Chapter 1: Introduction to Ethical Hacking

Technology Brief

Information Security Overview

The methods and processes to protect information and information systems from unauthorized access, the disclosure of information, usage or modification. Information security ensures the confidentiality, integrity, and availability. An organization without security policies and appropriate security rules are at great risk, and the confidential information and data related to that organization are not secure in the absence of these security policies. An organization along with well-defined security policies and procedures helps in protecting the assets of that organization from unauthorized access and disclosures. In the modern world, with the latest technologies and platforms, millions of users interacting with each other every minute. These sixty seconds can be vulnerable and costly to the private and public organizations due to the presence of various types of old and modern threats all over the world. Public internet is the most common and rapid option for spreading threats all over the world. Malicious Codes and Scripts, Viruses, Spams, and Malware are always waiting for you. That is why the Security risk to a network or a system can never eliminate. It is always a great challenge to implement a security policy that is effective and beneficial to the organization instead of the application of an unnecessary security implementation which can waste the resources and create a loophole for threats. Our Security objectives are surrounding these three basic concepts:

Data Breach

eBay Data Breach

One of the real-life examples describing the need for information and network security within the corporate network is eBay data breach. eBay is well-known online auction platform that is widely used all over the world.

eBay announced its massive data breach in 2014 which contained sensitive data. 145 million customers were estimated having data loss in this attack. According to eBay, the data breach compromised the following information including:

- Customers' names
- Encrypted passwords
- Email address
- Postal Address
- Contact Numbers
- Date of birth

These sensitive information must be stored in an encrypted form that uses strong encryption. Information must be encrypted, instead of being stored in plain text. eBay claims that no information relating to Security numbers like credit cards information was compromised, although identity and password theft can also cause severe risk. eBay database containing financial information such as credit cards information and other financial related information are claimed to be kept in a separate and encrypted format.

The Origin of eBay data breach for hackers is by compromising a small number of employees credentials via phishing in between February & March 2014. Specific employees may be targeted to get access to eBay's network or may eBay network was entirely being monitored and then compromised. They claimed detection of this cyberattack within two weeks.

Google Play Hack

A Turkish Hacker, “**Ibrahim Balic**” hacked Google Play twice. He conceded the responsibility of the Google Play attack. It was not his first attempt; he acclaimed that he was behind the Apple's Developer site attack. He tested vulnerabilities in Google's Developer Console and found a flaw in the Android Operating System, which he tested twice to make sure about it causing crash again and again.

Using the result of his vulnerability testing, he developed an android application to exploit the vulnerability. When the developer's console crashed, users were unable to download applications and developers were unable to upload their applications.

The Home Depot Data Breach

Theft of information from payment cards, like credit cards is common nowadays. In 2014, Home Depot's Point of Sale Systems were compromised. A released statement from Home Depot on the 8th of September 2014 claimed breach of their systems.

The attacker gained access to third-party vendors login credentials and accessed the POS networks. Zero-Day Vulnerability exploited in Windows which created a loophole to enter the corporate network of Home Depot to make a path from the third-party environment to Home Depot's network. After accessing the corporate network, Memory Scrapping Malware was released then attacked the Point of Sale terminals. Memory Scraping Malware is highly capable; it grabbed millions of payment cards information. Home Depot has taken several remediation actions against the attack, using EMV Chip-& Pin payment cards. These Chip-& Pin payment cards has a security chip embedded into it to ensure duplicity with magstripe.

Essential Terminology

Hack Value

The term Hack Value refers to a value that denotes attractiveness, interest or something that is worthy. Value describes the targets' level of attraction to the hacker.

Zero-Day Attack

Zero-Day Attacks refers to threats and vulnerabilities that can exploit the victim before the developer identify or address and release any patch for that vulnerability.

Vulnerability

The vulnerability refers to a weak point, loophole or a cause in any system or network which can be helpful and utilized by the attackers to go through it. Any vulnerability can be an entry point for them to reach the target.

Daisy Chaining

Daisy Chaining is a sequential process of several hacking or attacking attempts to gain access to network or systems, one after another, using the same information and the information obtained from the previous attempt.

Exploit

Exploit is a breach of security of a system through Vulnerabilities, Zero-Day Attacks or any other hacking techniques.

Doxing

The term Doxing refers to Publishing information or a set of information associated with an individual. This information is collected publicly, mostly from social media or other sources.

Payload

The payload refers to the actual section of information or data in a frame as opposed to automatically generated metadata. In information security, Payload is a section or part of a malicious and exploited code that causes the potentially harmful activity and actions such as exploit, opening backdoors, and hijacking.

Bot

The bots are software that is used to control the target remotely and to execute predefined tasks. It is capable to run automated scripts over the internet. The bots are also known as for Internet Bot or Web Robot. These Bots can be used for Social purposes such as Chatterbots, Commercial purpose or intended Malicious Purpose such as Spambots, Viruses, and Worms spreading, Botnets, DDoS attacks.

Elements of Information Security

Confidentiality

We want to make sure that our secret and sensitive data is secure. Confidentiality means that only authorized persons can work with and see our infrastructure's digital resources. It also implies that unauthorized persons should not have any access to the data. There are two types of data in general: data in motion as it moves across the network and data at rest, when data is in any media storage (such as servers, local hard drives, cloud). For data in motion, we need to make sure data encryption before sending it over the network. Another option we can use along with encryption is to use a separate network for sensitive data. For data at rest, we can apply encryption at storage media drive so that no one can read it in case of theft.

Integrity

We do not want our data to be accessible or manipulated by unauthorized persons. Data integrity ensures that only authorized parties can modify data.

Availability

Availability applies to systems and data. If authorized persons cannot get the data due to general network failure or denial-of-service(DOS) attack, then that is the problem as long as the business is concerned. It may also result in loss of revenues or recording some important results.

We can use the term “**CIA**” to remember these basic yet most important

security concepts.

Authenticity

Authentication is the process which identifies the user, or device to grant privileges, access and certain rules and policies. Similarly, Authenticity ensures the authentication of certain information initiates from a valid user claiming to be the source of that information & message transactions. The process of authentication through the combined function of identities and passwords can achieve Authenticity.

Non-Repudiation

Nonrepudiation is one of the Information Assurance (IA) pillar which guarantees the information transmission & receiving between the sender and receiver via different techniques such as digital signatures and encryption. Non-repudiation is the assurance the communication and its authenticity, so the sender cannot deny from what he sent. Similarly, the receiver cannot deny from receiving. Digital contracts, signatures and email messages use Nonrepudiation techniques.

The Security, Functionality, and Usability Triangle

In a System, Level of Security is a measure of the strength of the Security in the system, Functionality, and Usability. These three components are known as the Security, Functionality and Usability triangle. Consider a ball in this triangle, if the ball is centered, it means all three components are stronger, on the other hand, if the ball is closer to security, it means the system is consuming more resources for security and feature and function of the system and Usability requires attention. A secure system must provide strong protection along with offering all services and features and usability to the user.

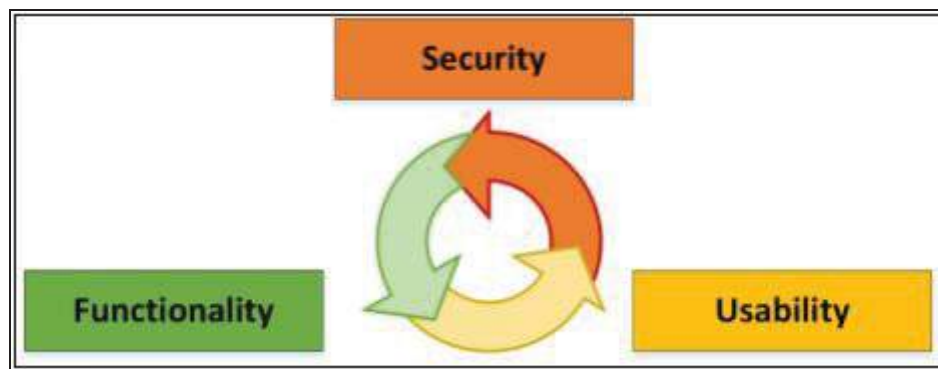


Figure 1-2 Security, Functionality & Usability Triangle

Implementation of High level of Security typically impacts the level of functionality and usability with ease. The system becomes nonuser-friendly with a decrease in performance. While developing an application, deployment of security in a system, Security experts must keep in mind to make sure about functionality & ease of usability. These three components of a triangle must be balanced.

Information Security Threats and Attack Vectors

Motives, Goals, and Objectives of Information Security Attacks

In the information security world, an attacker attacks the target system with the three main components behind it. "Motive or Objective" of an attack makes an attacker focus on attacking a particular system. Another major component is "Method" that is used by an attacker to gain access to a target system. Vulnerability also helps the attacker to fulfill his intentions. These three components are the major blocks on which an attack depends.

Motive and Objective of an attacker to attack a system may depend upon something valuable stored in that specific system. The reason might be ethical or non-ethical. However, there must be a goal to achieve for the hacker, which leads to the threat to the system. Some typical motives of behind attacks are information theft, Manipulation of data, Disruption, propagation of political or religious beliefs, attack on target's reputation or taking revenge. Method of attack & Vulnerability runs side by side. Intruder applies various tools and number of advanced & older techniques to exploit a vulnerability within a system, or security policy to breach & achieve their motives.

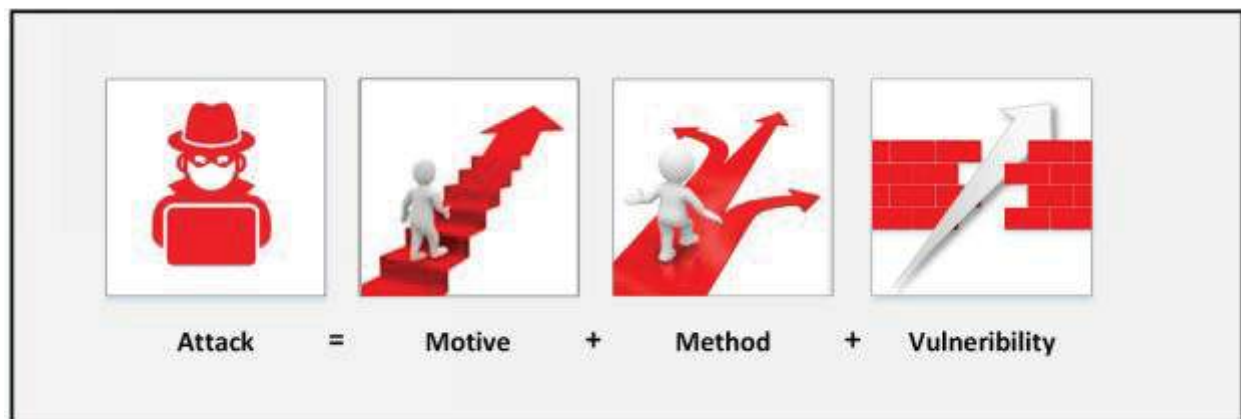


Figure 1-3 Information Security Attack

Top Information Security Attack Vectors

Cloud Computing Threats

Cloud Computing is the most common trend & popularly in use nowadays. It does not mean that threats to cloud computing or cloud security are fewer. Mostly, the same issues as in traditionally hosted environments also exist in the cloud computing. It is very important to secure Cloud computing to

protect services and important data.

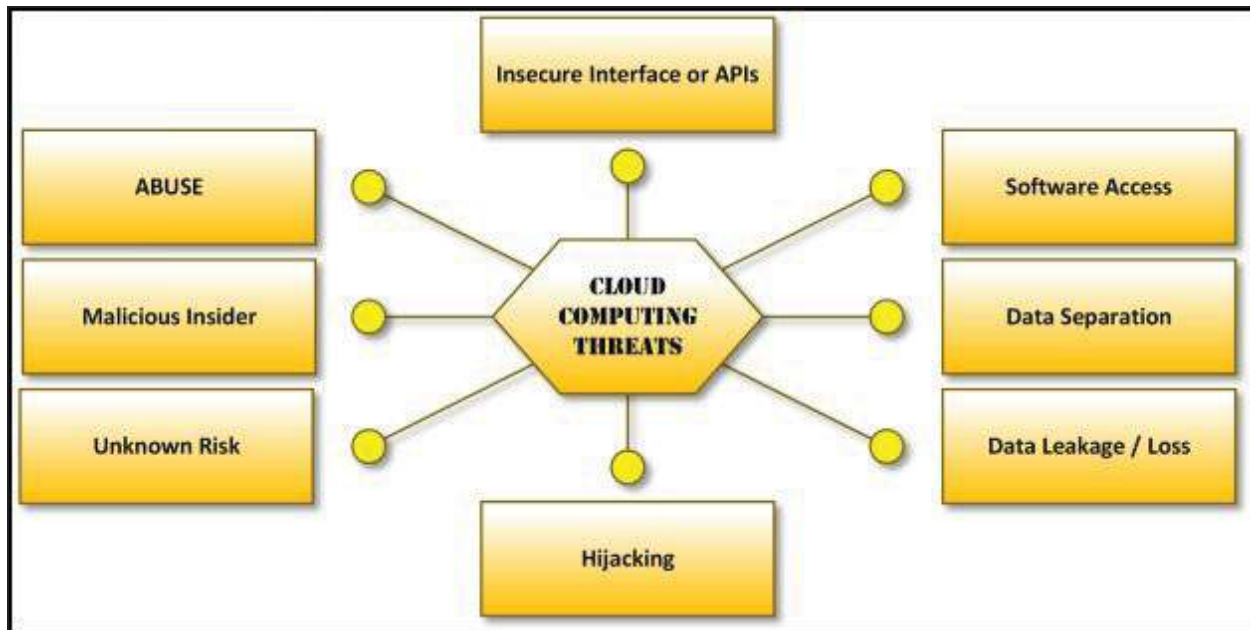


Figure 1-4 Cloud Computing Threats

The following are some threats that exist in the Cloud Security:

- In the Cloud Computing Environment, a major threat to cloud security is a single data breach that can result in loss. Additionally, it allows the hacker to further have access to the records which allows the hacker to have access to multiple records over the cloud. It is the extremely worst situation where compromising of single entity leads to compromise multiple records.
- Data Loss is one of the most common potential threats that is vulnerable to Cloud security as well. Data loss may be due to intended or accidental means. It may be large scale or small scale; however massive data loss is catastrophic & costly.
- Another Major threat to Cloud computing is the hijacking of Account over cloud and Services. Applications running on a cloud having software flaws, weak encryption, loopholes, and vulnerabilities allows the intruder to control.

Furthermore, there are several more threats to Cloud computing which are:

- Insecure APIs
- Denial of Services
- Malicious Insiders

- Poor Security
- Multi-Tenancy

Advanced Persistent Threats

An advanced persistent threat (APT) is the process of stealing information by a continuous process. An Advanced Persistent Threat usually focuses on private organizations or for political motives. The APT process relies upon advanced, sophisticated techniques to exploit vulnerabilities within a system. The "persistent" term defines the process of an external command and controlling system that is continuously monitoring and fetching data from a target. The "threat" process indicates the involvement attacker with potentially harmful intentions.

Viruses and Worms

Term "Virus" in Network and Information security describes malicious software. This malicious software is developed to spread, replicate themselves, and attach themselves to other files. Attaching with other files helps to transfer onto other systems. These viruses require user interaction to trigger and initiate malicious activities on the resident system.

Unlike Viruses, Worms are capable of replicating themselves. This capability of worms makes them spread on a resident system very quickly. Worms are

propagating in different forms since the 1980s. Some types of emerging worms are very destructive, responsible for devastating DoS attacks.

Mobile Threats

Emerging mobile phone technology, especially Smartphones has raised the focus of attacker over mobile devices. As Smartphones are popularly used all over the world, it has shifted the focus of attackers to steal business and personal information through mobile devices. The most common threat to mobile devices are:

- Data leakage
- Unsecured Wi-Fi
- Network Spoofing
- Phishing Attacks
- Spyware
- Broken Cryptography
- Improper Session Handling

Insider Attack

An insider attack is the type of attack that is performed on a system, within a corporate network, by a trusted person. Trusted User is termed as Insider because Insider has privileges and it is authorized to access the network resources.

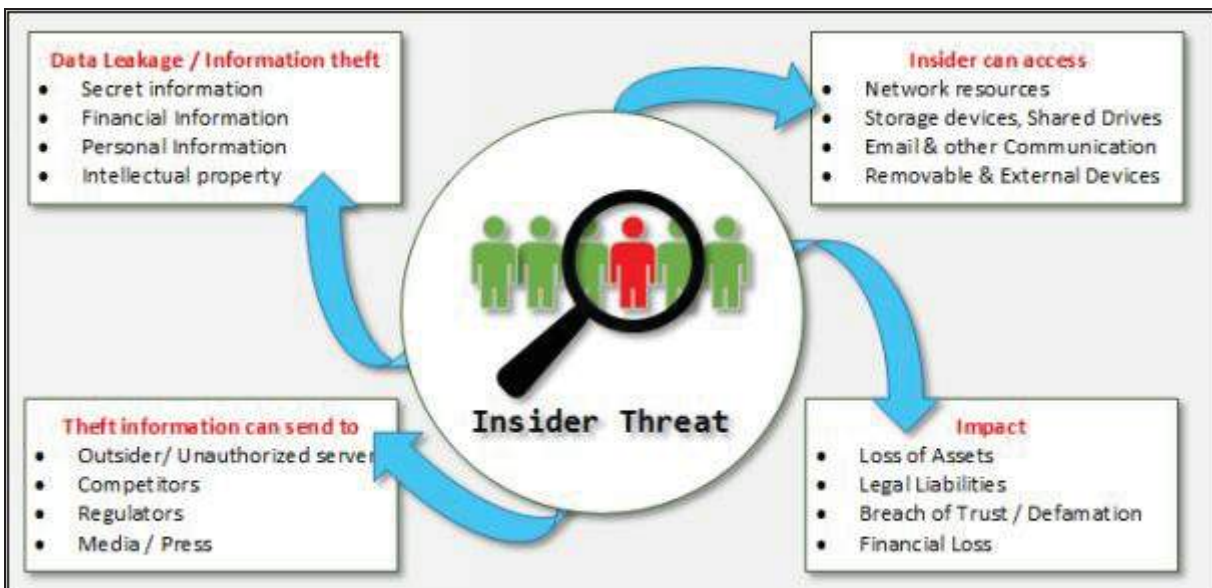


Figure 1-5 Insider Threats

Botnets

Combination of the functionality of Robot and Network develop a continuously working Botnet on a repetitive task. It is the basic fundamental of a bot. They are known as the workhorses of the Internet. These botnets perform repetitive tasks. The most often of botnets are in connection with Internet Relay Chat. These types of botnets are legal and beneficial.

A botnet may use for positive intentions but there also some botnets which are illegal and intended for malicious activities. These malicious botnets can gain access to the systems using malicious scripts and codes either by directly hacking the system or through "Spider." Spider program crawls over the internet and searches for holes in security. Bots introduce the system on the hacker's web by contacting the master computer. It alerts the master computer when the system is under control. Attacker remotely controls all bots from Master computer.

Information Security Threat Categories

Information Security Threats categories are as follows:

Network Threats

The primary components of network infrastructure are routers, switches, and firewalls. These devices not only perform routing and other network operations, but they also control and protect the running applications, servers, and devices from attacks and intrusions. The poorly configured device offers intruder to exploit. Common vulnerabilities on the network include using default installation settings, open access controls, Weak encryption & Passwords, and devices lacking the latest security patches. Top network level threats include:

- Information gathering
- Sniffing & Eavesdropping
- Spoofing
- Session hijacking
- Man-in-the-Middle Attack
- DNS & ARP Poisoning
- Password-based Attacks
- Denial-of-Services Attacks
- Compromised Key Attacks
- Firewall & IDS Attacks

Host Threats

Host threats are focused on system software; Applications are built or running over this software such as Windows 2000, .NET Framework, SQL Server, and others. The Host Level Threats includes:

- Malware Attacks
- Footprinting
- Password Attacks
- Denial-of-Services Attacks
- Arbitrary code execution
- Unauthorized Access
- Privilege Escalation
- Backdoor Attacks
- Physical Security Threats

Application Threats

Best practice to analyze application threats is by organizing them into application vulnerability category. Main threats to the application are:

- Improper Data / Input Validation
- Authentication & Authorization Attack
- Security Misconfiguration
- Information Disclosure
- Broken Session Management
- Buffer Overflow Issues
- Cryptography Attacks
- SQL Injection
- Improper Error handling & Exception Management

Types of Attacks on a System

Operating System Attacks

In Operating System Attacks, Attackers always search for an operating system's vulnerabilities. If they found any vulnerability in an Operating System, they exploit to attack against the operating system. Some most common vulnerabilities of an operating system are:

- ***Buffer overflow vulnerabilities***

Buffer Overflow is one of the major types of Operating System Attacks. It is related to software exploitation attacks. In Buffer overflow, when a

program or application does not have well-defined boundaries such as restrictions or pre-defined functional area regarding the capacity of data it can handle or the type of data can be inputted. Buffer overflow causes problems such as Denial of Service (DoS), rebooting, achievement of unrestricted access and freezing.

- ***Bugs in the operating system***

In software exploitation attack & bugs in software, the attacker tries to exploit the vulnerabilities in software. This vulnerability might be a mistake by the developer while developing the program code. Attackers can discover these mistakes, use them to gain access to the system.

- ***Unpatched operating system***

Unpatched Operating System allows malicious activities, or could not completely block malicious traffic into a system. Successful intrusion can impact severely in the form of compromising sensitive information, data loss and disruption of regular operation.

Misconfiguration Attacks

In a corporate network while installation of new devices, the administrator must have to change the default configurations. If devices are left upon default configuration, using default credentials, any user who does not have the privileges to access the device but has connectivity can access the device. It is not a big deal for an intruder to access such type of device because default configuration has common, weak passwords and there are no security policies are enabled on devices by default.

Similarly, permitting an unauthorized person or giving resources and permission to a person more than his privileges might also lead to an attack. Additionally, Using the organization in Username & password attributes make it easier for hackers to gain access.

Application-Level Attacks

Before releasing an application, the developer must make sure, test & verify from its end, manufactures or from developer's end. In an Application level attack, a hacker can use:

- Buffer overflow
- Active content
- Cross-site script

- Denial of service
- SQL injection
- Session hijacking
- Phishing

Shrink Wrap Code Attacks

Shrink Wrap code attack is the type of attack in which hacker uses the shrink wrap code method for gaining access to a system. In this type of attack, hacker exploits holes in unpatched Operating systems, poorly configured software and application. To understand shrink wrap vulnerabilities, consider an operating system has a bug in its original software version. The vendor may have released the update, but it is the most critical time between the release of a patch by vendor till client's systems updates. During this critical time, unpatched systems are vulnerable to the Shrinkwrap attack. Shrinkwrap attack also includes vulnerable to the system installed with software that is bundled with insecure test pages and debugging scripts. The developer must have to remove these scripts before release.

Information Warfare

Information warfare is a concept of warfare, to get involved in the warfare of information to gain the most of information. The term, “**Information Warfare**” or “**Info War**” describes the use of information and communication technology (ICT). The major reason or focus of this information war is to get a competitive advantage over the opponent or enemy. The following is the classification of Information warfare into two classes: -

1. Defensive Information Warfare

Defensive Information warfare term is used to refer to all defensive actions that are taken to defend from attacks to steal information and information-based processes. Defensive Information warfare areas are: -

- Prevention
- Deterrence
- Indication & Warning
- Detection
- Emergency Preparedness
- Response

2. Offensive Information Warfare

The offensive term is associated with the military. Offensive warfare is an aggressive operation that is taken against the enemies dynamically instead of waiting for the attackers to launch an attack. Accessing their territory to gain instead of losing territory is the fundamental concept of offensive warfare. The major advantage of offensive warfare is to identify the opponent, strategies of the opponent, and other information. Offensive Information warfare prevents or modifies the information from being in use by considering integrity, availability, and confidentiality.

Hacking Concepts, Types, and Phases

Hacker

Hacker is the one who is smart enough to steal the information such as Business data, personal data, financial information, credit card information, username & Password from the system he is unauthorized to get this information by taking unauthorized control over that system using different techniques and tools. Hackers have great skill, ability to develop software and explore software and hardware. Their intention can be either doing illegal things for fun or sometimes they are paid to hack.

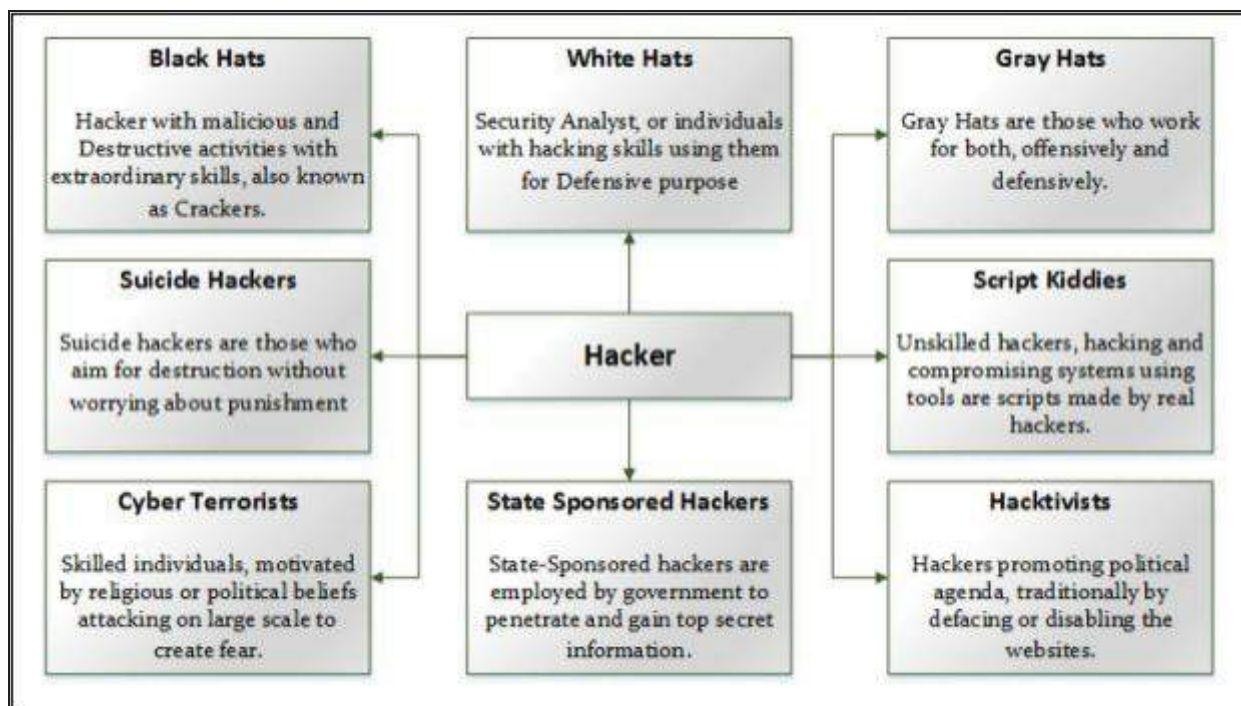


Figure 1-6 Types of Hacker

Hacking

The Term "Hacking" in information security refers to exploiting the vulnerabilities in a system, compromising the security to gain unauthorized command and control over the system resources. Purpose of hacking may include modification of system resources, disruption of features and services to achieve goals. It can also be used to steal information for any use like sending it to competitors, regulatory bodies or publicizing the sensitive information.

Hacking Phases

The following are the five phases of hacking: -

1. Reconnaissance
2. Scanning
3. Gaining Access
4. Maintaining Access
5. Clearing Tracks

Reconnaissance

Reconnaissance is an initial preparing phase for the attacker to get ready for an attack by gathering the information about the target before launching an attack using different tools and techniques. Gathering of information about the target makes it easier for an attacker, even on a large scale. Similarly, in large scale, it helps to identify the target range.

In ***Passive Reconnaissance***, the hacker is acquiring the information about target without interacting the target directly. An example of passive reconnaissance is public or social media searching for gaining information about the target.

Active Reconnaissance is gaining information by acquiring the target directly. Examples of active reconnaissance are via calls, emails, help desk or technical departments.

Scanning

Scanning phase is a pre-attack phase. In this phase, attacker scans the network by information acquired during the initial phase of reconnaissance. Scanning tools include Dialler, Scanners such as Port scanners, Network mappers, client tools such as ping, as well as vulnerabilities scanner. During the scanning phase, attacker finally fetches the information of ports including port status, operating system information, device type, live machines, and other information depending upon scanning.

Gaining Access

Gaining access phase of hacking is the point where the hacker gets the control over an operating system, application or computer network. Control gained by the attacker defines the access level such as operating system level, application level or network level access. Techniques include password cracking, denial of service, session hijacking or buffer overflow and others are used to gain unauthorized access. After accessing the system; the attacker

escalates the privileges to obtain complete control over services and process and compromise the connected intermediate systems.

Maintaining Access / Escalation of Privileges

Maintaining access phase is the point when an attacker is trying to maintain the access, ownership & control over the compromised systems. Similarly, attacker prevents the owner from being owned by any other hacker. They use ***Backdoors, Rootkits*** or ***Trojans*** to retain their ownership. In this phase, an attacker may steal information by uploading the information to the remote server, download any file on the resident system, and manipulate the data and configuration. To compromise other systems, the attacker uses this compromised system to launch attacks.

Clearing Tracks

An attacker must hide his identity by covering the tracks. Covering tracks are those activities which are carried out to hide the malicious activities. Covering track is most required for an attacker to fulfill their intentions by continuing the access to the compromised system, remain undetected & gain what they want, remain unnoticed and wipe all evidence that indicates his identity. To manipulate the identity and evidence, the attacker overwrites the system, application, and other related logs to avoid suspicion.

Ethical Hacking Concepts and Scope

Ethical Hacking

Ethical hacking and penetration testing are common terms, popular in information security environment for a long time. Increase in cybercrimes and hacking create a great challenge for security experts and analyst and regulations over the last decade. It is a popular war between hackers and security professionals.

Fundamental Challenges to these security experts are of finding weaknesses and deficiencies in running and upcoming systems, applications, software and addressing them proactively. It is less costly to investigate proactively before an attack instead of investigating after falling into an attack, or while dealing with an attack. For security aspect, prevention and protection, organizations have their penetration testing teams internally as well as contracted outside professional experts when and if they are needed depending on the severity and scope of the attack.

Why Ethical Hacking is Necessary

The rise in malicious activities, cybercrimes and appearance of different forms of advanced attacks require to need of penetration tester who penetrate the security of system and networks to be determined, prepare and take precaution and remediation action against these aggressive attacks.

These aggressive and advanced attacks include: -

- Denial-of-Services Attacks
- Manipulation of data
- Identity Theft
- Vandalism
- Credit Card theft
- Piracy
- Theft of Services

Increase in these type of attacks, hacking cases, and cyber attacks, because of increase of use of online transaction and online services in the last decade. It becomes more attractive for hackers and attackers to tempt to steal financial information. Computer or Cybercrime law has slowed down prank activities

only, whereas real attacks and cybercrimes rise. It focuses on the requirement of Pentester, a shortened form of Penetration tester for the search for vulnerabilities and flaw within a system before waiting for an attack.

If you want to beat the attacker and hacker, you have to be smart enough to think like them and act like them. As we know, hackers are skilled, with great knowledge of hardware, software, and exploration capabilities. It ensures the need and importance of ethical hacking which allows the ethical hacker to counter the attack from malicious hackers by anticipating methods. Another major advantage and need for ethical hacking are to uncover the vulnerabilities in systems and security deployments to take action to secure them before they are used by a hacker to breach security.

Scope and Limitations of Ethical Hacking

Ethical Hacking is an important and crucial component of risk assessment, auditing, counter frauds. Ethical hacking is widely used as penetration testing to identify the vulnerabilities, risk, and highlight the holes to take remedial actions against attacks. However, there is also some limitations where ethical hacking is not enough, or just through ethical hacking, the issue could not resolve. An organization must first know what it is looking for before hiring an external pentester. It helps focus the goals to achieve and save time. The testing team dedicated in troubleshooting the actual problem in resolving the issues. The ethical hacker also helps to understand the security system of an organization better. It is up to the organization to take recommended actions by the Pentester and enforce security policies over the system and network.

Phases of Ethical Hacking

Ethical Hacking is the combination of the following phases: -

1. Footprinting & Reconnaissance
2. Scanning
3. Enumeration
4. System Hacking
5. Escalation of Privileges
6. Covering Tracks

Skills of an Ethical Hacker

A skilled, ethical hacker has a set of technical and non-technical skills.

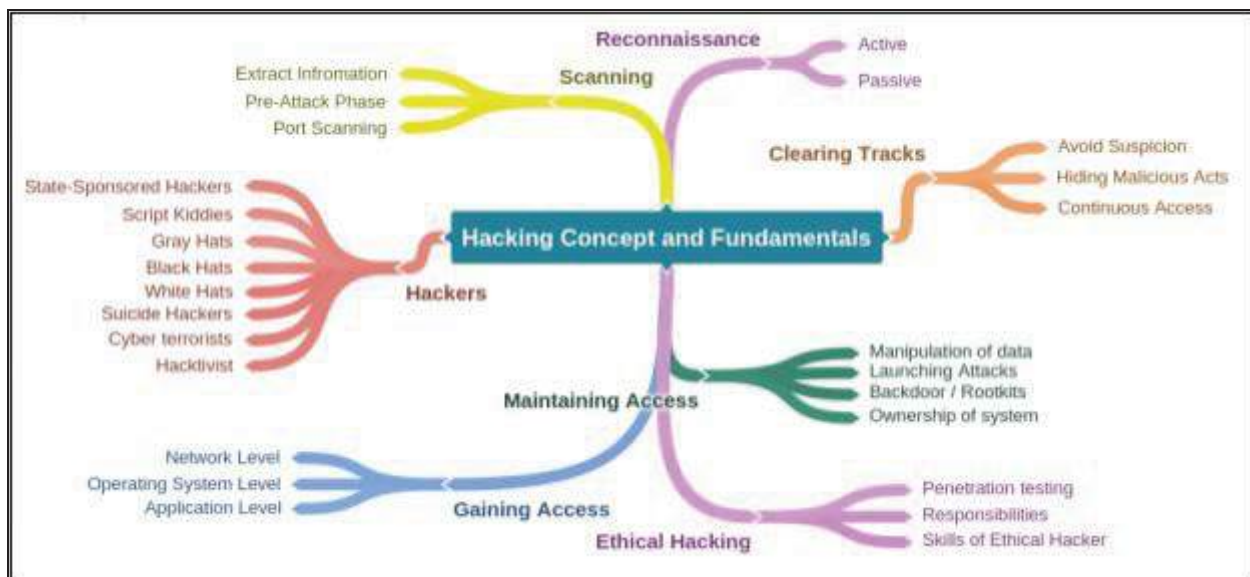
Technical Skills

1. Ethical Hacker has in-depth knowledge of almost all operating systems, including all popular, widely- used operating systems such as Windows, Linux, Unix, and Macintosh.
2. These ethical hackers are skilled at networking, basic and detailed concepts, technologies, and exploring capabilities of hardware and software.
3. Ethical hackers must have a strong command over security areas, related issues, and technical domains.
4. They must have detailed knowledge of older, advanced, sophisticated attacks.

Non-Technical Skills

1. Learning ability
2. Problem-solving skills
3. Communication skills
4. Committed to security policies
5. Awareness of laws, standards, and regulations.

Information Security Controls

Information Assurance (IA)

Information Assurance, in short, known as IA, depends upon the components that are ***Integrity, Availability, Confidentiality, and Authenticity***. With the combination of these components, assurance of information and information systems are ensured and protected during the processes, usage, storage, and communication. These components are defined earlier in this chapter.

Apart from these components, some methods and processes also help in the achievement of information assurance such as: -

- Policies and Processes.
- Network Authentication.
- User Authentication.
- Network Vulnerabilities.
- Identifying problems and resources.
- Implementation of a plan for identified requirements.
- Application of information assurance control.

Information Security Management Program

Information Security Management programs are the programs that are specially designed to focus on reducing the risk and vulnerabilities towards information security environment to train the organization and users to work in the less vulnerable state. The Information Security Management is a combined management solution to achieve the required level of information security using well-defined security policies, processes of classification, reporting, and management and standards. The diagram on the next page shows the EC-Council defined Information Security Management Framework: -

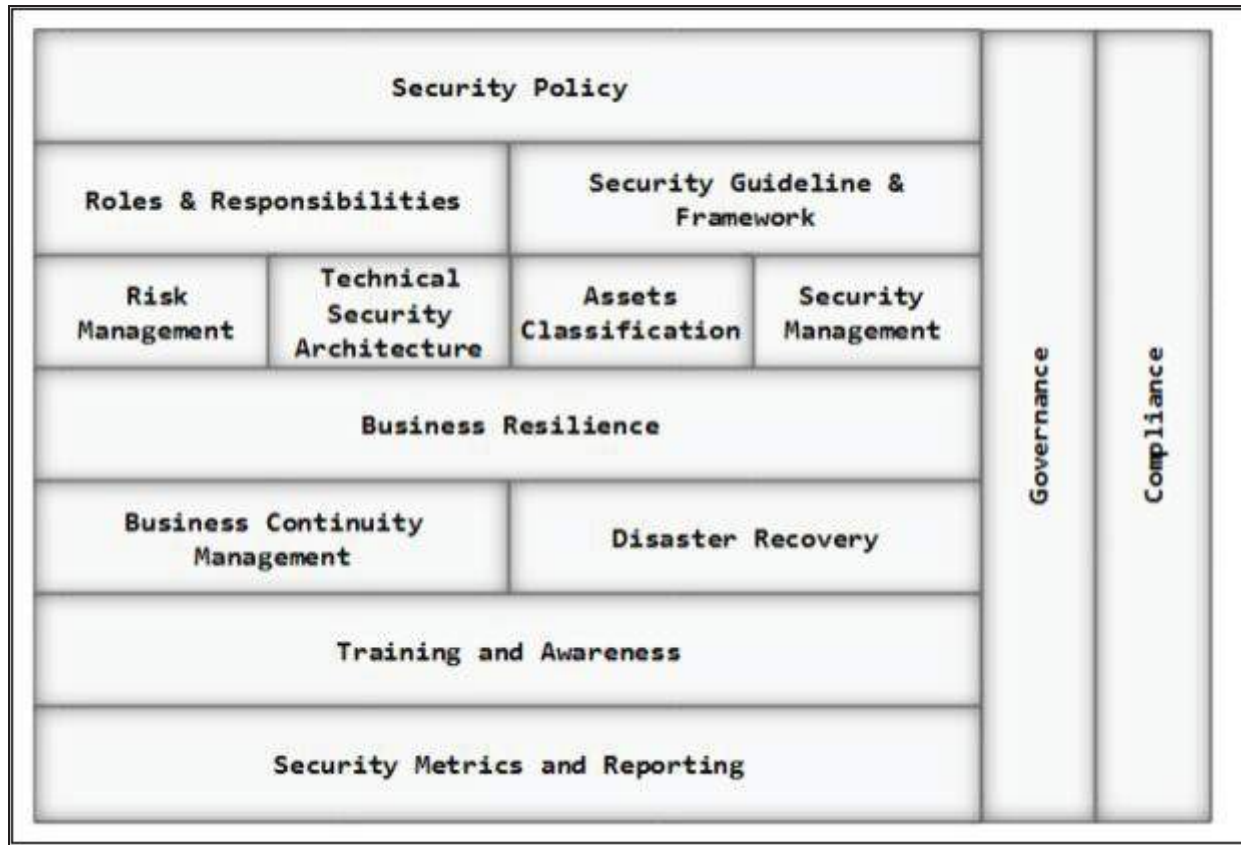


Figure 1-7 Information Security Management Framework

Threat Modeling

Threat Modeling is the process or approach to identify, diagnose, and assist the threats and vulnerabilities of the system. It is an approach to risk management which dedicatedly focuses on analyzing the system security and application security against security objectives. This identification of threats and risks helps to focus and take action on an event to achieve the goals. Capturing data of an organization, implementing identification and assessment processes over the captured information to analyze the information that can impact the security of an application. Application overview includes the identification process of an application to determine the trust boundaries and data flow. Decomposition of an application and identification of a threat helped to a detailed review of threats, identification of threat that is breaching the security control. This identification and detailed review of every aspect expose the vulnerabilities and weaknesses of the information security environment.

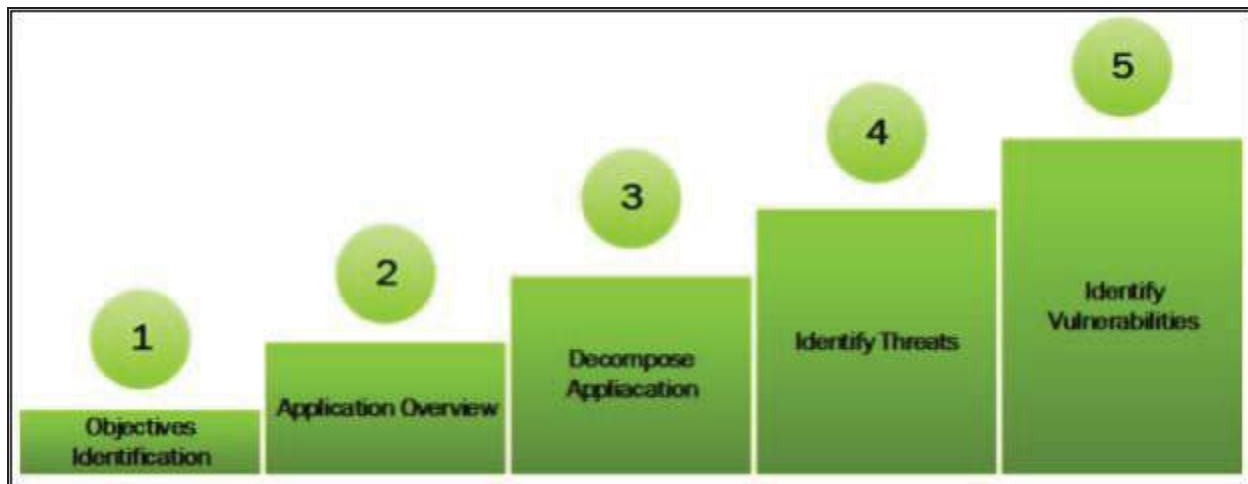


Figure 1-8 Threat Modelling

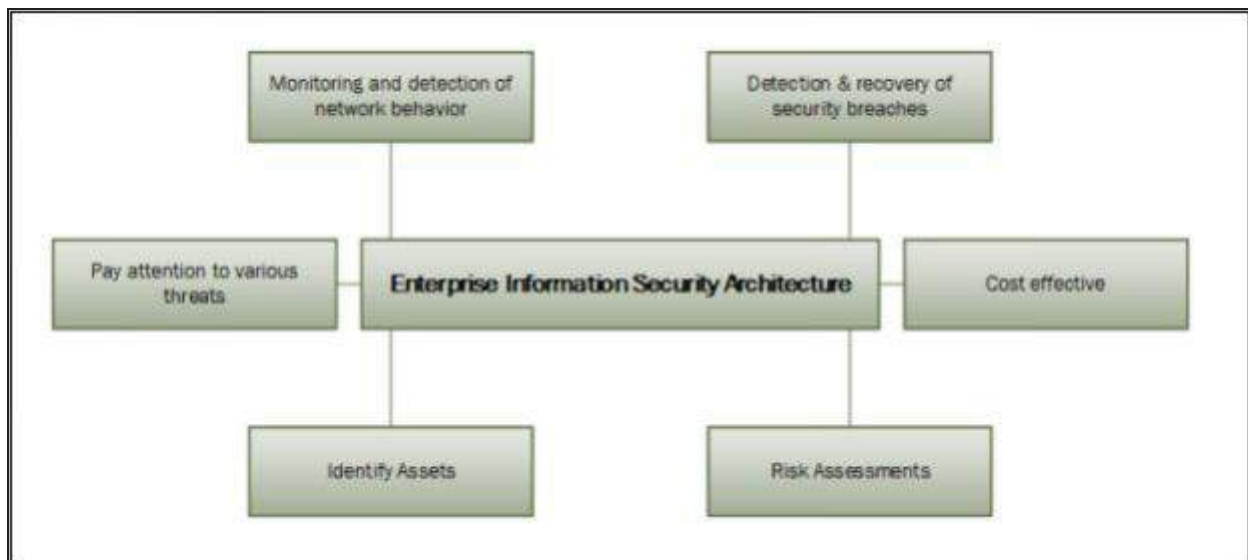


Figure 1-9 EISA

Network Security Zoning

These security zones are the set of network devices having a specific security level. Different security zones may have a similar or different security level. Defining different security zones with their security levels helps in monitoring and controlling of

inbound and outbound traffic across the network.

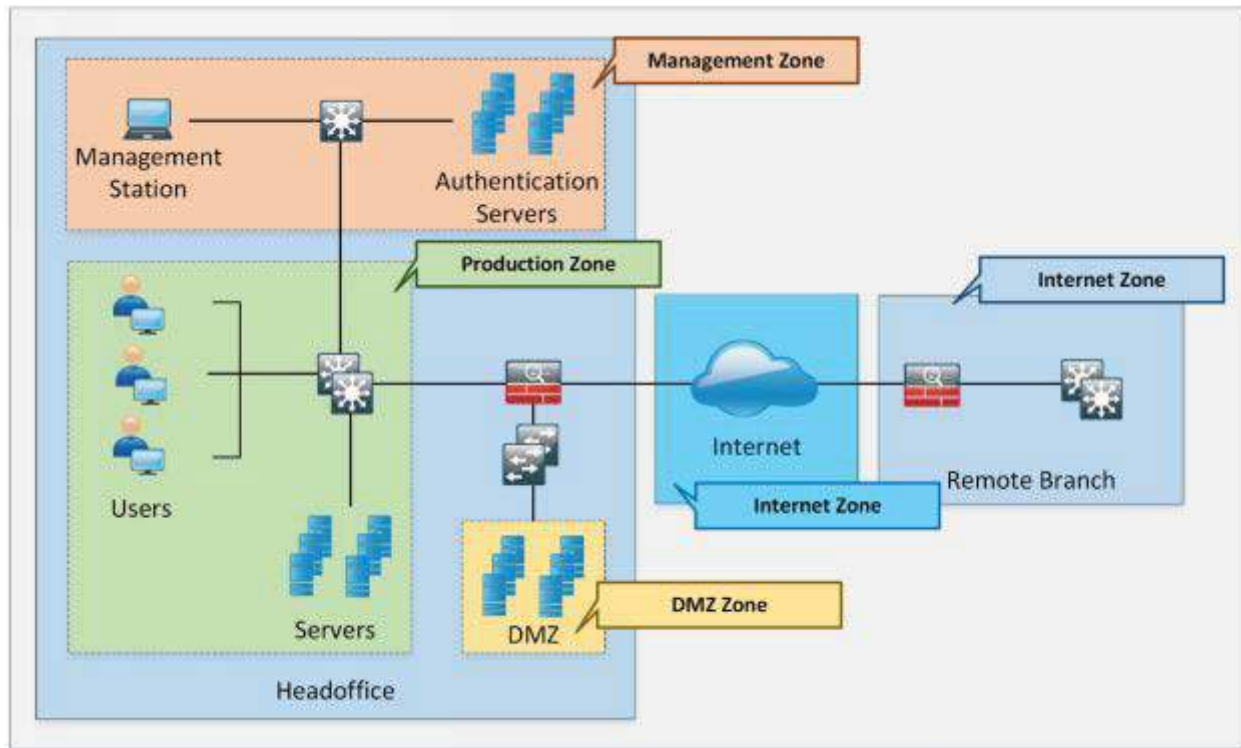


Figure 1-10 Network Security Zoning

Information Security Policies

Information Security Policies are the fundamental and the most dependent component of the information security infrastructure. Fundamental security requirements, conditions, rules are configured to be enforced in an information security policy to secure the organization's resources. These policies cover the outlines of management, administration and security requirements within an information security architecture.

Promiscuous policy

The promiscuous policy has no restriction on usage of system resources.

Permissive policy

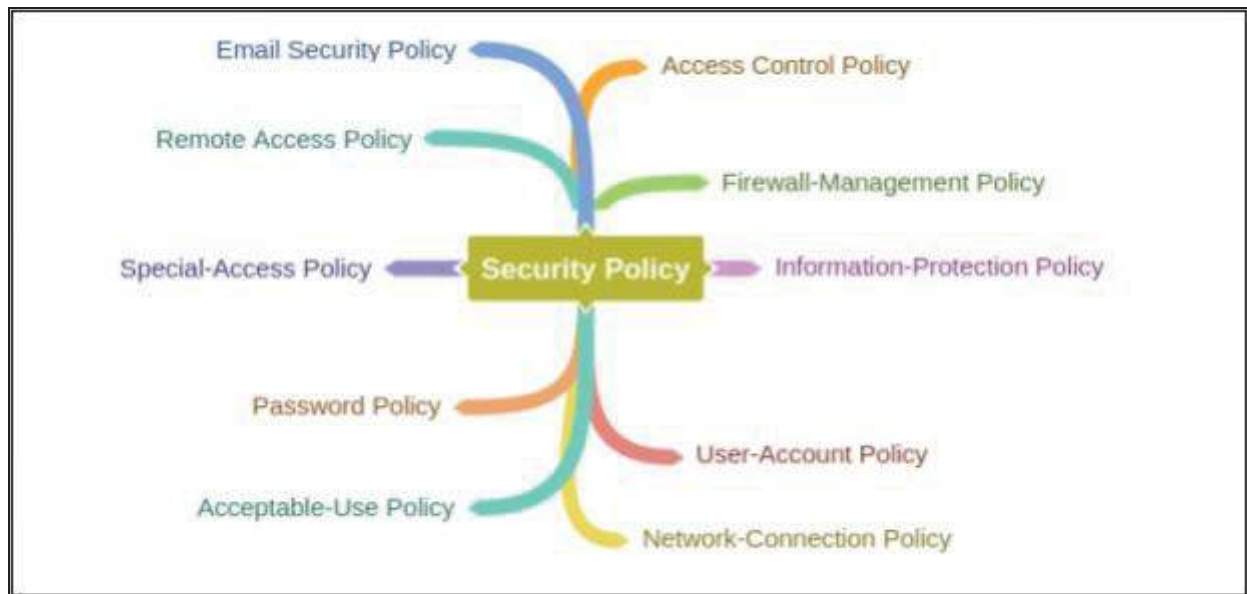
The permissive policy restricts only widely known, dangerous attacks or behavior.

Prudent Policy

The prudent policy ensures maximum and strongest security among them. However, it allows known, necessary risks, blocking all other service but individually enabled services. Every event is log in prudent policy.

Paranoid Policy

Paranoid Policy denied everything, limiting internet usage.



Implications for Security Policy Enforcement

HR & Legal Implication of Security Policies

HR department has the responsibility of making sure the organization is aware regarding security policies as well as providing sufficient training.

With the cooperation of the management or administration within an organization, the HR department monitors the enforcement of security policies & deals with any violation, issues arise in the deployment.

Legal implication of security policies enforces under the supervision of the professionals. These professionals are legal experts, consultant which comply with laws, especially local laws and regulations. Any violation of legal implication leads to lawsuits against the responsible.

Physical Security

Physical Security is always the top priority in securing anything. In Information Security, it is also considered important and regarded as the first layer of protection. Physical security includes protection against human-made attacks such as theft, damage, unauthorized physical access as well as environmental impacts such as rain, dust, power failure and fire.

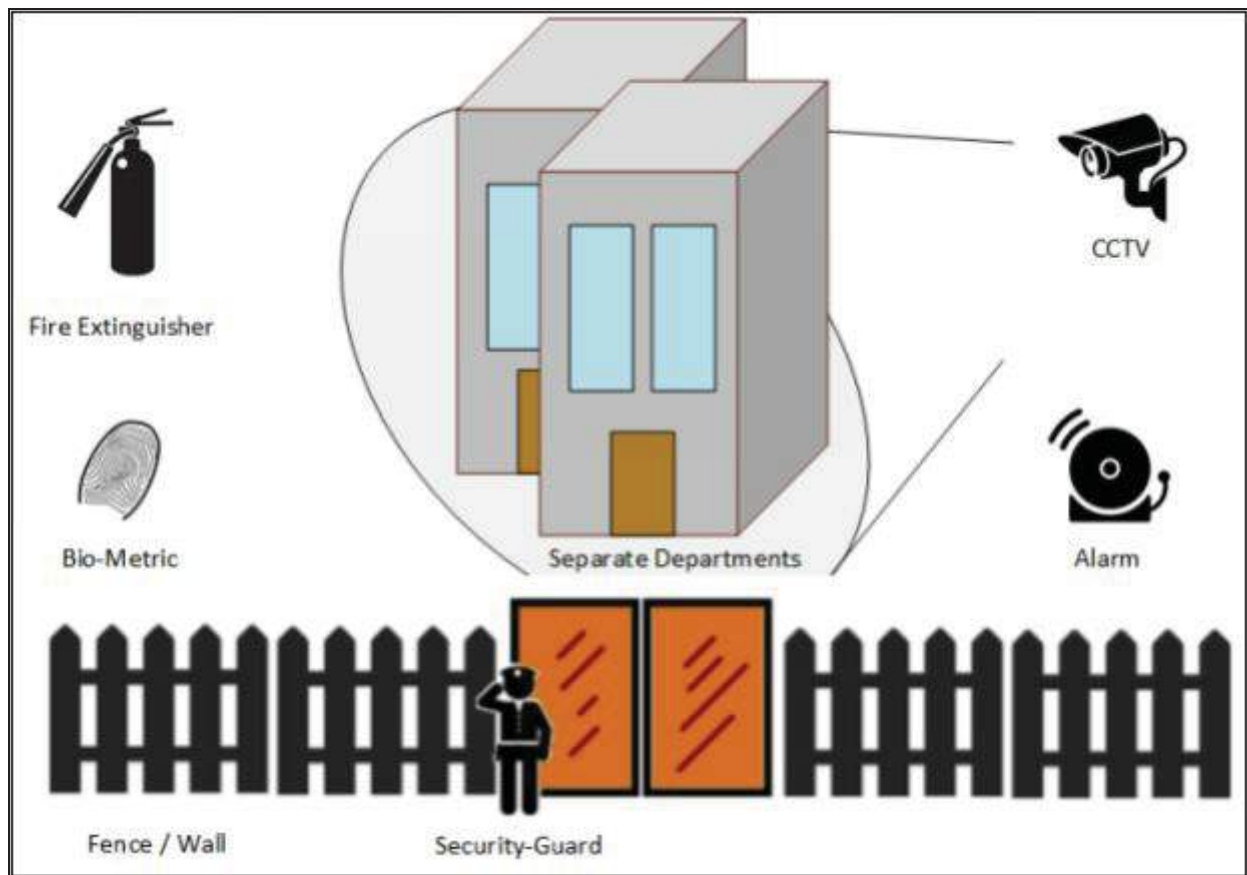


Figure 1-12 Physical Security

Physical security is required to prevent stealing, tampering, damage, theft and many more physical attacks. To secure the premises and assets, setup of fences, guards, CCTV cameras, intruder monitoring system, burglar alarms, deadlocks to secure the premises. Important files and documents should be available on any unsecured location even within an organization or keep locked, available to authorized persons only. Function area must be separated, biometrically protected. Continuous or frequent monitoring such as monitoring of wiretapping, computer equipment, HVAC, and firefighting system should also be done.

Incident Management

Incident Response Management is the procedure and method of handling an incident that occurs. This incident may be any specific violation of any condition, policies, or else. Similarly, in information security, incident responses are the remediation actions or steps taken as the response of an incident depending upon identification of an event, threat or attack to the removal or elimination (when system become stable, secure and functional again). Incident response management defines the roles and responsibilities of penetration testers, users or employees of an organization. Additionally, incident response management defines actions required when a system is facing a threat to its confidentiality, integrity, authenticity, availability depending upon the threat level. Initially, the important thing to remember is when a system is dealing with an attack, it requires sophisticated, dedicated troubleshooting by an expert. While responding to the incident, the professional collects the evidence, information, and clues that are helpful for prevention in future, tracing the attacker and finding the holes and vulnerabilities in the system.

Incident Management Process

Incident Response Management processes include: -

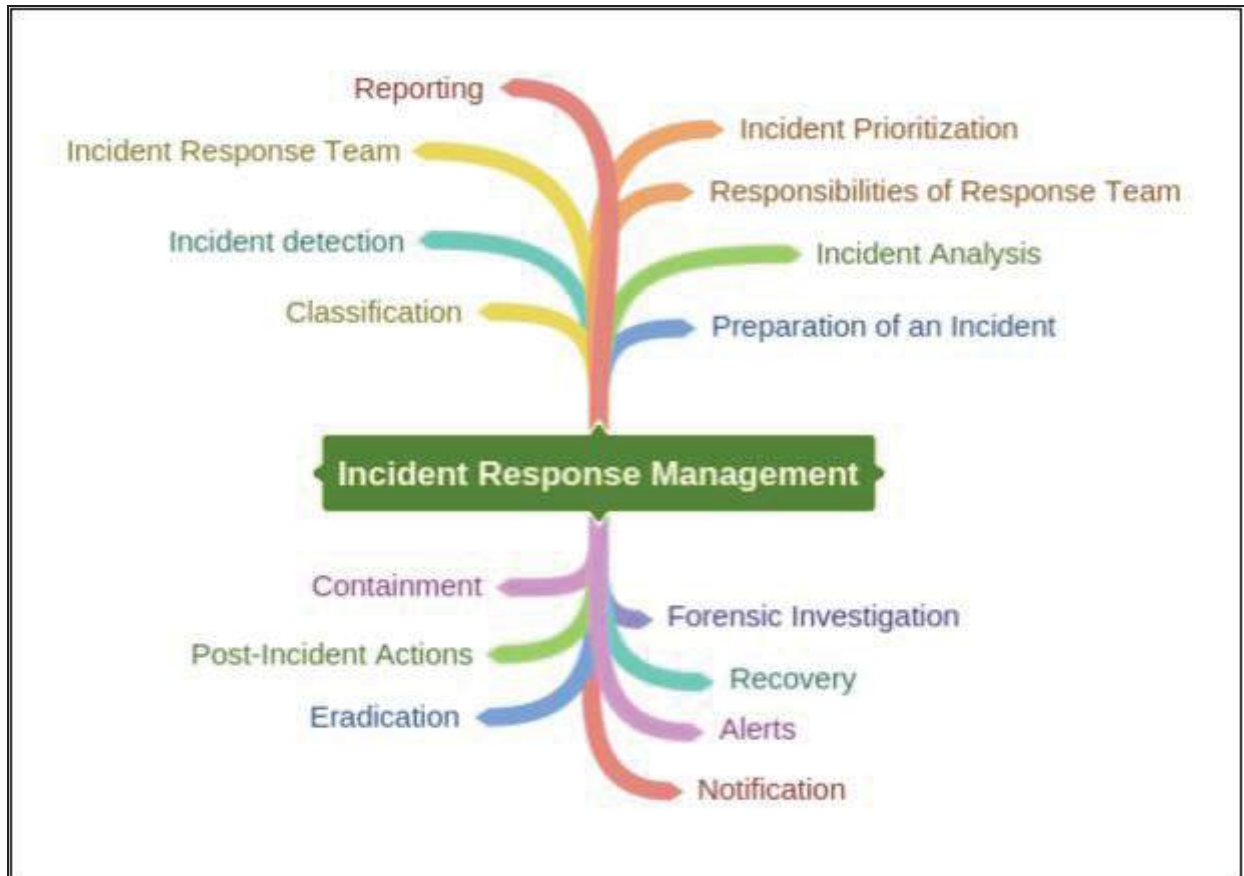
1. Preparation for Incident Response
2. Detection and Analysis of Incident Response
3. Classification of an incident and its prioritization
4. Notification and Announcements
5. Containment
6. Forensic Investigation of an incident
7. Eradication and Recovery
8. Post-Incident Activities

Responsibilities of Incident Response Team

The Incident Response team is consists of the members who are well-aware of dealing with incidents. This Response team is consists of trained officials who are expert in collecting the information and secure all evidence of an attack from the incident system. As far as the member of Incident response team is concerned, this team includes IT personnel, HR, Public Relation officers, Local Law enforcement, and Chief Security officer.

- The major responsibility of this team is to take action according to Incident Response Plan (IRP). If IRP is not defined, not applicable on that case, the team has to follow the leading examiner to perform a coordinated operation.
- Examination and evaluation of event, determination of damage or scope of an attack.
- Document the event, processes.
- If required, take the support of external security professional or consultant.
- If required, take the support of local law enforcement.
- Facts Collection.
- Reporting.

Vulnerability Assessment

Vulnerability assessment is the procedure of examination, identification, and analysis of system or application abilities including security processes running on a system to withstand any threat. Through vulnerability assessment, you can identify weaknesses and threat to a system, scope a vulnerability, estimate the requirement and effectiveness of any additional security layer.

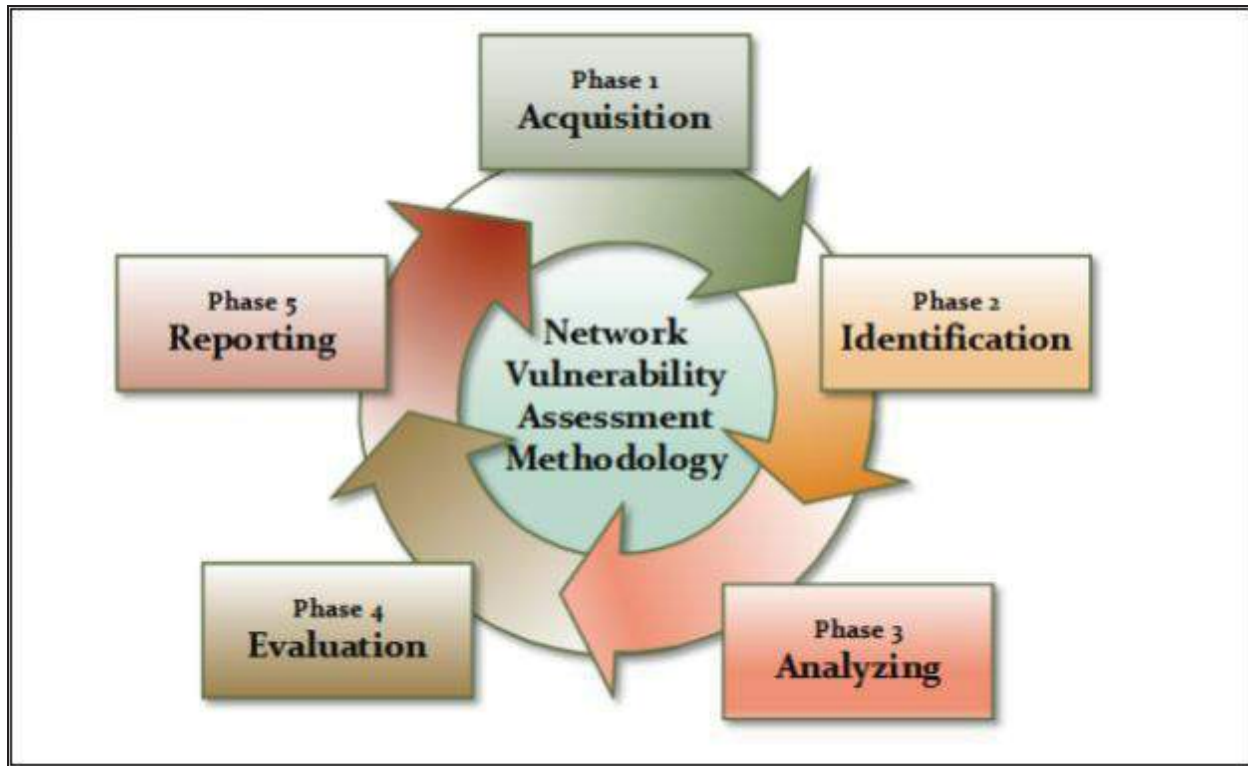


Figure 1-13 Network Vulnerability Assessment Methodology

Analyzing

Analyzing phase reviews, the gathered, collected information in the form of a collection of documentation or one-to-one interaction. Analyzing phase is basically: -

- Evaluation of the effectiveness of existing security policies.

Evaluation

Evaluation phase includes: -

- Inspection of Identified Vulnerabilities.

- Determination of Security Control required resolving issues & Vulnerabilities.
- Identify modification and Upgrades.

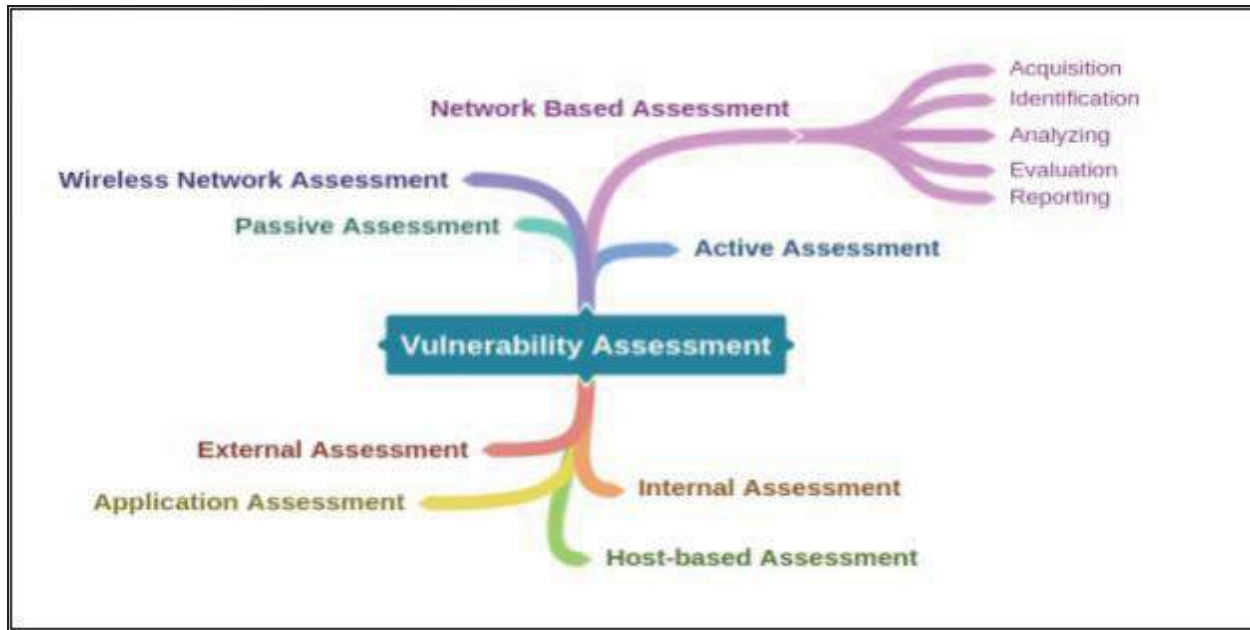
Generating Reports

Central Databases usually holds these reports.

Technology Overview

In the Ethical Hacking environment, the most common term that often uses is "**pentester**." Pentesters are the penetration tester that has permission to hack a system by owner. Penetration testing is the process of hacking a system with the permission from the owner of that system, to evaluate security, Hack Value, Target of Evaluation (TOE), attacks, exploits, zero-day vulnerability & other components such as threats, vulnerabilities, and daisy chaining.

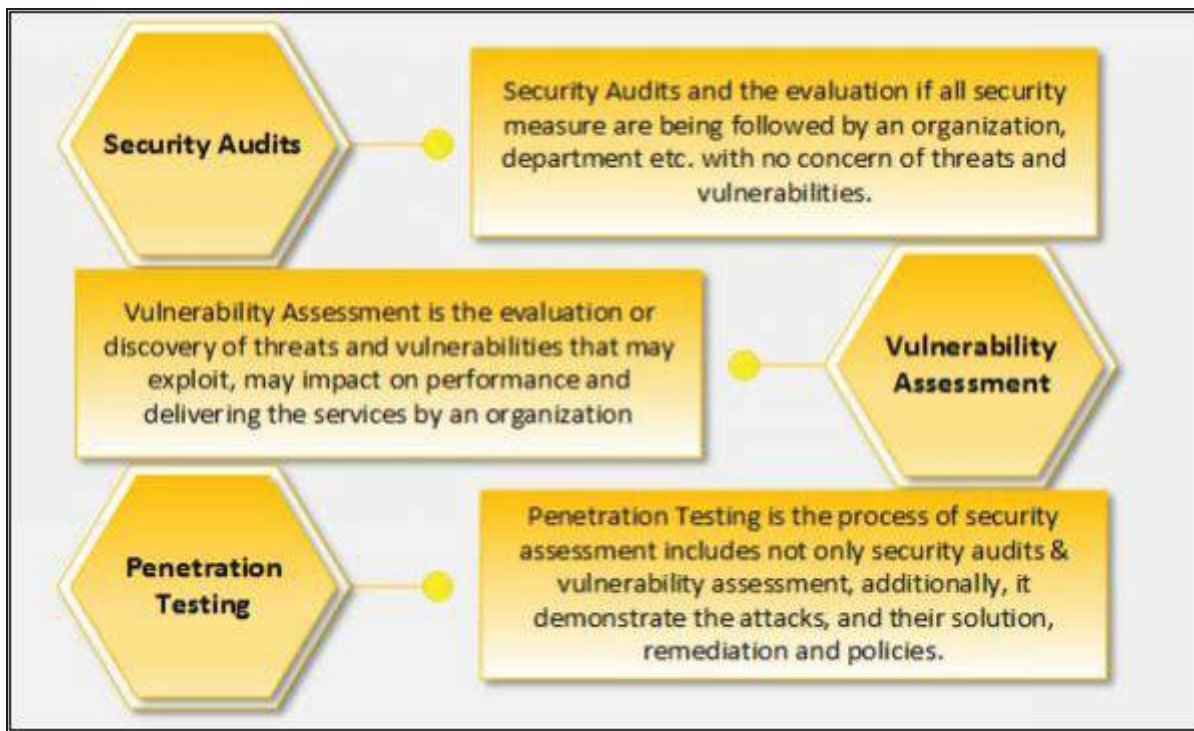


Figure 1-13 Comparing Pentesting

Important for Penetration testing

If you want to be ready for an attack, you must be smart, to think like them, act like them. Hackers are skilled, having detailed information of hardware's, software, networking and other related information. The need and importance of penetration testing, in the modern world where variously advanced threat such as Denial-of-service, Identity theft, theft of services, stealing information is common, system penetration ensure to counter the attack from malicious threat by anticipating methods. Some other major advantages and need for penetration testing is to uncover the vulnerabilities in systems and security deployments in the same way an attacker gains access: -

- To identify the threats and vulnerabilities to organizations assets.
- To provide a comprehensive assessment of policies, procedures, design, and architecture.
- To set remediation actions to secure them before they are used by a hacker to breach security.
- To identify what an attacker can access to steal.
- To identify what information can be theft and its use.
- To test and validate the security protection & identify the need for any additional protection layer.
- Modification and up-gradation of currently deployment security architecture.
- To reduce the expense of IT Security by enhancing Return on Security Investment (ROSI).

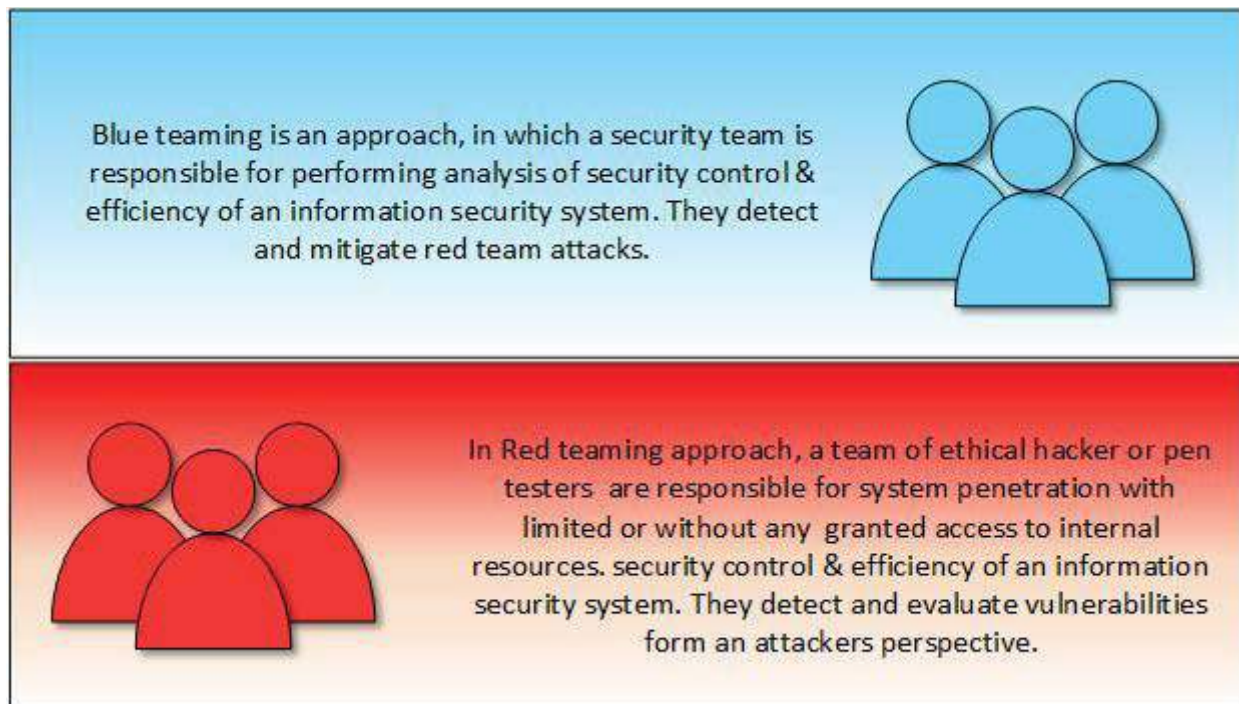


Figure 1-14 Comparing Blue & Red Teaming

Types of Penetration Testing

Three types of Penetration testing are important to be differentiated because a penetration tester may have asked to perform any of them.

Black Box

The black box is a type of penetration testing in which the pentester is blind testing or double-blind testing, i.e. provided with no prior knowledge of the

system or any information of the target. Black boxing is designed to demonstrate an emulated situation as an attacker in countering an attack.

Gray box

Gray box, is a type of penetration testing in which the pentester has very limited prior knowledge of the system or any information of targets such as IP addresses, Operating system or network information in very limited. Gary boxing is designed to demonstrate an emulated situation as an insider might have this information and to counter an attack as the pentester has basic, limited information regarding target.

White box

The white box is a type of penetration testing in which the pentester has complete knowledge of system and information of the target. This type of penetration is done by internal security teams or security audits teams to perform auditing.

Phases of Penetration Testing

Penetration testing is a three-phase process.

- 1- Pre-Attack Phase
- 2- Attack Phase
- 3- Post-Attack Phase

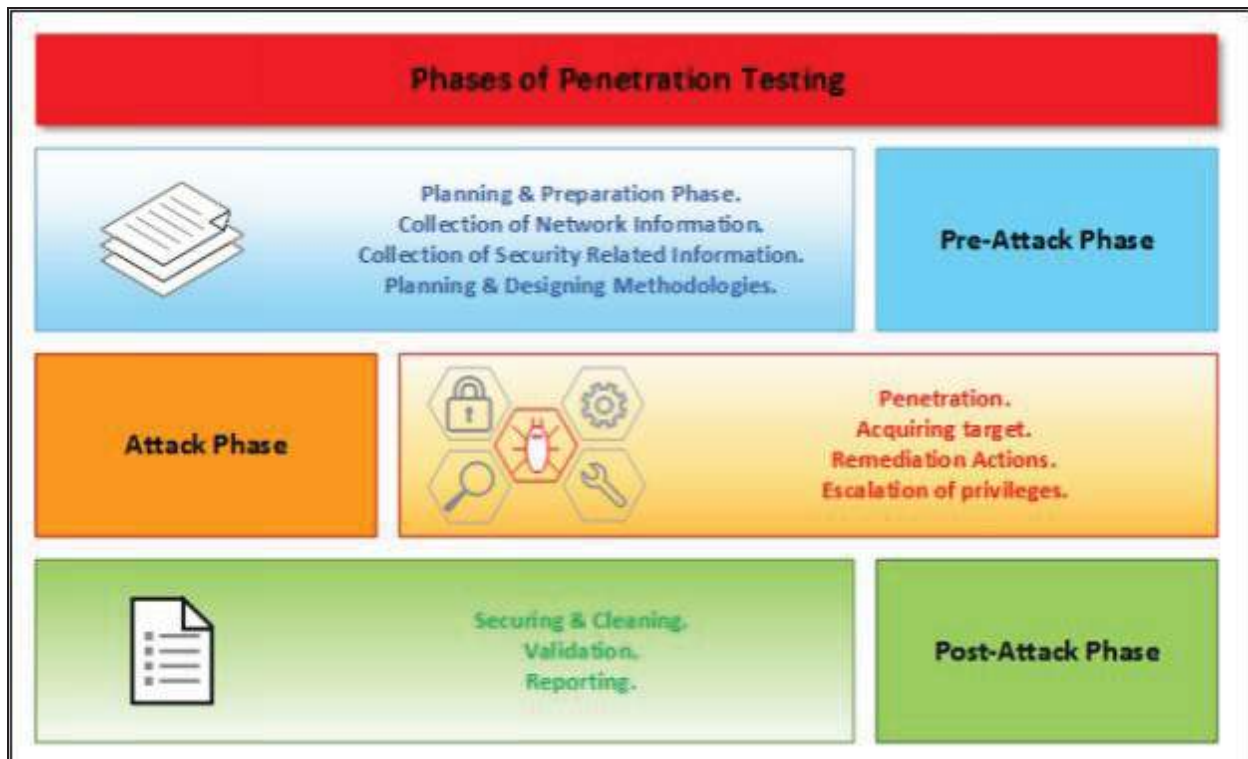


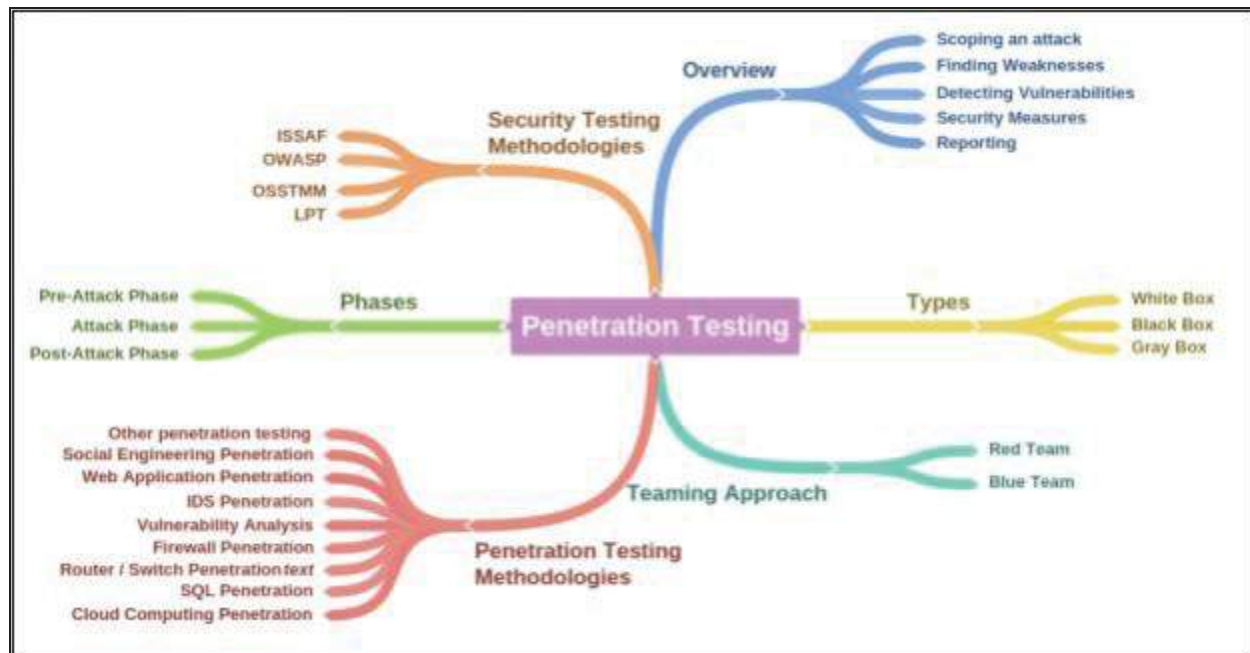
Figure 1-15 Penetration Testing Phases

This standard is a revised edition (second) of the first edition ISO/IEC 27001:2005. ISO/IEC 27001:2013 cover the following key point in information security: -

- Status of Information Security Management Activities.
- Compliant with laws.

Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA)

Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) was passed in 1996 by Congress. HIPAA runs with Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to develop and maintain regulation that associates with privacy and security of health information. HIPAA Security rules ensure what information is protected, additionally, the safeguards that must apply to secure electronic protected health information. HIPAA defines Electronic protected information, general rules, risk analysis, and management. Administrative safeguards including physical safeguards, technical safeguards ensure the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of electronic protected health information (e-PHI).

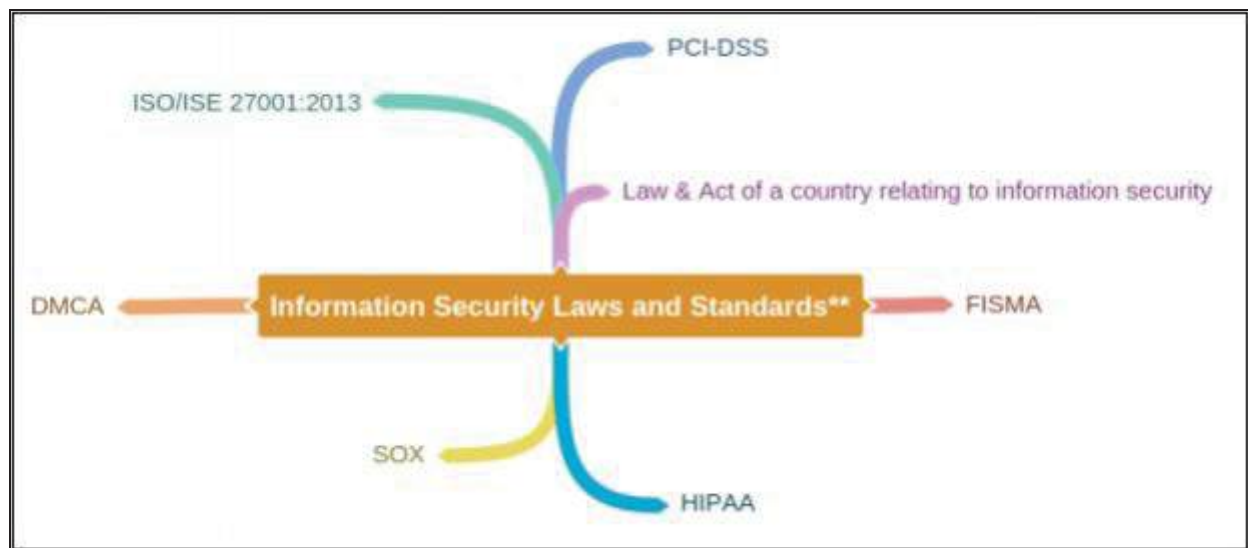

The legislation provides the Department authority to develop and oversee the implementation of binding operational directives to other agencies, in coordination and consistent with OMB policies and practices. The Federal Information Security Modernization Act of 2014 amends the Federal Information Security Management Act of 2002 (FISMA).

Chapter 2: Footprinting & Reconnaissance

Technology Brief

Footprinting phase allows the attacker to gather the information regarding internal and external security architecture; he has to face a target. Collection of information also helps to identify the vulnerabilities within a system, which exploits, to gain access. Getting deep information about target reduces the focus area & bring attacker closer to the target. The attacker focuses the target by mean of the range of IP address he has to go through, to hack target or regarding domain information or else.

Footprinting Concepts

The first step to ethical hacking is Footprinting. Footprinting is the collection of every possible information regarding the target and target network. This collection of information helps in identifying different possible ways to enter into the target network. This collection of information may have gathered through publicly- available personal information and sensitive information from any secret source. Typically, footprinting & reconnaissance is performing social engineering attacks, system or network attack, or through any other technique. Active and passive methods of reconnaissance are also popular for gaining information of target directly or indirectly. The overall purpose of this phase is to keep interaction with the target to gain information without any detection or alerting.

Pseudonymous Footprinting

Pseudonymous footprinting includes footprinting through online sources. In Pseudonymous footprinting, information about a target is shared by posting with an assumed name. This type information is shared with the real credential to avoid trace to an actual source of information.

Internet Footprinting

Internet Footprinting includes the Footprinting and reconnaissance methods for gaining information through the internet. In Internet Footprinting, processes such as Google Hacking, Google Search, Google Application including search engines other than Google as well.

Objectives of Footprinting

The major objectives of Footprinting are: -

1. To know security posture
2. To reduce focus area
3. Identify vulnerabilities
4. Draw network map

Footprinting Methodology

It is not a big deal to get information regarding anyone as the internet, social media, official websites and other resources have much information about their users which are not sensitive, but a collection of information may fulfill the requirements of an attacker and attacker can gather enough information by a little effort. Below are more often techniques used by hackers: -

- Footprinting through Search Engines
- Footprinting through Advance Google Hacking Techniques
- Footprinting through Social Networking Sites
- Footprinting through Websites
- Footprinting through Email
- Footprinting through Competitive Intelligence
- Footprinting through WHOIS
- Footprinting through DNS
- Footprinting through Network
- Footprinting through Social Engineering

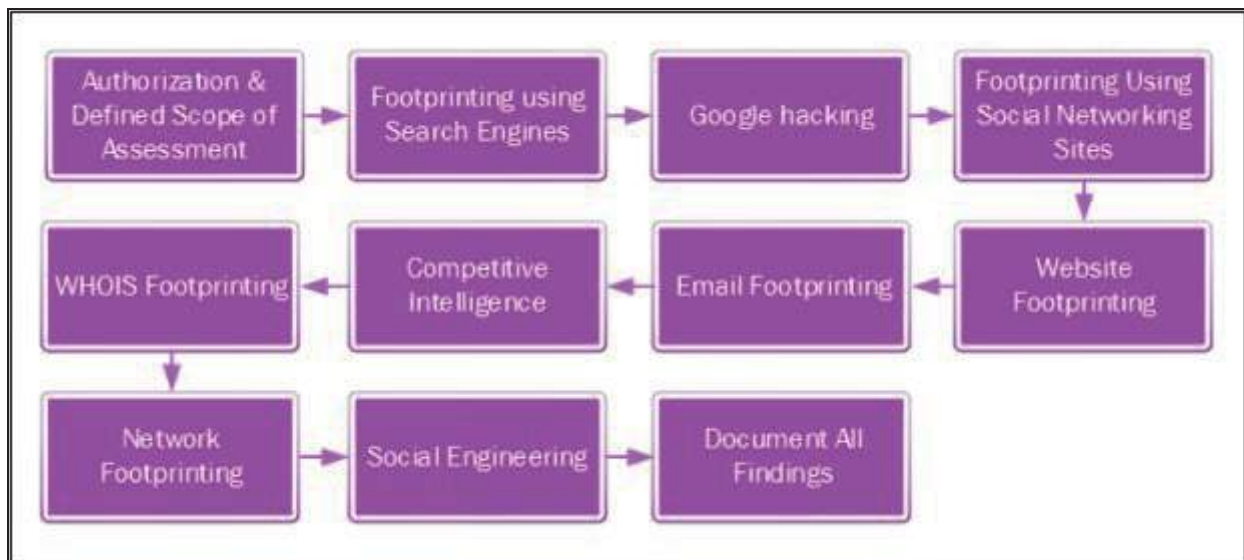


Figure 2-01 Footprinting Methodology

The most basic option that is very responsive as well is Footprinting through search engines. Search engines extract the information about an entity you have searched for from internet. You can open a web browser and through any search engine like Google or Bing, search for any organization. The result collects every available information on the internet.

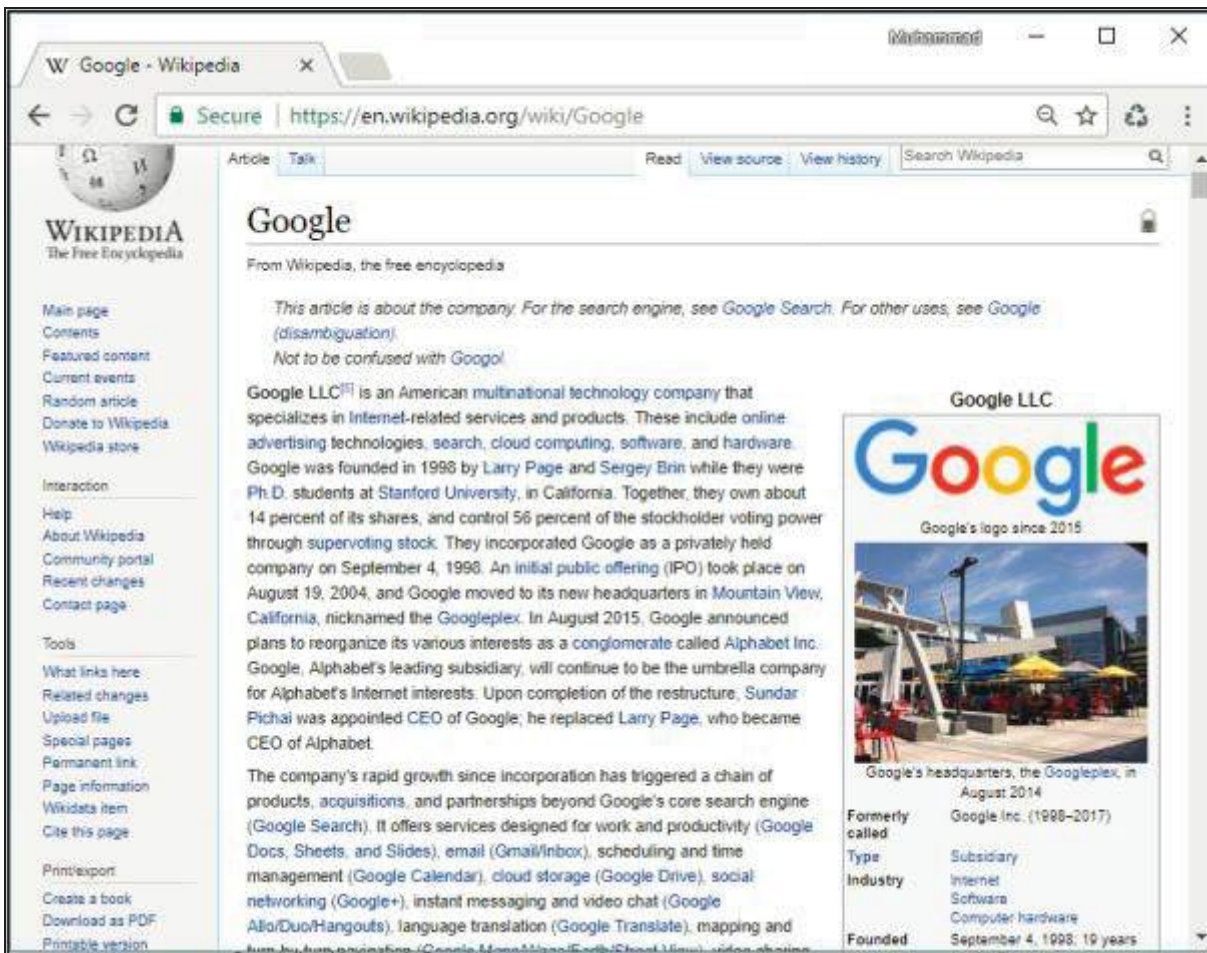


Figure 2-02 Footprinting

For example, Search for google shows the information about the world's most popular search engine itself. method, using different services which can fetch the information from Web sites such as www.netcraft.com.

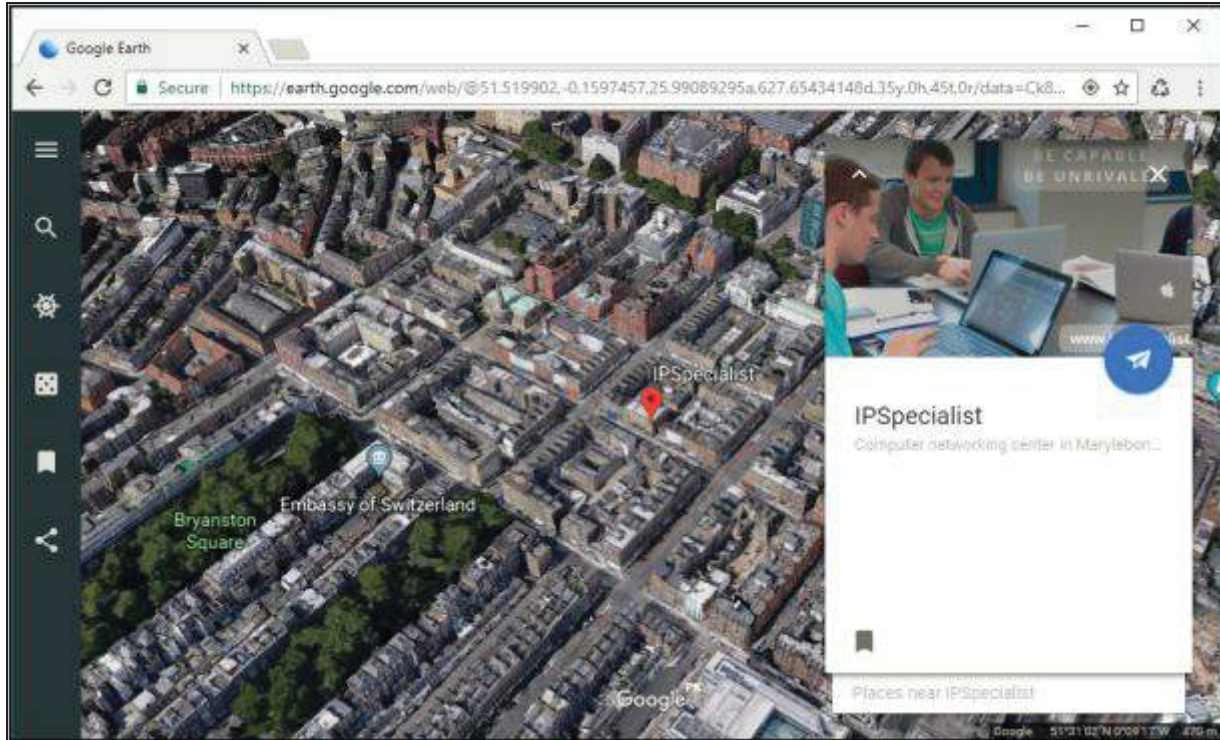


Figure 2-04 Collection of Location Information

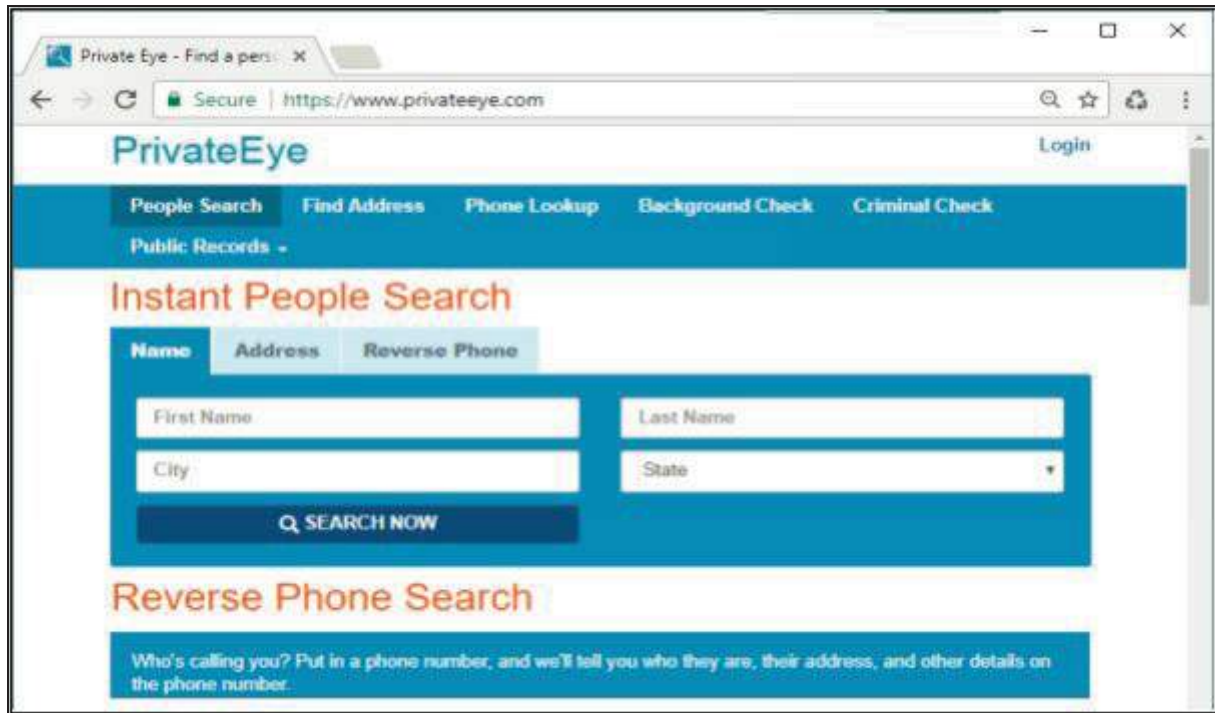


Figure 2-05 Online People Search Service

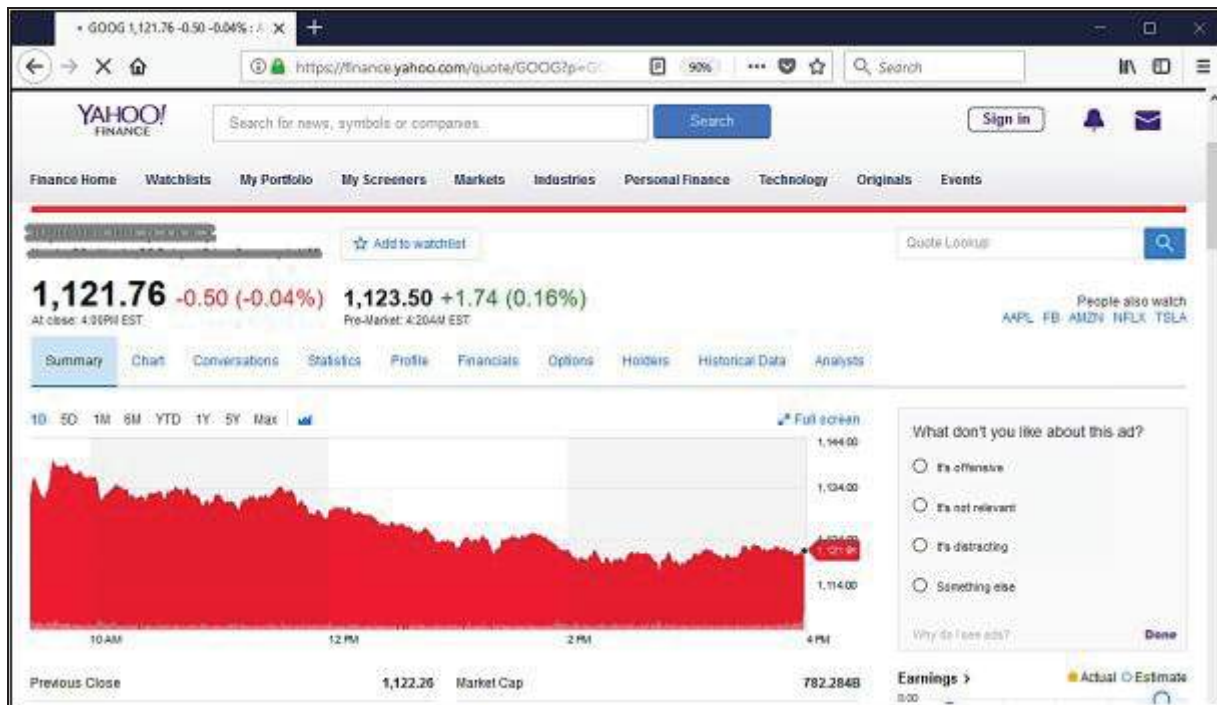


Figure 2-06 Financial Services

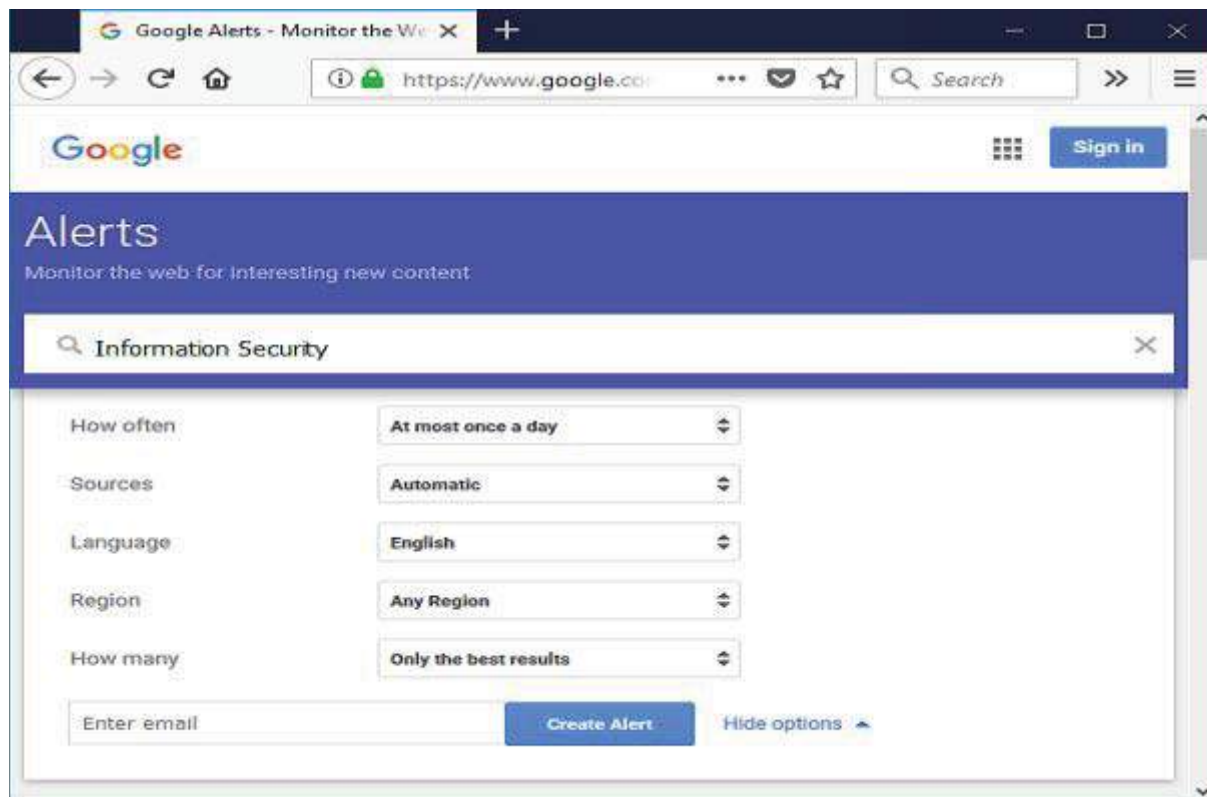


Figure 2-07 Alert Service by Google



more.

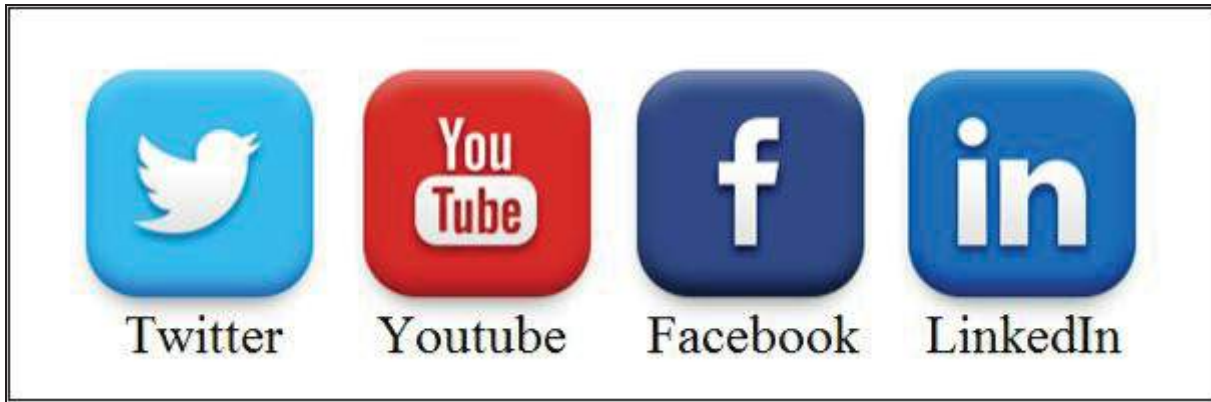


Figure 2-10 Social Networking Sites

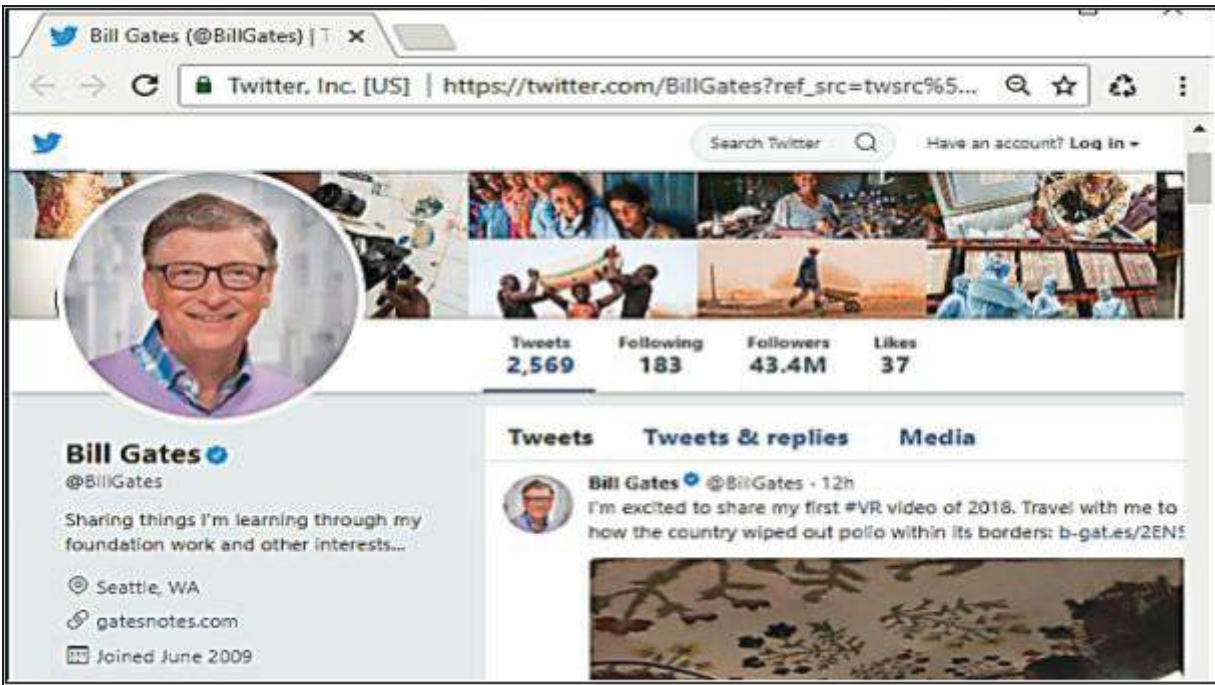
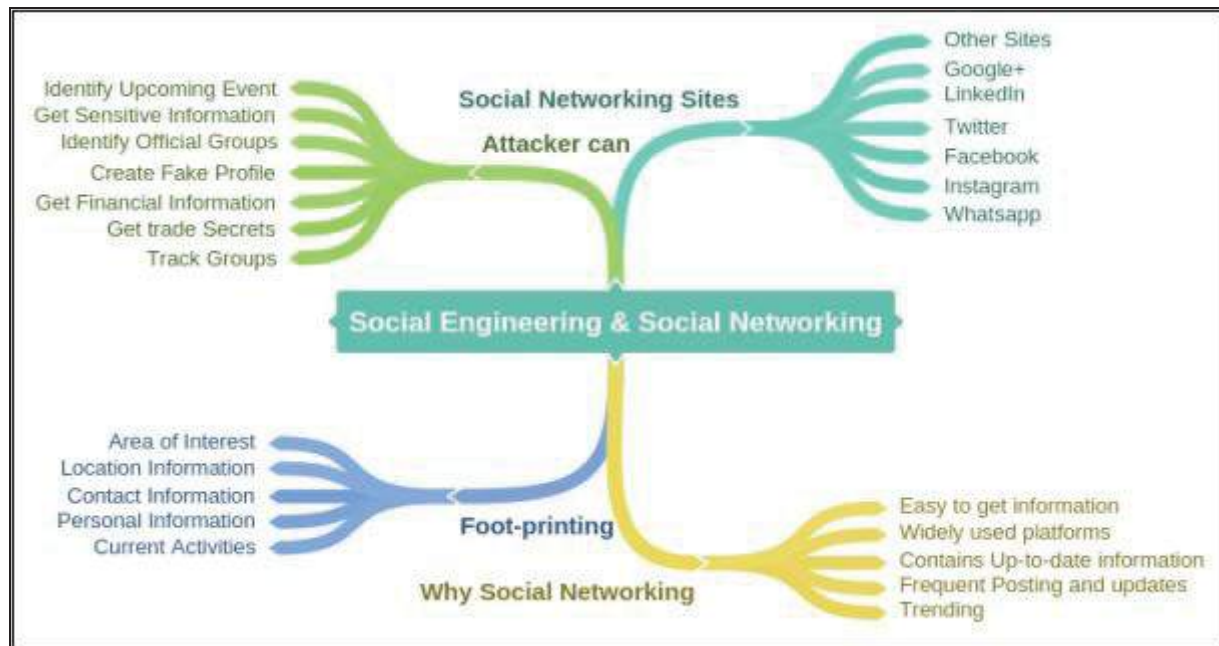


Figure 2-11 Collection of Information from Social Networking

Website Footprinting includes monitoring and investigating about the target organization's official website for gaining information such as Software running, versions of these software's, operating systems, Sub-directories, database, scripting information, and other details. This information can be gathered by online service as defined earlier like netcraft.com or by using software such as Burp Suite, Zaproxy, Website Informer, Firebug, and others. These tools can bring information like connection type and status and last modification information. By getting these type of information, an attacker can examine source code, developer's details, file system structure and scripting.

Determining the Operating System

Using websites such as Netcraft.com can also help in searching for Operating systems that are in use by the targeted organizations. Go to the website www.netcraft.com and enter the target organization's official URL. Results in the figure below are hidden to avoid legal issues.

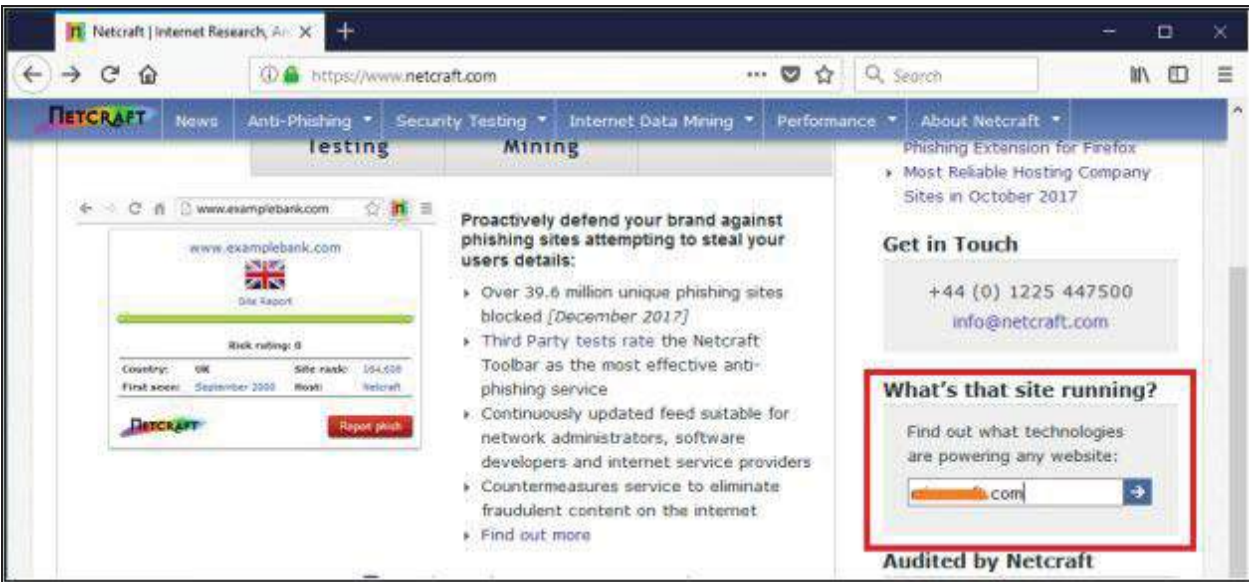


Figure 2-12 Determination of Website Information

The result brings all websites related to the domain of that organization including operating system information and other information. If you enter a complete URL, it shows the in-depth detail of that particular website.

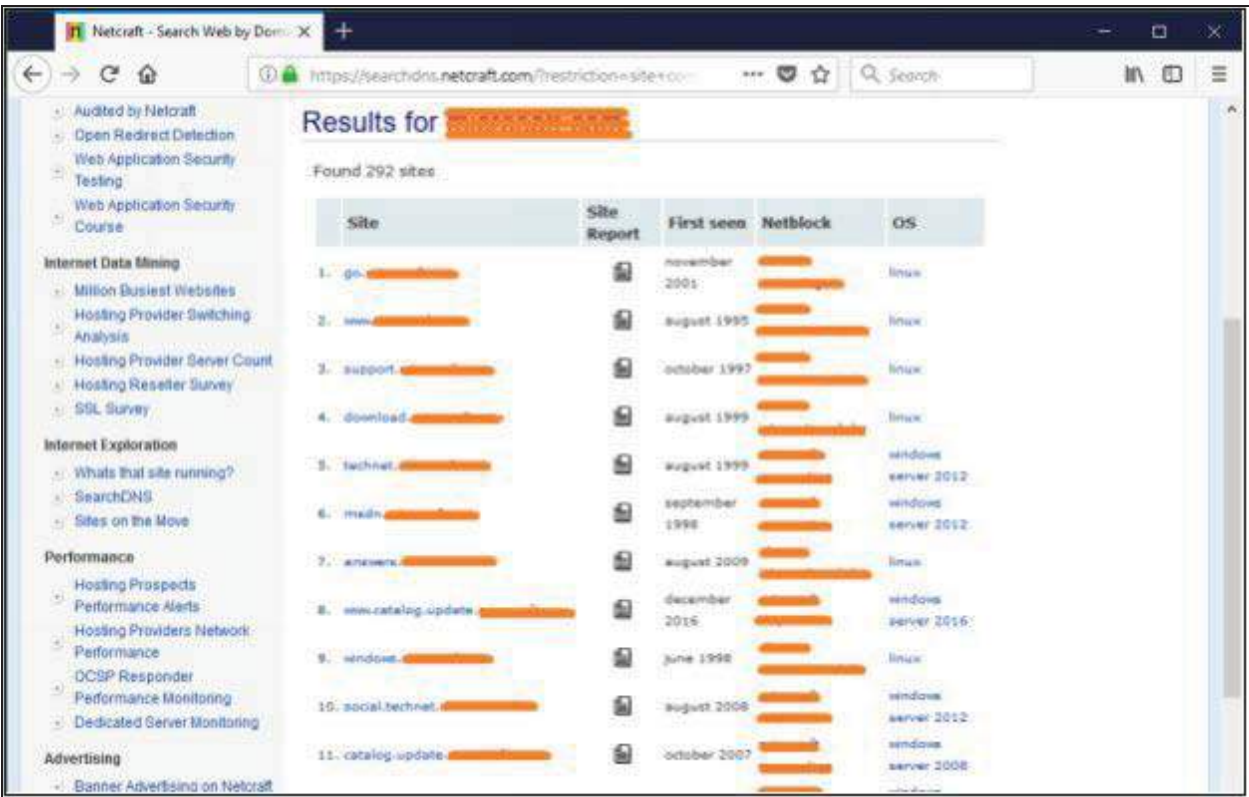


Figure 2-13 Determination of Operating System information

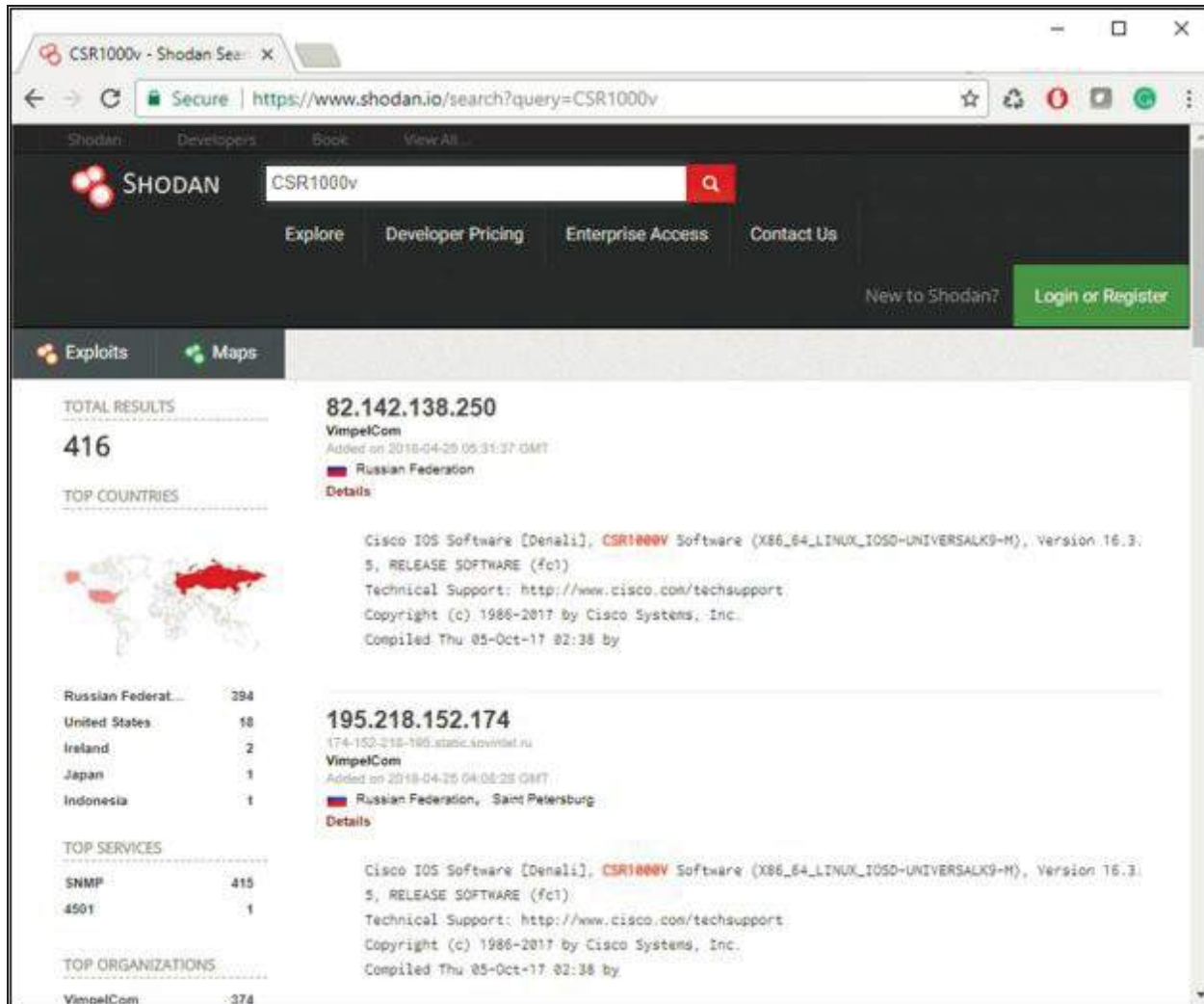


Figure 2-15 Shodan Search Engine

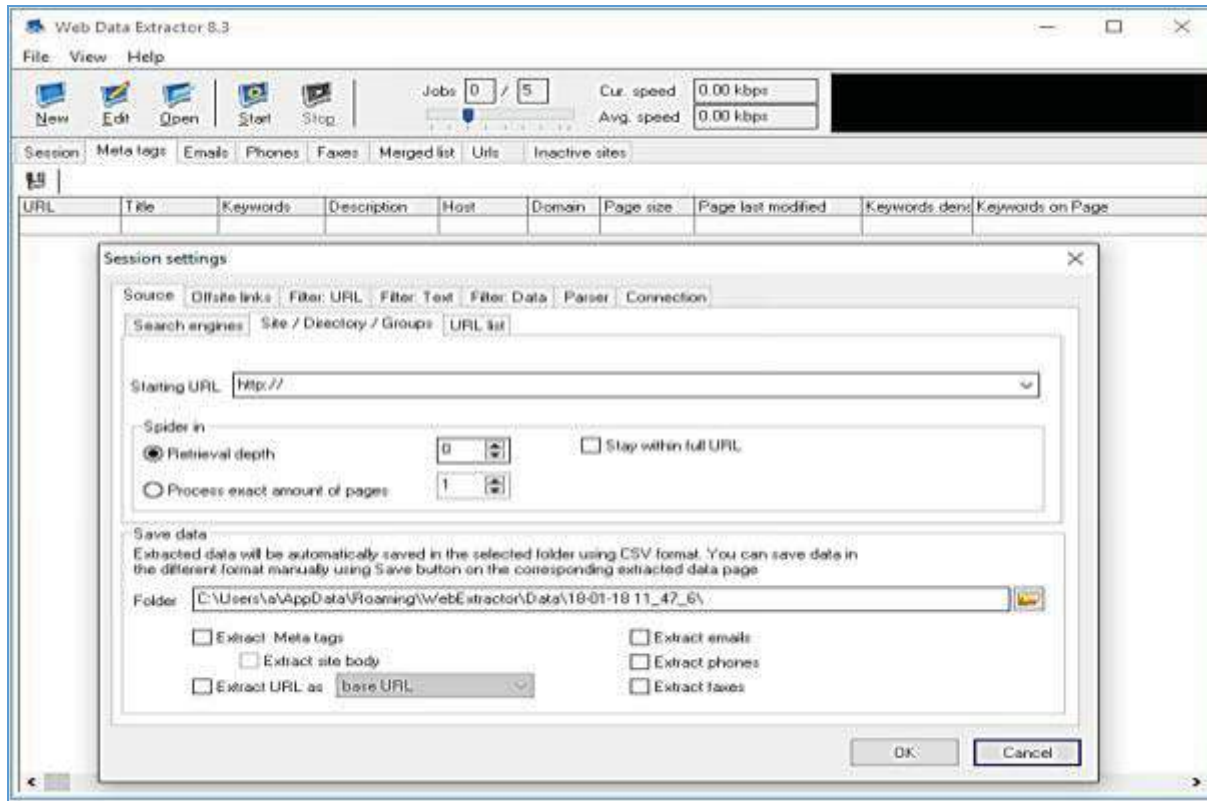


Figure 2-16 Web Data Extractor Application (Web Spider)

Mirroring Entire Website

Mirroring a website is the process to mirror the entire website in the local system. Downloading entire website onto the system enables the attacker to use, inspect the website, directories, structure and to find other vulnerabilities from this downloaded mirrored website copy in an offline environment. Instead of sending multiple copies to a web server, this is a way to find vulnerabilities on a website. Mirroring tools are available which can download a website. Additionally, they are capable of building all directories, HTML and other files from the server to a local directory.

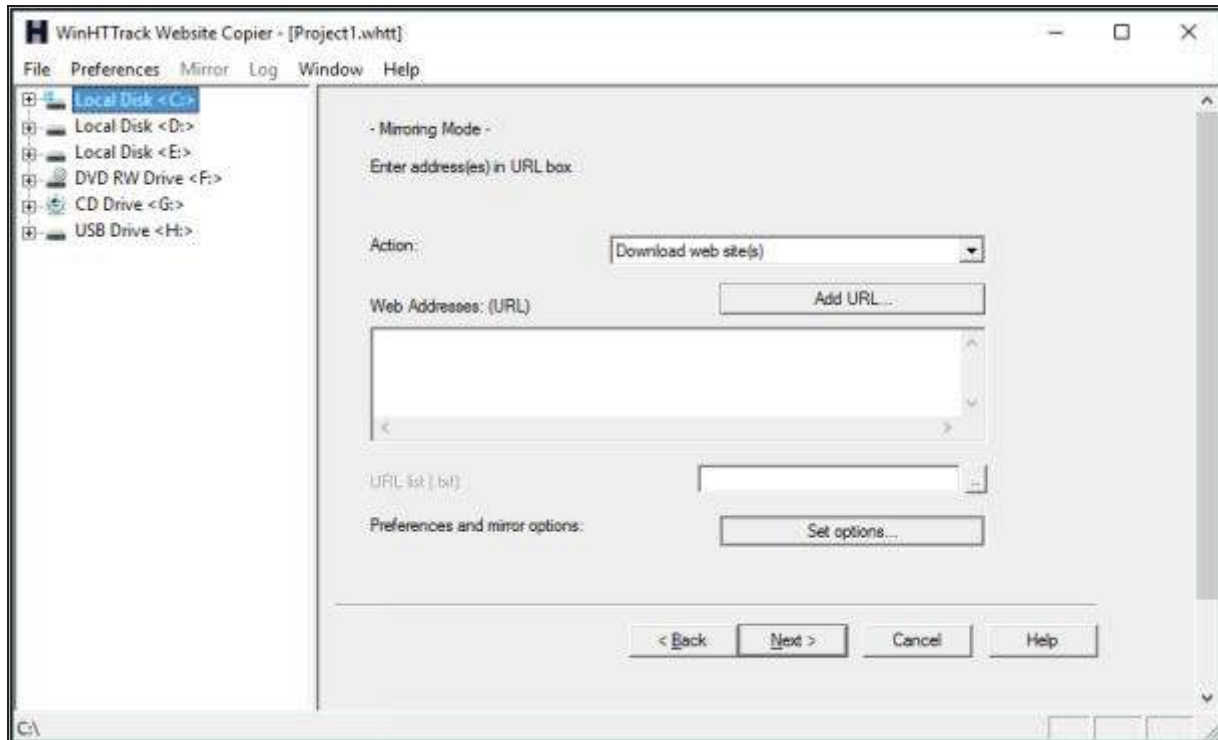


Figure 2-17 WinHTTrack Website Copier

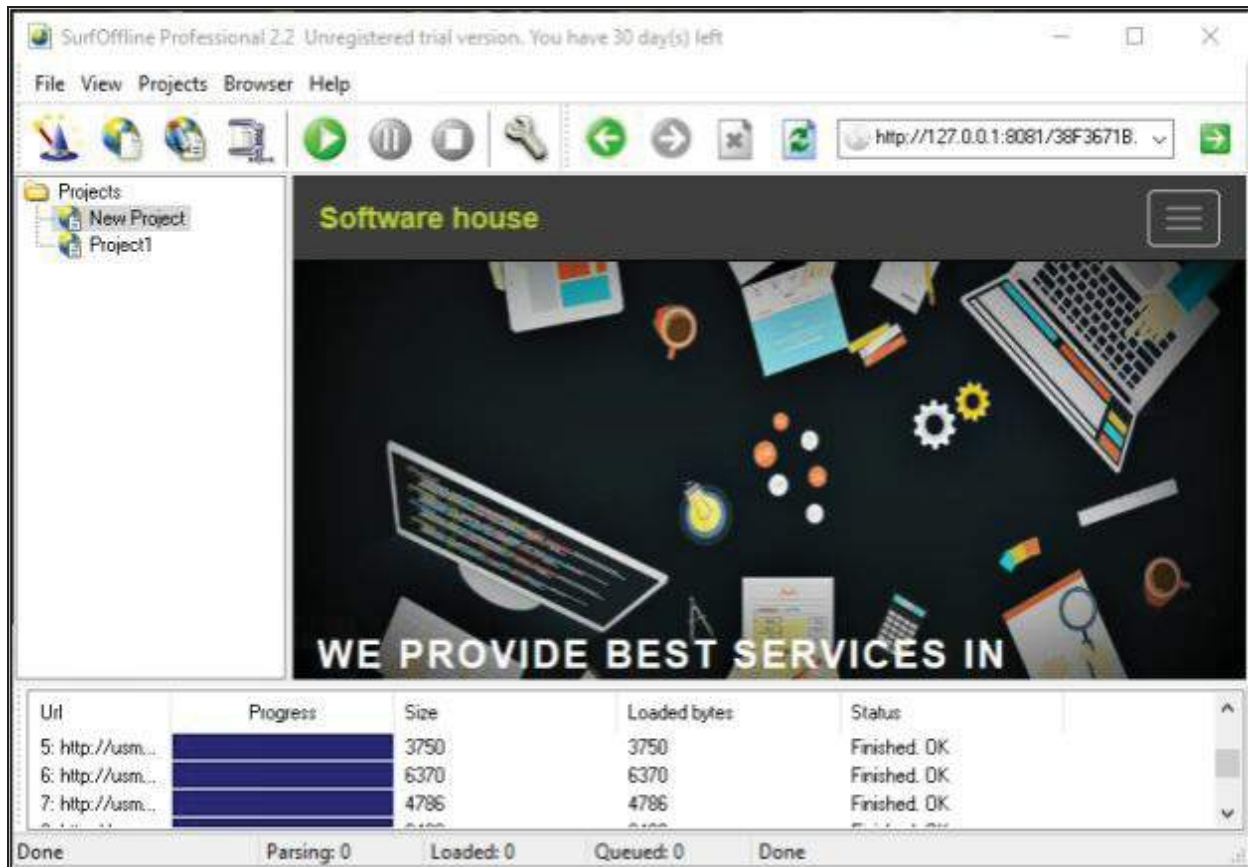


Figure 2-18 Surf Offline Professional Application

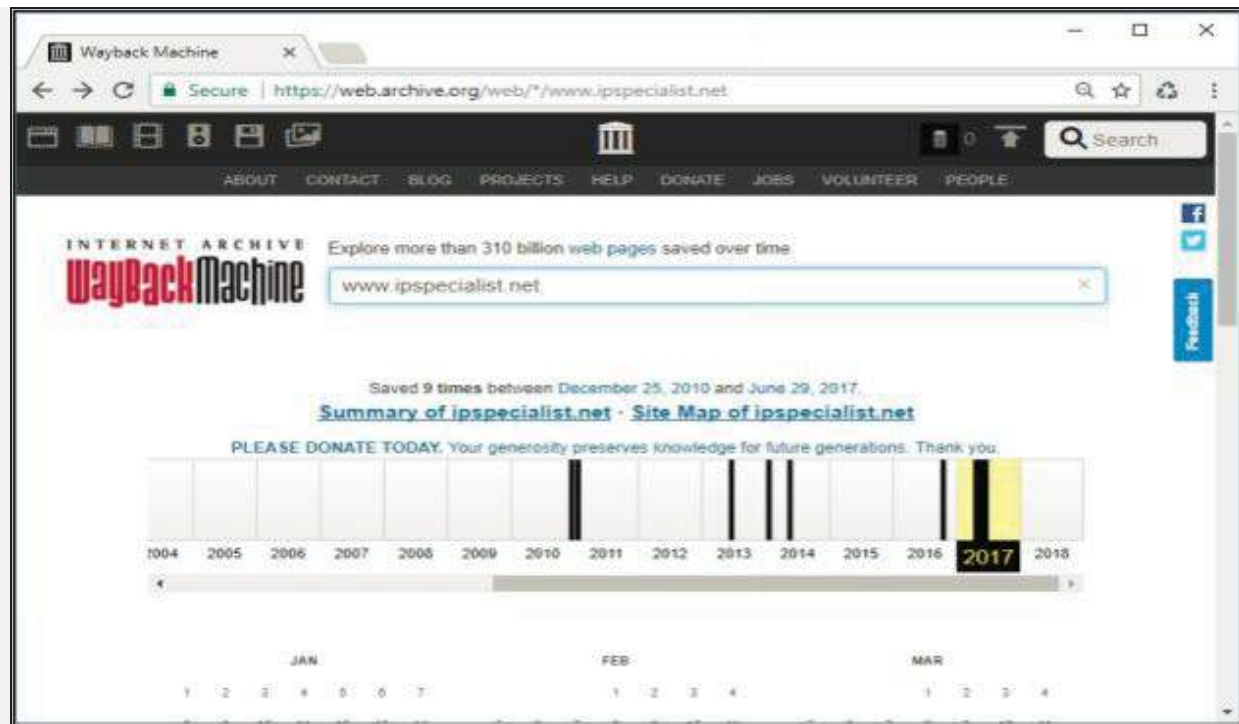


Figure 2-19 Archive.com Wayback Machine

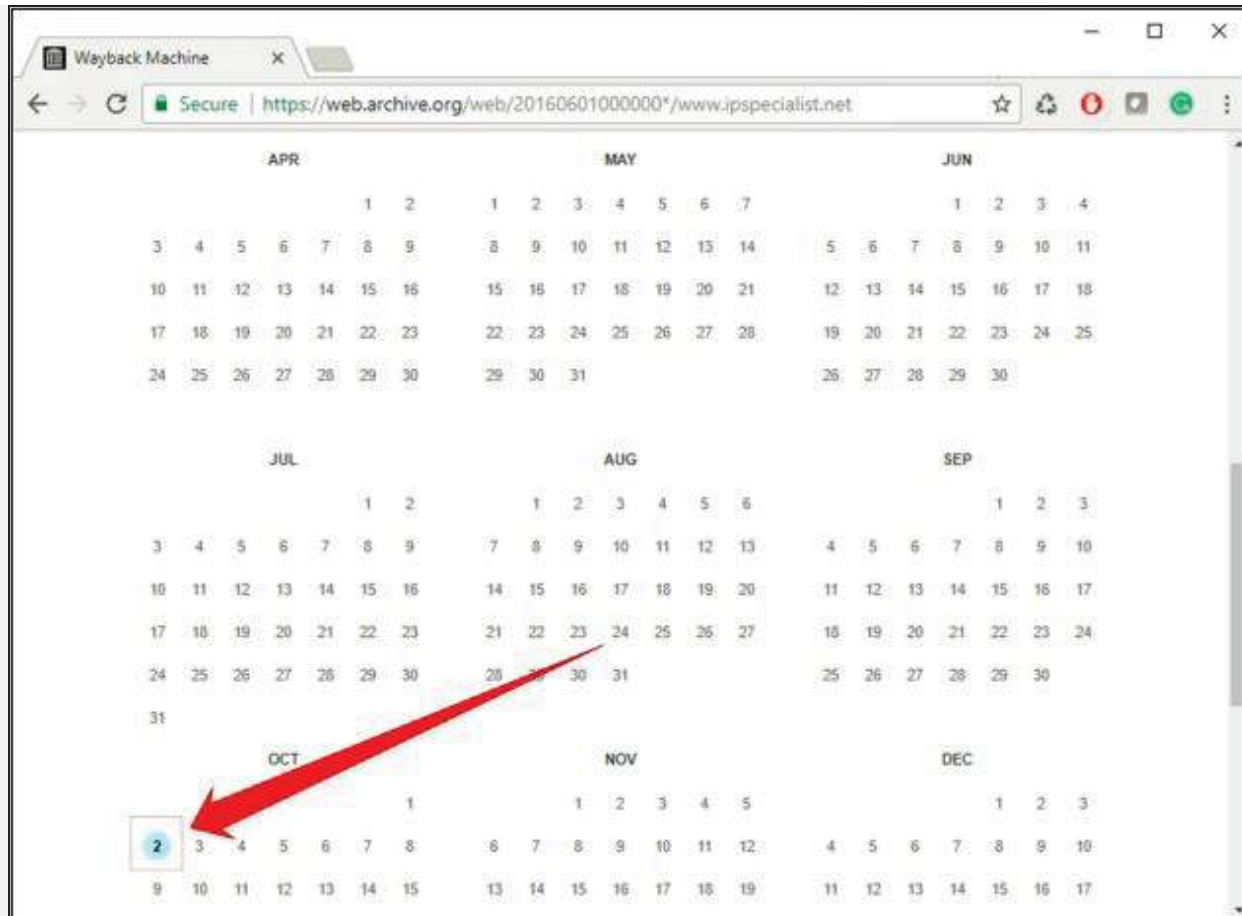


Figure 2-20 Select Date

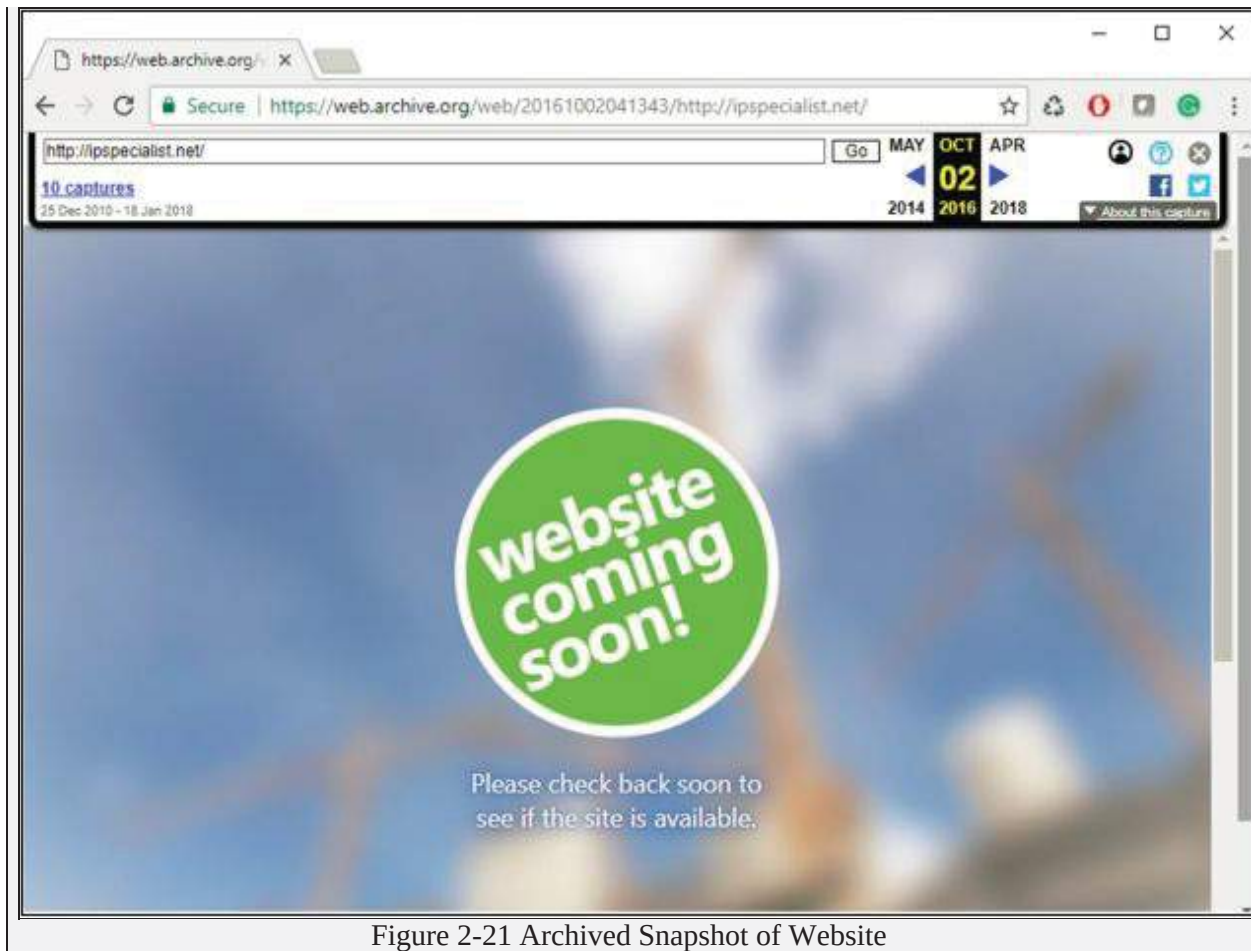


Figure 2-21 Archived Snapshot of Website

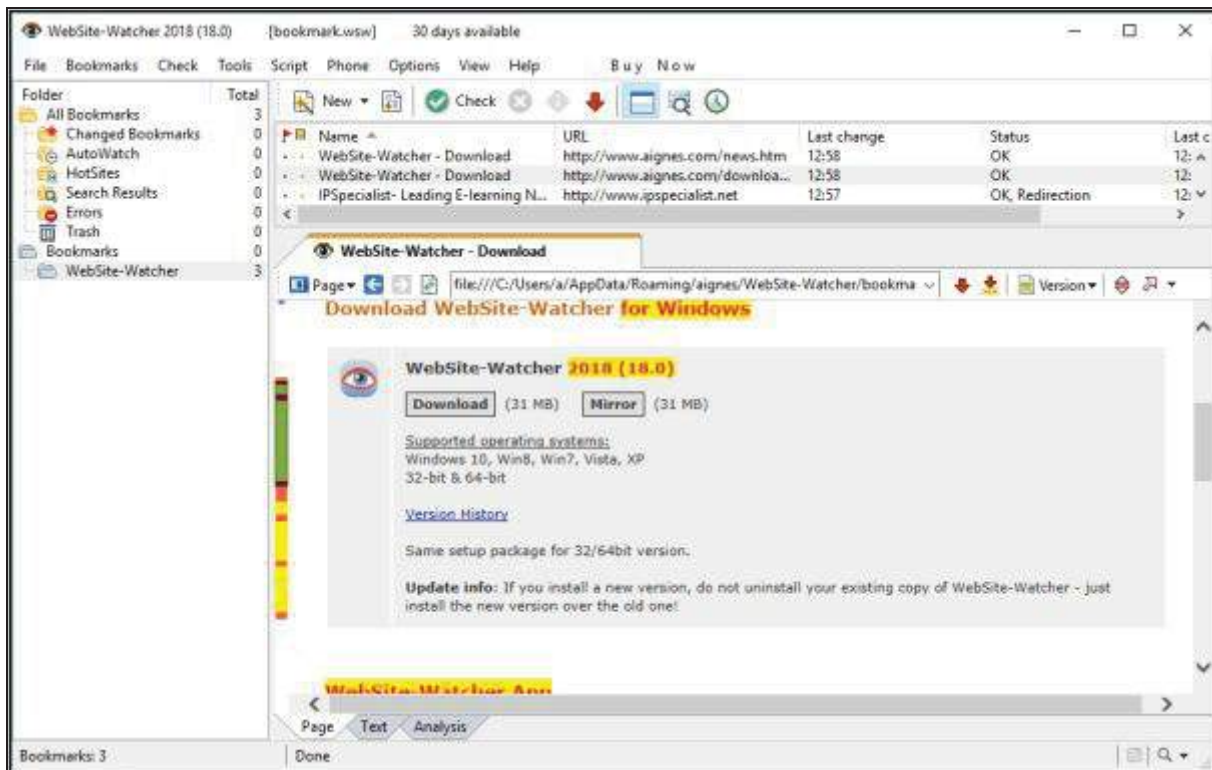


Figure 2-22 Website-Watcher Application

This content may include hardware and software information, user credentials, network and security devices information, financial information which is valuable for penetration testers and attackers.

Polite Mail is a very useful tool for Email footprinting. Polite Mail tracks email communication with Microsoft Outlook. Using this tool, with a list of email addresses of a targeted organization, the malicious link can be sent and trace the individual event. Tracing an email using email header can reveal the following information:

- Destination address
- Sender's IP address
- Sender's Mail server
- Time & Date information
- Authentication system information of sender's mail server

Tracking Email from Email Header

Tracing Email from Email header offer hop by hop trace of an email along with IP addresses, Hop Name, and location. Several online and software applications offer Email header tracing. Email Tracker Pro is one of the popular tools.

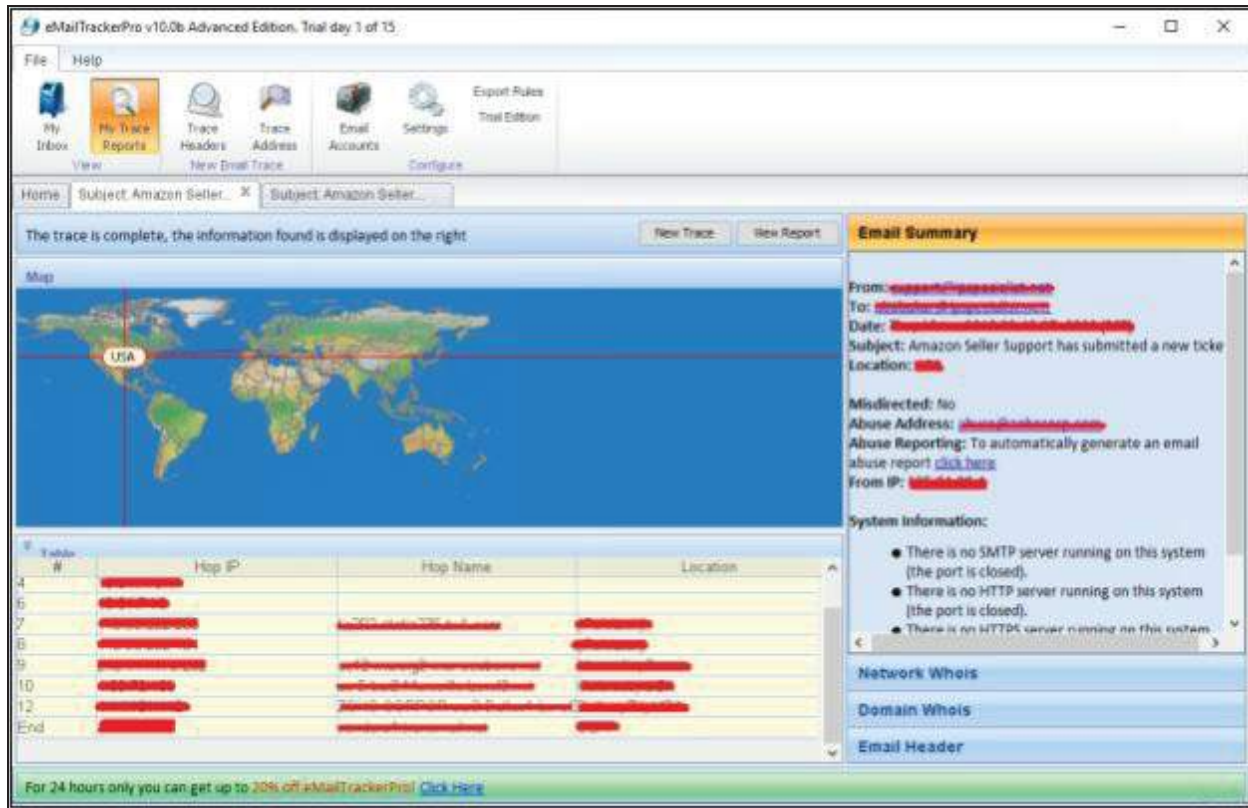


Figure 2-23 Email Tracker Pro

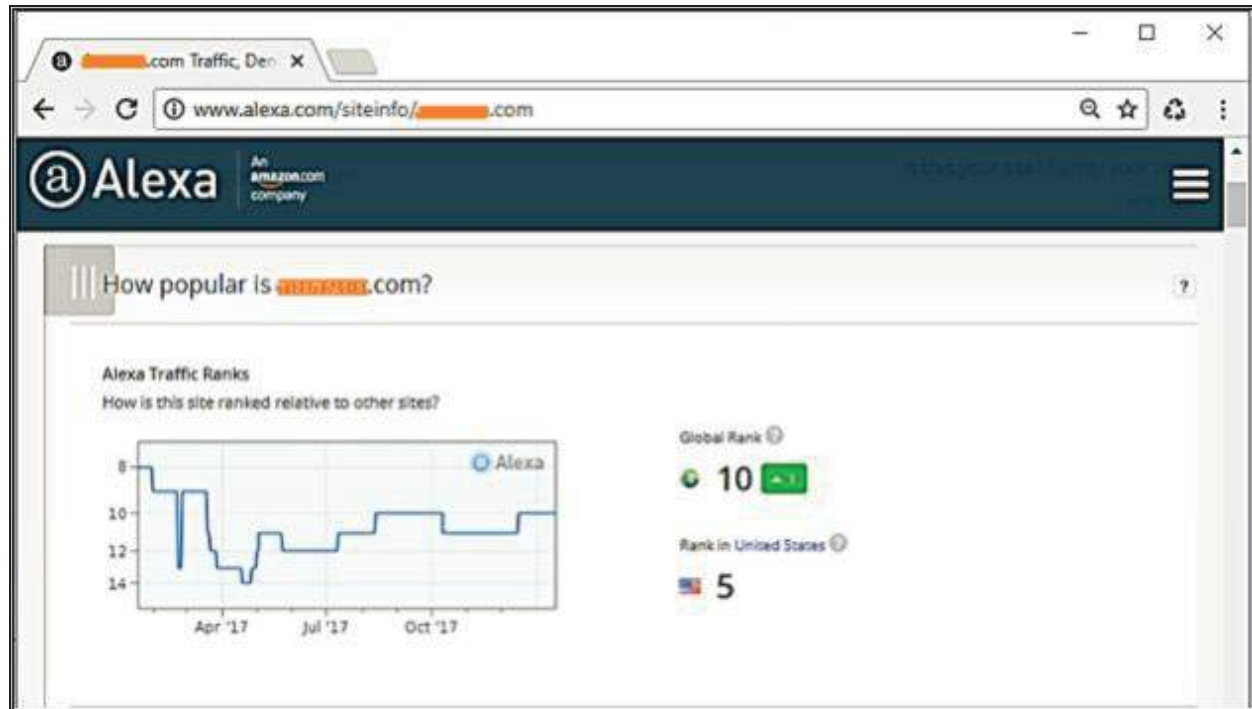


Figure 2-24 Website Statistics using Alexa

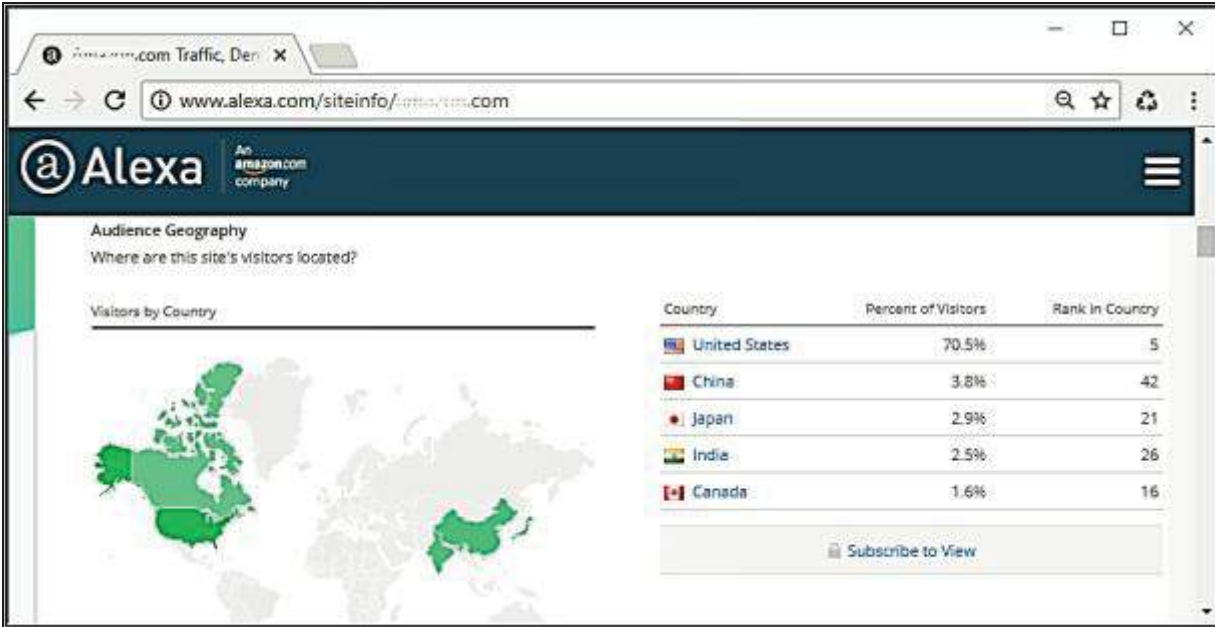
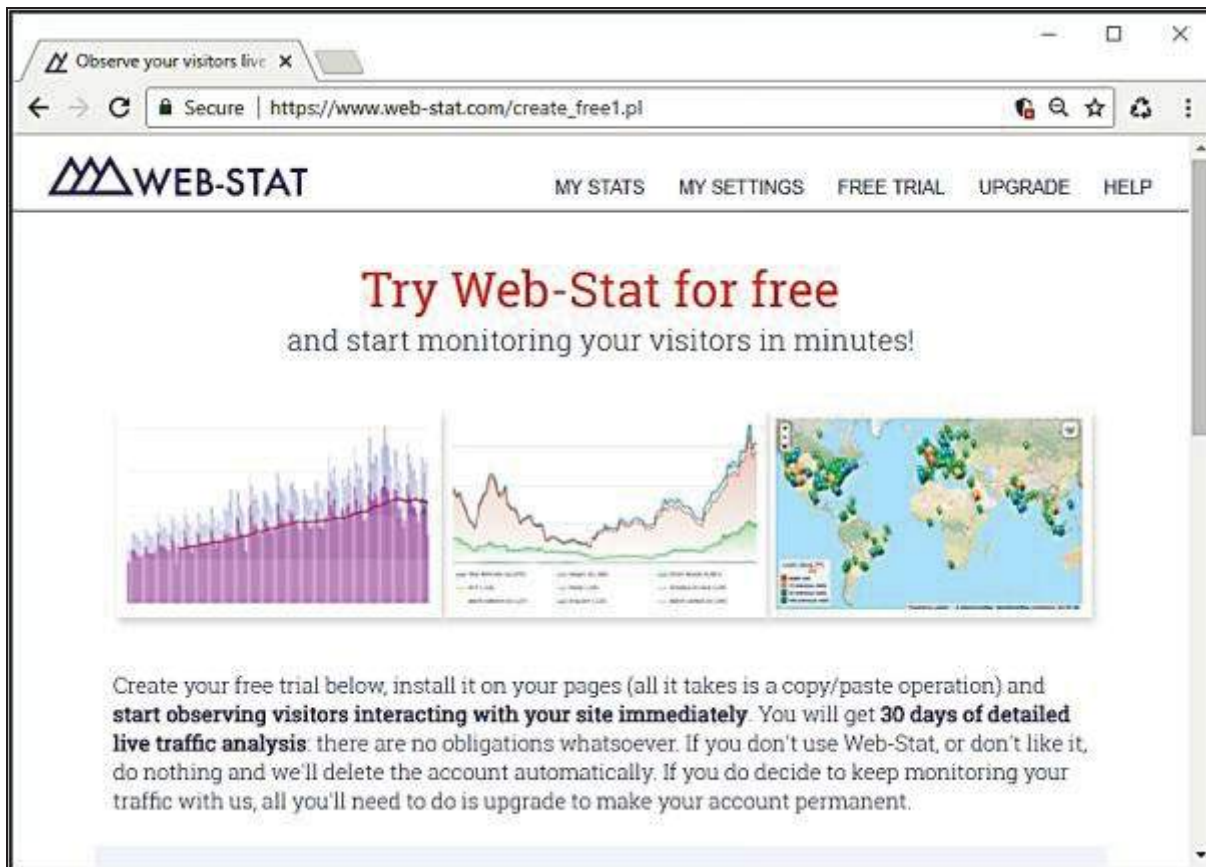


Figure 2-25 Website Statistics using Alexa

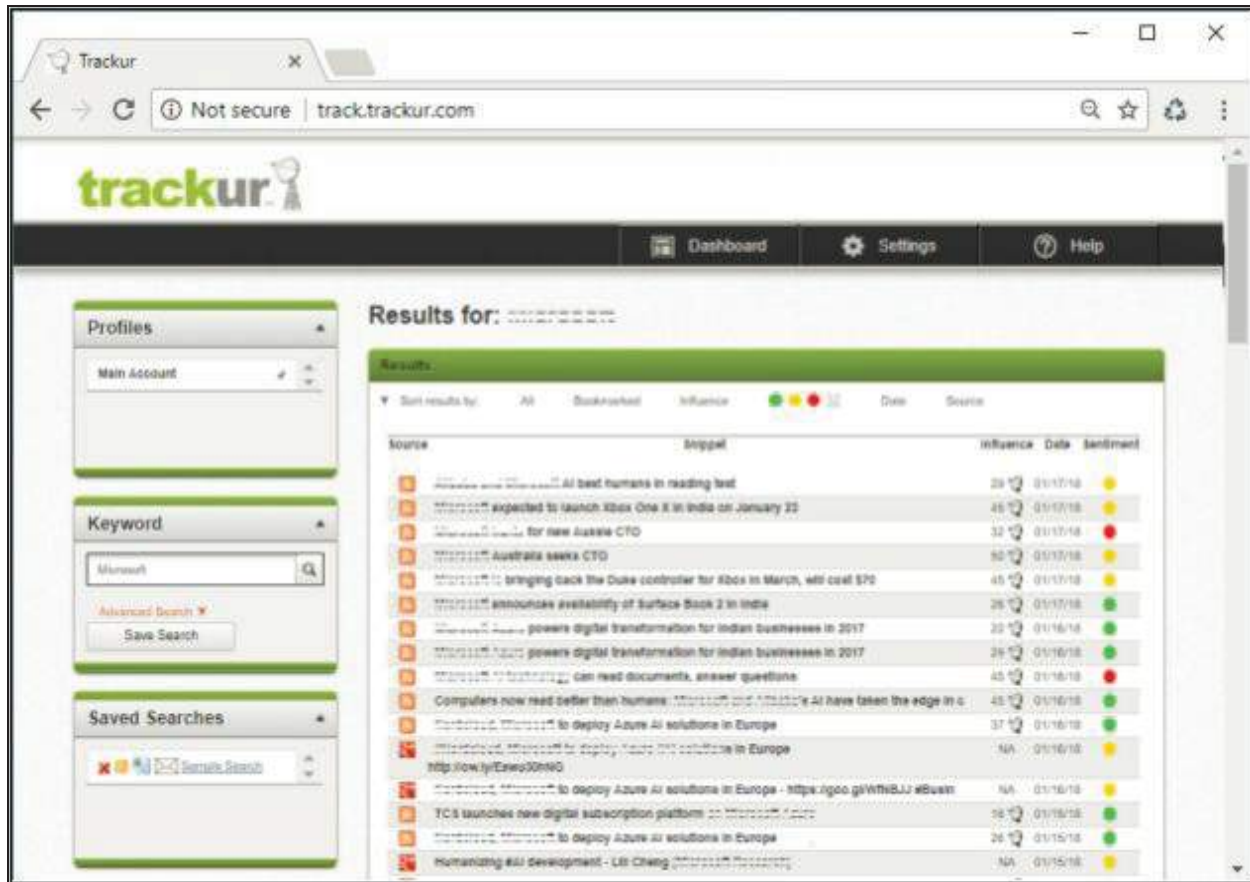


Figure 2-27 Trackur (Reputation Monitoring Tool)

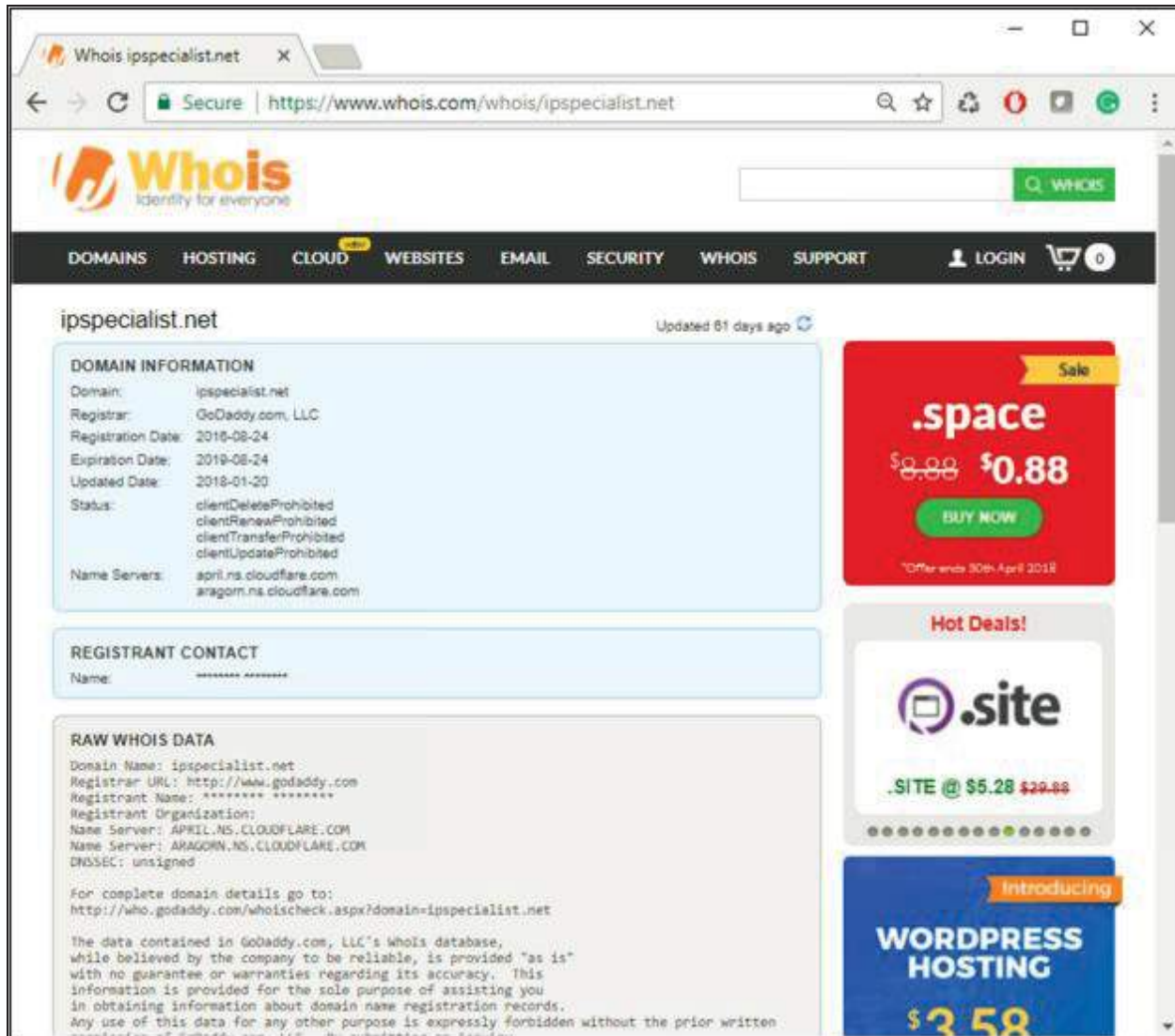


Figure 2-29 WHOIS Footprinting

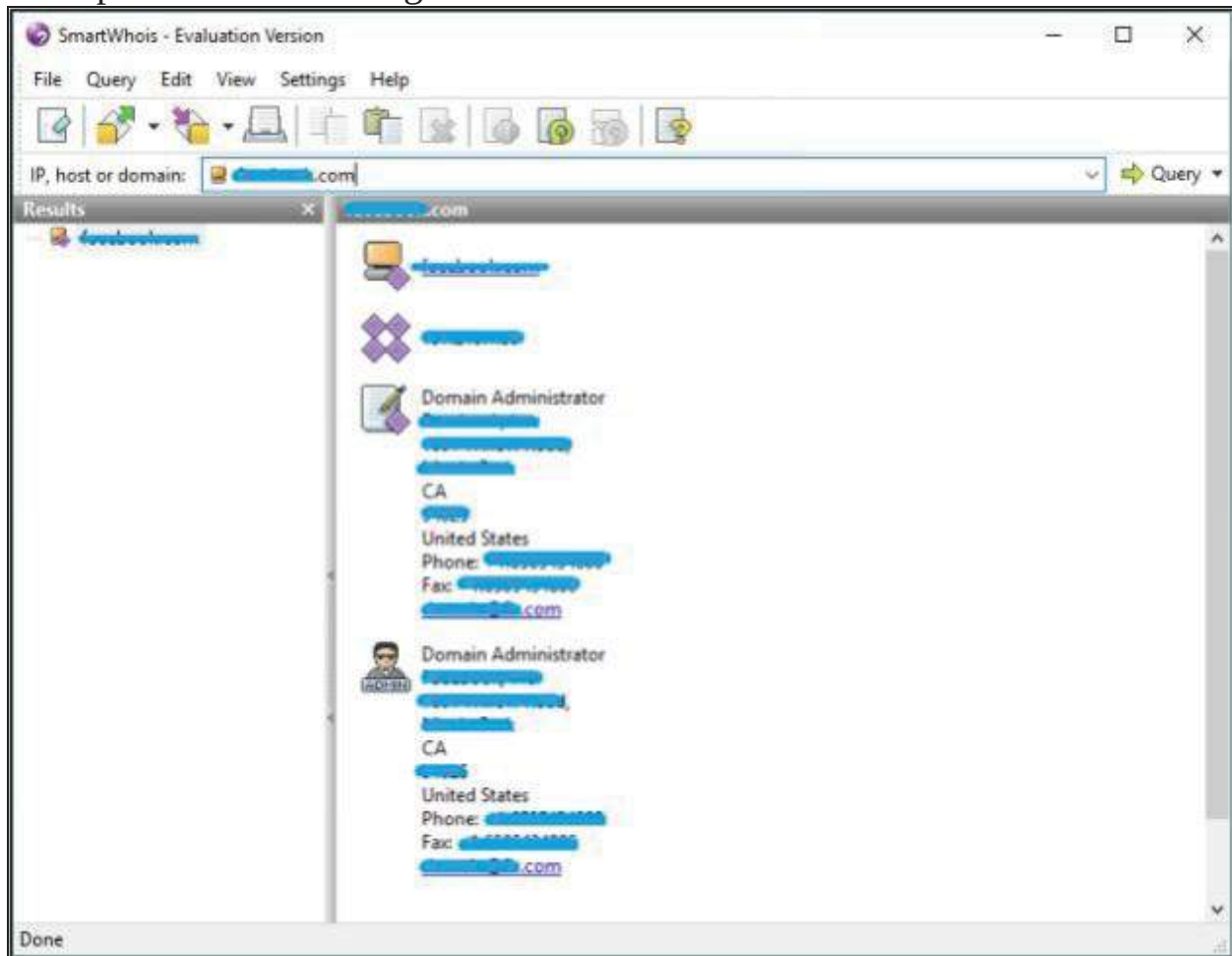


Figure 2-31 SmartWhois Lookup Application

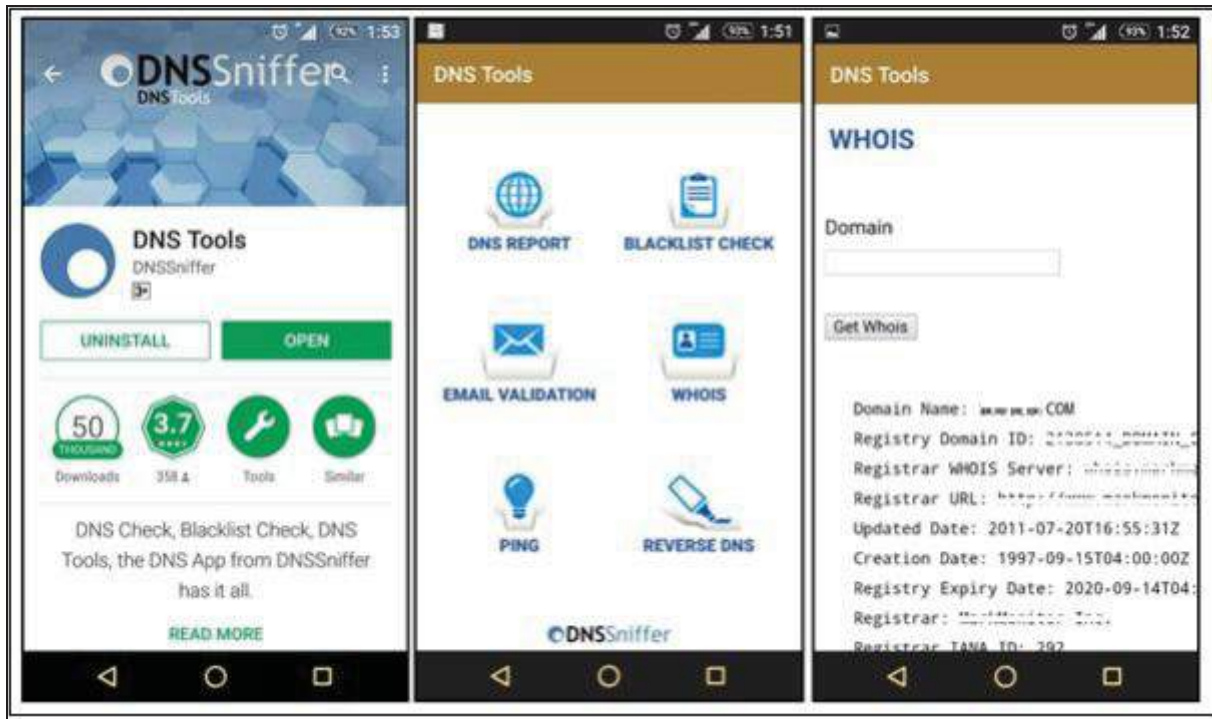


Figure 2-32 DNS tool Application

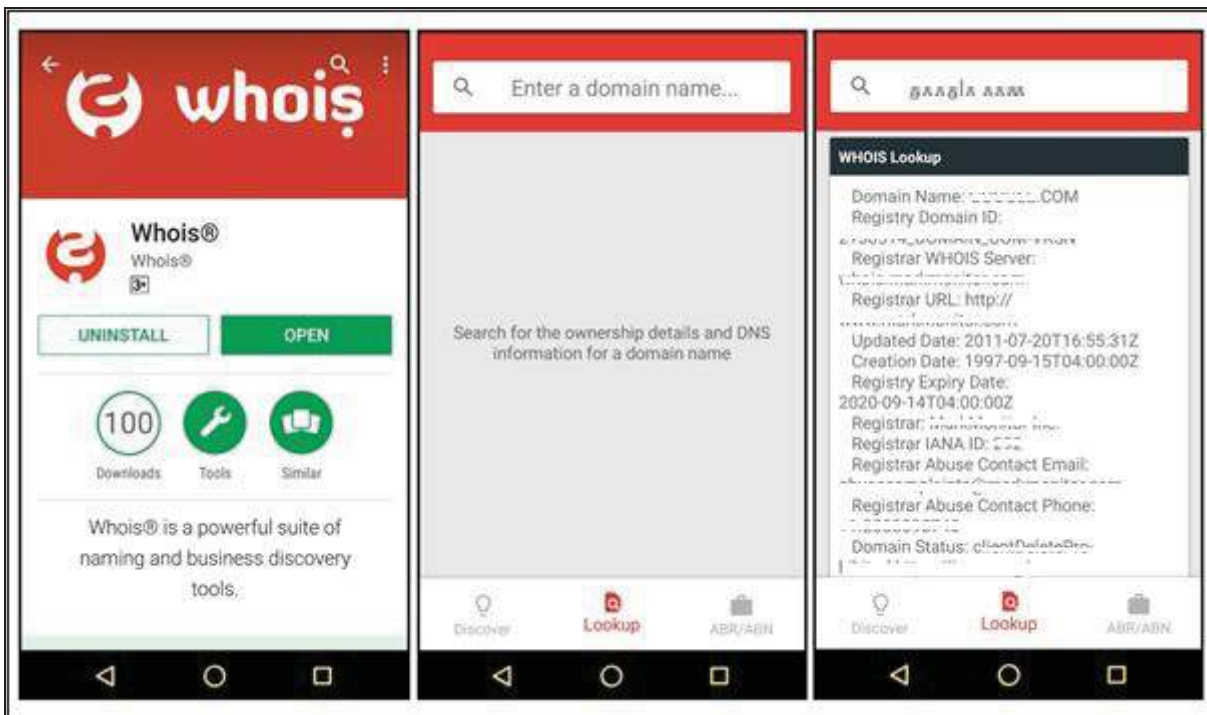


Figure 2-33 Whois Application

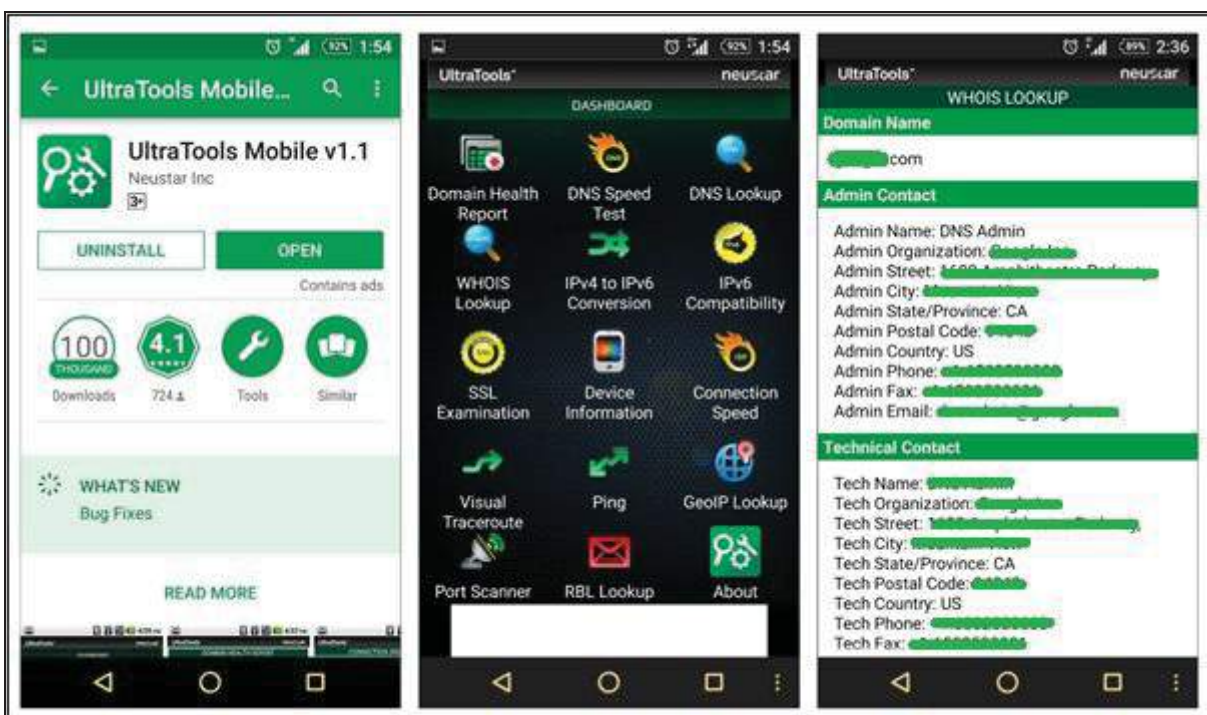


Figure 2-34 Ultra Tool Mobile Application

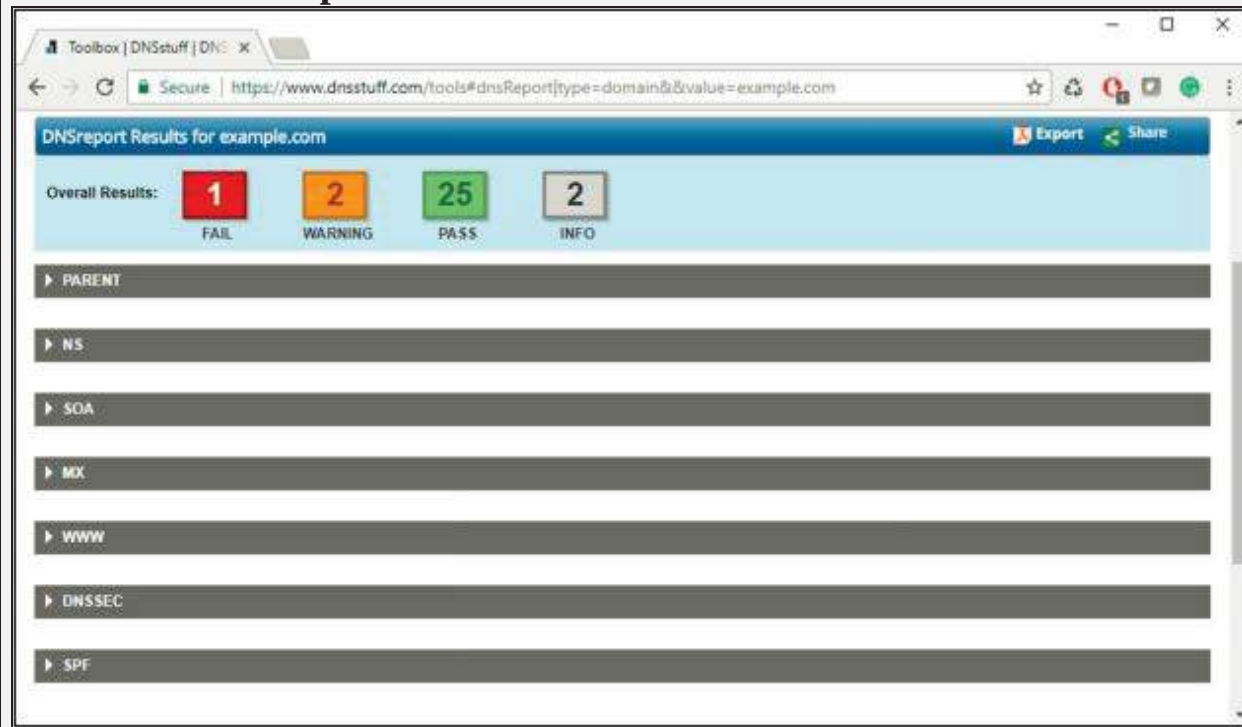


Figure 2-35 DNSStuff.com

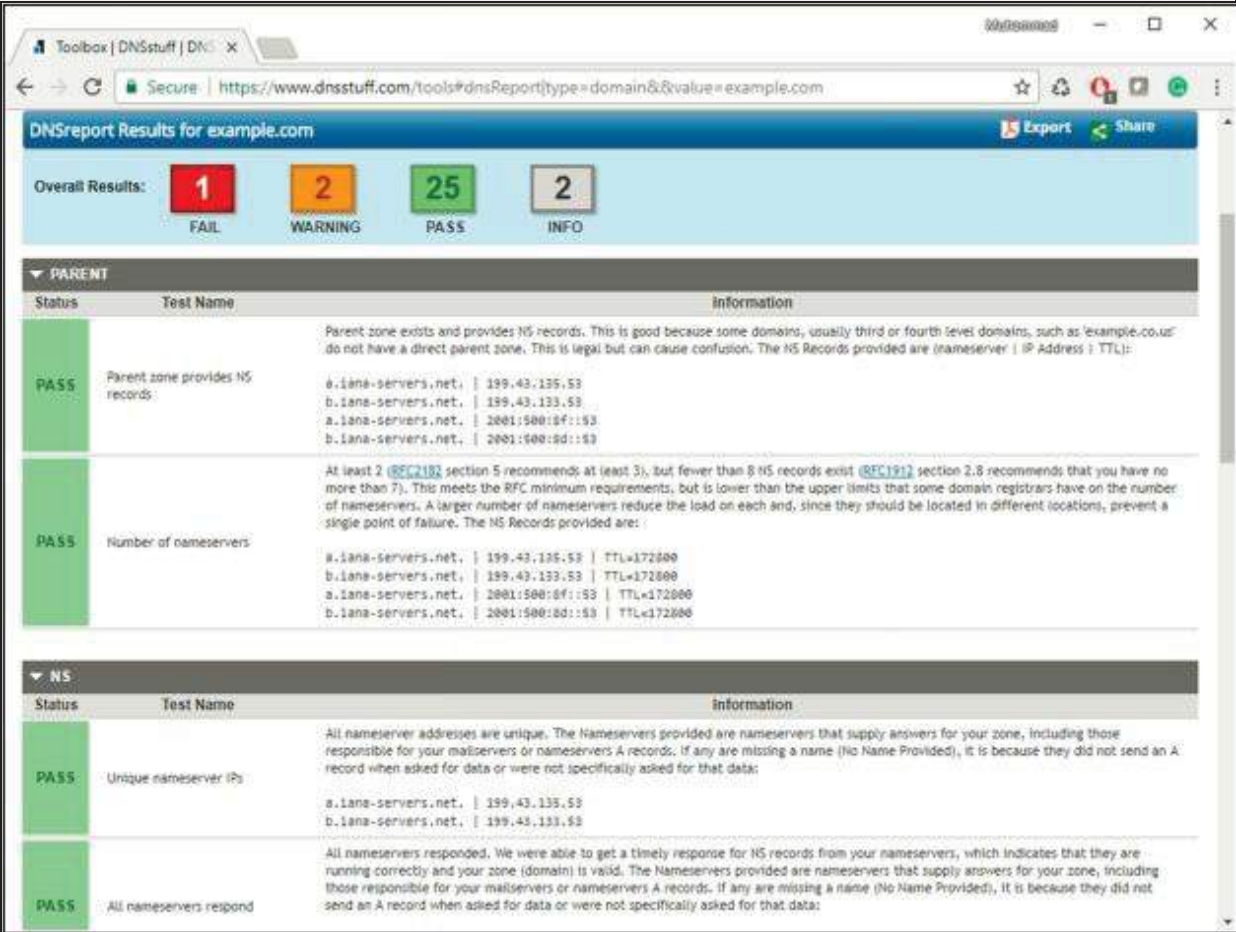


Figure 2-36 DNS Footprinting

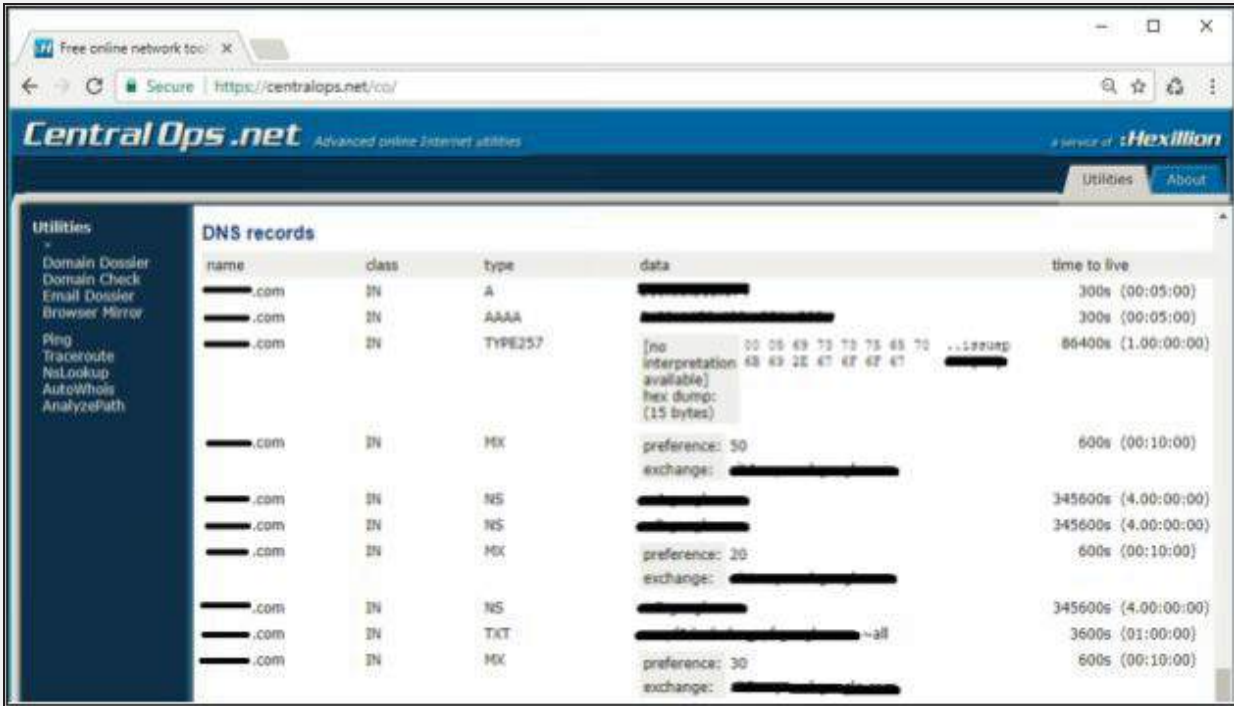


Figure 2-38 Domain Dossier Search Results

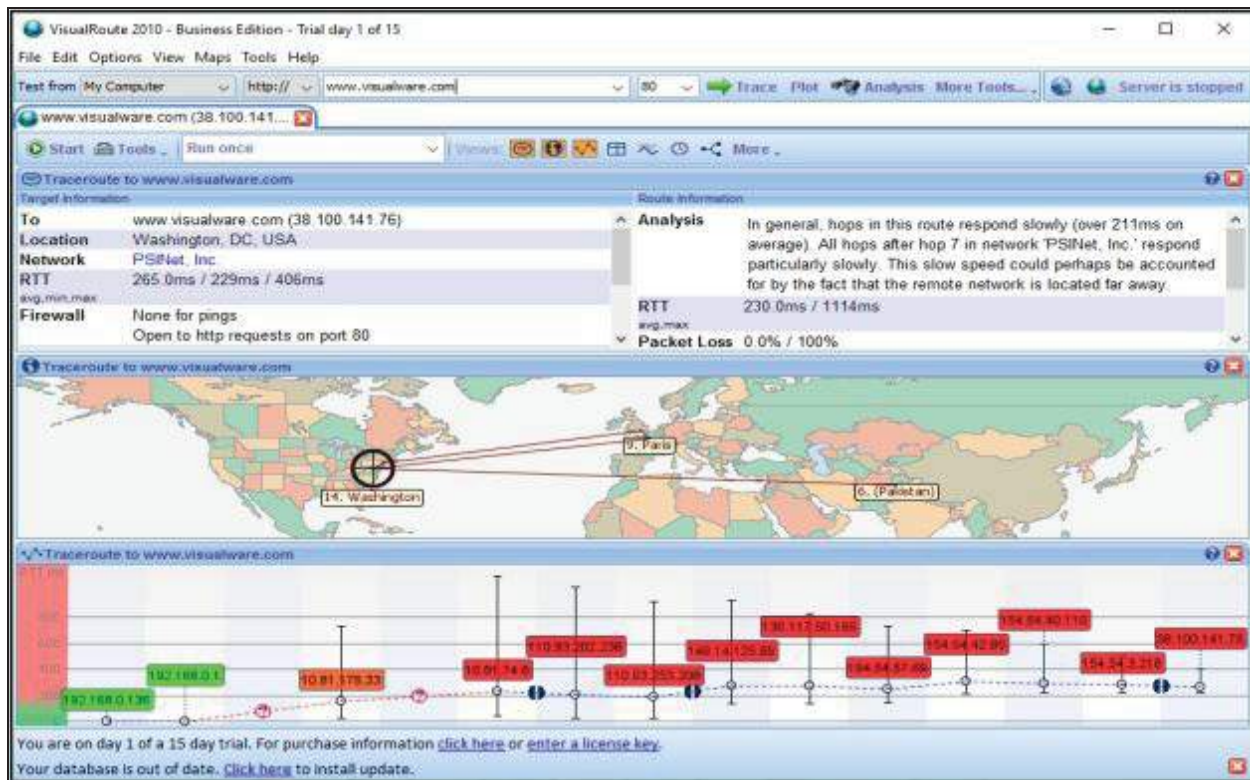


Figure 2-43 Visual Route Application

Footprinting through Social Engineering

In footprinting, the one of the easiest component to hack is human being itself. We can collect information from a human quite easily than fetching information from systems. Using Social Engineering, some basic social engineering techniques are: -

- Eavesdropping
- Shoulder Surfing
- Dumpster Diving
- Impersonation

Social Engineering

You can understand the social engineering as an art of extracting sensitive information from peoples. Social Engineers keep themselves undetected, people are unaware and careless and share their valuable information. This information is related to the type of social engineering. In Information Security aspects, Footprinting through Social engineering gathers information such as: -

- Credit card information.
- Username & Passwords.
- Security devices & Technology information.
- Operating System information.
- Software information.
- Network information.
- IP address & name server's information.

Eavesdropping

Eavesdropping is a type of Social Engineering footprinting in which the Social Engineer is gathers information by listening to the conversation covertly. Listening conversations includes listening, reading or accessing any source of information without being notified.

Phishing

In the Phishing process, Emails sent to a targeted group contains email message body which looks legitimate. The recipient clicks the link mentioned in the email assuming it as a legitimate link. Once the reader clicks the link, enticed for providing information. It redirects users to the fake webpage that looks like an official website. For example, Recipient is redirected to a fake bank webpage, asking for sensitive information. Similarly, the redirected link may download any malicious script onto the recipient's system to fetch information.

Shoulder Surfing

Shoulder Surfing is another method of gathering information by standing behind a target when he is interacting with sensitive information. By Shoulder surfing, passwords, account numbers, or other secret information can be gathered depending upon the carelessness of the target.

Dumpster Diving

Dumpster Diving is the process of looking for treasure in trash. This technique is older but still effective. It includes accessing the target's trash such as printer trash, user desk, company's trash for finding phone bills, contact information's, financial information, source codes, and other helpful material.

Footprinting Tool

Maltego is a data mining tools that are powered by Paterva. This interactive tool gathers data and represents graphs for analysis. The measure purpose of this Data mining tools is an online investigation of relationships among different pieces of information obtained from various sources lies over the internet. 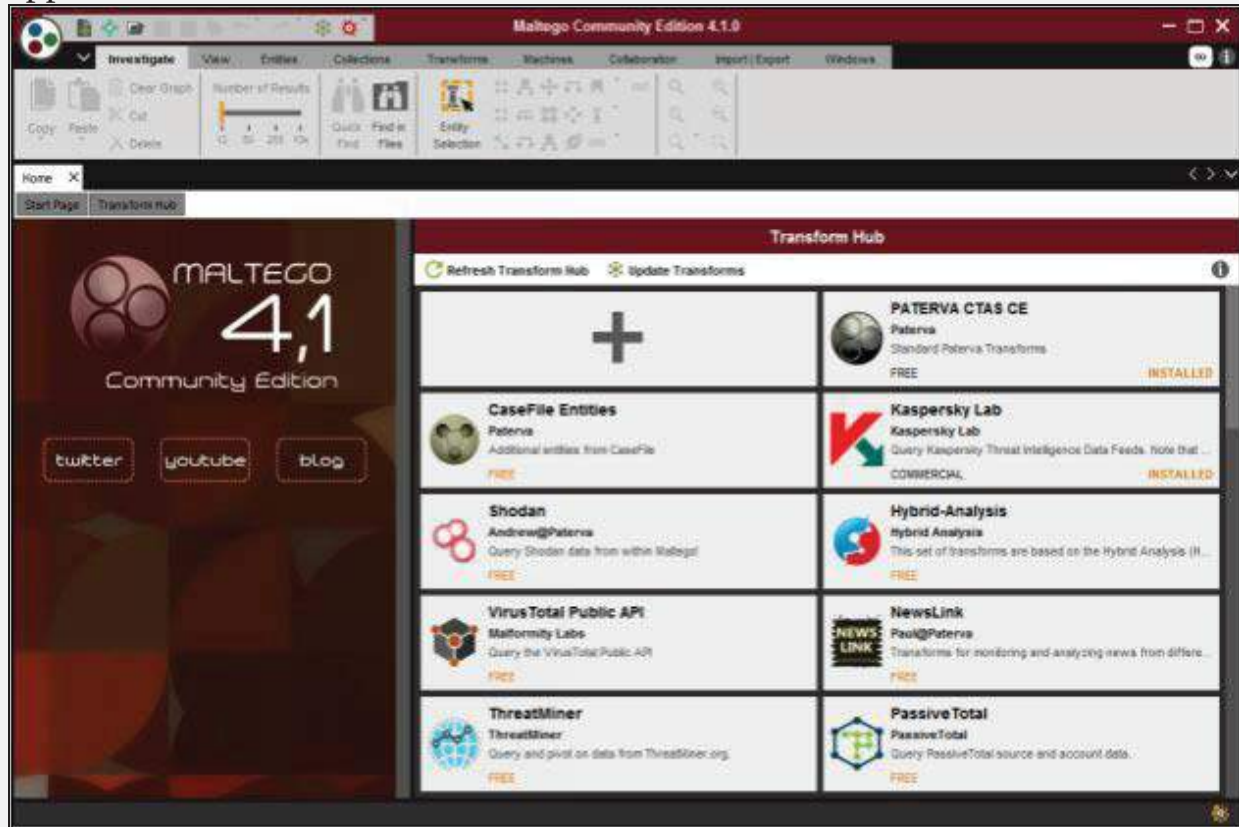


Figure 2-44 Maltego Home Page

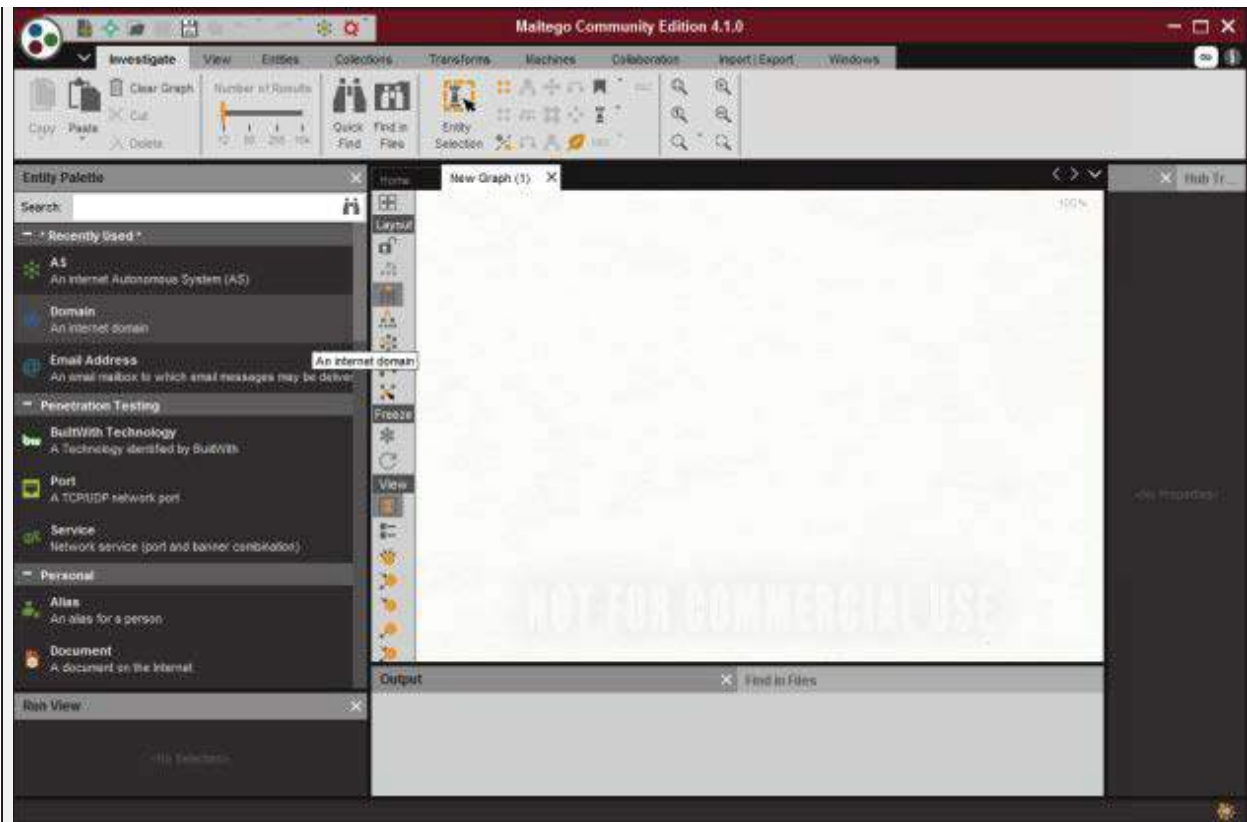


Figure 2-45 Maltego

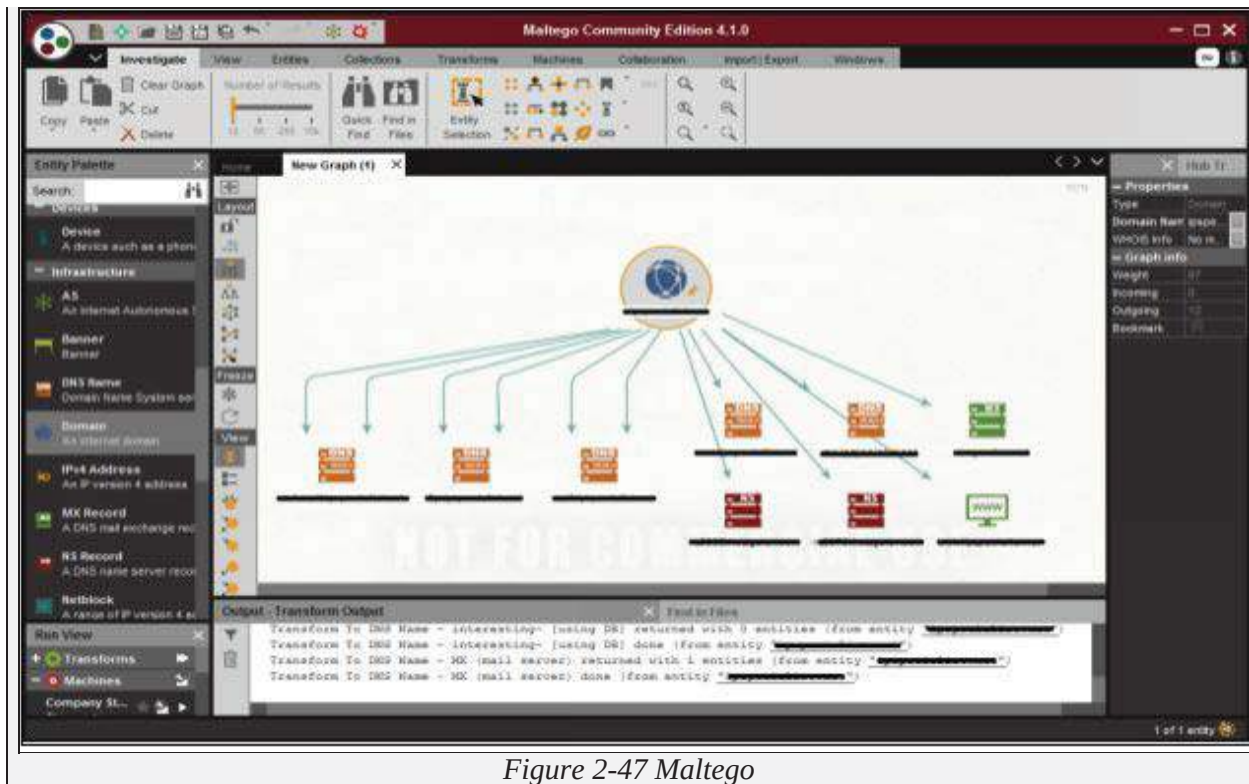


Figure 2-47 Maltego

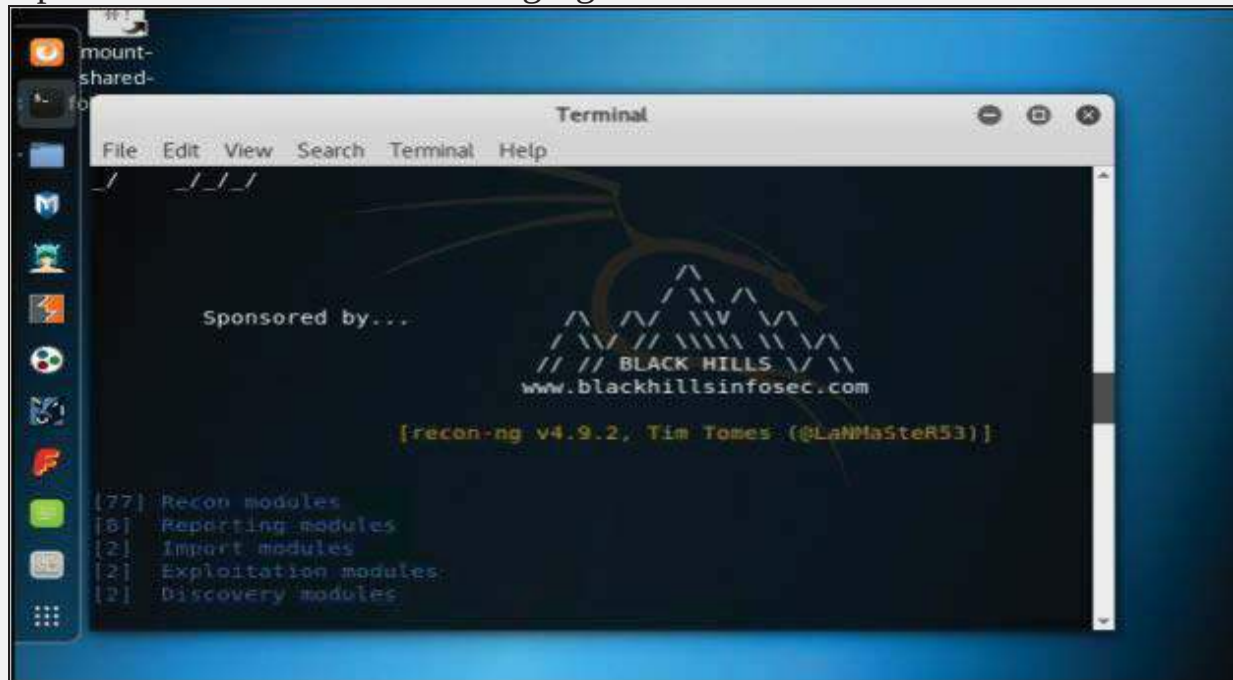


Figure 2-48 Recon-ng

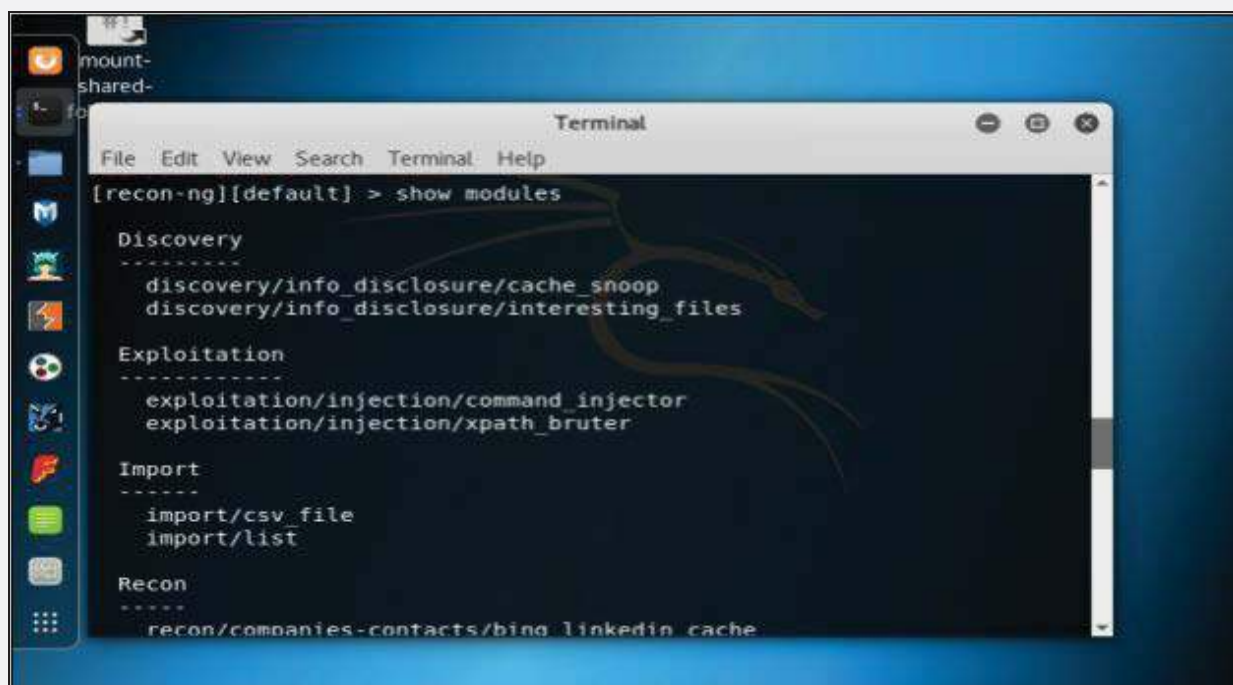


Figure 2-49 Recon-ng (Show module command)

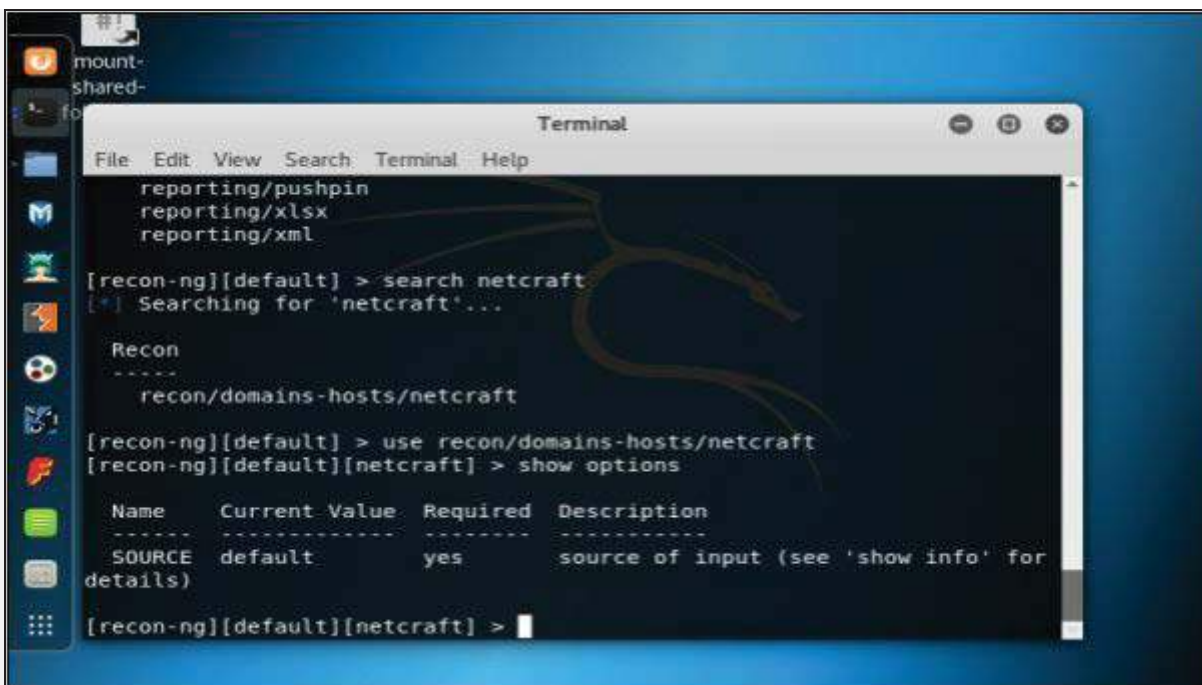


Figure 2-51 Using Netcraft through Recon-ng

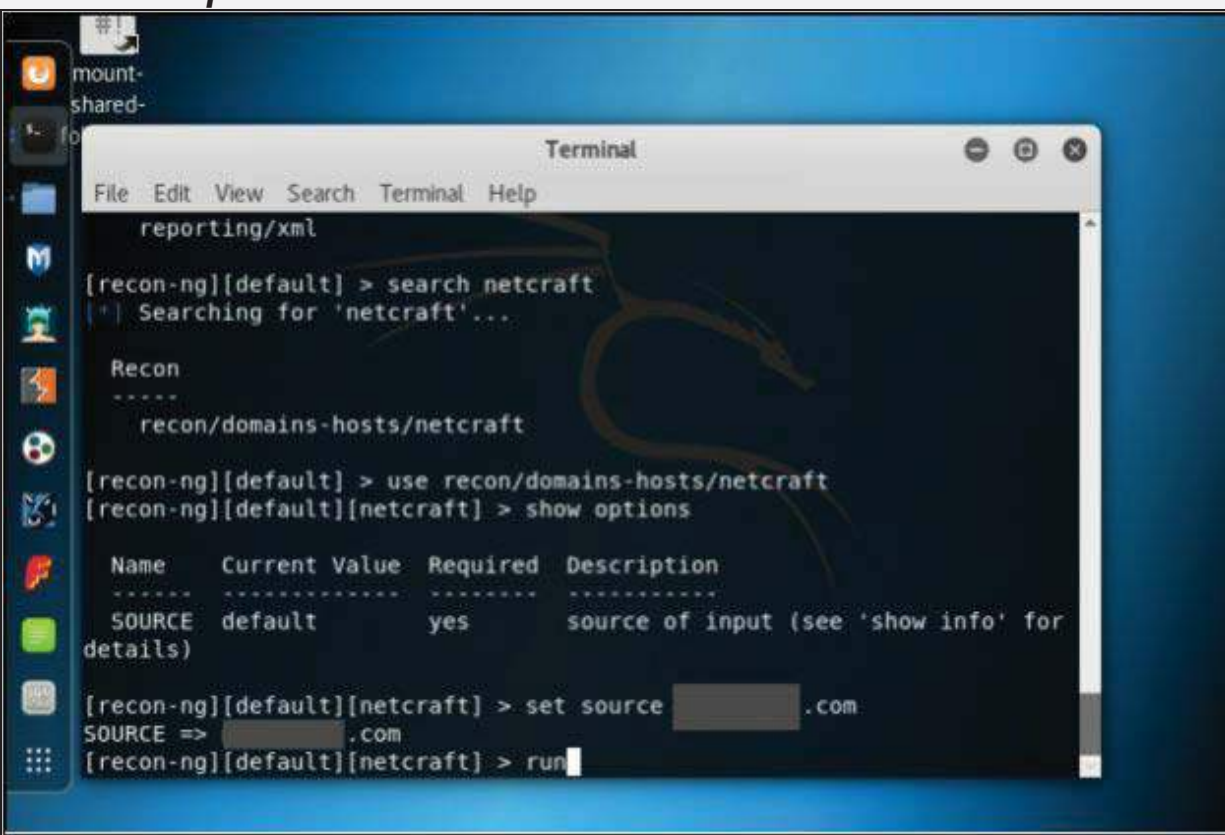


Figure 2-52 Searching for Target Domain

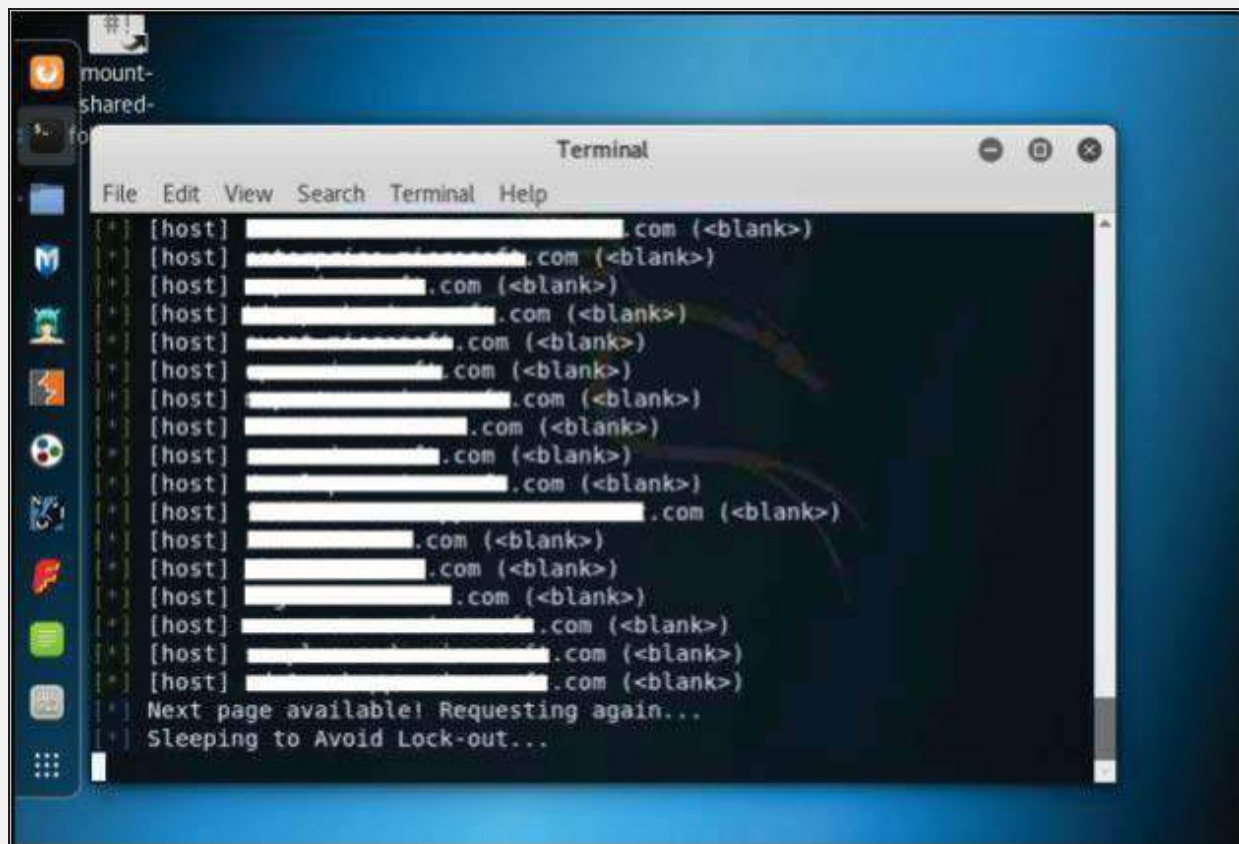


Figure 2-53 Search Result of Target Domain

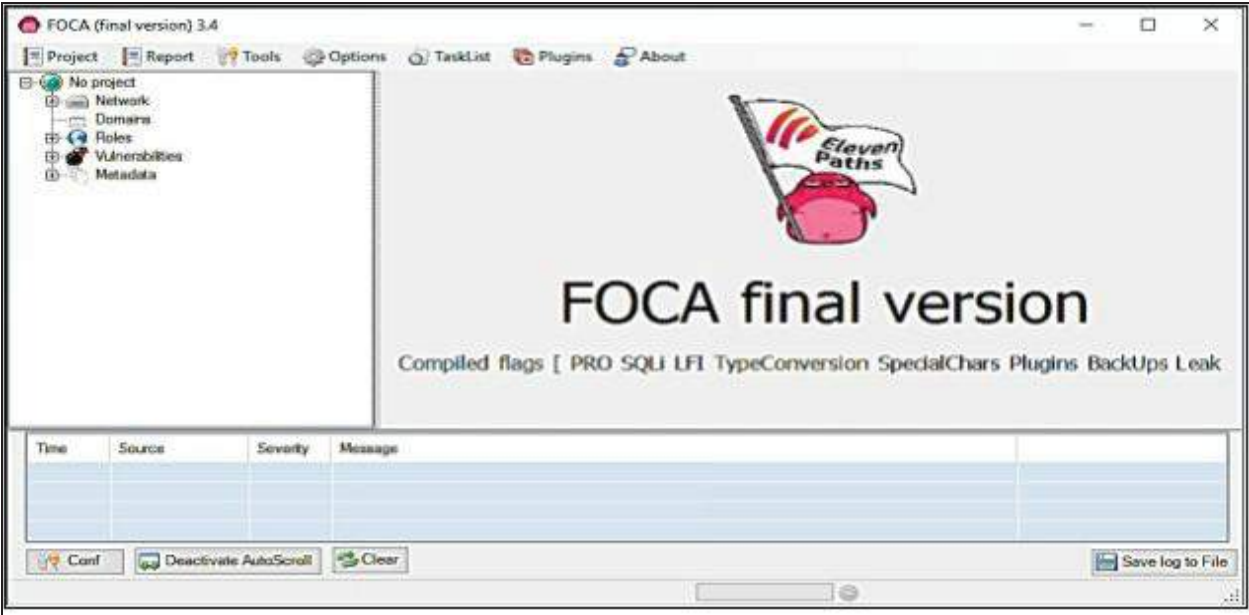


Figure 2-54 FOCA Dashboard

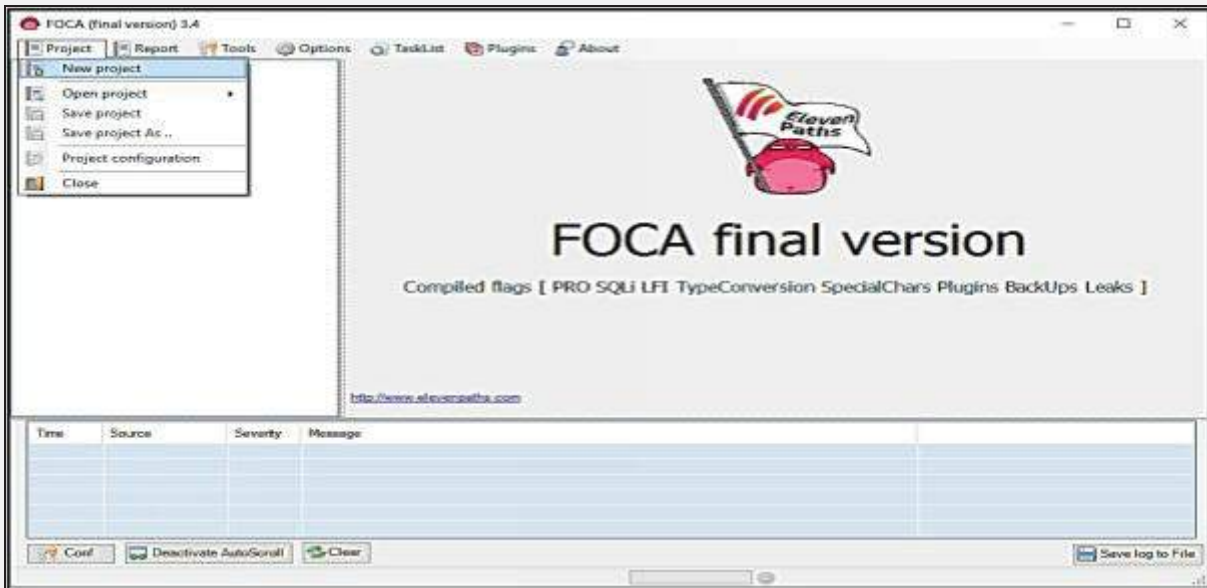
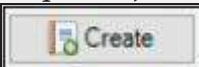


Figure 2-55 Creating New Project using FOCA

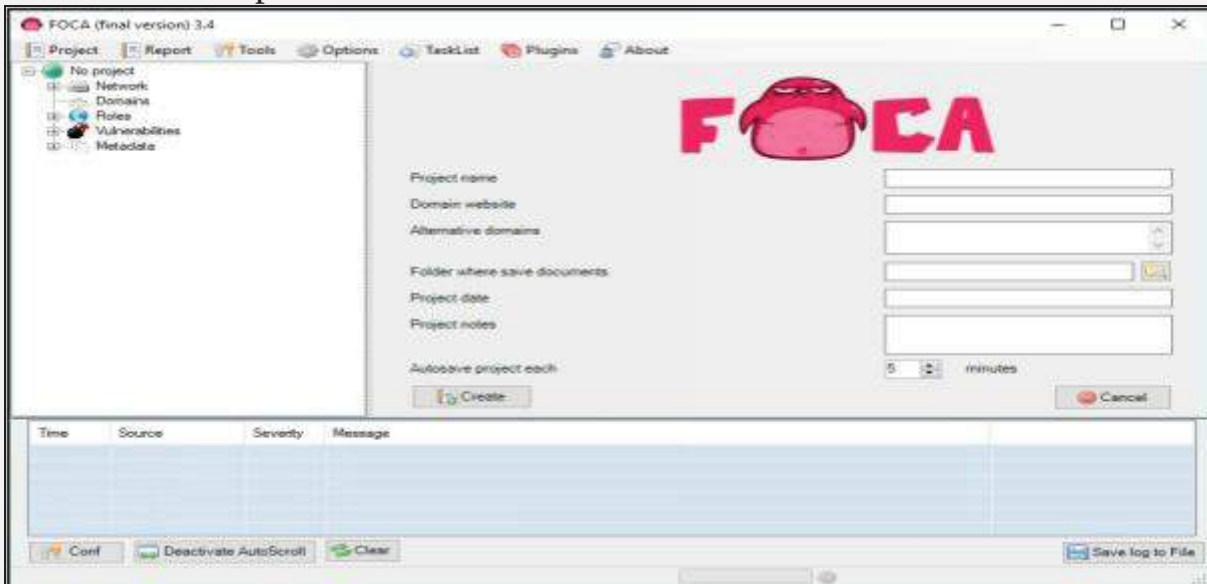


Figure 2-56 Creating New Project using FOCA

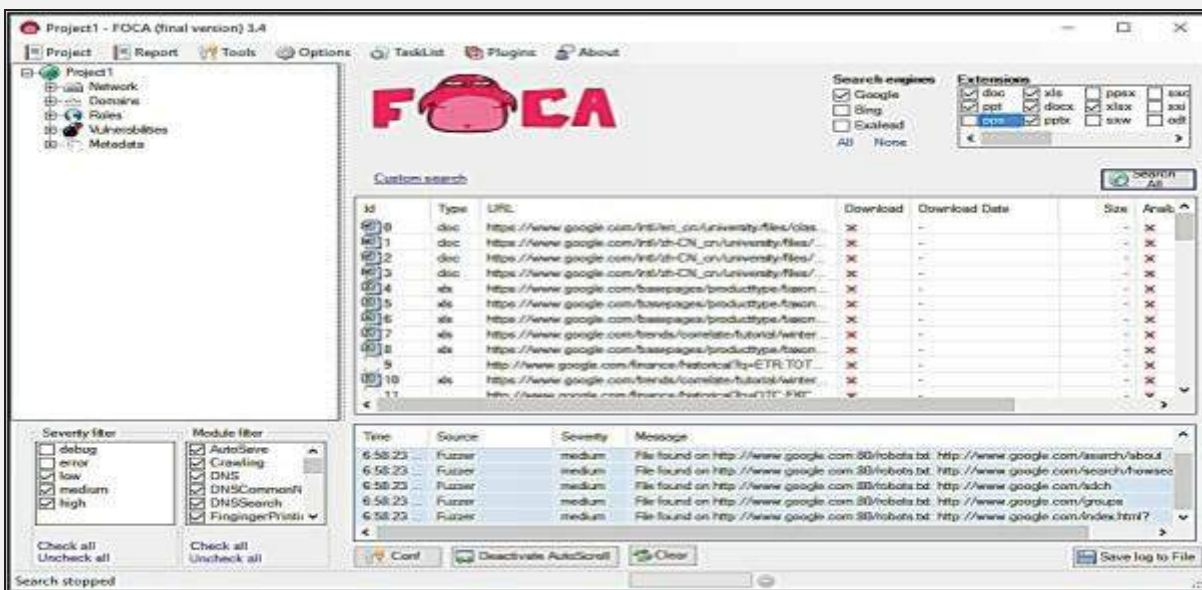


Figure 2-57 Search using FOCA

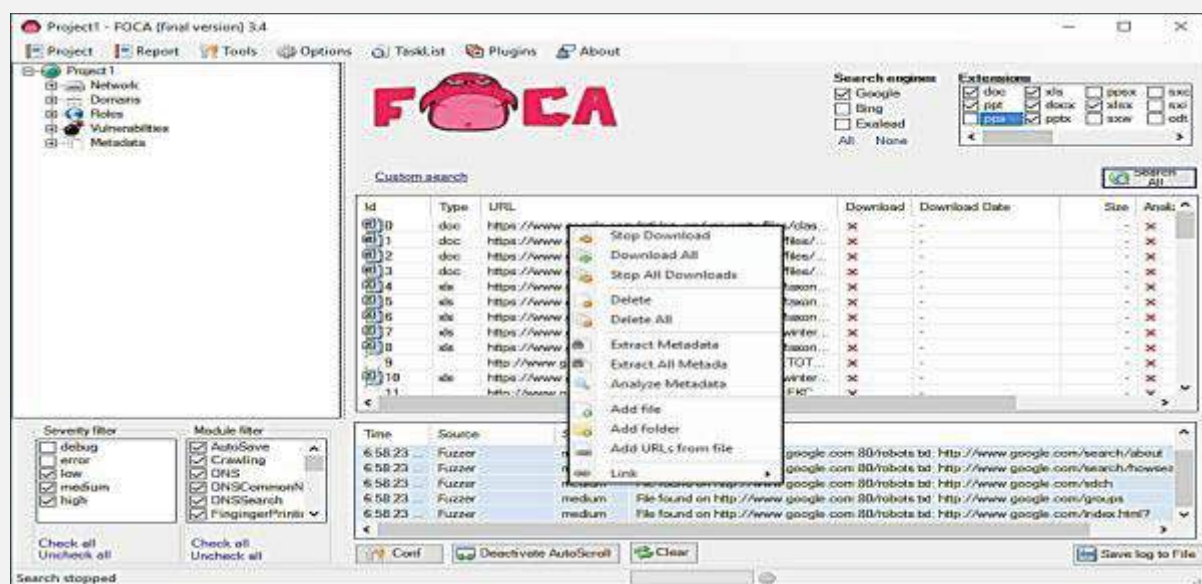


Figure 2-58 Analysing Options with FOCA

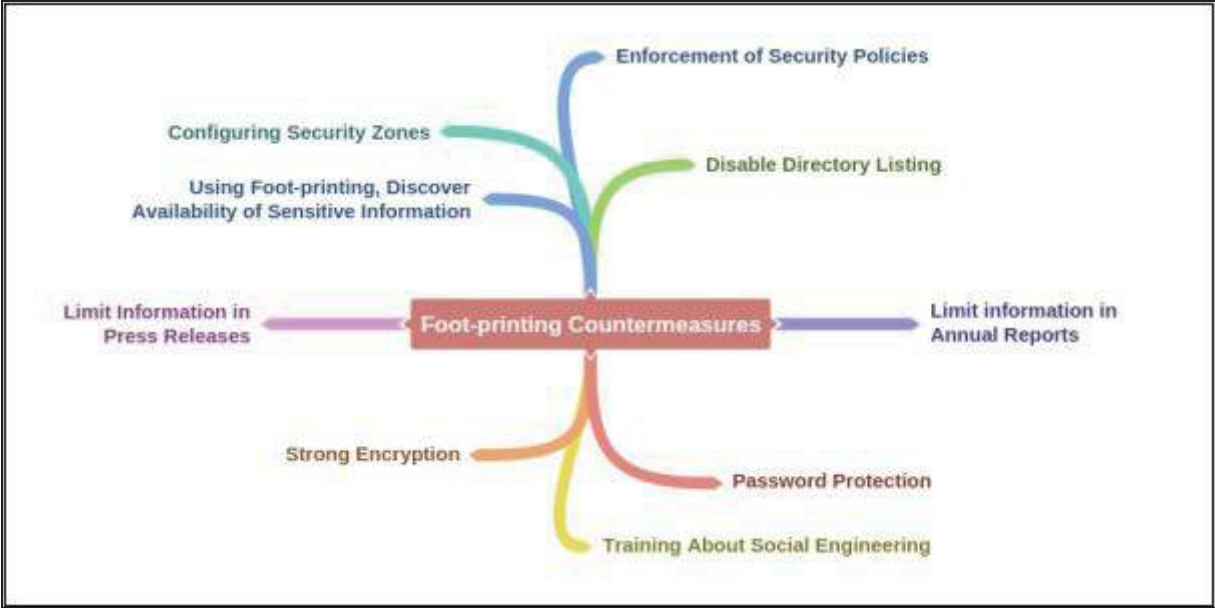

Footprinting countermeasure includes the following measures to mitigate footprinting:

- Employees on an organization must be restricted to access social networking sites from the corporate network.
- Devices and Servers are configured to avoid data leakage.
- Provide education, training, and awareness of footprinting, impact, methodologies, and countermeasures to the employees of an organization.
- Avoid revealing sensitive information in Annual reports, Press releases, etc.
- Prevent search engines to cache web pages.

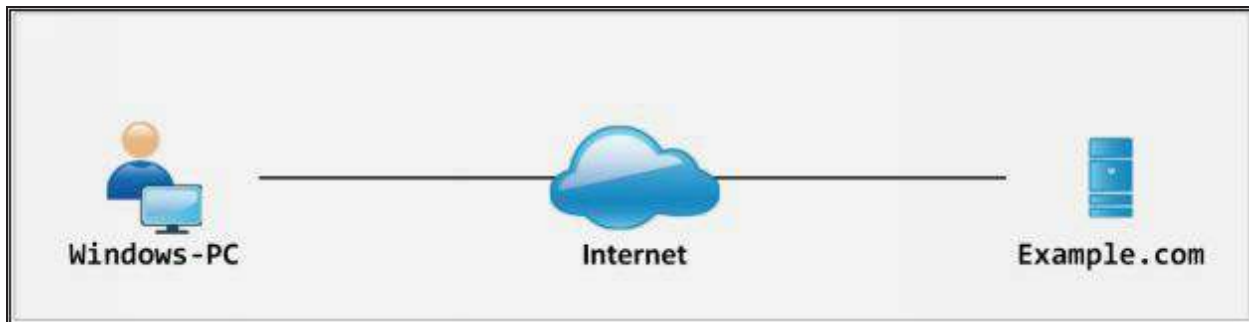


Figure 2-59: Topology Diagram

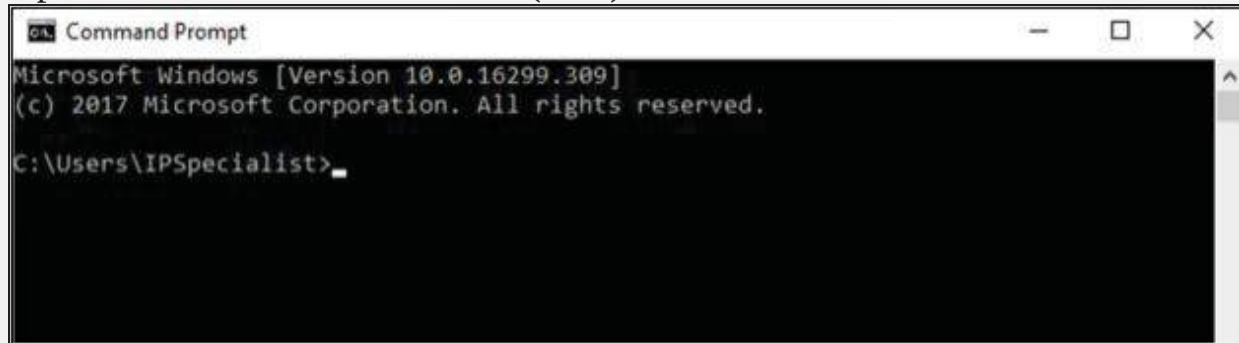



Figure 2-60: Windows Command Prompt





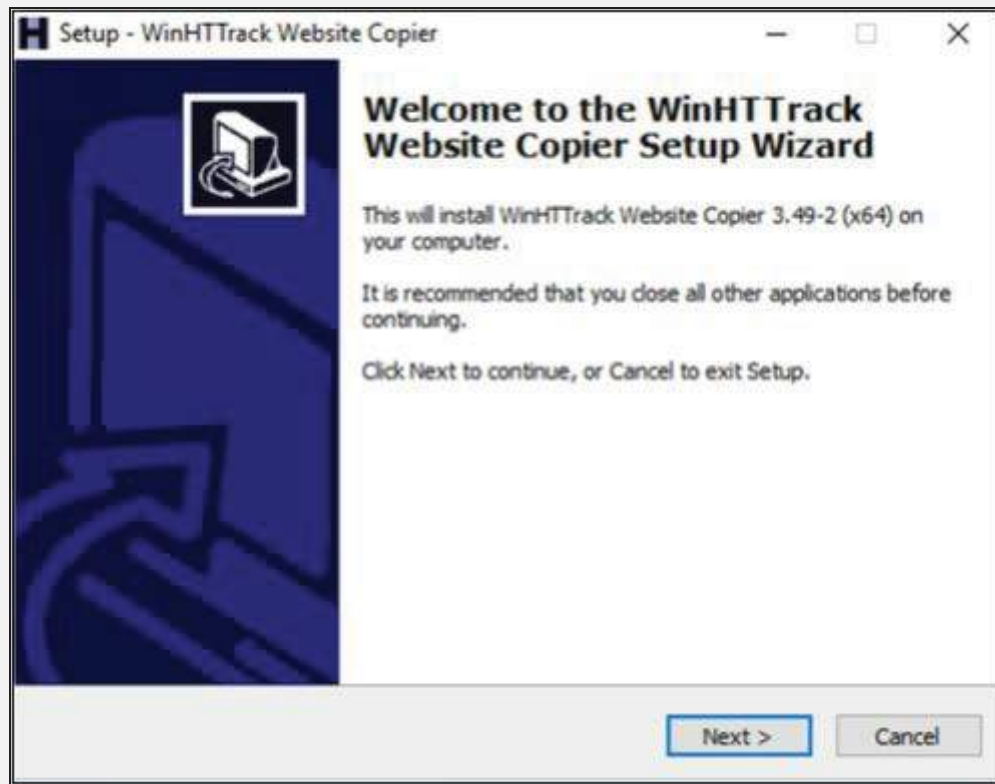


Figure 2-67: WinHTTrack Website Copier

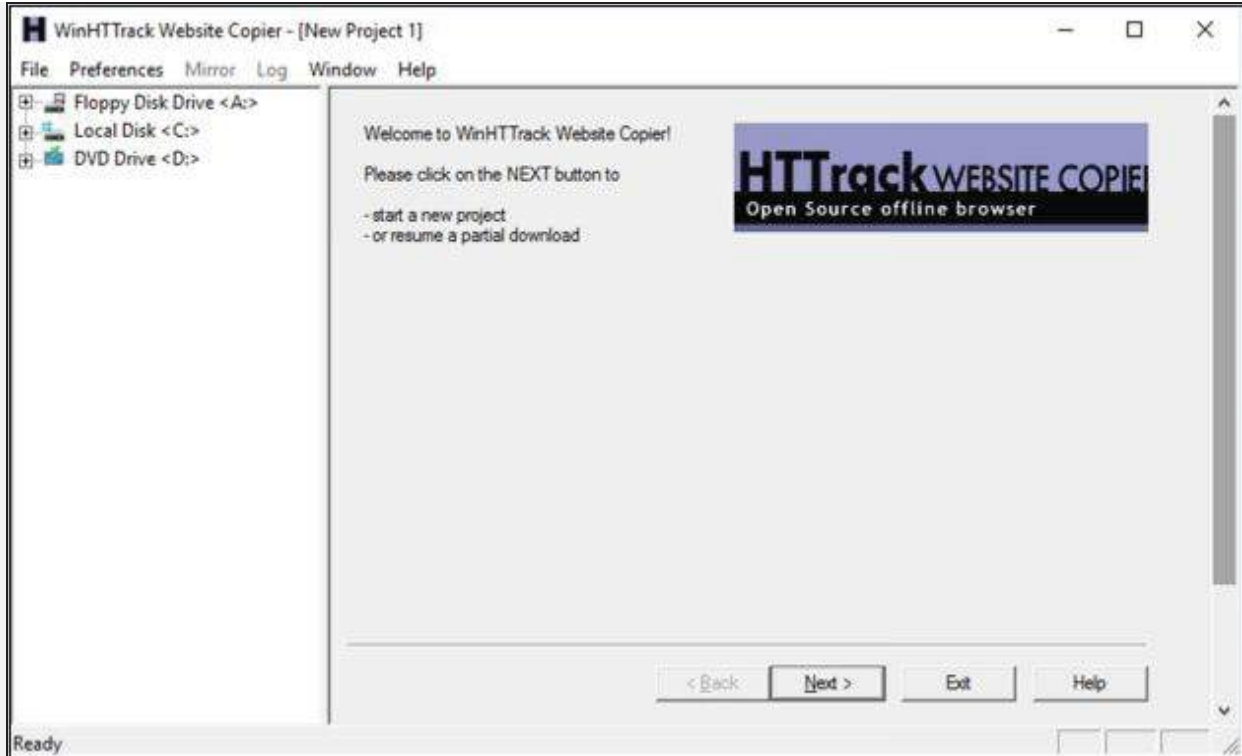


Figure 2-68: WinHTTrack Website Copier

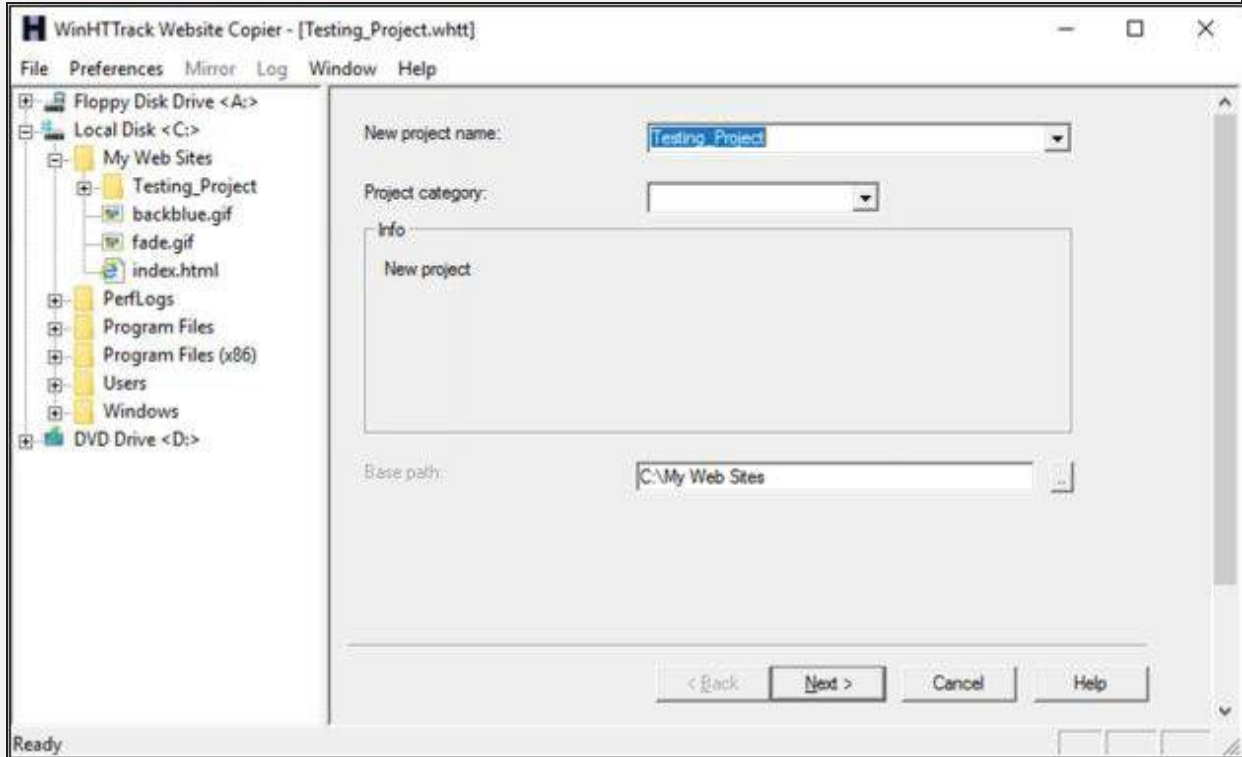


Figure 2-69: Creating a new project

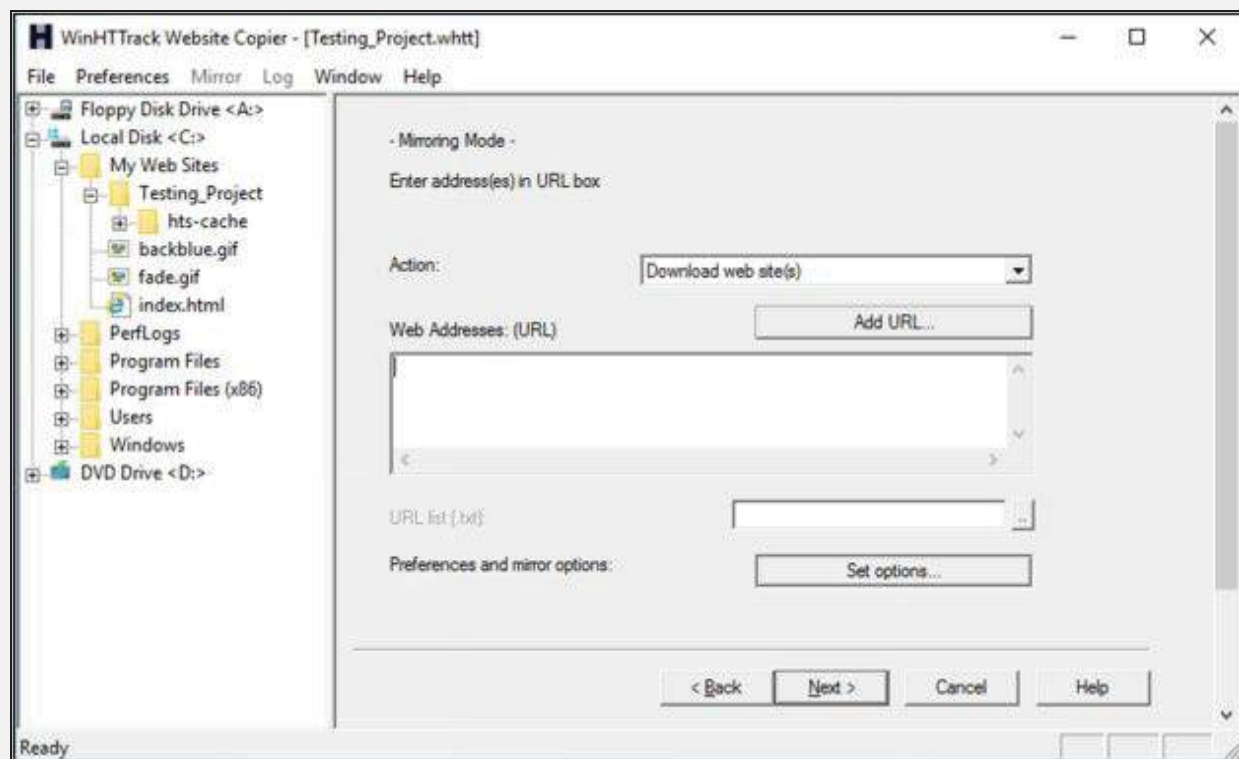


Figure 2-70: Setting Target

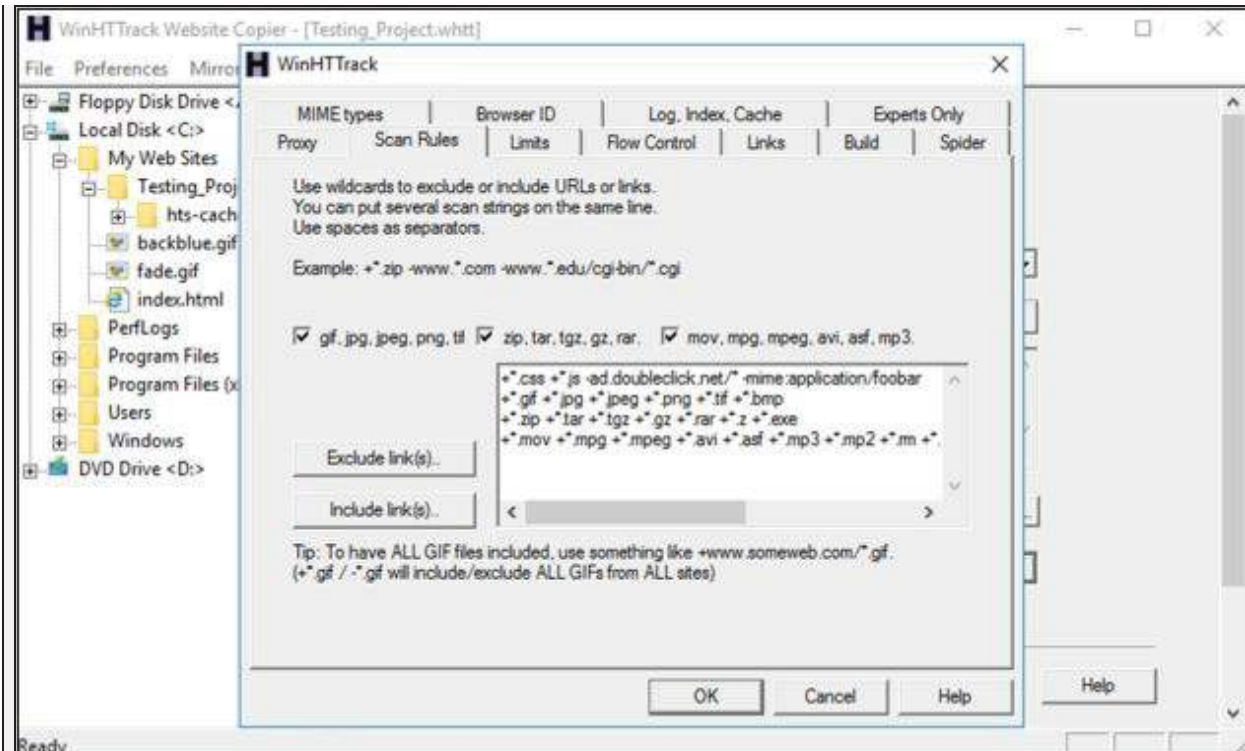


Figure 2-71: Configuring Options

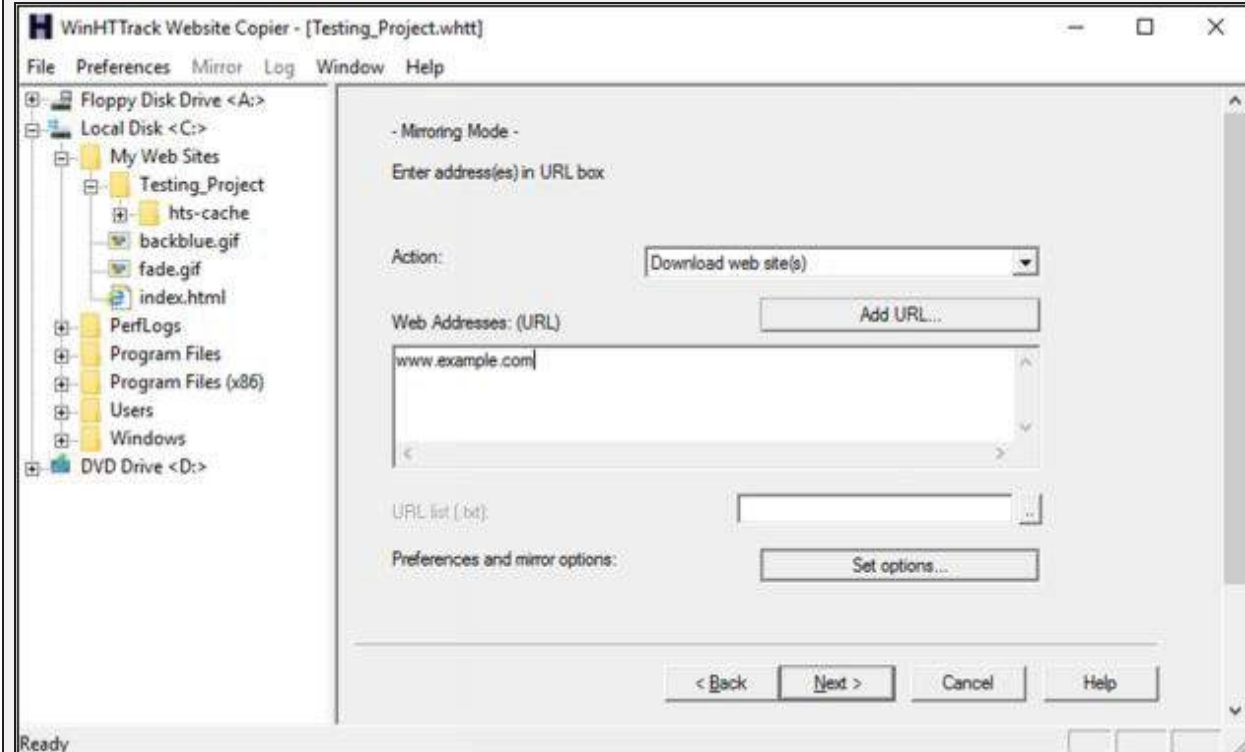


Figure 2-72: Configuring Options

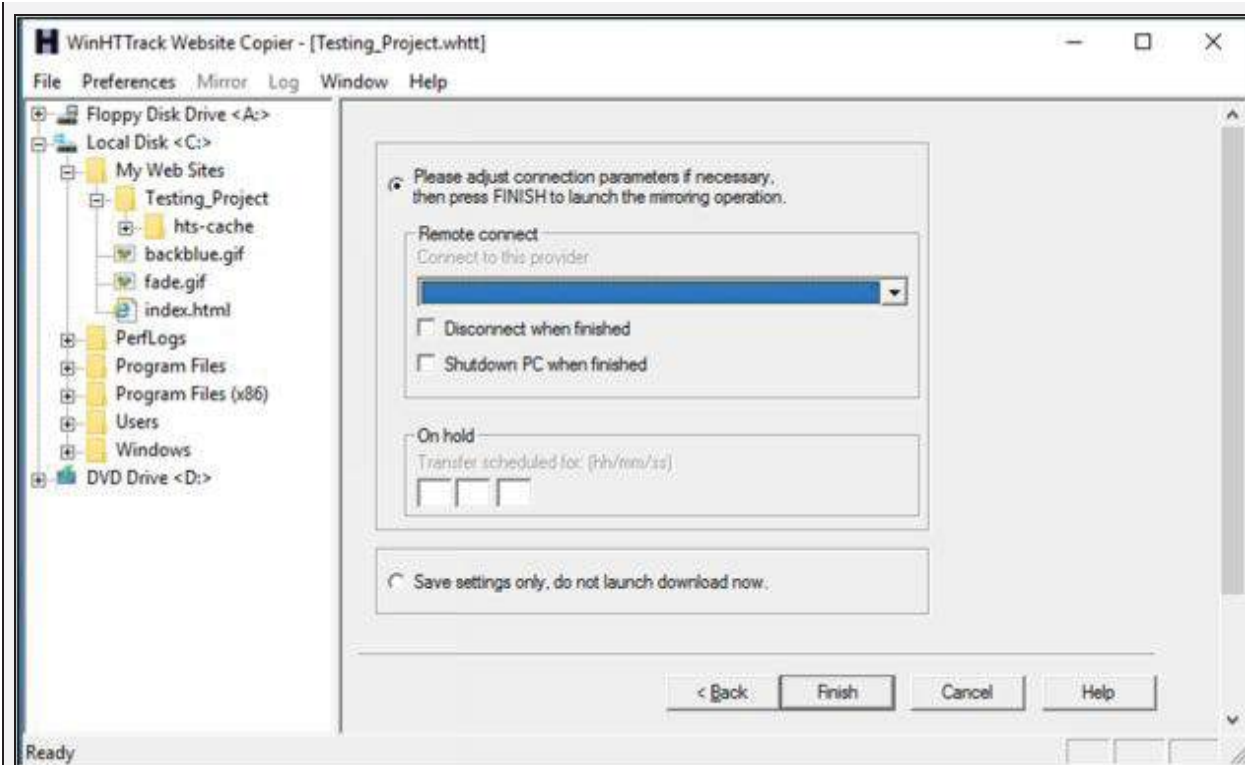


Figure 2-73: Configuring Options

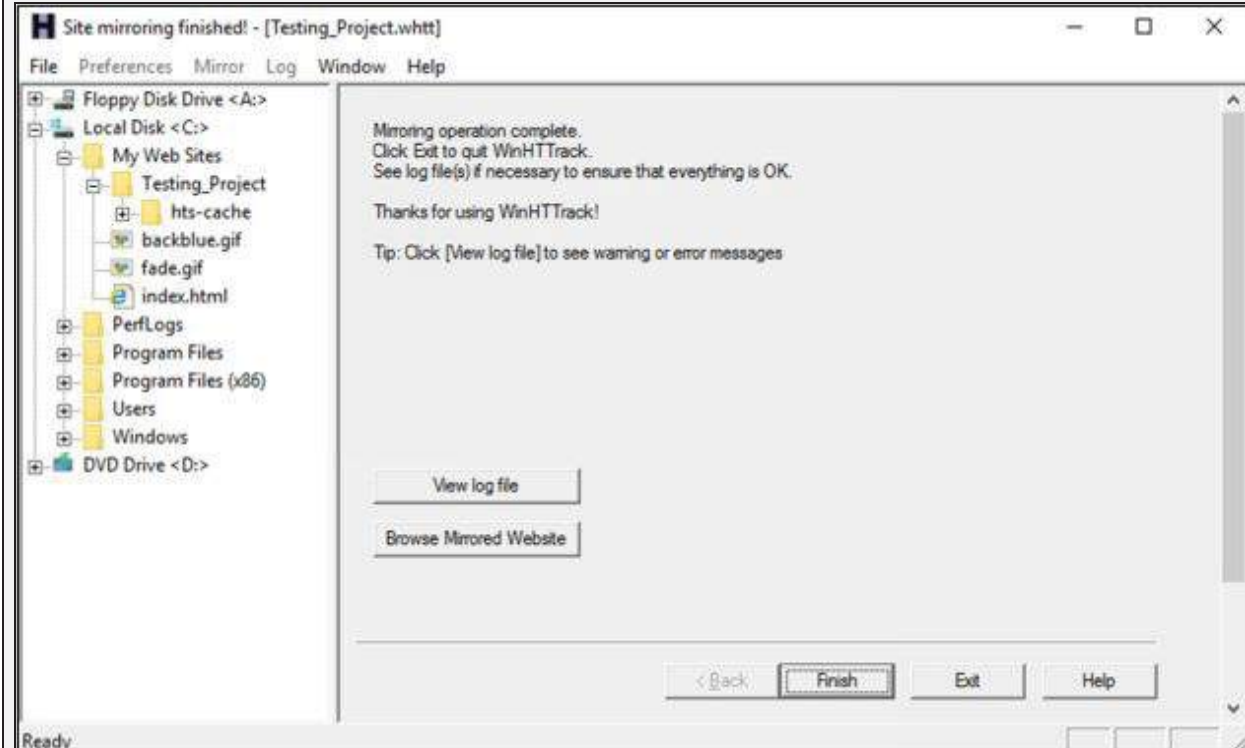


Figure 2-74: Copying complete

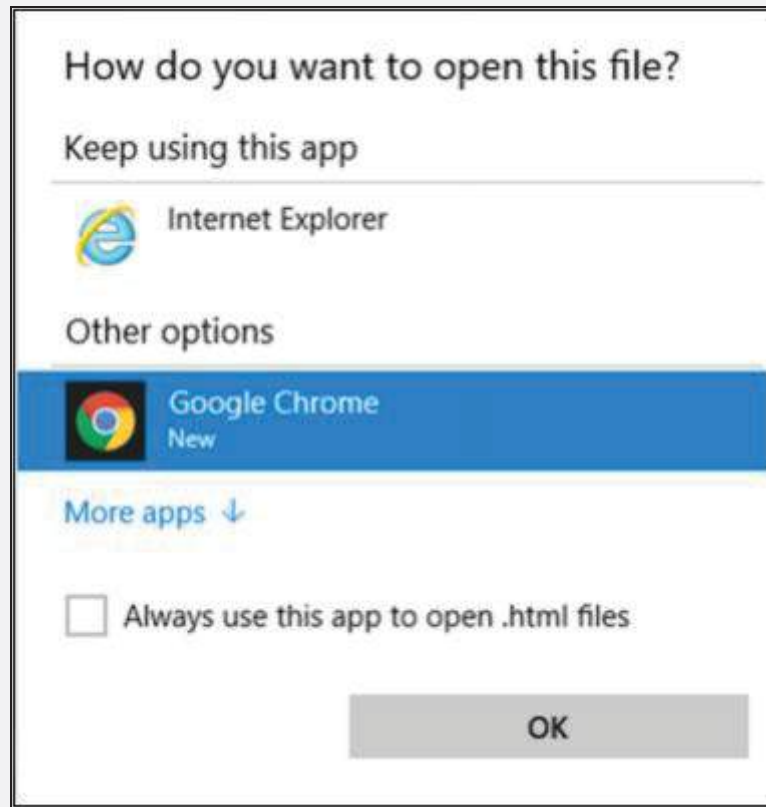


Figure 2-75: Browsing Copied Website

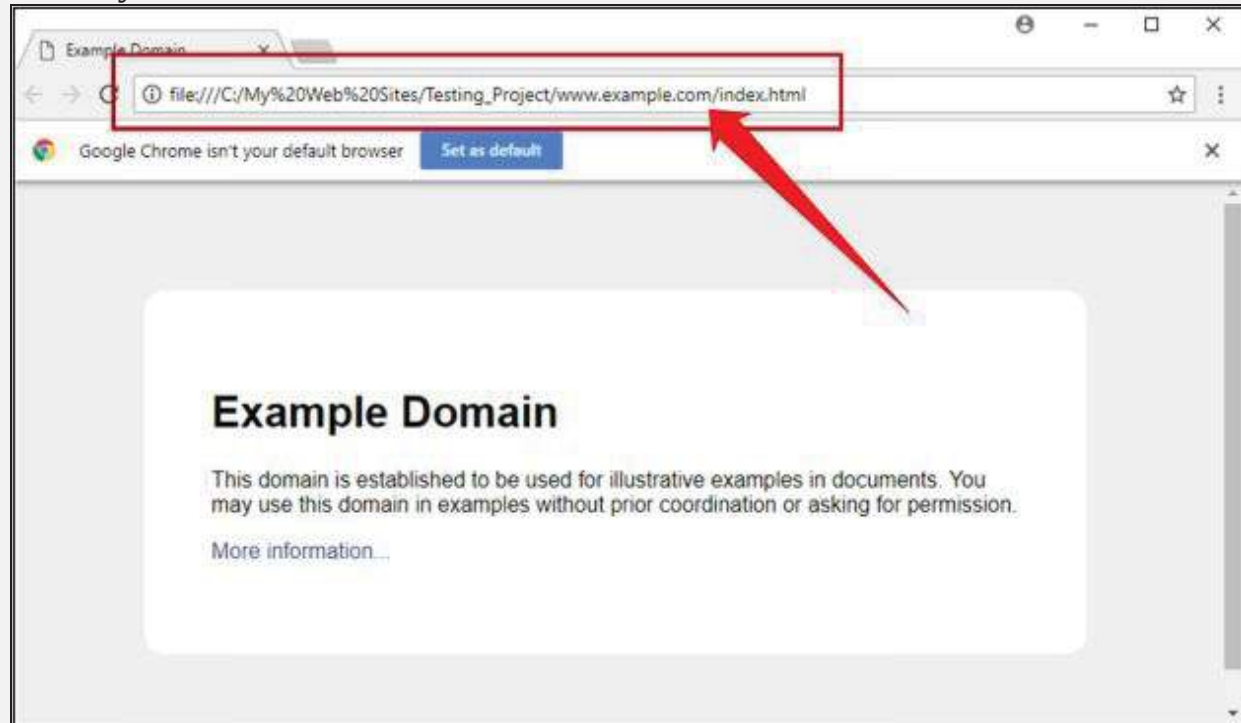


Figure 2-76: Website browse from a local directory

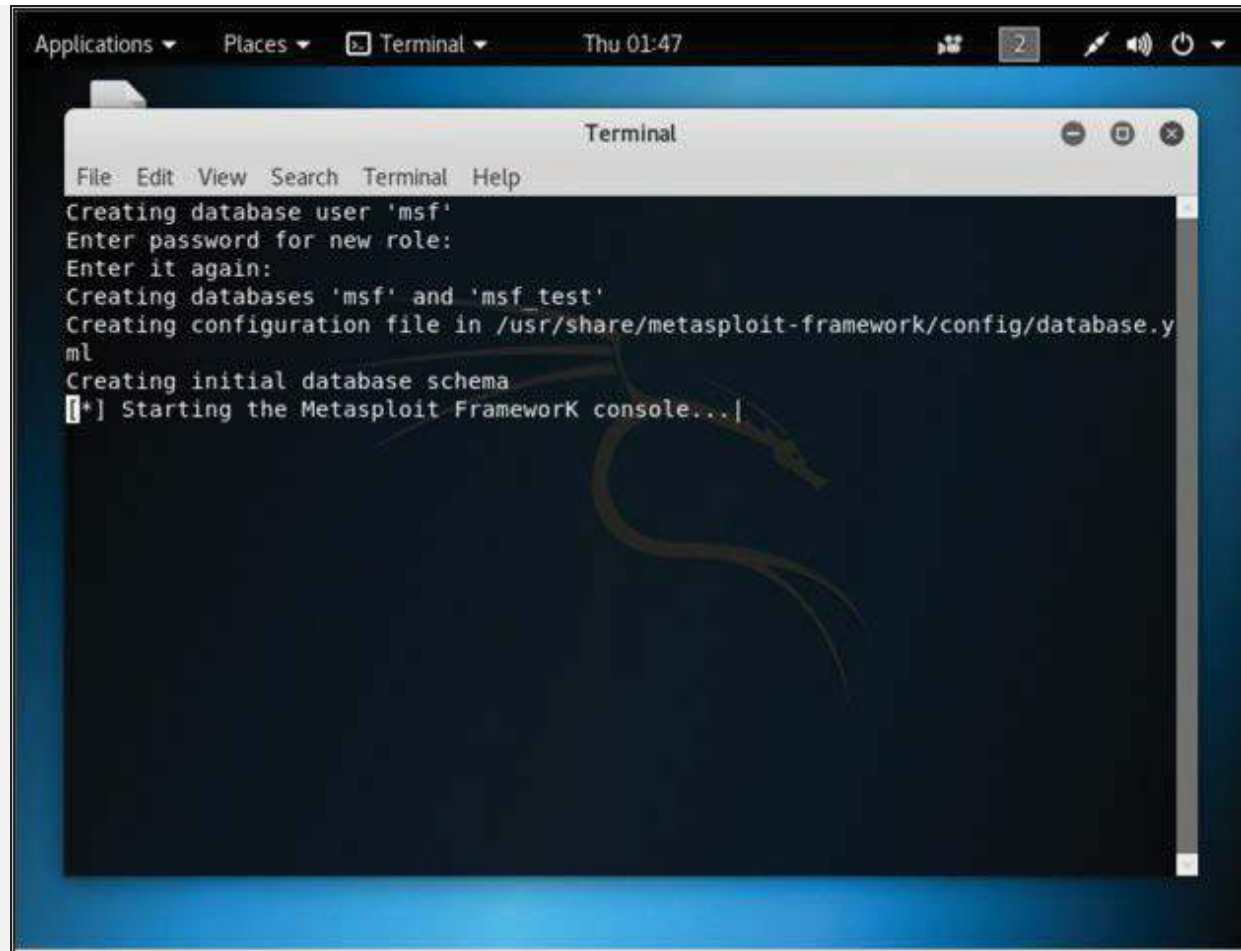

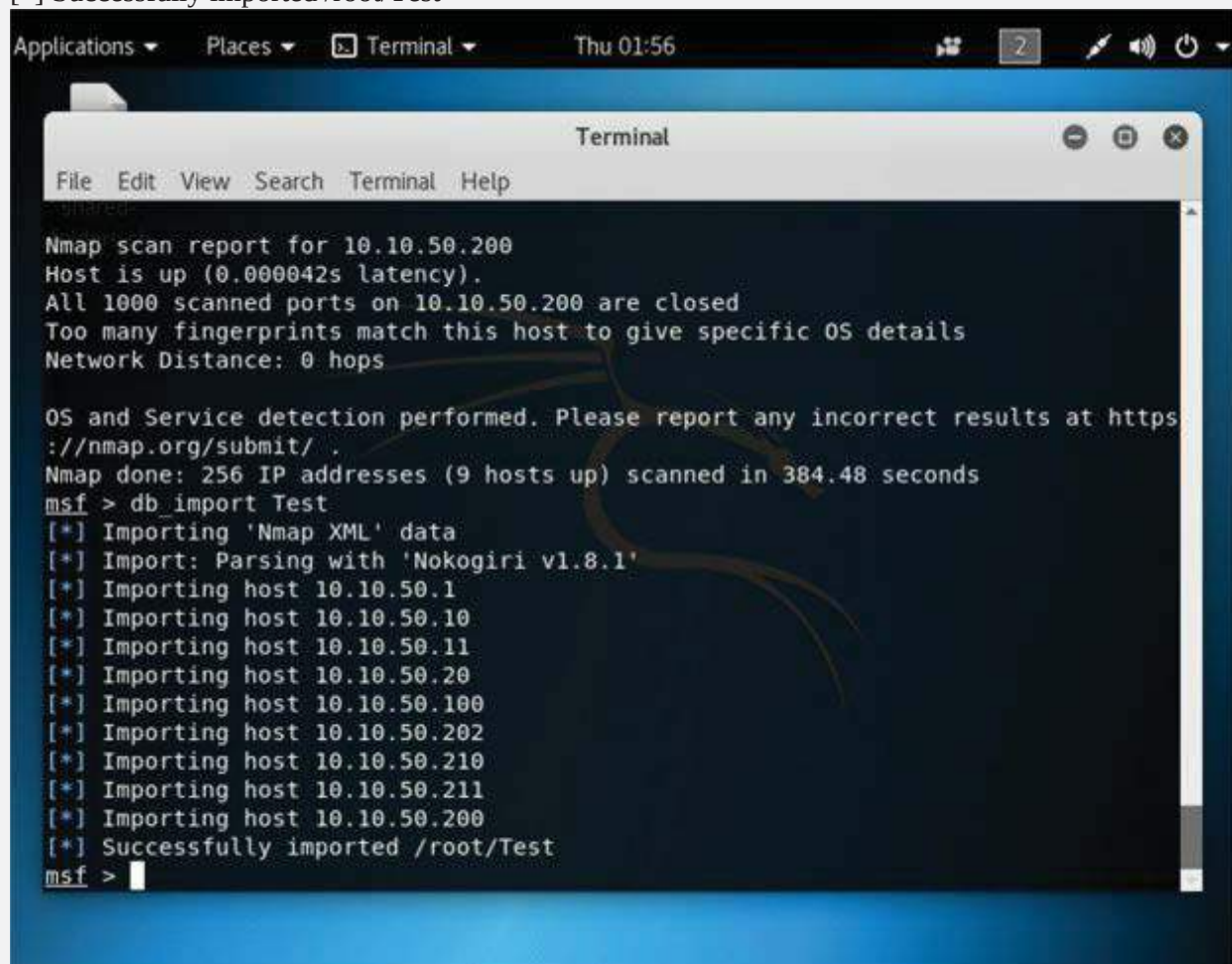


Figure 2-80: Importing Results



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Chapter 3: Scanning Networks

Technology Brief

After Footprinting phase, you may have enough information about the target. Now Scanning network phase requires some of this information to proceed further. Network Scanning is a method of getting network information such as identification of hosts, port information, and services by scanning networks and ports. The main Objective of Network Scanning is: -

- To identify live hosts on a network
- To identify open & closed ports
- To identify operating system information
- To identify services running on a network
- To identify running processes on a network
- To identify the presence of Security Devices like firewalls
- To identify System architecture
- To identify running services
- To identify vulnerabilities

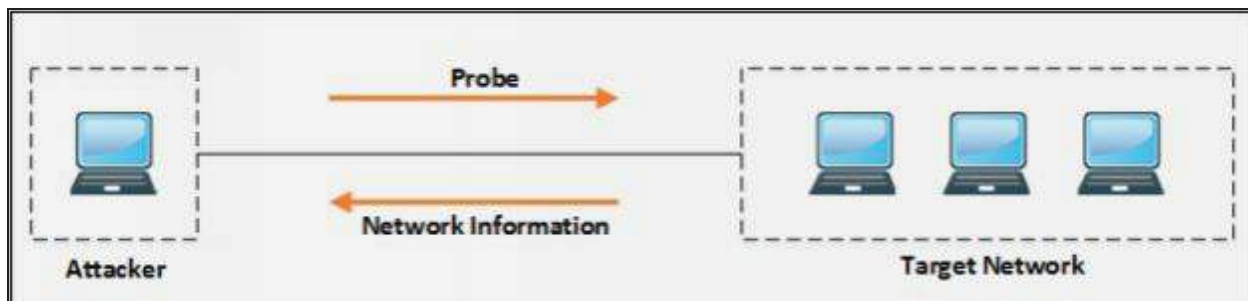


Figure 3-01 Scanning Network

Overview of Network Scanning

Scanning Network phase includes probing to the target network for getting information. When a user probes another user, it can reveal much useful information from the reply is received. In-depth identification of a network, ports and running services helps to create a network architecture, and the attacker gets a clearer picture of the target.

TCP Communication

There are two types of Internet Protocol (IP) traffic. They are TCP (Transmission Control Protocol) and UDP (User Datagram Protocol). TCP is connection oriented. Bidirectional communication takes place after successful connection establishment. UDP is a simpler, connectionless Internet protocol. Multiple messages are sent as packets in chunks using UDP. Unlike the TCP, UDP adds no reliability, flow-control, or error-recovery functions to IP packets. Because of UDP's simplicity, UDP headers contain fewer bytes and consume less network overhead than TCP. Following diagram shows the TCP header: -

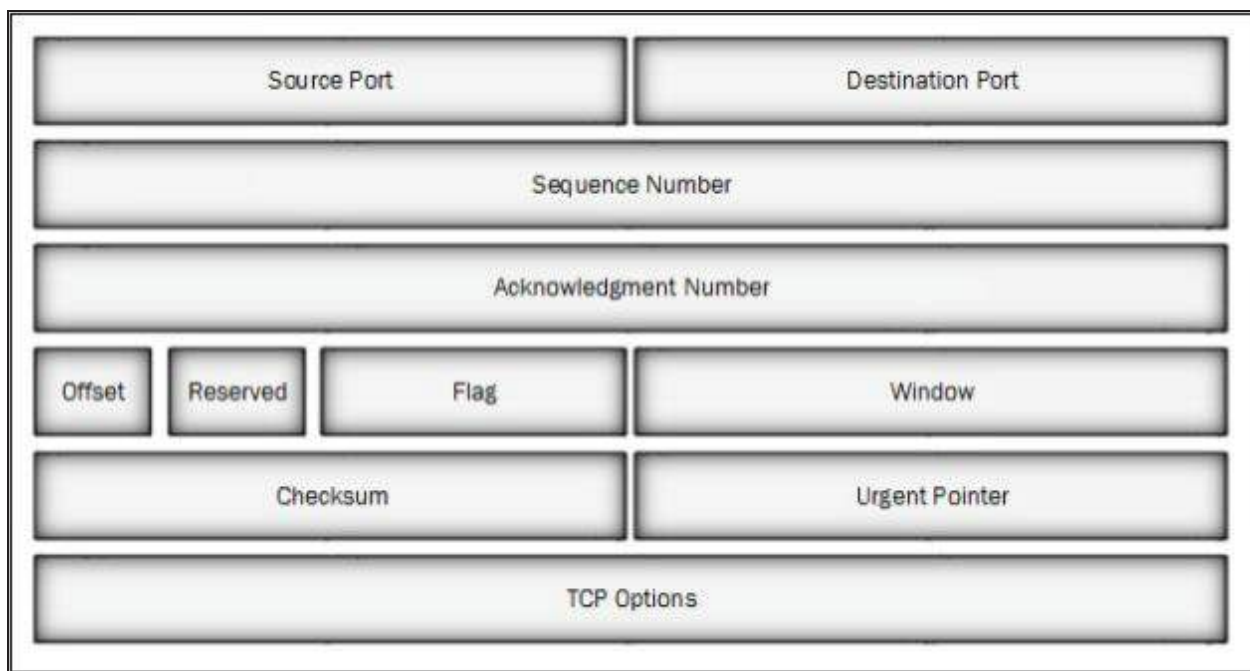


Figure 3-02 TCP Header

There is three-way handshaking while establishing a TCP connection between hosts. This handshaking ensures successful, reliable and connection-oriented session between these hosts. The process of establishment of a TCP connection includes three steps. As shown in the figure below: -

*Figure 3-03 TCP Connection Handshaking*

Consider Host A wants to communicate with Host B. TCP Connection establishes when host A sends a Sync packet to host B. Host B upon receipt of Sync packet from Host A, reply to Host A with Sync+Ack packet. Host A reply with Ack packet when it receives Sync+Ack packet from host B. After successful handshaking results in the establishment of TCP connection.

U.S Dept proposes TCP/IP model. Of Defence by combining OSI Layer Model and DOD. The [Transmission Control Protocol](#) (TCP) and the [Internet Protocol](#) (IP) are two of the network standards that define the Internet. IP defines how computers can get data to each other over a routed, interconnected set of networks. TCP defines how applications can create

reliable channels of communication across such a network. IP defines addressing and routing, while TCP defines how to have a conversation across the link without garbling or losing data. Layers in TCP/IP model perform similar functions with similar specifications like in OSI model. The only difference is they combine top three layers into a single Application Layer.

Creating Custom Packet Using TCP Flags

Colasoft Packet Builder software enables to create the customized network packets. These Customized Network packets can penetrate the network for attacks. Customization can also use to create fragmented packets. You can download the software from www.colasoft.com.

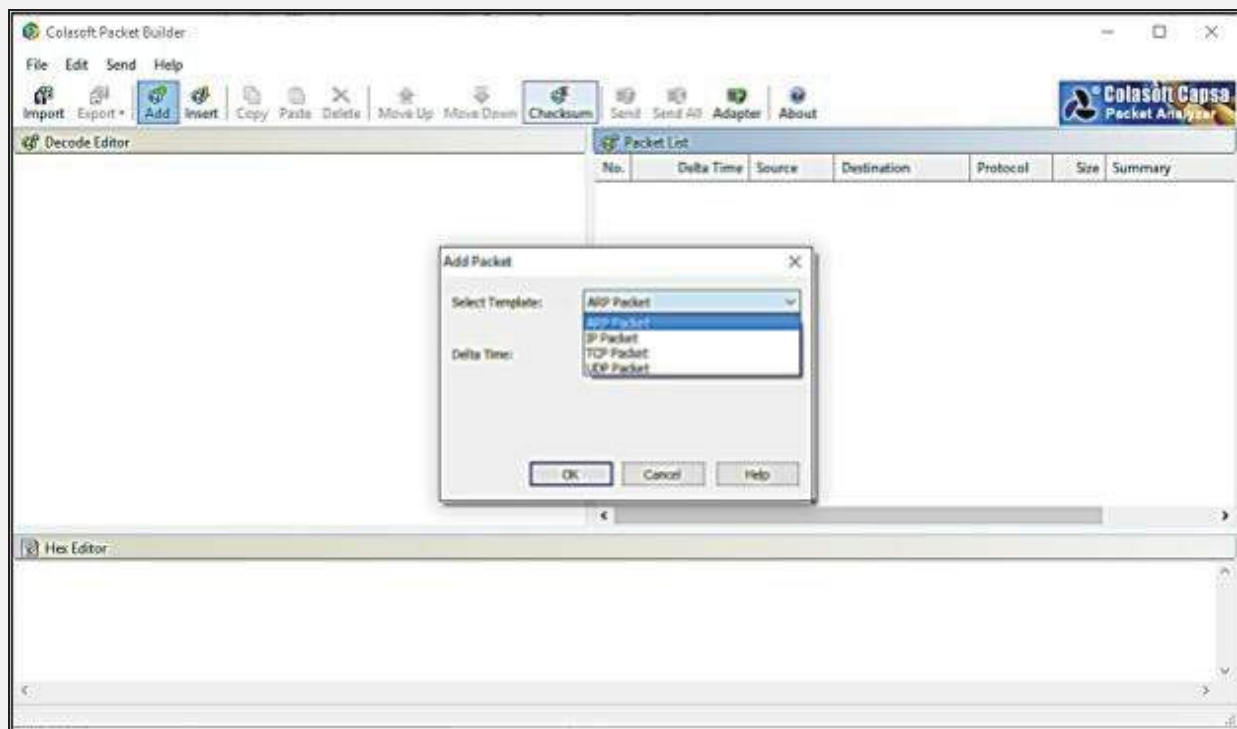


Figure 3-04 Packet Builder Software

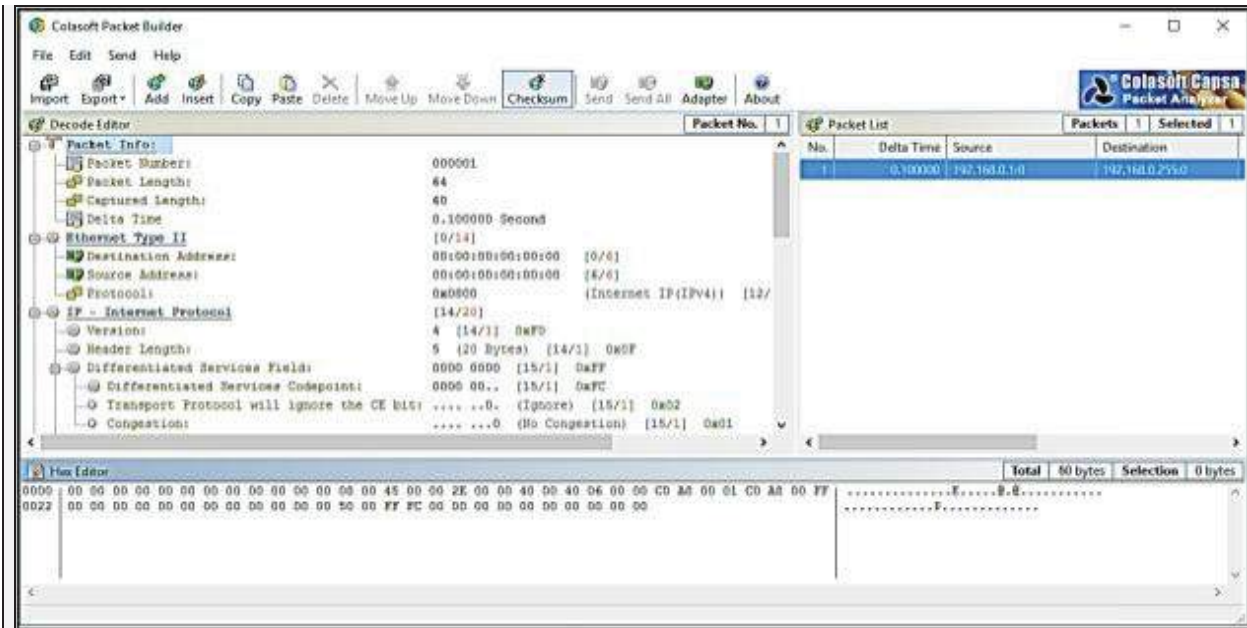


Figure 3-05 Creating Custom Packet

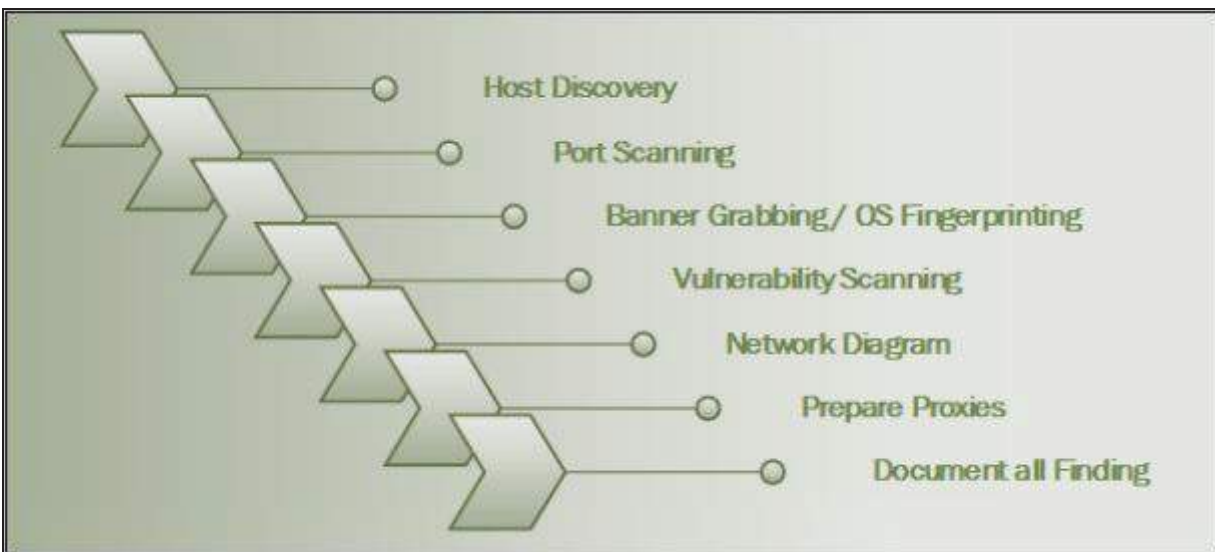


Figure 3-06 Scanning Pentesting

Checking for Live Systems

Initially, you must know about the hosts which are living in a targeted network. Finding live hosts in a network is done by ICMP Packets. The target replies ICMP Echo packets with ICMP echo reply. This response verifies that the host is live.

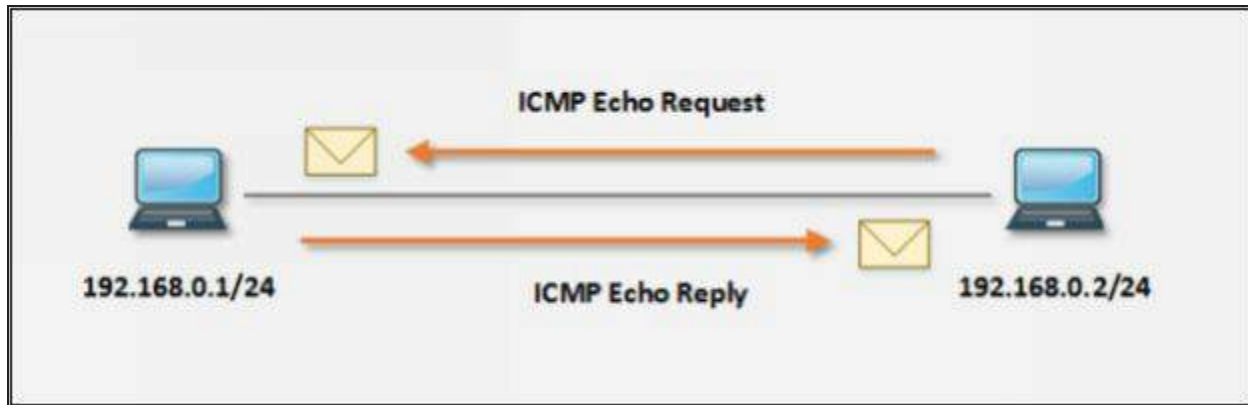


Figure 3-07 ICMP Echo Request & Reply Packets

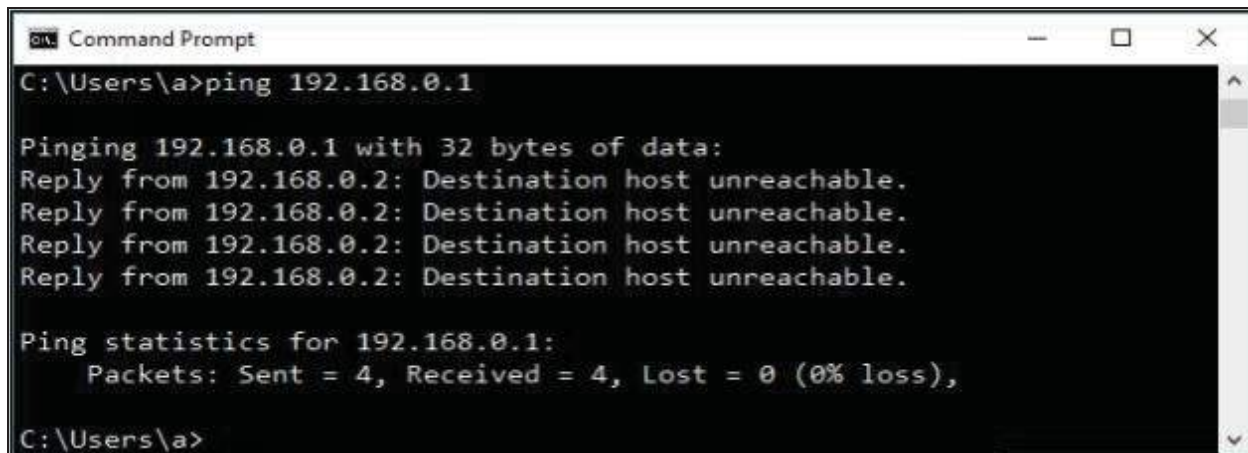


Figure 3-09 ICMP Echo Reply Packets

ICMP Scanning

ICMP Scanning is a method of identifying live hosts by sending ICMP Echo requests to a host. ICMP Echo reply packet from host verify the host is live. Ping Scanning is a useful tool for not only identification of live host, but also for determining ICMP packet are passing through firewalls, and TTL value.

Ping Sweep

Ping Sweep determines live host on a large scale. Ping Sweep is a method of sending ICMP Echo Request packets to a range of IP addresses instead of sending one by one requests and observing the response. Live hosts respond with ICMP Echo Reply packets. Thus, instead of probing individually, we can probe a range of IPs using Ping Sweep. There are several tools available for Ping Sweep. Using these ping sweep tools such as SolarWinds Ping Sweep tool or Angry IP Scanner, you can ping the range of IP addresses.

Additionally, they can perform reverse DNS lookup, resolve hostnames, bring MAC addresses, and Scan ports.

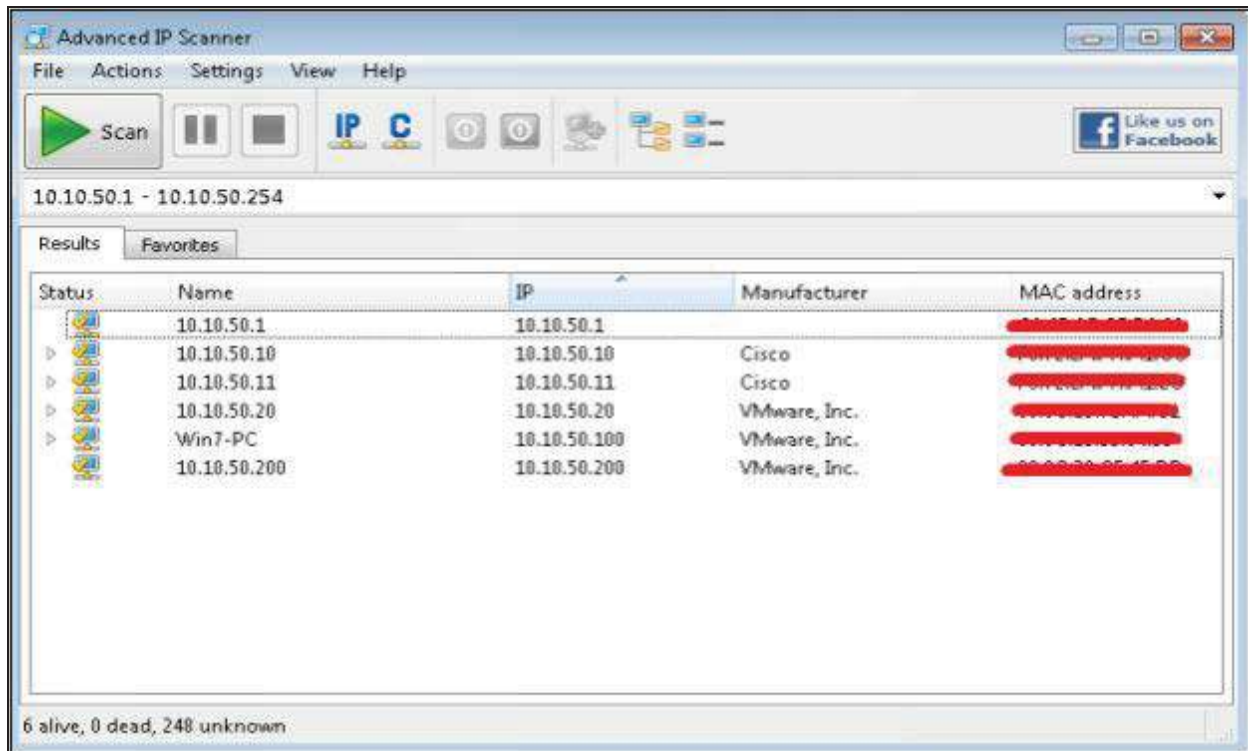


Figure 3-11 Ping Sweep

Check for Open Ports

SSDP Scanning

Simple Service Discovery Protocol (SSDP) is a protocol used for discovery of network services without the assistance of server-based configuration like Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) and Domain Name System (DNS) and static network host configuration. SSDP protocol can discover Plug & Play devices, with UPnP (Universal Plug and Play). SSDP protocol is compatible with IPv4 and IPv6.

Scanning Tool

1. Nmap

Another way to ping a host is by performing a ping using nmap. Using Windows or Linux command prompt, enter the following command: -

```
nmap -sP -v <target IP address>
```

Upon successful response from the targeted host, If the command successfully finds a live host, it returns a message indicating that the IP address of the targeted host is up, along with the media access control (MAC)

address and the network card vendor.

Apart from ICMP Echo Request packets and using ping sweep, nmap also offers a quick scan. Enter the following command for quick scan: -

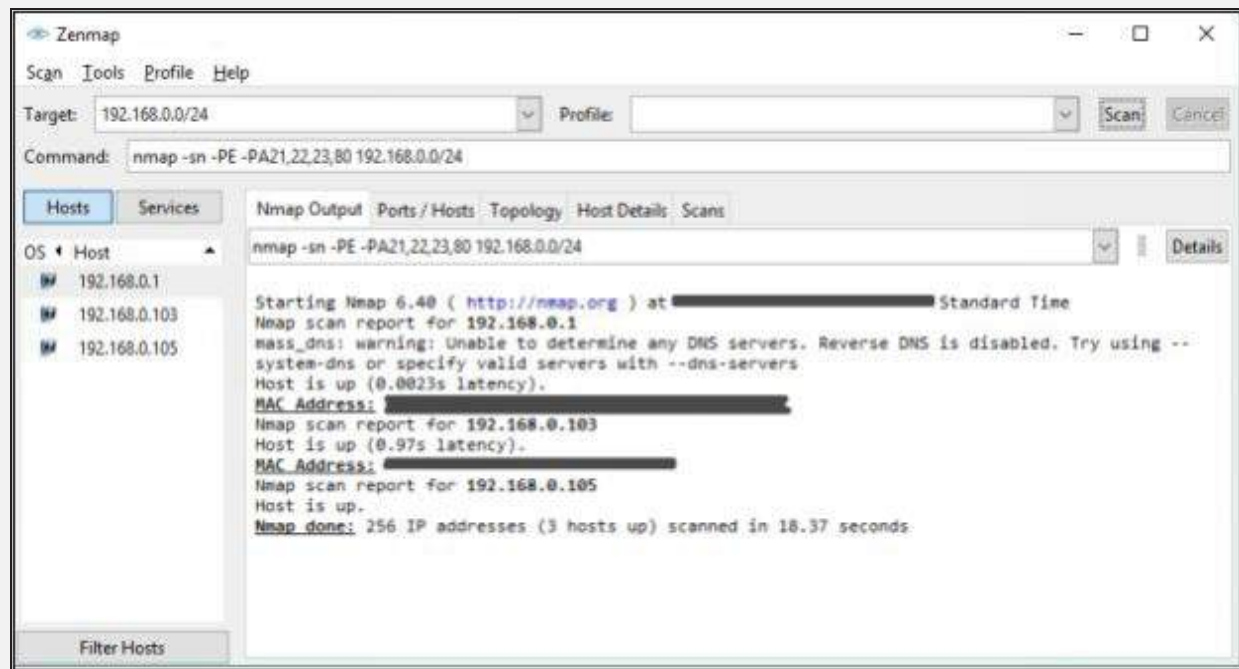


Figure 3-12 Nmap

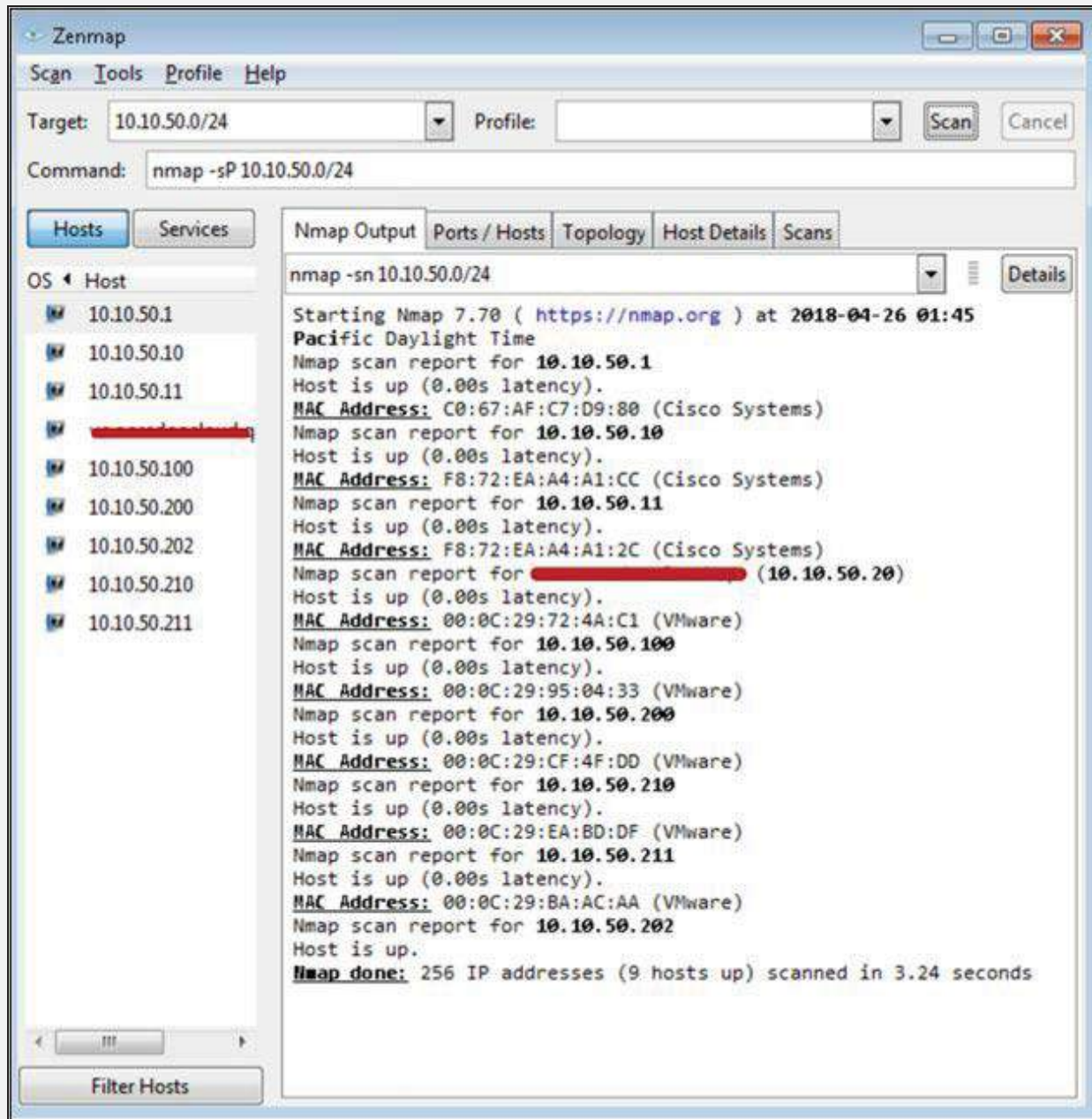


Figure 3-13 Nmap ping Sweep

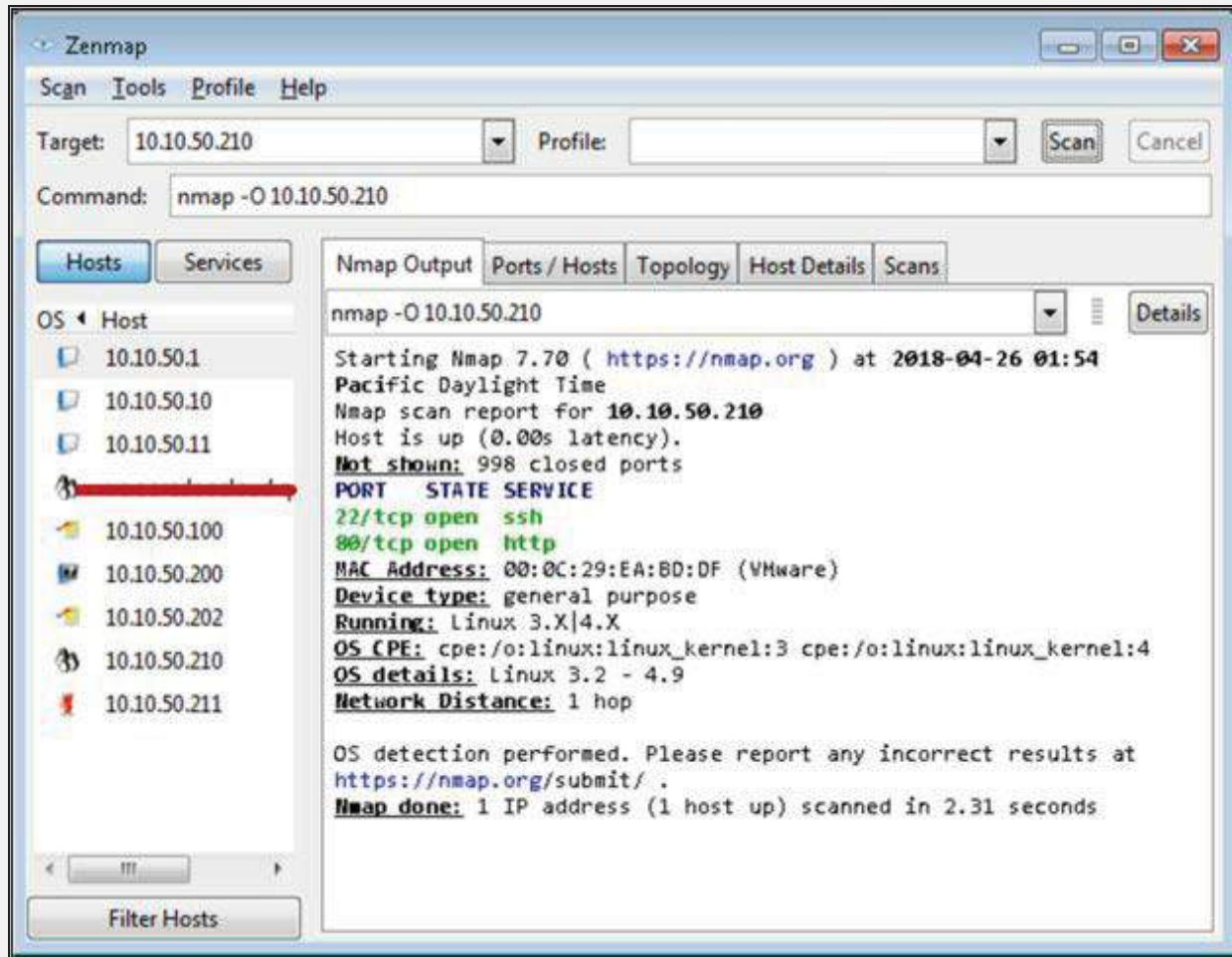



Figure 3-14 Nmap OS Scanning

2. Hping2 & Hping3

Hping is a command-line TCP/IP packet assembler and analyzer tool that is used to send customized TCP/IP packets and display the target reply as ping command display the ICMP Echo Reply packet from targeted host. Hping can also handle fragmentation, arbitrary packets body, and size and file transfer. It supports TCP, UDP, ICMP and RAW-IP protocols. Using Hping, the following parameters can be performed: -

- Test firewall rules.

- Advanced port scanning.
- Testing net performance.
- Path MTU discovery.
- Transferring files between even fascist firewall rules.
- Traceroute-like under different protocols.
- Remote OS fingerprinting & others.







Scanning Techniques

Scanning techniques include UDP & TCP Scanning technique. Observe the following figure showing the classification of Scanning techniques: -

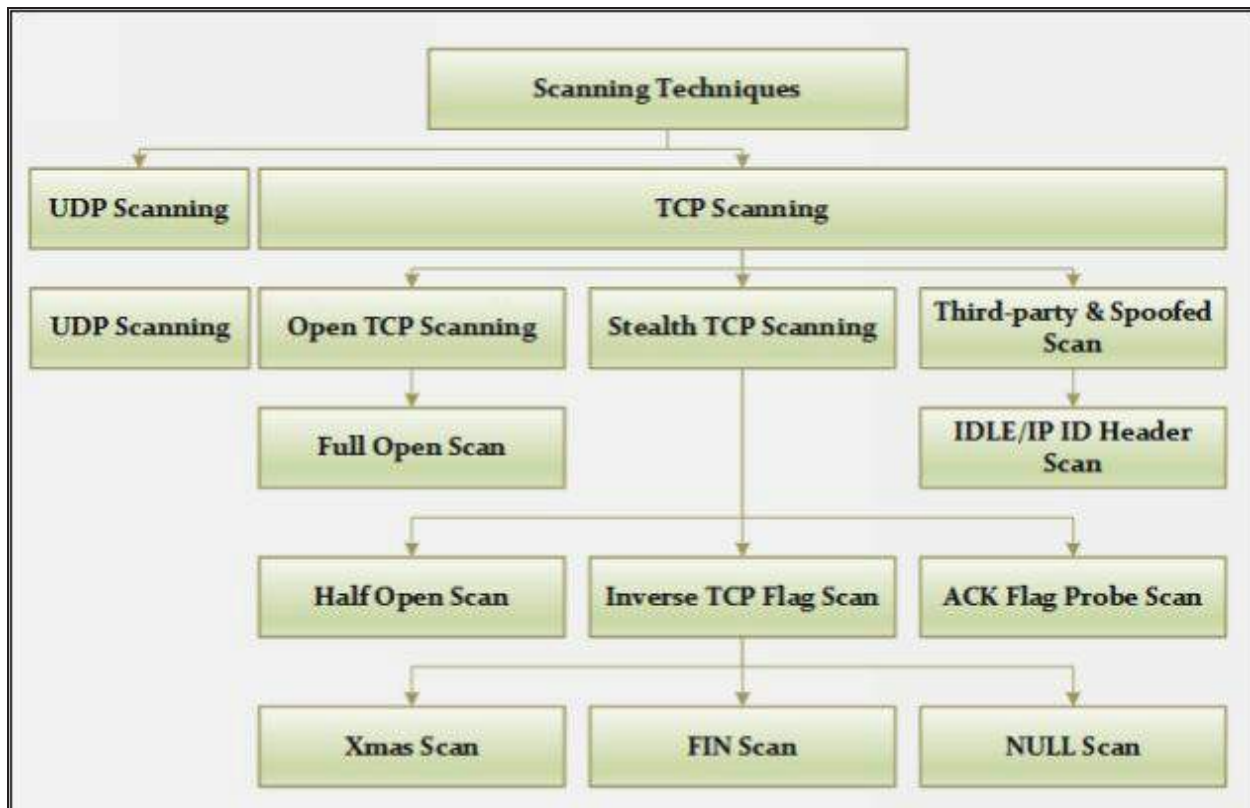


Figure 3-19 Scanning Techniques

TCP Connect / Full Open Scan

Full Open Scan is the type of Scanning technique in which Three-way handshaking session initiates and completed. Full Open Scanning ensures the response that the targeted host is live and the connection is complete. It is a

major advantage of Full Open Scanning. However, it can be detected, logged by security devices such as Firewalls and IDS. TCP Connect / Full Open Scan does not require Super User Privileges.

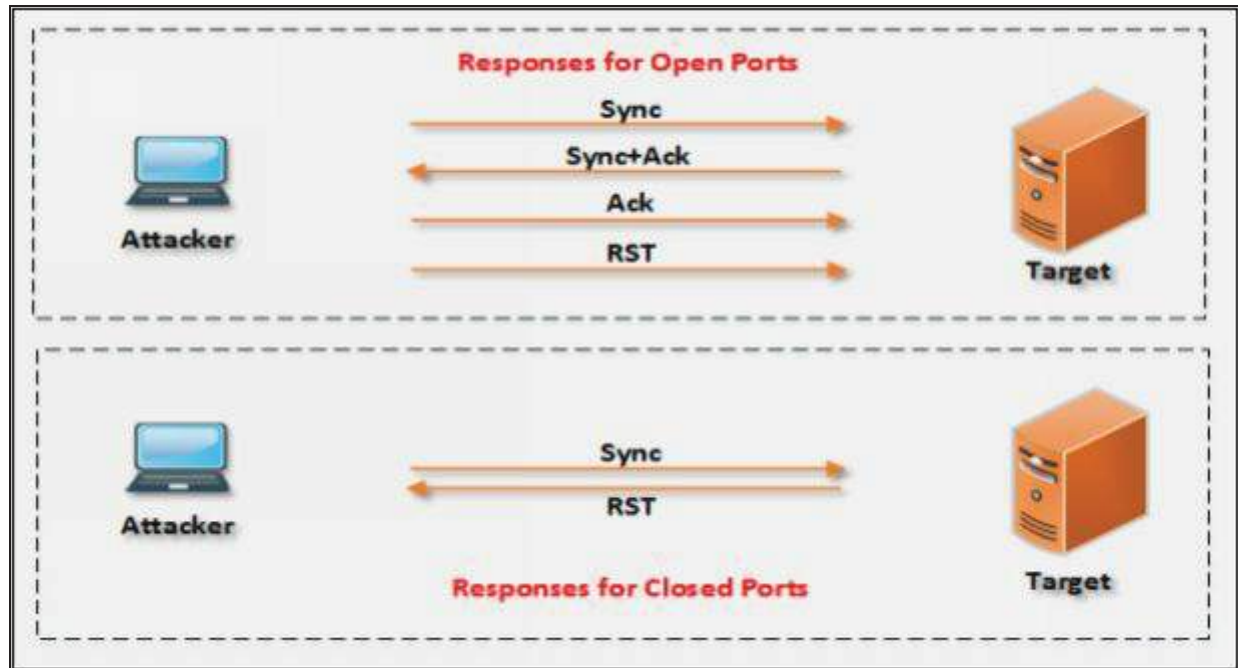


Figure 3-20 TCP Connection Responses

While using Full Open Scanning and a Closed port is encountered, RST response is sent to the incoming request to terminate the attempt. To perform Full Open Scan, you must use -sT option for Connect Scan.

Type the command to execute Full Open Scan: -

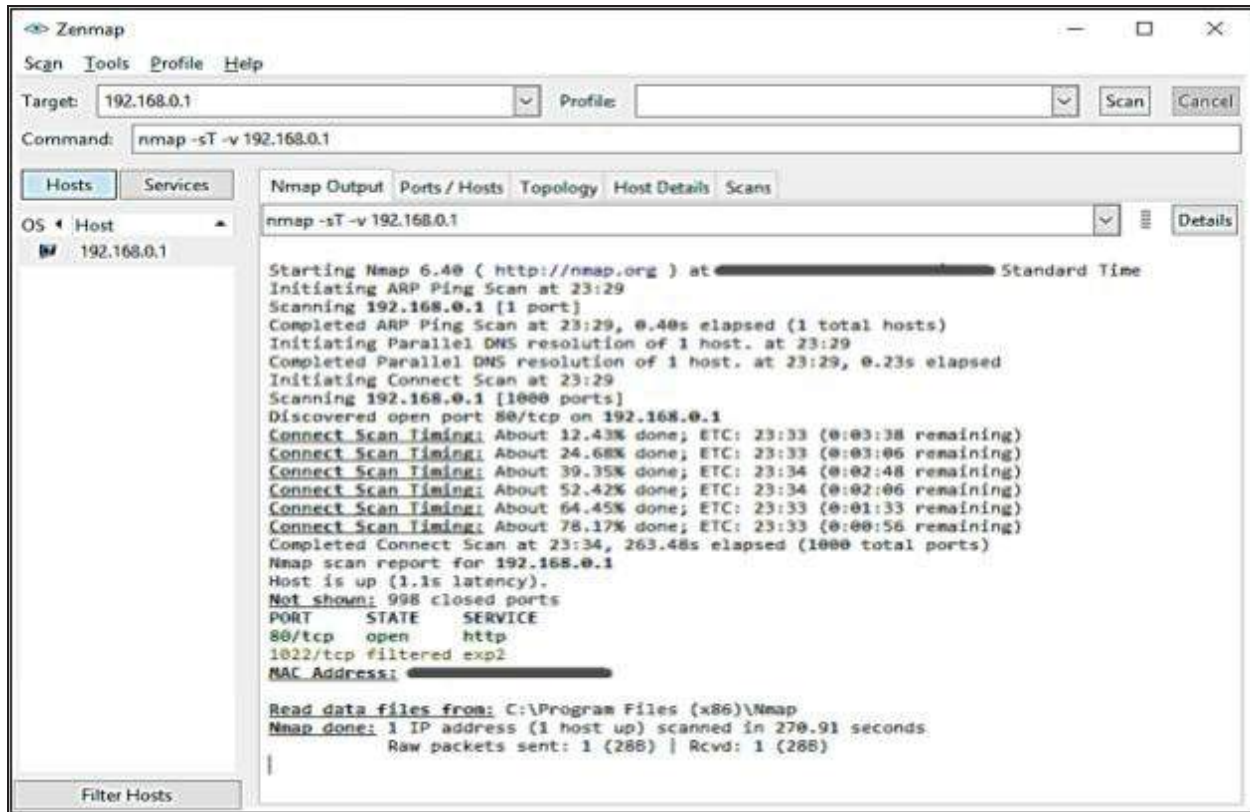


Figure 3-21 Full Open Scan

Stealth Scan (Half-open Scan)

Half-Open Scan is also known as Stealth Scan. To understand the Half-Open Scan processes, Consider the scenario of two hosts, Host A & Host B. Host A is the initiator of the TCP connection handshaking. Host A sends the Sync packet to initiate the handshaking. Receiving host (Host B) replies with Sync+Ack packet. Host A, Instead of Acknowledging the Host B with Ack packet, it responds with RST.

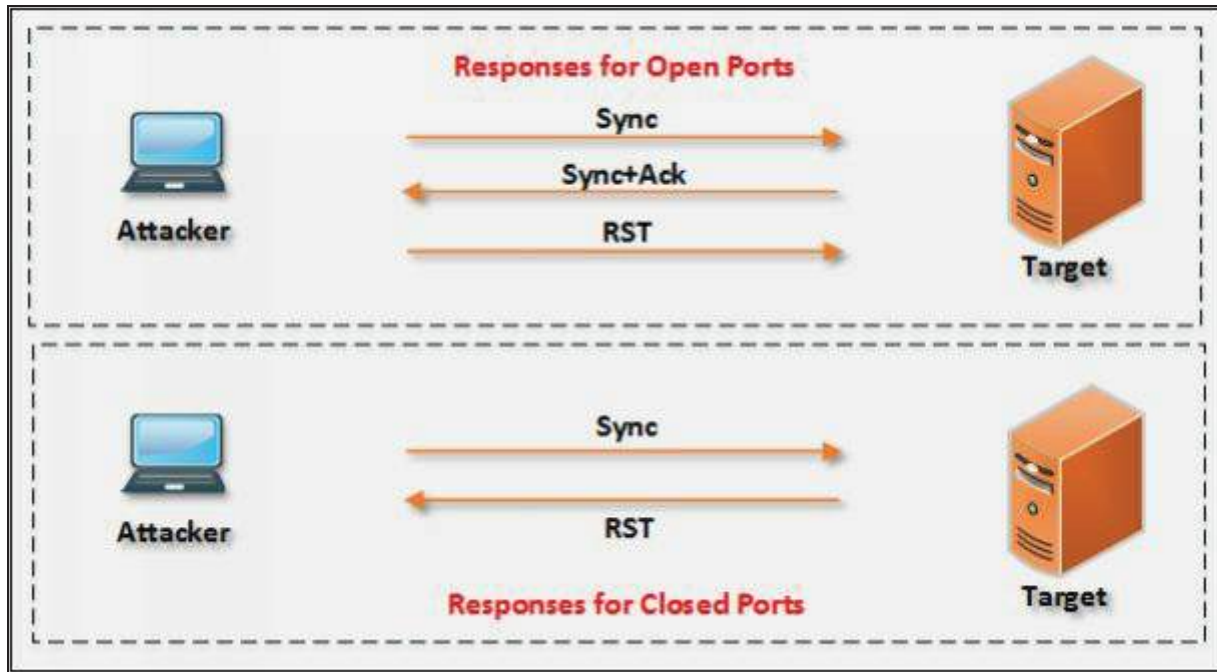


Figure 3-21 Half-Open Scan

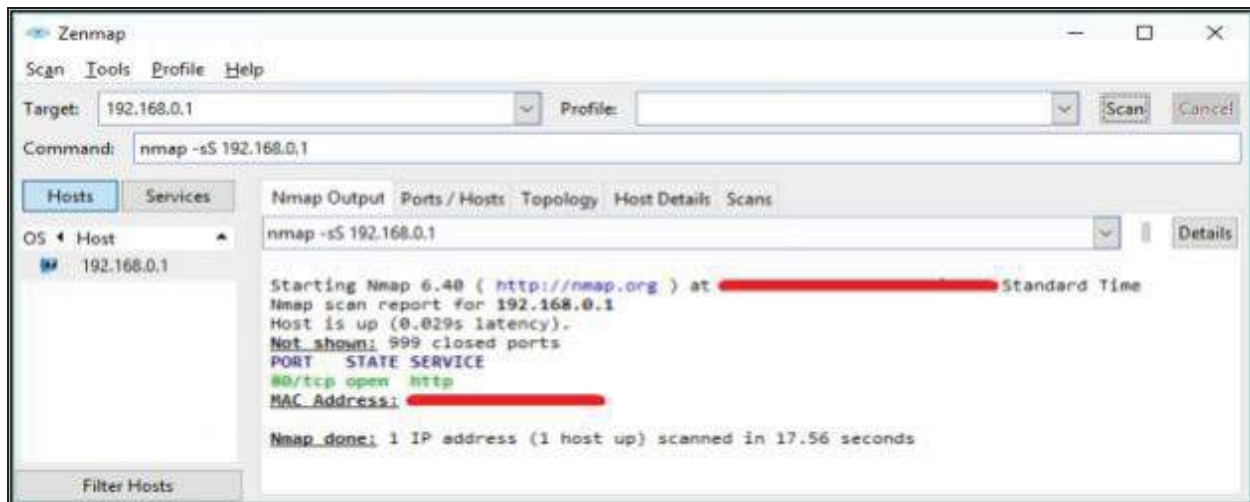


Figure 3-22 Half-Open Scan

Inverse TCP Flag Scanning

Inverse TCP Flag Scanning is the Scanning process in which Sender either send TCP probe with TCP flags, i.e. FIN, URG, and PSH or without Flags. Probes with TCP flags is known as XMAS Scanning. In case, if there is no flag set, it is known as Null Scanning.

Xmas Scan

Xmas Scan is the type of scan in which contains multiple flags. Packet sent to the target along with URG, PSH & FIN; or a packet having all flags creates an abnormal situation for the receiver. Receiving system has to take a decision when this condition occurs. Closed port responds with single RST packet. If the port is open, some systems respond as an open port, but the modern system ignores or dropped these requests because the combination of these flags is bogus. FIN Scan works only with Operating Systems with RFC-793 based TCP/IP Implementation. FIN Scan does not work with any current version of Windows typically Windows XP or later.

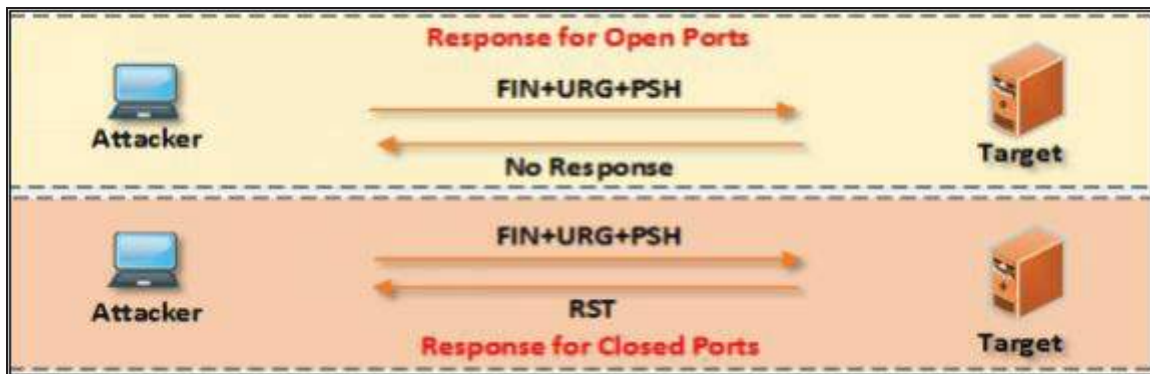


Figure 3-23 Xmas Scan

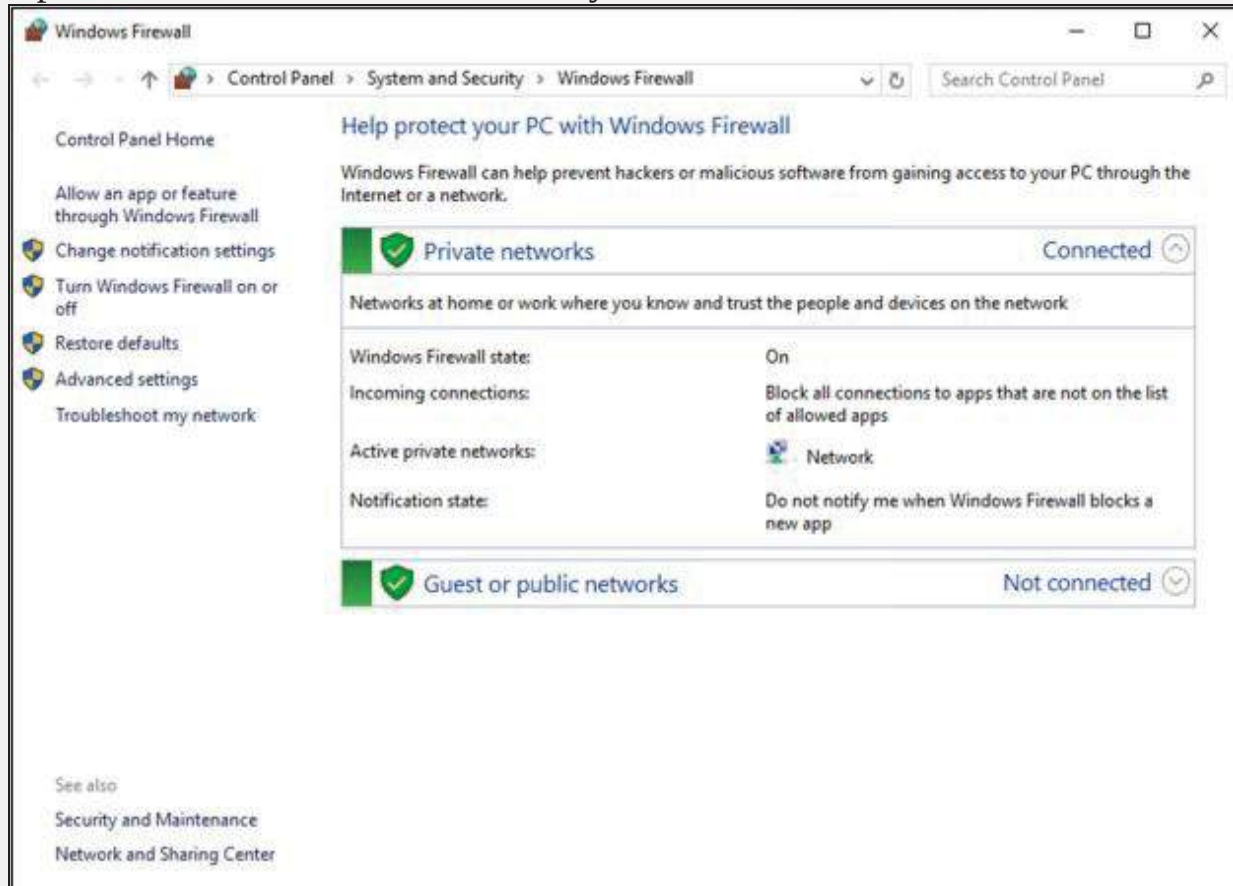



Figure 3-24 Windows Firewall settings



FIN Scan

FIN Scan is the process of sending the packet having only FIN flag set. These packets can reliably pass the firewall. FIN Scan packets, when sent to the target, the port is considered to be open if there is no response. If the port is closed, RST is returned.

To perform this type of scan, use the syntax:

```
nmap -SF <ip address or range>
```

NULL Scan

NULL Scan is the process of sending the packet without any flag set. Responses are similar to FIN and XMAS Scan. If Null Scan packet sends to an open port, it brings no response. If Null Scan packet sends to the closed port, it brings RST packet. Performing this scan is comparatively easier to be detected as there is logically no reason to send a TCP packet without any flag.

To perform this type of scan, use the syntax:

ACK Flag Probe Scanning

ACK flag Scanning technique sends TCP packet with ACK flag set towards the target. Sender Examine the header information because even when ACK packet has made its way to the target, it replies with RST packet either the

port is open or closed. After Analyzing the header information such as TTL and WINDOW fields of RST packet, the attacker identifies if the port is open or closed.

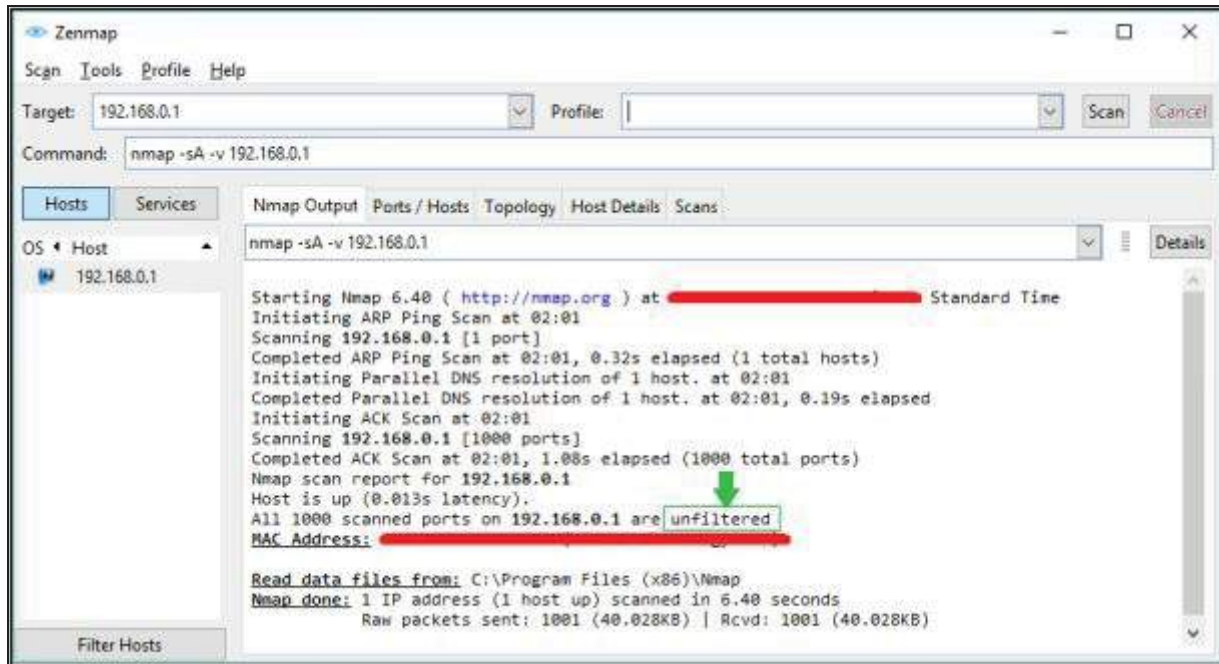


Figure 3-28 Ack Flag Probe Scanning

ACK Probe scanning also helps in identifying the filtering system. If RST packet receives from the target, it means that packets toward this port are not filtering. If there is no response, it means Stateful firewall is filtering the port.

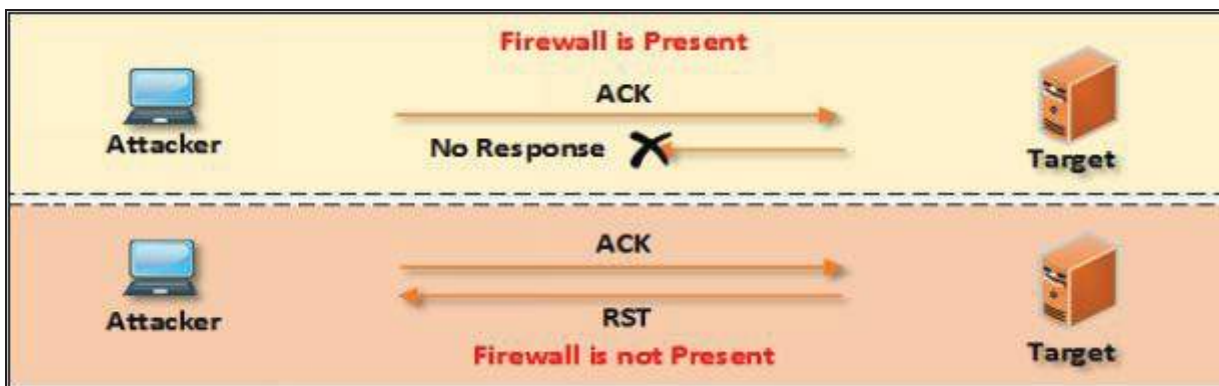


Figure 3-29 Ack Flag Probe Scanning Response

IDLE/IPID Header Scan

IDLE / IPID Header Scan is a unique and effective technique to identify the target host port status. Using this scan is capable of remaining low profile. Idle scanning describes the hiding ability of attacker. Attacker hides its identity by instead of sending the packet through its system, the scanning

process done by bouncing packets from Zombie's system. If target investigates the threat, it traces Zombie instead of tracing the attacker.

Before understanding the Step required for IDLE/IPID Scan, you must know recall some important point: -

- To determine an Open port, send SYN packet to the port.
- Target machine responds with SYN+ACK packet if the port is open.
- Target Machine responds with RST packet if the port is closed.
- The unsolicited SYN+ACK packet is either ignored, responded with RST.
- Every IP packet has Fragment Identification Number (IPID).
- OS increments IPID for each packet.

Step: 01

- Send Sync+Ack packet to Zombie to get its IPID Number.
- Zombie is not waiting for Sync+Ack, hence respond with RST packet. Its Reply discloses the IPID.
- Extract IPID from Packet.

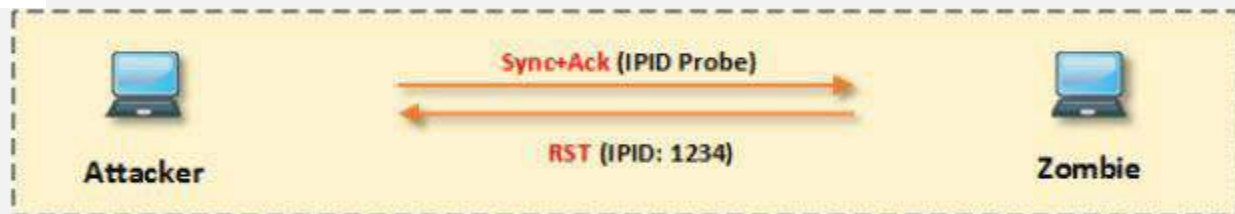


Figure 3-30 Step#01 Idle Scanning

Step: 02

- Send Sync packet to target spoofing the IP address of Zombie.
- IP port is open; Target reply with Sync+Ack to Zombie & Zombie reply back to target with RST packet.

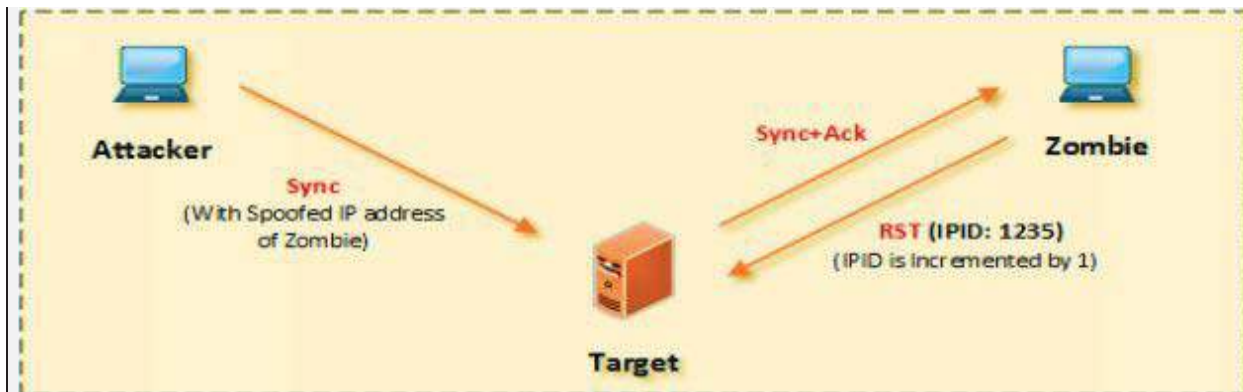


Figure 3-31 Step#02 Idle Scanning

- If the port is closed; Target reply with RST to Zombie & Zombie reply nothing back to target. IPID of Zombie is not incremented.

- Port is open if IPID is incremented by 2.

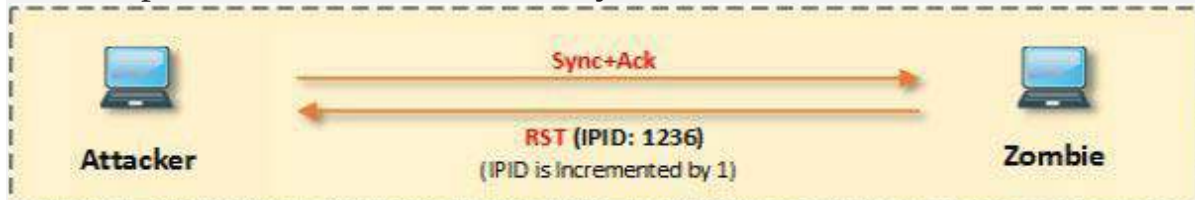


Figure 3-33 Step#03 Idle Scanning

UDP Scanning

Like TCP-based scanning techniques, there are also UDP Scanning methods.

Keeping in mind, UDP is a connectionless protocol. UDP does not have flags. UDP packets are working with ports; no connection orientation requires. No response if the targeted port is open however if the port is closed, the response message of "Port unreachable" returned. Most of the Malicious Programs, Trojans, Spywares uses UDP ports to access the target.

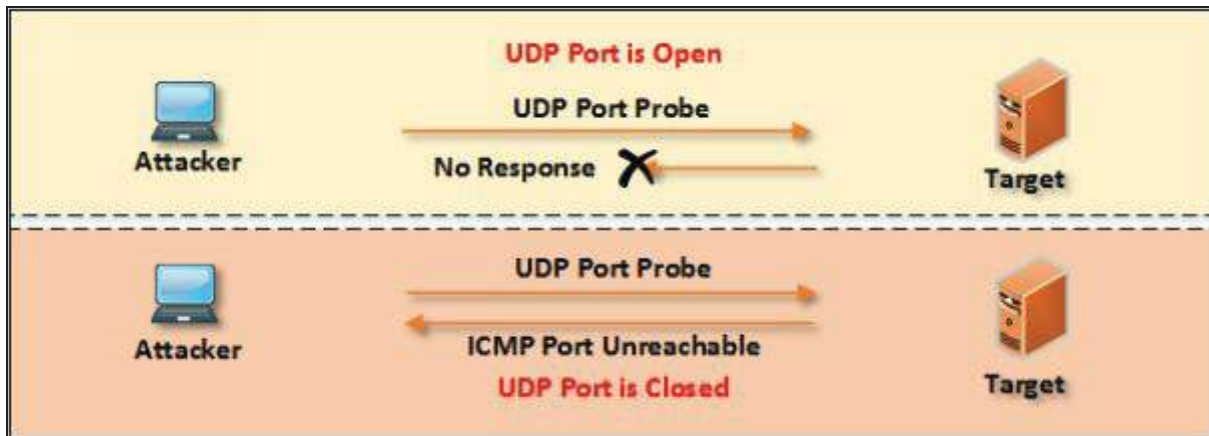


Figure 3-34 UDP Scanning Response

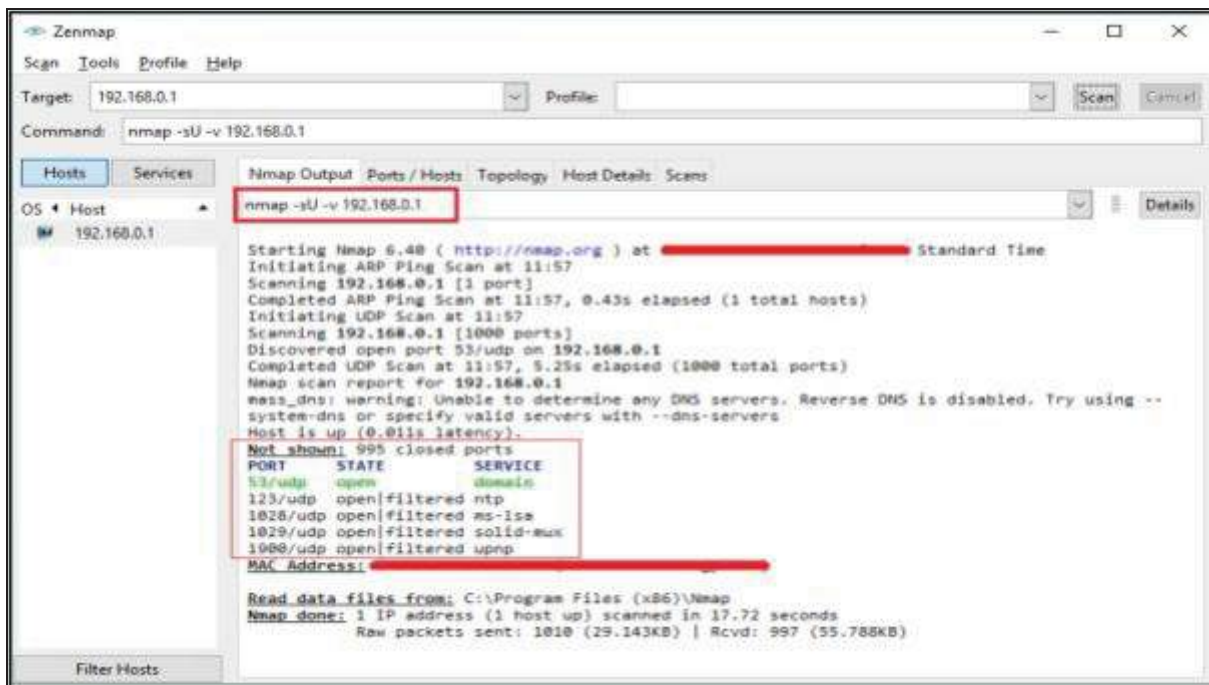


Figure 3-35 UDP Port Scanning

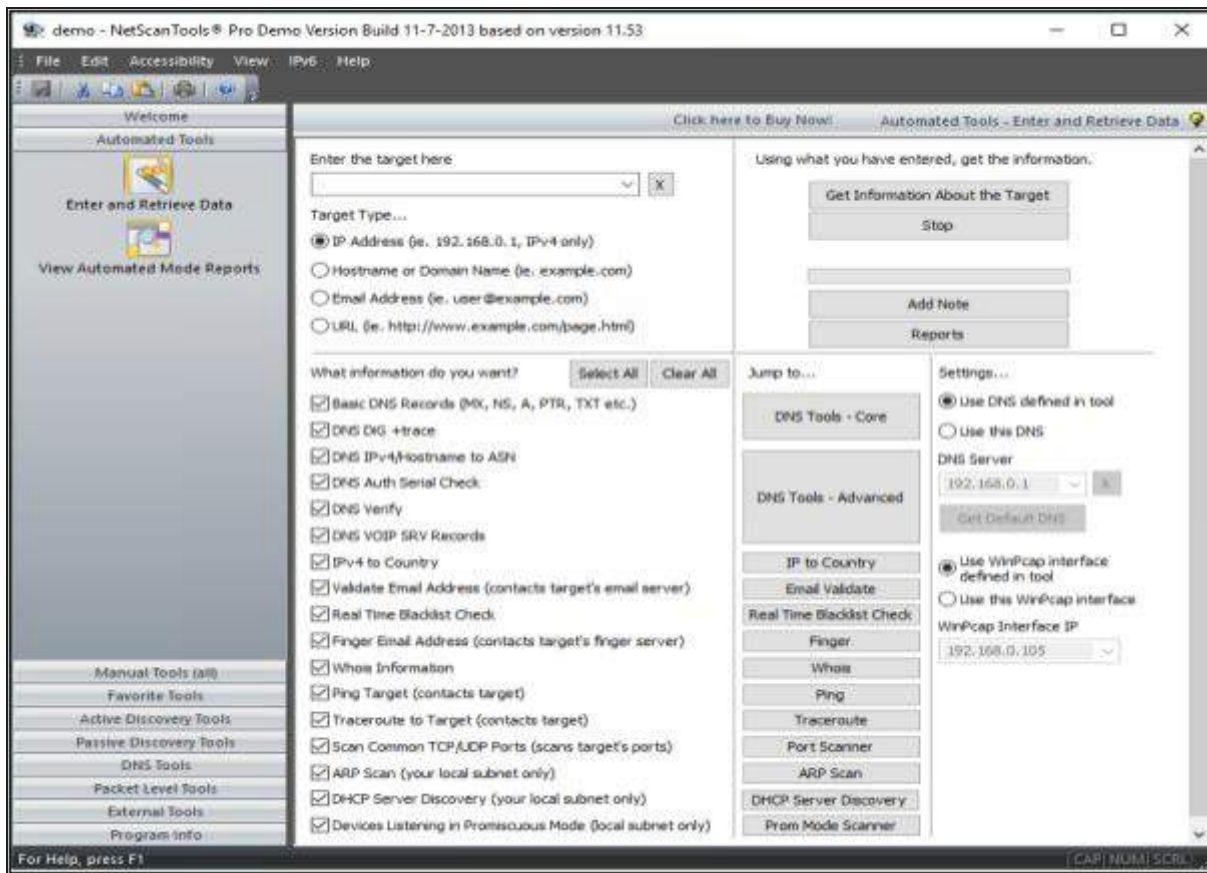


Figure 3-36 UDP Port Scanning

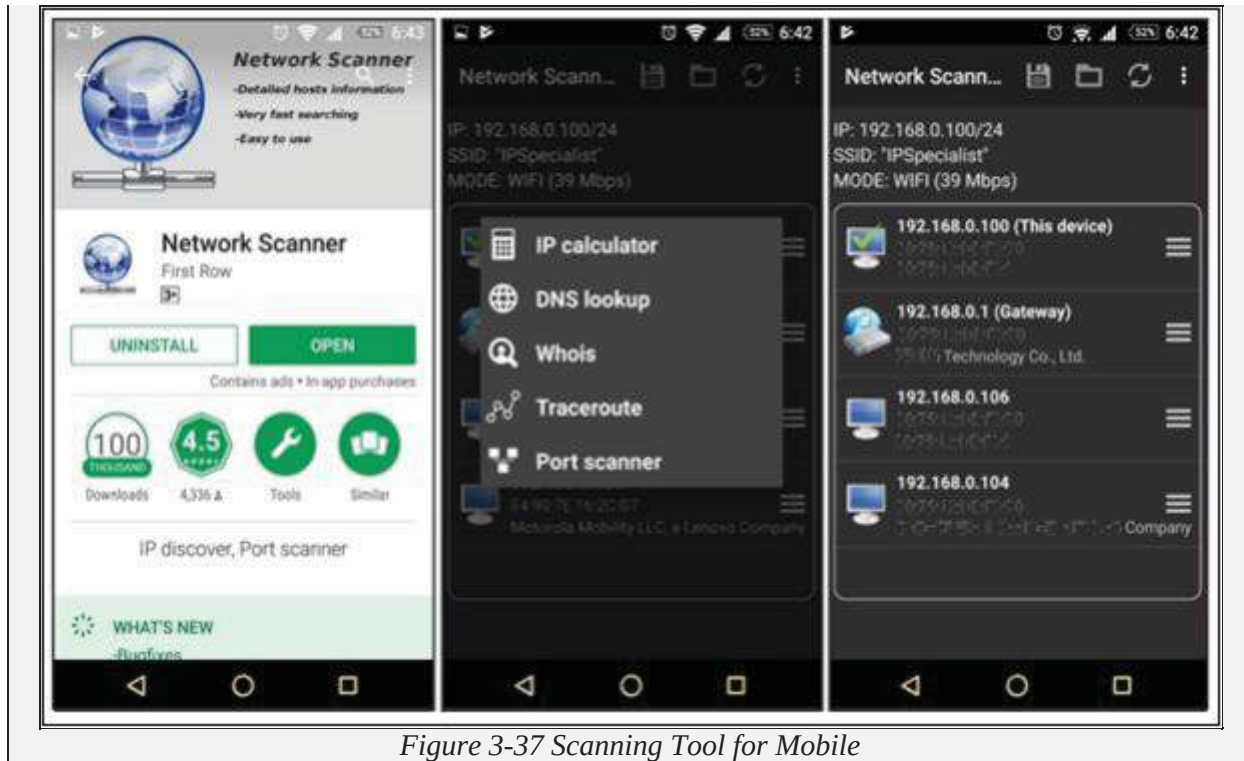


Figure 3-37 Scanning Tool for Mobile

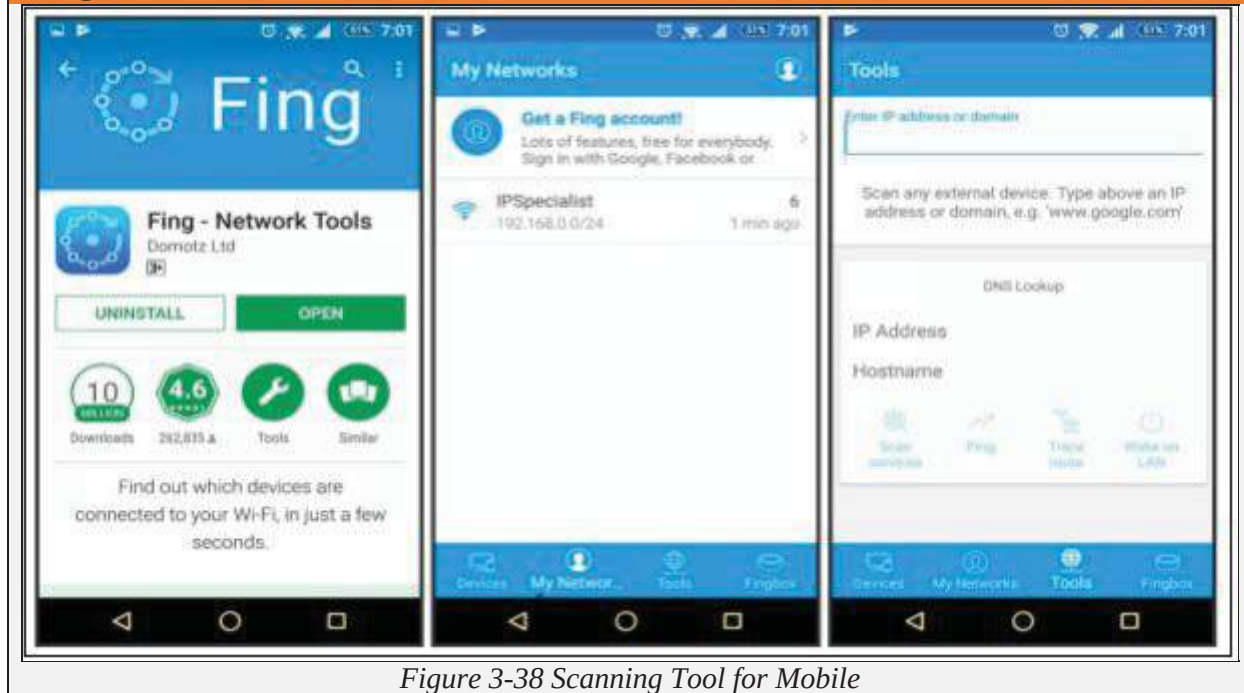


Figure 3-38 Scanning Tool for Mobile

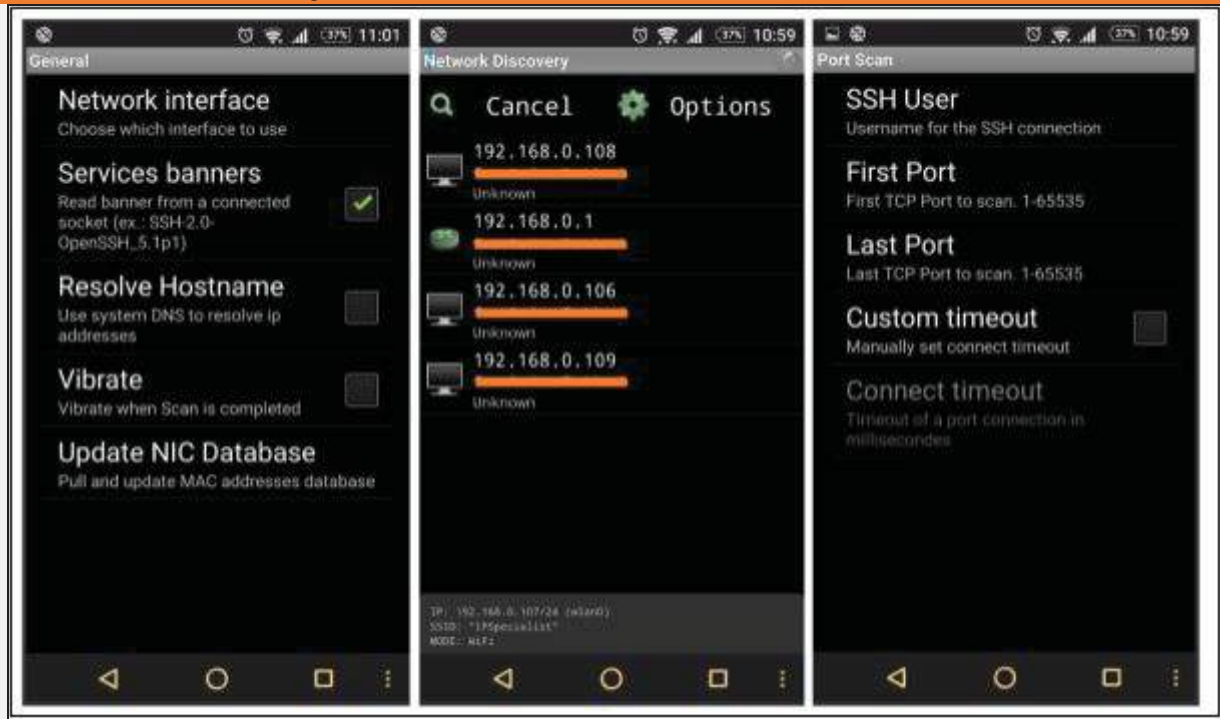


Figure 3-39 Scanning Tool for Mobile

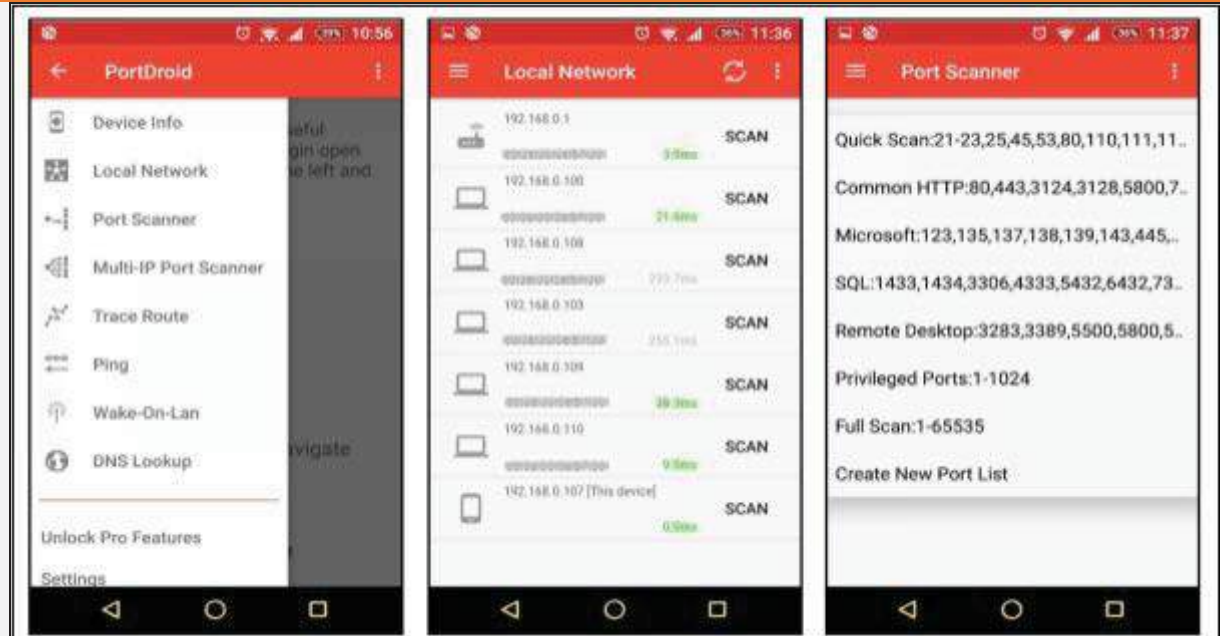


Figure 3-40 Scanning Tool for Mobile

Scanning Beyond IDS

The attacker uses Fragmentation and Small packets to evade Security devices such as Firewalls, IDS, and IPS. The basic technique that is most commonly & popularly used is splitting the payload into the smaller packet. IDS must have to reassemble these incoming packet stream to inspect and detect the attack. The small packet is further modified to be more complicated to reassemble and detect by packet reassemble. Another way of using fragmentation is by sending these fragmented packets out of order. These fragmented out of order packets are sent with pauses to create a delay. These packets are sent using proxy servers, or through compromised machines to launch attacks.

OS Fingerprinting & Banner Grabbing

OS Fingerprinting is a technique, used to identify the information of Operating System running on a target machine. By gathering information about running operating system, attacker determines the vulnerabilities and possible bugs that an operating system may possess. The two types of OS Fingerprinting are as follows: -

1. Active OS Fingerprinting
2. Passive OS Fingerprinting

Banner Grabbing is similar to OS fingerprinting, but actually, Banner grabbing is determining the services that are running on the target machine. Typically, Telnet is used to retrieve information of banner.

Active OS Fingerprinting or Banner Grabbing

NMPA can perform Active Banner grabbing with ease. NMAP, as we know, is a powerful networking tool which supports many features and commands. Operating System detection capability allows to send TCP and UDP packet and observe the response from the targeted host. A detailed assessment of this response bring some clues regarding nature of an operating system disclosing the type an OS.

To perform OS detection with nmap perform the following: -

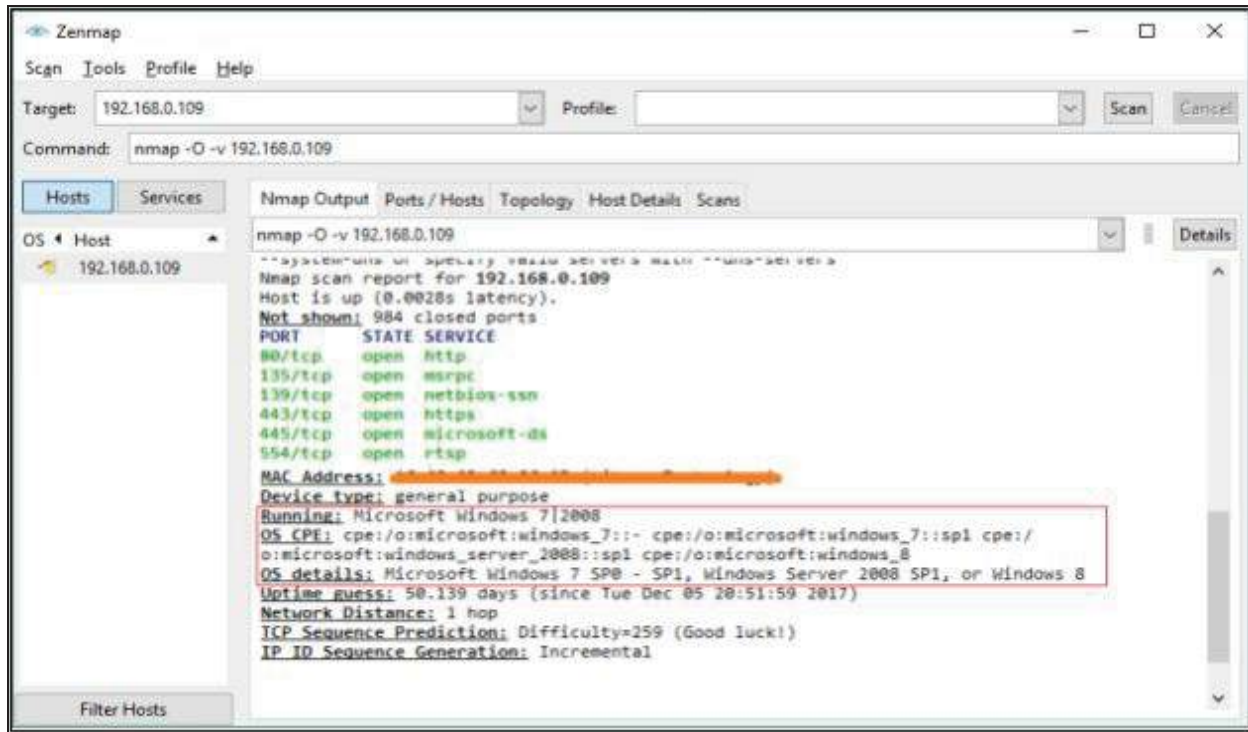



Figure 3-41 OS Fingerprinting

Passive OS Fingerprinting or Banner Grabbing

Passive OS Fingerprinting requires detail assessment of traffic. You can perform Passive banner grabbing by analyzing network traffic along with special inspection of Time to Live (TTL) value and Window Size. TTL value and Window Size are inspected from a header of TCP packet while observing network traffic. Some of the common values for operating systems are: -

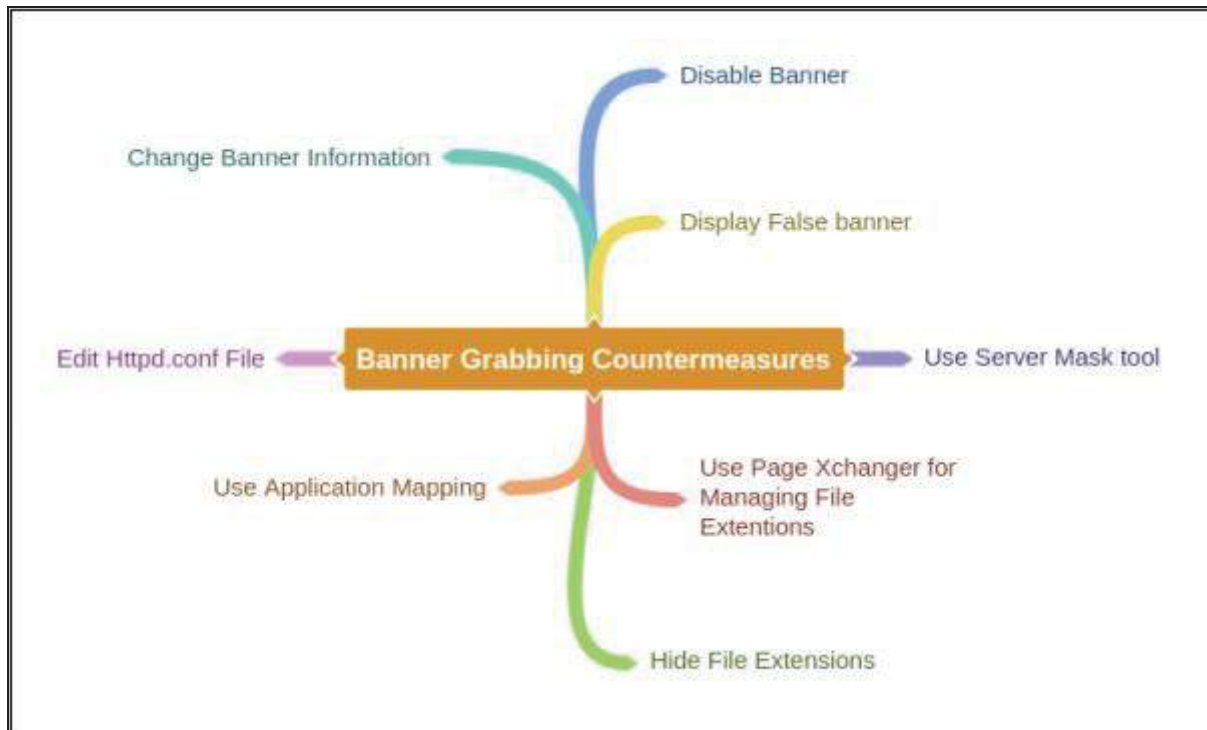

To gain access to a network, deep understanding of the architecture of that network and detailed information is required. Having valuable network information such as security zones, security devices, routing devices, number of hosts, etc. helps an attacker to understand the network diagram. Once Network diagram is designed, it defines logical and physical path leading to the appropriate target within a network. Network diagram visually explains the network environment and provide an even more clear picture of that network. Network Mappers are the network mapping tools, which uses scanning and other network tools and techniques and draw a picture of a network. The thing that is important to care about is, these tools generate traffic which can reveal the presence of attacker or pentester on the network.

Network Discovery Tool

OpManager is an advanced network monitoring tool which offers fault management, supporting over WAN links, Router, Switch, VoIP & servers. It can also perform performance management. Network View is an advanced network discovery tools. It can perform discovery of routes, TCP/IP nodes using DNS, ports, and other network protocols. List of some popular tools are: -

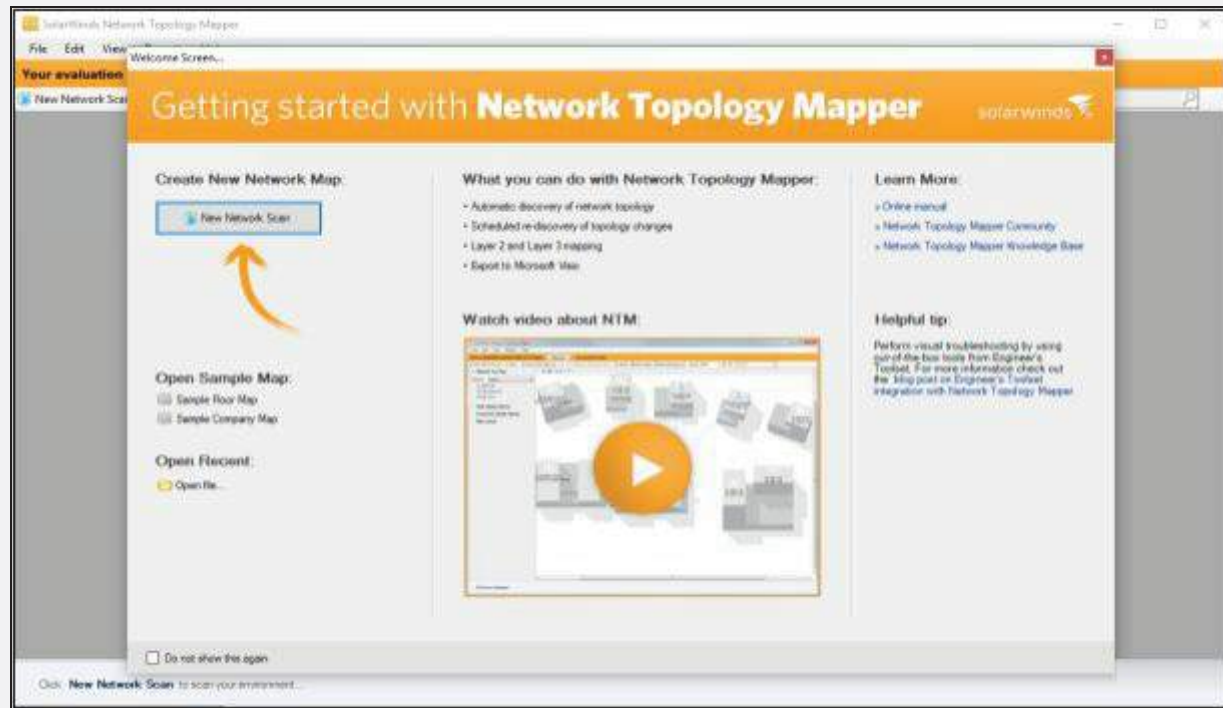


Figure 3-42 Network Topology Mapper Tool

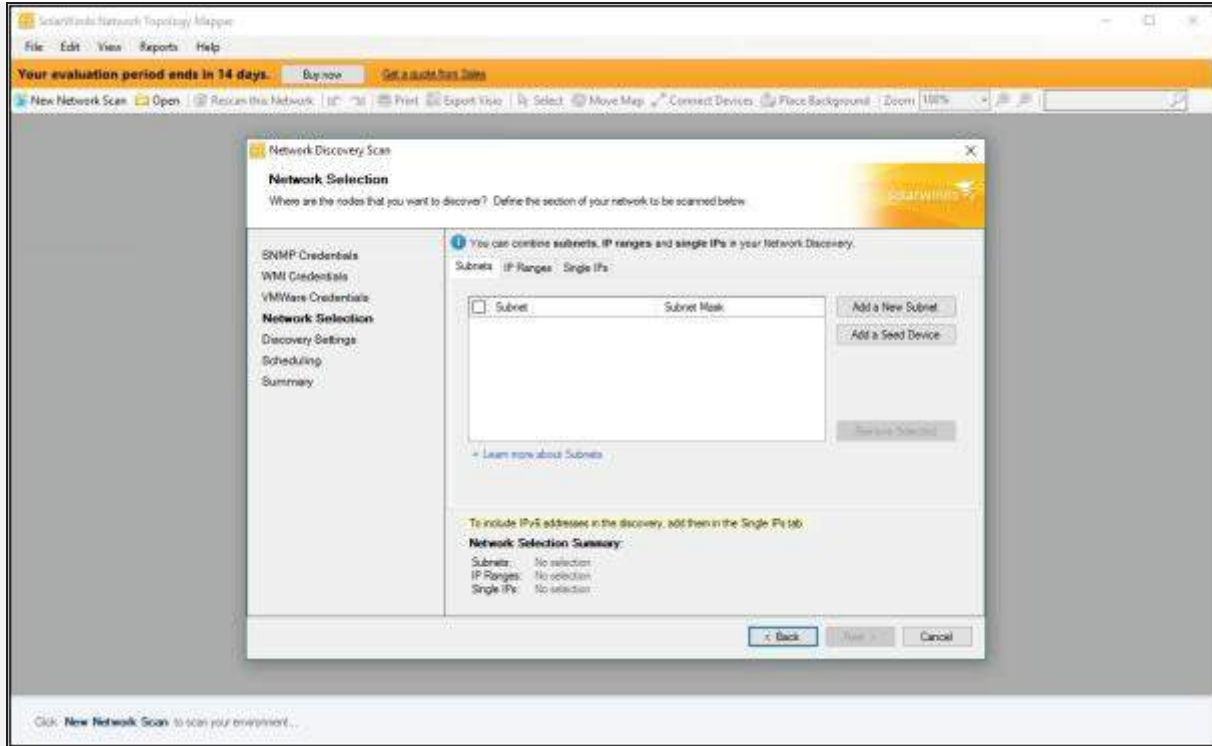


Figure 3-43 Configuring Scan

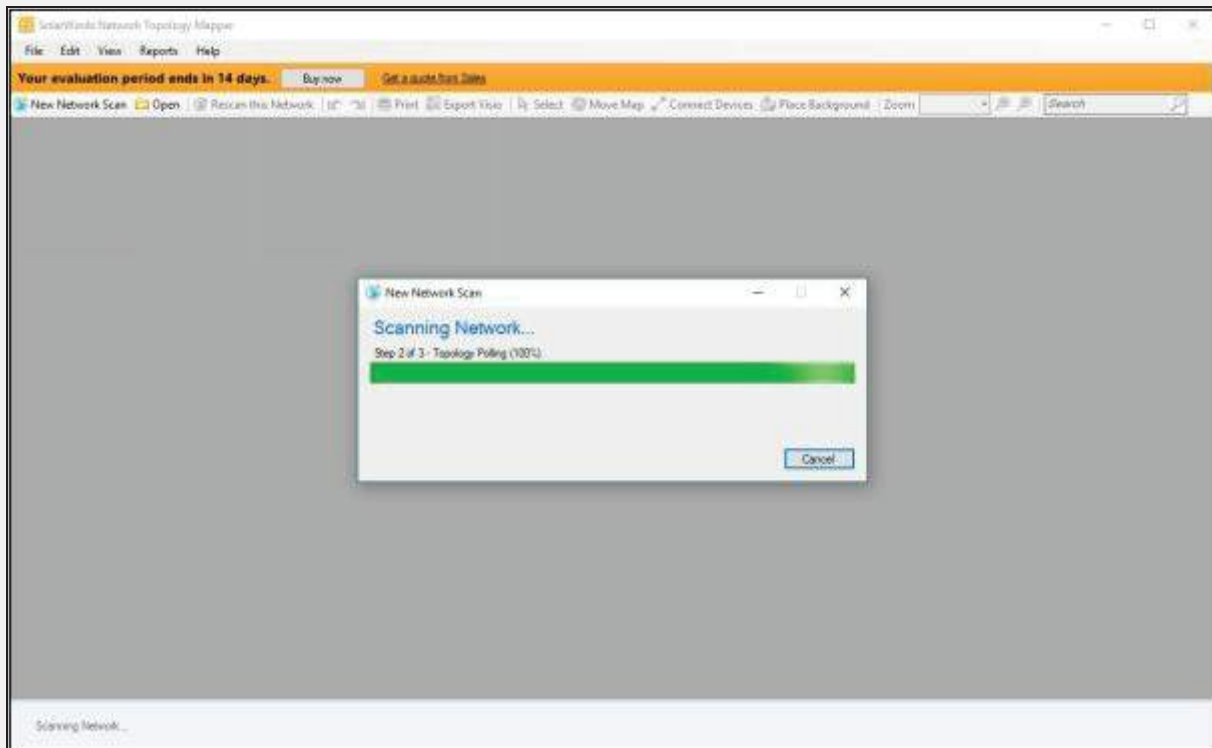


Figure 3-44 Scanning Network

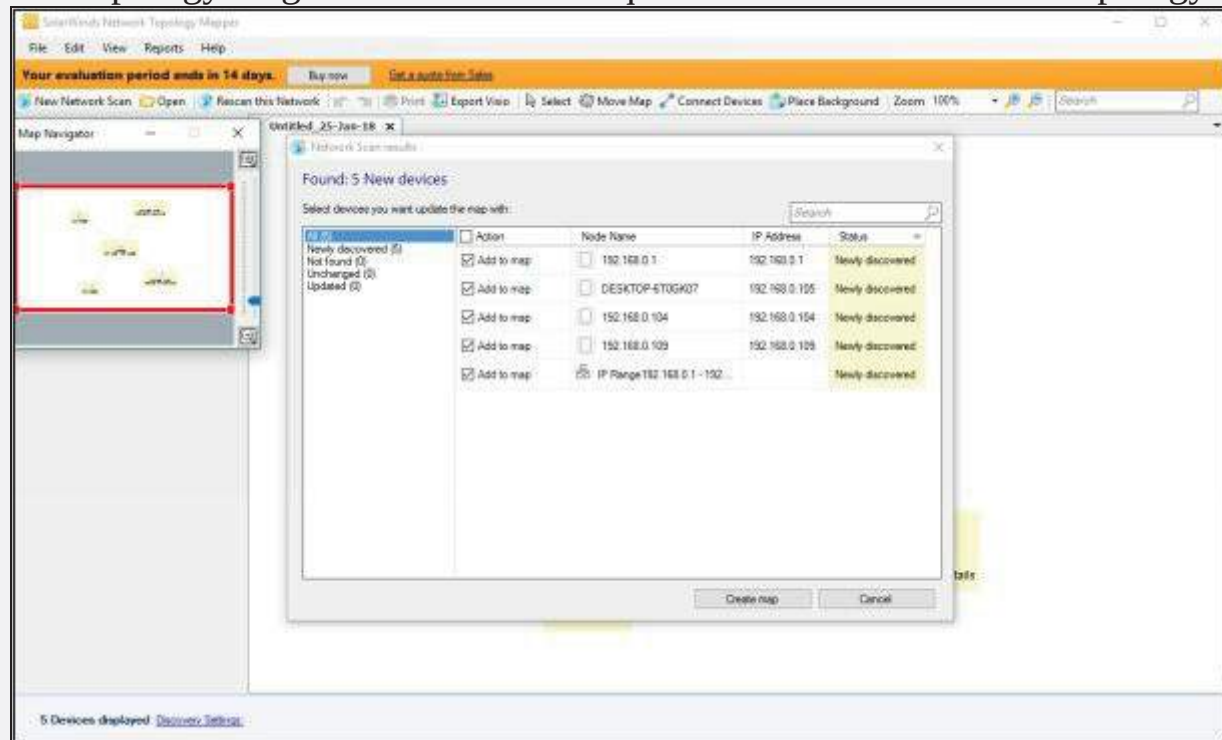


Figure 3-45 Discovered Devices List

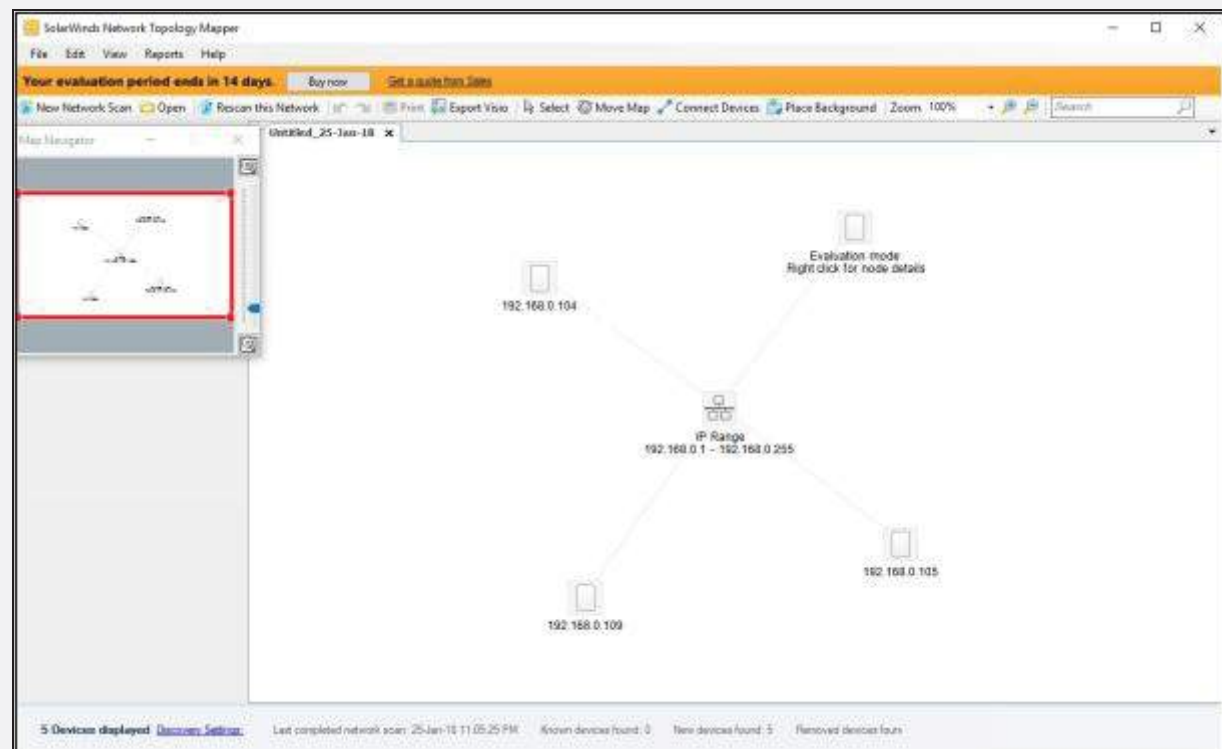


Figure 3-46 Topology

Proxy is the system that stands in between attacker and the target. Proxy systems play an important role in networks. Proxy systems are basically used by scanners to hide their identity to be traced back to the target.

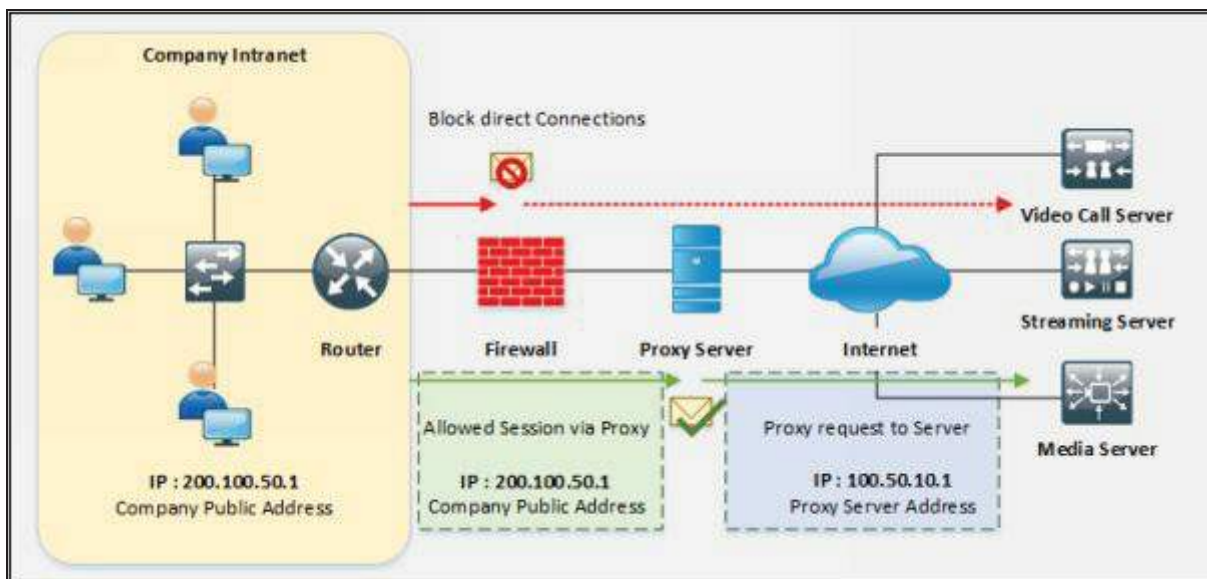


Figure 3-47 Proxy Server

Proxy Servers

Proxy server anonymizes the web traffic to provide anonymity. When a user sends a request for any resources to the other publically available servers, proxy server act as an intermediary for these requests. Users request is forwarded to proxy server first. the proxy server will entertain these requests like a web page, file download, connection to another server, etc. The most popular use of the proxy server is in terms of web proxy servers. These Web proxy servers are used to provide access to world wide web by bypassing the IP address blocking.

Uses Proxy server, in a nutshell, can be summarized as: -

- Hiding Source IP address for bypassing IP address blocking.
- Impersonating.
- Remote Access to Intranet.
- Redirecting all requests to the proxy server to hide identity.
- Proxy Chaining to avoid detection.

Proxy Chaining

Proxy Chaining is basically a technique of using multiple proxy servers. In addition to proxy servers, one proxy server forwards the traffic to next proxy server. This process is not recommended for production environments, or a long-term solution, however, this technique leverages your existing proxy.

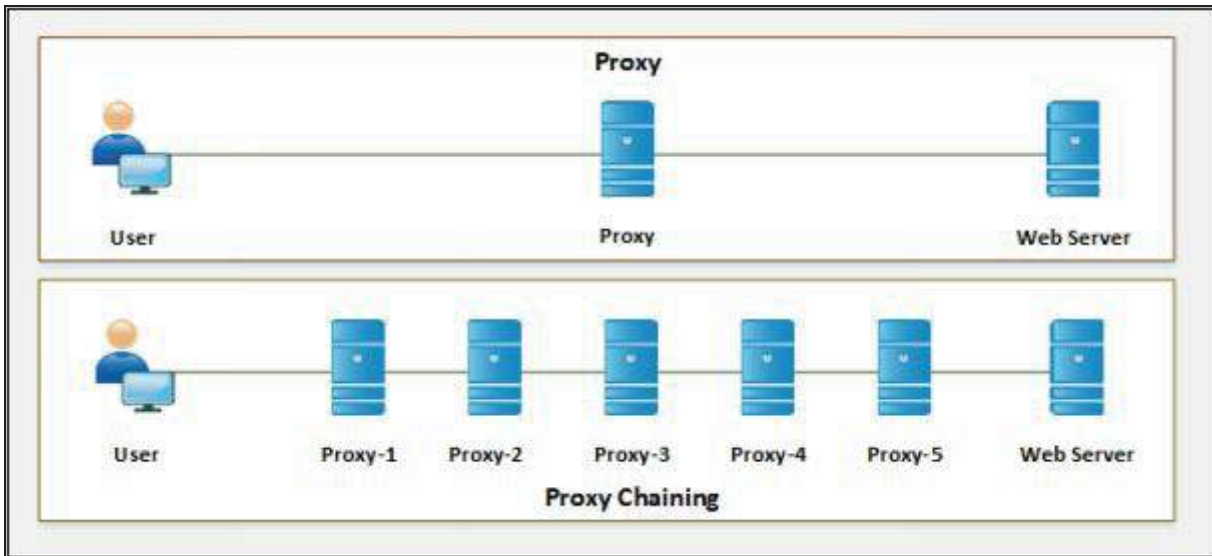


Figure 3-48 Proxy Chaining

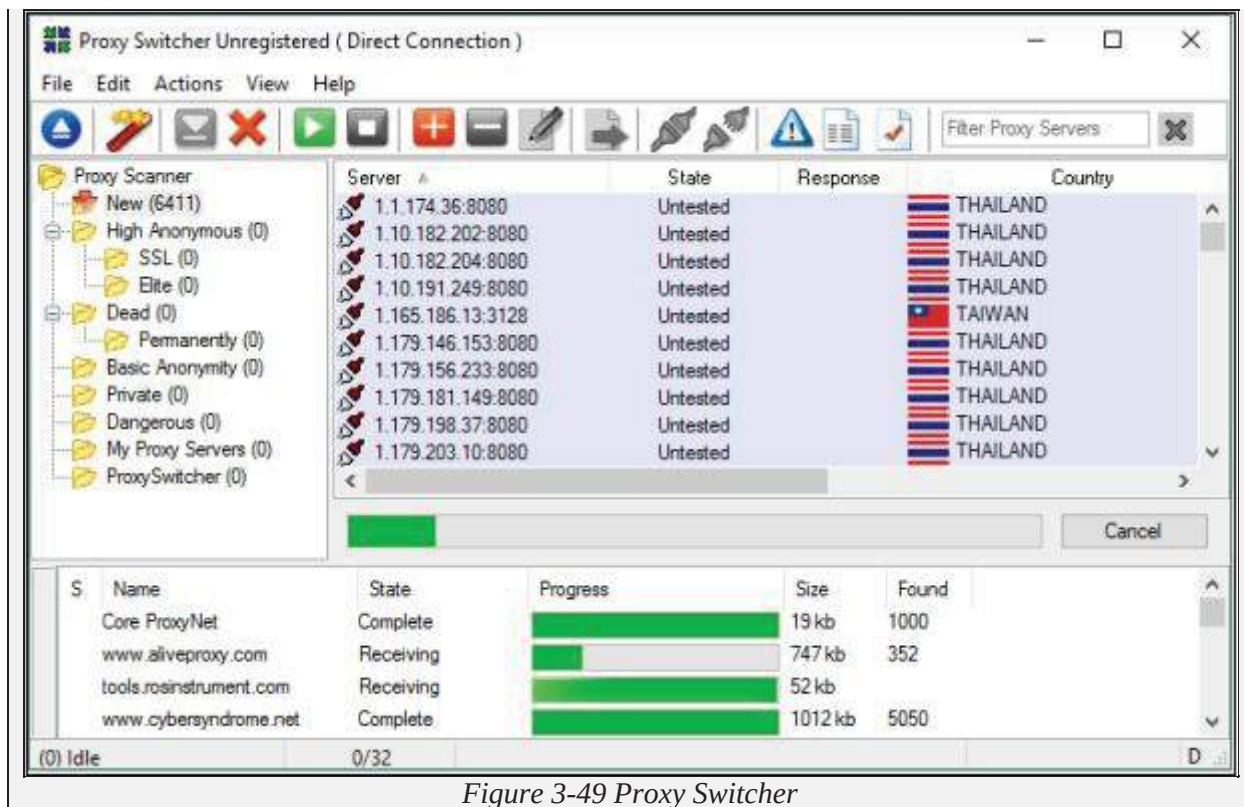


Figure 3-49 Proxy Switcher

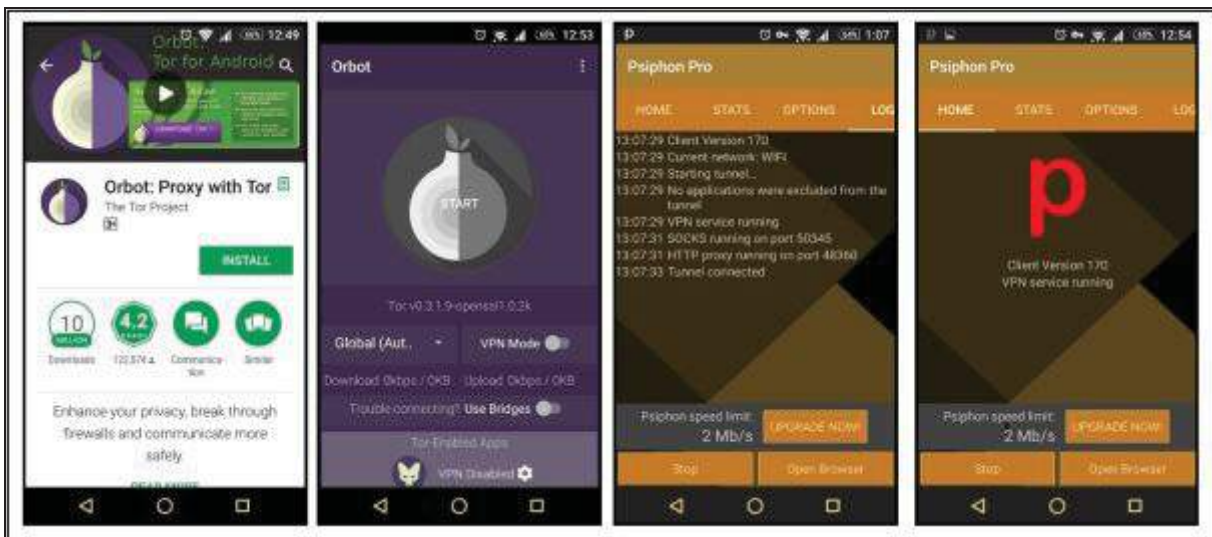


Figure 3-50 Anonymizers for Mobile

Spoofing IP Address

IP Address Spoofing is a technique, that is used to gain unauthorized access to machines by spoofing IP address. An attacker illicitly impersonates any user machine by sending manipulated IP packets with spoofed IP address. Spoofing process involves modification of header with a spoofed source IP address, a checksum, and the order values. Packet-switched networking causes the packets arriving at the destination in different order. When these out of order packets are received at the destination, these packets are resembled to extract the message.

IP spoofing can be detected by different techniques including Direct TTL probing technique and through IP Identification Number. In the process of sending direct TTL probes, packets are sent to the host that is suspected of sending spoofed packets and responses are observed. By comparing TTL value from the reply from the suspected host, IP spoofing can be detected. It

will be a spoofed packet if TTL value is not same as in spoofed packet. However, TTL values can vary in even normal traffic and this technique identify the spoofing when the attacker is on a different subnet.

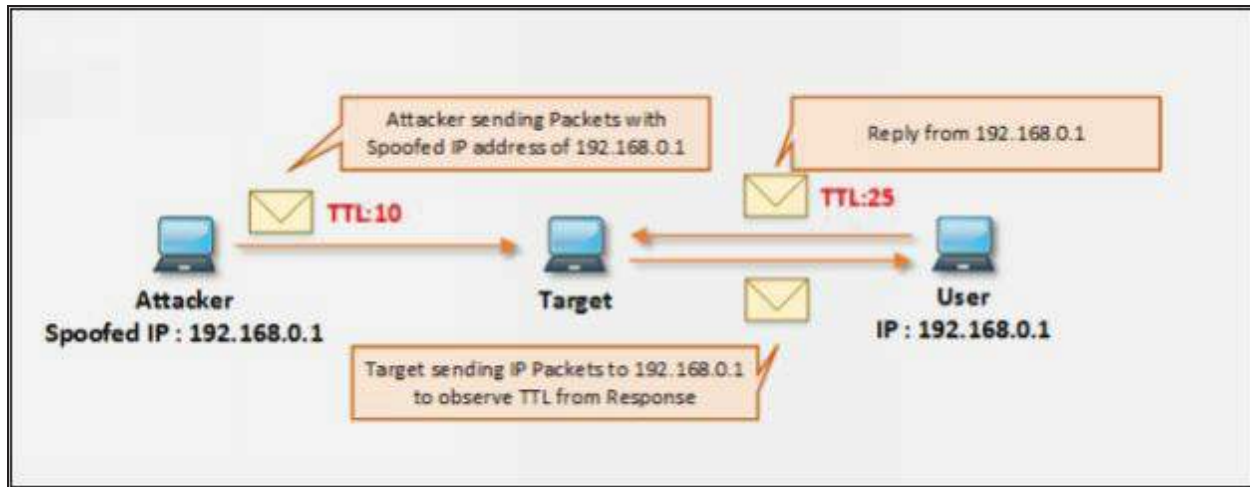


Figure 3-51 Direct TTL Probing

Similarly, additional probes are sent to verify the IPID of the host. If IPID values are not closer, suspect traffic is spoofed. This technique can be used in case if the attacker is within a subnet.

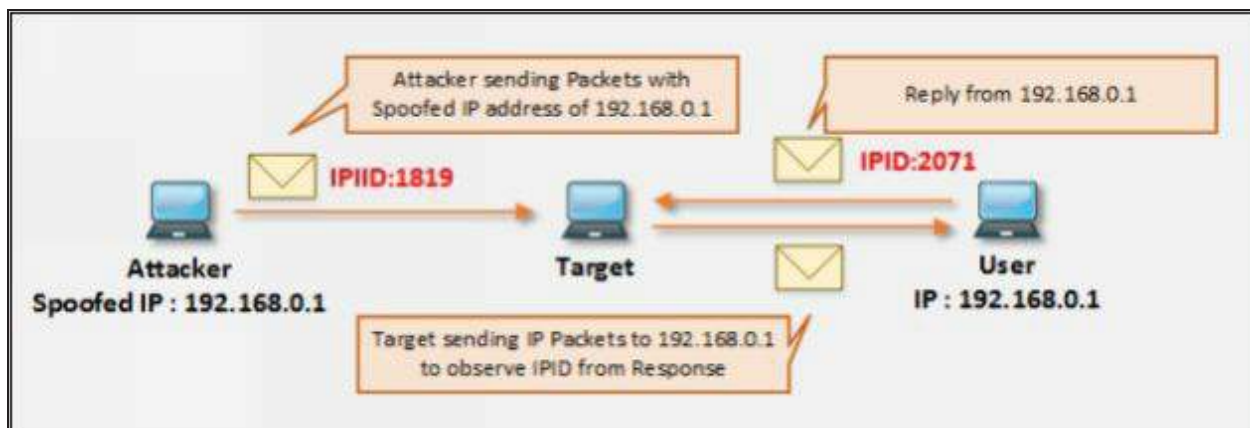


Figure 3-52 Verifying IPID Number

Chapter 4: Enumeration

Technology Brief

In the earlier processes like Footprinting and Scanning, we have understood how to collect information about any organization, target website, or a particular network. We have also discussed several tools that can be helpful in collecting the general information regarding the target. Now we are moving to observe the target more closely in order to gain detailed information. This information is sensitive such as network information, network resources, routing paths, SNMP, DNS and other protocol-related information, user and group information, etc. This sensitive information is required to gain access to a system. This information is gathered by using different tools and techniques actively.

Enumeration Concepts

Enumeration

In the phase of Enumeration, An attacker initiates active connections with the target system. With this active connection, direct queries are generated to gain more information. These information helps to identify the system attack points. Once attacker discovers attack points, it can gain unauthorized access using this collected information to reach assets.

Information that is enumerated in this phase are: -

- Routing Information
- SNMP Information
- DNS Information
- Machine Name
- User Information
- Group Information
- Application and Banners
- Network Sharing Information
- Network Resources

In the previous phases, the finding was not too concerned with any legal issues. Using the tools required for enumeration phase may cross legal boundaries and chances to being traced as using active connections with the target. You must have proper permission to perform these actions.

Techniques for Enumeration

Enumeration Using Email ID

Extraction of information using Email ID can provide useful information like username, domain name, etc. An Email address contains username and domain name in it.

Enumeration using Default Password

Another way of enumeration is using default passwords. Every device and software has its default credentials and settings. This default setting and configuration are recommended to be changed. Some administrators keep

using default passwords and settings. It became so easy for an attacker to gain unauthorized access using default credentials. Finding default settings, configuration and password of a device is not a big deal.

Enumeration using SNMP

Enumeration using SNMP is a process of gaining information through SNMP. The attacker uses default community strings or guesses the string to extract information about a device. SNMP protocol was developed to allow the manageability of devices by the administrator, such as servers, routers, switches, workstations on an IP network. It allows the network administrators to manage network performance of a network, finds, troubleshoots and solve network problems, design, and plan for network growth. SNMP is an application layer protocol. It provides communication between managers and agents. The SNMP system is consisting of three elements:

- SNMP manager
- SNMP agents (managed node)
- Management Information Base (MIB)

Brute Force Attack on Active Directory

Active Directory (AD) provides centralized command and control of domain users, computers, and network printers. It restricts the access to network resources only to the defined users and computers. The AD is a big target, a greater source of sensitive information for an attacker. Brute force attack to exploit, or generating queries to LDAP services are performed to gather information such as username, address, credentials, privileges information, etc.

Enumeration through DNS Zone Transfer

Enumeration through DNS zone transfer process includes extracting information like locating DNS Server, DNS Records, Other valuable network related information such as hostname, IP address, username, etc. A zone transfer is a process to update DNS servers; Zone file carries valuable information which is retrieved by the attacker. UDP 53 is used for DNS requests from DNS servers. TCP 53 is used for DNS zone transfers to ensure the transfer went through.



Enter the command: root@kali:~# **nmap -sP 10.10.10.0/24**





NetBIOS Enumeration

NetBIOS is Network Basic Input / Output System program that allows the communication in between different applications running on different systems within a local area network. NetBIOS service uses a unique 16-ASCII Character string in order to identify the network devices over TCP/IP. The Initial 15 Characters are for identifying the device, 16th Character is to identify the service. NetBIOS service uses TCP port 139. NetBIOS over TCP (NetBT) uses the following TCP and UDP ports:

- UDP port 137 (name services)
- UDP port 138 (datagram services)
- TCP port 139 (session services)

Using NetBIOS Enumeration, an attacker can discover: -

- List of Machines within a domain
- File Sharing
- Printer Sharing
- Username
- Group information
- Password
- Policies

NetBIOS names are classified into the following types: -

- Unique
- Group
- Domain Name
- Internet Group
- Multihomed

NetBIOS Enumeration Tool

The ***nbstat*** command is a useful tool to display information about NetBIOS over TCP/IP statistics. It is also used to display information such as NetBIOS name tables, name cache, and other information. Command using nbstat utility is shown below: -

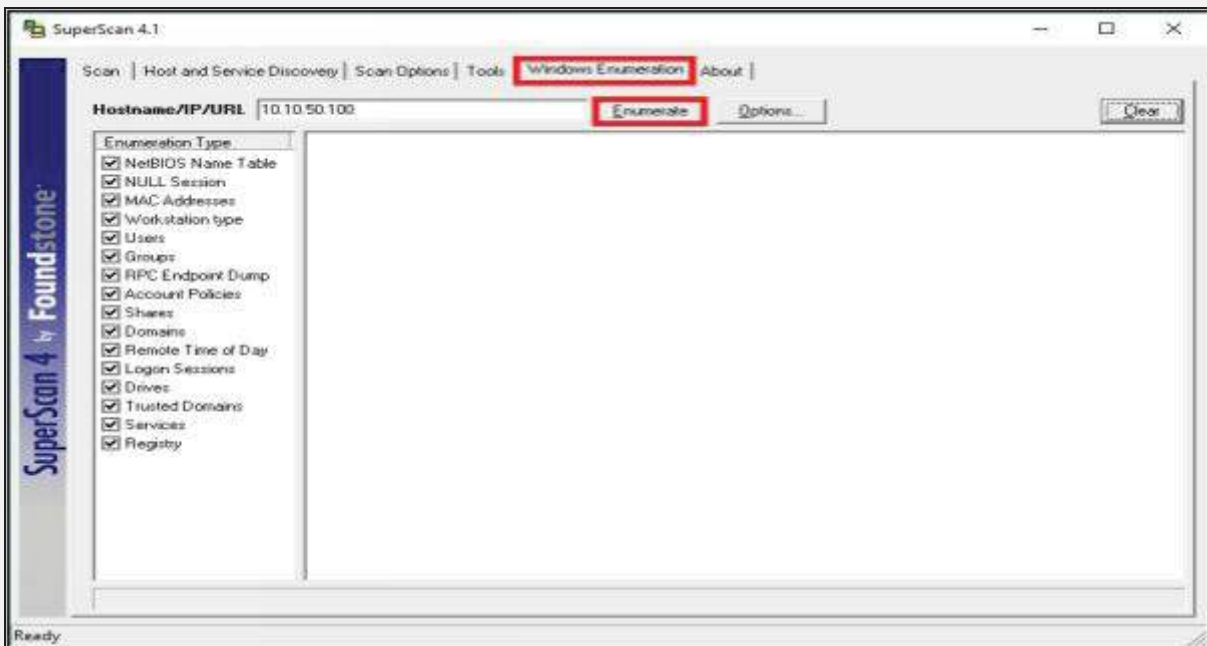


Figure 4-05 Super Scan Enumeration tool

After starting the Enumeration, it will gather the information about the target machine such as MAC address information, operating system information and other information depending upon the type of enumeration selected before initiating the process.

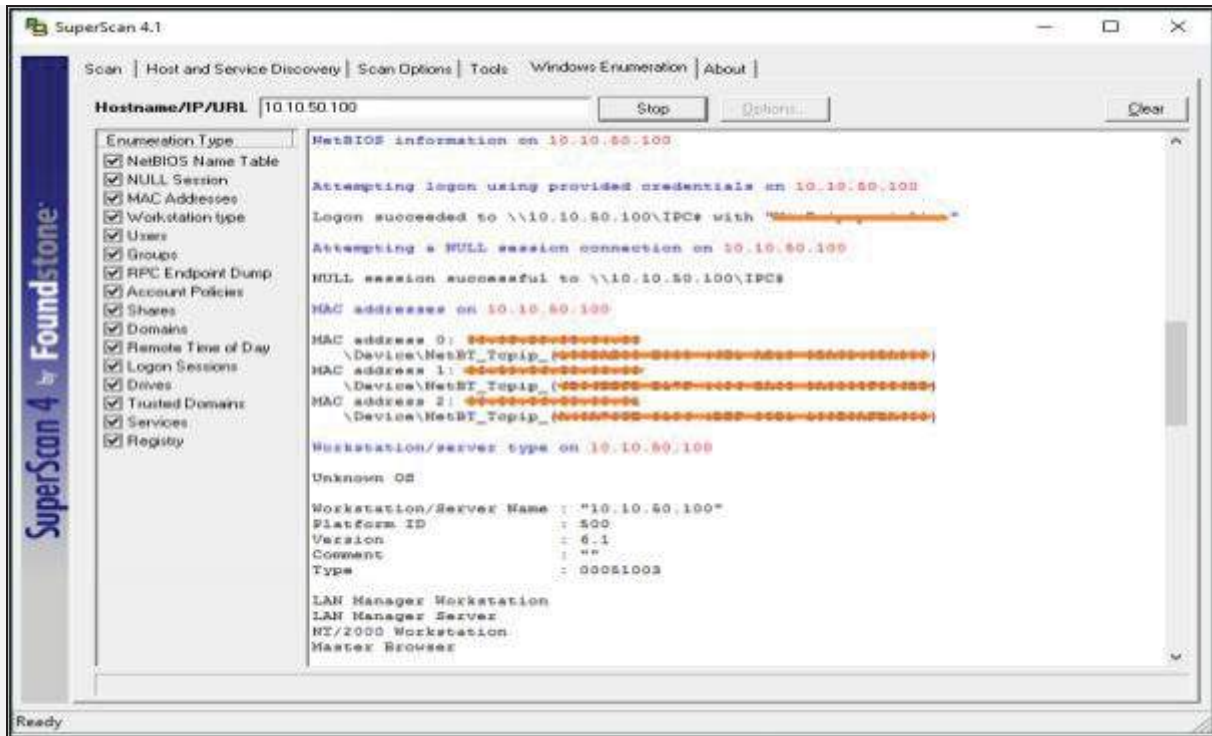


Figure 4-06 Windows Enumeration

Displaying User information of target machine along with Full name, System comments, Last login information, password expiry information, password change information, number of logins and invalid password count information, etc.

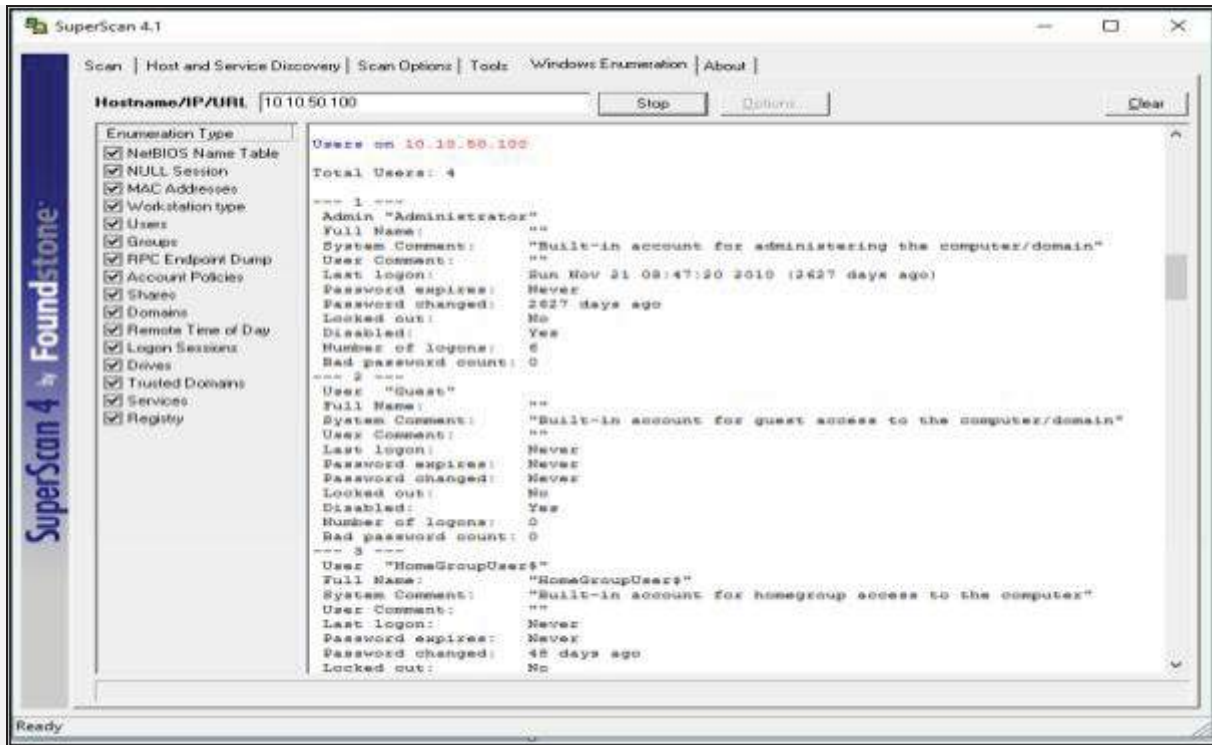


Figure 4-07 Windows Enumeration

The result is showing password and Account policies information, shares information, Remote login information, etc.

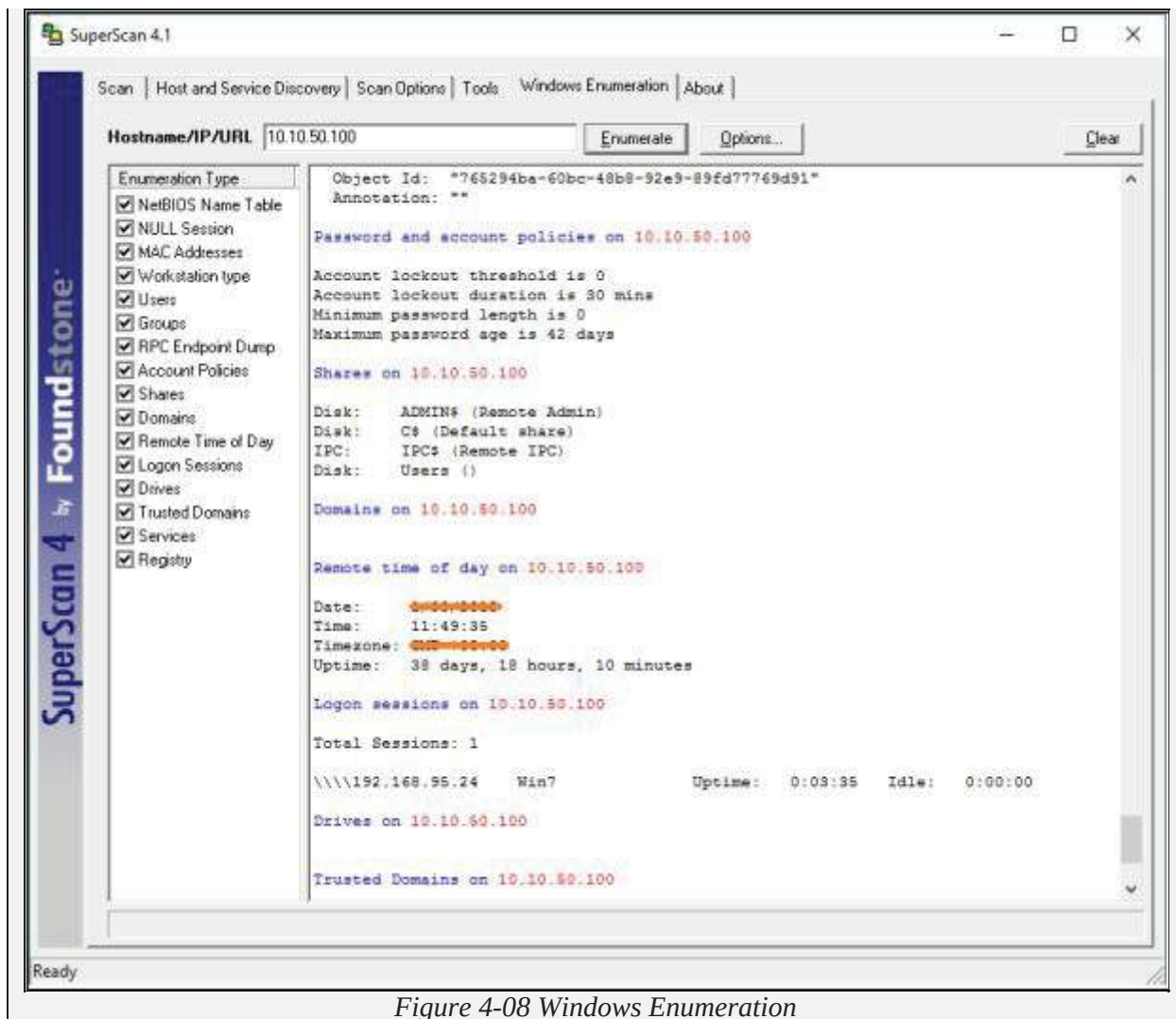


Figure 4-08 Windows Enumeration



After Installation, run the application & enter the range of IP address to scan.

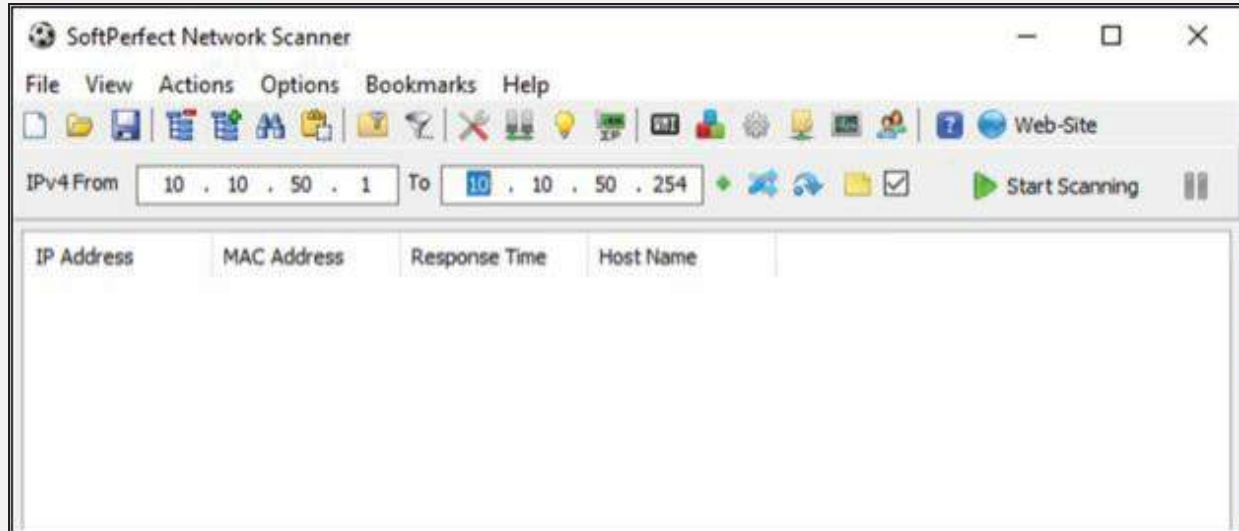


Figure 4-10 SoftPerfect Network Scanner

Now, Click on **Start Scanning** button.

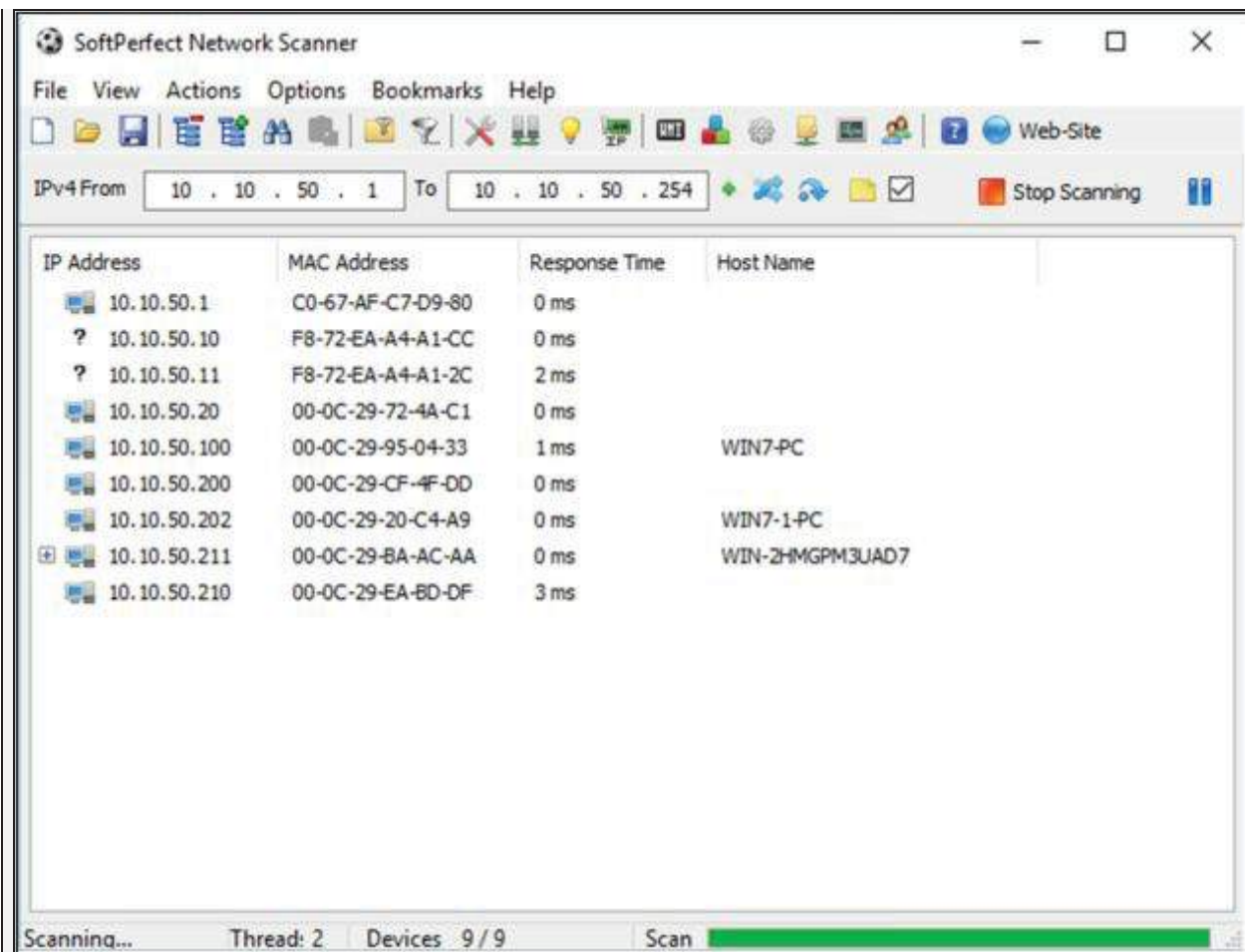


Figure 4-11 Scanning

SoftPerfect Network Scanning tool is scanning for hosts in a given range.

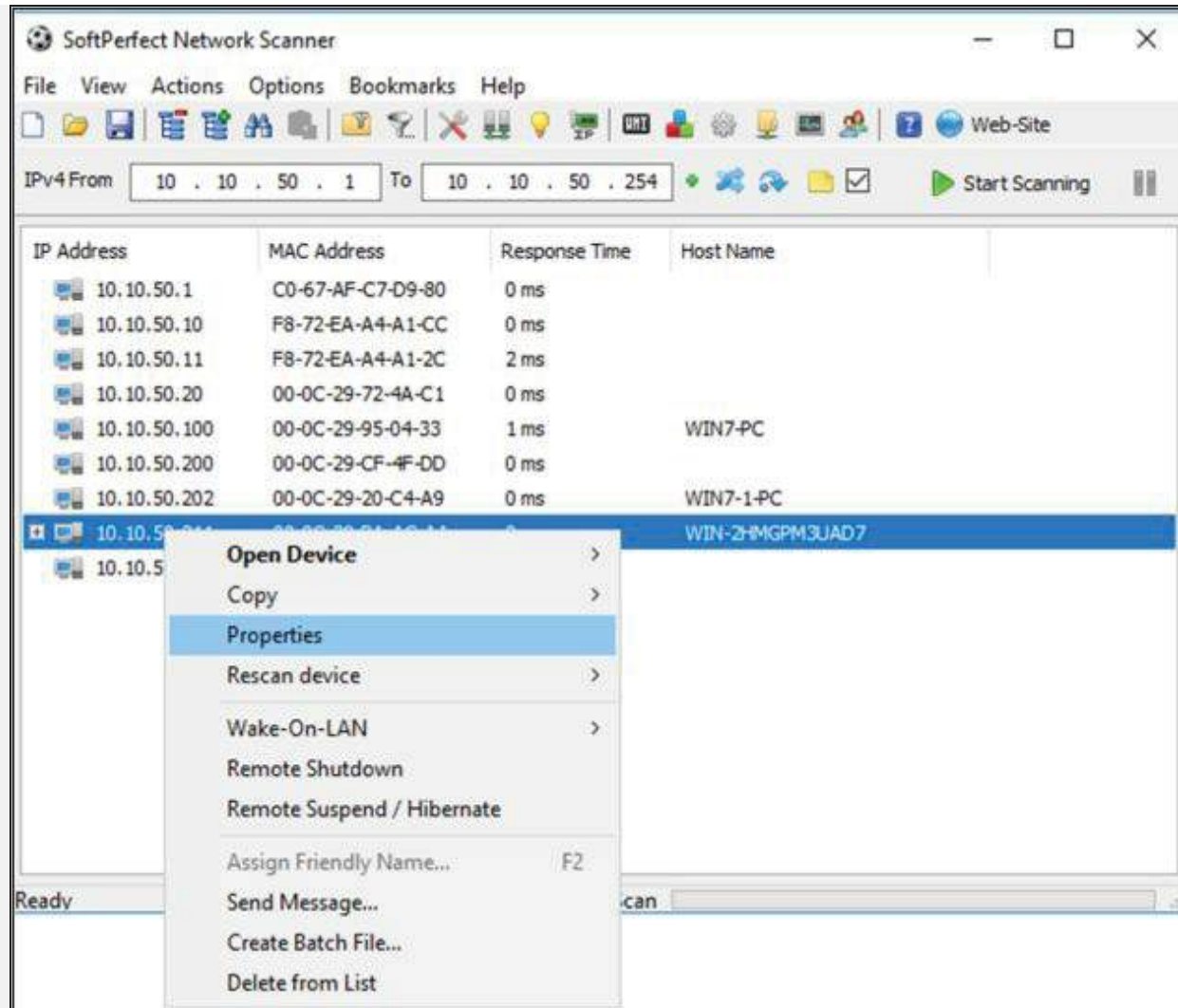


Figure 4-12 Exploring results

Go to **Properties**.

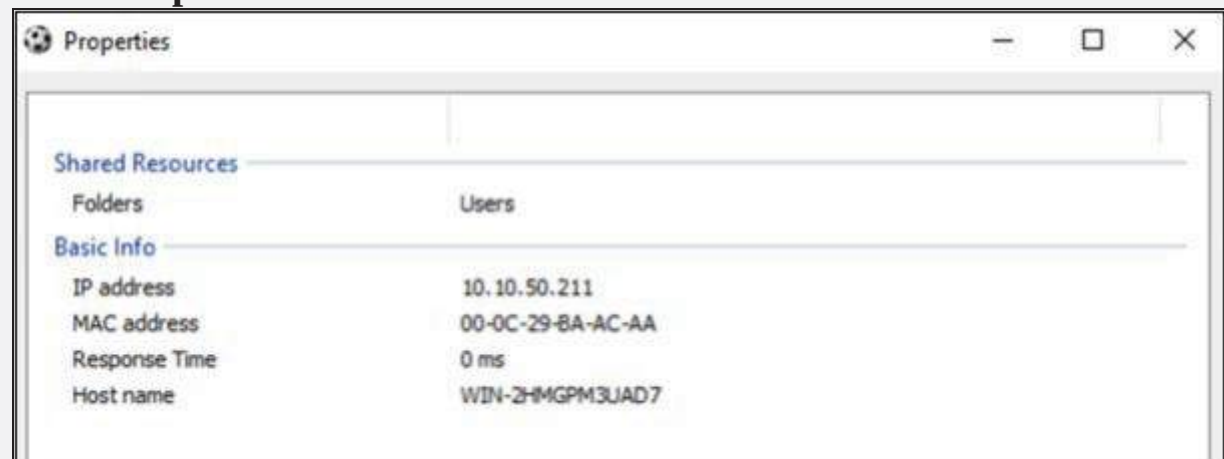


Figure 4-13 Exploring Results

The output is showing shared resource & basic information about the host. This host has shared folders with different users.

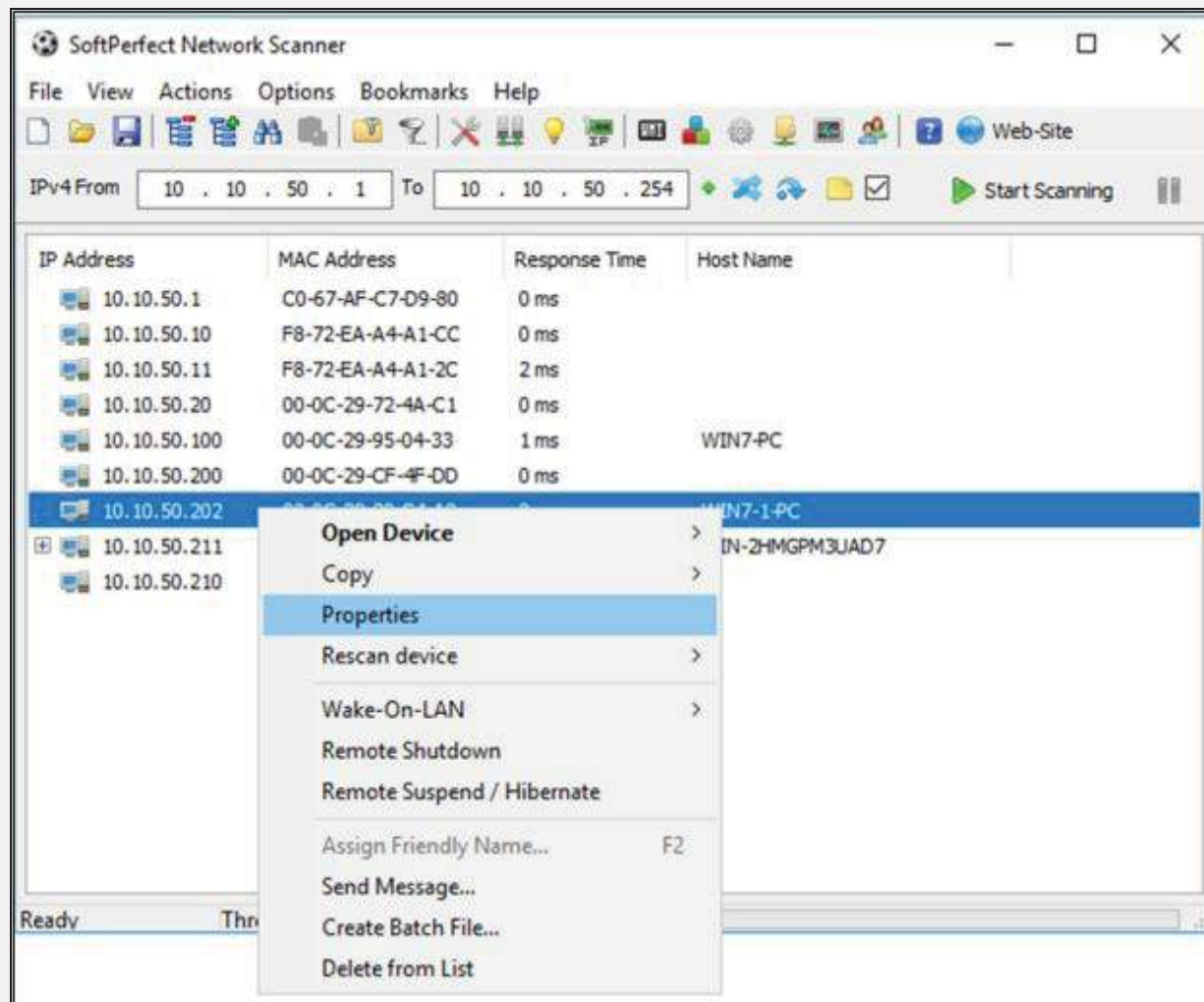


Figure 4-14 Exploring Results

Now select other host and go to properties.

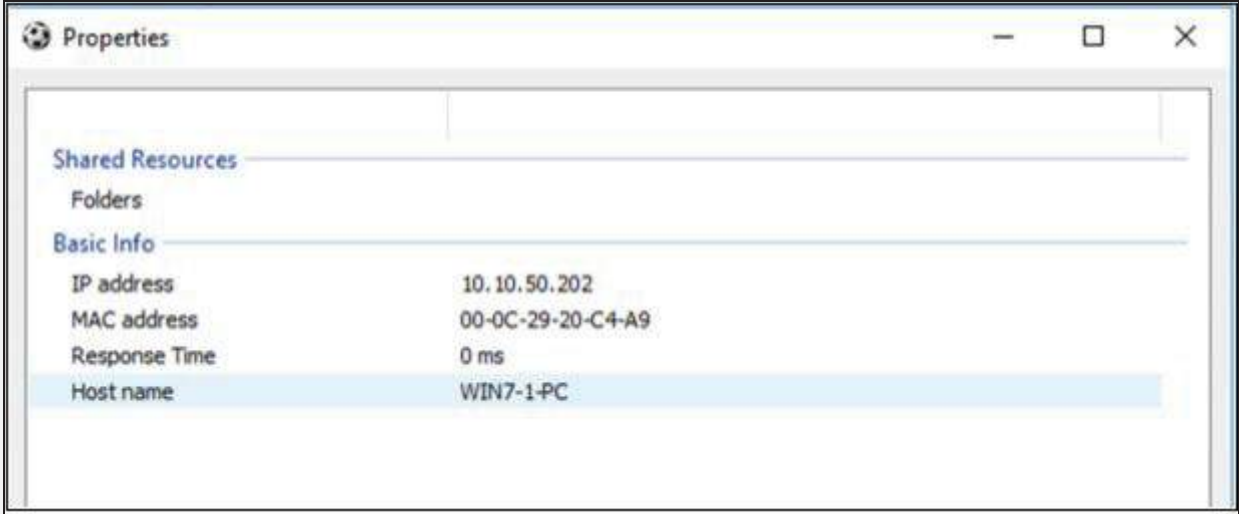


Figure 4-15 Exploring Results

SNMP Enumeration

SNMP Enumeration

Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) Enumeration is a technique of enumeration using most widely used network management protocol SNMP. In SNMP Enumeration, user accounts and device information is targeted using SNMP. SNMP requires community string to authenticate the management station.

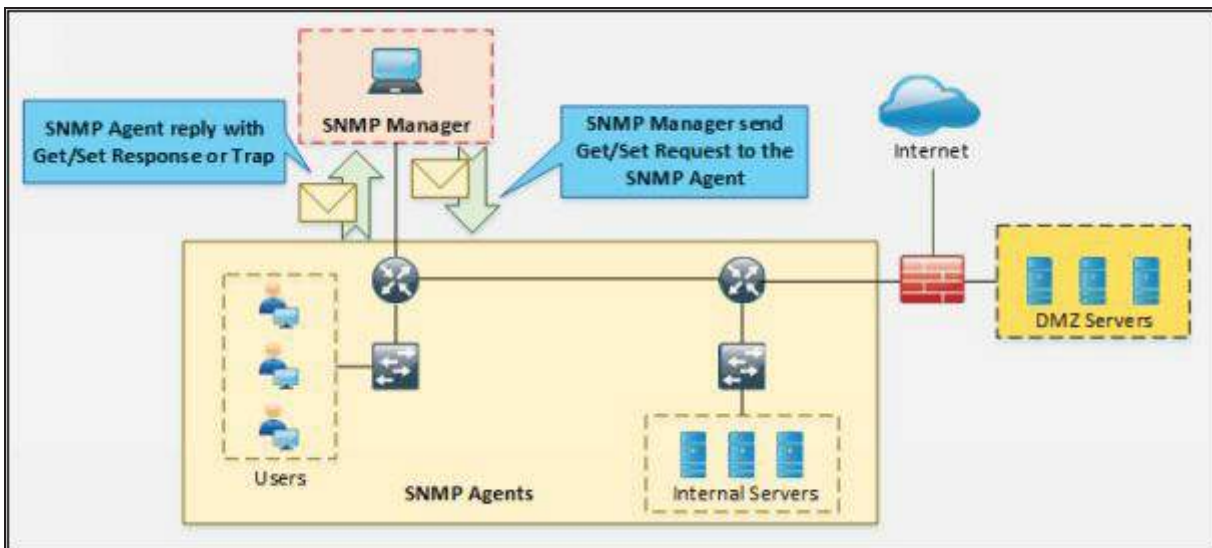


Figure 4-16 SNMP Working

This community string is in a different form in different versions of SNMP. Using the default community string, by guessing the community string, attacker extracts the information such as Host, devices, shares, network information and much more by gaining unauthorized access.

| Community Strings | Description |

Simple Network Management Protocol

In a production environment, where thousands of networking devices such as

routers, switches, servers, and endpoints are deployed, Network Operation Center (NOC) has to play a very important role. Almost every single vendor supports Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP). Initially, SNMP deployment requires Management Station. Management station collects the information regarding different aspects of network devices. The second thing is configuration and software support by networking devices itself. A configuration like the type of encryption and hashing running on management station's software must match with SNMP settings on networking devices.

Technically three components are involved in deploying SNMP in a network:

-

SNMP Manager:

A software application running on the management station to display the collected information from networking devices in a nice and representable manner. Commonly used SNMP software are PRTG, Solarwinds, OPManager, etc.

SNMP Agent:

The software is running on networking nodes whose different components need to be monitored. Examples include CPU/RAM usage, interface status, etc. UDP port number 161 is used for communication between SNMP agent and SNMP manager.

Management Information Base:

MIB stands for Management Information Base and is a collection of information organized hierarchically in a virtual database. These are accessed using a protocol such as SNMP.

There are two types of MIBs: -

There are two types of MIBs: -

| MIB Types | Description |

Scalar objects define a single object instance whereas tabular objects define

multiple related object instances grouped in MIB tables. MIBs are collections of definitions, which define the properties of the managed object within the device to be managed.

This collection of information such as a description of network objects that are organized & managed hierarchically in MIB using SNMP is addressed through Object identifiers (OIDs). These Object identifiers (OIDs) includes MIB objects like String, Address, Counter, Access level and other information.

MIB Example: The typical objects to monitor on a printer are the different cartridge states and maybe the number of printed files, and on a switch, the typical objects of interest are the incoming and outgoing traffic as well as the rate of packet loss or the number of packets addressed to a broadcast address.

The features of available SNMP variants are:

LDAP Enumeration

Lightweight Directory Access Protocol (LDAP)

The Lightweight Directory Access Protocol LDAP is an open standard, Internet protocol. LDAP is for accessing and maintaining distributed directory information services in a hierarchical and logical structure. A directory service plays an important role by allowing the sharing of information like user, system, network, service, etc. throughout the network. LDAP provides a central place to store usernames and passwords. Applications and Services connect to the LDAP server to validate users. The client initiates an LDAP session by sending an operation request to Directory System Agent (DSA) using TCP port 389. Communication between Client and Server uses Basic Encoding Rules (BER).

- Active Directory
- Open Directory

- OpenLDAP

NTP Enumeration

Network Time Protocol (NTP)

NTP is Network Time Protocol used in a network to synchronize the clocks across the hosts and network devices. The NTP is an important protocol, as directory services, network devices and host rely on clock settings for login purposes and logging to keep a record of events. NTP helps in correlating events by the time system logs are received by Syslog servers. NTP uses UDP port number 123, and its whole communication is based on coordinated universal time (UTC).

NTP uses a term known as **stratum** to describe the distance between NTP server and device. It is just like TTL number that decreases every hop a packet passes by. Stratum value, starting from one, increases by every hop. For example, if we see stratum number 10 on local router, it means that NTP server is nine hops away. Securing NTP is also an important aspect as the attacker may change time at first place to mislead the forensic teams who investigate and correlate the events to find the root cause of the attack.

NTP Authentication

NTP version 3 (NTPv3), and later versions support a cryptographic authentication technique between NTP peers. This authentication can be used to mitigate an attack.

Three commands are used on the NTP master and the NTP client:

Without NTP Authentication configuration, Network time information still exchanges between server and clients, but the difference is these NTP clients do not authenticate the NTP server as a secure source such as what if the legitimate NTP server goes down and Fake NTP server overtake the real NTP server.

NTP Enumeration

Another important aspect of collecting information is the time at which that specific event occurs. Attackers may try to change the timestamps setting of the router or may introduce rough NTP server in the network to mislead the

forensic teams. Thanks to the creators of NTP v3, it has support for authentication with NTP server before considering its time to be authenticated one.

It is possible to gather information from NTP using different tools such as NTP commands, Nmap and an NSE script. In the process of Enumeration through NTP, attacker generates queries to NTP server to extract valuable information from the responses such as: -

- Host information connected to NTP server
- Client IP address, Machine name, Operating System information
- Network information such as Internal IPs depends upon deployment of NTP server, i.e., if NTP server is deployed in DMZ.

NTP Enumeration Commands

ntpdc is used to query the ntpd daemon regarding current state & request changes in state.





SMTP Enumeration

Simple Mail Transfer Protocol (SMTP)

SMTP Enumeration is another way to extract information about the target using Simple Mail Transfer Protocol (SMTP). SMTP Protocol ensures the mail communication between Email servers and recipients over Internet port 25. SMTP is one of the popular TCP/IP protocol widely used by most of the email servers now defined in RFC 821.

SMTP Enumeration Technique

The following are some of the SMTP commands that can be used for Enumeration. SMTP server responses for these commands such as VRFY, RCPT TO, and EXPN are different. By inspecting and comparing the responses for valid and invalid users through interacting the SMTP server via telnet, valid users can be determined.

DNS Zone Transfer Enumeration Using NSLookup

In the enumeration process through DNS Zone transfer, attacker find the target's TCP port 53, as TCP port 53 is used by DNS and Zone transfer uses

this port by default. Using port scanning techniques, you can find if the port is open.

DNS Zone Transfer

DNS Zone transfer is the process that is performed by DNS. In the process of Zone transfer, DNS passes a copy containing database records to another DNS server. DNS Zone transfer process provides support for resolving queries, as more than one DNS server can respond to the queries.

Consider a scenario in which both primary and secondary DNS Servers are responding to the queries. Secondary DNS server gets the DNS records copy to update the information in its database.

DNS Zone Transfer using nslookup command

1. Go to Windows command line (CMD) and enter Nslookup and press Enter.

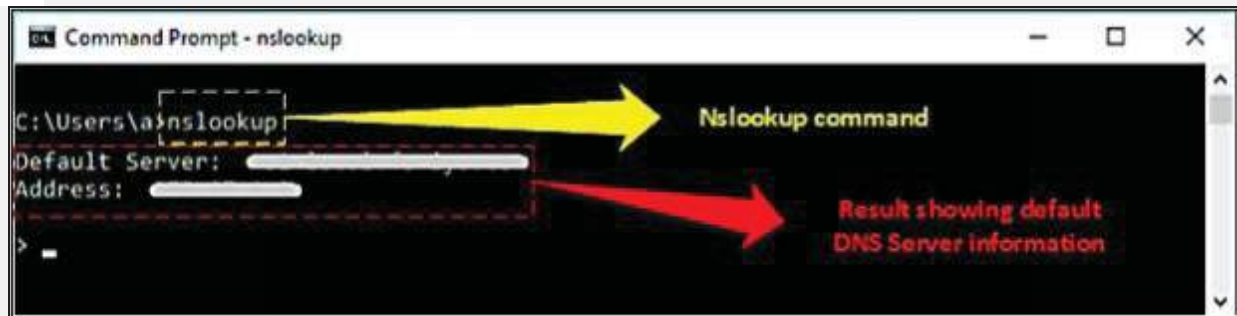


Figure 4-20 nslookup command

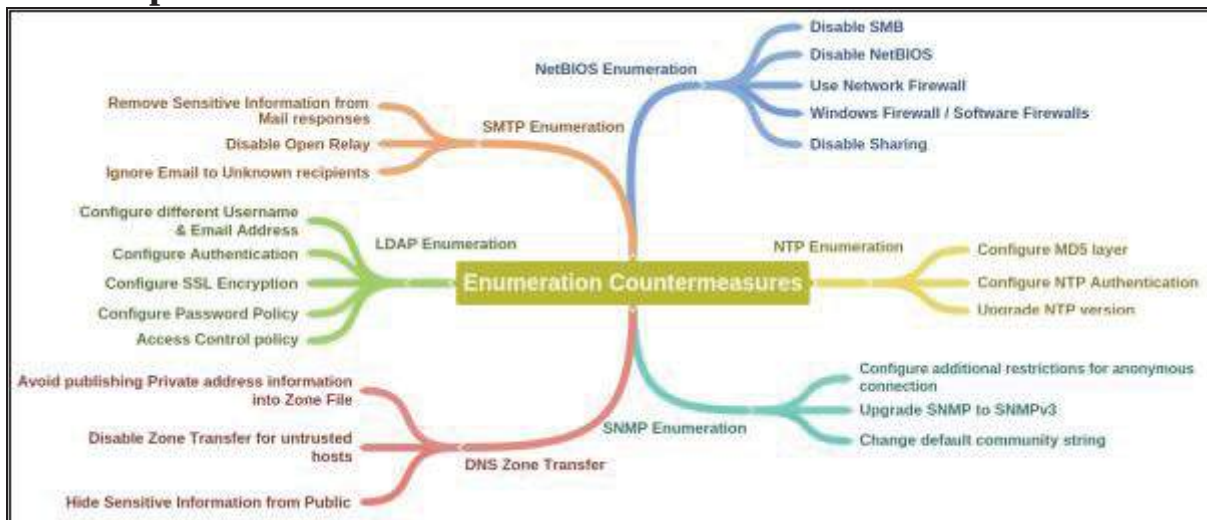

Chapter 5: Vulnerability Analysis

Technology Brief

Vulnerability analysis is a part of the scanning phase. In the Hacking cycle, vulnerability analysis is a major and important part. In this chapter, we will discuss the concept of Vulnerability Assessment, Vulnerability Assessment phases, types of assessment, tools and other important aspects.

Vulnerability Assessment Concept:

This is a fundamental task for a penetration tester to discover the vulnerabilities in an environment. Vulnerability assessment includes discovering weaknesses in an environment, design flaws and other security concerns which can cause an operating system, application or website to be misused. These vulnerabilities include misconfigurations, default configurations, buffer overflows, Operating System flaws, Open Services, and others. There are different tools available for network administrators and Pentesters to scan for vulnerabilities in a network. Discovered vulnerabilities are classified into three different categories based on their security levels, i.e., low, medium or high. furthermore, they can also be categorized as exploit range such as local or remote.

Vulnerability Assessment

Vulnerability Assessment can be defined as a process of examination, discovery, and identification of system and applications security measures and weaknesses. Systems and applications are examined for security measures to identify the effectiveness of deployed security layer to withstand attacks and misuses. Vulnerability assessment also helps to recognize the vulnerabilities that could be exploited, need of additional security layers, and information's that can be revealed using scanners.

Types of Vulnerability Assessments

- **Active Assessments:** Active Assessment is the process of Vulnerability Assessment which includes actively sending requests to the live network and examining the responses. In short, it is the process of assessment which requires probing the target host.
- **Passive Assessments:** Passive Assessment is the process of Vulnerability Assessment which usually includes packet sniffing to discover vulnerabilities, running services, open ports and other information. However, it is the process of assessment without interfering the target host.
- **External Assessment:** Another type in which Vulnerability assessment can be categorized is an External assessment. It the process of assessment with hacking's perspective to find out vulnerabilities to exploit them from outside.

- **Internal Assessment:** This is another technique to find vulnerabilities. Internal assessment includes discovering vulnerabilities by scanning internal network and infrastructure.

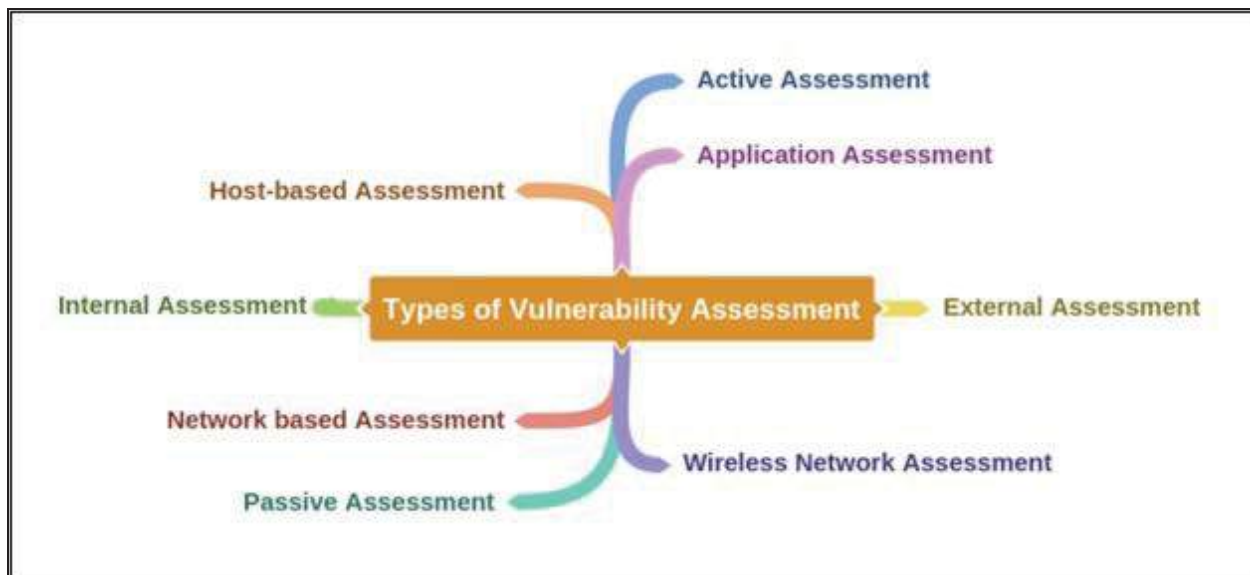


Figure 5-01 Types of Vulnerability Assessment

Vulnerability Assessment Life-Cycle

Vulnerability Assessment life cycle includes the following phases:

Creating Baseline

Creating Baseline is a pre-assessment phase of the vulnerability assessment life-cycle in which pentester or network administrator who is performing assessment identifies the nature of the corporate network, the applications, and services. He creates an inventory of all resources and assets which helps to manage, prioritize the assessment. Furthermore, he also maps the infrastructure, learns about the security controls, policies, and standards followed by the organization. In the end, baseline helps to plan the process effectively, schedule the tasks, and manage them with respect to priority.

Vulnerability Assessment

Vulnerability Assessment phase is focused on assessment of the target. The assessment process includes examination and inspection of security measures such as physical security as well as security policies and controls. In this phase, the target is evaluated for misconfigurations, default configurations,

faults, and other vulnerabilities either by probing each component individually or using assessment tools. Once scanning is complete, findings are ranked in terms of their priorities. At the end of this phase, vulnerability assessment report shows all detected vulnerabilities, their scope, and priorities.

Risk Assessment

Risk Assessment includes scoping these identified vulnerabilities and their impact on the corporate network or on an organization.

Remediation

Remediation phase includes remedial actions for these detected vulnerabilities. High priority vulnerabilities are addressed first because they can cause a huge impact.

Verification

Verification phase ensures that all vulnerabilities in an environment are eliminated.

Monitor

Monitoring phase includes monitoring the network traffic and system behaviors for any further intrusion.

Vulnerability Assessment Solutions

Different approaches for Vulnerability Assessment

- ***Product based Solution Vs Service based Solution***

Product- based solutions are deployed within the corporate network of an organization or a private network. These solutions are usually for dedicated for internal (private) network.

Service-based solutions are third-party solutions which offers security and auditing to a network. These solutions can be host either inside or outside the network. As these solutions are allowed to the internal network, hence a security risk of being compromised.

- ***Tree-based Assessment Vs. Inference-based Assessment***

Tree-based assessment is the assessment approach in which auditor follows different strategies for each component of an environment. For example, consider a scenario of an organization's network where different machines are live, the auditor may use an approach for Windows-based machines whereas another technique for Linux based servers.

Inference-based assessment is another approach to assist depending on the inventory of protocols in an environment. For example, if an auditor found a protocol, using inference-based assessment approach, the auditor will investigate for ports and services related to that protocol.

Best Practice for Vulnerability Assessment

The following are some recommended steps for Vulnerability Assessment for effective results. A network administrator or auditor must follow these best practices for vulnerability assessment.

- Before starting any vulnerability assessment tool on a network, the auditor must understand the complete functionality of that assessment tool. It will help to select appropriate tool to extract your desired information.

- Make sure about the assessment tool that it will not cause any sort of damage or unavailability of services running on a network.
- Make sure about the source location of scan to reduce the focus area.
- Run scan frequently for vulnerabilities.

Vulnerability Scoring Systems

Common Vulnerability Scoring Systems (CVSS)

The Common Vulnerability Scoring System (CVSS) provides a way to capture the principal characteristics of vulnerability and produce a numerical score reflecting its severity. The numerical score can then be translated into a qualitative representation (such as low, medium, high, and critical) to help organizations properly assess and prioritize their vulnerability management processes.

Common Vulnerabilities and Exposure (CVE) is another platform where you can find the information about vulnerabilities. CVE maintain the list of known vulnerabilities including an identification number and description of known cybersecurity vulnerabilities.

U.S. National Vulnerability Database (NVD) was launched by National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST), The CVE List feeds NVD, which then builds upon the information included in CVE Entries to provide enhanced information for each entry such as fix information, severity scores, and impact ratings. As part of its enhanced information, NVD also provides advanced searching features such as by OS; by vendor name, product name, and/or version number; and by vulnerability type, severity, related exploit

range, and impact.

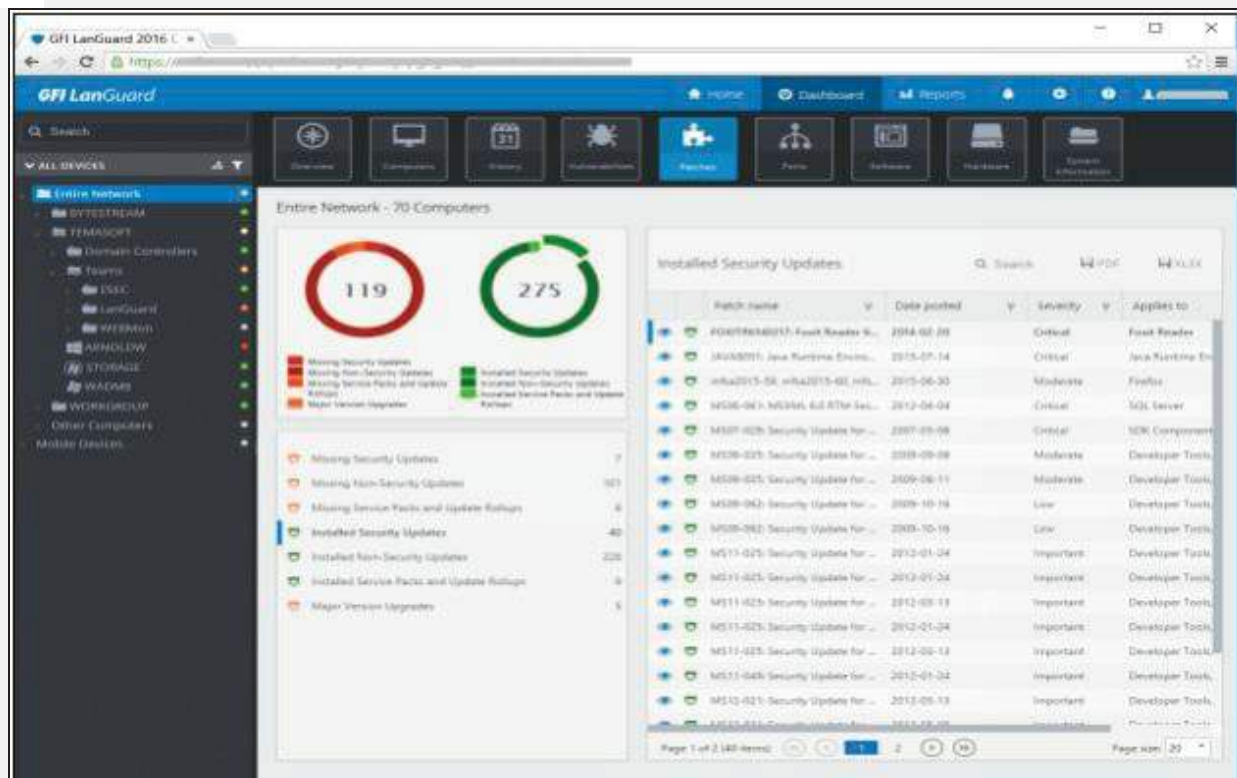


Figure 5-04 GFI Lan Guard Vulnerability Scanning Tool

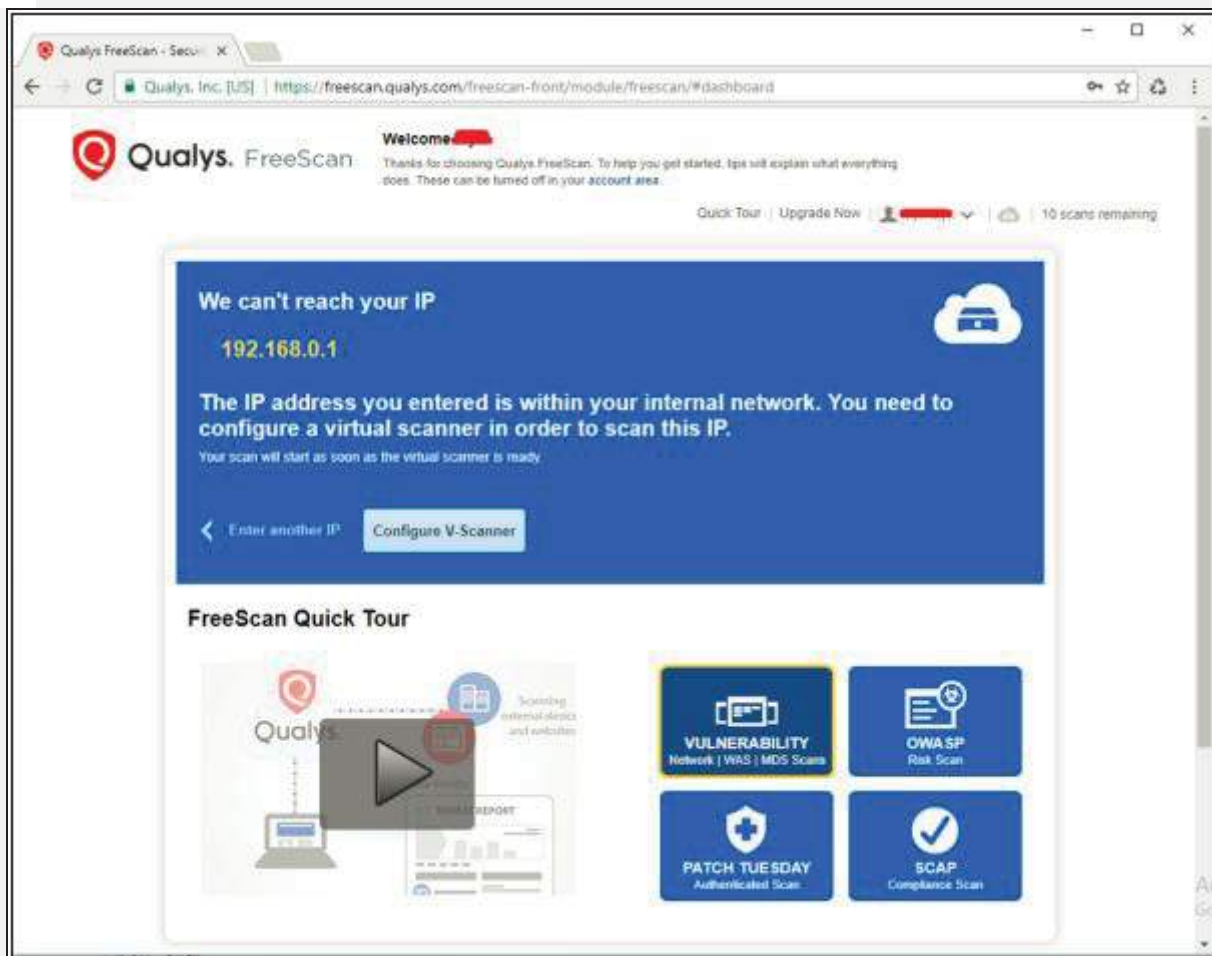


Figure 5-05 Qualys FreeScan Vulnerability Scanning Tool

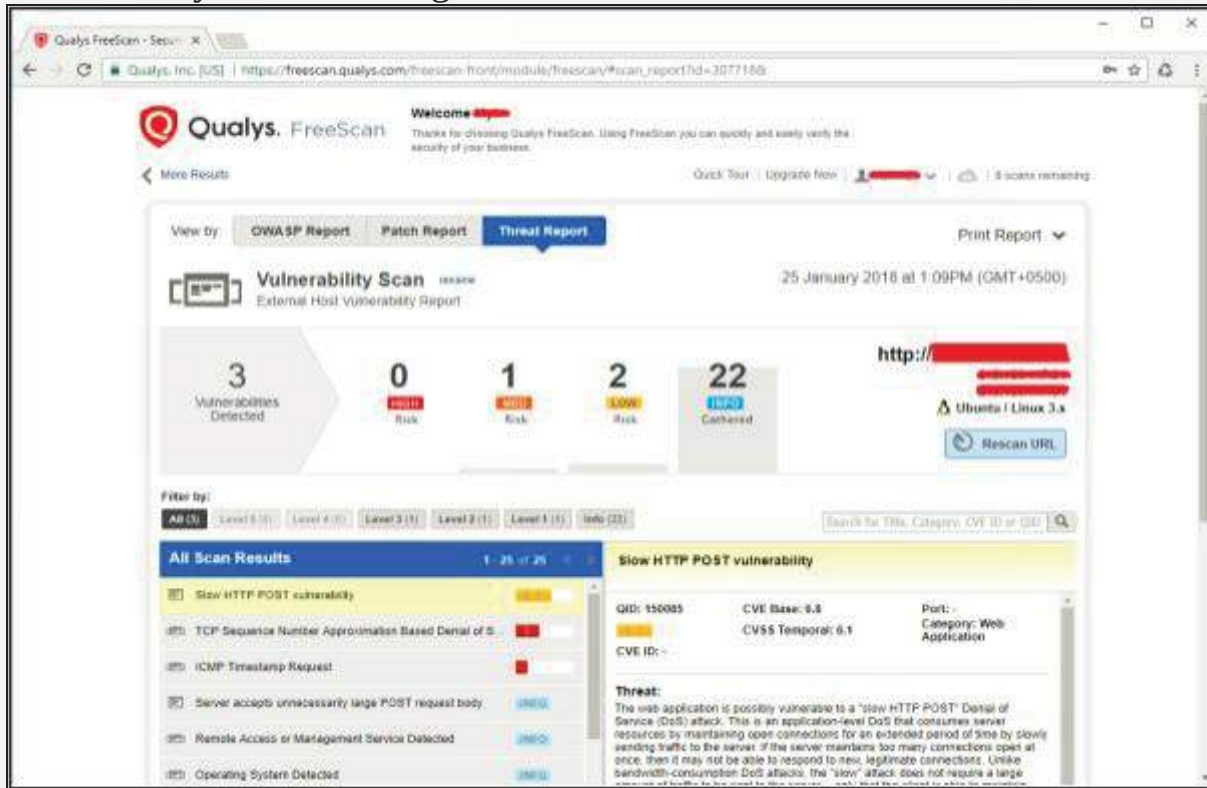


Figure 5-06 Qualys FreeScan Vulnerability Scanning Tool

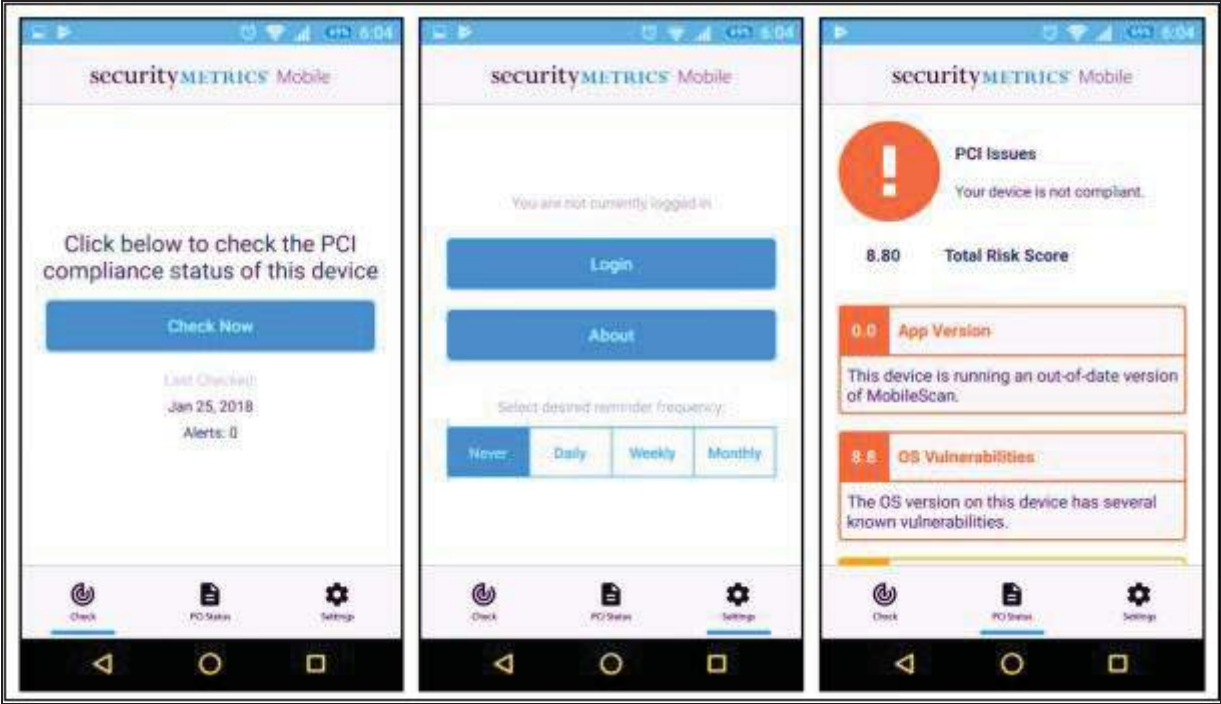


Figure 5-07 Security Metrics Mobile Scan

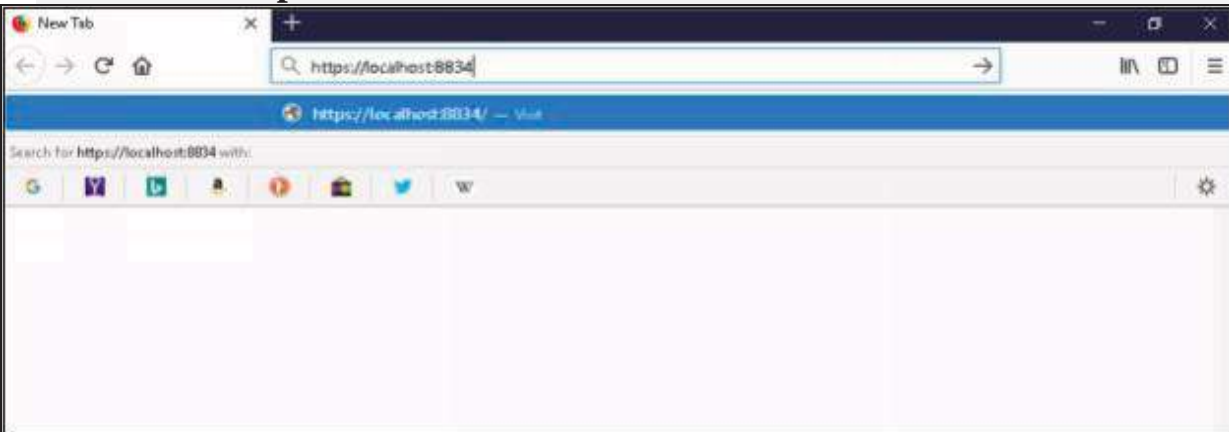


Figure 5-08 <https://localhost:8834>

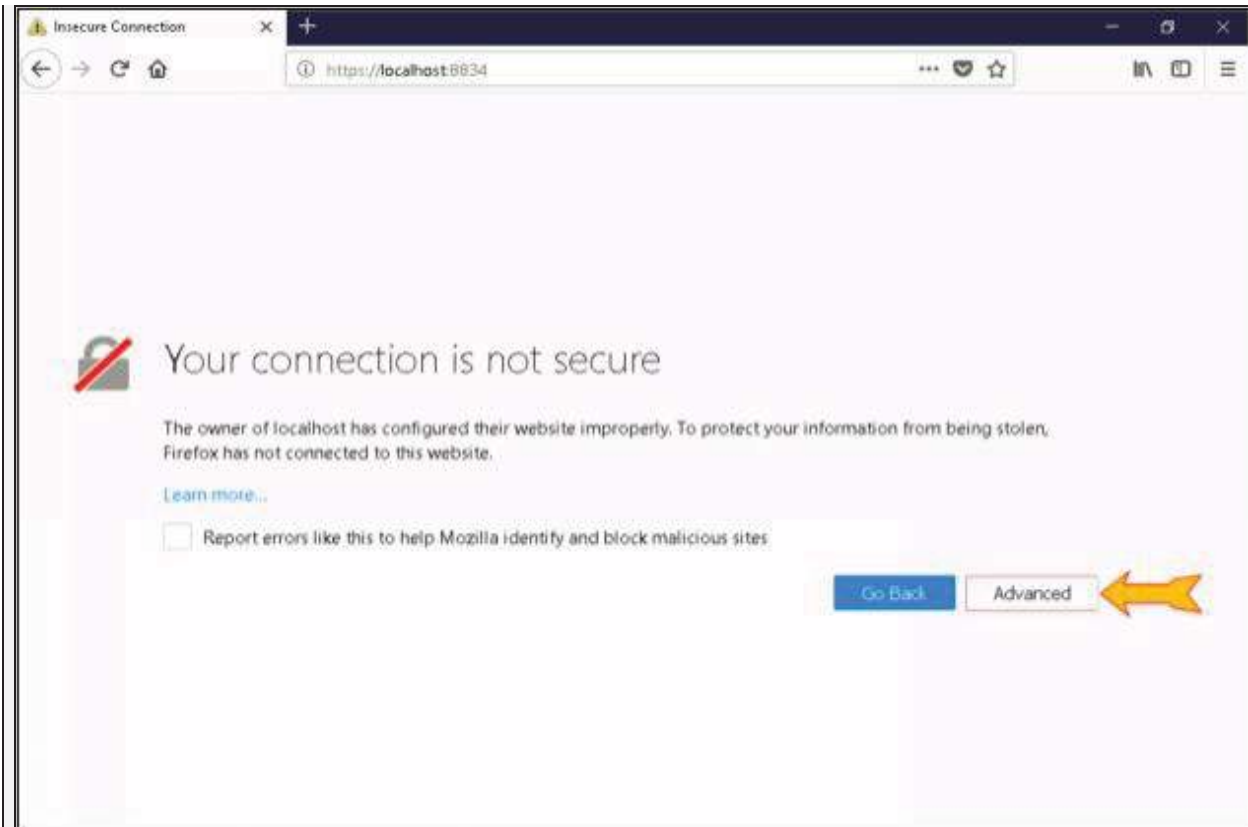


Figure 5-09 Security Exception required

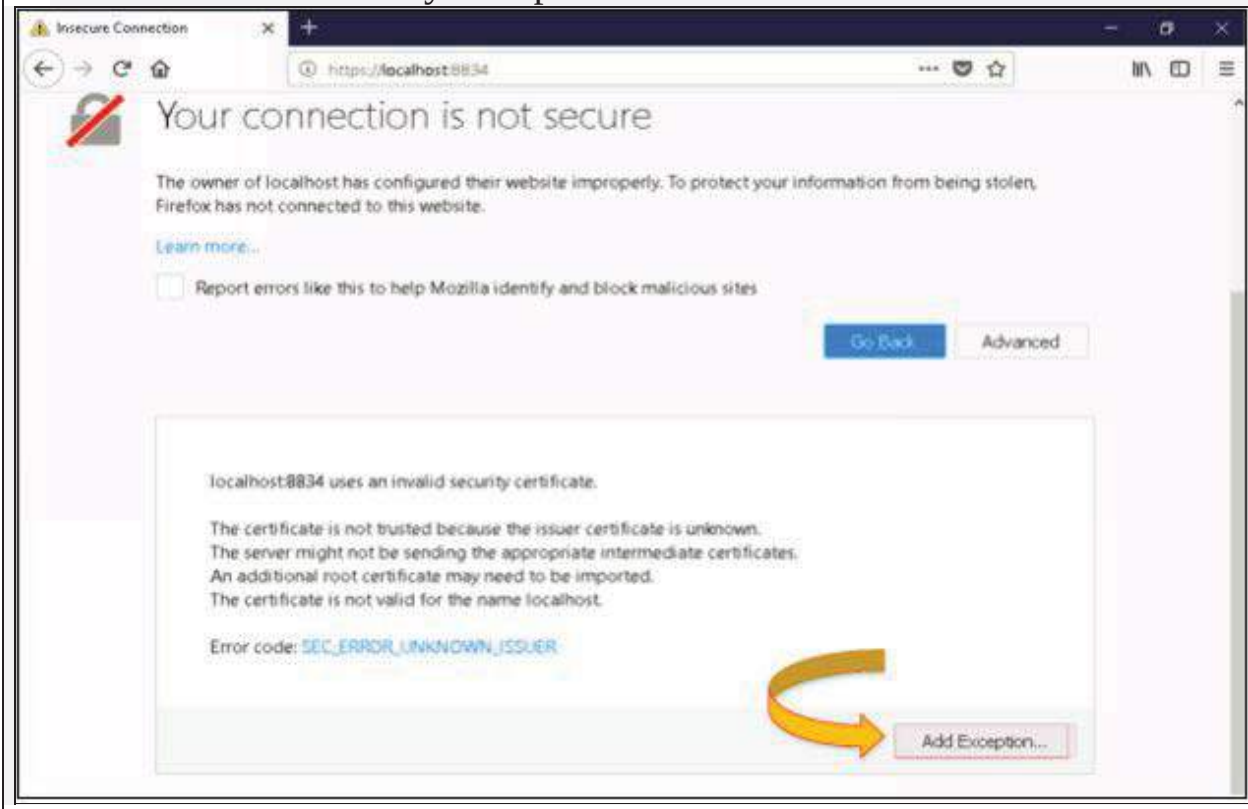
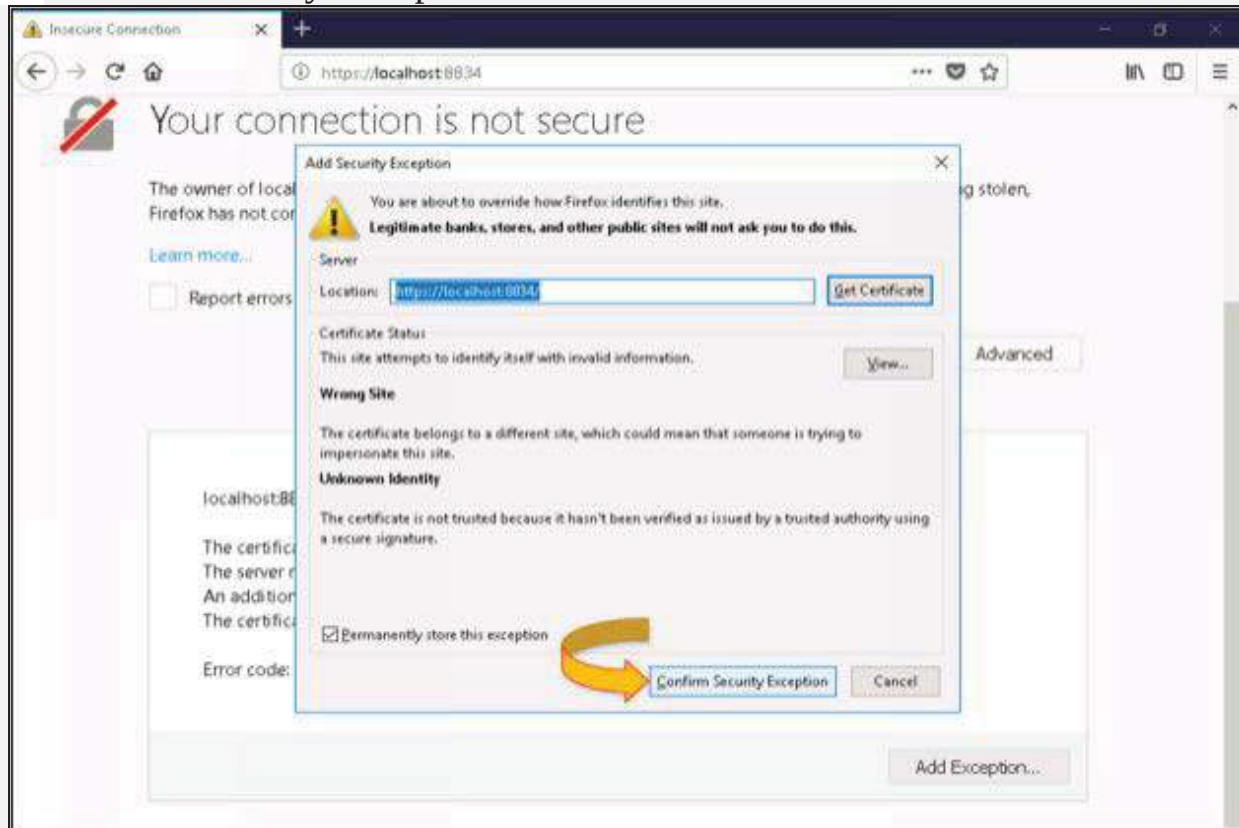


Figure 5-10 Add Security Exception

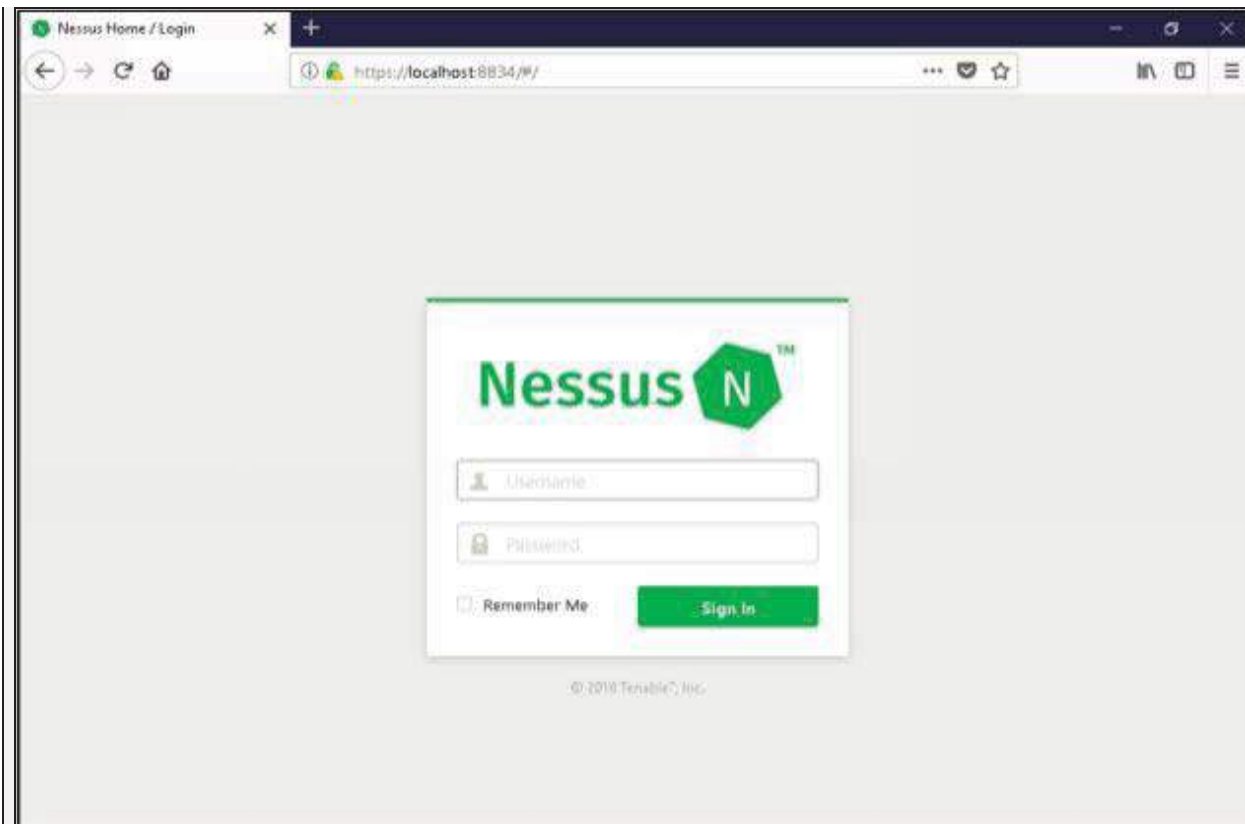


Figure 5-12 Nessus Login Page

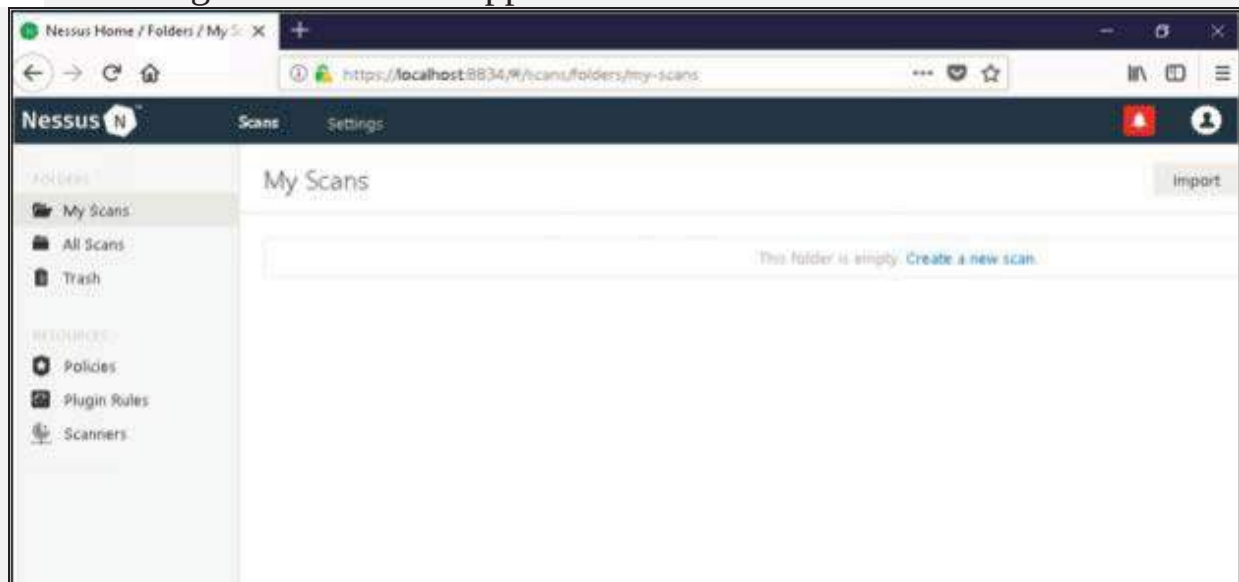


Figure 5-13 Nessus Dashboard

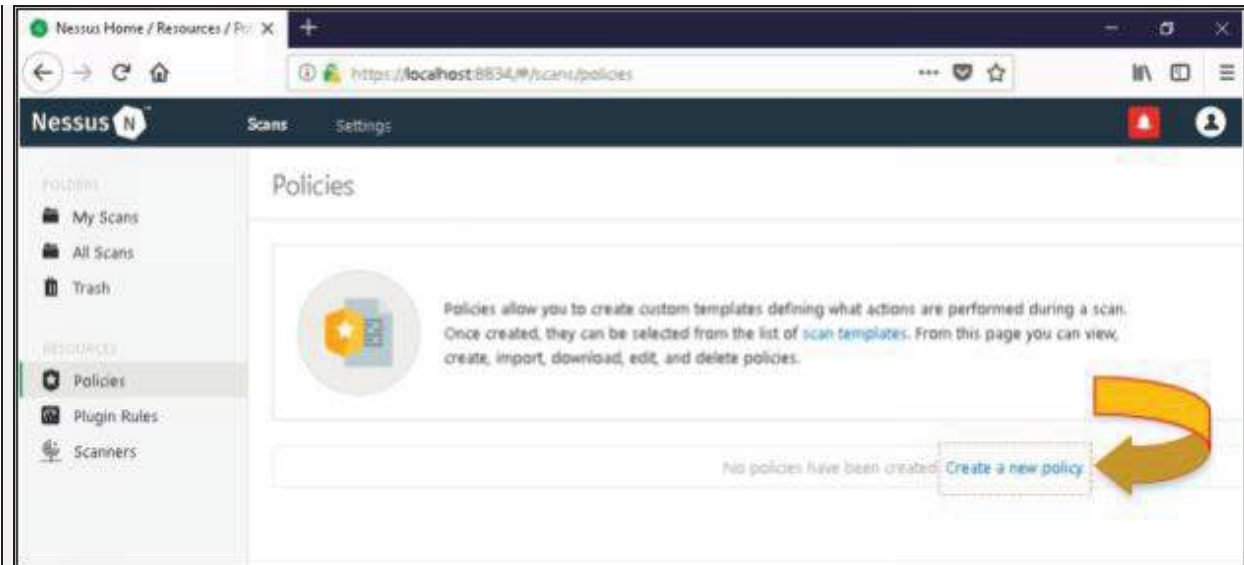


Figure 5-14 Create new policy

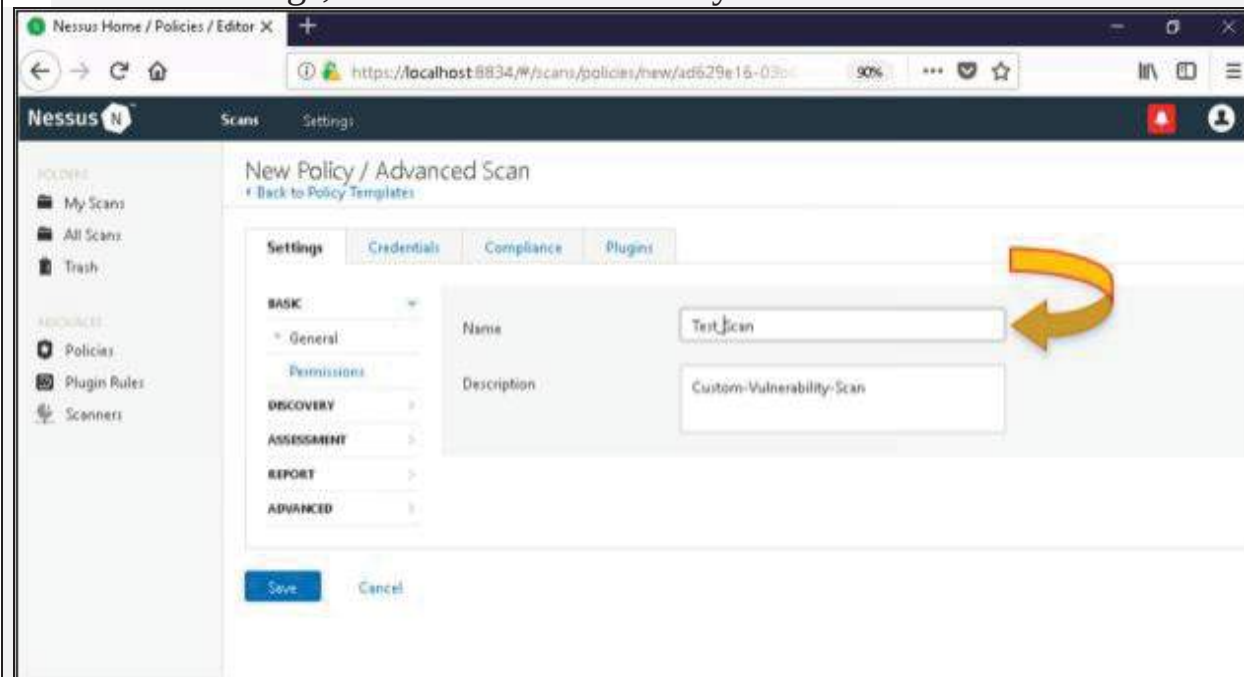


Figure 5-15 Configuring Policy

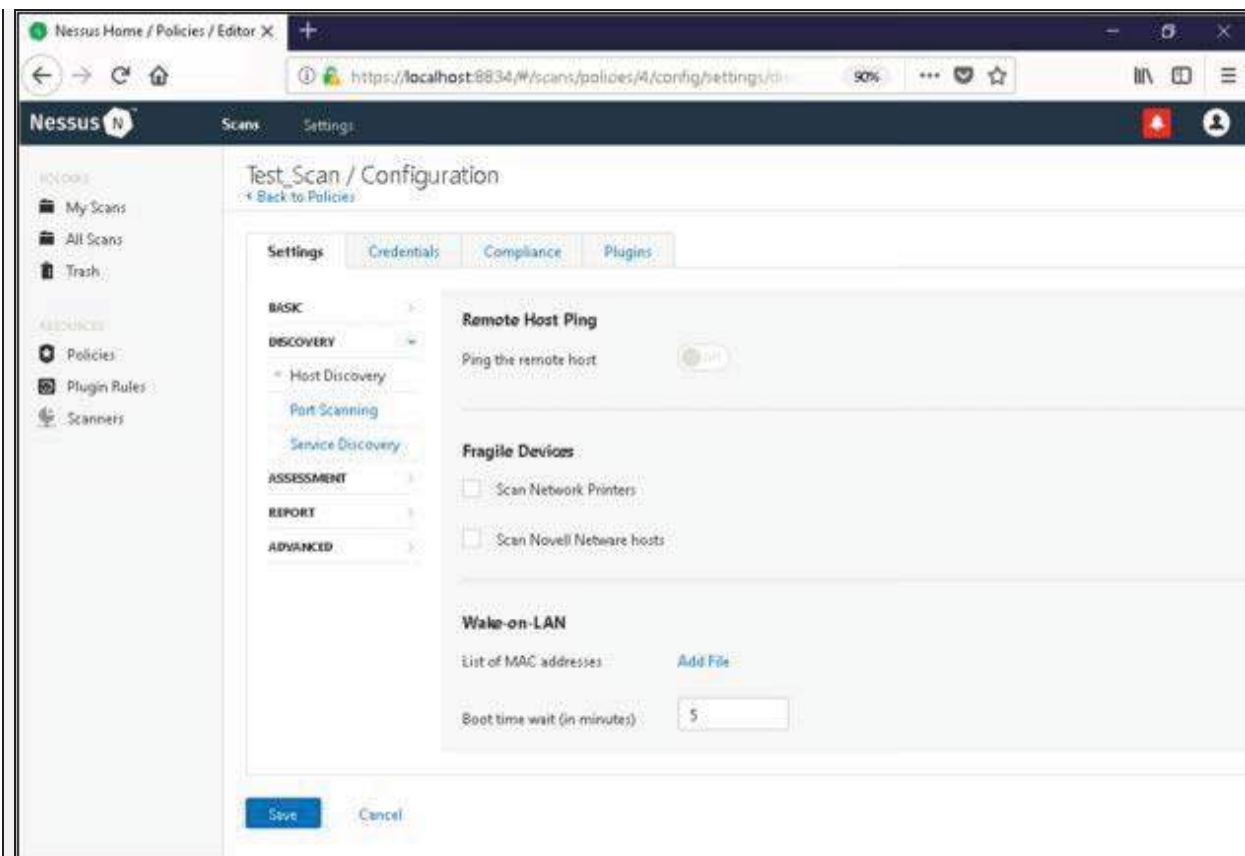


Figure 5-16 Configuring Policy

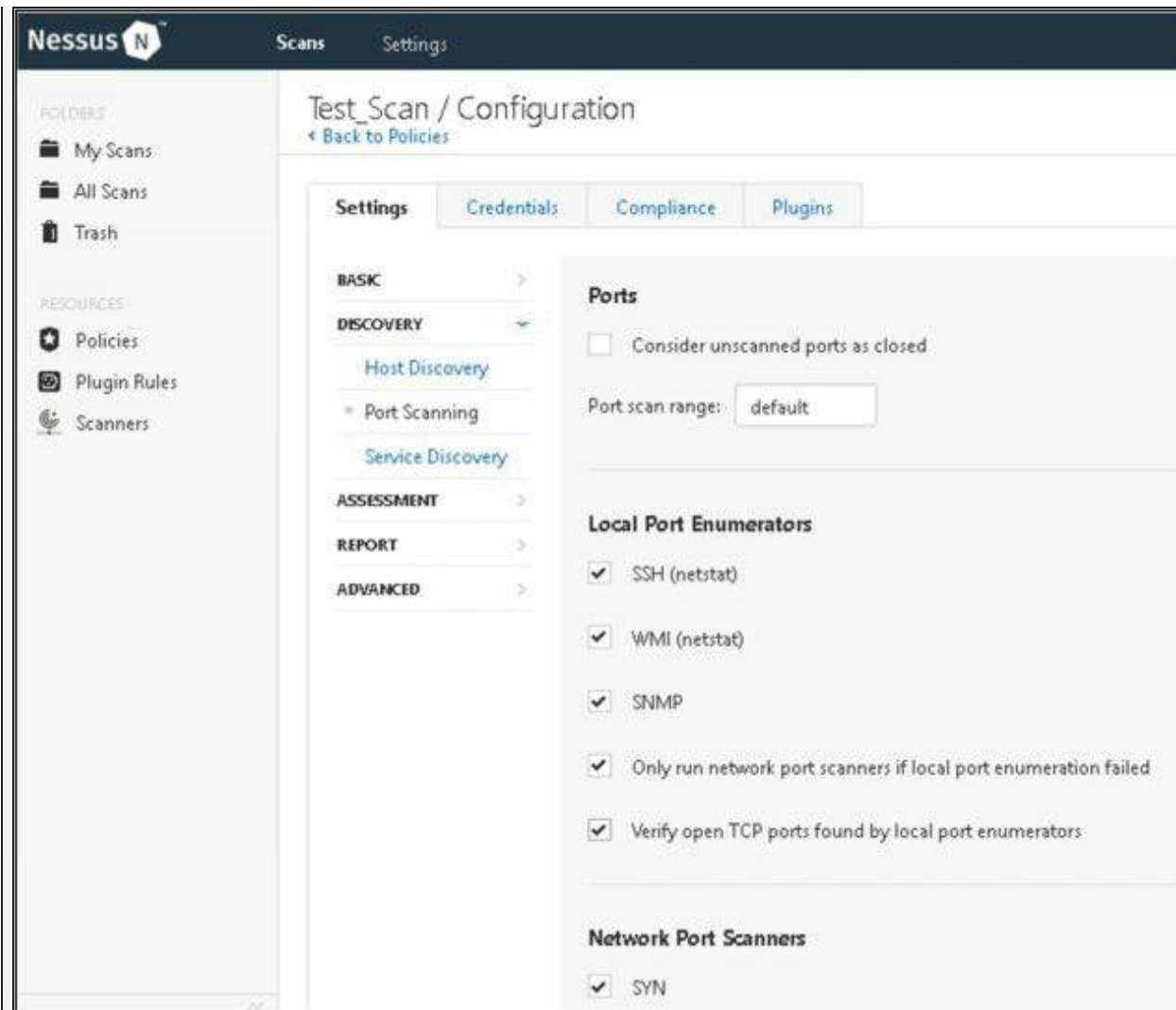


Figure 5-17 Configuring Policy

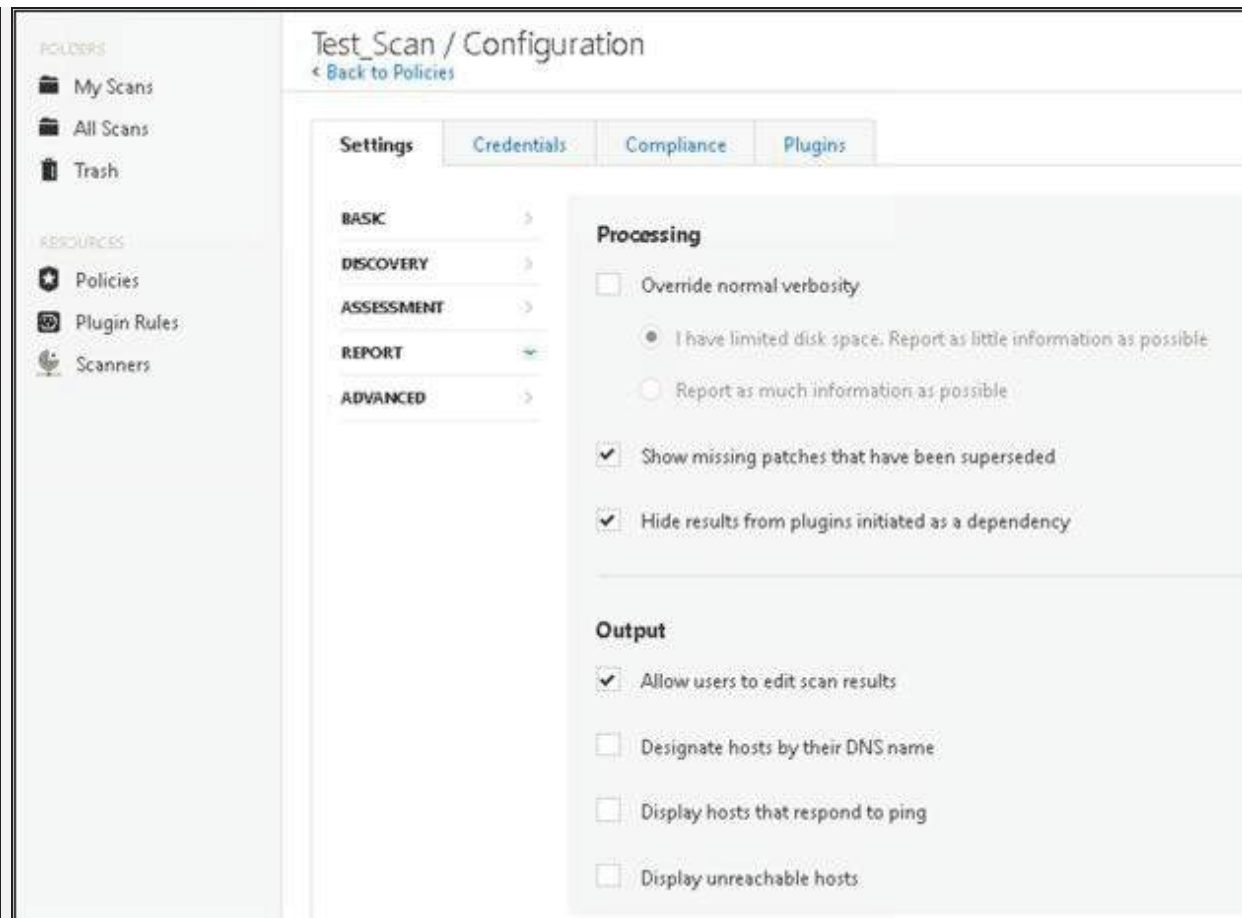


Figure 5-18 Configuring Policy

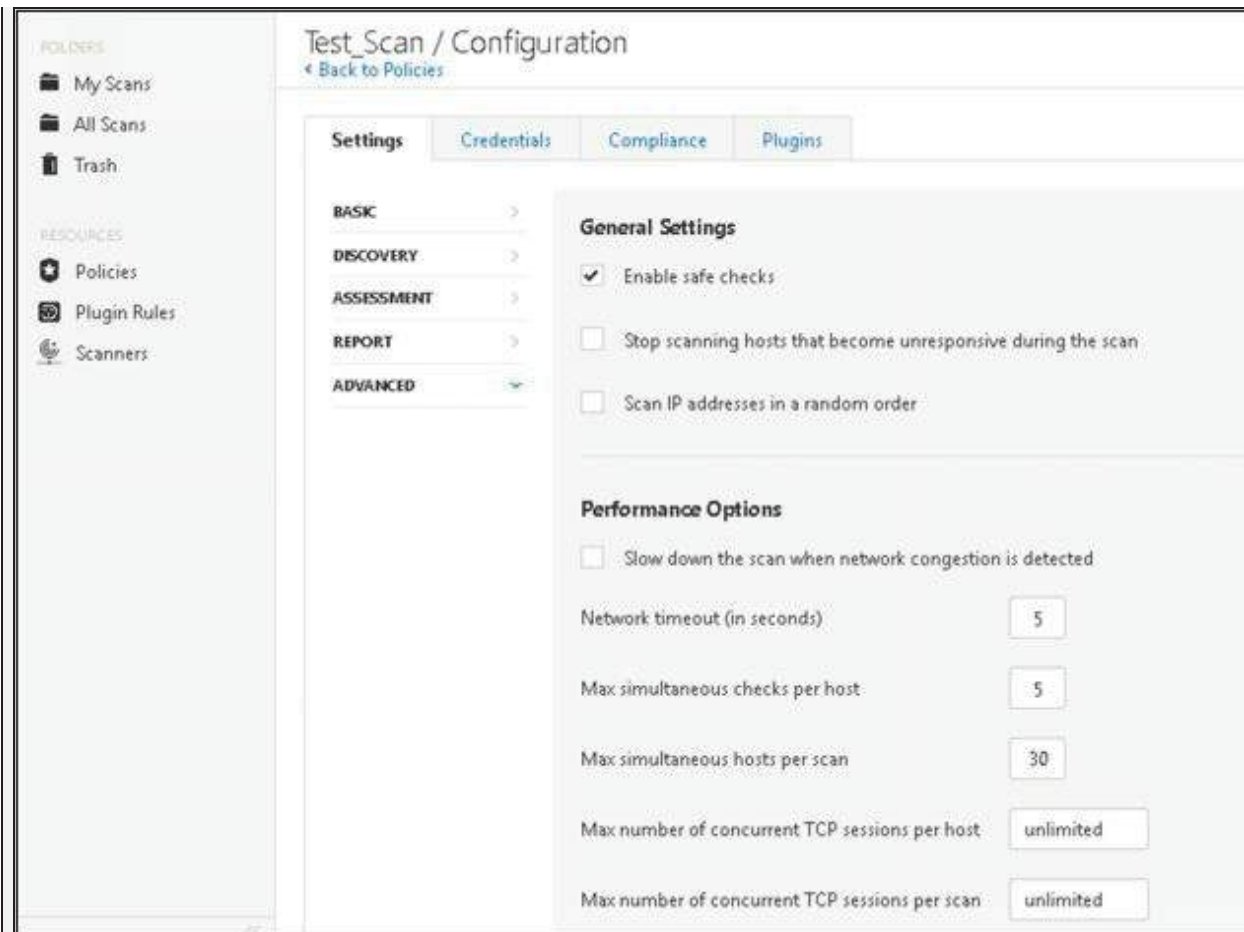


Figure 5-19 Configuring Policy

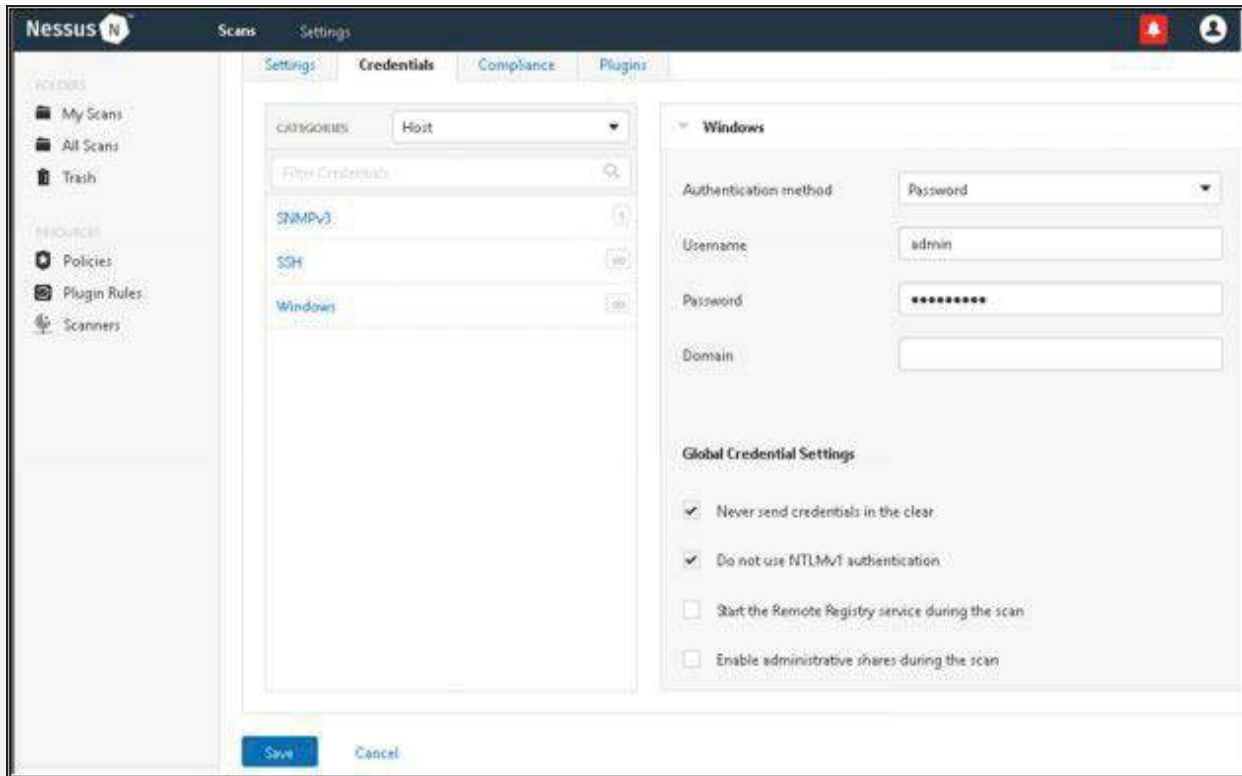


Figure 5-20 Configuring Policy

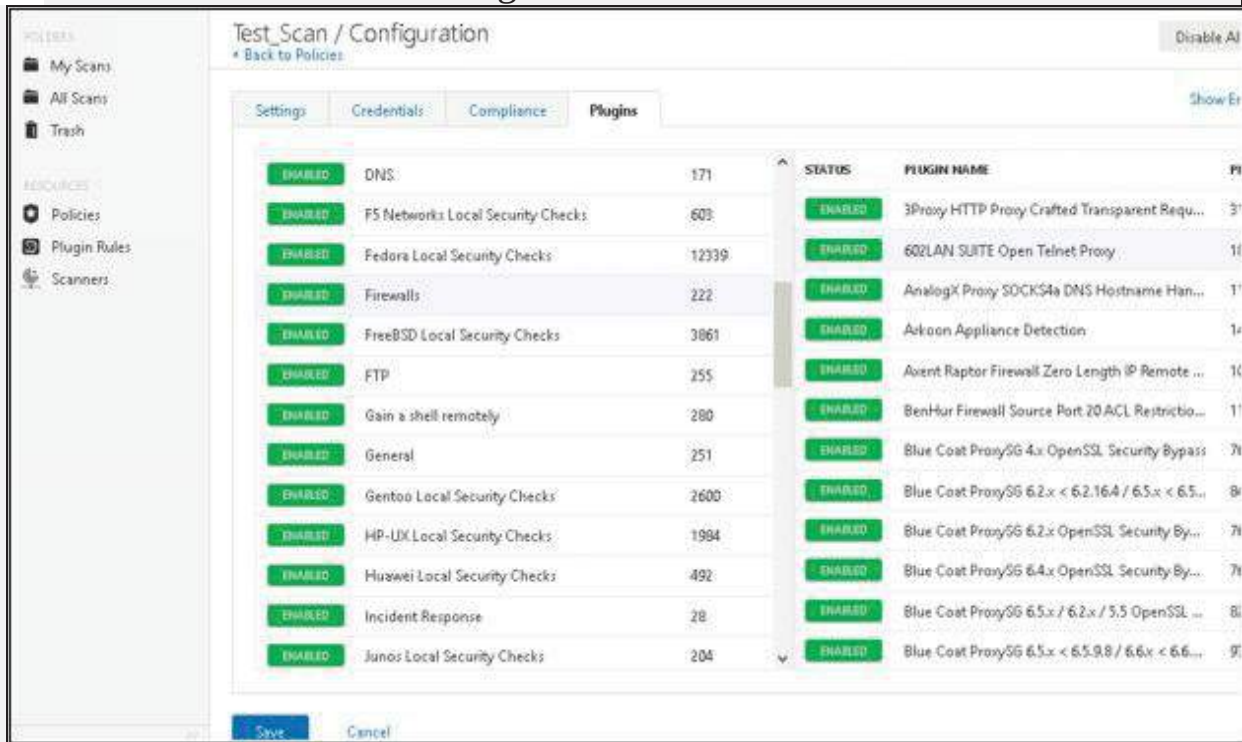


Figure 5-21 Configuring Policy

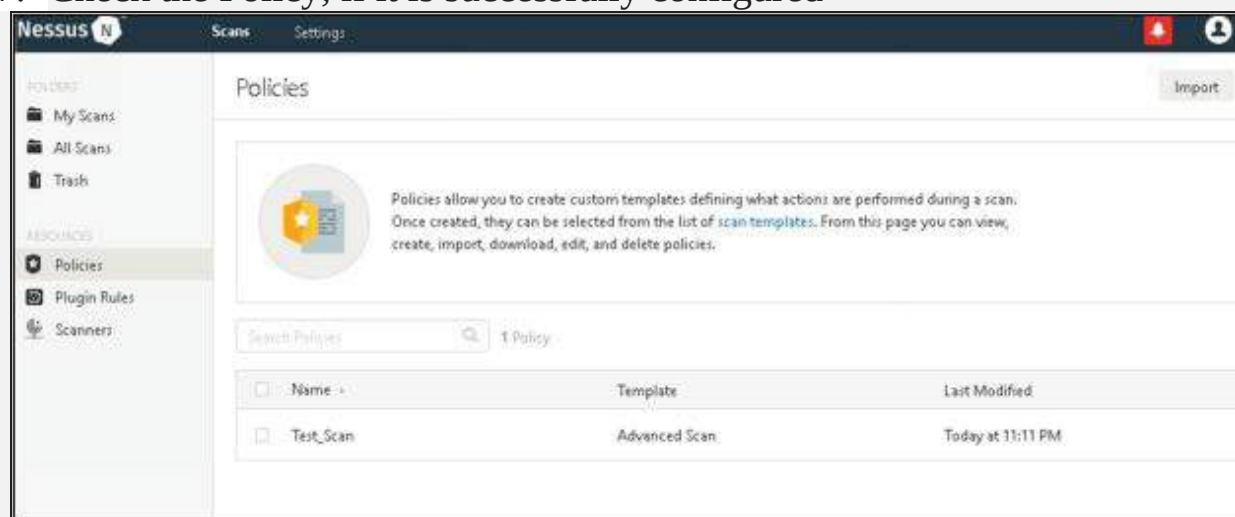


Figure 5-22 Verify Policy

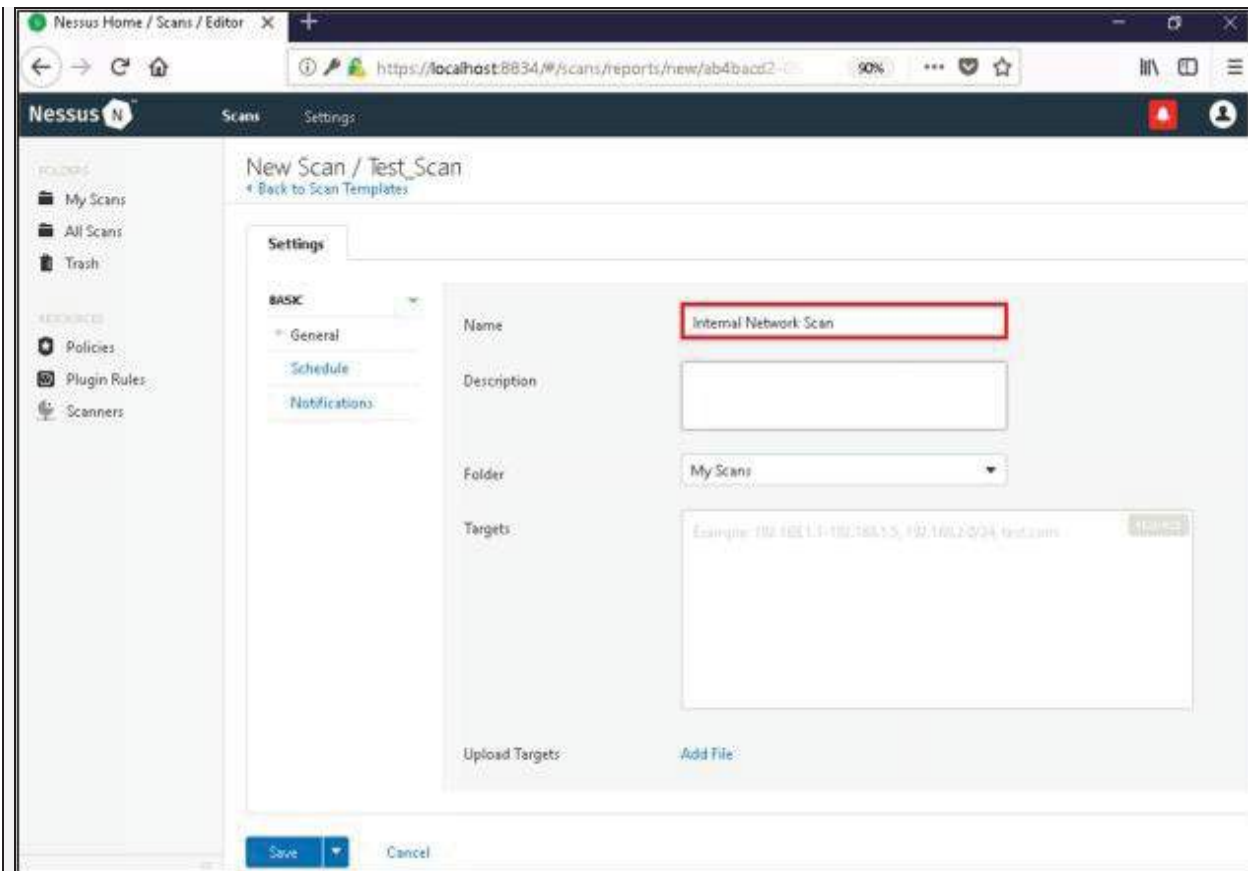


Figure 5-24 Configuring Scan

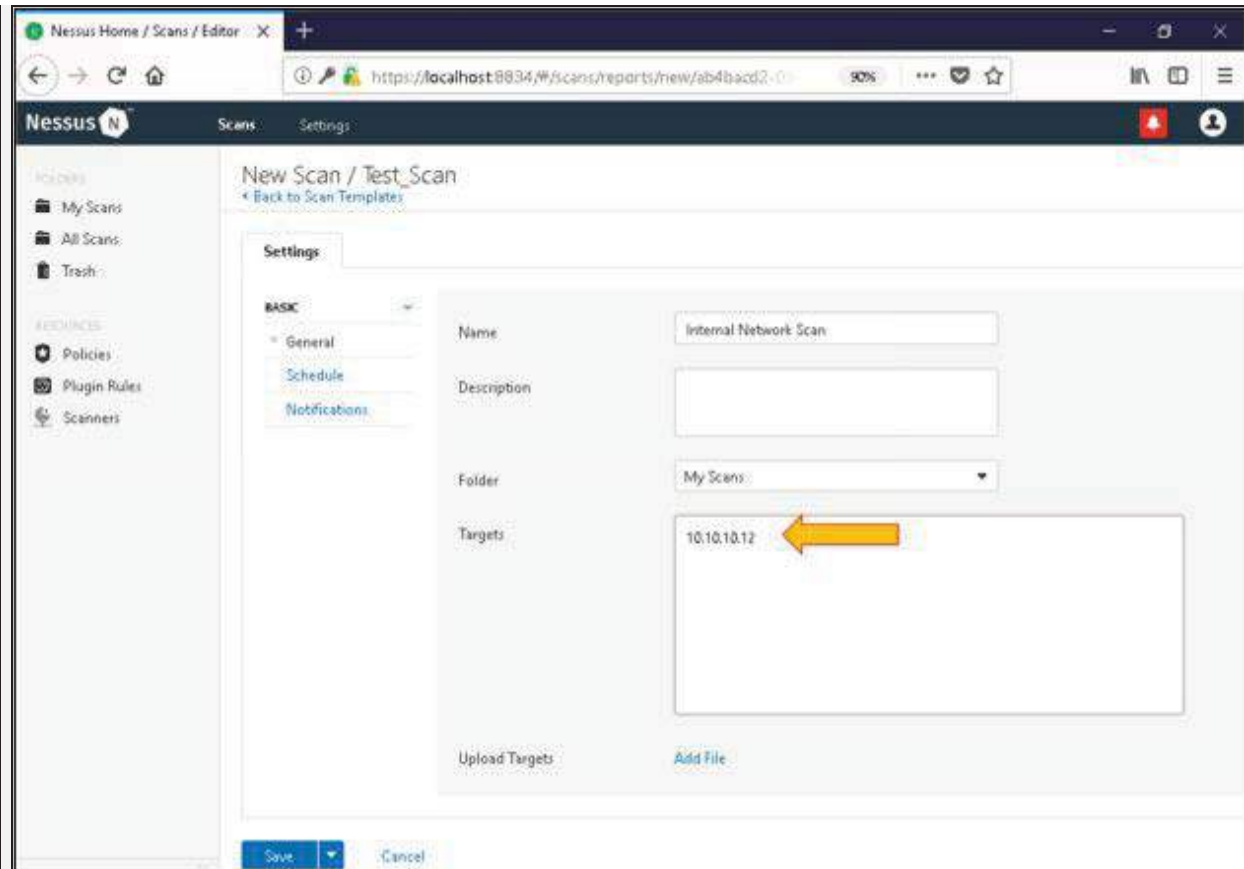


Figure 5-25 Configuring Scan

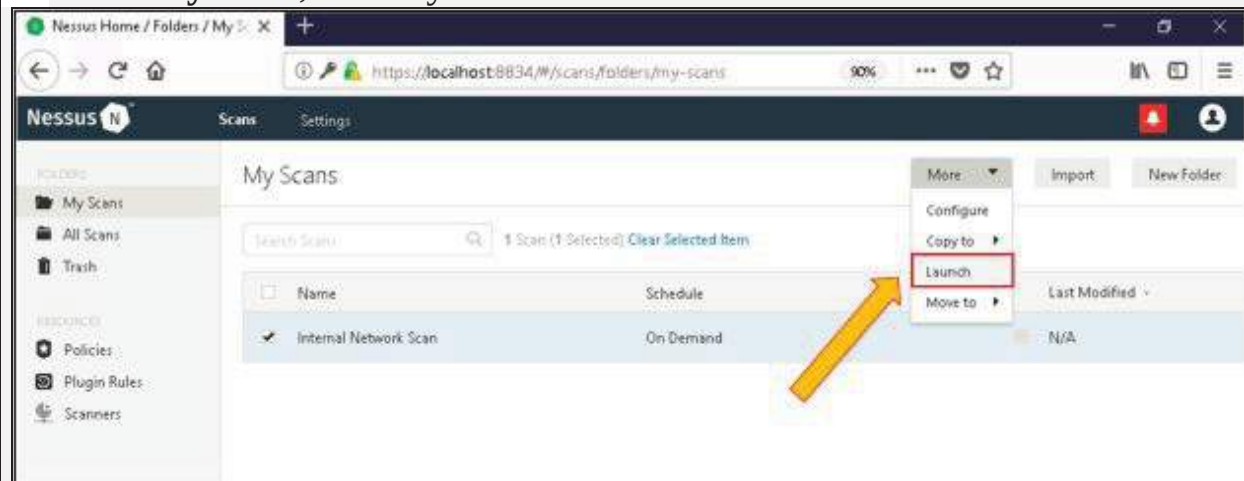


Figure 5-26 Launching Scan

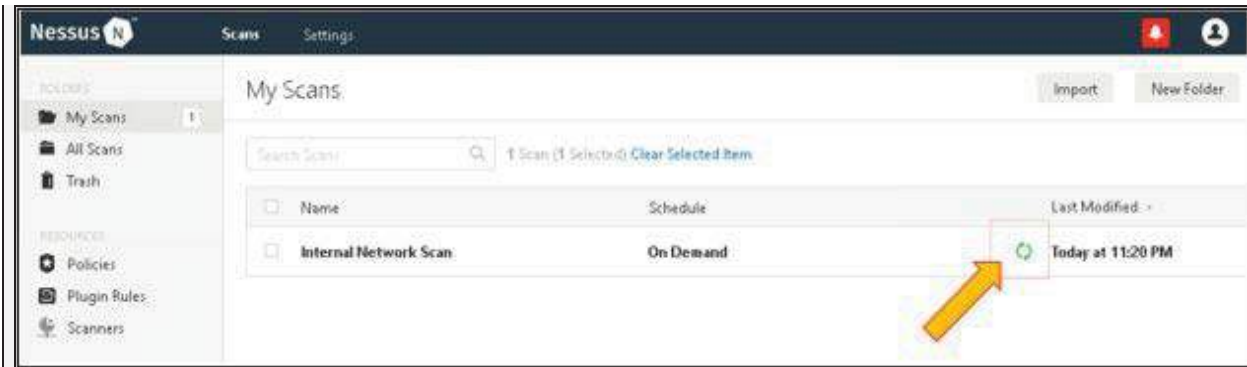


Figure 5-27 Scanning

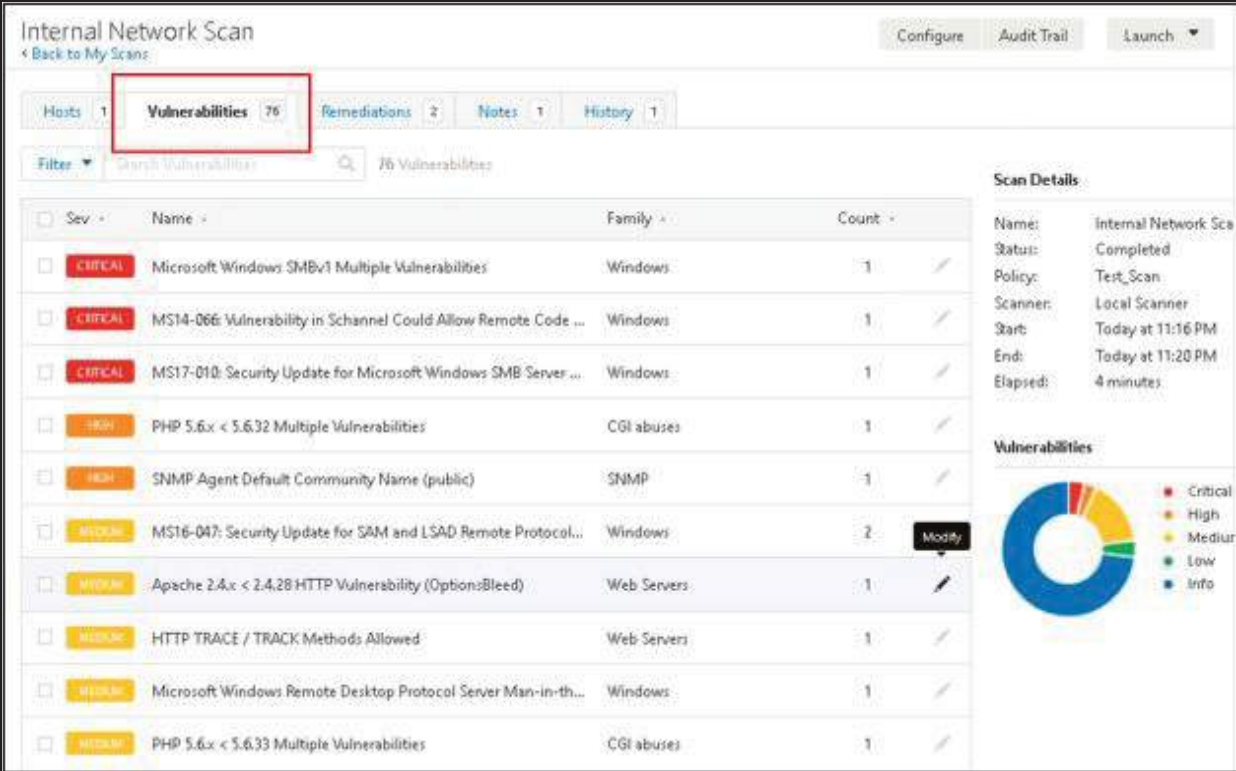


Figure 5-29 Scan results

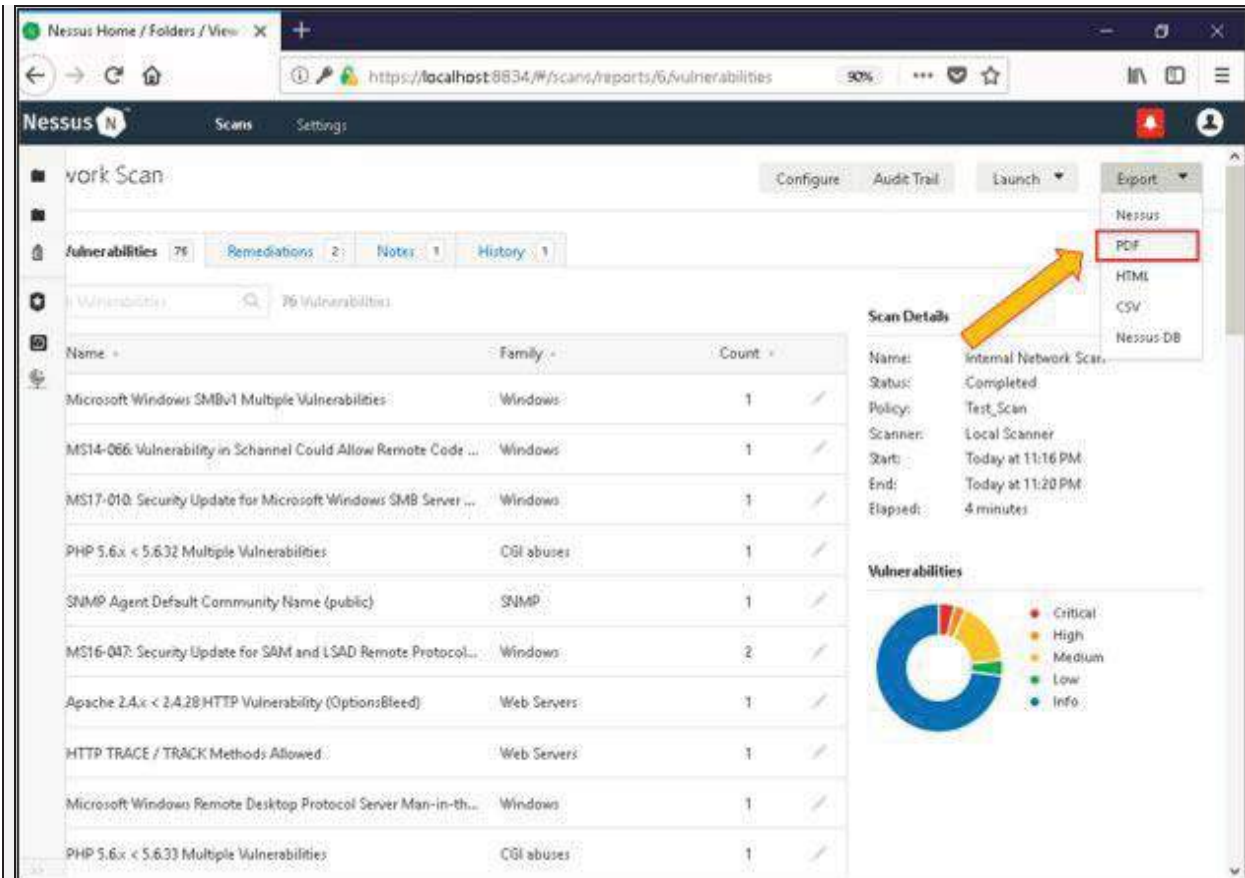


Figure 5-30 Scan results

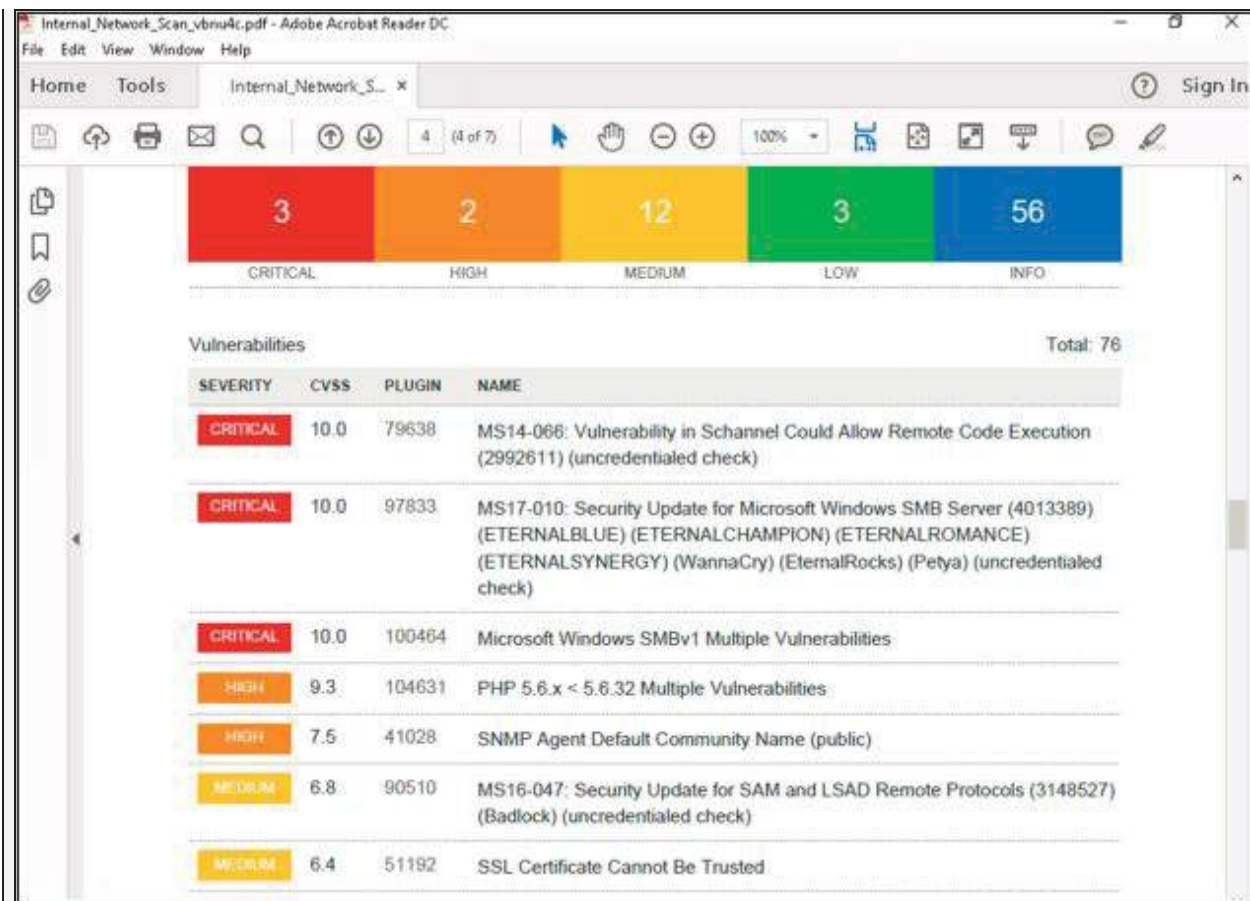


Figure 5-31 Scan results

Technology Brief

With the information extracted using the previously explained techniques and phases of penetration including footprinting, scanning, and enumeration, now you can proceed to the next level: System hacking. All information extracted so far are focused toward the target, now using this collection of information, we are moving forward to access the system.

Summarizing the information collected in previous phases, such as a list of valid Usernames, Email addresses, passwords, groups, IP range, operating system, hardware and software version, shares, protocols and services information, and other details. Depending upon the collection of information, the attacker will have a more precise image of the target.

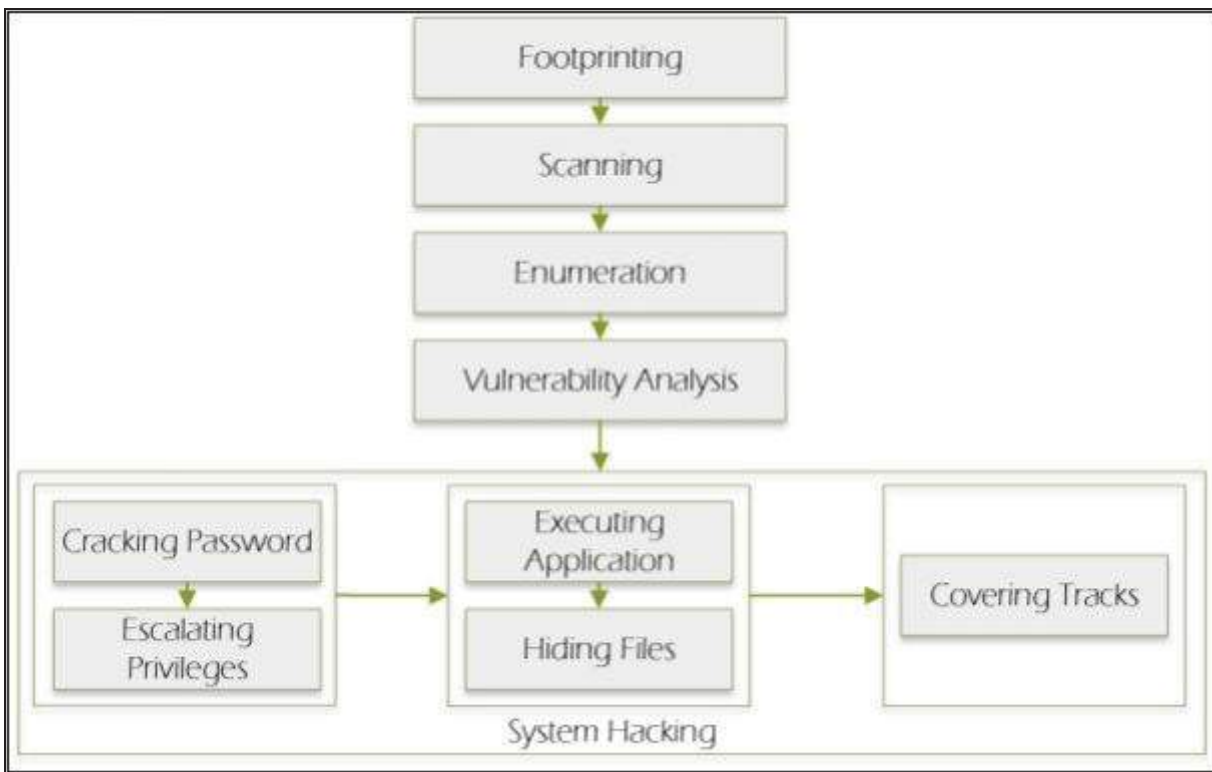


Figure 6-01 System Hacking

System Hacking

After gaining the information from previous phases, now proceed to system hacking phase. The process of system hacking is much difficult and complex than previous ones.

Before starting the system hacking phase, an ethical hacker, or pentester must remember that you cannot gain access to the target system in a go. You must have to wait for what you want, deeply observe and struggle; then you will find some results.

System Hacking Methodology

The process of System hacking is classified into some System hacking methods. These methods are also termed as CEH hacking methodology by EC-Council. This methodology includes: -

1. Cracking passwords
2. Escalating privileges
3. Executing applications
4. Hiding files
5. Covering tracks

Goals of System hacking

In the methodological approach of System hacking, bypassing the access control and policies by password cracking or social engineering attacks will lead to gain access to the system. Using the operating system information, it helps to exploit the known vulnerabilities of an operating system to escalate the privileges. Once you have gained access to the system and acquire the rights and privileges, by executing an application such as Trojans, backdoors, and spyware, an attacker can create a backdoor to maintain the remote access to the target system. Now, to steal actual information, data or any other asset of an organization, the attacker needs to hide its malicious activities. Rootkits and steganography are the most common techniques to hide malicious activities. Once an attacker steals the information and remains undetected, the last phase of system hacking ensures to be undetected by hiding the evidence of compromises by modifying or clearing the logs.

Password Cracking

Before proceeding to Password Cracking, you should know about three types

of authentication factors:

- **Something I have**, like username and password.
- **Something I am**, like biometrics
- **Something I possess**, like registered / allowed devices

Password Cracking is the method of extracting the password to gain authorized access to the target system in the guise of a legitimate user. Usually, only the username and password authentication are configured but now, password authentication is moving toward two-factor authentication or multiple-factor authentication which includes something you have such as username and password with the biometrics. Password cracking may be performed by social engineering attack or cracking through tempering the communication and stealing the stored information. Guessable password, short password, password with weak encryption, a password only containing numbers or alphabets can be cracked with ease. Having a strong lengthy and difficult password is always an offensive line of defense against these cracking attacks. Typically, a good password contains: -

- Case Sensitive letters
- Special characters
- Numbers
- lengthy password (typically more than 8 letters)

Types of Password Attacks

Password Attacks are classified into the following types: -

1. Non-Electronic Attacks
2. Active Online Attacks
3. Passive Online Attacks
4. Default Password
5. Offline Attack

1. Non-Electronic Attacks

Non-Electronic attacks or Nontechnical Attacks are the attacks which do not require any type of technical understanding and knowledge. This is the type of attack that can be done by shoulder surfing, social engineering, and dumpster diving. For example, gathering username and password information by standing behind a target when he is logging in, interacting

with sensitive information or else. By Shoulder surfing, passwords, account numbers, or other secret information can be gathered depending upon the carelessness of the target.

2. Active Online Attacks

Active Online Attack includes different techniques that directly interact with the target for cracking the password. Active Online attacks include: -

1. *Dictionary Attack*

In the Dictionary attack to perform password cracking, a password cracking application is used along with a dictionary file. This dictionary file contains entire dictionary or list of known and common words to attempt password recovery. This is the simplest type of password cracking, and usually, systems are not vulnerable to dictionary attacks if they use strong, unique and alphanumeric passwords.

2. *Brute Force Attack*

Brute Force attack attempt to recover the password by trying every possible combination of characters. Each combination pattern is attempted until the password is accepted. Brute forcing is the common, and basic technique to uncover password.

3. *Hash Injection*

In the Hash injection attack, hashing and other cryptography techniques knowledge is required. In this type of attack,

- a. The attacker needs to extract users log on hashes, stores in Security Account Manager (SAM) file.
- b. By compromising a workstation, or a server by exploiting the vulnerabilities, attacker gain access to the machine.
- c. Once it compromises the machine, it extracted the log-on hashes of valuable users and admins.
- d. With the help of these extracted hashes, attacker logged on to the server like domain controller to exploit more accounts.

3. Passive Online Attacks

Passive online attacks are performed without interfering with the target. Importance of these attacks is because of extraction of the password without revealing the information as it obtains password without directly probing the target. The most common types of Passive Online Attacks are:

- **Wire Sniffing**

Wire Sniffing, packet Sniffing is a process of sniffing the packet using packet sniffing tools within a Local Area Network (LAN). By inspecting the Captured packets, sensitive information and password such as Telnet, FTP, SMTP, rlogin credentials can be extracted. There are different sniffing tools available which can collect the packets flowing across the LAN, independent of the type of information carrying. Some sniffers offer to filter to catch only certain types of packets.

- **Man-in-the-Middle Attack**

A man-in-the-middle attack is the type of attack in which attacker involves himself into the communication between other nodes. MITM attack can be explained as a user communicating with another user, or server and attacker insert himself in between the conversation by sniffing the packets and generating MITM or Replay traffic. The following are some utilities available for attempting Man-in-the-middle (MITM) attacks:

- SSL Strip
- Burp Suite
- Browser Exploitation Framework (BeEF)

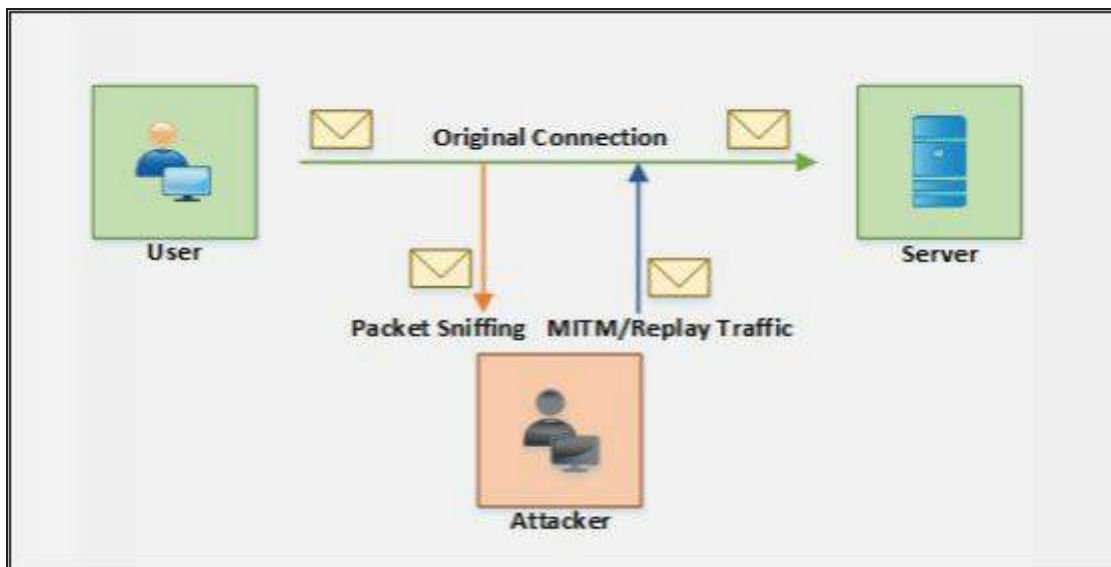


Figure 6-02 MITM Attack

- ***Replay Attack***

In a Replay attack, Attacker capture packets using a packet sniffer tools. Once packets are captured, relevant information such as passwords is extracted. By generating replay traffic with the injection of extracted information, attacker gain access to the system

4. Default Password

Every new equipment is configured with a default password by the manufactures. It is recommended to change the default password to a unique, secret set of characters. An attacker using default passwords by searching through the official website of device manufacturer or through online tools for searching default passwords can attempt this type of attack. The following are the list of online tools available for searching default password.

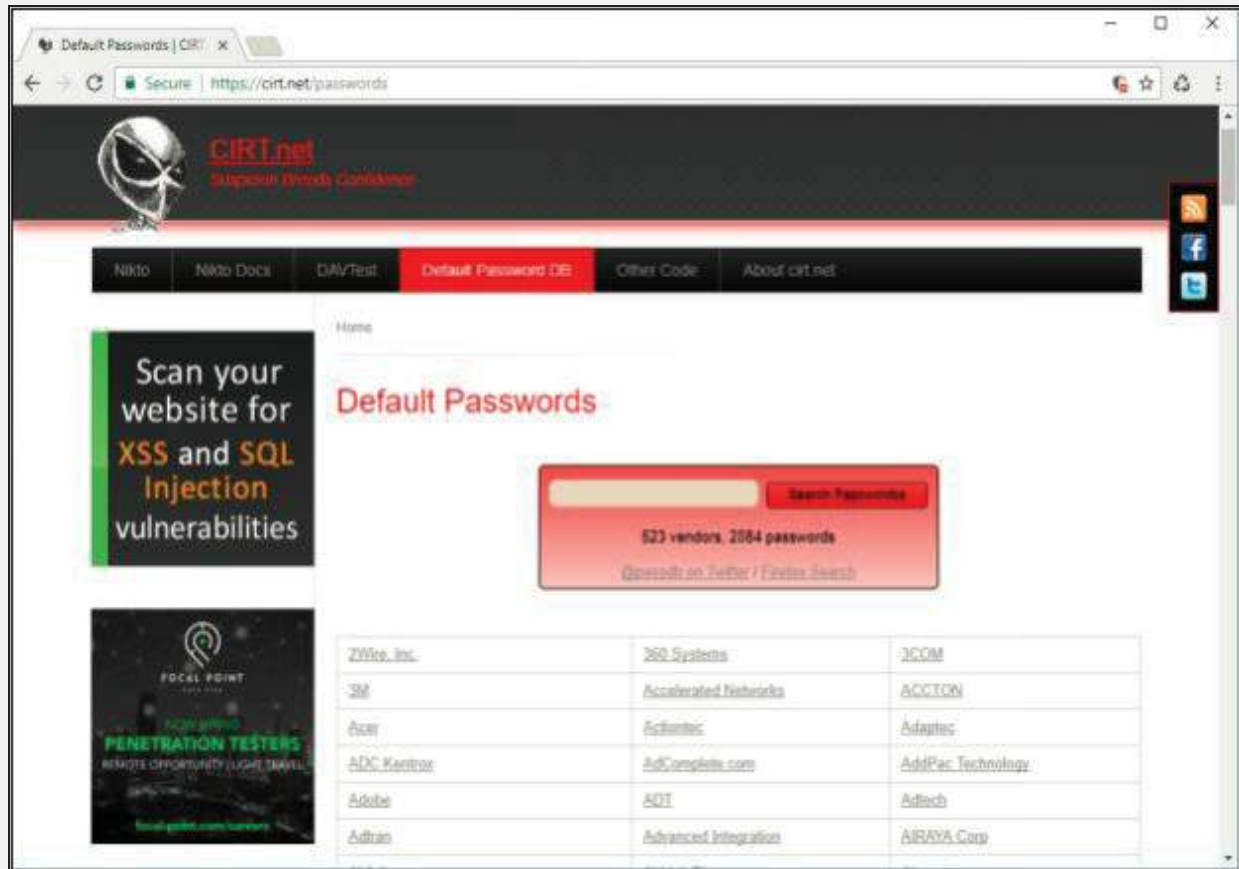


Figure 6-03 Online tool for the default password

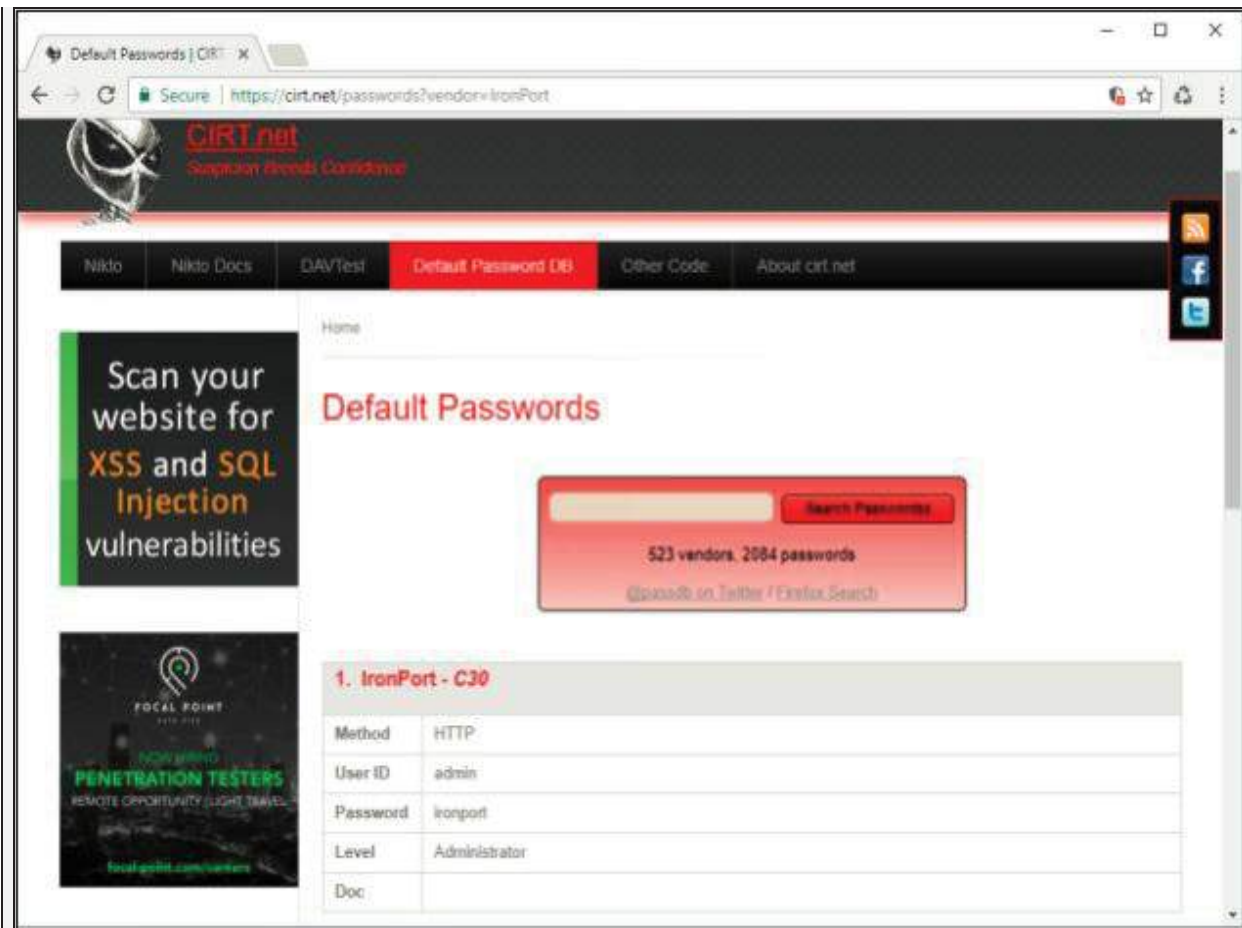


Figure 6-04 Online tool for the default password

5. Offline Attacks

- **Pre-Computed hashes and Rainbow Table**

An example of offline attacks is comparing the password using a rainbow table. Every possible combination of character is computed for the hash to create a rainbow table. When a rainbow table contains all possible precomputed hashes, attacker captures the password hash of target and compares it with the rainbow table. The advantage of Rainbow table is all hashes are precomputed. Hence it took few moments to compare and reveal the password. Limitation of a rainbow table is it takes a long time to create a rainbow table by computing all hashes.

To generate rainbow tables. Utilities you can use to perform this task

are **winrtgen**, a GUI-based generator, and **rtgen**, a command line tool. Supported hashing formats are the following:

- MD2
- MD4
- MD5
- SHA1
- SHA-256
- SHA-384
- SHA-512 and other hashing formats

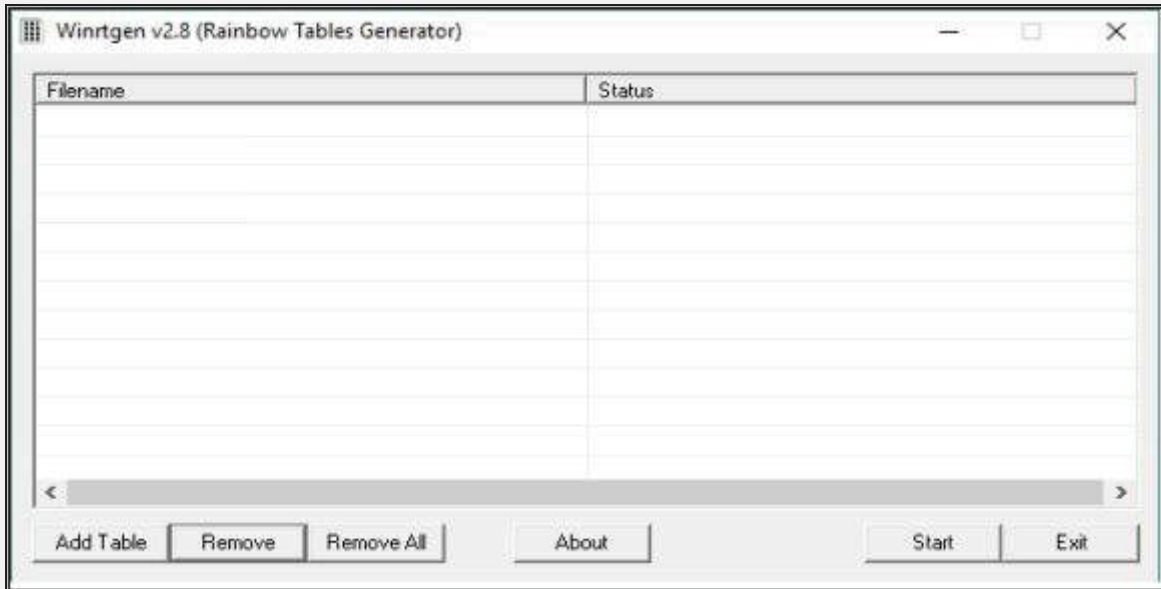


Figure 6-05 Winrtgen tool for Rainbow Table

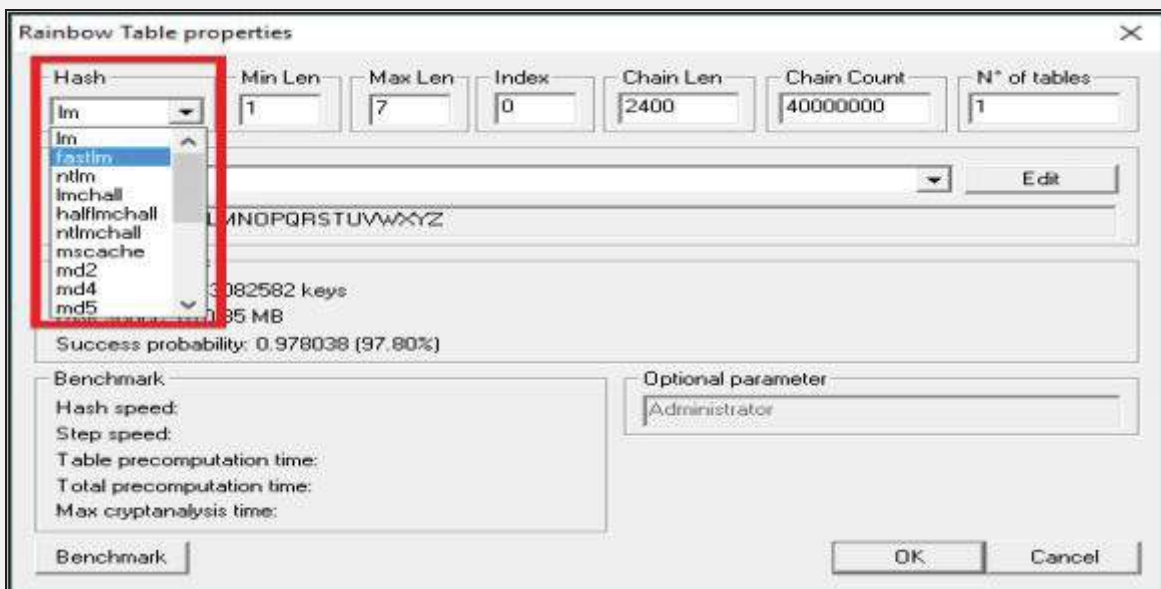


Figure 6-06 Winrtgen tool for Rainbow Table

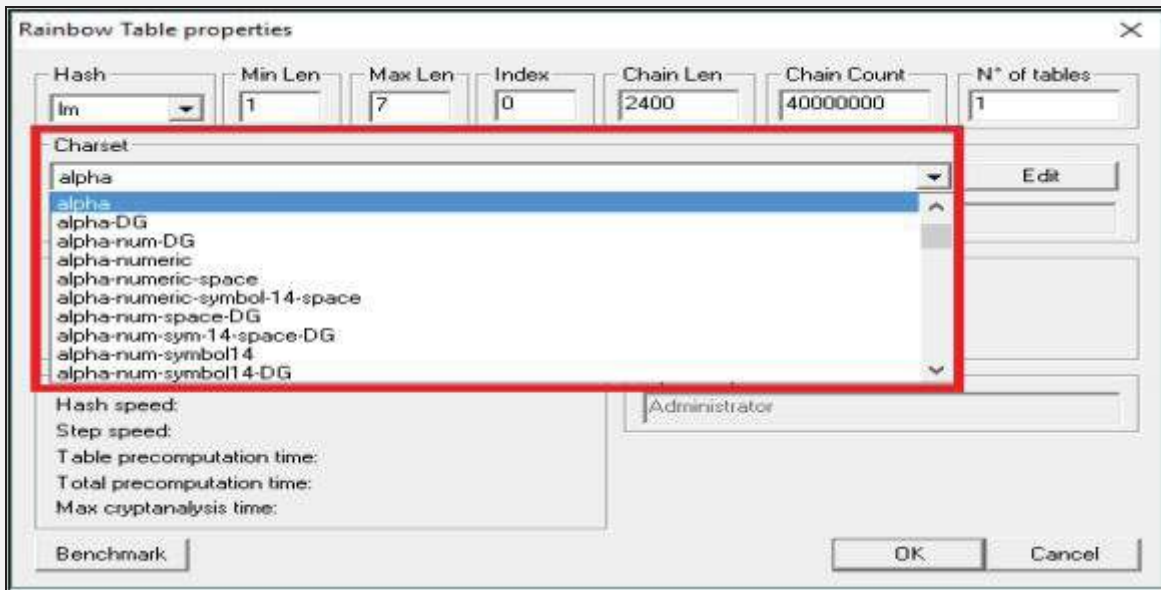




Figure 6-07 Winrtgen tool for Rainbow Table

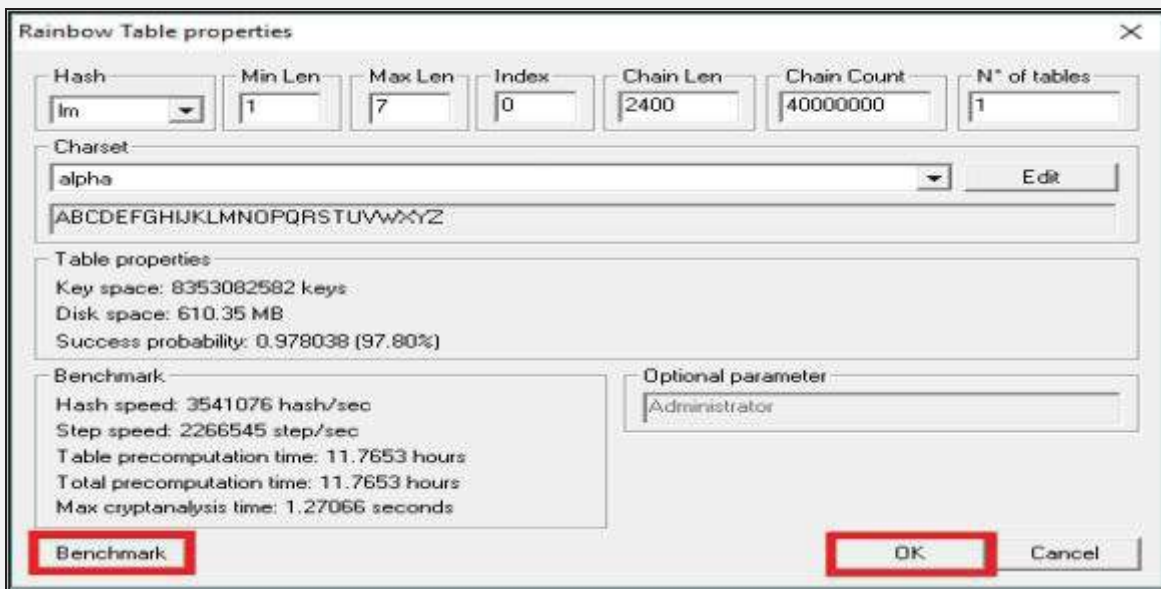


Figure 6-08 Winrtgen tool for Rainbow Table

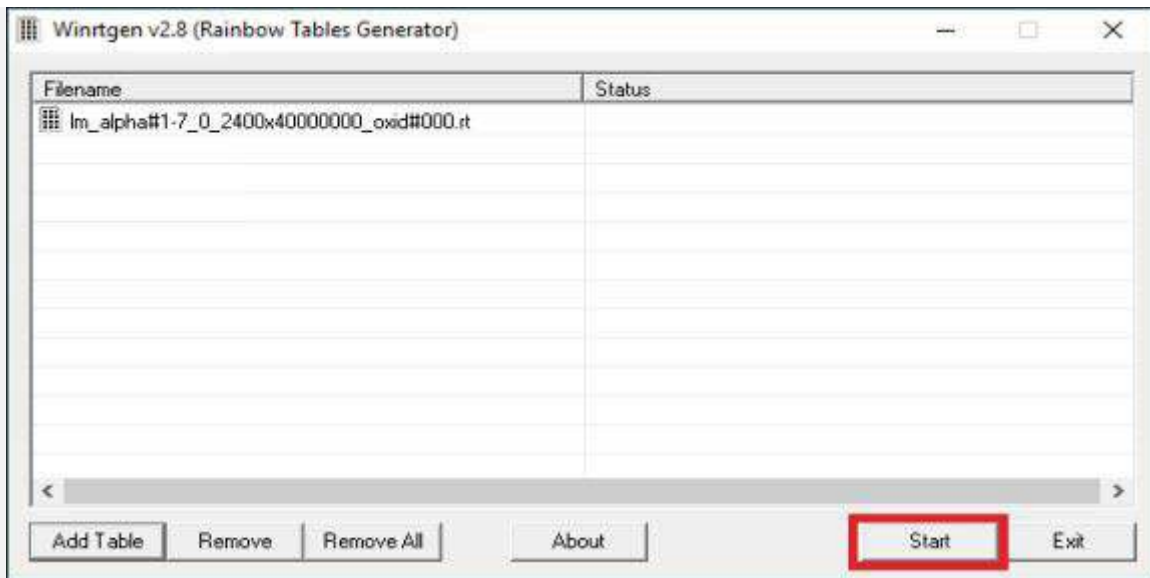


Figure 6-09 Winrtgen tool for Rainbow Table

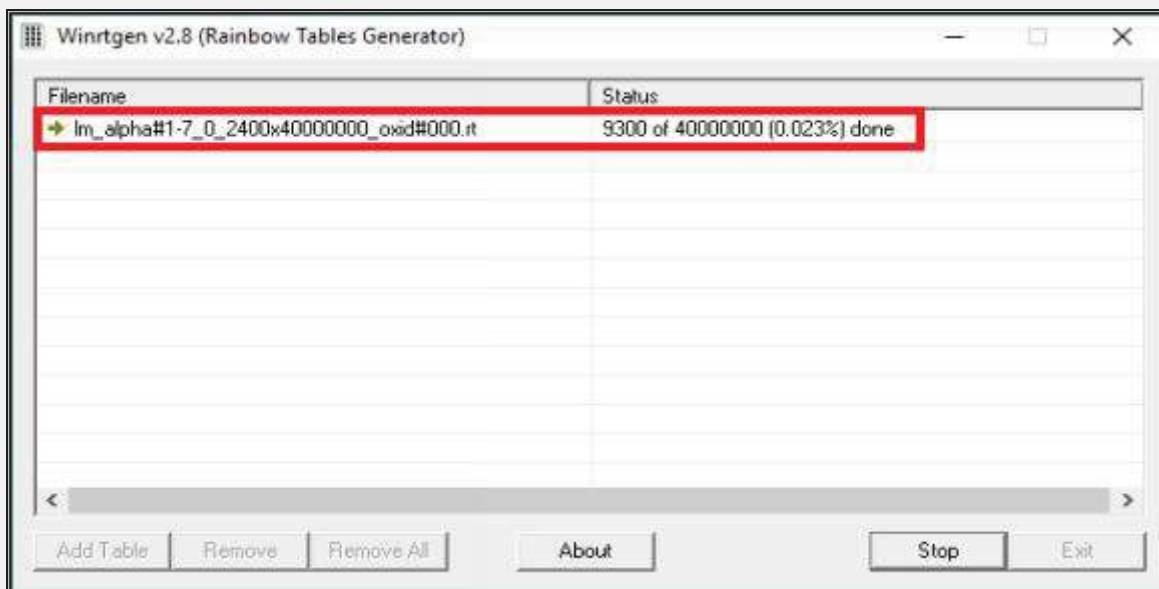


Figure 6-10 Winrtgen tool for Rainbow Table

- **Distributed Network Attack**

Distributed Network Attack (DNA) is an advanced approach to cracking the password. Using the unused processing power of machines across the network, DNA recovers the password by decrypting the hashes. Distributed Network Attack requires a DNA Manager and DNA client. DNA manager is deployed in a central location in a network across the DNA Clients. DNA manager allocates small task

over the distributed network to be computed in the background using unused resources to crack the password.

6. Password Guessing

Password guessing is the trial and error method of guessing the password. The attacker uses the information extracted by initial phases and guess the password, attempt manually for cracking the password. This type of attack is not common, and rate of failure is high because of the requirement of password policies. Normally, information collected from social engineering helps to crack the password.

7. USB Drive

In an active online attack using a USB drive, attacker plugs in a USB drive containing a password hacking tool such as " **Passview** " in it. As USB drive plugs in, Window Autorun feature allows running the application automatically if the feature is enabled. Once the application is allowing to execute, it will extract the password.

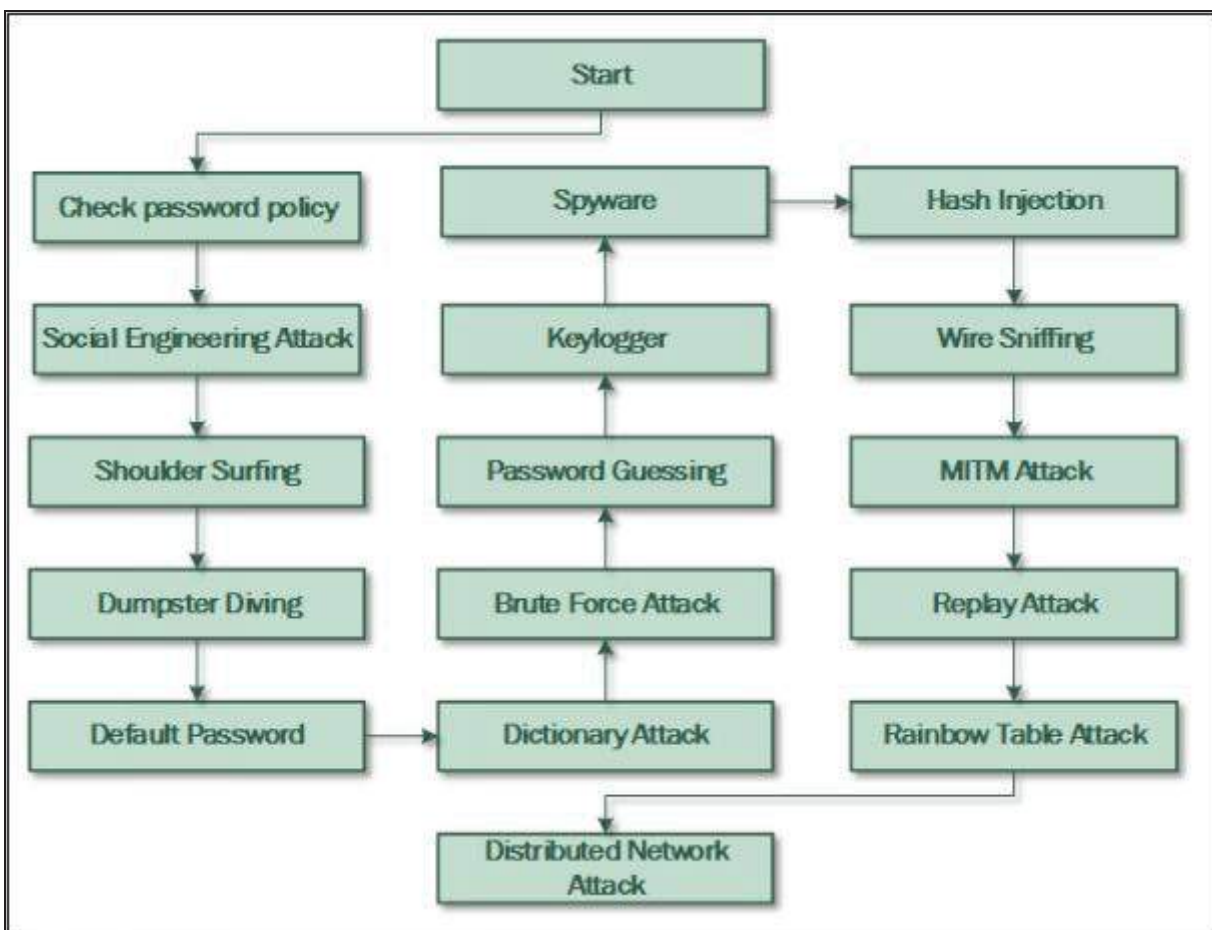


Figure 6-11 Password Cracking Flow Chart

Microsoft Authentication

In Computer networking, Authentication is a verification process to identify any user or device. When you authenticate an entity, the motive of authentication is to validate if the device is legitimate or not. When you authenticate a user, it means you are verifying the actual user against the imposter.

Within Microsoft platform, operating system implements a default set of authentication protocols, including, Kerberos, Security Account Manager (SAM), NT LAN Manager (NTLM), LM, and other authentication mechanisms. These protocols ensure the authentication of users, computers, and services.

Security Account Manager (SAM)

Security Account Manager SAM is a database that stores credentials and other account parameters such as passwords for the authentication process in a Windows Operating system. Within Microsoft platform, SAM database contains passwords in a hashed form and other account information. While the operating system is running, this database is locked to be accessed by any other service and process. There are several other security algorithms are applied to the database to secure and validate the integrity of data.

Microsoft Windows store password in LM/ NTLM hashing format. Windows XP and Later version of Windows do not store the value of LM hash, or when the value of LM hash is exceeding 14 characters, it stores blank or dummy value instead.

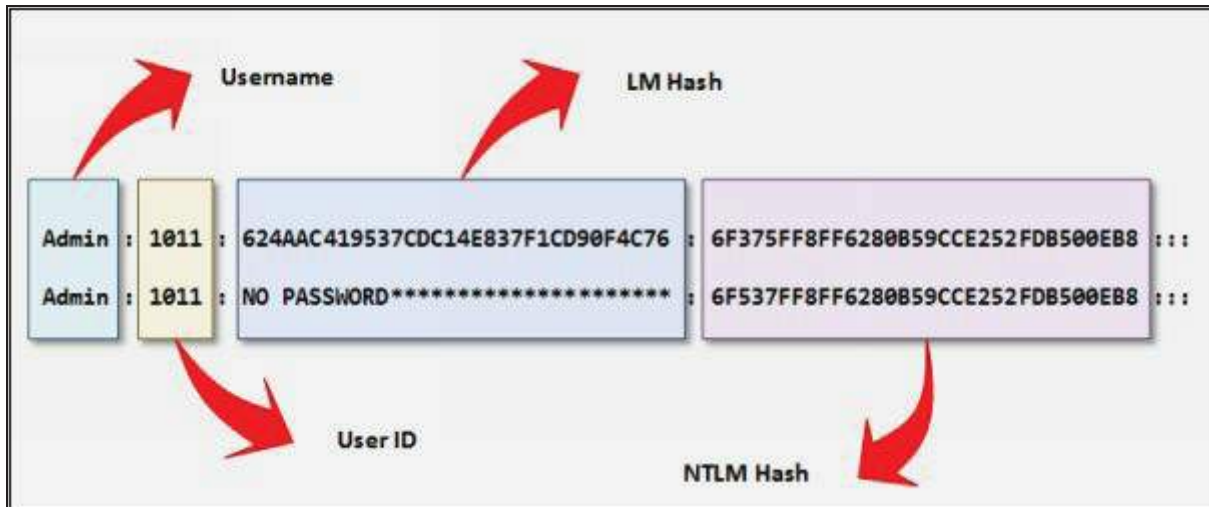


Figure 6-12 Stored hashed password in SAM File

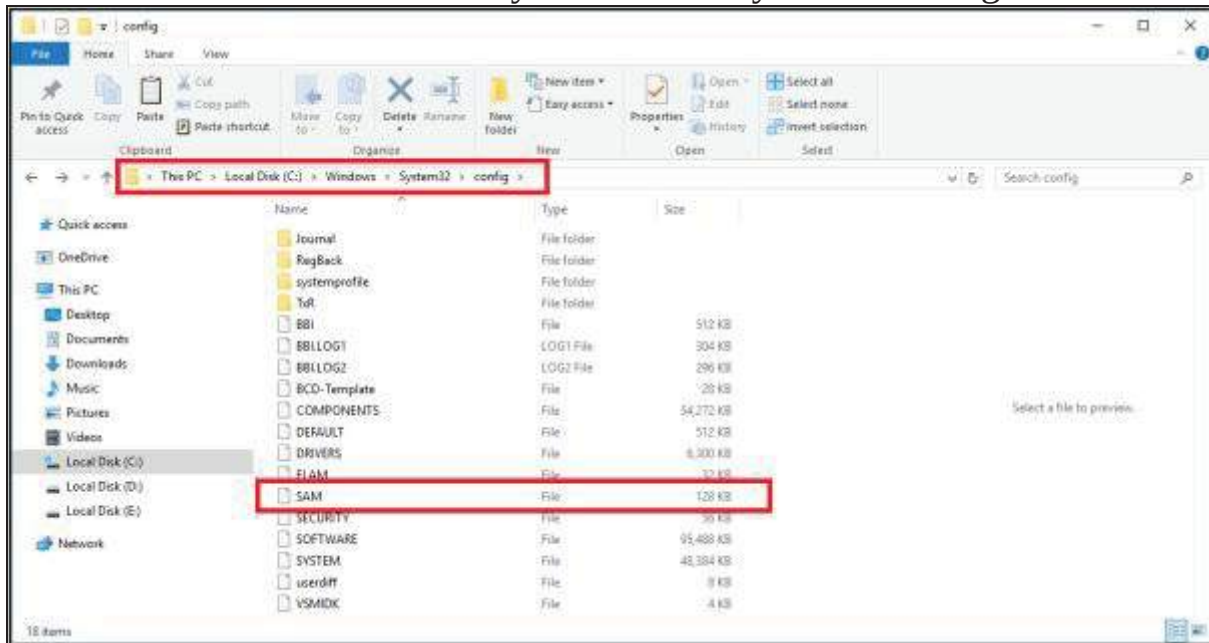


Figure 6-13 SAM File Directory

NTLM Authentication

NT Lan Manager (NTLM) is a proprietary authentication protocol by Microsoft. In the NTLM authentication process, User sends login credentials to a domain controller. Domain Controller responds to a challenge known as “**nonce**” to be encrypted by the password's hash. This challenge is a 16-byte random number generated by the domain controller. By comparing the received encrypted challenge with the database, Domain controller permit or deny the login session. Microsoft has upgraded its default authentication

mechanism from NTLM to Kerberos.

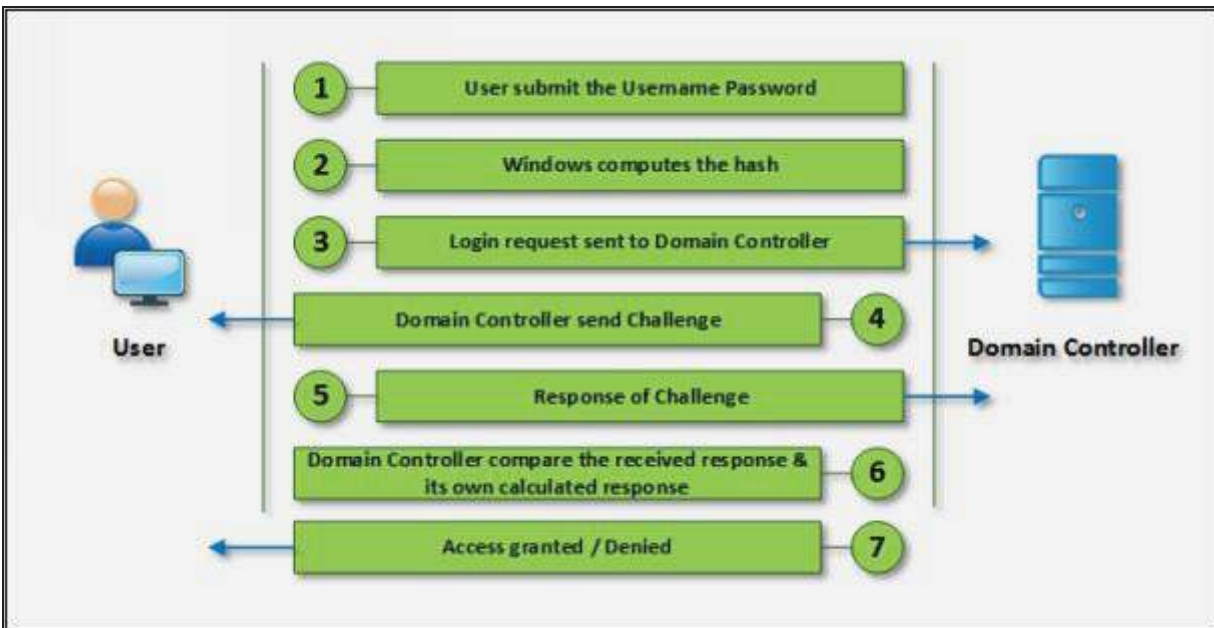


Figure 6-14 NTLM Authentication Process

NTLM authentication comes in two versions.

1. NTLMv1 (Older version)
2. NTLMv2 (Improved version)

To provide an additional layer of security, NTLM is combined with another security layer known as Security Support Provider (SSP)

Kerberos

The Microsoft Kerberos Authentication protocol is an advanced Authentication protocol. In Kerberos, Clients receive tickets from Kerberos Key Distribution Center (KDC). KDC depends upon the following components: -

1. Authentication Server
2. Ticket-Granting Server

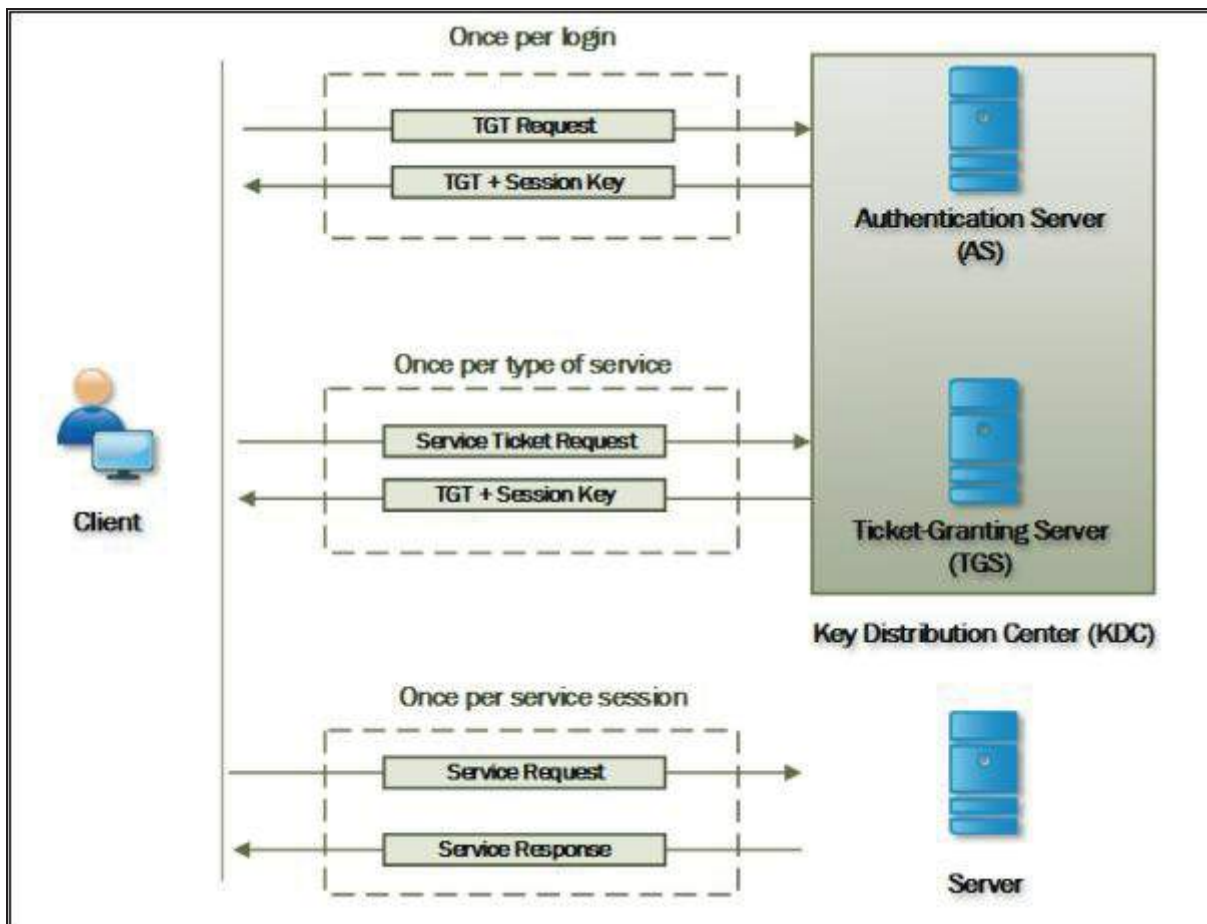


Figure 6-15 Kerberos Authentication Process

In order to authenticate itself, the client has to send a request to the authentication server to grant Ticket-granting-ticket (TGT). The authentication server authenticates the client by comparing the user identity and password from its database and reply with Ticket-granting-ticket (TGT) and a session key. The session key is for a session between Client and TGS. Now, Client has been authenticated and received TGT and Session key from the Authentication server (AS) for communicating Ticket-Granting Server (TGS). The client sends the TGT to TGS, ask for the ticket to communication with another user. TGS reply with ticket and session key. Ticket and Session key is for communicating with another user within a trusted domain.

Password Salting

Password salting is the process of adding additional character in the password to one-way function. This addition of characters makes the password more

difficult to reverse the hash. Major advantage or primary function of Password salting is to defeat the dictionary attacks and pre-computed attacks. Consider the following example, one of the hashed value is of the password without salting, while another hashed value is of the same password with salting.

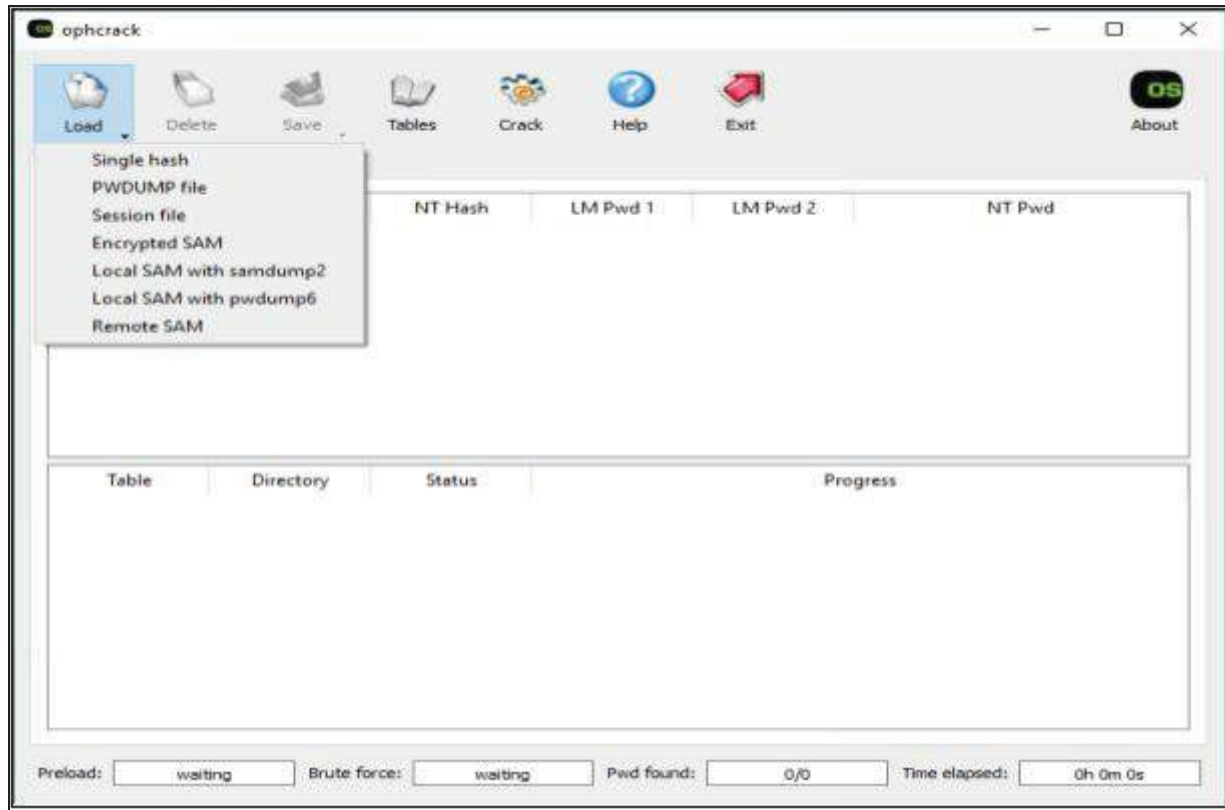


Figure 6-16 Ophcrack Software

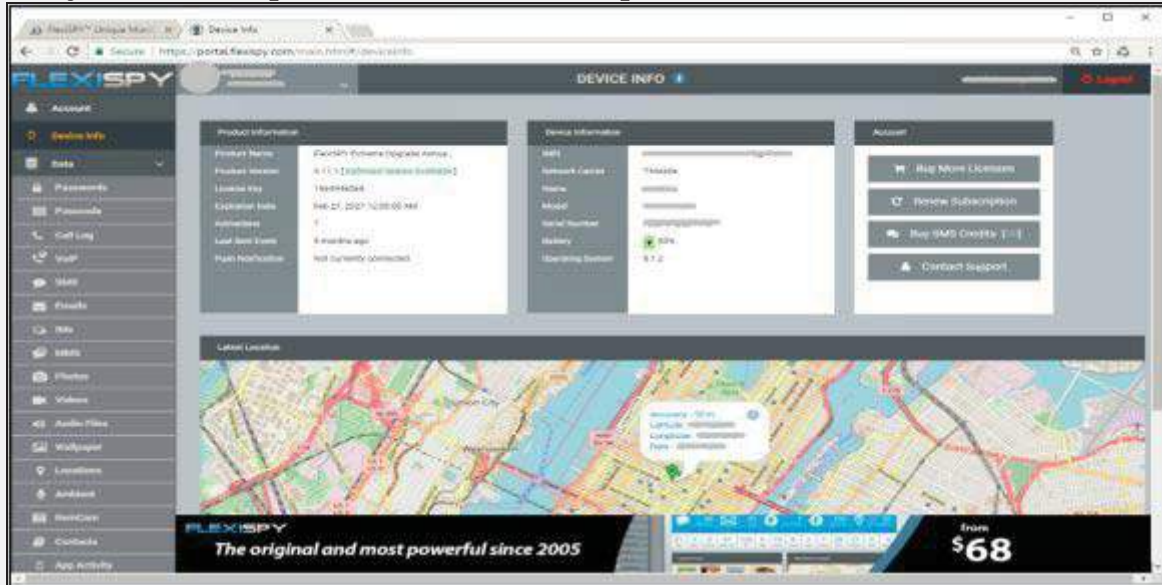


Figure 6-18 FlexySpy

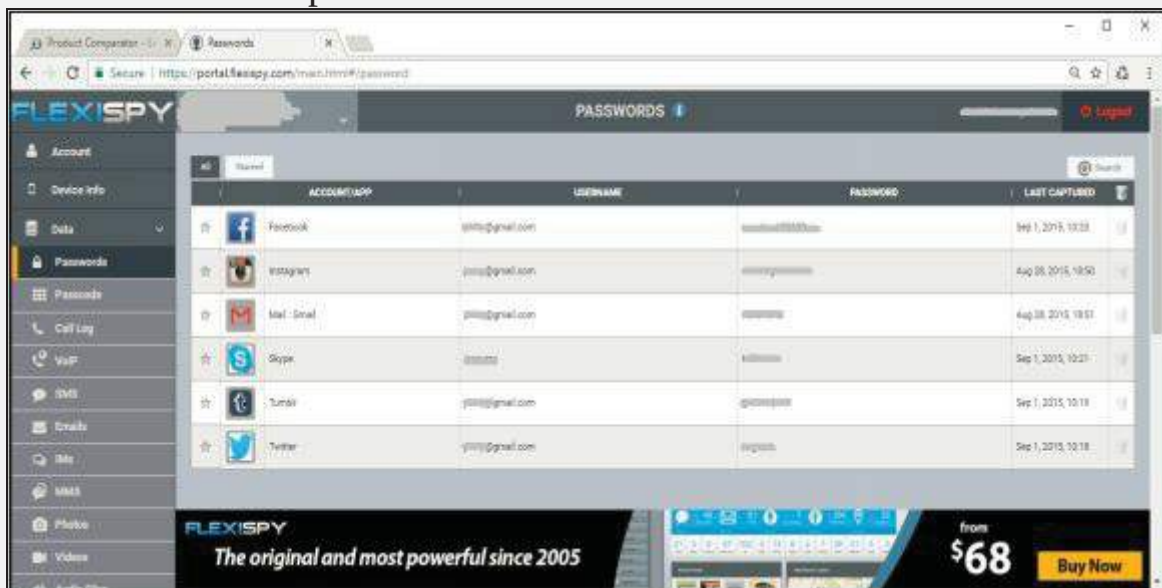
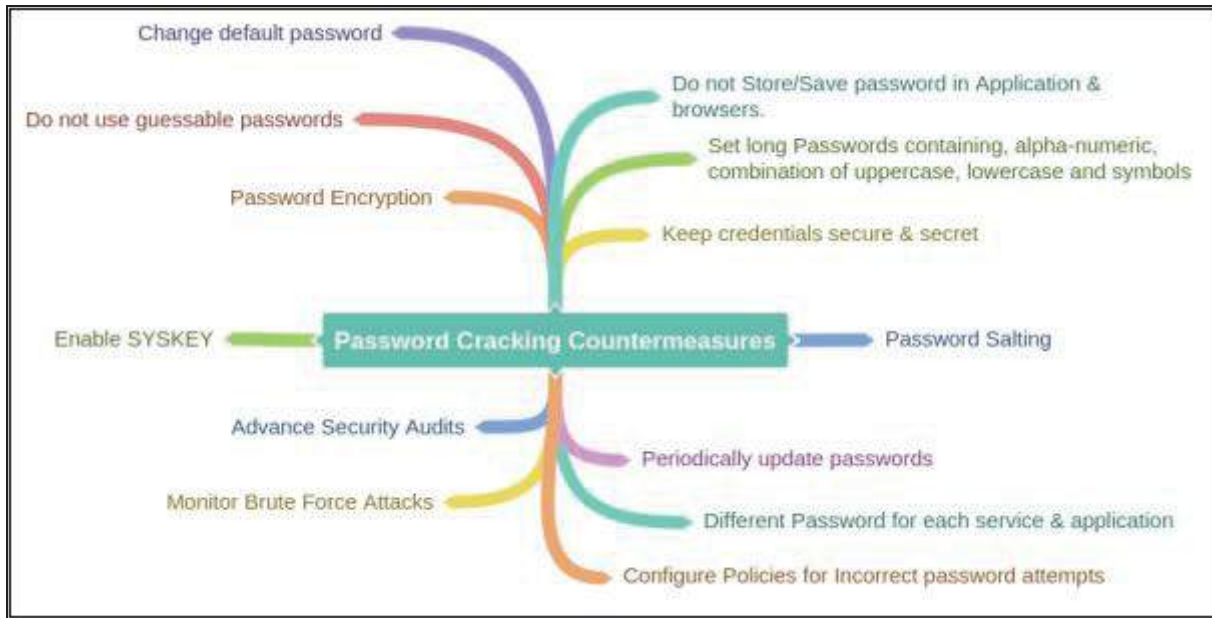


Figure 6-19 FlexySpy



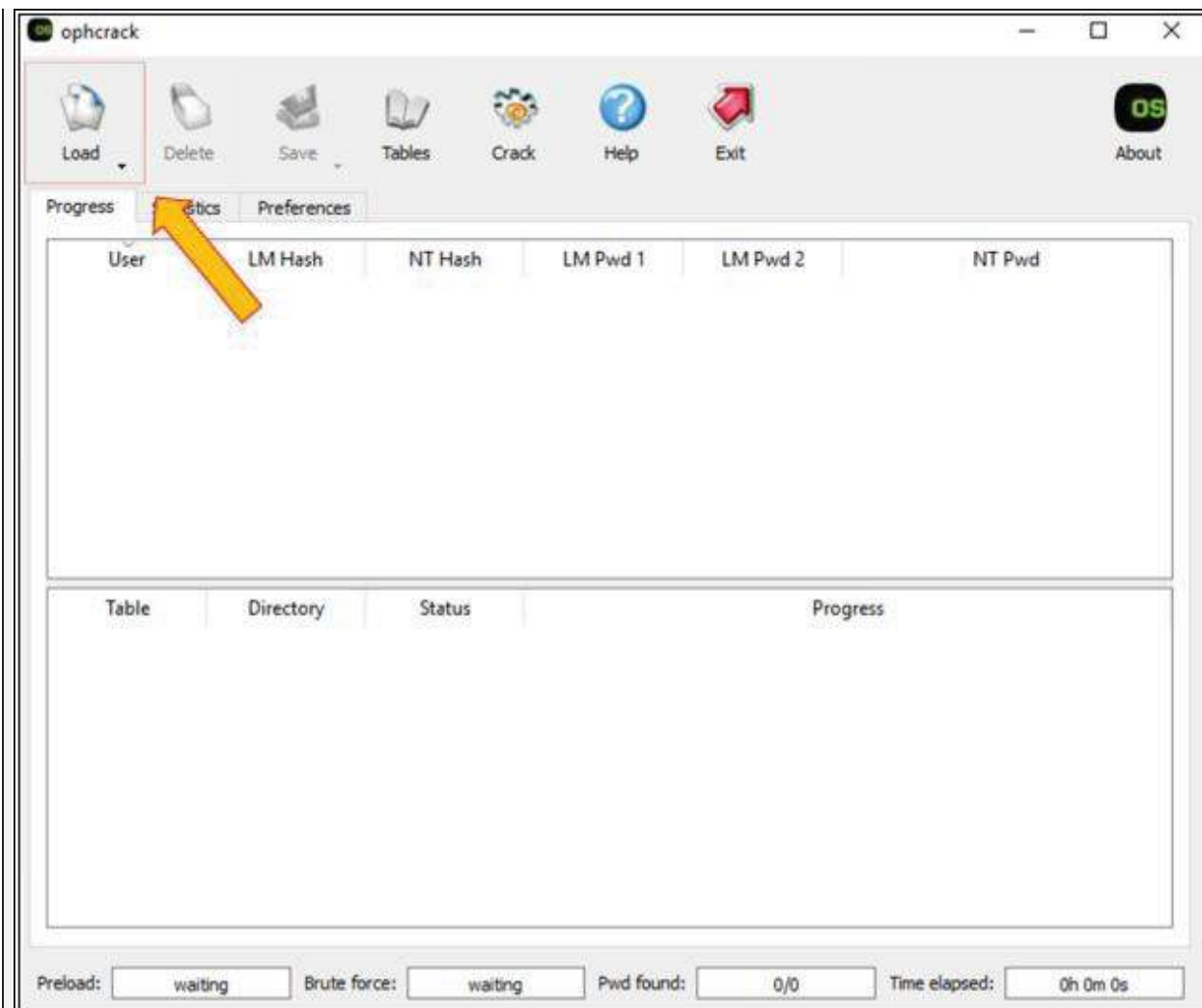


Figure 6-25 Ophcrack tool

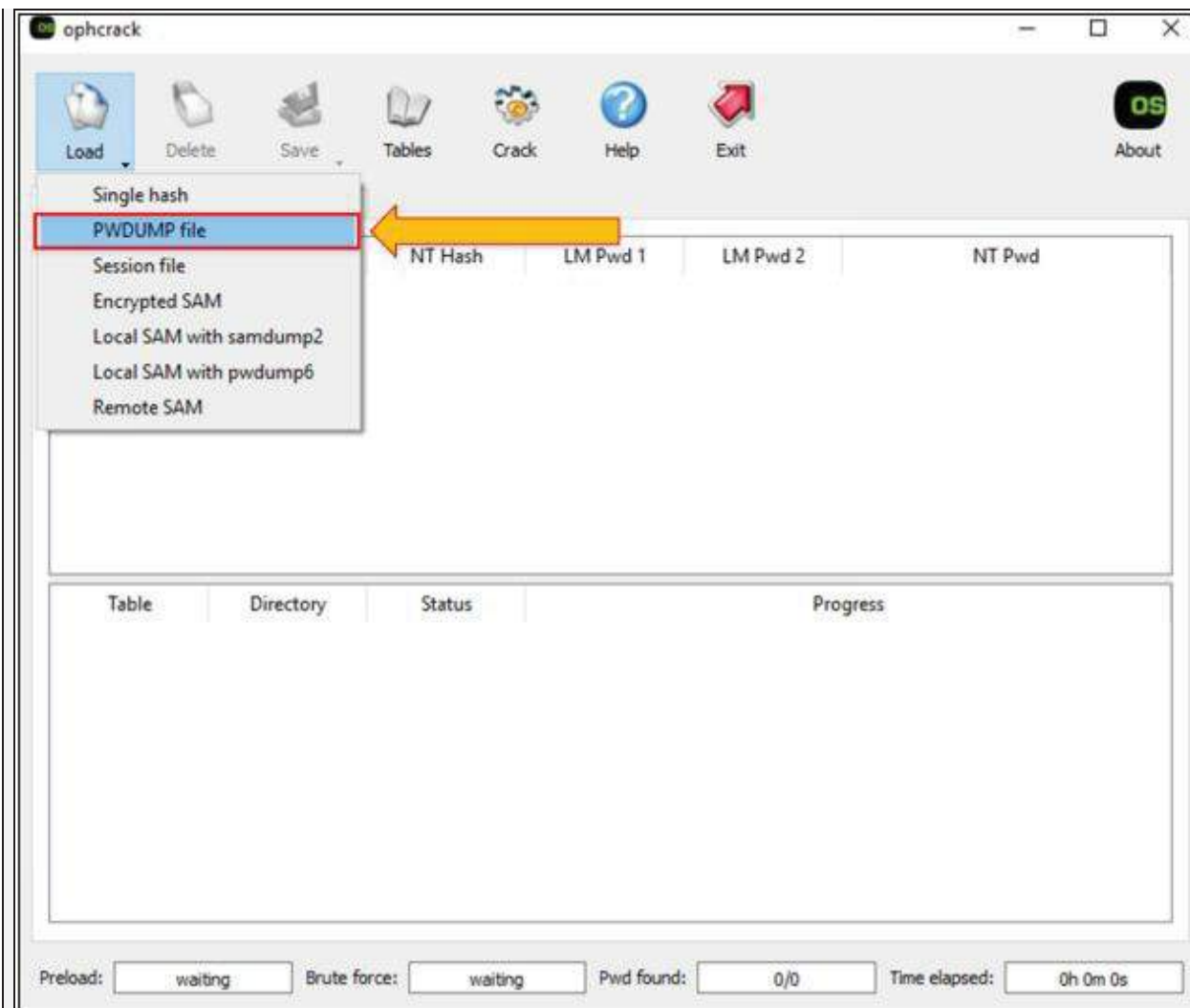


Figure 6-26 Loading PWDUMP file

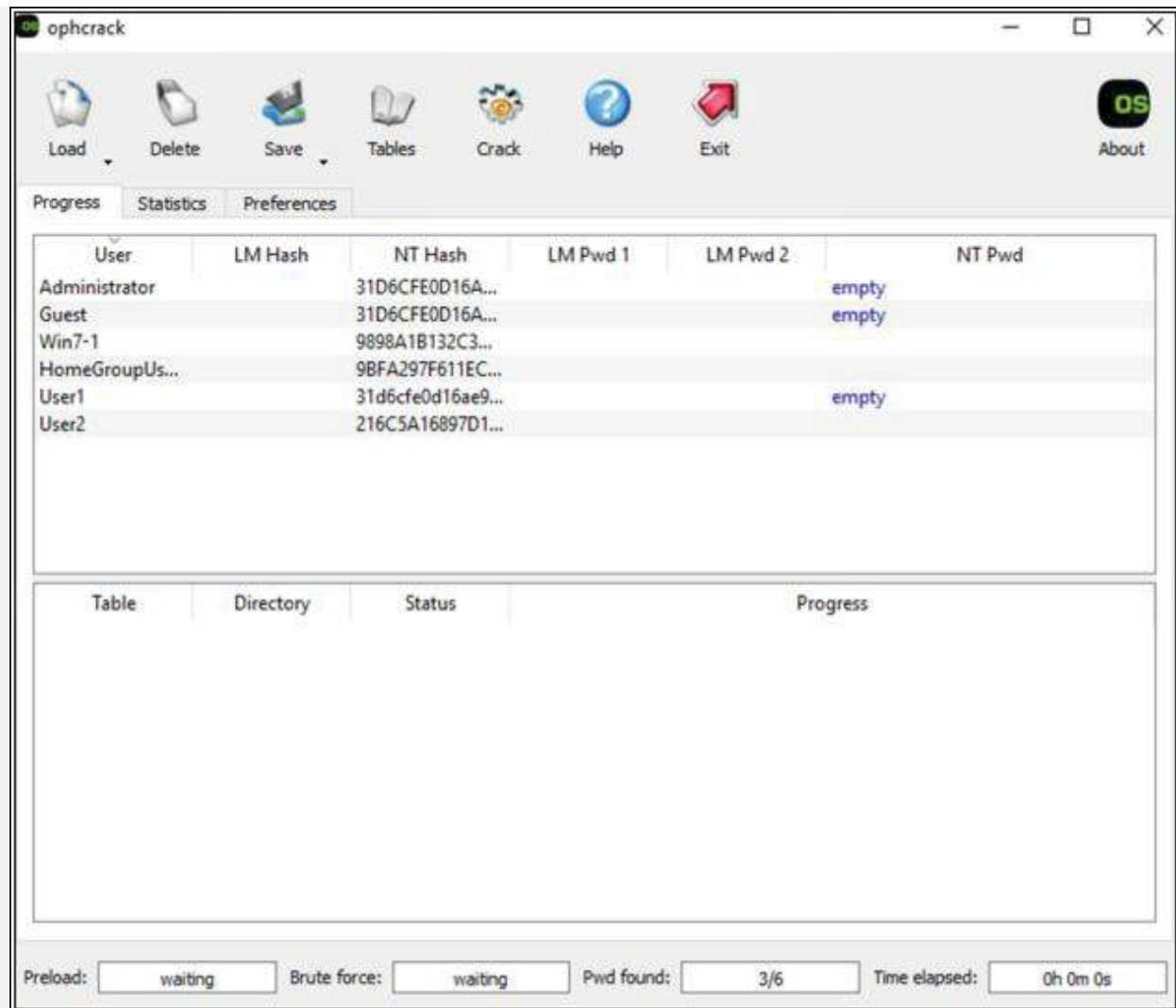


Figure 6-27 File loaded

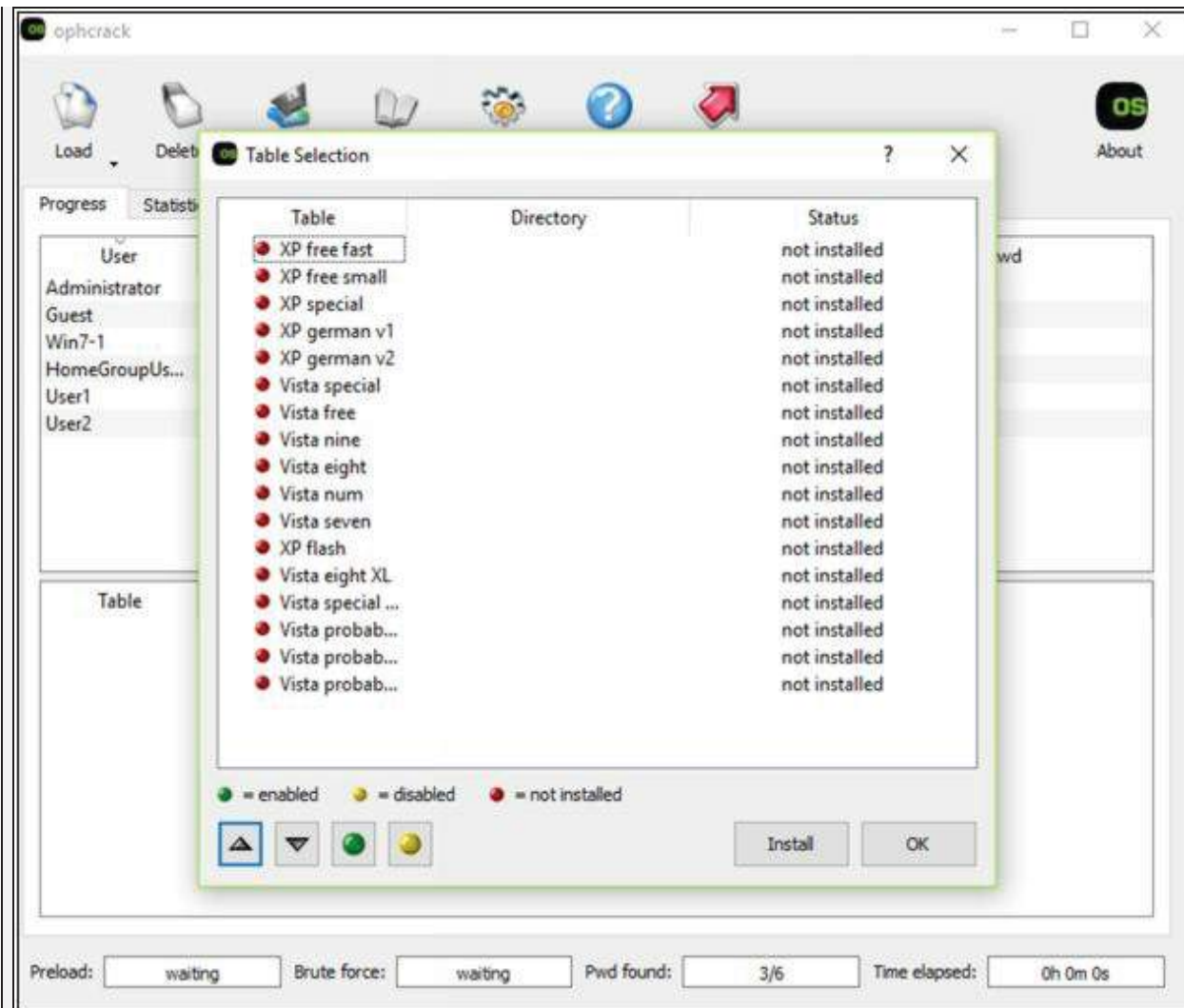


Figure 6-28 Installing Table

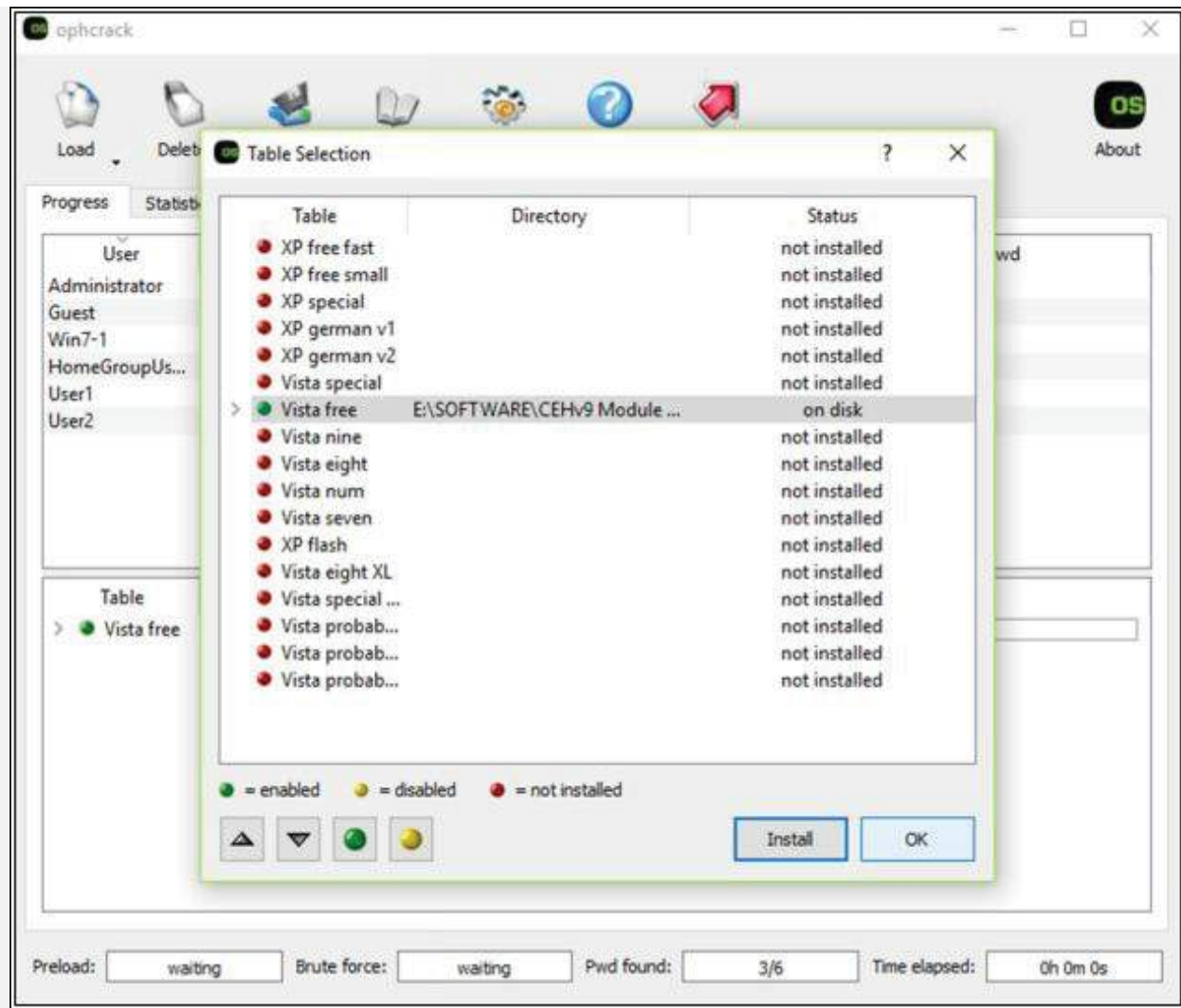


Figure 6-29 Installing Table

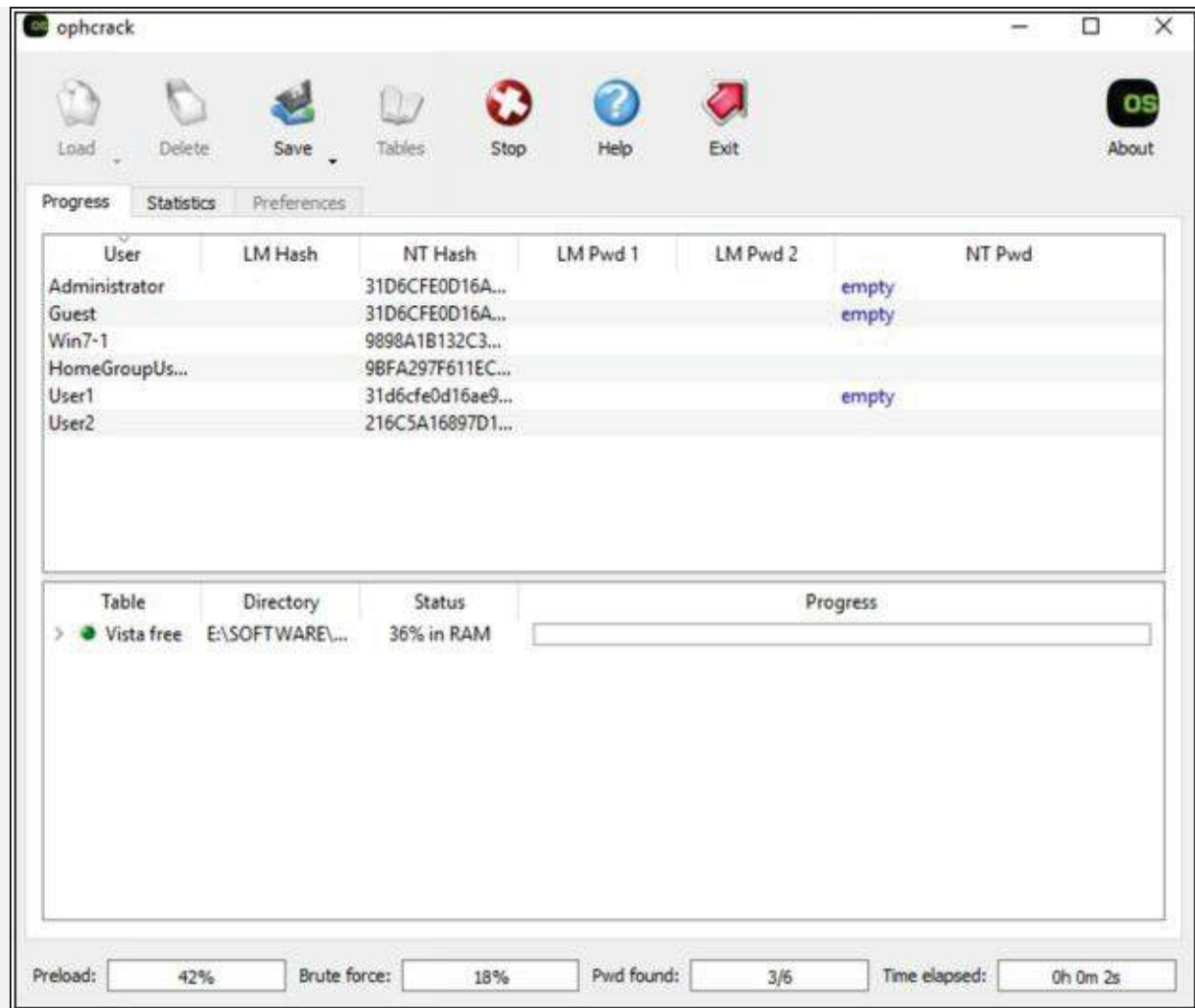


Figure 6-30 Cracking Password

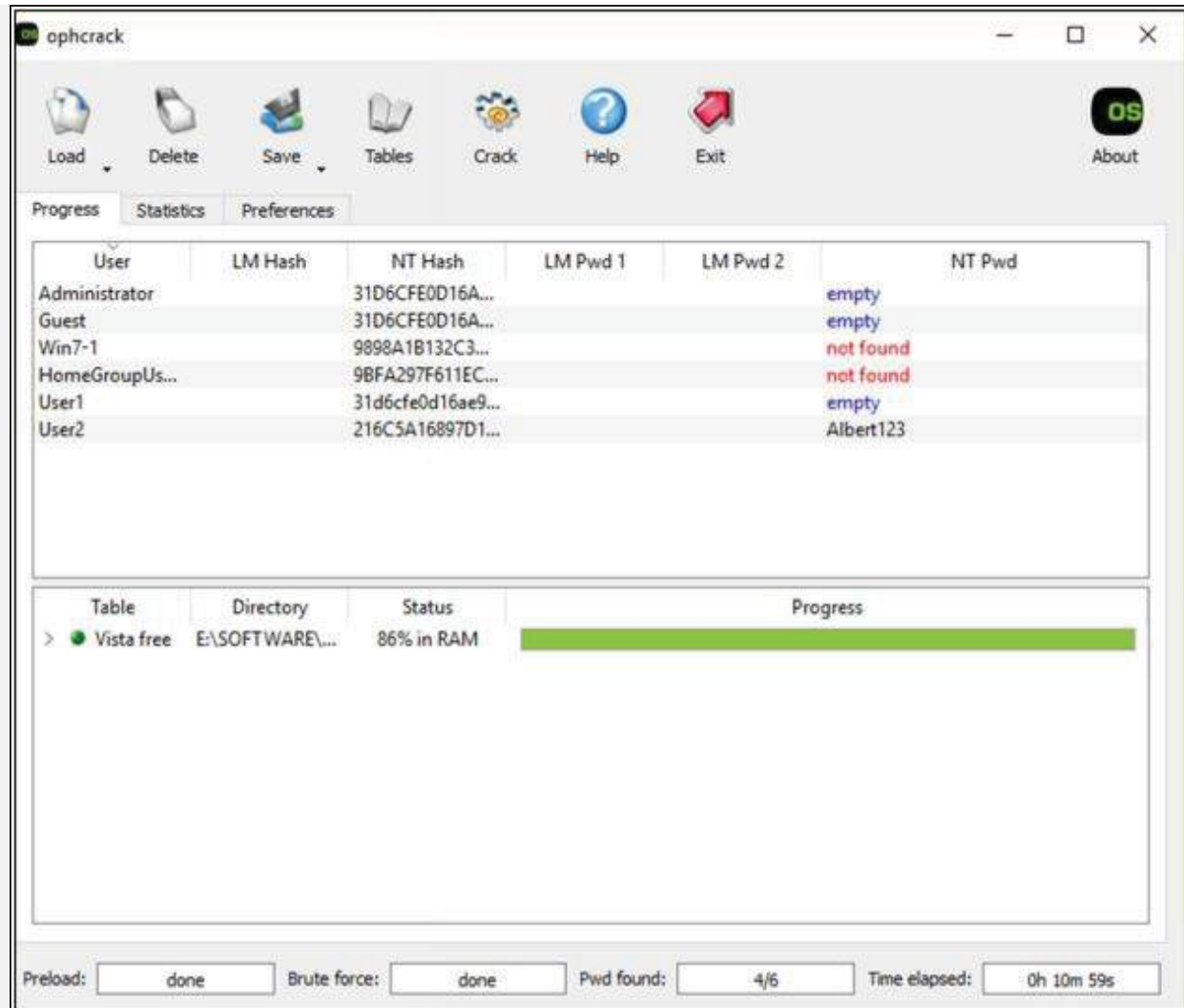


Figure 6-31 Results

Escalating Privileges

In the section of Privilege Escalation, we will discuss what to do after gaining access to the target. There is still a lot of tasks to perform in Privilege Escalation. You may not always hack an admin account; sometimes, you have compromised the user account which has lower privileges. Using the compromised account with limited privilege will not help you to achieve your goals. Prior to anything after gaining access, you have to perform privilege escalation to have complete you high-level access with no or limited restrictions.

Each Operating system comes with some default setting and user accounts such as administrator account, root account and guest account, etc. with default passwords. It is easy for an attacker to find vulnerabilities of pre-configured account in an operating system to exploit and gain access. These default settings and account must be secured and modified to prevent

unauthorized access.

Privilege Escalation is further classified into two types: -

1. Horizontal Privileges Escalation
2. Vertical Privileges Escalation

Horizontal Privileges Escalation

In Horizontal Privileges Escalation, an attacker attempts to take command over the privileges of another user having the same set of privileges for his account. Horizontal privileges escalation occurs when an attacker is attempting to gain access to the same set of resources allowed for the particular user.

Consider an example of horizontal privileges escalation by considering an operating system having multiple users including Administrator having full privileges, User A, User B and so on having limited privileges to run application only (not allowed to install or uninstall any application). Each user is assigned with the same level of privileges. By finding any weakness or exploiting any vulnerability, User A, gain access to User B. Now user A is able to control and access the User B account.

Vertical Privileges Escalation

In Vertical Privileges Escalation, an attacker attempts to escalate privileges to a higher level. Vertical privileges escalation occurs when an attacker is attempting to gain access usually to the administrator account. Higher privileges allow the attacker to access sensitive information, install, modify and delete files and programs such as a virus, Trojans, etc.

Privilege Escalation using DLL Hijacking

Applications need Dynamic Link Libraries (DLL) for executable files to run. In Windows operating system, most of the application search for DLL in directories instead of using fully qualified path. Taking advantage of this, legitimate DLL is replacing malicious DLL. Once these DLLs are renamed with exactly the same name of legitimate DLLs and replaced in the directory, the executable file will load malicious DLL from application directory instead of real DLL.

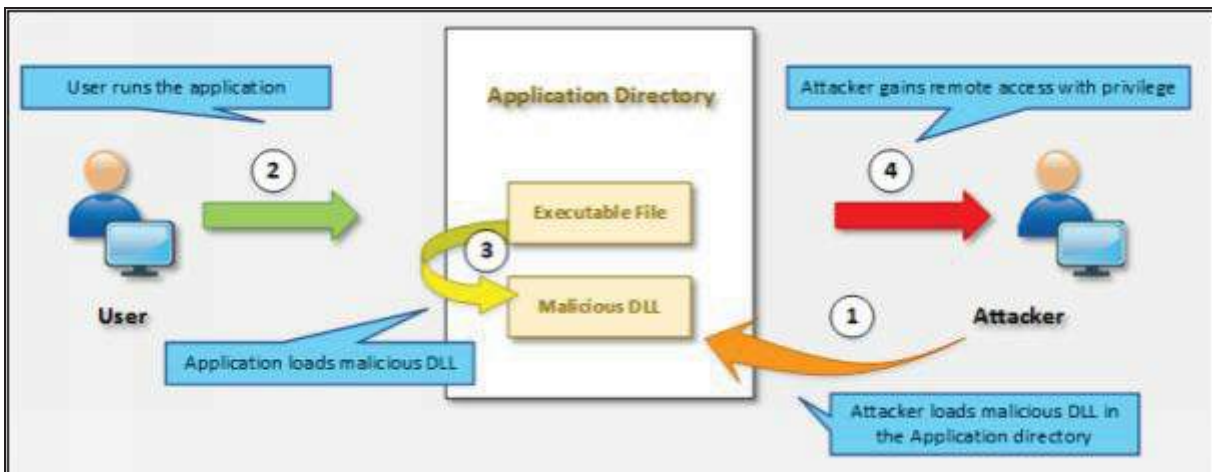


Figure 6-34 Vertical Privilege Escalation

Using DLL hijacking tool, such as Metasploit can be used for generating DLL which returns with a session with privileges. This generated malicious DLL is renamed and pasted in the directory. When application run, it will open the session with system privileges. In Windows platform, Known DLLs' are specified in the registry key.

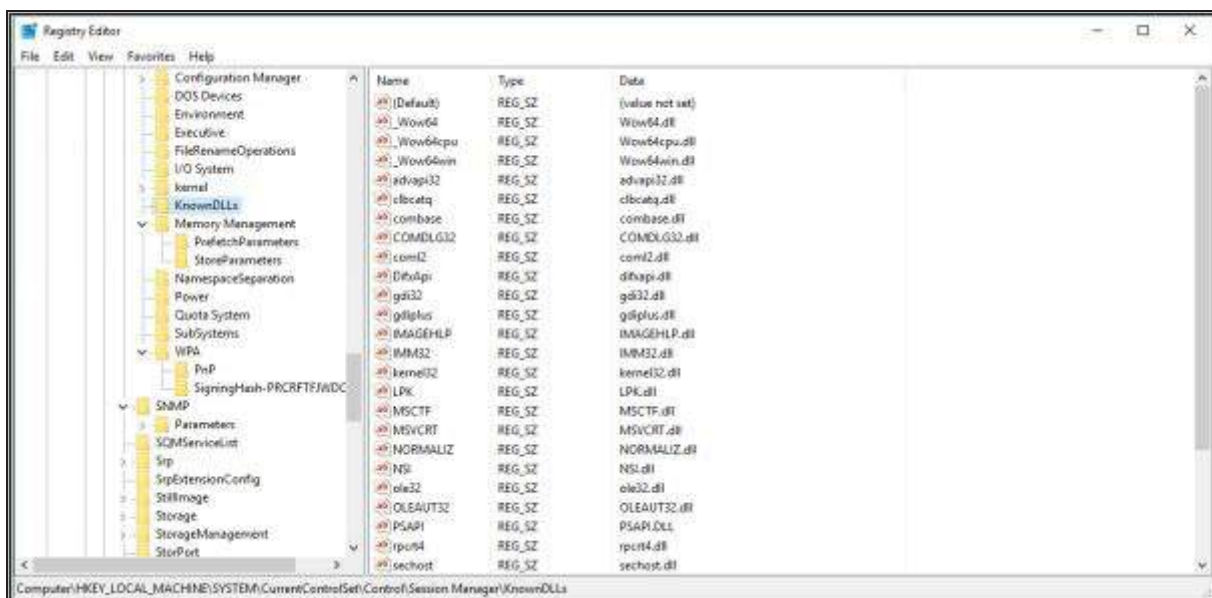


Figure 6-35 Horizontal Privilege Escalation

The application normally searches for DLL in the exact directory if it is configured with the fully qualified path, else, if the application is not using specified path it may search in the following search paths used by Microsoft:

- Directory of Application or current directory
- System Directory i.e. C:\\Windows\\System32\\
- Windows Directory

Executing Applications

Once an attacker gains unauthorized access to the system and escalates privileges, now the next step of the attacker is to execute malicious applications on the target system. This execution of malicious programs is intended for gaining unauthorized access to system resources, crack passwords, set up backdoors, and for other motives. These executable programs can be customized application or available software. This process, execution of the application is also called as "System Owing." The attacker is to own the system. Intentions or goals, an attacker, wanted to achieve by executing such malicious application are: -

- Installation of Malware to collect information.
- To setup Backdoor to maintain access.
- To install Cracker to crack password and scripts.
- To install Keyloggers for gathering information via input devices such as a keyboard.

RemoteExec

RemoteExec is a software designed for installation of the application, execution of code and scripts remotely. additionally, RemoteExec can update files on the target system across a network. Major features offered by the RemoteExec application are: -

- Deploy packages on the target system.
- Remotely execution of programs and scripts.
- Scheduling Execution based on particular date and time.
- Remote Configuration management such as modification of registry, disabling accounts, modification, and manipulation of files.
- Remote controlling of target system such as power off, sleep, wake up, reboot and lock, etc.

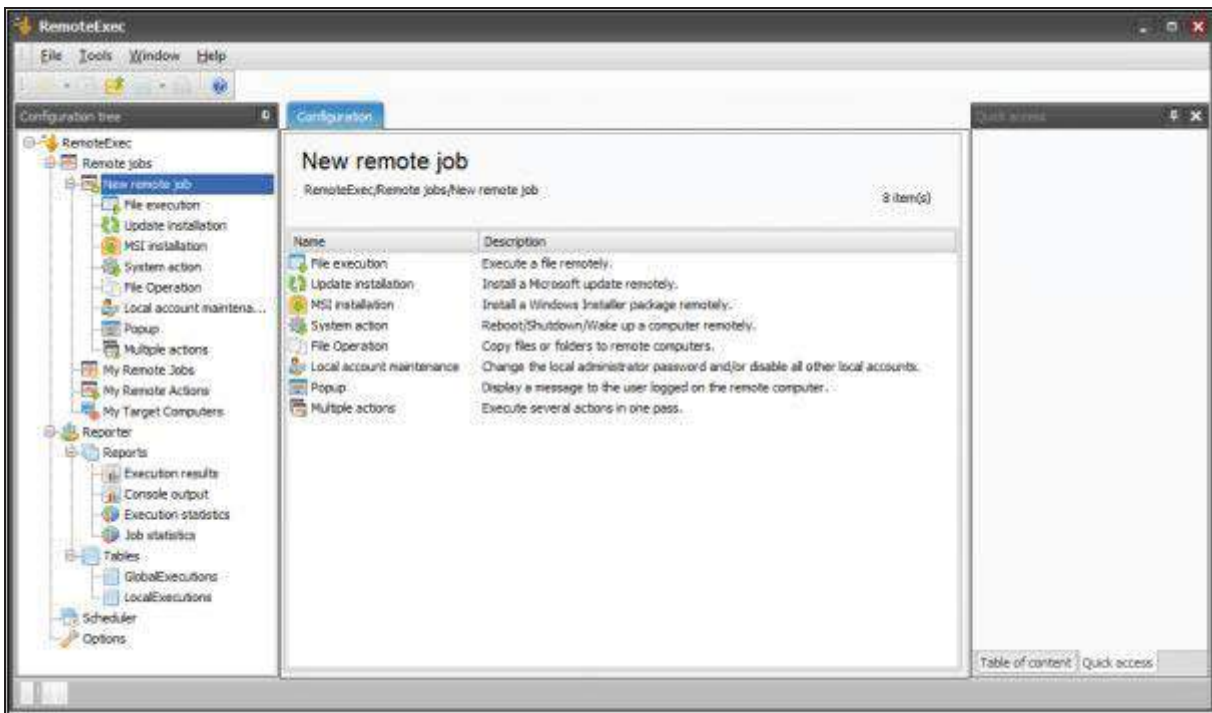


Figure 6-36 RemoteExec Application

PDQ Deploy

PDQ Deploy is basically software, system administrator tool used to install and send updates silently to the remote system. PDQ Deploy allow or assist the admin in installing application and software to a particular system as well as multiple systems in a network. It can silently deploy almost every application (such as .exe or .msi) to the target system. Using PDQ Deploy, you can install and uninstall, copy, execute and send files.

Keyloggers

Keystroke logging, Keylogging and keyboard capturing is a process of monitoring or recording the actions performed by any user such as monitoring a user using keyboard using Keyloggers. Keyloggers can be either hardware or software. The major purpose of using Keyloggers are monitoring data copied to the clipboard, screenshots captured by the user, screen logging by capturing a screenshot at every moment even when the user just clicked.

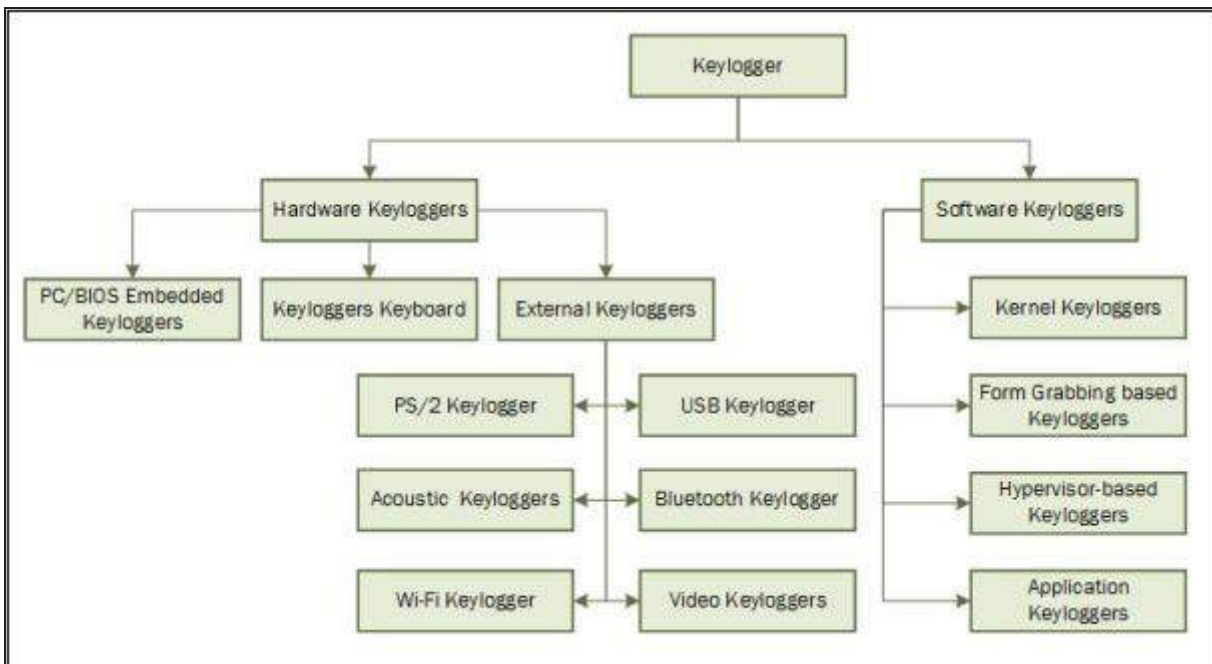


Figure 6-37 Types of Keyloggers

Types of Keystroke Loggers

- ***Software Keyloggers***

Software-based Keyloggers performs its function by logging the actions in order to steal information from the target machine. Software-based Keyloggers are remotely installed, or an attacker may send it to user and user can accidentally execute the application. Software Keyloggers includes: -

- Application Keyloggers
- Kernel Keyloggers
- Hypervisor-based Keyloggers
- Form Grabbing based Keyloggers

- ***Hardware Keyloggers***

Hardware-based Keyloggers are physical hardware's or Keyloggers which are installed on hardware by physically accessing the device. Firmware-based Keyloggers requires physical access the to the machine to load the software into BIOS, keyboard hardware such as key grabber USB is a physical device needs to be installed inline with the keyboard. Hardware Keyloggers are further classified into following types includes: -

- PC/BIOS Embedded Keyloggers

- Keyloggers Keyboard
- External Keyloggers

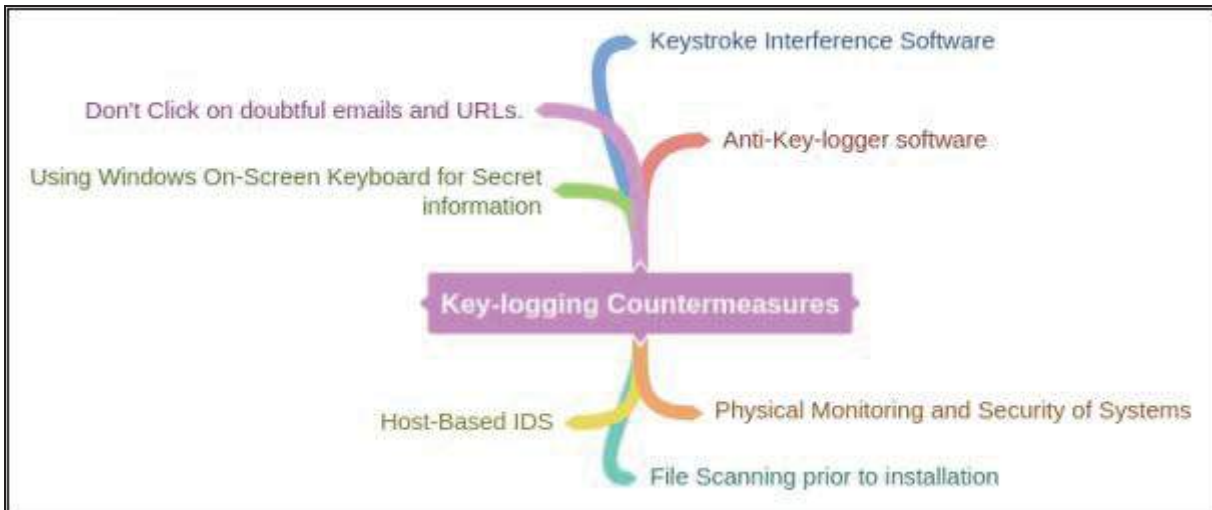

Spyware

Spywares are the software designed for gathering user interaction information with a system such as an email address, login credentials, and other details without informing the user of the target system. Mostly, Spyware is used for tracking internet interaction of the user. This gathered information is sent to a remote destination. Spyware hides its files and processes to avoid detection.

The most common types of Spywares are: -

- Adware
- System Monitors
- Tracking Cookies
- Trojans

Features of Spyware

Rootkits

A rootkit is a collection of software designed to provide privileged access to a remote user over the target system. Mostly, Rootkits are the collection of malicious software deployed after an attack, when the attacker has the administrative access to the target system to maintain its privileged access for future. It creates a backdoor for an attacker; Rootkits often mask the existence of its software which helps to avoid detection.

Types of Rootkits

- **Application Level Rootkits**

Application Level Rootkits perform manipulation of standard application files, modification of the behavior of the current application with an injection of codes.

- **Kernel-Level Rootkits**

The kernel is the core of an OS. Kernel-Level Rootkits add additional codes (malicious), replace the section of codes of original Operating system kernel.

- **Hardware / Firmware Level Rootkits**

Type of Rootkits that hides in hardware such as hard drive, network interface card, system BIOS, which are not inspected for integrity. These rootkits are built into a chipset for recovering stolen computers, delete data, or render them useless. Additionally, Rootkits has privacy and security concerns of undetectable spying.

- **Hypervisor Level Rootkits**

Hypervisor Level Rootkits exploits hardware features like AMD-V (Hardware-assisted virtualization technologies) or Intel VT, which hosts the target OS as a virtual machine.

- **Boot Loader Level Rootkits**

Bootloader Level Rootkits (Bootkits) replaces the legitimate boot loader with the malicious one which enables the Bootkits to be activated before an OS run. Bootkits are a serious threat to the system security because they can infect startup codes such as Master Boot

Record (MBR), Volume Boot Record (VBR) or boot sector. It can be used to attack full disk encryption systems, hack encryption keys and passwords.

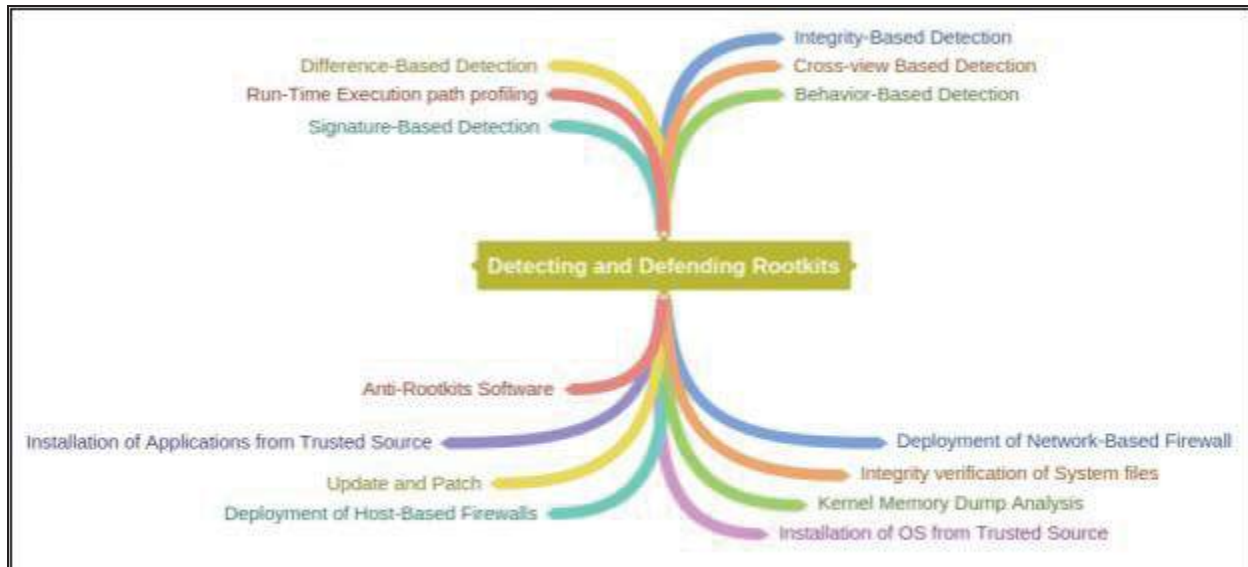

Integrity-Based Detection, using Digital Signatures, Difference-based detection, behavioral detection, memory dumps, and other approaches can be used for detecting Rootkits. In Unix Platform, Rootkit detection tools such as Zeppoo, chrootkit and other tools are available for detection. In Windows, Microsoft Sysinternals RootkitRevealer, Avast and Sophos anti-Rootkit software are available.

NTFS Stands for New Technology File System. NTFS is a Windows Proprietary file system by Microsoft. NTFS was the default File system of Windows NT 3.1. It is also the primary file system for Windows 10, Windows 8, Windows 7, Windows Vista, Windows XP, Windows 2000, and Windows NT operating systems.


Alternate Data Stream

Alternate Data Streams (ADS) is a file attribute in NTFS file system. This Feature of NTFS contains metadata for locating a particular file. ADS feature was introduced for Macintosh Hierarchical File System (HFS). ADS is capable of hiding file data into an existing file without altering or modifying any noticeable changes. In a practical environment, ADS is a threat to security because of its data hiding capability which can hide a malicious piece of data hidden in a file which can be executed when an attacker decides to run.

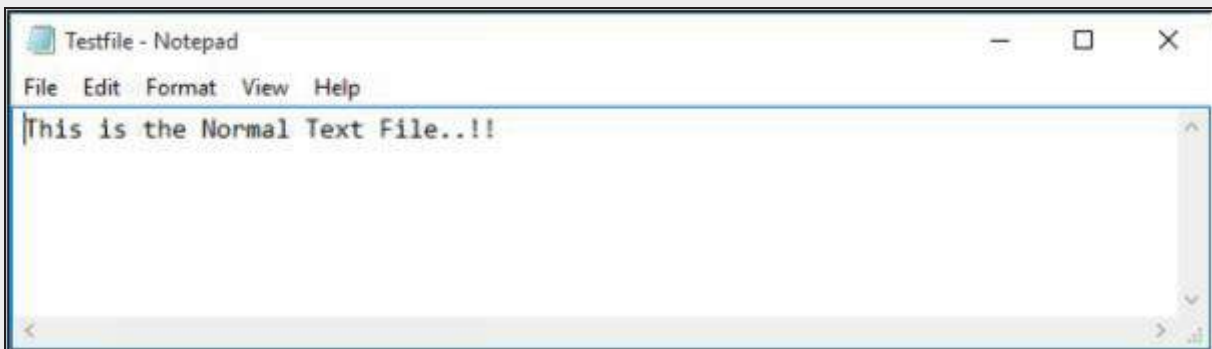



Figure 6-39 Cover File(Text File)

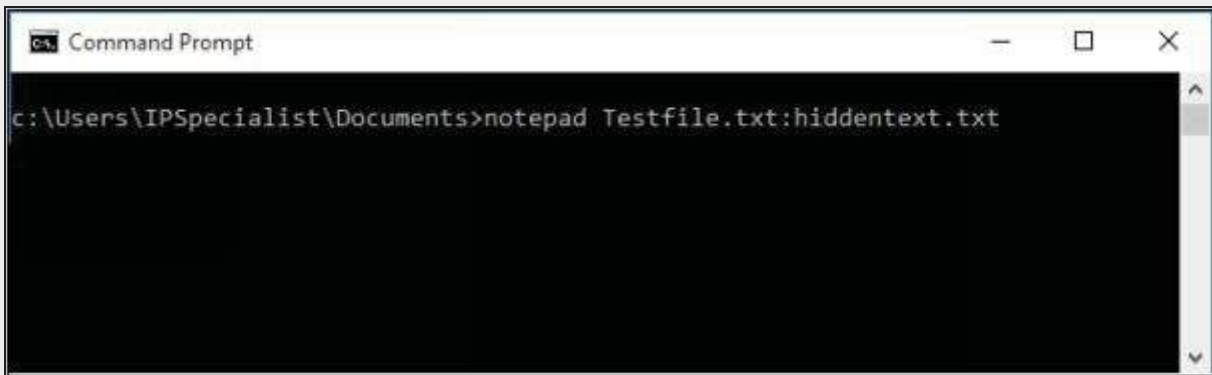


Figure 6-41 Creating Hidden File

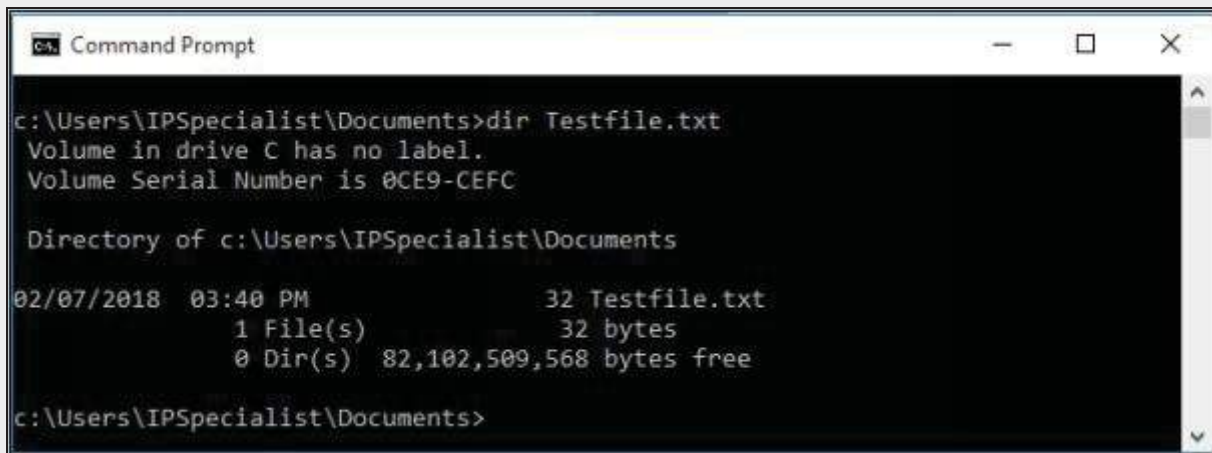
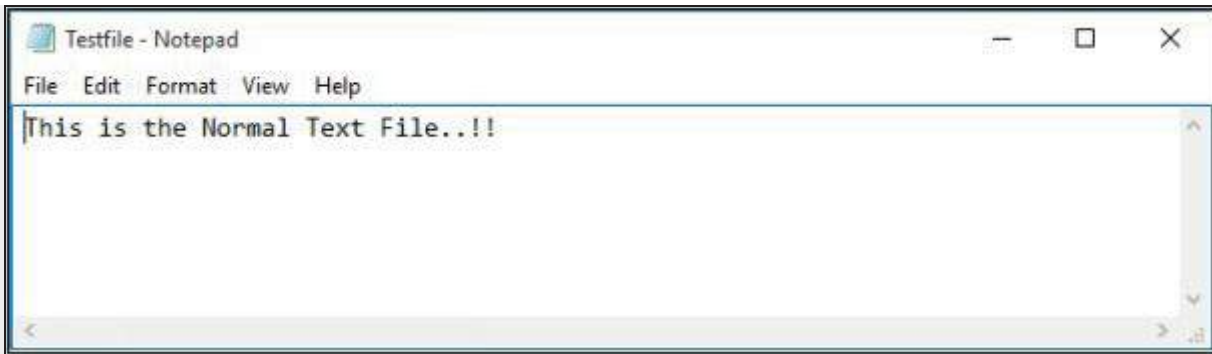
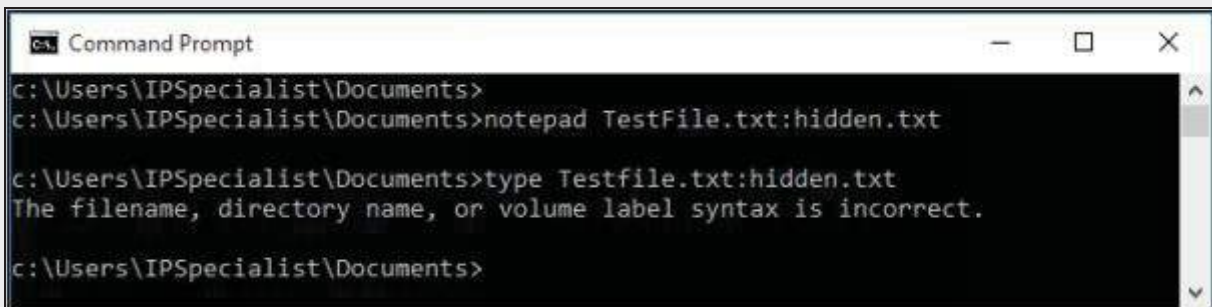


Figure 6-43 Comparing File Size

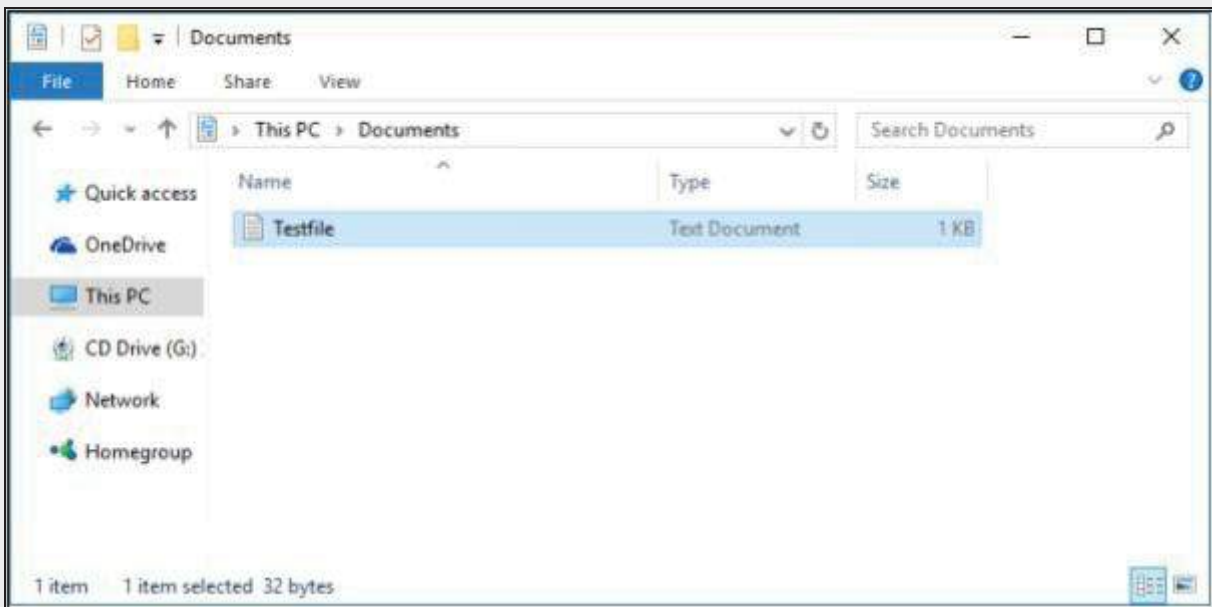

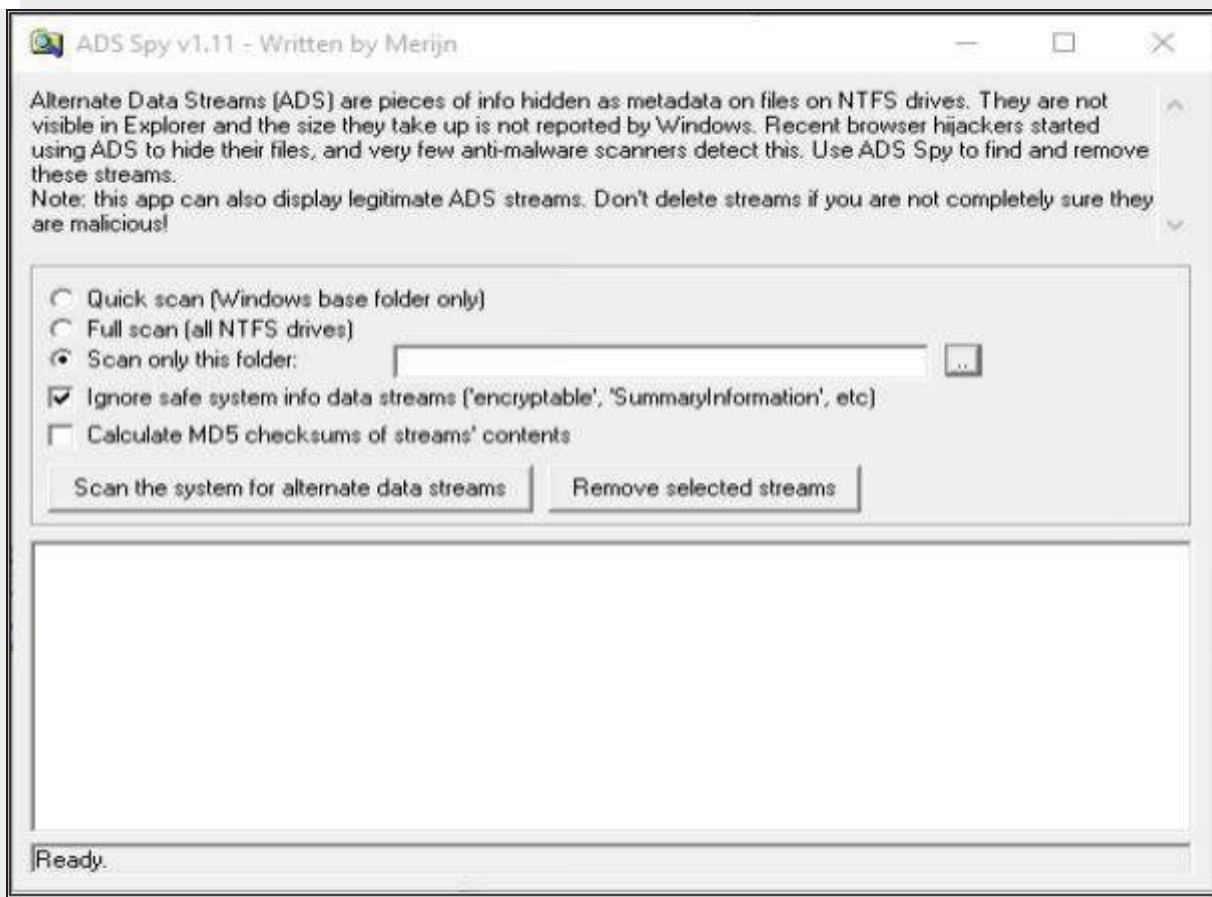


Figure 6-47 ADS Spy Application

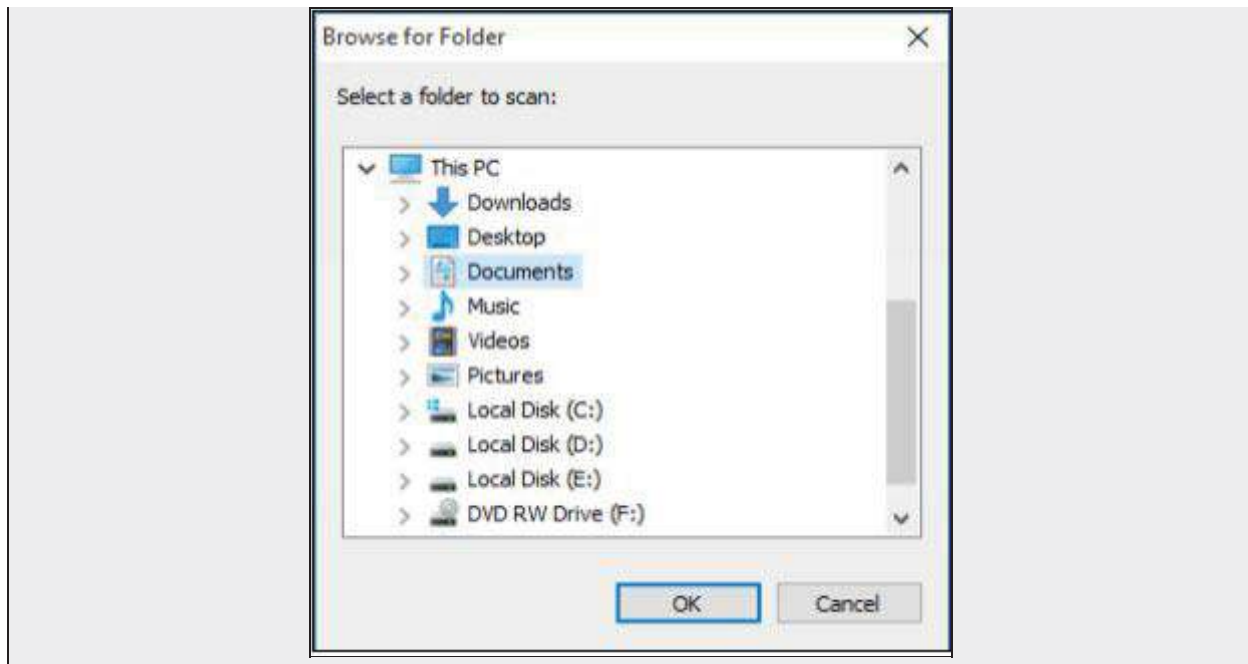


Figure 6-48 Browsing Directory

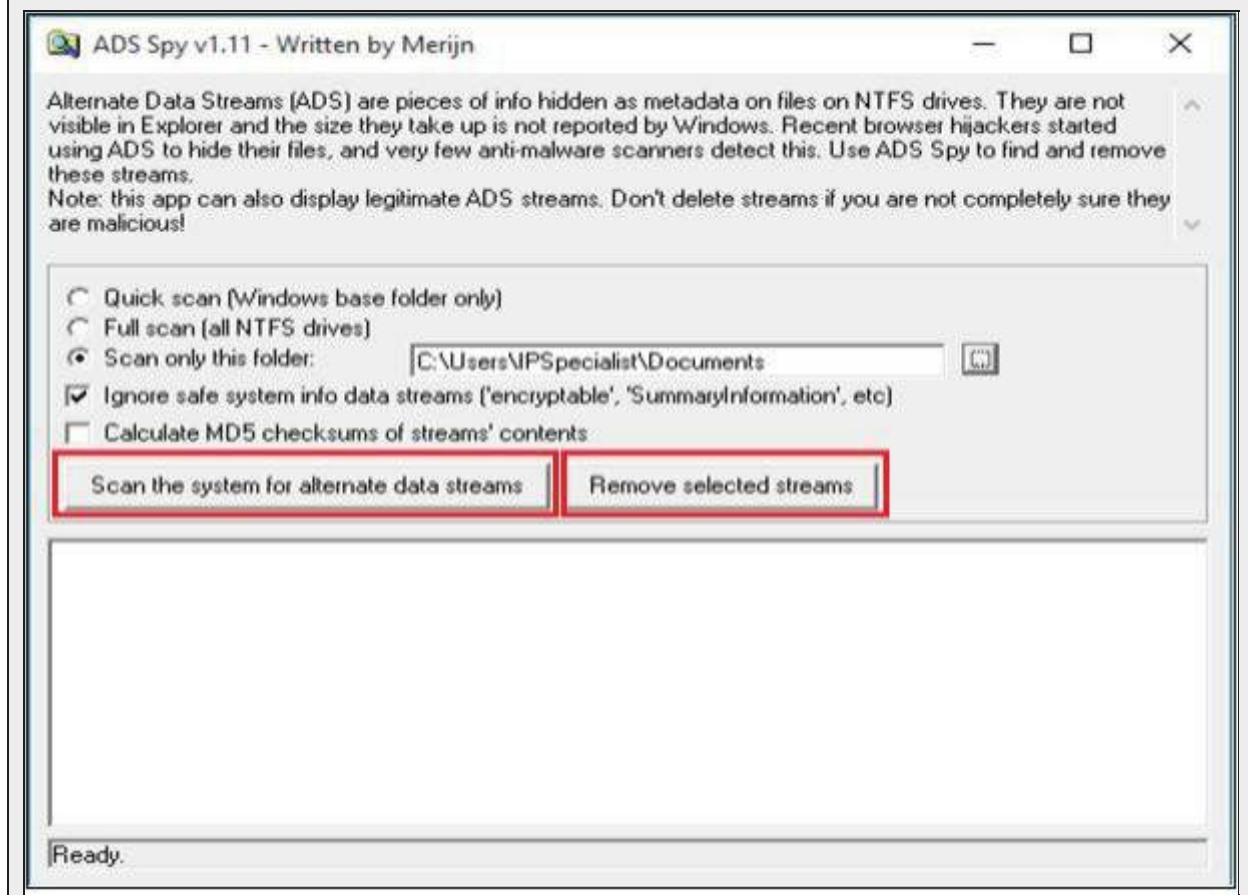


Figure 6-49 Scanning for ADS

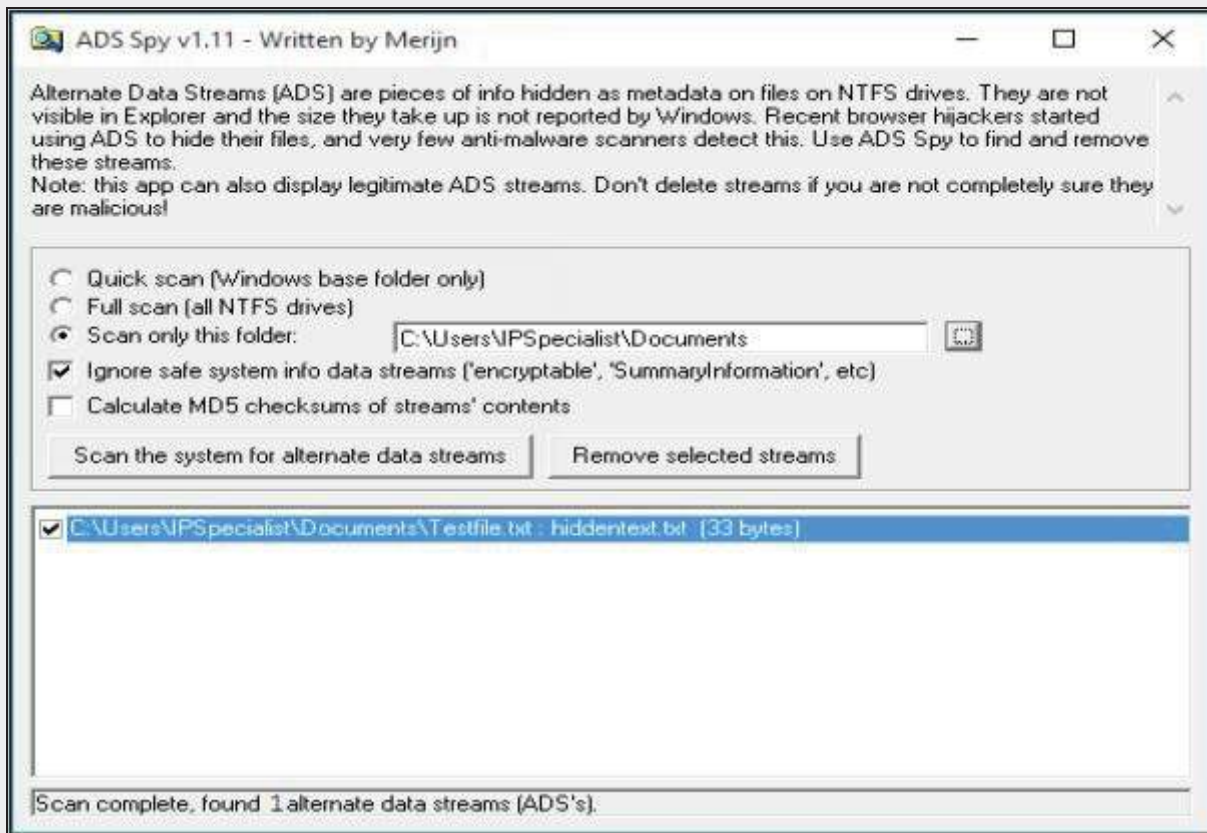


Figure 6-50 ADS Detection

NTFS Streams Countermeasures

Using Third-party tools and technique can provide security and protection from NTFS streams. The most basic method to file, to prevent NTFS Stream is by moving the File such as Suspected NTFS stream to FAT partition. FAT does not support Alternate Data Stream (ADS). Moving ADS from NTFS to FAT partition will corrupt the file. There are several tools such as ADS Spy, ADS Tools, LADS, Stream Armor, and other tools can also detect and remove them completely.

Steganography

Steganography is basically a technique for hiding sensitive information in an ordinary message to ensure the confidentiality. Hidden information is extracted at the destination by a legitimate receiver. Steganography uses encryption to maintain confidentiality and integrity. Additionally, it hides the

encrypted data to avoid detection. The goal of using steganography is hiding the information from the third party. An attacker may use this technique to hide information like source codes, plans, any other sensitive information to transfer without being detected.

Classification of Steganography

Steganography is classified into two types, Technical and Linguistic Steganography. Technical Steganography includes concealing information using methods like using invisible ink, microdots, and another method to hide information. Linguistic Steganography uses text as covering media to hide information like using Ciphers and code to hide information.

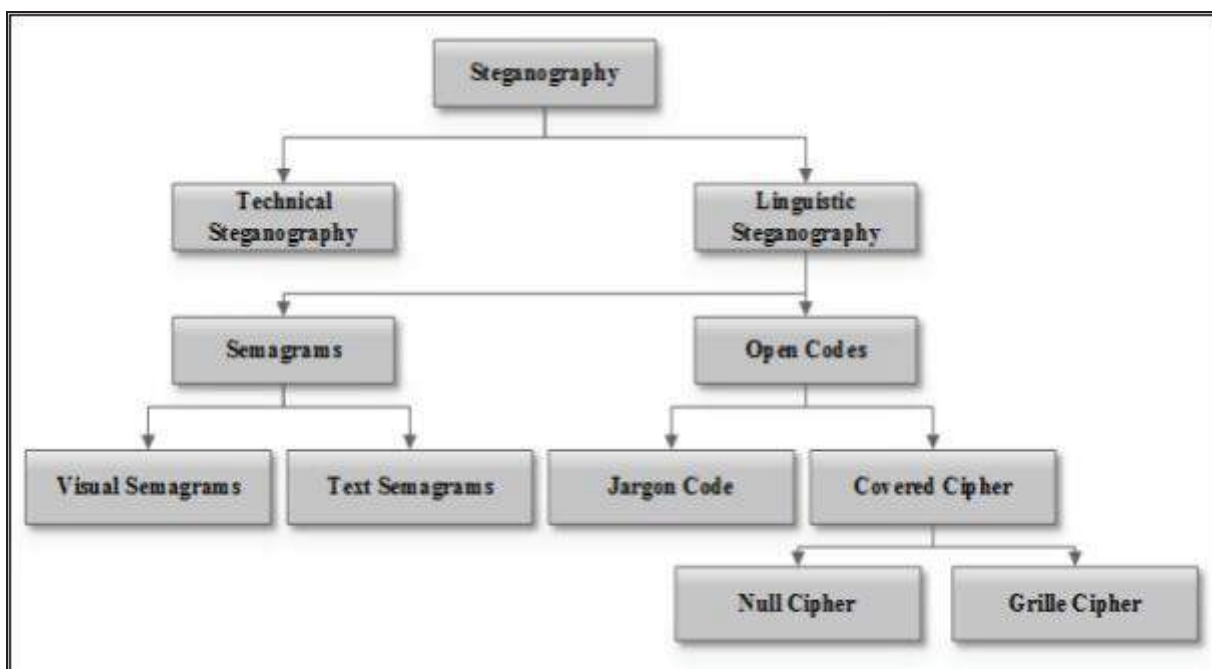


Figure 6-51 Classification of Steganography

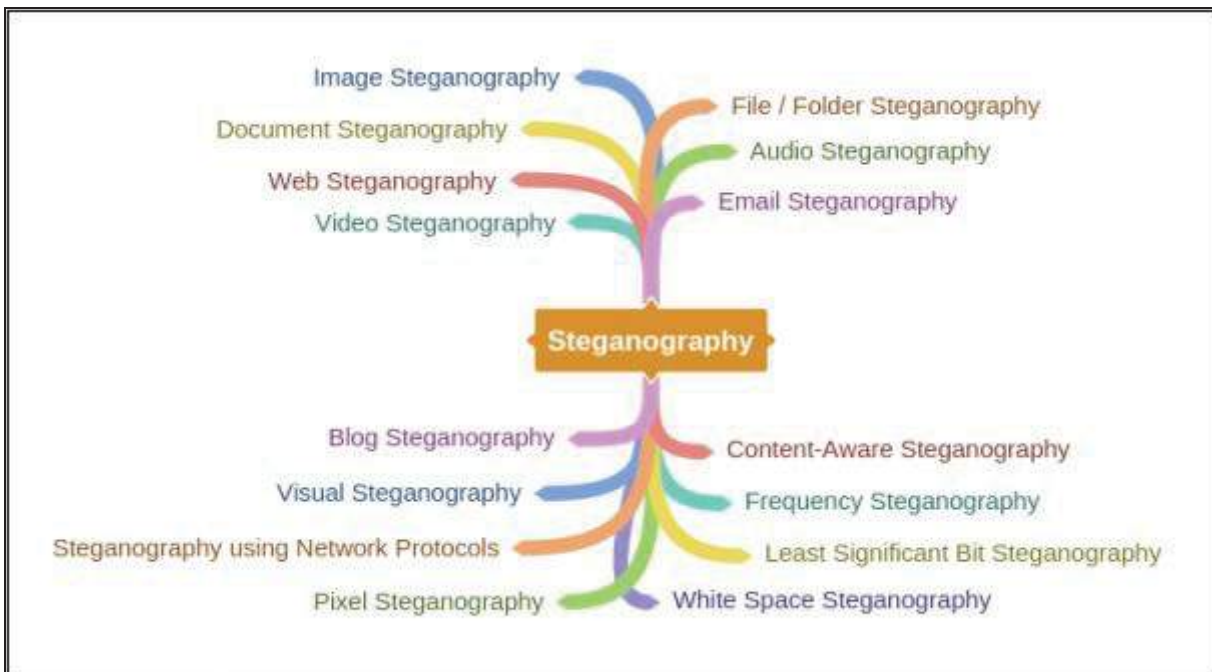

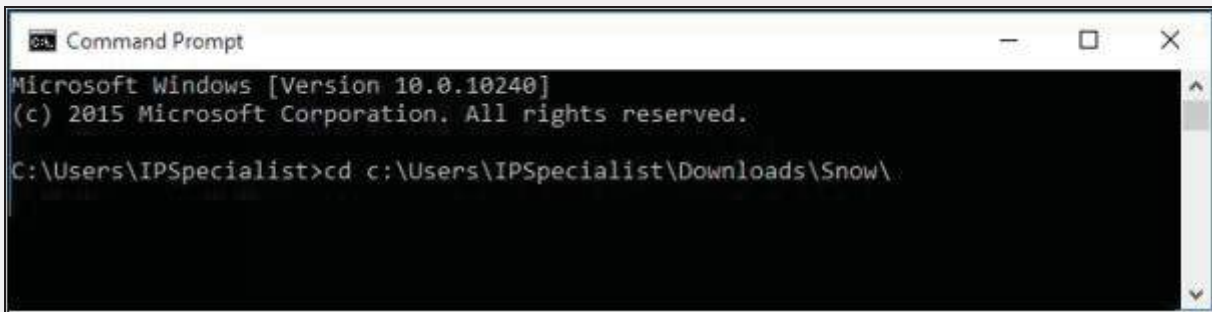



Figure 6-53 Changing Directory



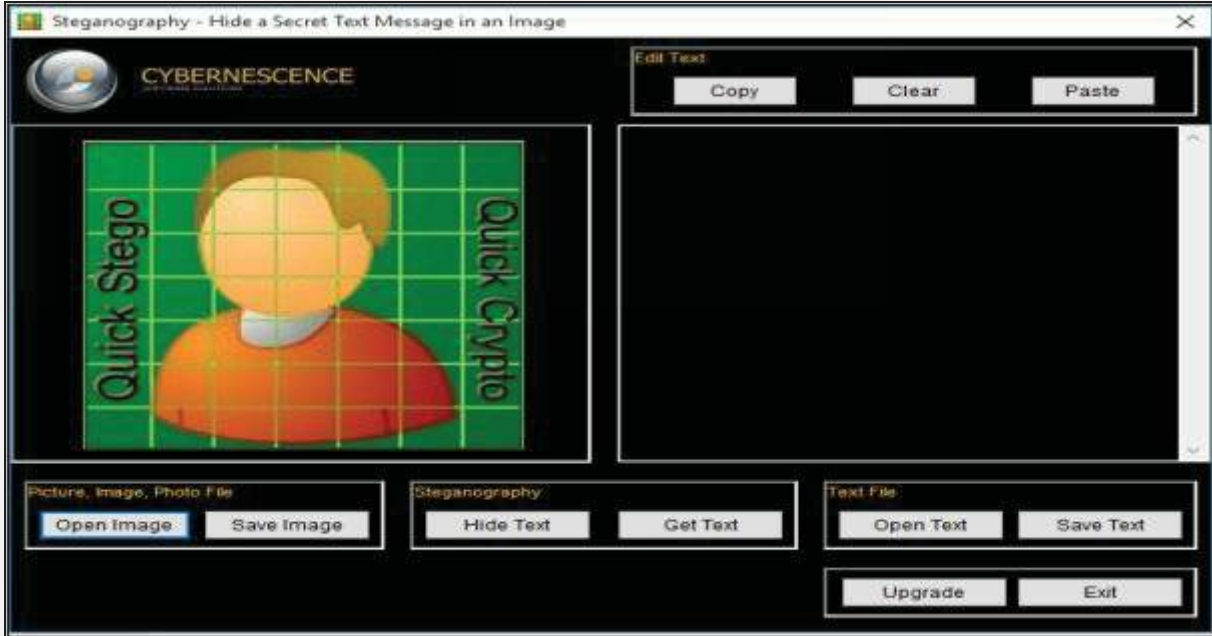


Figure 6-57 QuickStego Application for Image Steganography

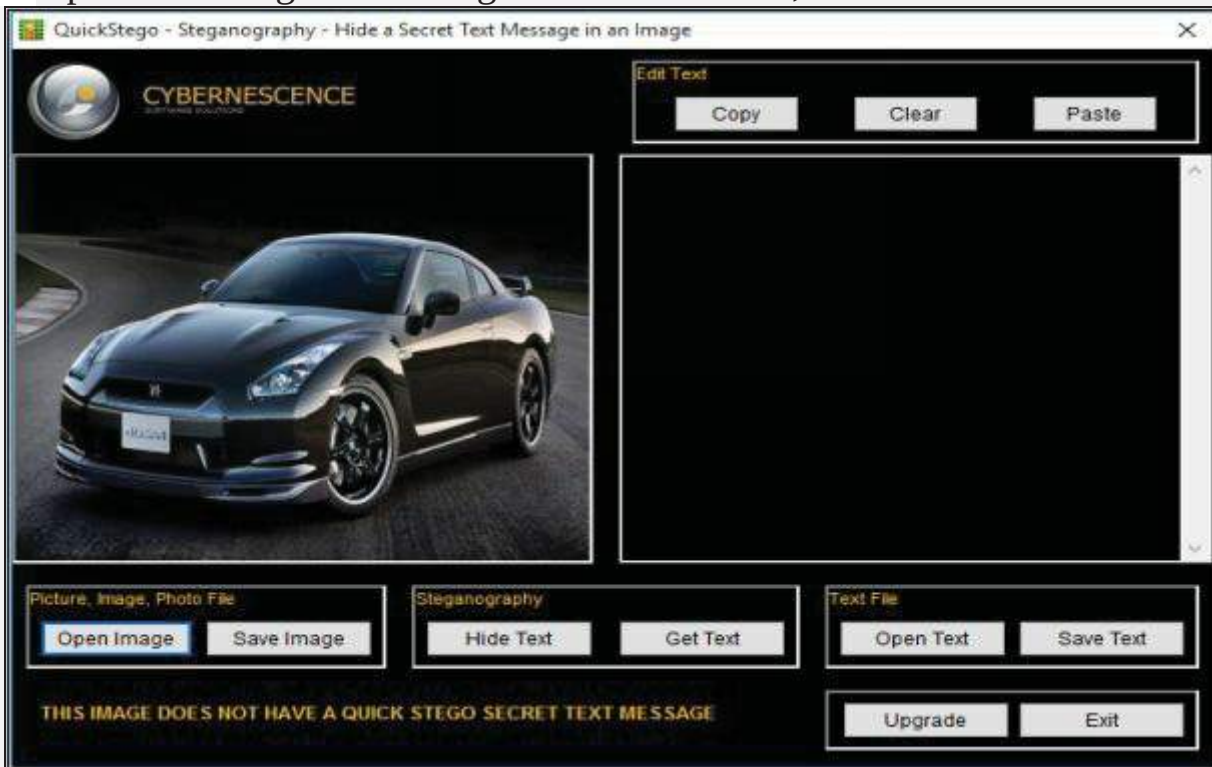


Figure 6-58 Uploading Cover Image

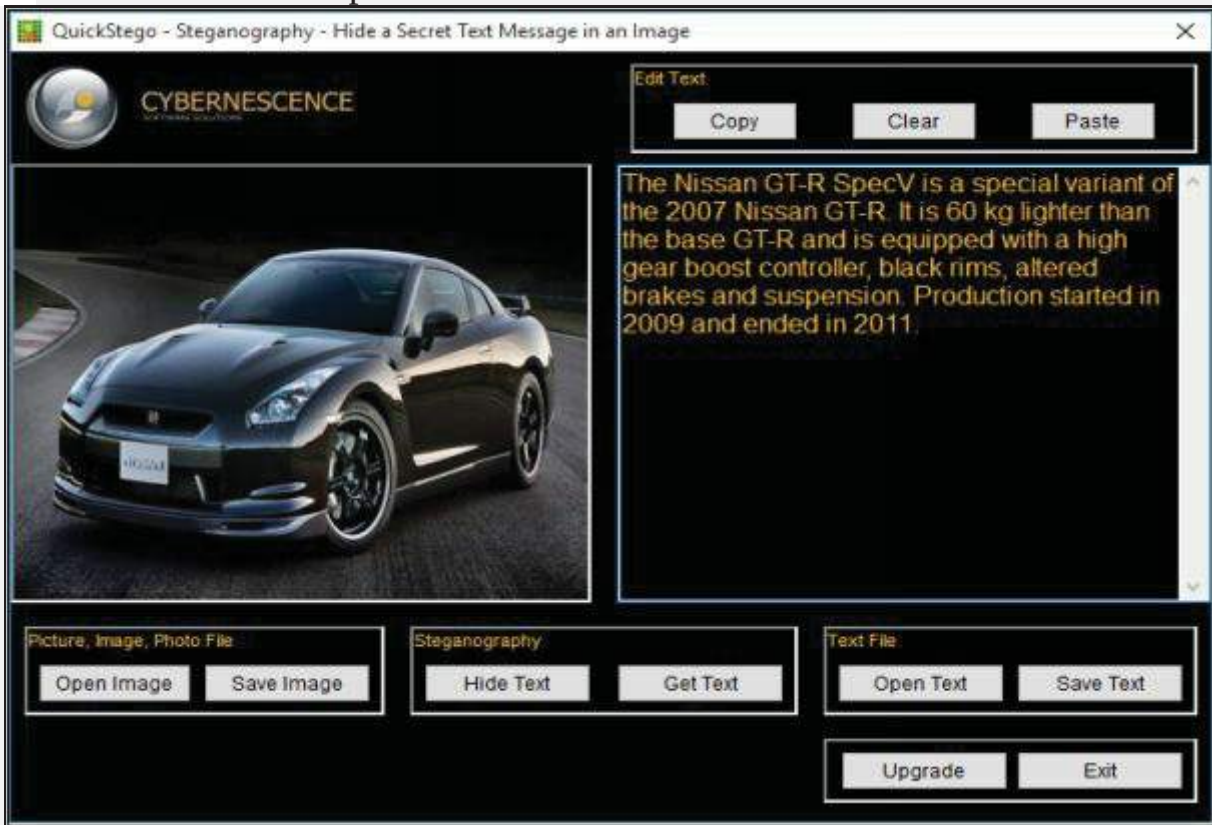


Figure 6-59 Entering Secret Information

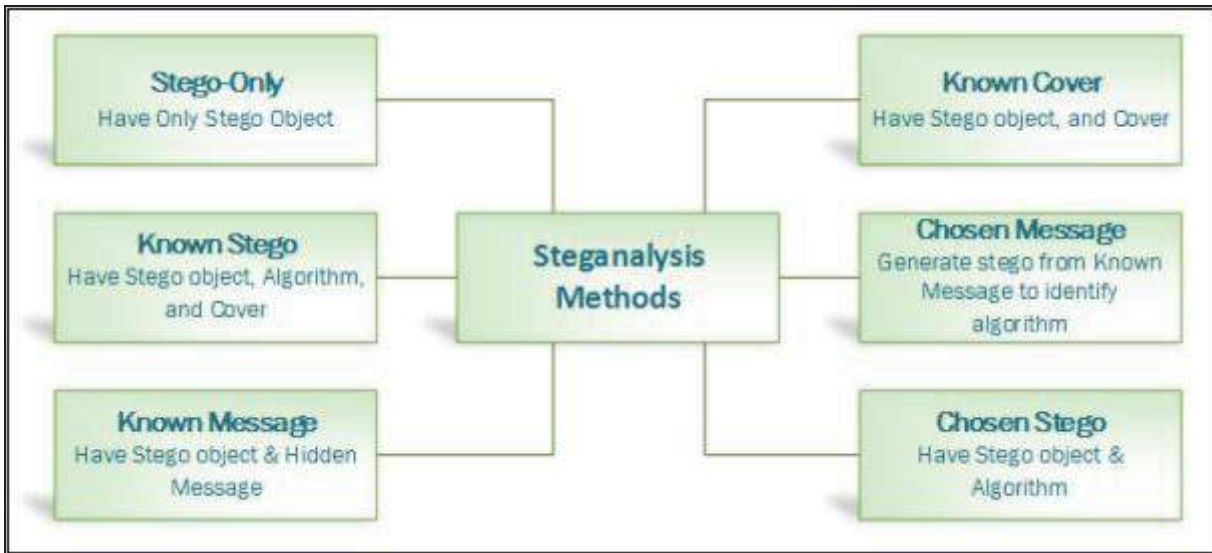


Figure 6-63 Steganalysis Methods

Covering Tracks

After gaining access, escalating privileges, executing the application, the next step is to wipe the evidence to get back. In the phase of covering track, attacker removes all the event logs, error messages, and other evidence to prevent its attack from being discovered easily.

Most Common techniques that are often used by attackers to cover tracks on the target system are: -

- Disable Auditing
- Clearing Logs
- Manipulating Logs

Disabling Auditing

The best approach to avoid detection, preventing another security mechanism to indicate an alert any sort of intrusion, and leaving to track on the target machine. The best practice for leaving no track and prevent detection or leaving very limited evidence on target is by disabling the auditing as you logged on the target system.


When you disable auditing on the target machine, it will not only prevent to log events, but also resist in the detection. Auditing in a system is enabled to detect and track events; once auditing is disabled, target machine will not be able to log the critical and important logs that are not only the evidence of an attack but a great source of information about an attacker.


Figure 6-64 Audit Policy Categories



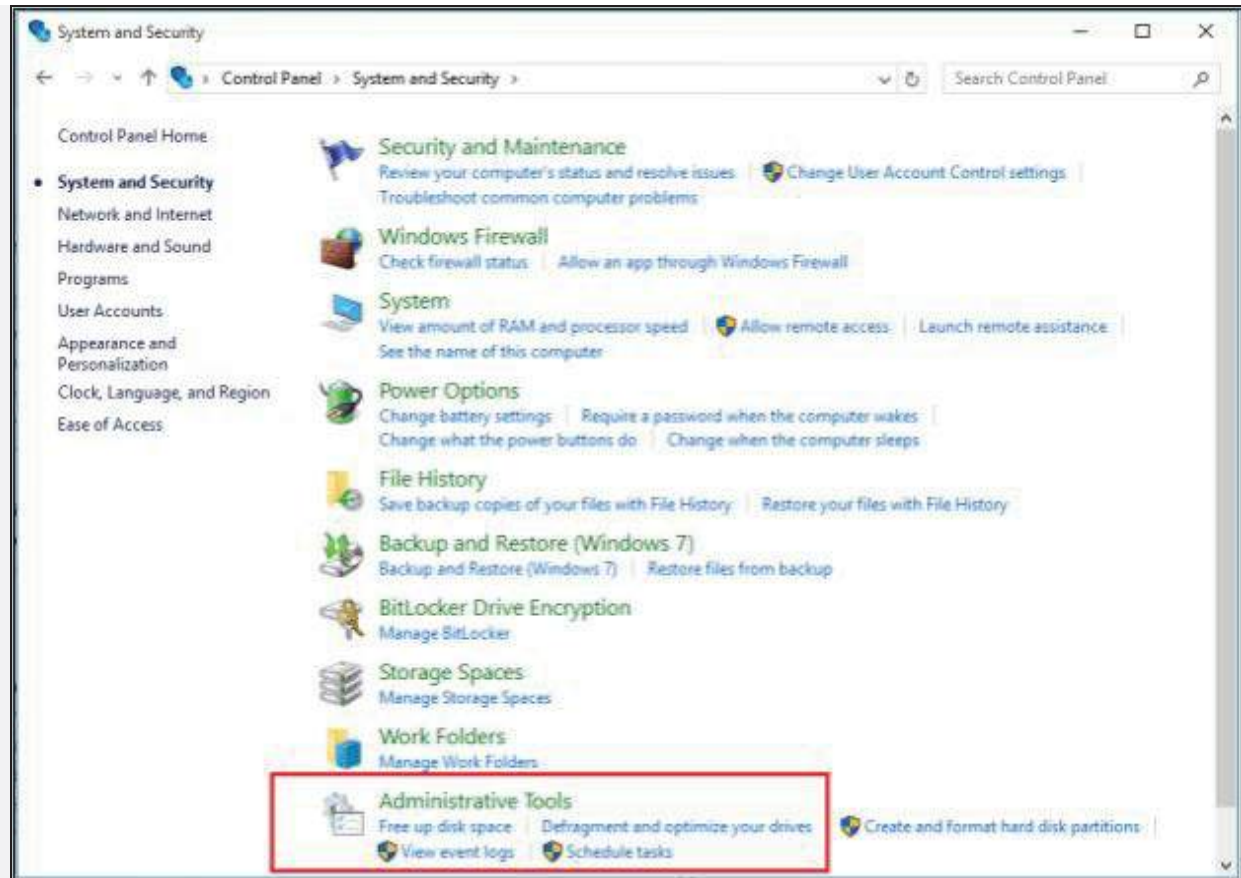


Figure 6-71 System and Security Options

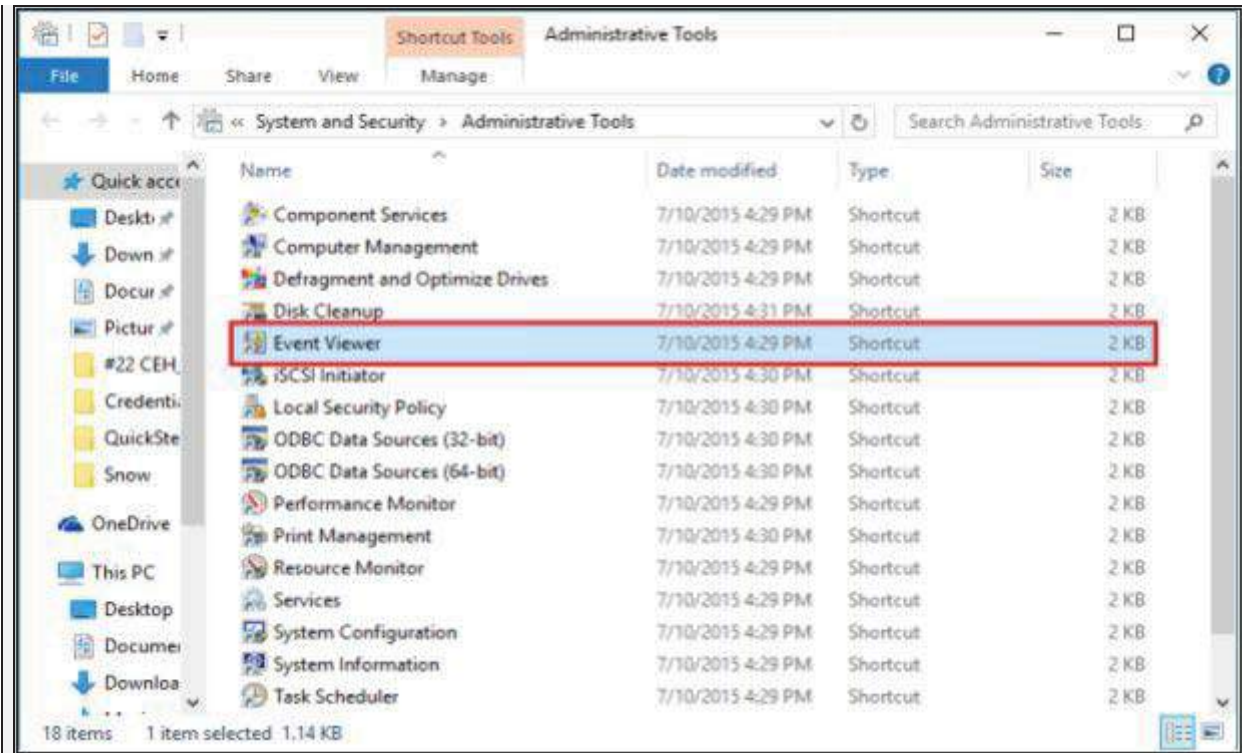


Figure 6-72 Administrative Tools

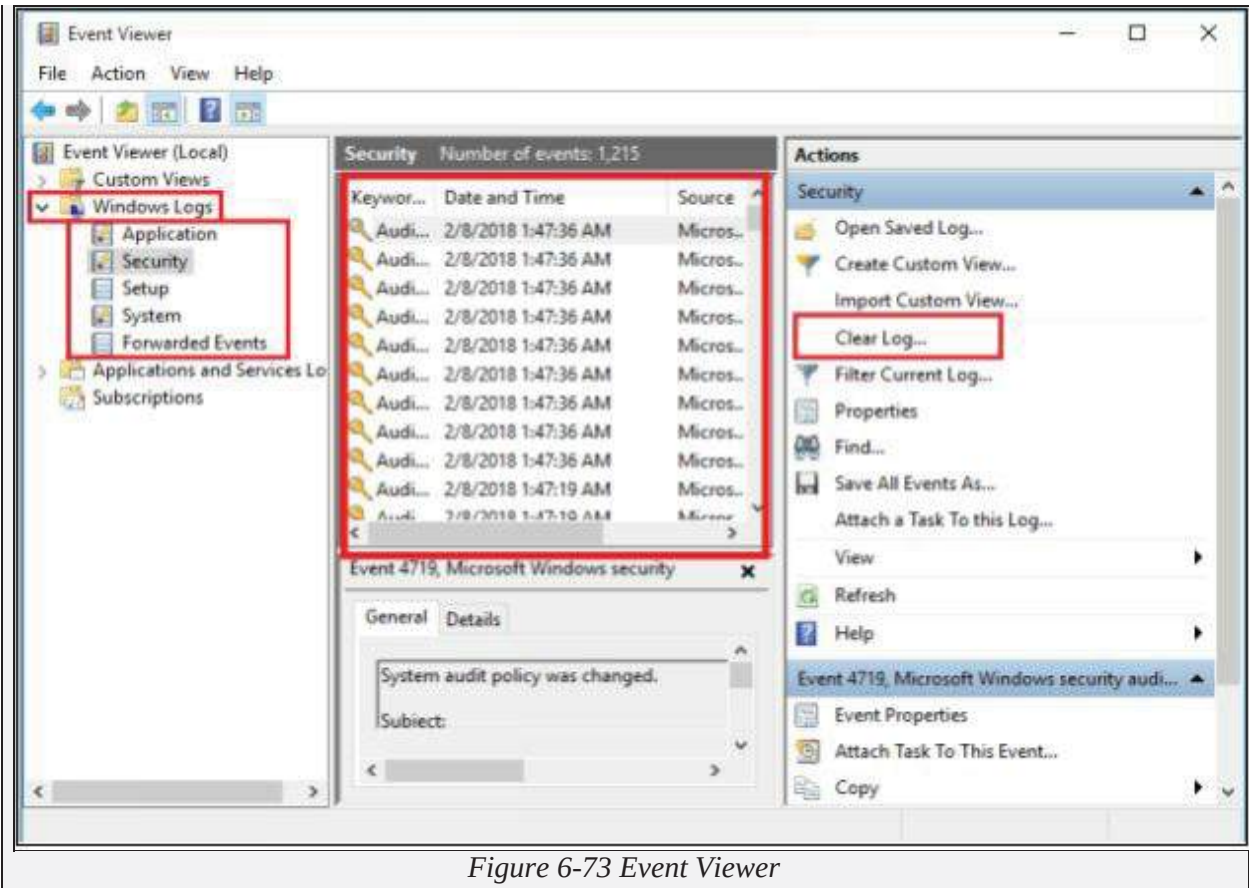


Figure 6-73 Event Viewer

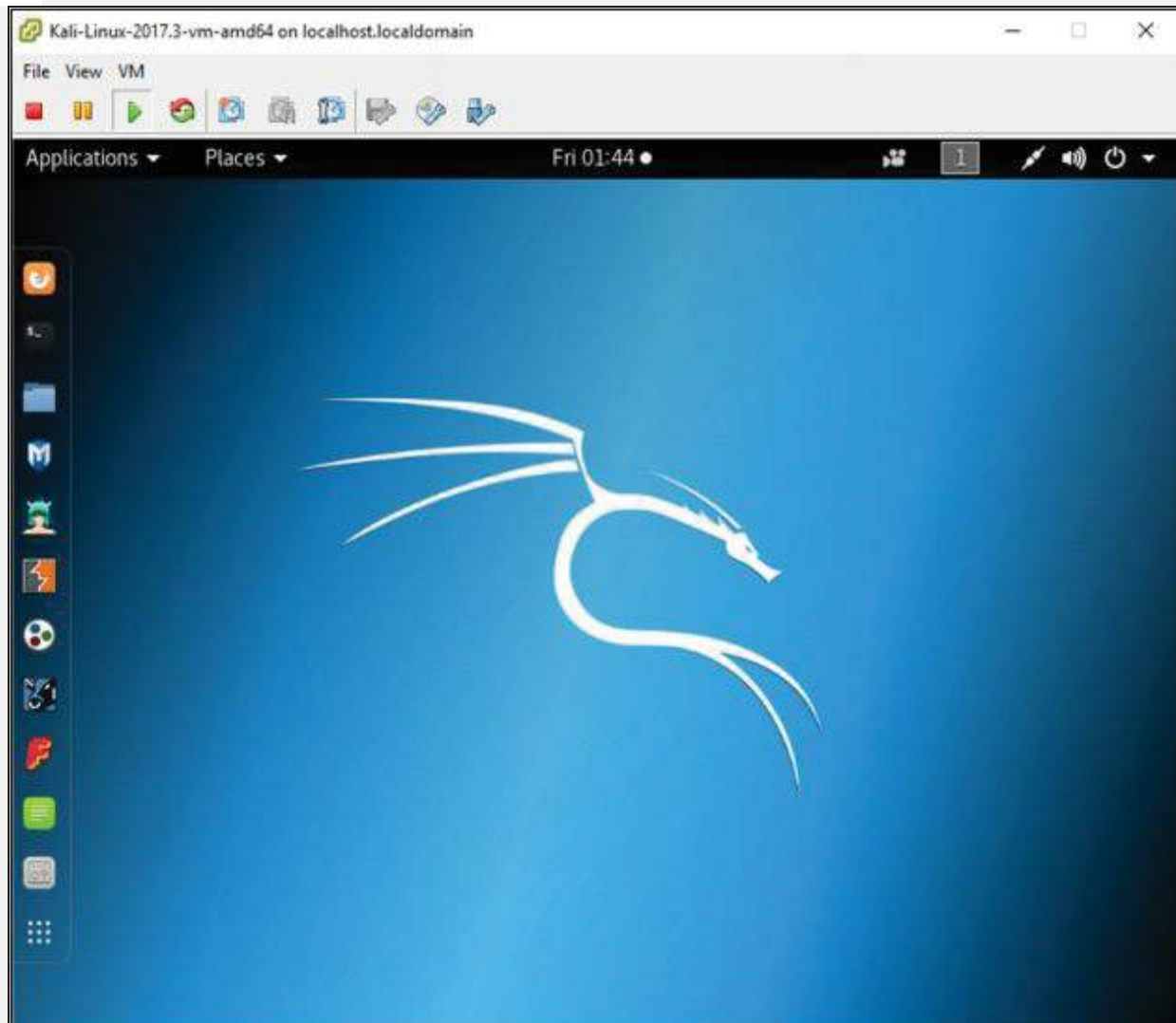


Figure 6-74 Kali Linux Desktop

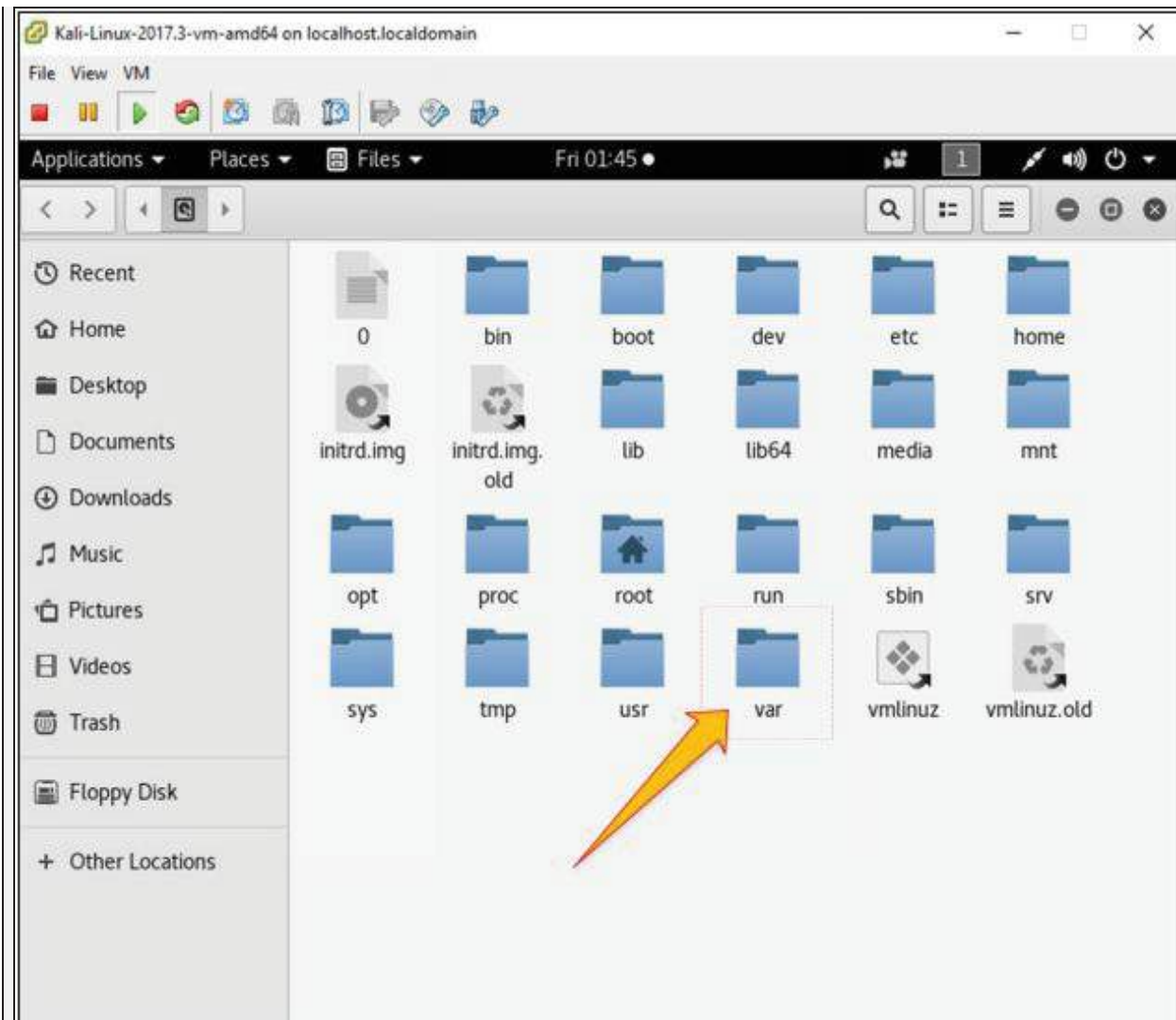


Figure 6-75 /Computer directory

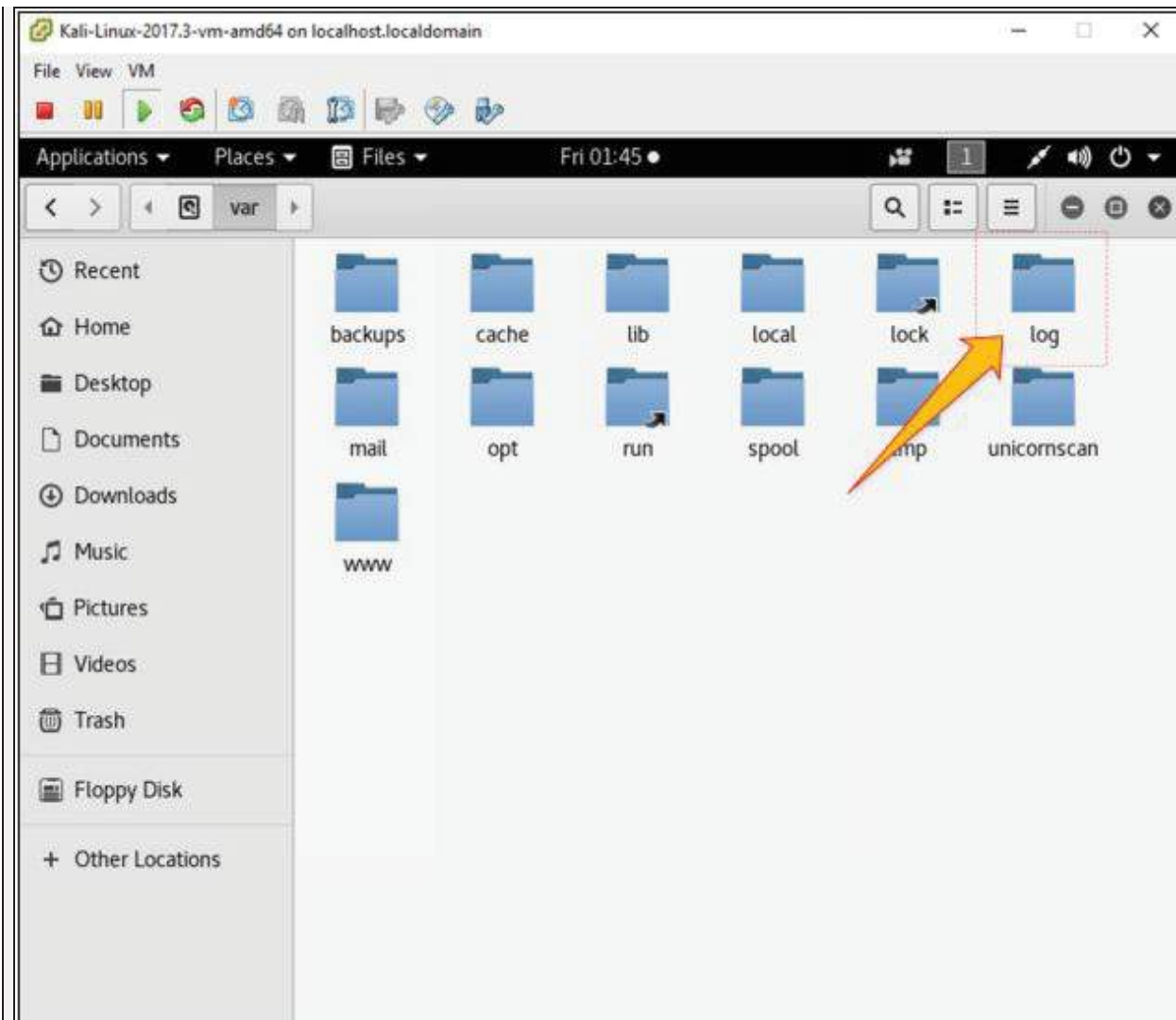


Figure 6-76 /var directory

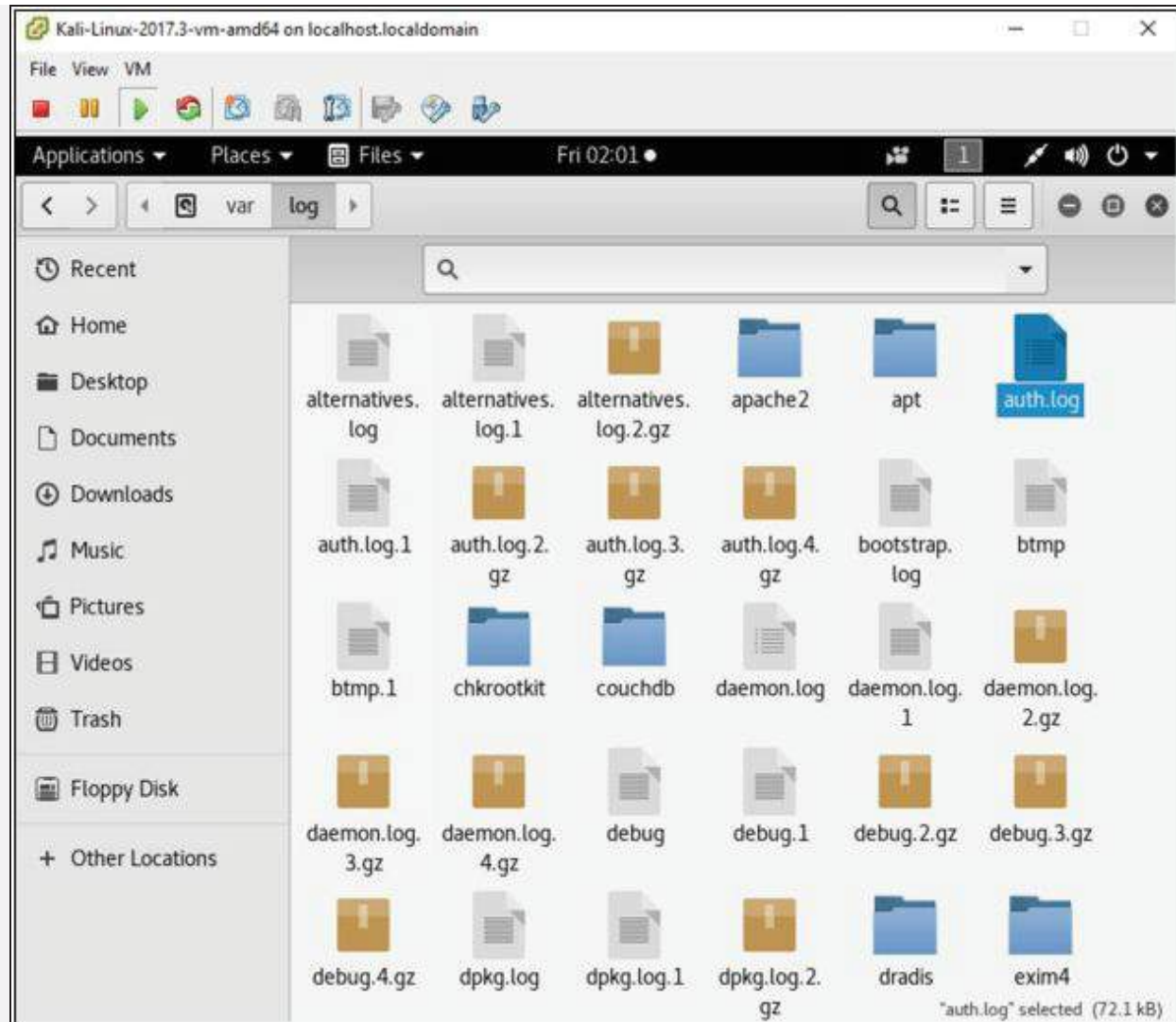



Figure 6-77 /var/log/ directory

Chapter 7: Malware Threats

Technology Brief

Malware

Malware is abbreviated from the term Malicious Software. The term malware is an umbrella term that defines a wide variety of potentially harmful software. This malicious software is specially designed for gaining access to target machines, stealing information and harm the target system. Any software is having malicious intention like damaging, disabling or limiting the control of the legitimate owner and providing control of the target system to the developer of malware or an attacker, or any other malicious intent can be considered as Malware. Malware can be classified into various types including Viruses, Worms, Keyloggers, Spywares, Trojans, Ransomware and other malicious software. Malware is the most critical, prominent, emerging problem now a day. Malicious software classified as Viruses and Worm have some older techniques whereas Malware has some new techniques which makes them more dangerous.

Malware Propagation ways

There are different ways that malware can get into a system. Users should be careful while interacting with these methods. Some of these methods that are popularly used to for the propagation of malware are: -

- ***Free Software***

When software is available on the internet for free, it mostly contains additional software and applications which may belong to the offering organization bundled later by any third party to propagate this malicious software. Most common example of free software is like downloading crack files usually contains additional malicious software, or sometimes it only contains a malware.

- ***File Sharing Services***

File sharing services such as torrent and Peer-to-peer file sharing services transfer the file from multiple computers. During the transfer, the file can be infected, or any infected file may additionally transfer with the transfer because there may be a computer having low, or no security policy.

- ***Removable Media***

Malware can also propagate through removable media such as USB. Various advance Removable media malware is introduced which can propagate through Storage area of USB as well as through Firmware embedded in the hardware. Apart from USB, External hard disk, CD, DVD can also bring malware along with them.

- ***Email Communication***

In an organization, email communication is the most popularly- used way of communication. Malicious software can be sent through email attachment, Email containing malicious URL.

- ***Not using Firewall and Anti-Virus***

Disabling Security Firewalls and Anti-virus programs or not using Internet security software can also allow the malicious software to be download on a system. Anti-virus and Internet security Firewalls can block malicious software from downloading automatically and alert upon detection.

Trojan Concept

Trojan Horse and Trojan are the malicious programs which mislead from its actual intentions. This term is actually derived from a Greek story of a great Wooden horse. This horse had soldiers hiding inside waiting to enter into the city. As this wooden horse reached in the city, soldiers came out and attacked the city.

With this philosophy, Trojan software misleads from its true intentions and wait for best time to attack. These Trojan may provide access to personal information, as well as unauthorized access to the attacker. The trojan can also lead to infection of other connected devices across a network.

Trojan

A Malicious Program misleading the user about its actual intention is classified as Trojan. Trojans are typically spread by Social Engineering. The purpose or most common use of Trojan programs are: -

- Creating back door
- Gaining Unauthorized Access
- Steal Information
- Infect Connected Devices
- Ransomware Attacks
- Using Victim for Spamming
- Using Victim as Botnet
- Downloading other malicious software
- Disabling Firewalls

The infection process using a Trojan is comprised of some steps. This combination of steps is taken by an attacker to infect the target system.

1. Creation of a Trojan using Trojan Construction Kit.
2. Create a Dropper.
3. Create a Wrapper.
4. Propagate the Trojan.
5. Execute the Dropper.

Trojan Construction Kit

Trojan Construction Kit allow the attacker to create their own Trojans. These customized Trojans can be more dangerous for the target as well as an attacker if it is not executed properly or backfires. These customized Trojans created by using Construction kits can avoid detection from virus and Trojan scanning.

Some Trojan Construction Kits are: -

- Dark Horse Trojan Virus Maker
- Senna Spy Generator
- Trojan Horse Construction Kit
- Progenic mail Trojan Construction Kit
- Pandora's Box

Droppers

A dropper is a software or program that is specially designed for delivering a payload on the target machine. The main purpose of Dropper is to install malware codes on to the victim's computer without alerting and avoiding detection. It uses various methods to spread and install malware.

Trojan-Dropper Tools

- TrojanDropper: Win32/Rotbrow.A
- TrojanDropper: Win32/Swisyn
- Trojan: Win32/Meredrop
- Troj/Destover-C

Wrappers

It is a non-malicious file that binds the malicious file to propagate the Trojan. Basically, Wrapper binds a malicious file in order to create and propagate the Trojan along with it to avoid detection. Wrappers are often popular Executable file such as games, music and video files, as well as any other non-malicious file.

Crypter

A Crypter is software used while creating Trojans. The basic purpose of Crypter is it encrypt, obfuscate, and manipulate the malware and malicious programs. By using Crypter for hiding a malicious program, it becomes even more difficult for security programs such as anti-viruses to detect. It is popularly used by hackers to create malware which is capable of bypassing

security programs by presenting itself as a non-malicious program until it gets installed.

Some of the available Crypter to hide malicious programs are: -

- Cryogenic Crypter
- Heaven Crypter
- Swayz Cryptor

Deployment of Trojan

The Deployment process to a Trojan is simple. An Attacker uploads the Trojan on a server where it can be downloaded immediately when the victim clicks on the link. After uploading the Trojan on the server, Attacker sends an email containing a malicious link. When the victim receives this spam email, which may be offering something he is interested in and clicks the link, it will connect it to Trojan Server and download the Trojan on victim PC. Once Trojan is installed on victim's PC, it will connect the attacker to the victim by providing unauthorized access or extract secret information or perform a specific action for which Trojan is designed for.

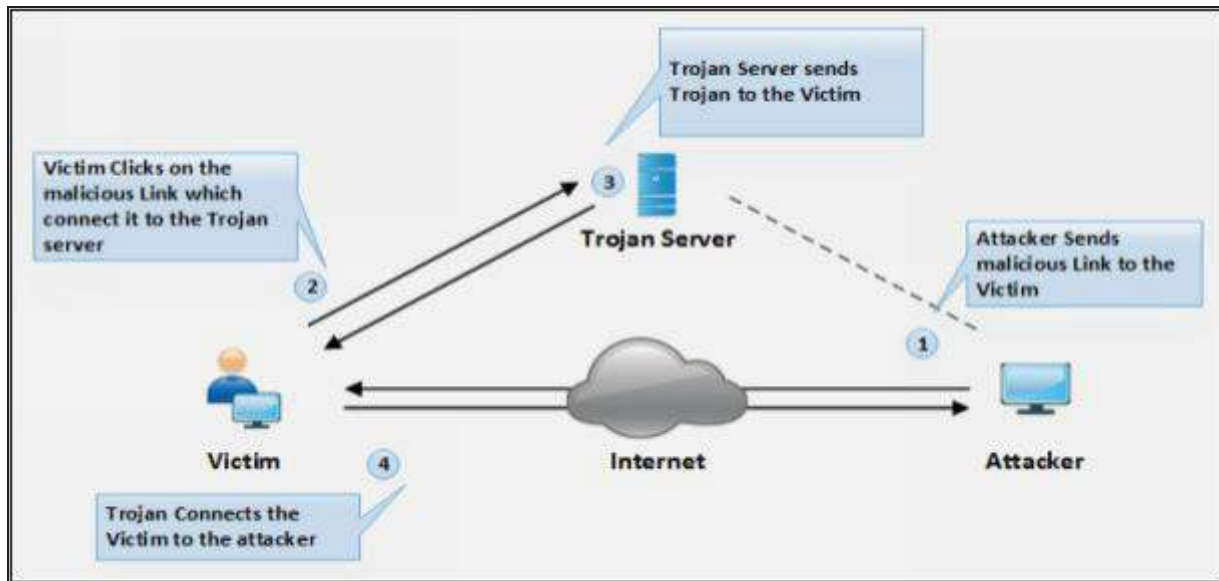


Figure 7-01 Linux Log Directory

Types of Trojans

- ***Command Shell Trojans***

Command Shell Trojans are capable of providing remote control of Command Shell of a victim. Trojan Server of Command Shell Trojan such as Netcat is installed on the target machine. Trojan Server will open the port for

command shell connection to its client application, installed on attacker's machine. This Client Server based Trojan provide access to Command line.

- ***Defacement Trojans***

Using Defacement Trojan, Attacker can view, edit and extract information from any Windows program. Using this information attacker replaces the string, images, and logos often to leave their mark. Using User-Styled Custom Application (UCA), attacker defaces programs. Website Defacement is most popularly known; it is the same concept on applications running on the target machine.

- ***HTTP/HTTPS Trojans***

HTTP and HTTPS Trojans bypasses the firewall inspection and execute on the target machine. After execution, they create HTTP/ HTTPS tunnel to communicate with the attacker from victim's machine.

- ***Botnet Trojans***

A botnet is the large scale of the compromised system. These compromised systems are not limited to a specific LAN; they may be spread over the large geographical area. These Botnets are controlled by Command and Control Center. These botnets are used to launch attacks such as Denial of Service, Spamming and other.

- ***Proxy Server Trojans***

Trojan-Proxy Server is standalone malware application which is capable of turning the host system into a proxy server. Proxy Server Trojan allows the attacker to use victim's computer as a proxy by enabling the proxy server on victim's system. This technique is used to launch further attacked by hiding the actual source of the attack.

- ***Remote Access Trojans (RAT)***

Remote Access Trojan (RAT) allows the attacker to get remote desktop access to victim's computer by enabling Port which allows the GUI access to the remote system. RAT includes a back door for maintaining administrative access and control over the victim. Using RAT, an attacker can monitor user's activity, access confidential information, take screenshots and record audio and video using a webcam, format drives and alter files, etc.

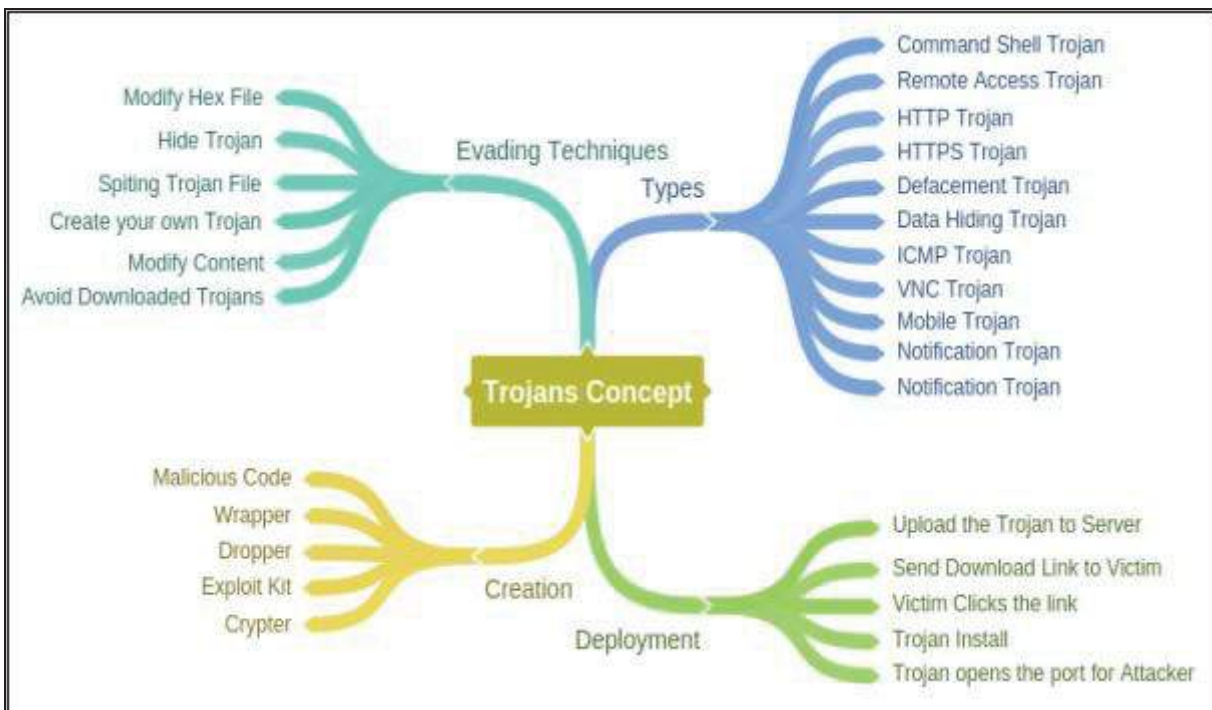

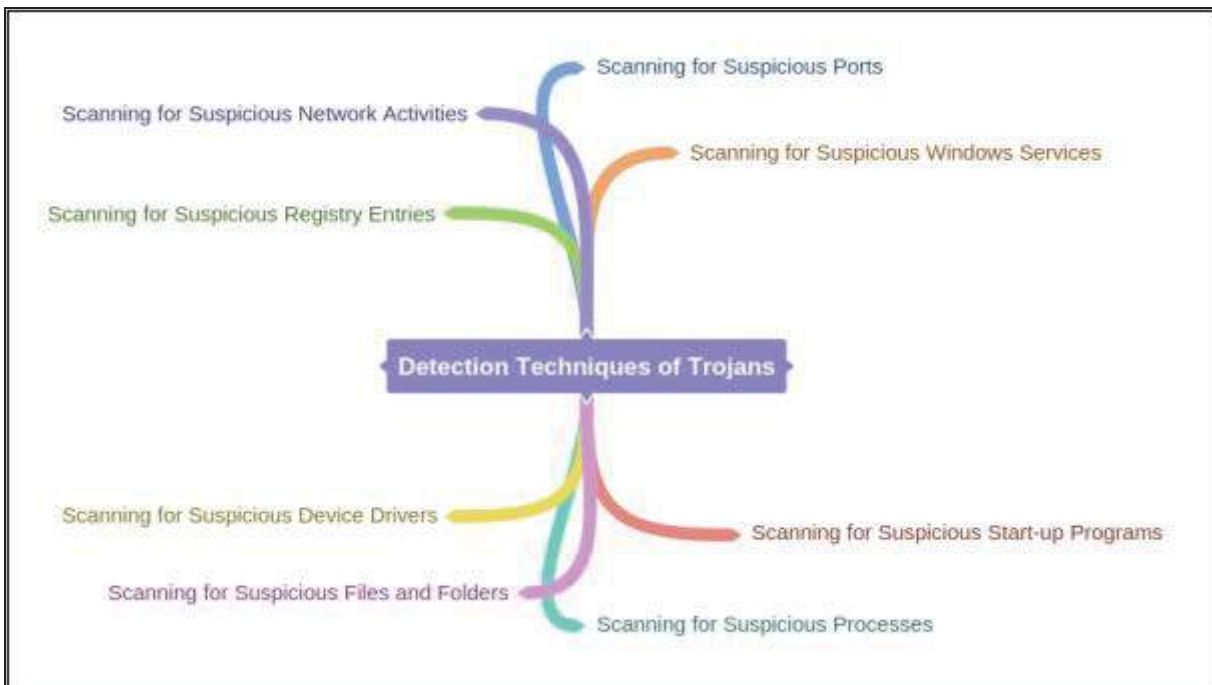

Virus and Worms Concepts

Viruses are the oldest form of the malicious program; it was first introduced in 1970. In this section, we will discuss the virus and worms, how viruses are classified to be different from other malicious programs, how to create viruses and how does virus infect the target.

Viruses

The virus is a self-replicating program; it is capable of producing multiple copies of itself by attaching with another program of any format. These viruses can be executed as soon as they are downloaded, it may wait for the host to execute them as well as be in sleep for a predetermined time. The major characteristics of viruses are: -

- Infecting other files
- Alteration of data
- Transformation
- Corruption
- Encryption
- Self-Replication

Stages of Virus Life

The process of developing a virus till its detection is divided into the following six stages. These stages include the creation of a virus program, its execution, detection, and anti-virus stages. The methodology of Developing a virus is classified as: -

- **Design**

In Designing phase, Virus is created. To design a virus, the developer can create its own virus code completely from scratch using programming languages, either he can use construction kits.

- **Replication**

In Replication phase when the virus is deployed, the virus replicates for a certain time period in a target system. After the certain period, the virus will spread itself. Replication of different viruses may differ depending upon how the developer wants to replicate them. usually, this replication process is very fast to infect the target in short order.

- **Launch**

Launch stage is the stage when user accidentally launches the infected program. Once this virus is launch, it starts performing the action it is designed for. For example, a virus is specially designed for destroying the data; once the virus is activated, it starts corrupting the data.

- **Detection**

In the detection phase, the behavior of a virus is observed, and the virus is identified as a potential threat to systems. Typically, antivirus developers observe the behavior of a reported virus.

- **Incorporation**

Anti-Virus Software developer after identification, detection and observing the behavior of a virus, design a defensive code in term of anti-virus or an update to provide support to an older version of anti-viruses to detect this new type of virus.

- **Elimination**

The user, by installing the update of an anti-virus, or downloading the newer version of anti-virus capable of detecting advanced threats can eliminate the threat from its operating system.

Working of Viruses

Working on Virus is a two-phase process. in which virus replicates onto an executable file and attack on a system. Different phases of virus operation are defined below: -

1. Infection Phase

During Infection phase, virus planted on a target system replicate itself onto an executable file. By replicating into a legitimate software, it can be launch when a user runs the legitimate application for its use. These Viruses spread by reproducing and infecting the programs, documents, or e-mail attachments. Similarly, they can be propagated through e-mails, file sharing or downloaded files from internet. They can be entering into an operating system through CDs, DVDs, USB-drives and any other sort of digital media.

2. Attack Phase

In the Attack Phase, the Infected file is executed accidentally by the user,

or by any other way. Viruses normally require a triggering action to infect a victim. This infection can be minimized to complete destruction and corruption of program files and data. Some Virus can initiate an attack when they are executed, but they can also have configured to infect upon certain predefined conditions.

Ransomware

Ransomware is a malware program which restricts the access to system files and folder by encrypting them. Some type of ransomware may lock the system as well. Once the system is encrypted, it requires decryption key to unlock the system and files. Attacker demands a ransom payment in order to provide the decryption key to remove restrictions. Online payments using Digital currencies like Ukash and Bitcoins are used for ransoms which are difficult to trace. Ransomware is normally deployed using Trojans. One of the best examples of ransomware is WannaCry Ransomware attack.

The following are the most common, widely known types of ransomware family: -

- Cryptobit Ransomware
- CryptoLocker Ransomware
- CryptoDefense Ransomware
- CryptoWall Ransomware
- Police-themed Ransomware

Types of Viruses

- **System or Boot Sector Viruses**

Boot Sector Virus is designed to move actual Master Boot Record (MBR) from its actual location. Boot Sector Virus responds from the original location of MBR when the system boots, it executes the virus first. Boot sector virus altered the boot sequence by infecting the MBR. It infects the system causing boot problems, performance issues, instability and inability to locate directories.

- **File and Multipartite Viruses**

File or multipartite viruses infect systems in various ways. File viruses infect the files which are executed like executable file or BAT files. Multipartite Virus can infect boot sector and files simultaneously, hence the term multipartite. Attack targets may include boot sector and

executable files on the hard drive.

- **Macro Viruses**

Macro Virus is a type of virus that is specially designed for the application of Microsoft Word, Excel and other application using Visual Basic for Application (VBA). Macro languages help to automate and create a new process which is used abusively by running on victim's system.

- **Cluster Viruses**

Cluster Virus dedicatedly designed for attack and modify the file location table or directory table. Cluster virus attacks in a different way. By altering the actual file located in the directory table, file entries point the viruses instead of an actual file. In this way, when a user attempts to run an application, the virus is executed instead.

- **Stealth/Tunneling Viruses**

These type of viruses uses different techniques to avoid detection by an anti-virus program. In order to evade detection, Stealth virus employs tunnel technique to launch under anti-virus via a tunnel and intercepting request from Operating System Interruption handler. Anti-virus uses their own tunnels to detect these types of attacks.

- **Logic Bombs**

A logic bomb virus is designed to remain in a waiting state or sleep mode until a predetermined period, event or action occurs. Fulfillment of condition triggers the virus to exploit, the payload detonates and perform its intended task. These Logic bombs are difficult to detect, as they are unable to detect in sleep mode and can cause destruction after triggering as it may be too late.

- **Encryption Virus**

Encryption viruses are the type of virus uses encryption, capable of scrambling to avoid detection. Due to this ability, these viruses are difficult to detect. They use new encryption to encrypt and decrypt the code as it replicates and infects.

Other types of viruses

Some other types of viruses are: -

Writing a Simple Virus Program

Creating a virus is a simple process, although it depends upon the intention of the developer what is his intention. High profiled developer prefers to design code from scratch. The following are some steps to create a basic virus which can perform a certain action upon the trigger. To create a virus, you may have a notepad application and bat2com application, or you can create using GUI based virus creating an application.

Simple Virus Program using Notepad

1. Create a directory having bat file and text file.
2. Open Notepad Application
3. Enter the code as shown

4. Save the file in .bat format.
5. Convert the file using bat2com utility or bat to the .exe converter.
6. It will save an Exe file in the current directory which will execute upon click.

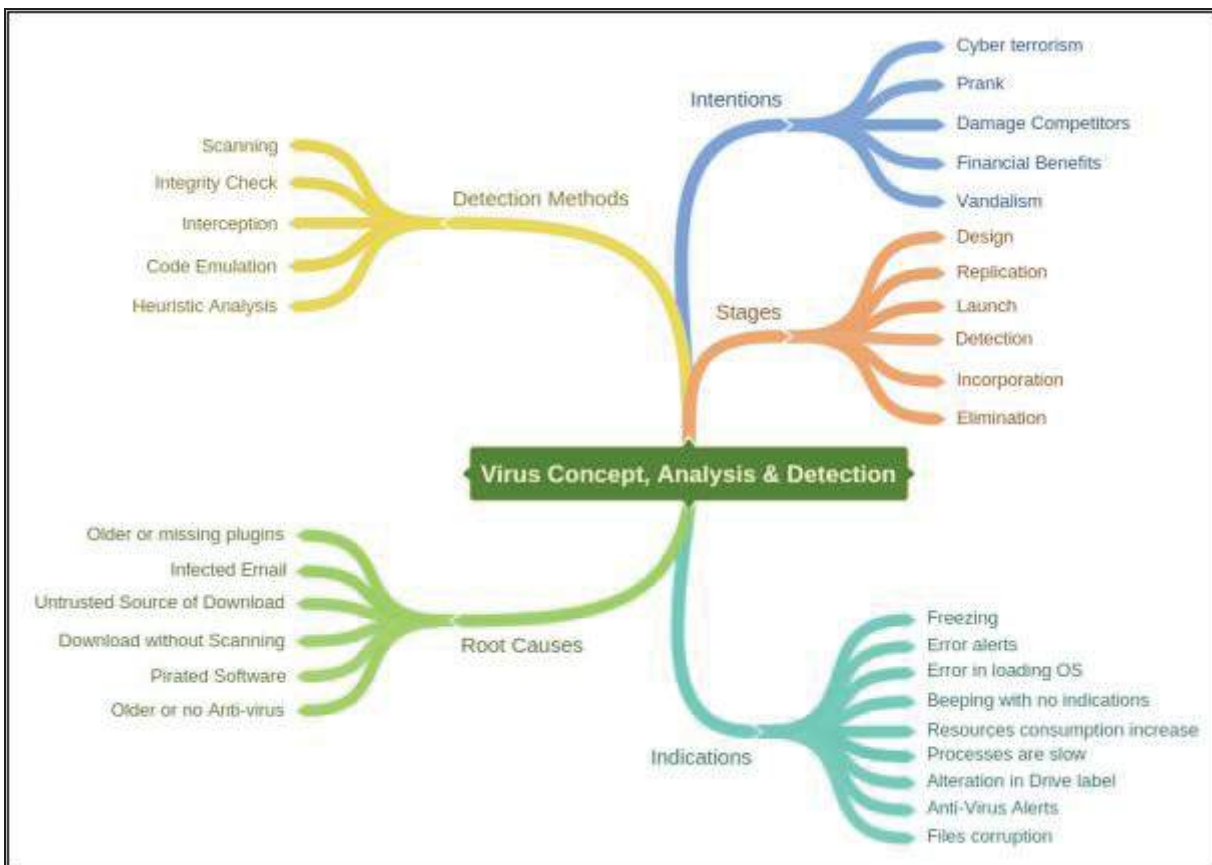

Computer Worms

Worms are a type of malware. Unlike viruses requiring a triggering event to perform intended tasks, Worms can replicate themselves but cannot attach themselves. The worm can propagate using File transport and spread across the infected network which virus is not capable of.

Virus Analysis and Detection Methods

Detection phase of virus initiate with scanning, Initially, the suspected file is scanned for the signature string. In the second step of the detection method, entire disk is checked for integrity. Integrity checker records integrity of all files on a disk by calculating Checksum usually. If a file is altered by a virus, it can be detected through integrity check. In an Interception step, Request from Operating system is monitored. Interception software's are used to detect virus resembling behaviors and generate a warning for users. Code Emulation and Heuristic Analysis include behavioral analysis and Code analysis of virus by executing it in a sophisticated environment.



Malware Reverse Engineering

Sheep Dipping

Sheep Dipping is the analysis of suspected file and packets against viruses and malware before allowing them to be available for users in an isolated environment. This analysis is performing on a dedicated computer. This is initial line of defense running, with highly secured computing along with port monitoring, file monitoring, anti-viruses and other security programs.

Malware Analysis

Malware Analysis is the process of identification of a malware till its verification that malware is completely removed, including observing the behavior of malware, scoping the potential threat to a system and finding other measures. Before explaining the malware analysis, the need for malware analysis and goal to be achieved by this analytics must be defined. Security analyst and security professional at some point in their career have performed malware analysis. The major goal of malware analysis is to gain detailed information and observe the behavior of malware, to maintain incident response and defense action to secure the organization.

Malware Analyses process start with Preparing the Testbed for analysis. Security Professional get ready a Virtual machine as a host operating system where dynamic malware analysis will be performed by executing the malware over the guest operating system. This host operating system is isolated from another network to observe the behavior of malware by quarantine the malware from the network.

After Executing a malware in a Testbed, Static and Dynamic Malware analysis are performed. Network connection is also setup later to observe the behavior using Process monitoring tools and Packet monitoring tools and debugging tools like OllyDbg and ProcDump.

Goals of Malware Analysis

Malware analysis goals are defined below: -

- Diagnostics of threat severity or level of attack.
- Diagnostics of the type of Malware.
- Scope the attack
- Built defense to secure organization's network and systems.

- Finding a root cause.
- Built Incident response actions.
- Develop Anti-malware to eliminate.

Types of Malware Analysis

Malware analysis is classified into two basic types.

- **Static Analysis**

Static Analysis or Code Analysis is performed by fragmenting the resources of the binary file without executing it and study each component. Disassembler such as IDA is used to disassemble the binary file.

- **Dynamic Analysis**

Dynamic Analysis or Behavioural Analysis is performed by executing the malware on a host and observing the behavior of the malware. These behavioral analyses are performed in a Sandbox environment.

Sandboxing technology helps in detection of threat in a dedicated manner in a sophisticated environment. During Sandboxing of a Malware, it is searched in the Intelligence database for the analysis report. It might be possible that diagnostics details are available if the threat is detected previously. When a threat is diagnosed before, its analytics are recorded for future use; it helps to diagnose now. If a match found is in the database, it helps in responding quickly.

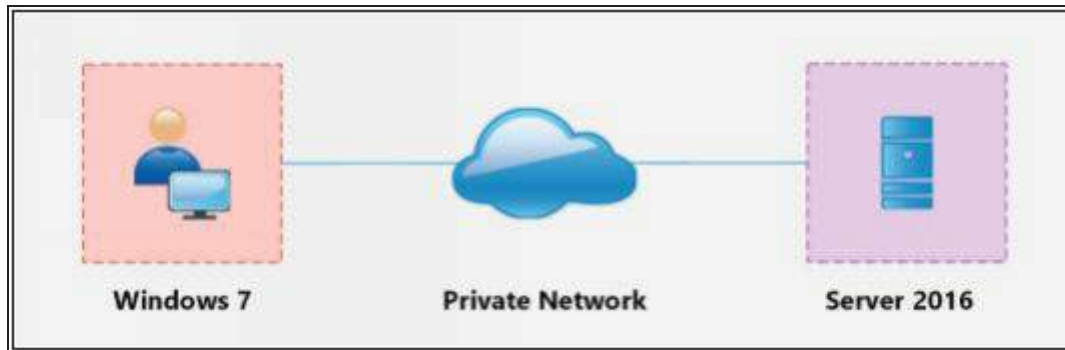


Figure 7-02 Topology Diagram

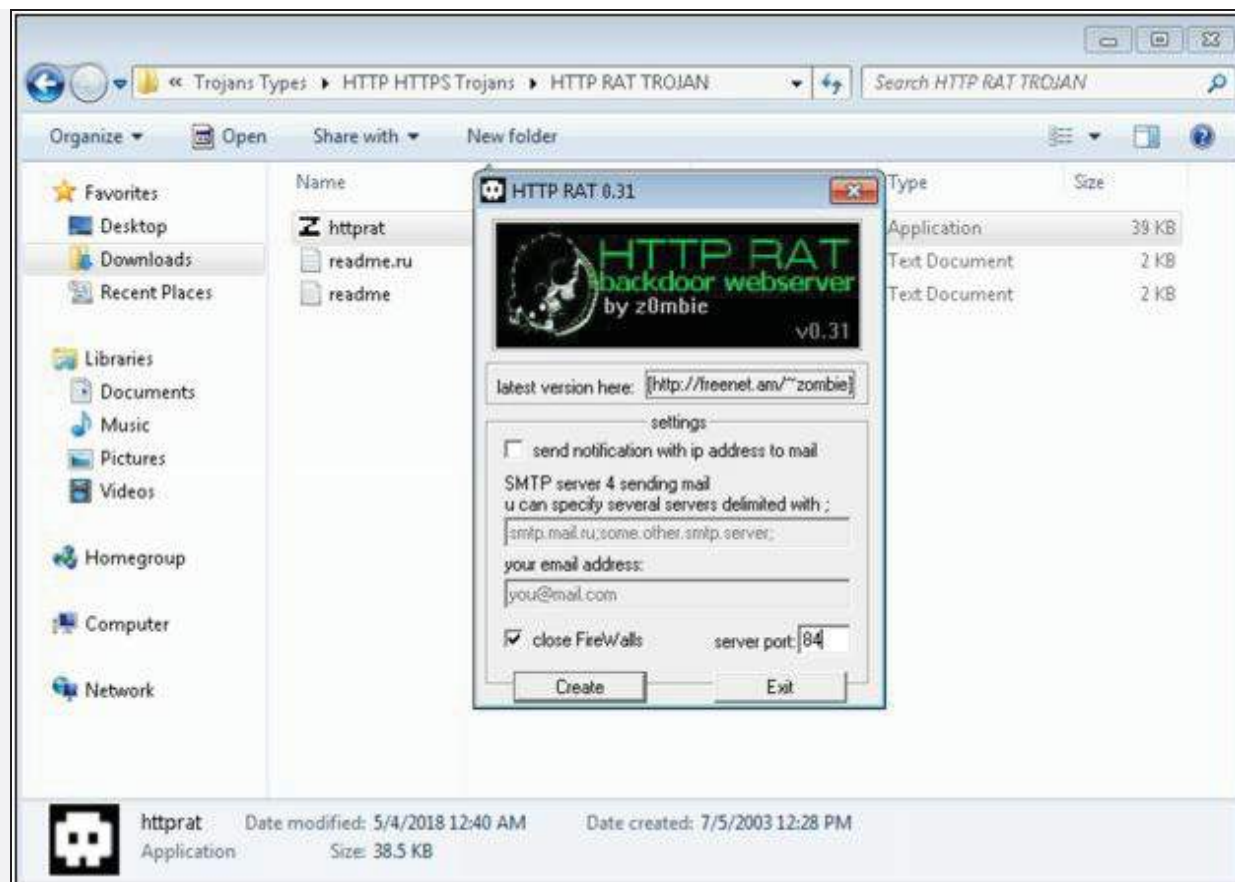


Figure 7-03 HTTP RAT Trojan

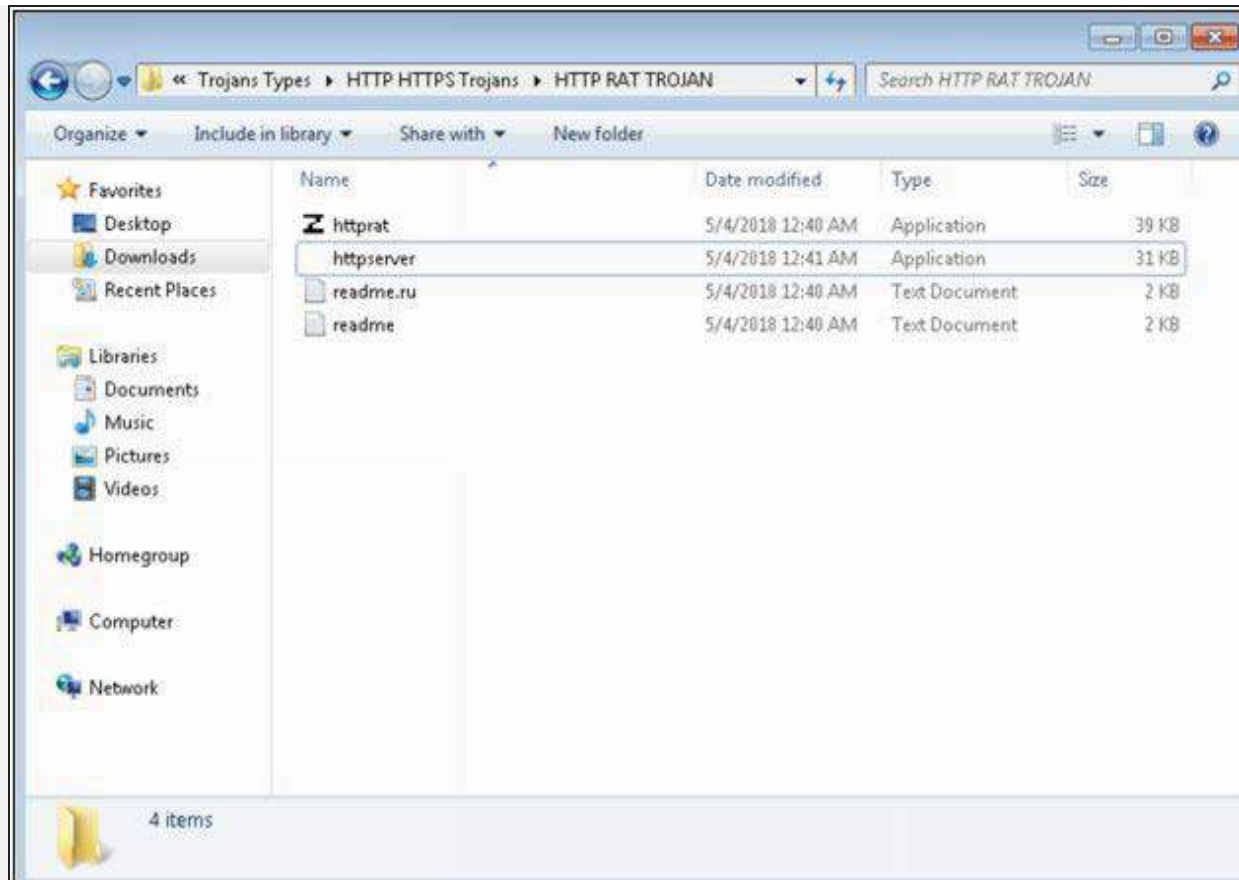


Figure 7-04 Trojan EXE file created

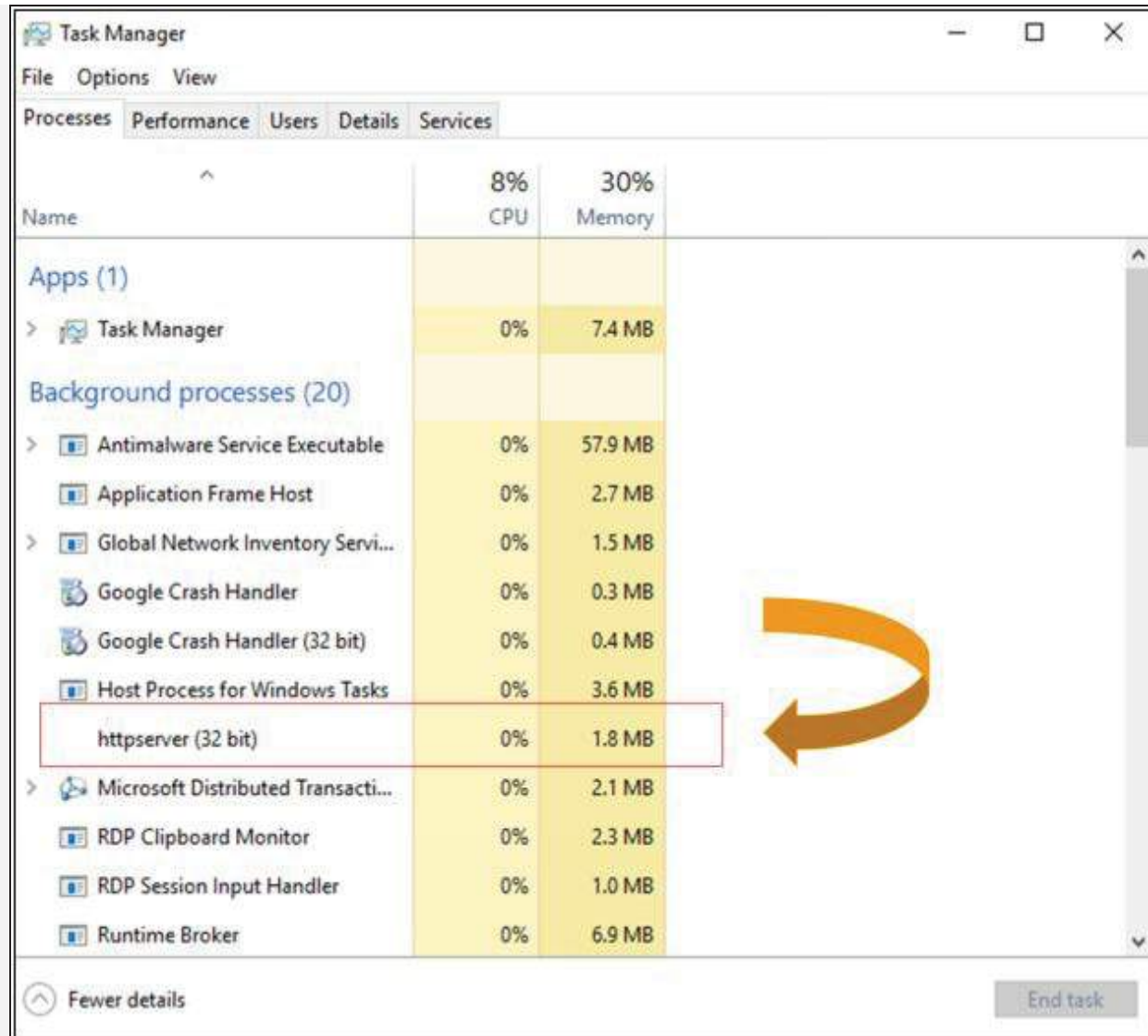


Figure 7-05 Trojan process on Victim machine

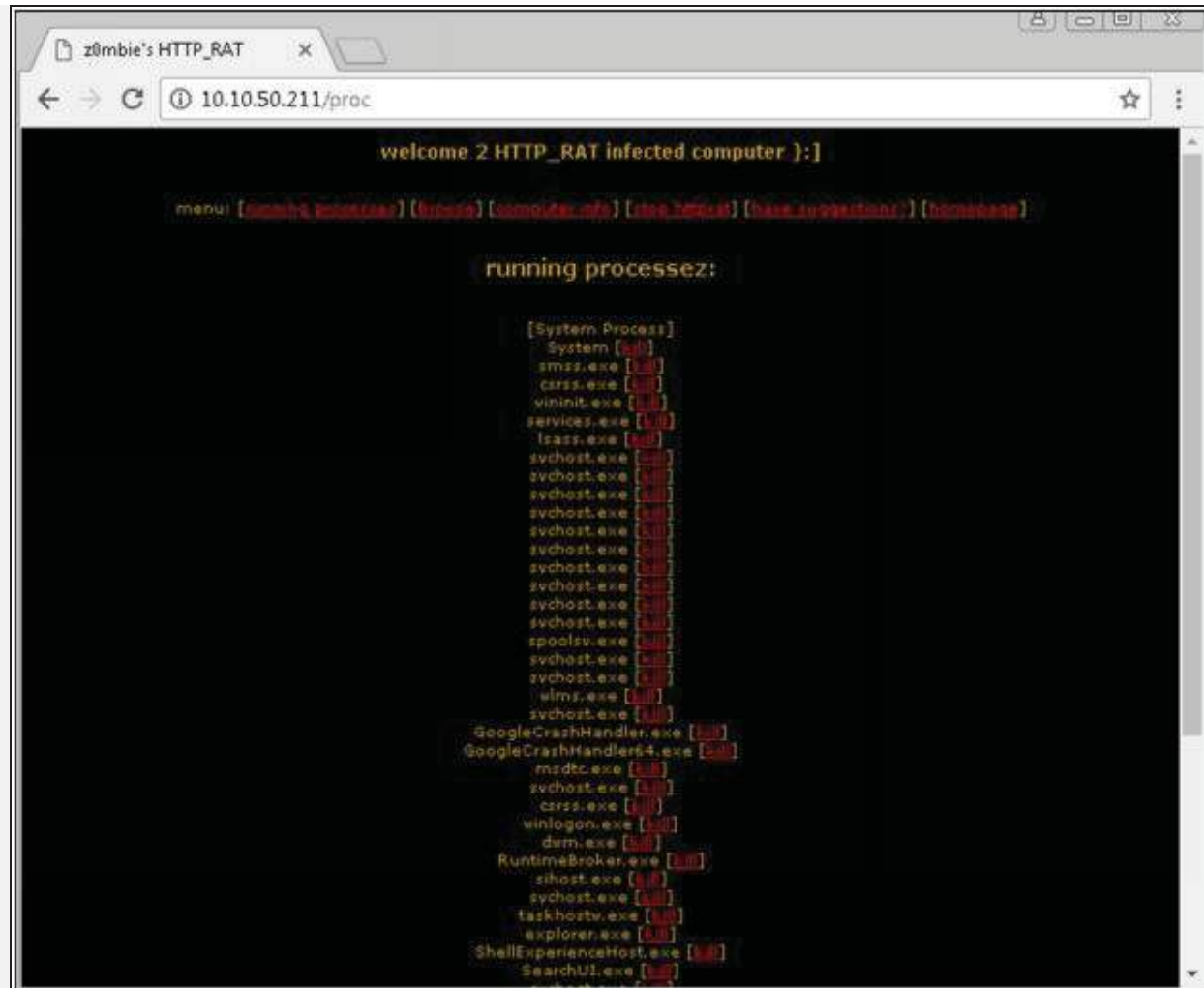


Figure 7-07 Running Process on Victim

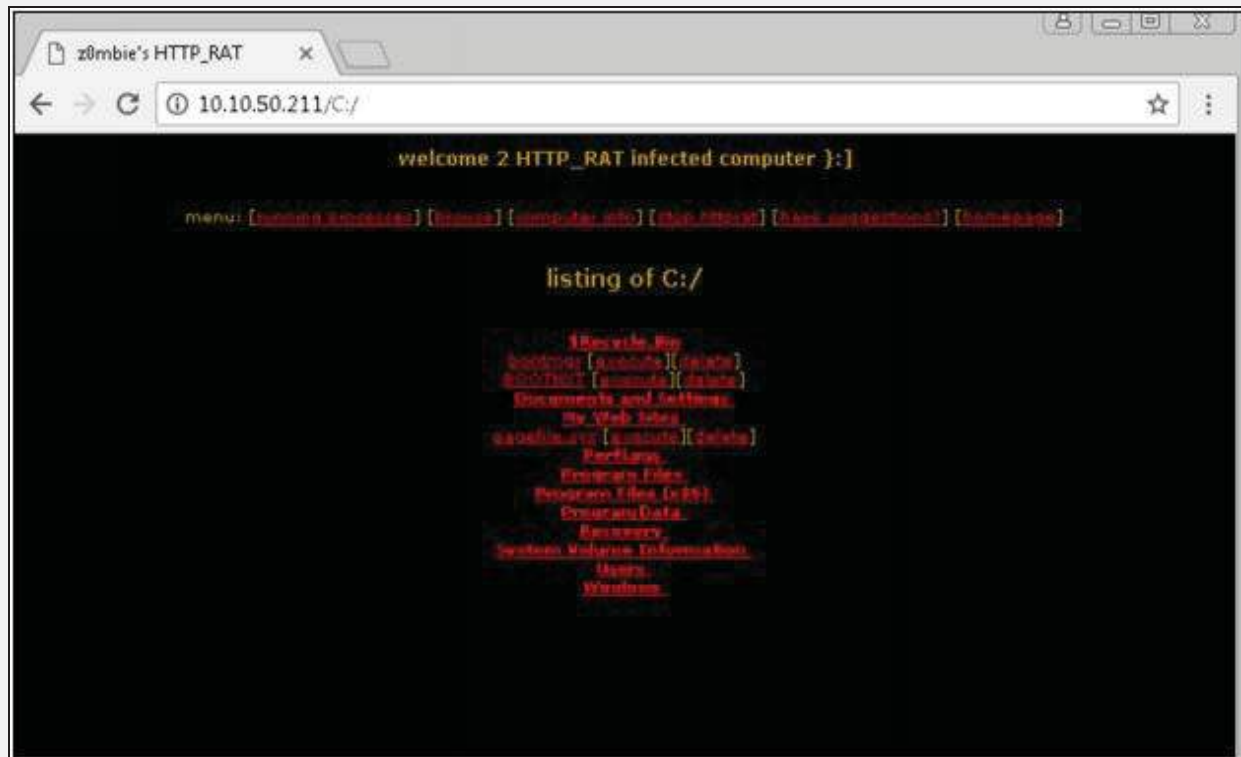


Figure 7-09 C drive of Victim

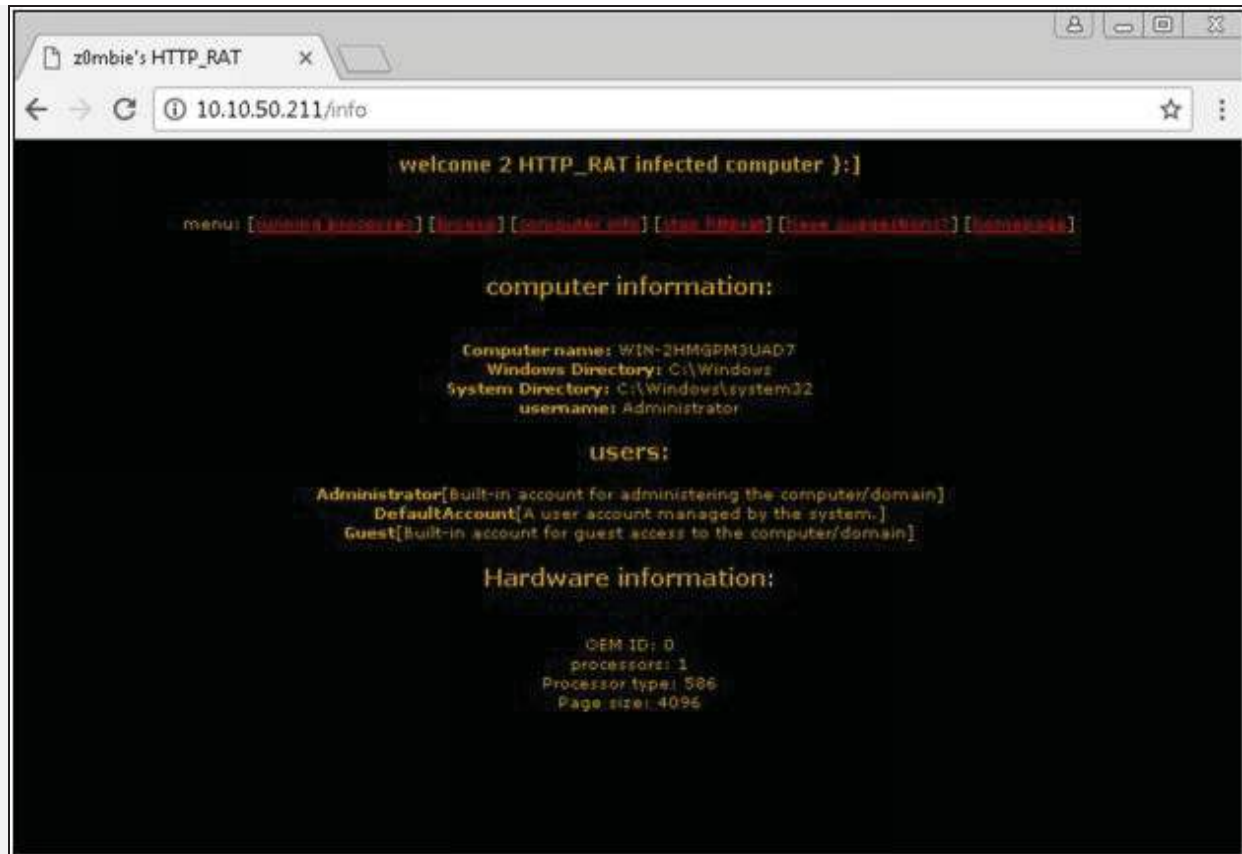


Figure 7-10 Computer's information of Victim

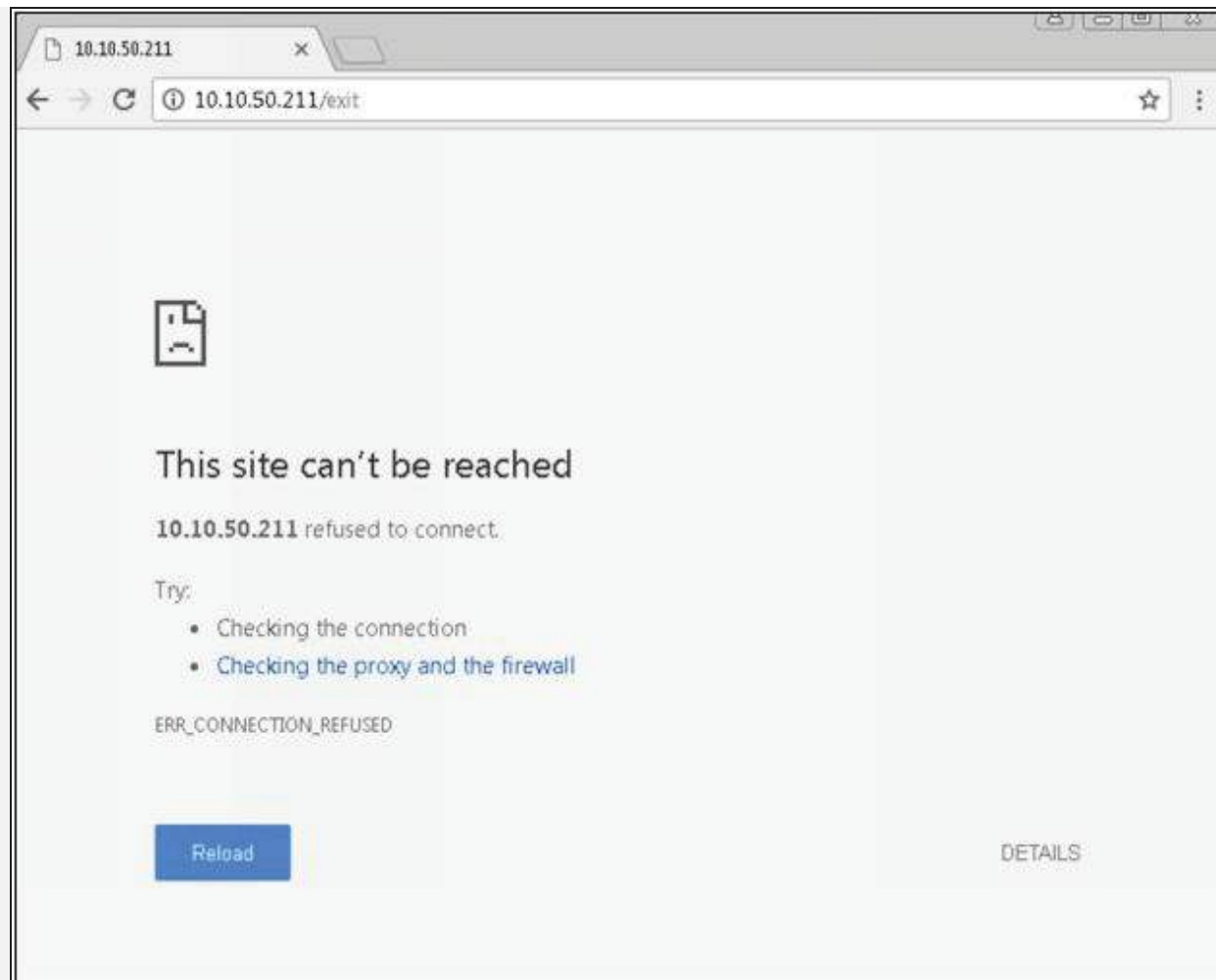


Figure 7-12 Connection terminated

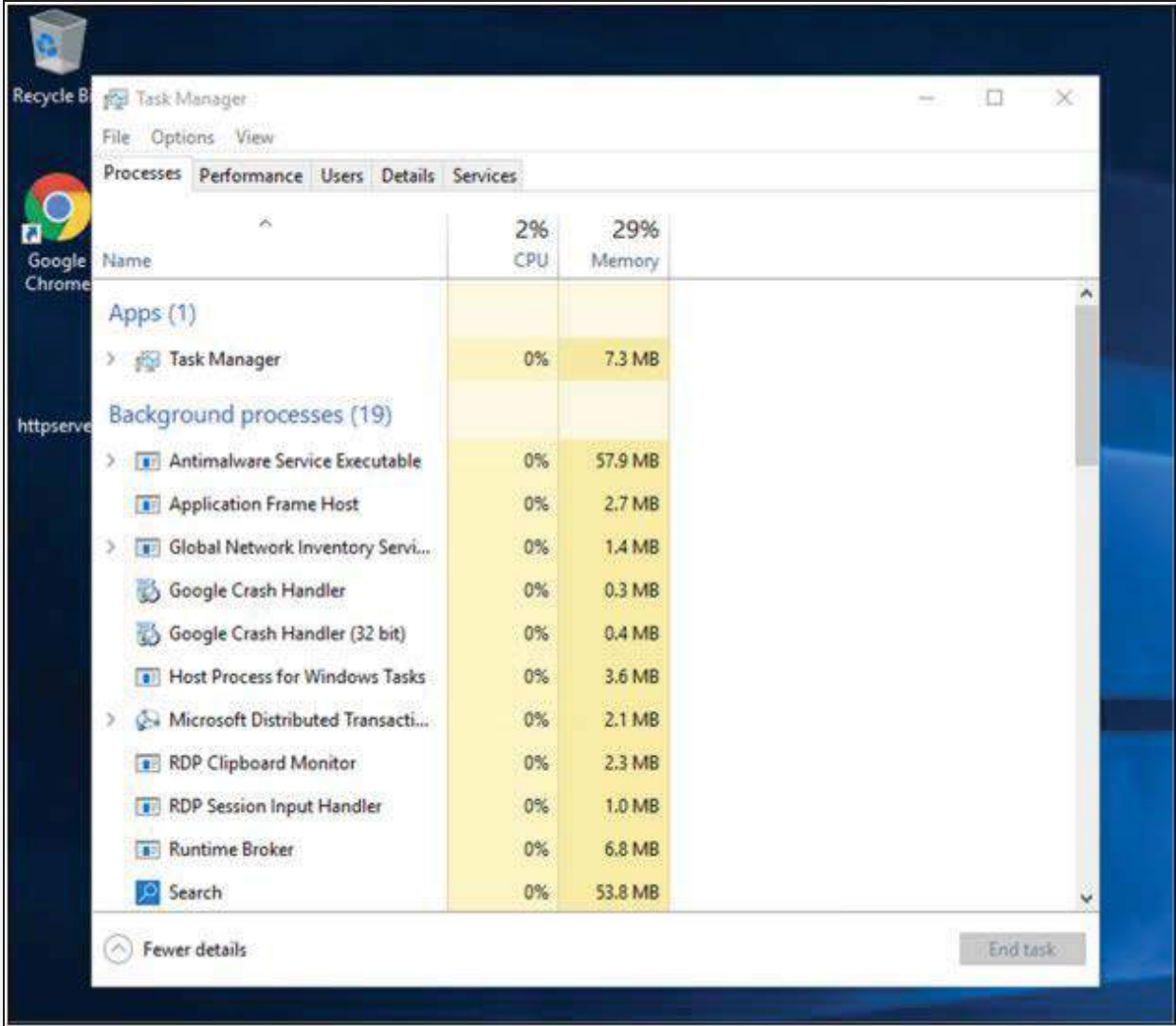


Figure 7-13 Verifying Process

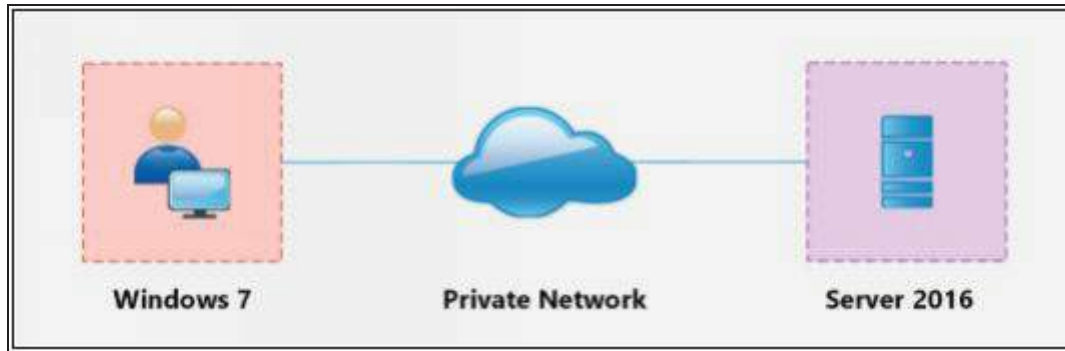


Figure 7-14 Topology Diagram

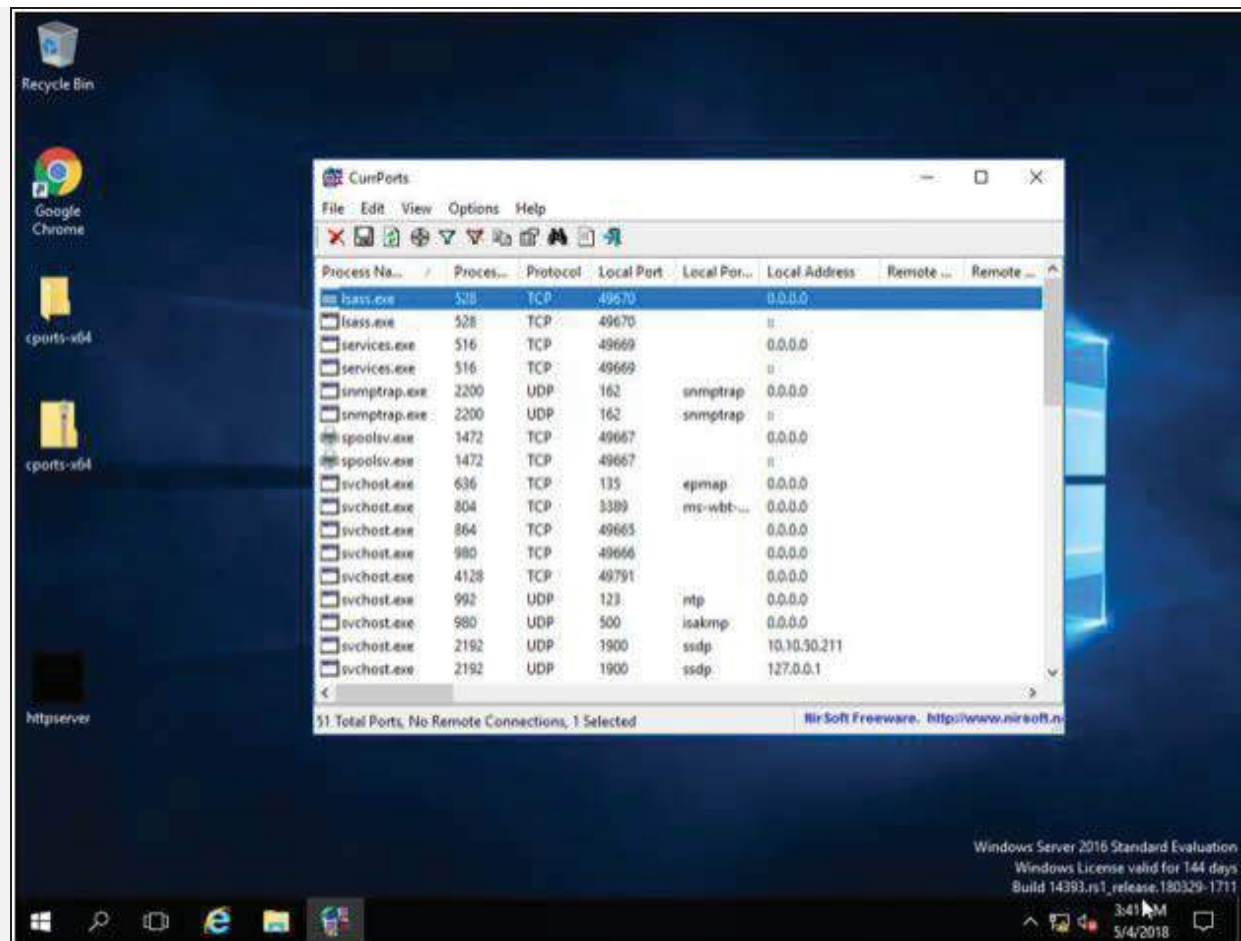



Figure 7-15 Currports Application showing Running processes

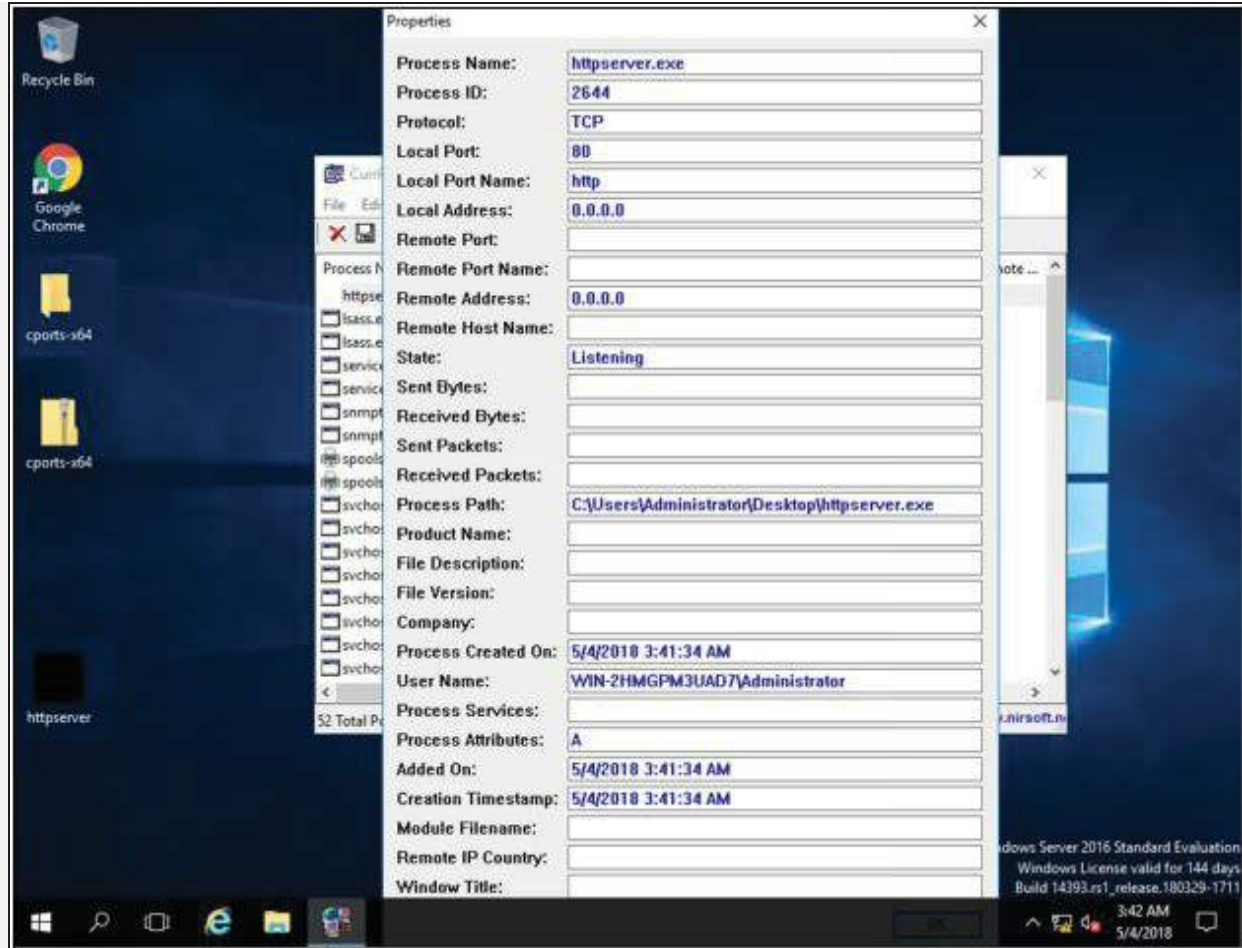


Figure 7-17 TCP connection properties

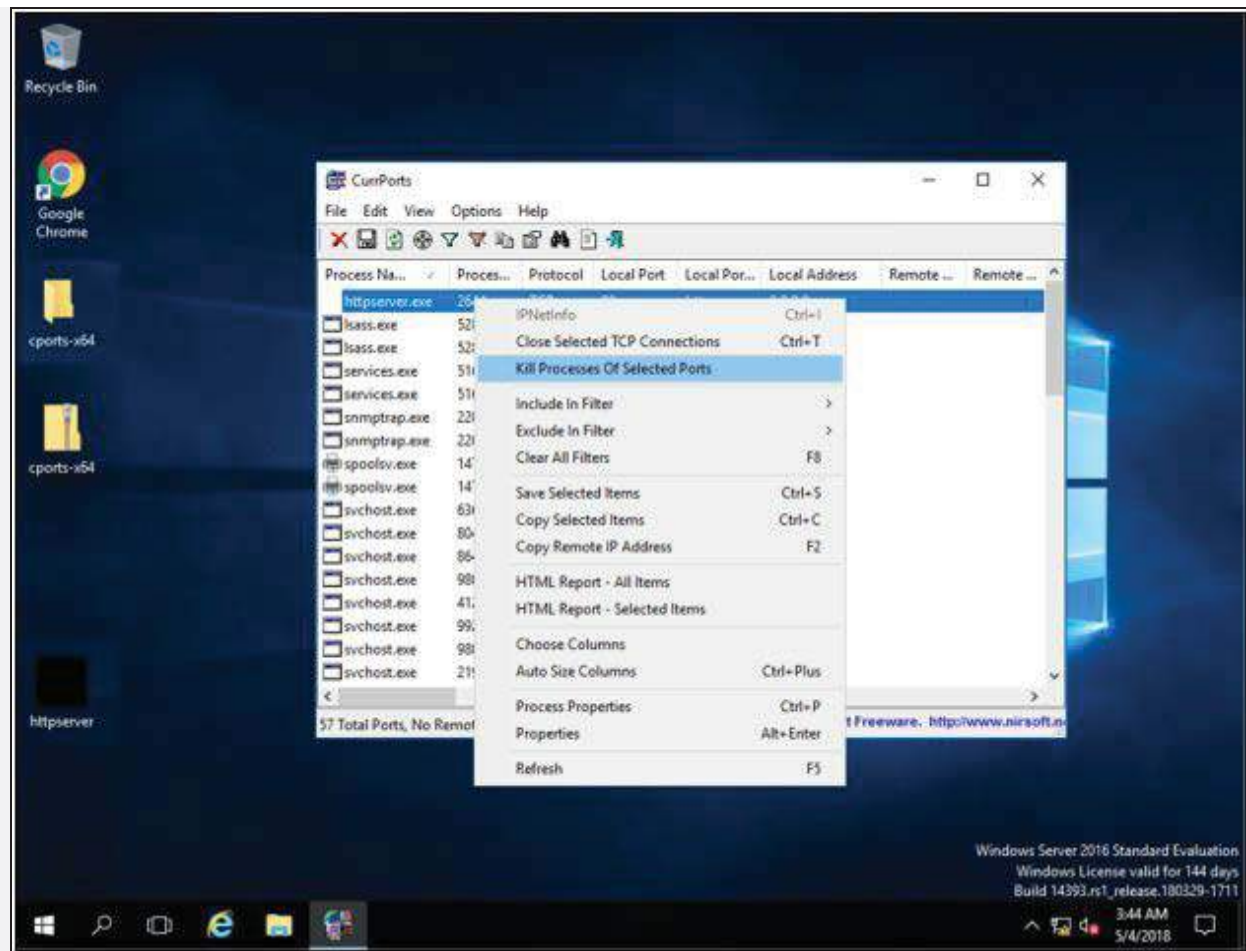


Figure 7-19 Killing TCP connection properties

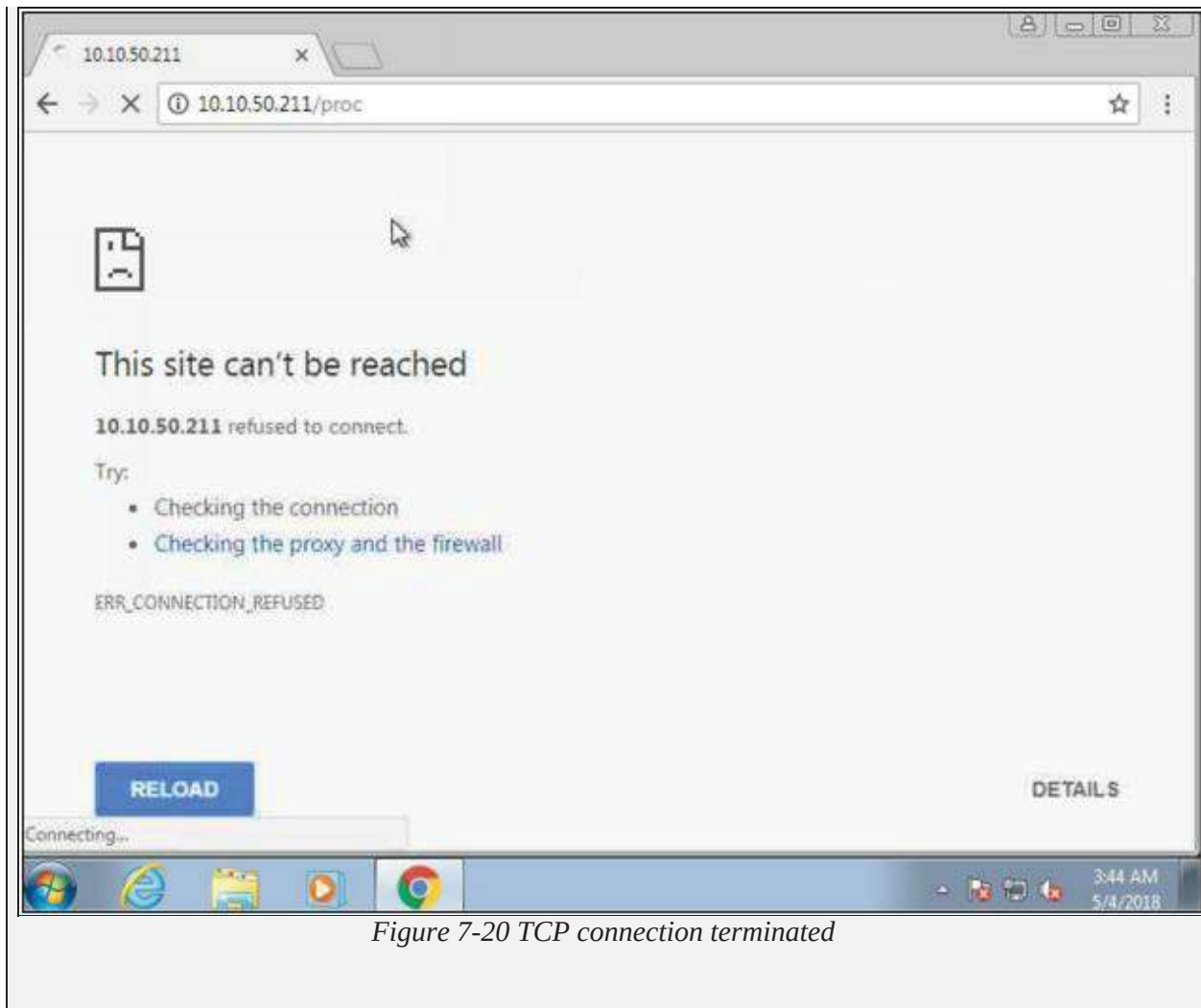


Figure 7-20 TCP connection terminated

Chapter 8: Sniffing

Technology Brief

This chapter focuses on Sniffing concepts. By Sniffing, you can monitor all sorts of traffic either protected or unprotected. Using Sniffing attacker can gain such information which might be helpful for further attacks and can cause trouble for the victim. Furthermore, in this chapter, you will learn Media Access Control (MAC) Attacks, Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) Attacks, Address Resolution Protocol (ARP) Poisoning, MAC Spoofing Attack, DNS Poisoning. Once you have done with sniffing, you can proceed to launch attacks such as Session Hijacking, DoS Attacks, MITM attack, etc. Remember that Sniffers are not hacking tools, they are diagnostic tools typically used for observing network, troubleshooting issues.

Sniffing Concepts

Introduction to Sniffing

Sniffing is the process of scanning and monitoring of the captured data packets passing through a network using Sniffers. The process of sniffing is performed by using Promiscuous ports. By enabling promiscuous mode function on the connected network interface, allow capturing all traffic, even when traffic is not intended for them. Once the packet is captured, you can easily perform the inspection.

There are two types of Sniffing: -

1. Active Sniffing
2. passive Sniffing

Using Sniffing, the attacker can capture packet like Syslog traffic, DNS traffic, Web traffic, Email and other types of data traffic flowing across the network. By capturing these packets, an attacker can reveal information such as data, username, and passwords from protocols such as HTTP, POP, IMAP, SMTP, NMTP, FTP, Telnet, and Rlogin and other information. Anyone within same LAN, or connected to the target network can sniff the packets. Let focus how sniffers perform their action and what we get using sniffing.

Working of Sniffers

In the process of Sniffing, an attacker gets connected to the target network in order to sniff the packets. Using Sniffers, which turns Network Interface Card (NIC) of the attacker's system into promiscuous mode, attacker captures the packet. Promiscuous mode is a mode of the interface in which NIC respond for every packet it receives. As you can observe in the figure below, the attacker is connected in promiscuous mode, accepting each packet even those packet which is not intended for him.

Once the attacker captures the packets, it can decrypt these packets to extract information. The fundamental concept behind this technique is if you are connected to a target network with a switch as opposed to a hub, broadcast, and multicast traffic is transmitted on all ports. Switch forward the unicast packet to the specific port where the actual host is connected. Switch maintain its MAC table to validate who is connected to which port. In this case, attacker alters the switch configuration by using different techniques

such as Port Mirroring or Switched Port Analyzer (SPAN). All packets passing through a certain port will be copied onto a certain port (the port on which attacker is connected with promiscuous mode). If you are connected to a hub, it will transmit all packet to all ports.

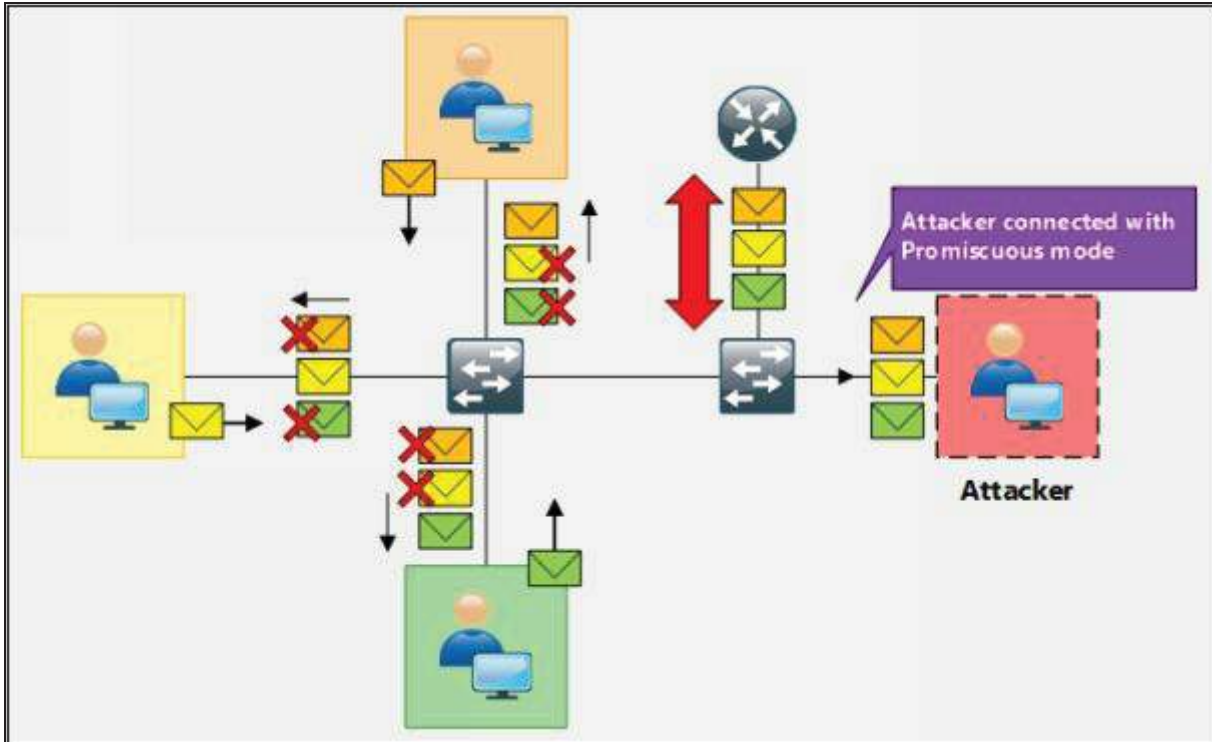


Figure 8-01 Packet Sniffing

Types of Sniffing

Passive Sniffing

Passive Sniffing is the sniffing type in which there is no need of sending additional packets or interfering the device such as Hub to receive packets. As we know, Hub broadcast every packet to its ports, which helps the attacker to monitor all traffic passing through hub without any effort.

Active Sniffing

Active Sniffing is the sniffing type in which attacker has to send additional packets to the connected device such as Switch to start receiving packets. As we know, a unicast packet from the switch is transmitted to a specific port only. The attacker uses certain techniques such as MAC Flooding, DHCP Attacks, DNS poisoning, Switch Port Stealing, ARP Poisoning, and Spoofing to monitor traffic passing through the switch. These techniques are defined in detail later in this chapter.

Hardware Protocol Analyzer

Protocol Analyzers, either Hardware or Software analyzer are used to analyze the captured packets and signals over the transmission channel. Hardware Protocol Analyzers are the physical equipment which is used to capture without interfering the network traffic. A major advantage offered by these hardware protocol analyzers are mobility, flexibility, and throughput. Using these hardware analyzers, an attacker can: -

- Monitor Network Usage
- Identify Traffic from hacking software
- Decrypt the packets
- Extract the information
- Size of Packet

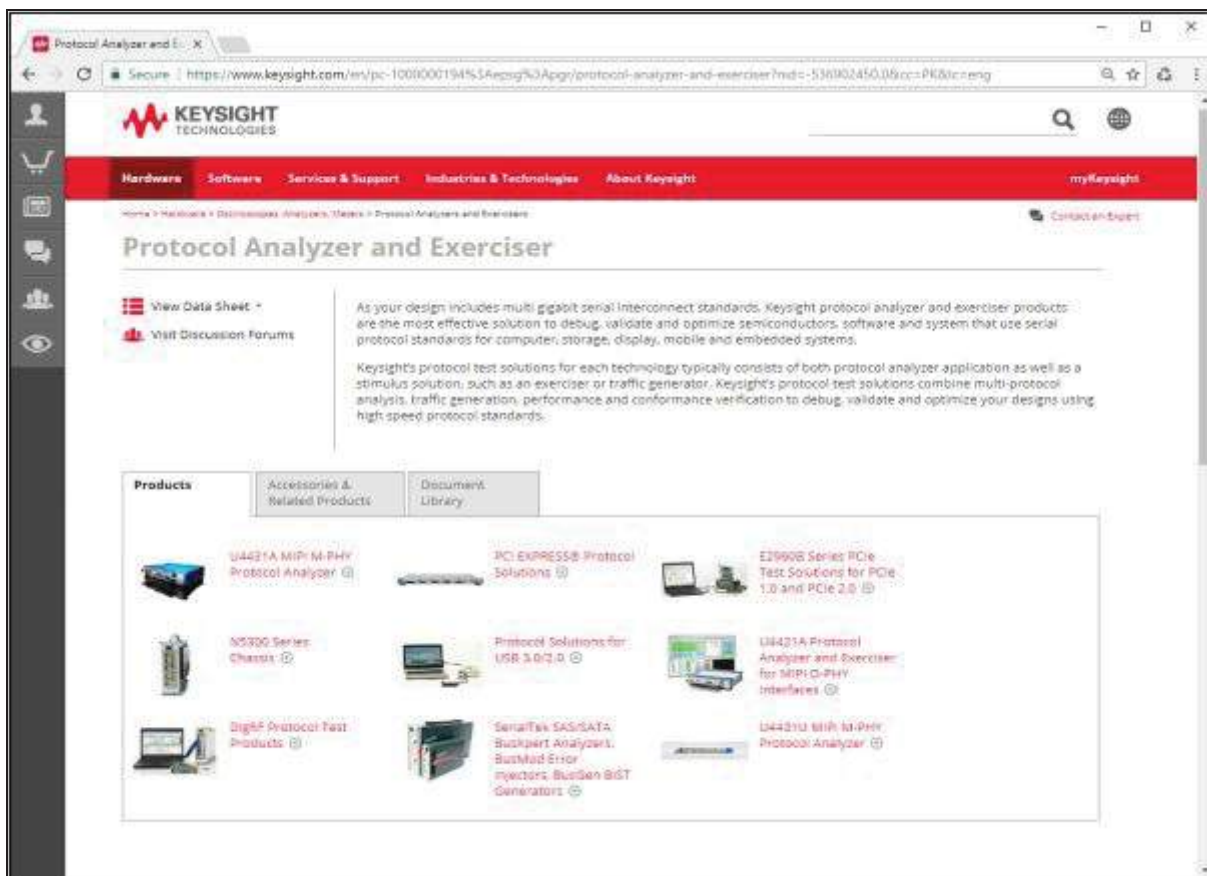


Figure 8-02 KEYSIGHT Technologies Hardware Protocol Analyser Products

SPAN Port

You have a user who has complained about network performance, no one else in the building is experiencing the same issues. You want to run a Network Analyser on the port like Wireshark to monitor ingress and egress traffic on the port. To do this, you can configure SPAN (Switch Port Analyser). SPAN allows you to capture traffic from one port on a switch to another port on the same switch.

SPAN makes a copy of all frames destined for a port and copies them to the SPAN destination port. Certain traffic types are not forwarded by SPAN like BDPUs, CDP, DTP, VTP, STP traffic. The number of SPAN sessions that can be configured on a switch is model dependent. For example, Cisco 3560 and 3750 switches only support up to 2 SPAN sessions at once, whereas Cisco 6500 series switches support up to 16.

SPAN can be configured to capture either inbound, outbound or both directions of traffic. You can configure a SPAN source as either a specific port, a single port in an Ether channel group, an Ether channel group, or a VLAN. SPAN cannot be configured with a source port of a MEC (Multi chassis Ether channel). You also cannot configure a source of a single port and a VLAN. When configuring multiple sources for a SPAN session, you simply specify multiple source interfaces.

One thing to keep in mind when configuring SPAN is if you are using a source port that has a higher bandwidth than the destination port, some of the traffic if the link is congested, traffic will be dropped.

Simple Local SPAN Configuration

Consider the following diagram in which a Router (R1) is connected to Switch through Switch's Fast Ethernet port 0/1, this port is configured as the Source SPAN port. Traffic copied from FE0/1 is to be mirrored out FE0/24 where our monitoring workstation is waiting to capture the traffic.

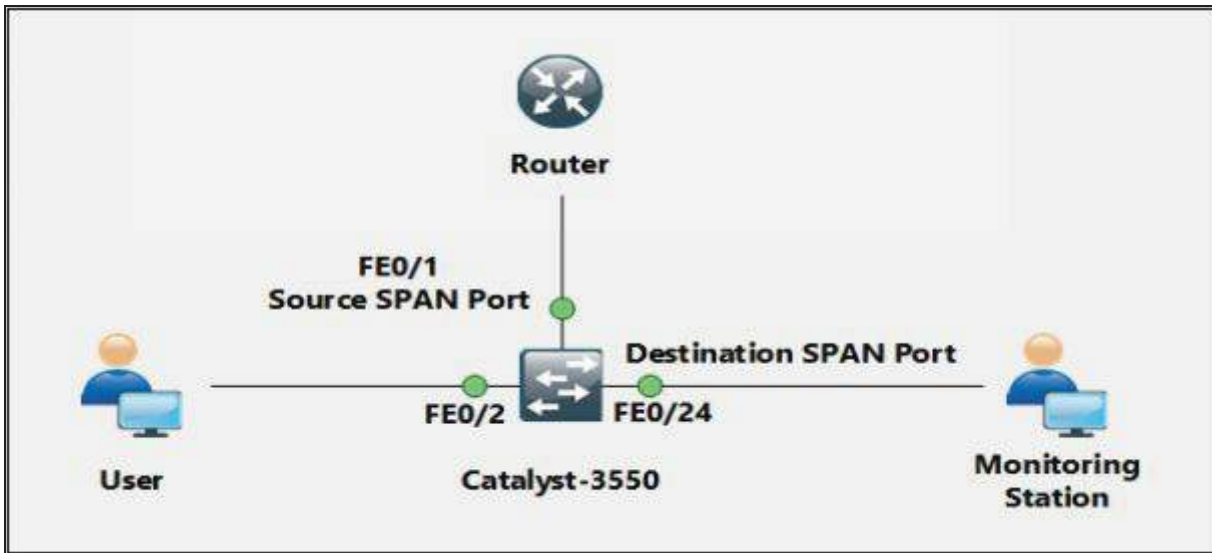


Figure 8-03 SPAN Port

Once we have our network analyzer is setup and running, the first step is to configure Fast Ethernet 0/1 as a source SPAN port, configure Fast Ethernet 0/24 as the destination SPAN port. After configuring both interfaces, destination's SPAN port LED (FE0/24) began flashing in synchronization with that of FE0/1's LED – an expected behavior considering all FE0/1 packets were being copied to FE0/24.

Wiretapping

Wiretapping is the process of gaining information by tapping the signal from wire such as telephone lines or the Internet. Mostly, wiretapping is performed by a third party to monitor the conversation. Wiretapping is basically electrical tap on the telephone line. Legal Wiretapping is called Legal Interception which is mostly performed by governmental or security agencies.

Wiretapping is classified into its two types: -

Active Wiretapping

Active Wiretapping is monitoring, recording of information by wiretapping, additionally active wiretapping includes alteration of the communication.

Passive Wiretapping

Monitoring and Recording the information by wiretapping without any alteration in communication.

Lawful Interception

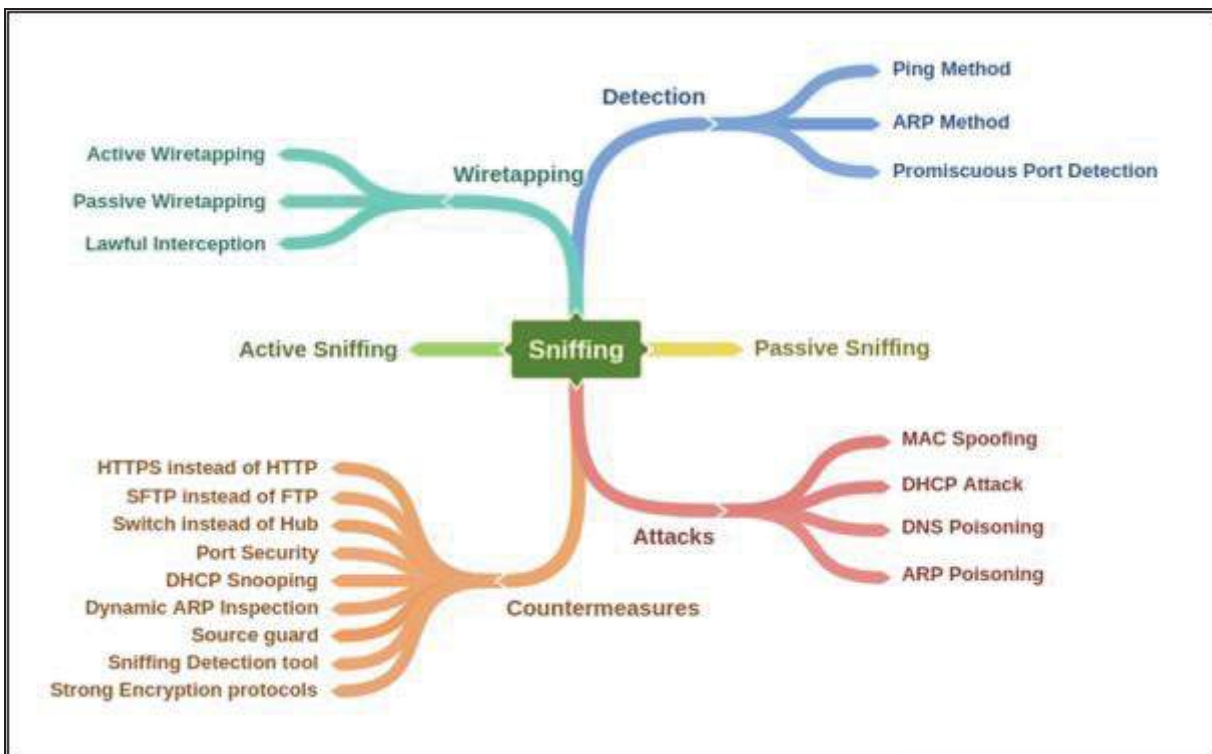
Lawful Interception (LI) is a process of wiretapping with legal authorization

which allows law enforcement agencies to wiretap the communication of individual user selectively. Telecommunication standardization organization standardized the legal interception gateways for the interception of communication by agencies.

Planning Tool for Resource Integration (PRISM)

PRISM Planning Tool for Resource Integration stands for, Synchronization and Management. PRISM is a tool that is specially designed to collect information and process, passing through American servers. PRISM program is developed by Special Source Operation (SSO) division of National Security Agency (NSA). PRISM is intended for identification and monitoring of suspicious communication of target. Internet traffic routing through the US, or data stored on US servers are wiretap by NSA.

MAC Attacks

MAC Address Table / CAM Table

Media Access Control Address is in short known as MAC address or physical address of a device. MAC address is 48-bits unique identification number that is assigned to a network device for communication at data link layer. MAC address is comprised of Object Unique Identifier (QUI) 24-bits and 24-bits of Network Interface Controller (NIC). In case of multiple NIC, the device will have multiple unique MAC addresses.

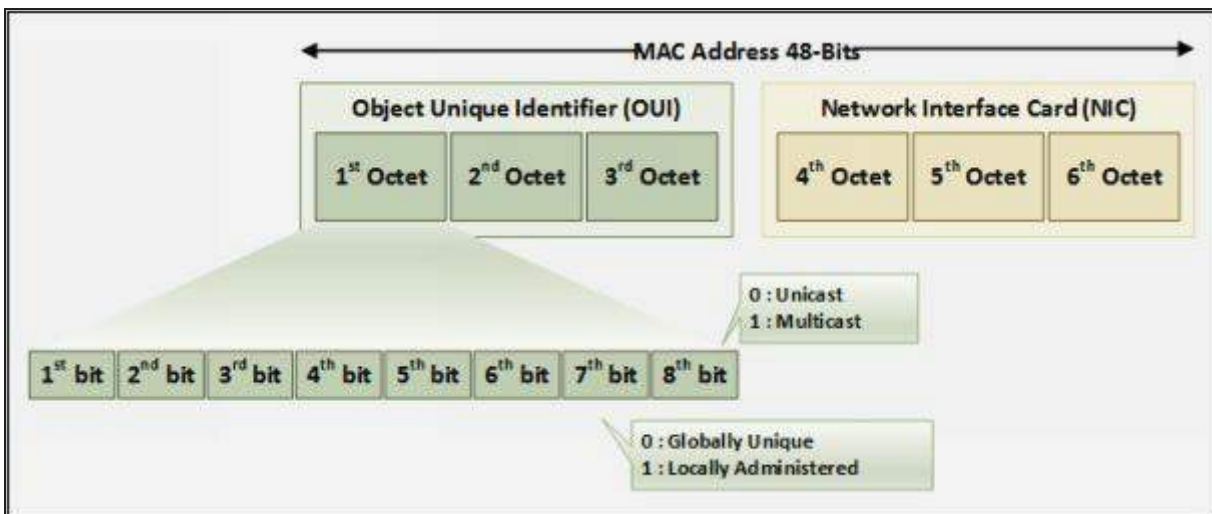



Figure 8-04 MAC-Address

MAC address table or Content-Addressable Memory (CAM) table is used in Ethernet switches to record MAC address, and its associated information which is used to forward packets. CAM table records a table in which each MAC address information such as associated VLAN information, learning type, and associated port parameters. These parameters help at the data-link layer to forward packets.

How Content Addressable Memory Works

To learn the MAC address of devices is the fundamental responsibility of switches. The switch transparently observes incoming frames. It records the source MAC address of these frames in its MAC address table. It also records the specific port for the source MAC address. Based on this information, it can make intelligent frame forwarding (switching) decisions. Notice that a network machine could be turned off or moved at any point. As a result, the switch must also age MAC addresses and remove them from the table after they have not been seen for some duration.

The switch supports multiple MAC addresses on all ports so we can connect individual workstation as well as multiple devices through switch or router as well. By the feature of Dynamic Addressing, switch updates the source address received from the incoming packets and binds it to the interface from which it is received. As the devices are added or removed, they are updated dynamically. By default, aging time of MAC address is 300 seconds. The switch is configured to learn the MAC addresses dynamically by default.

MAC Flooding

MAC flooding is a technique in which attacker sends random mac addresses mapped with random IP to overflow the storage capacity of CAM table. As we know CAM table has its fixed length, switch then acts as a hub. It will now broadcast packet on all ports which help the attacker to sniff the packet with ease. For MAC Flooding, Unix / Linux utility “*macof*” offers MAC flooding. using macof, random source MAC and IP can be sent on an interface.

Switch Port Stealing

Switch port stealing is also a packet sniffing technique that uses MAC flooding to sniff the packets. In this technique, the attacker sends bogus ARP packet with the source MAC address of target and destination address of its own as the attacker is impersonating the target host let's say Host A. When this is forwarded to switch, the switch will update the CAM table. When Host A sends a packet, Switch will have to update it again. This will create the winning the race condition in which if the attacker sends ARP with Host A's MAC address, the switch will send packets to the attacker assuming Host A is connected to this port.

Defend against MAC Attacks

Port Security is used to bind the MAC address of known devices to the physical ports and violation action is also defined. So if an attacker tries to connect its PC or embedded device to the switch port, then it will shut down or restrict the attacker from even generating an attack. In dynamic port security, you configure the total number of allowed MAC addresses, and the switch will allow only that number simultaneously, without regard to what those MAC addresses are.

Configuring Port Security

Cisco Switch offers port security to prevent MAC attacks. You can configure the switch either for statically defined MAC Addresses only, or dynamic MAC learning up to the specified range, or you can configure port security with the combination of both as shown below. The following configuration on Cisco Switch will allow specific MAC address and 4 additional MAC addresses. If the switch has learned the static MAC address

DHCP Attacks

Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) Operation

DHCP is the process of allocating the IP address dynamically so that these addresses are assigned automatically and also that they can be reused when hosts don't need them. Round Trip time is the measurement of time from discovery of DHCP server until obtaining the leased IP address. RTT can be used to determine the performance of DHCP. By using UDP broadcast, DHCP client sends an initial DHCP-Discover packet because it initially doesn't have network information to which they are connected. This DHCP-Discover packet is replied by DHCP server with DHCP-Offer Packet offering the configuration parameters. DHCP Client will send DHCP-Request packet destined for DHCP server for requesting for configuration parameters. Finally, DHCP Server will send the DHCP-Acknowledgement packet containing configuration parameters.

DHCPv4 uses two different ports:

- UDP port 67 for Server.
- UDP port 68 for Client.

DHCP Relay agent forwards the DHCP packets from server to client and Client to server. Relay agent helps the communication like forwarding request and replies between client and servers. Relay agent, when receiving a DHCP message, it generates a new DHCP request to send it out from another interface with including default gateway information as well as Relay-Agent information option (Option-82). When the Relay Agent gets the reply from the server, it removes the Option 82 and forwards it back to the client.

The working of Relay agent and DHCPv6 Server is same as the IPv4 Relay

agent and DHCPv4 Server. DHCP server receives the request and assigns the IP address, DNS, Lease time and other necessary information to the client whereas relay server forwards the DHCP messages.

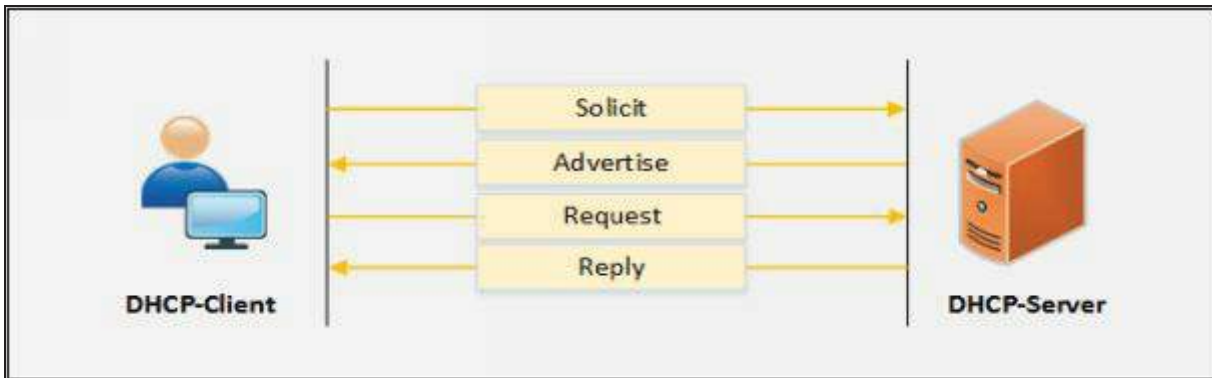


Figure 8-07 IPv6 DHCP process

DHCPv6 uses two different ports:

- UDP port 546 for clients.
- UDP port 547 for servers.

DHCP Starvation Attack

DHCP Starvation attack is a Denial-of-Service attack on DHCP server. In DHCP Starvation attack, Attacker sends bogus requests for broadcasting to DHCP server with spoofed MAC addresses to lease all IP addresses in DHCP address pool. Once, all IP addresses are allocated, upcoming users will be unable to obtain an IP address or renew the lease. DHCP Starvation attack can be performed by using tools such as “*Dhcpstarv*” or “*Yersinia*.”

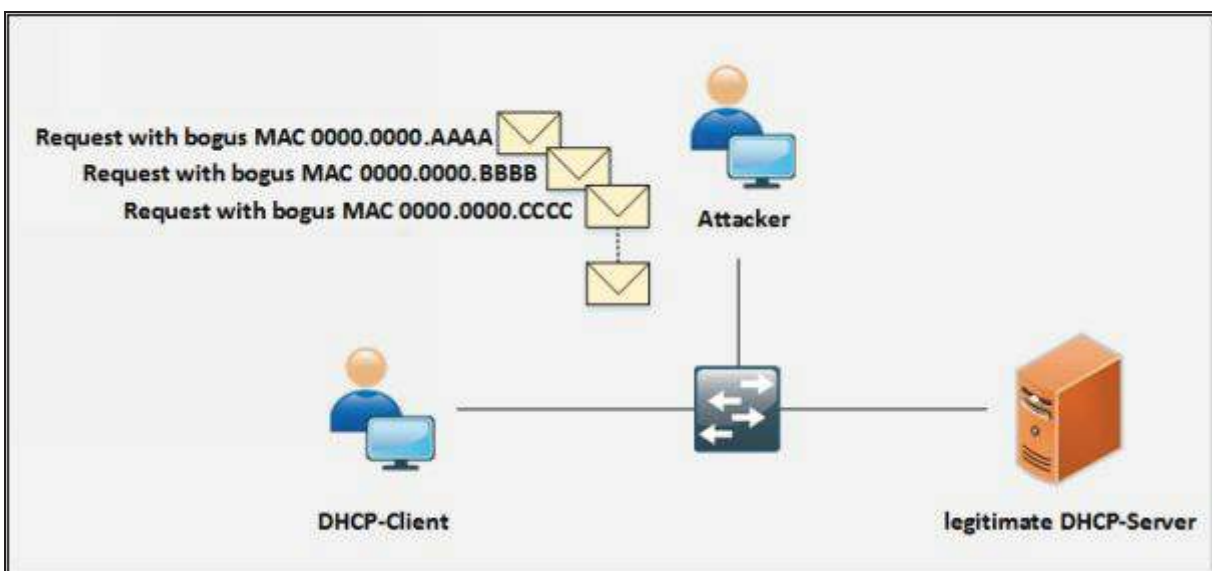


Figure 8-08 DHCP Starvation Attack

Rogue DHCP Server Attack

Rogue DHCP Server attack is performed by deploying the rogue DHCP Server in the network along with the Starvation attack. When a legitimate DHCP server is in Denial-of-Service attacks, DHCP clients are unable to gain IP address from the legitimate DHCP server. Upcoming DHCP Discovery (IPv4) or Solicit (IPv6) packet are replied by bogus DHCP server with configuration parameter which directs the traffic towards it.

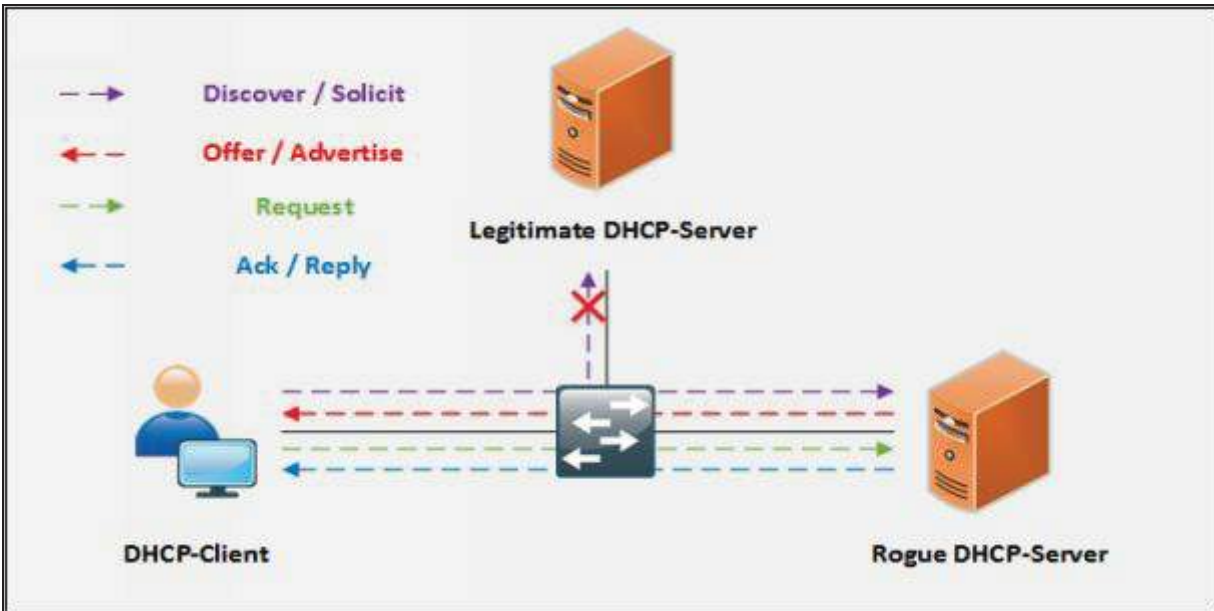


Figure 8-09 Rogue DHCP Server Attack

Defending Against DHCP Starvation and Rogue Server Attack

DHCP Snooping

It is actually very easy for someone to accidentally or maliciously bring a DHCP server in a corporate environment. *DHCP snooping* is all about protecting against it. In order to mitigate such attacks, DHCP snooping feature is enabled on networking devices to identify the only trusted ports from DHCP traffic either in ingress or egress direction is considered legitimate. Any access port who tries to reply the DHCP requests will be ignored because the device will only allow DHCP process from the trusted port as defined by networking team. It is a security feature, which provides network security via filtering of untrusted DHCP messages and by building and maintaining a DHCP snooping binding database known as a DHCP snooping binding table. DHCP snooping differentiates between untrusted interfaces that are connected to the end user/host and trusted interfaces that

are connected to the legitimate DHCP server or any trusted device.

Port Security

Enabling Port security will also mitigate these attack by limiting the learning of a maximum number of MAC addresses on a port, configuring violation action, aging time, etc.

ARP Poisoning

Address Resolution Protocol (ARP)

ARP is a stateless protocol that is used within a broadcast domain to ensure the communication by resolving the IP address to MAC address mapping. It is in charge of L3 to L2 address mappings. ARP protocol ensures the binding of IP addresses and MAC addresses. By broadcasting the ARP request with IP address, the switch can learn the associated MAC address information from the reply of the specific host. In the event that there is no map, or the map is unknown, the source will send a broadcast to all nodes. Just the node with a coordinating MAC address for that IP will answer to the demand with the packet that involves the MAC address mapping. The switch will learn the MAC address and its connected port information into its fixed length CAM table.

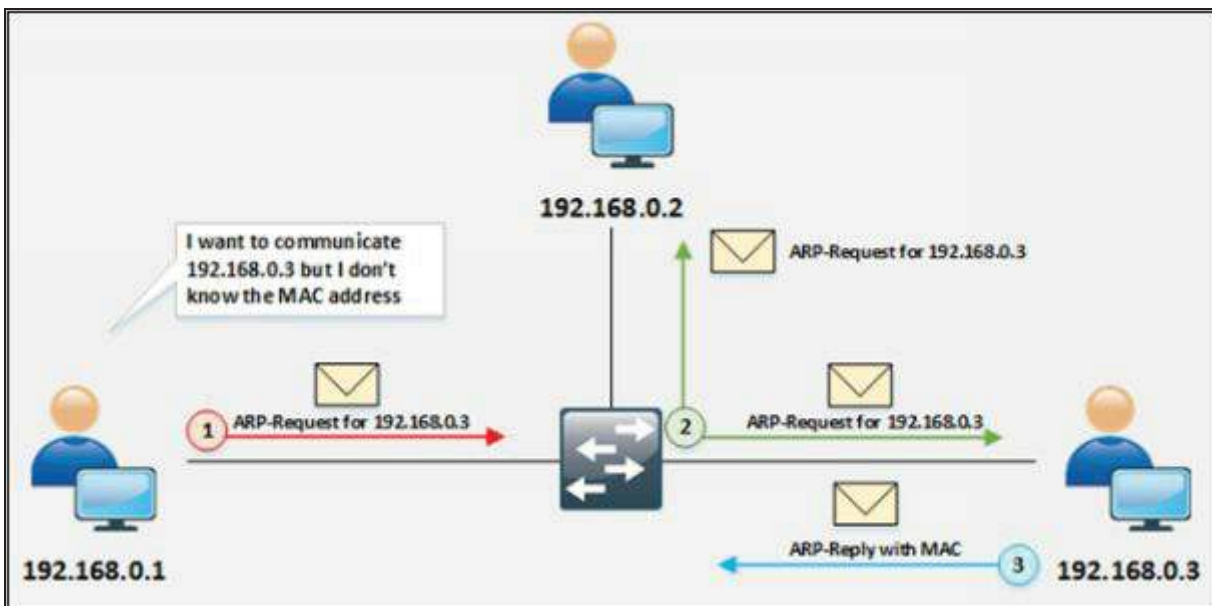


Figure 8-10 ARP Operation

As shown in the figure, the source generates the ARP query by broadcasting the ARP packet. A node having the MAC address, the query is destined for, will reply only to the packet. The frame is flooded out all ports (other than the port on which the frame was received) if CAM table entries are full. This also happens when the destination MAC address in the frame is the broadcast address. MAC flooding technique is used to turn a switch into a hub in which switch starts broadcasting each and every packet. In this scenario, each user can catch the packet even those packets which is not intended for.

ARP Spoofing Attack

In ARP spoofing, Attacker sends forged ARP packets over Local Area Network (LAN). In the case, Switch will update the attacker's MAC Address with the IP address of a legitimate user or server. Once attacker's MAC address is learned with the IP address of a legitimate user, the switch will start forwarding the packets to attacker intending that it is the MAC of the user. Using ARP Spoofing attack, an attacker can steal information by extracting from the packet received intended for a user over LAN. Apart from stealing information, ARP spoofing can be used for: -

- Session Hijacking
- Denial-of-Service Attack
- Man-in-the-Middle Attack
- Packet Sniffing
- Data Interception
- Connection Hijacking
- VoIP tapping
- Connection Resetting
- Stealing Password

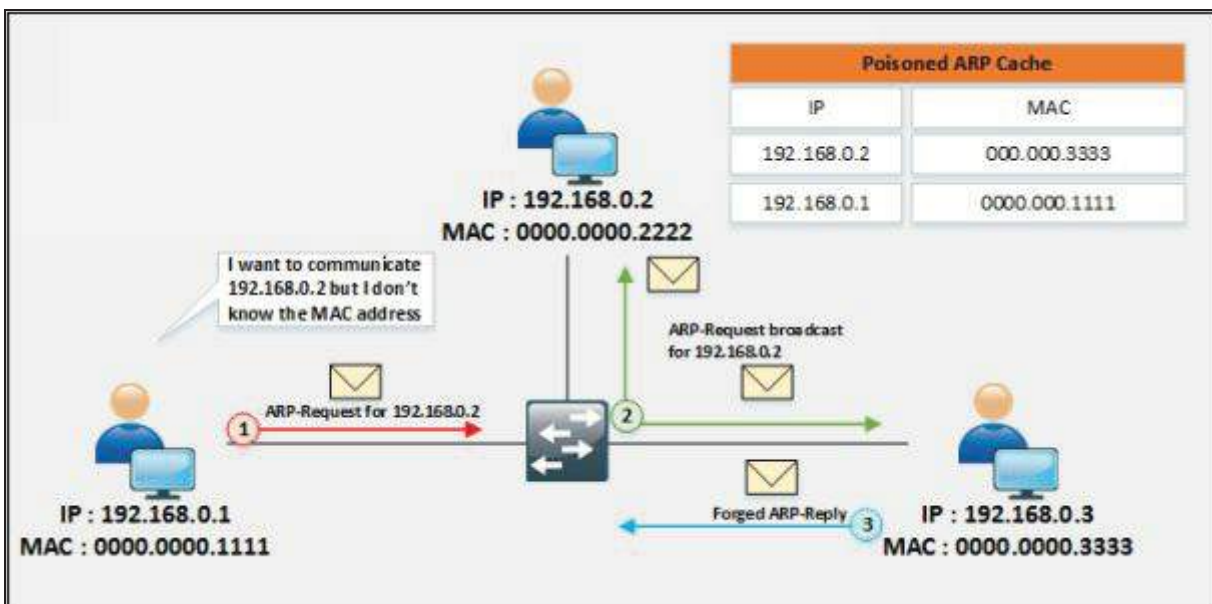


Figure 8-11 ARP Spoofing Attack

Defending ARP Poisoning

Dynamic ARP Inspection (DAI)

DAI is used with DHCP snooping, IP-to-MAC bindings can be a track from

DHCP transactions to protect against ARP poisoning (which is an attacker trying to get your traffic instead of to your destination). DHCP snooping is required in order to build the MAC-to-IP bindings for DAI validation.

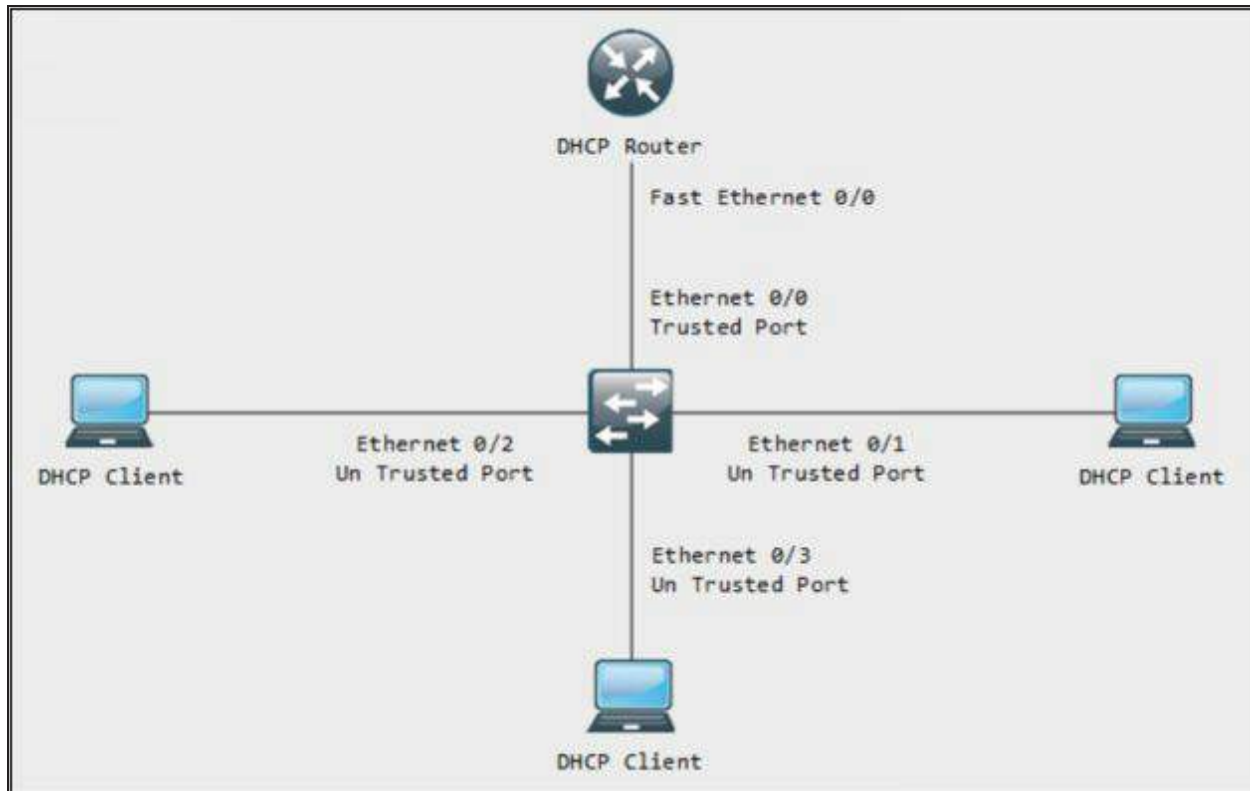


Figure 8-12 Configuring DHCP Snooping



Spoofing Attack

MAC Spoofing/Duplicating

MAC Spoofing is a technique of manipulating MAC address to impersonate the legitimate user or launch attack such as Denial-of-Service attack. As we know, MAC address is built-in on Network interface controller which cannot be changed, but some drivers allow to change the MAC address. This masking process of MAC address is known as MAC Spoofing. Attacker sniffs the MAC address of users which are active on switch ports and duplicate the MAC address. Duplicating the MAC can intercept the traffic and traffic destined to the legitimate user may direct to the attacker.



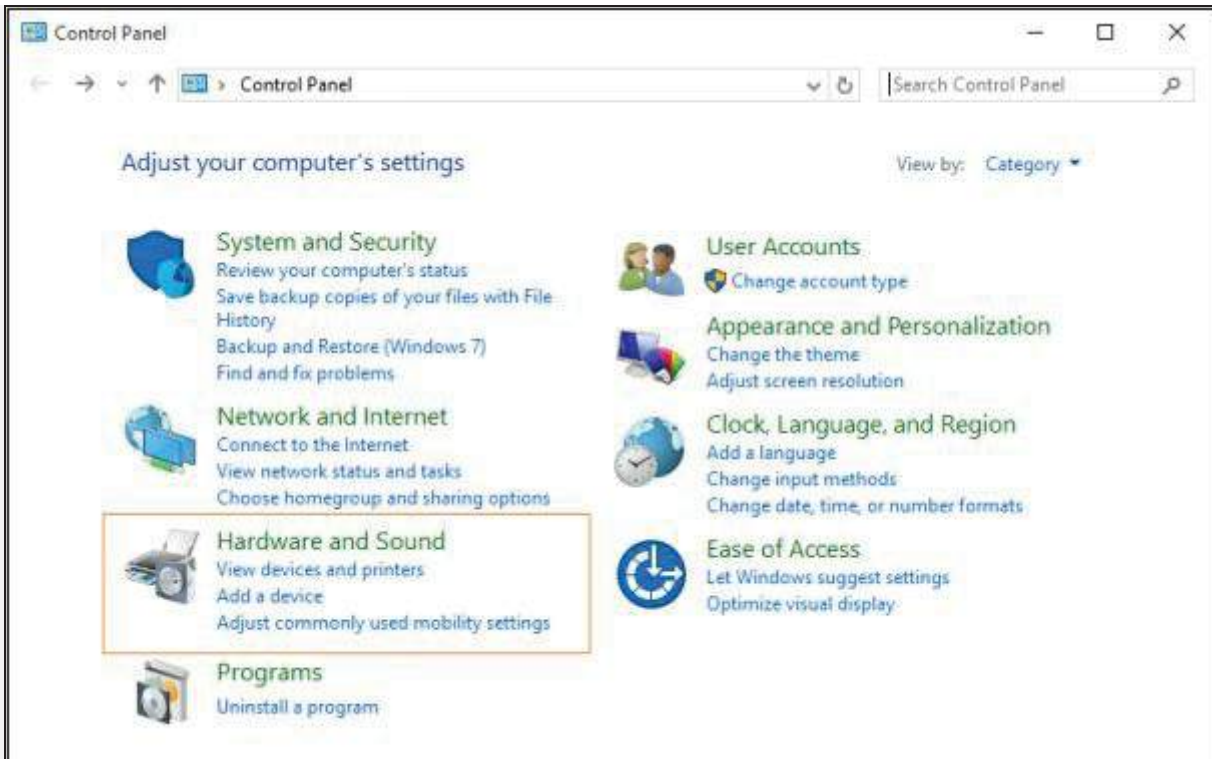


Figure 8-15 Control Panel

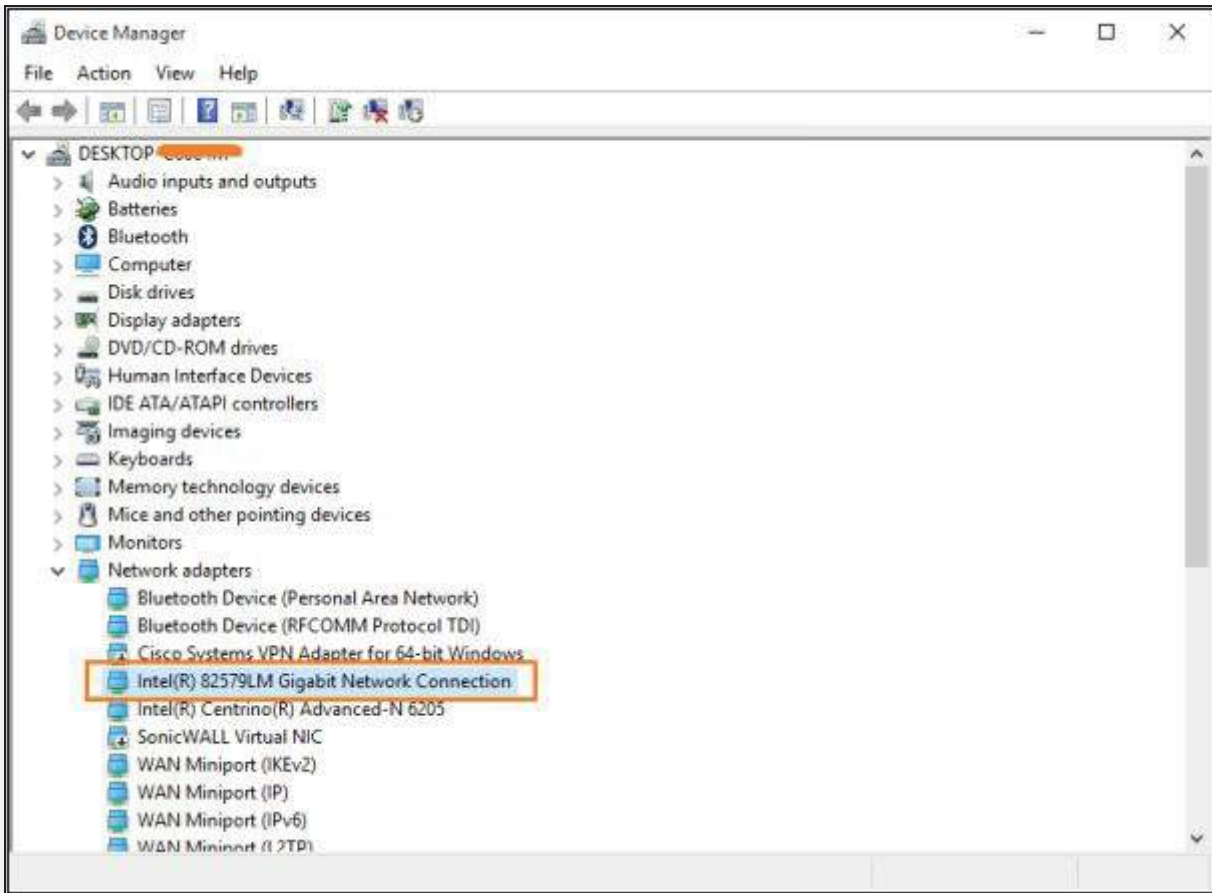


Figure 8-17 Device Manager

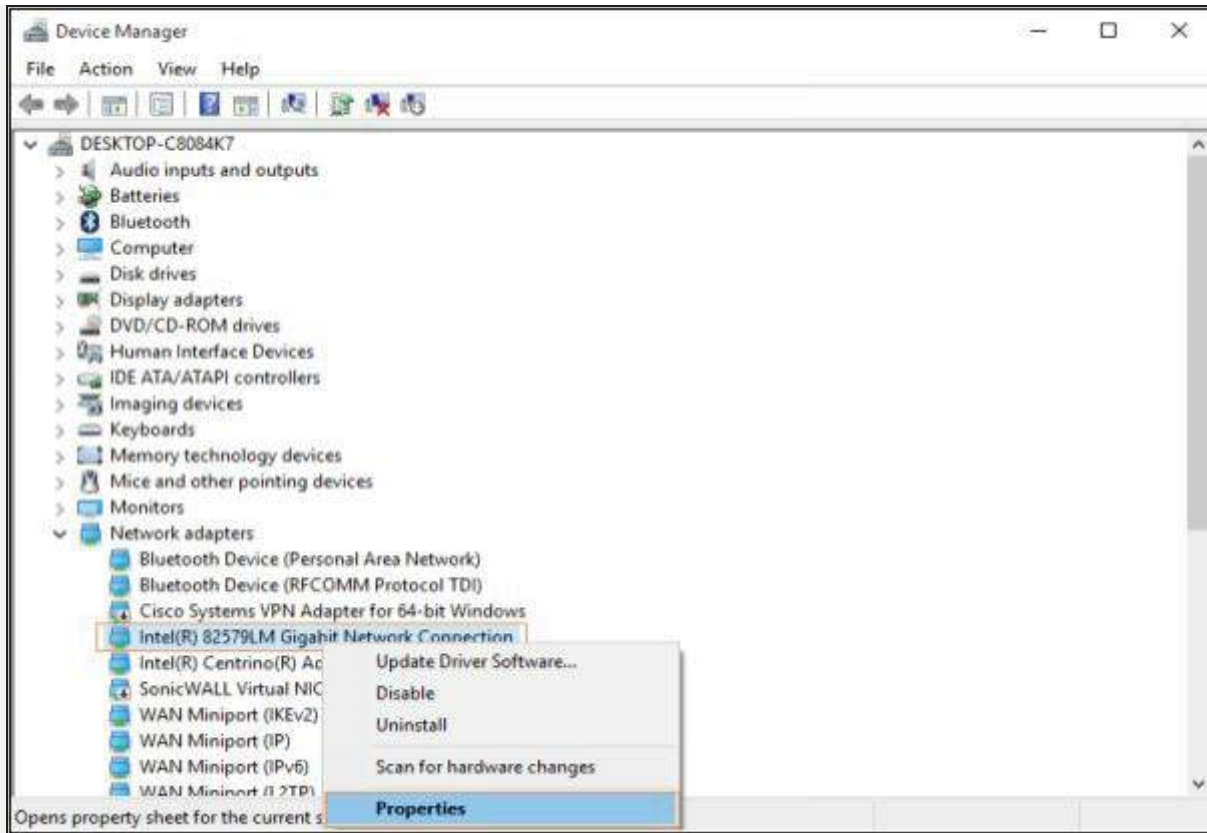


Figure 8-18 Network Adapters

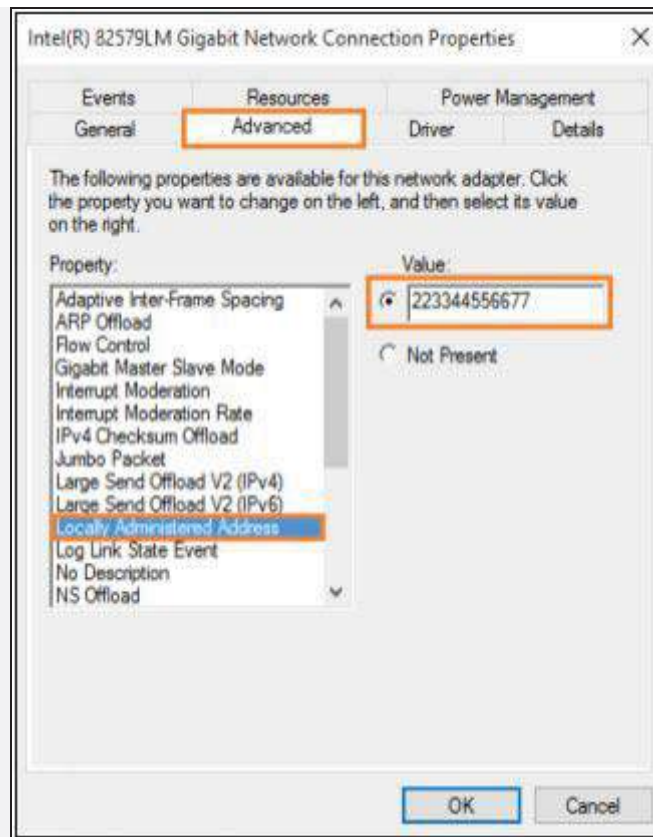


Figure 8-19 Network Adapter Properties

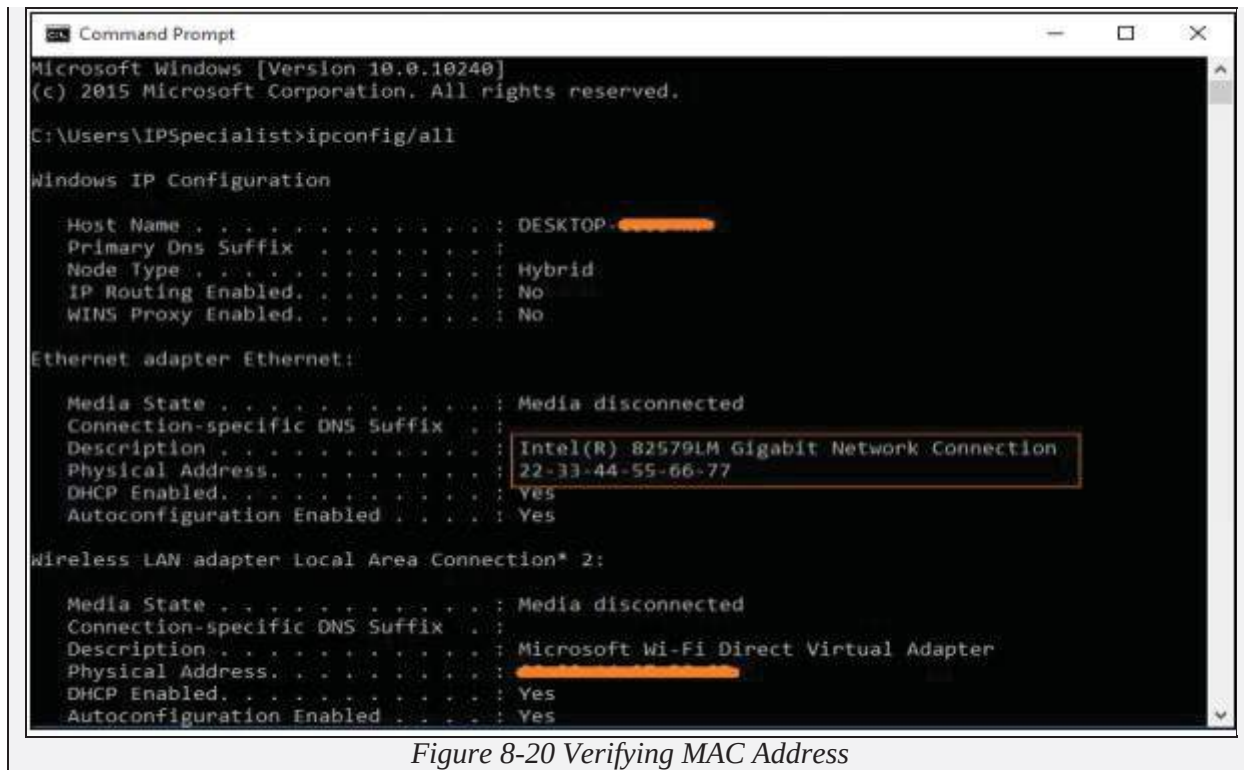


Figure 8-20 Verifying MAC Address

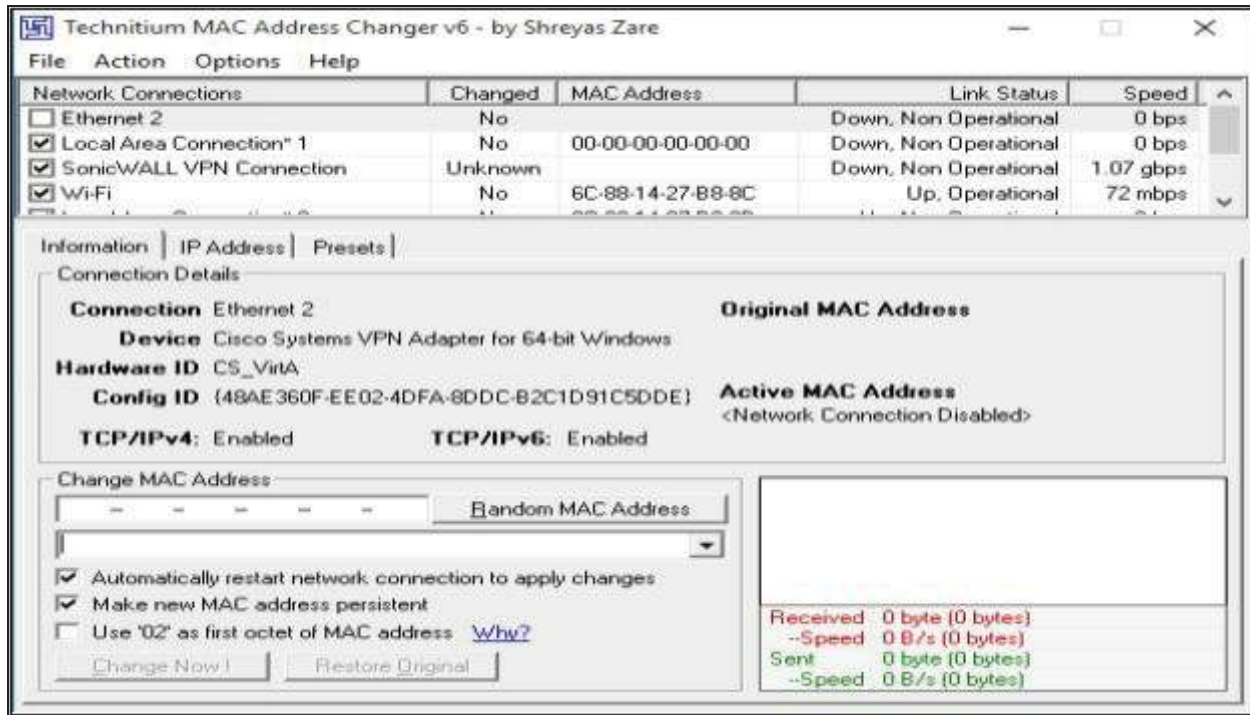


Figure 8-21 Technitium MAC Address Changer

How to Defend Against MAC Spoofing

In order to defend against MAC spoofing, DHCP Snooping, Dynamic ARP inspection are effective techniques to mitigate MAC spoofing attacks. Additionally, Source guard feature is configured on client facing Switch ports.

IP source guard is a port-based feature which provides Source IP address filtering at Layer 2. Source guard feature monitors and prevents the host from impersonating another host by assuming the legitimate host's IP address. In this way, the malicious host is restricted to use its assigned IP address. Source guard uses dynamic DHCP snooping or static IP source binding to match IP addresses to hosts on untrusted Layer 2 access ports.

Initially, all type of inbound IP traffic from the protected port is blocked except for DHCP packets. When a client receives an IP address from the DHCP server, or static IP source binding by the administrator, the traffic with an assigned source IP address is permitted from that port. All bogus packets will be denied. In this way, Source guard protects from the attack by claiming a neighbor host's IP address. Source guard creates an implicit port access control list (PACL).

DNS Poisoning

DNS Poisoning Techniques

Domain Name System (DNS) is used in networking to translate human-readable domain names into IP address. When a DNS server receives a request, it doesn't have the entry, it generates the query to another DNS server for the translation and so on. DNS server having the translation will reply to a request to the requesting DNS server, and then the client's query is resolved.

In case, when a DNS server receives a false entry, it updates its database. As we know, to increase performance, DNS servers maintain a cache in which this entry is updated to provide quick resolution of queries. This false entry causing poison in DNS translation continues until the cache expires. DNS poisoning is performed by attackers to direct the traffic toward the servers and computer owned or controlled by attackers.

Intranet DNS Spoofing

Intranet DNS Spoofing is normally performed over Local Area Network (LAN) with Switched Network. The attacker, with the help of ARP poisoning technique, performs Intranet DNS spoofing. Attacker sniff the packet, extract the ID of DNS requests and reply with the fake IP translation directing the traffic to the malicious site. The attacker must be quick enough to respond before the legitimate DNS server resolve the query.

Internet DNS Spoofing

Internet DNS Spoofing is performed by replacing the DNS configuration on the target machine. All DNS queries will be directed to a malicious DNS server controlled by the attacker, directing the traffic to malicious sites. Usually, Internet DNS spoofing is performed by deploying a Trojan or infecting the target and altering the DNS configuration to direct the queries toward them.

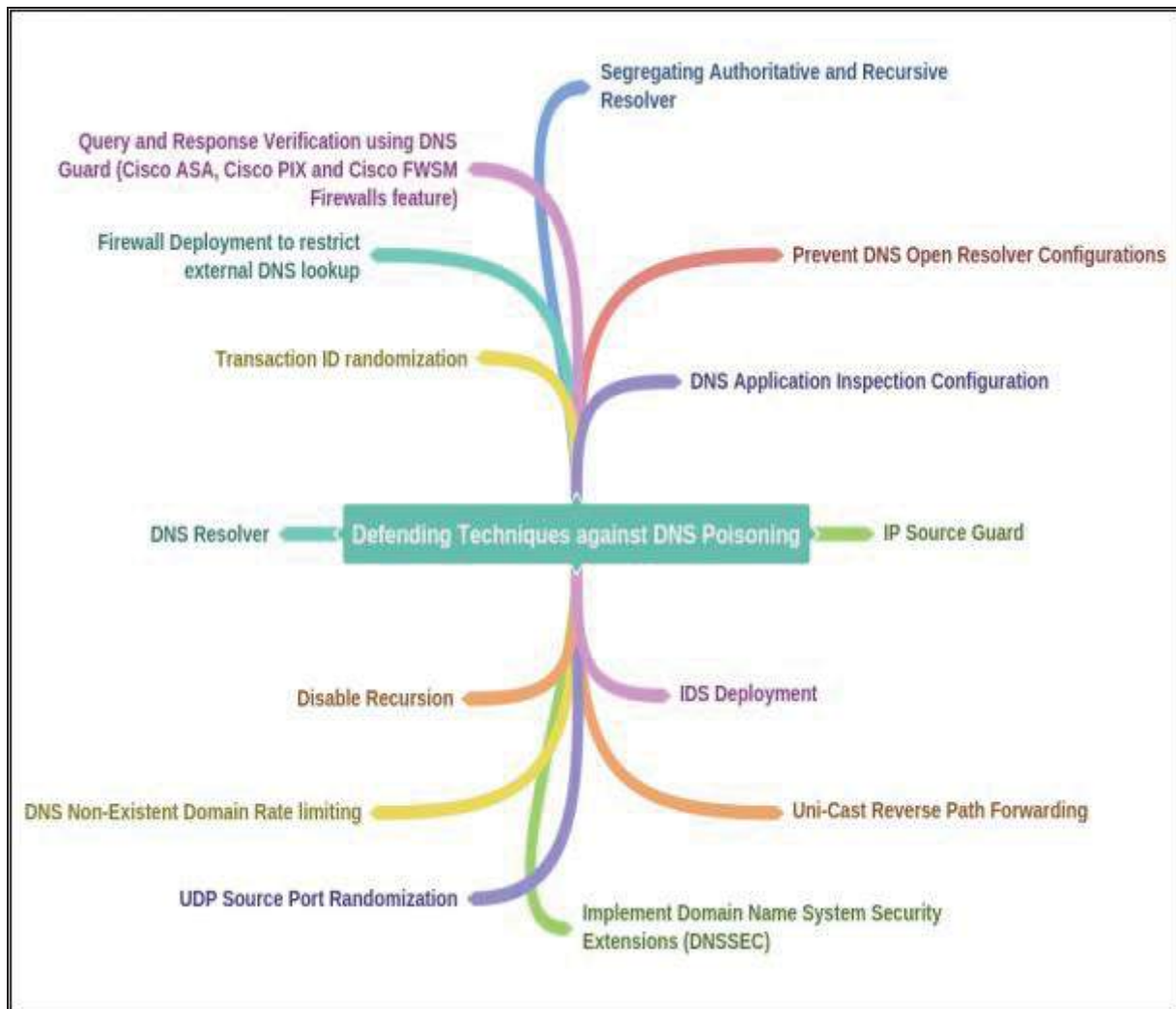
Proxy Server DNS Poisoning

Similar to Internet DNS Spoofing, Proxy Server DNS poisoning is performed by replacing the DNS configuration from the web browser of a target. All web queries will be directed to a malicious proxy server controlled by the attacker, redirecting the traffic to malicious sites.

DNS Cache Poisoning

As we know, Normally, Internet users are using DNS provided by the Internet Service Provider (ISP). In a corporate network, the organization uses their own DNS servers to improve performance by caching frequently or previously generated queries. DNS Cache poisoning is performed by exploiting flaws in DNS software. Attacker adds or alters the entries in DNS record cache which redirect the traffic to the malicious site. When an Internal DNS server is unable to validate the DNS response from authoritative DNS server, it updates the entry locally to entertain the user requests.

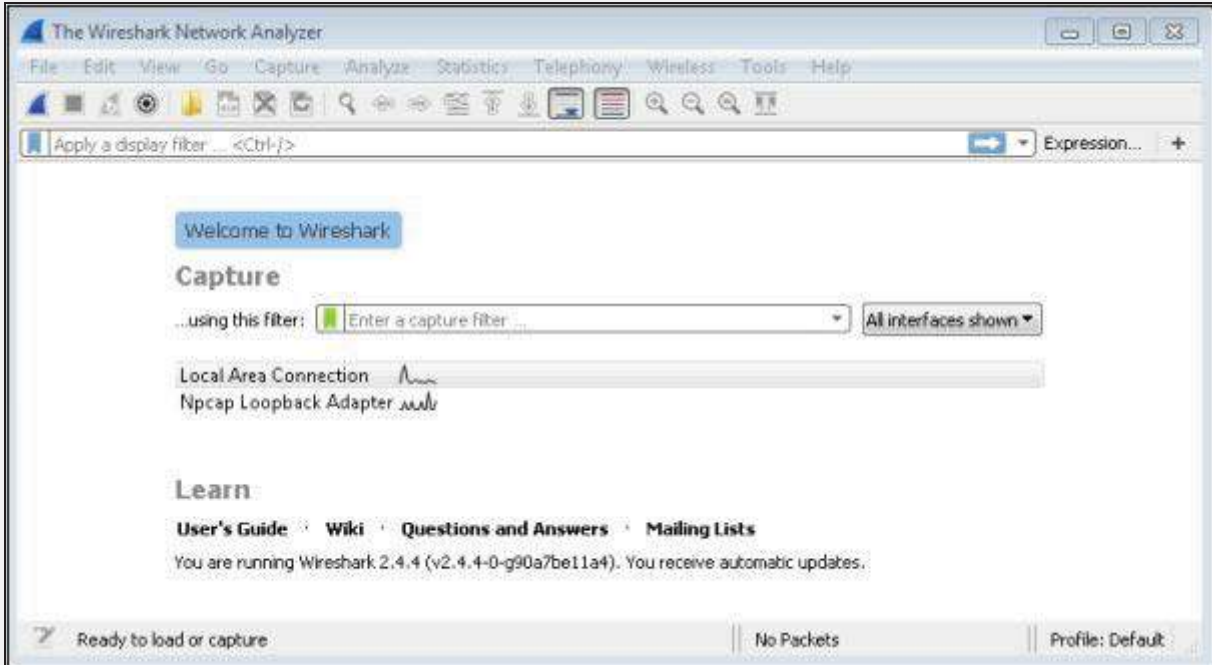


Figure 8-22 Wireshark Network Analyzer

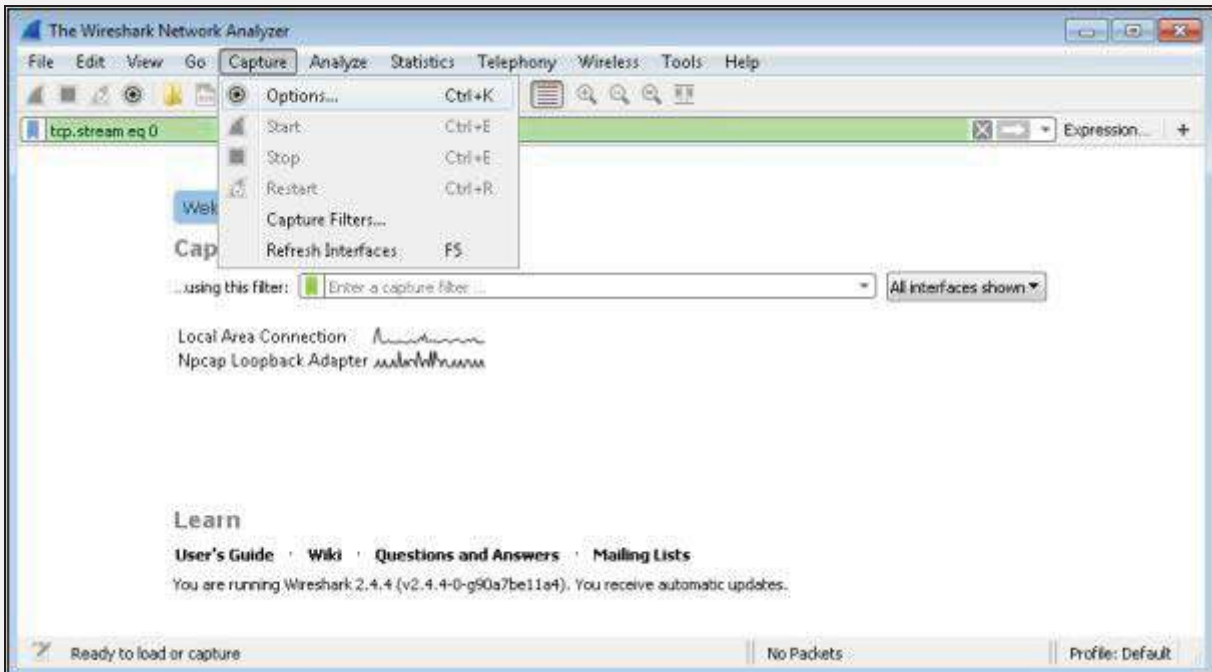


Figure 8-23 Wireshark Network Analyzer

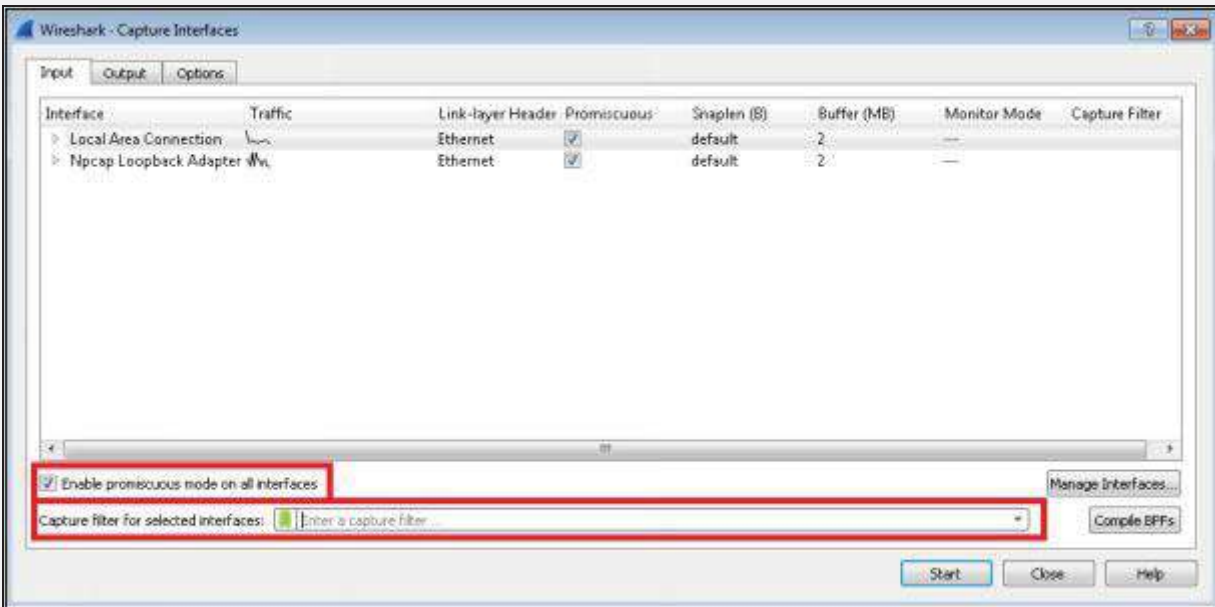


Figure 8-24 Wireshark Network Analyzer

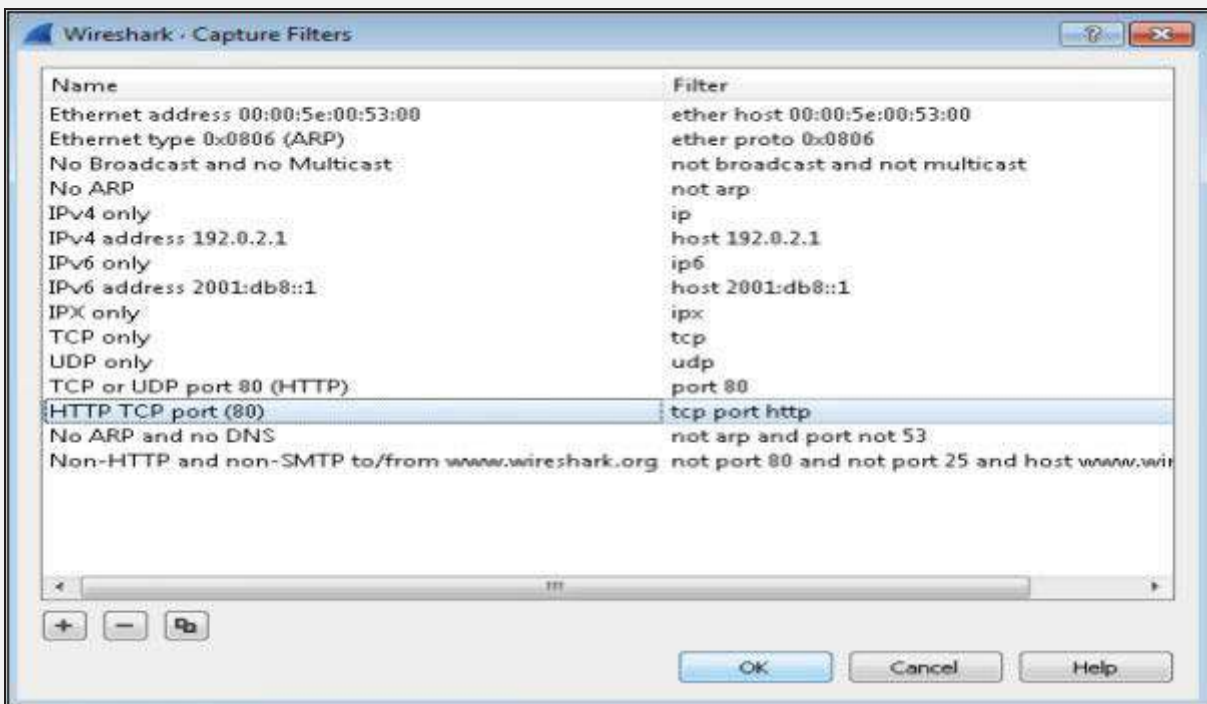


Figure 8-25 Wireshark Network Analyzer

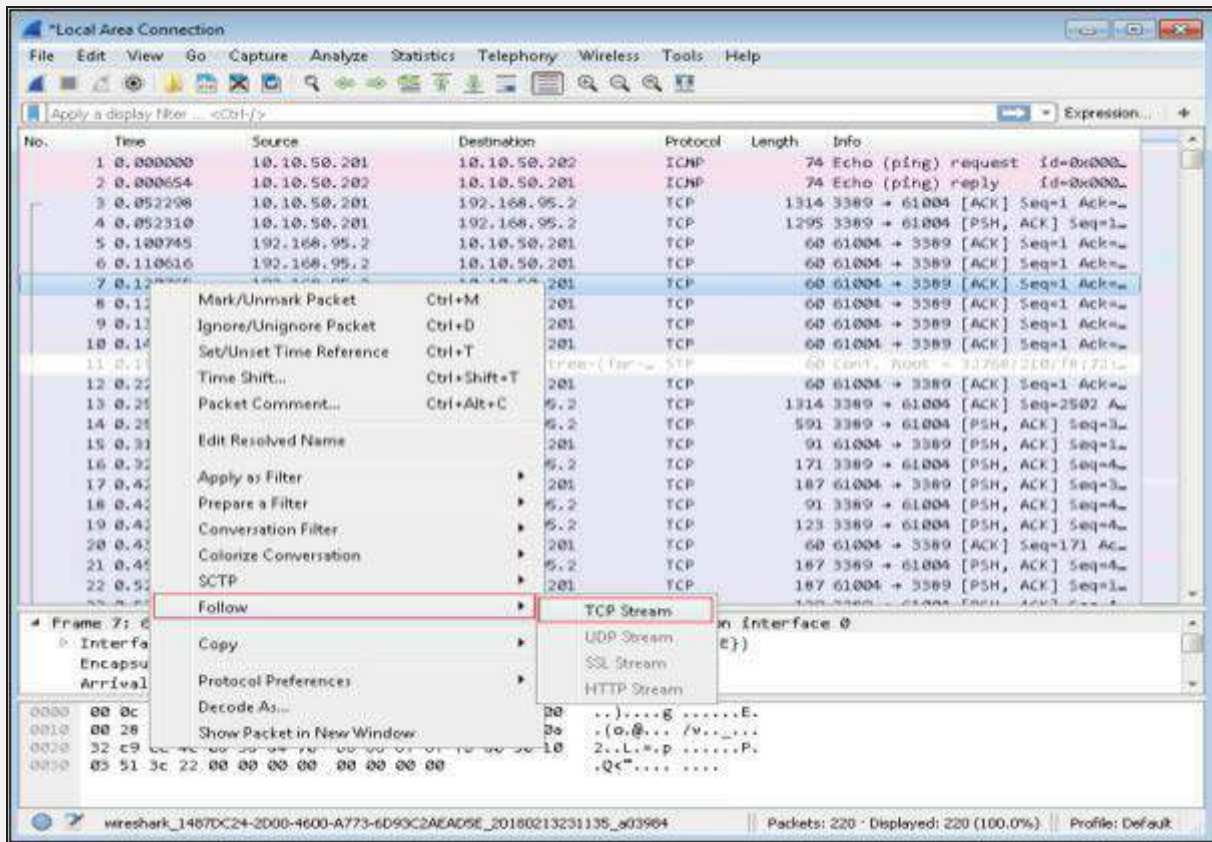


Figure 8-26 Wireshark Network Analyzer

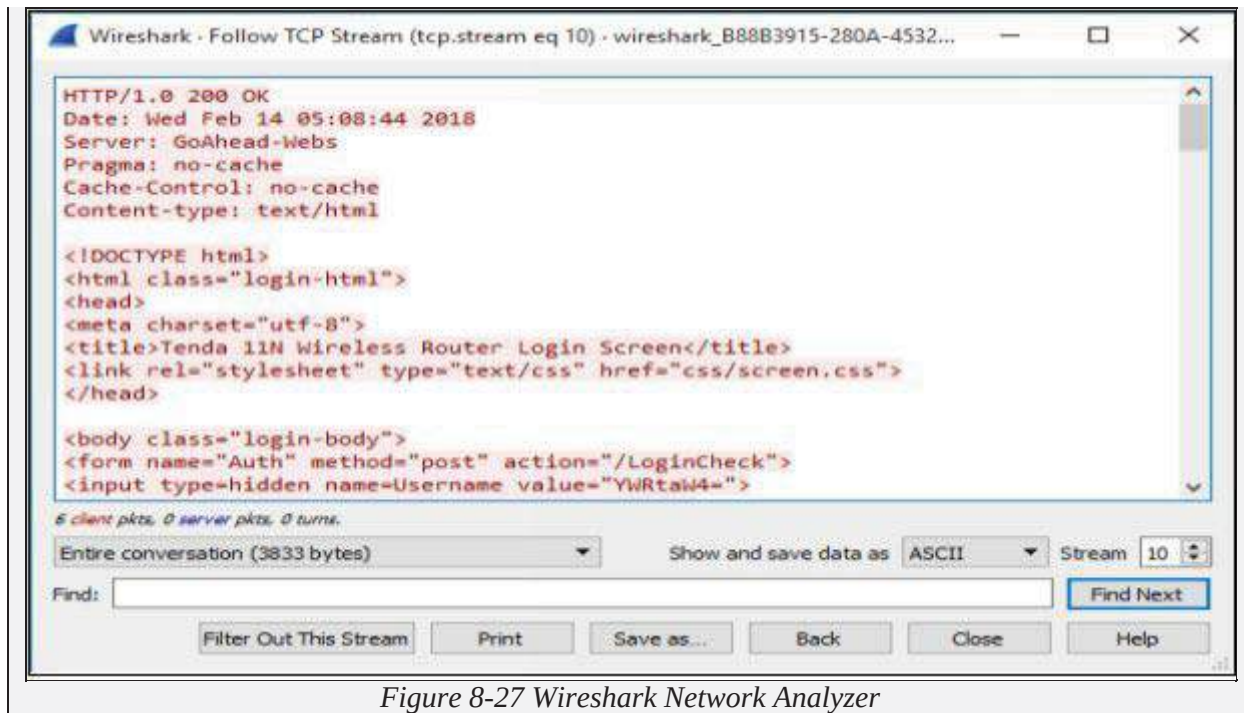


Figure 8-27 Wireshark Network Analyzer

Countermeasures

Defending Against Sniffing

Best practice against Sniffing includes the following approaches to protect the network traffic.

- Using HTTPS instead of HTTP
- Using SFTP instead of FTP
- Use Switch instead of Hub
- Configure Port Security
- Configure DHCP Snooping
- Configure Dynamic ARP Inspection
- Configure Source guard
- Use Sniffing Detection tool to detect NIC functioning in a promiscuous mode
- Use Strong Encryption protocols

Sniffing Detection Techniques

Sniffer Detection Technique

Ping Method

Ping technique is used to detect sniffer. A ping request is sent to the suspect IP address with spoofed MAC address. If the NIC is not running in promiscuous mode, it will not respond to the packet. In case, if the suspect is running a sniffer, it responds the packet. This is an older technique and not reliable.

ARP Method

Using ARP, Sniffers can be detected with the help of ARP Cache. By sending a non-broadcast ARP packet to the suspect, MAC address will be cached if the NIC is running in promiscuous mode. Next step is to send a broadcast ping with spoofed MAC address. If the machine is running promiscuous mode, it will be able to reply the packet only as it has already learned the Actual MAC from the sniffed Non-broadcast ARP packet.

Promiscuous Detection Tool

Promiscuous Detection tools such as *PromqryUI* or *Nmap* can also be used for detection of Network Interface Card running in Promiscuous Mode. These tools are GUI based application software.

Chapter 9: Social Engineering

Technology Brief

In this Chapter, "Social Engineering," we will discuss the basic concepts of Social Engineering and how it works. This technique is different from other information stealing technique used so far. All previous tools and technique used for hacking a system are technical and requires a deep understanding of networking, operating systems, and other domains. Social Engineering is the non-technical part of gaining information. It is most popular among other technique because of its ease as humans are most prone to mistake in terms of carelessness.

Security model includes network security, security of other resources of a corporate network, but humans are the most important component of the security. All security measures are dependent upon. If a User is careless to secure its login credentials, all security architectures will fail. Spreading awareness, training and briefing the user about Social Engineering, Social Engineering attacks and the impact of their carelessness will help to strengthen the security from endpoints.

This chapter will cover an overview of Social Engineering concepts, Types of Social Engineering attacks; you will learn how different social engineering techniques works, what are insider threats, how can an attacker impersonate on social networking sites, identity theft and how these threats of social engineering can be mitigated. Let's start with Social Engineering Concepts.

Social Engineering Concepts

Introduction to Social Engineering

Social Engineering is an act of stealing information from humans. As it does not have any interaction with target system or network, it is considered as a non-technical attack. Social Engineering is considered as the art of convincing the target to reveal information. It may be physically one-to-one interaction with the target or convincing the target on any platform such as social media is a popular platform for social engineering. This is the fact that people are careless, or unaware of the importance of the valuable information they possess.

Vulnerability to Social Engineering Attacks

One of the major vulnerability which leads to this type of attack is "Trust." The user trusts another user and does not secure their credentials from them. This may lead to an attack by the user, to the second person may reveal the information to the third one.

Organizations unaware of Social Engineering attacks, and its countermeasure and precaution are also vulnerable to this attack. Insufficient training program and education of employees create a vulnerability in the security against Social Engineering. Each organization must train their employees to be aware of social engineering.

Each organization must secure its infrastructure physically as well. An employee having a different level of authority should be restricted to perform in their restricted privileges. Employee not allowed to access the departments such as Finance department, he should be restricted to its allowed departments only. In the case where an employee is free to move may perform social engineering by Dumpster Diving or Shoulder surfing.

Lack of Security policies and privacy are also vulnerable. Security policies must be strong enough to prevent an employee from impersonating another user. Privacy in between unauthorized people or client and the employee of an organization must be maintained to keep things secure from unauthorized access or steal.

Phases of a Social Engineering Attack

Social Engineering attacks are not the complex attack which requires strong

technical knowledge. An attacker might be Non-technical personal as defined earlier; it is an act of stealing information from people. However, Social Engineering attacks are performed by the following the steps mentioned below: -

Research

Research phase includes a collection of information about target organization. It may be collected by dumpster diving, scanning websites of the organization, finding information on the internet, gathering information from employees of the target organization, etc.

Select Target

In the selection of target phase, attacker select the target among other employees of an organization. A frustrated target is more preferred as it will be easy to reveal information from him.

Relationship

Relationship phase includes creating a relationship with the target in the way that he could not identify the intention in fact target will be trusting the attacker. More Trust level between target and attacker will be easier to reveal information.

Exploit

Exploit of relationship by a collection of sensitive information such as Username, Passwords, network information, etc.

Social Engineering Techniques

Types of Social Engineering

Social Engineering attacks can be performed by different techniques. Different social engineering attack techniques are classified into the following types: -

Human-based Social Engineering

Human-based Social Engineering includes one-to-one interaction with the target. Social Engineer gathers sensitive information by tricking such as ensuring the trust, taking advantage of habits, behavior and moral obligation.

1. Impersonation

Impersonating is a human-based social engineering technique. Impersonation means pretending to be someone or something. Impersonating in Social engineering is pretending of an attacker to be a legitimate user or pretending to be an authorized person. This impersonating may be either personally or behind a communication channel such as while communicating with Email, telephone, etc.

Personal- impersonating is performed by identity theft, when an attacker has enough personal information about an authorized person, attacker gather information impersonating as a legitimate user providing the personal information of a legitimate user. Impersonating as Technical support agent asking for the credential is another way to impersonate and gather information.

2. Eavesdropping and Shoulder Surfing

Eavesdropping is a technique in which attacker is revealed information by listening to the conversation covertly. It does not only include Listening to conversations; it includes reading or accessing any source of information without being notified.

Shoulder Surfing is defined in the section of Footprinting in this workbook. Shoulder Surfing, in short, a method of gathering information by standing behind a target when he is interacting with sensitive information.

3. Dumpster Diving

Dumpster Diving is the process of looking for treasure in trash. This technique is older but still effective. It includes accessing the target's trash such as printer trash, user desk, company's trash for finding phone bills, contact information's, financial information, source codes, and other helpful material.

4. Reverse Social Engineering

A Reverse social engineering attack requires the interaction of attacker and victim, where an attacker convinces the target of having a problem or might have an issue in future. If the victim is convinced, he will provide the information required by the attacker. Reverse social engineering is performed through the following steps: -

- a. An attacker damages the target's system or identifies the known vulnerability.
- b. Attacker advertises himself as an authorized person for solving that problem.
- c. Attacker gains the trust of the target and obtains access to sensitive information.
- d. Upon successful reverse social engineering, the user may often get the attacker for help.

5. Piggybacking and Tailgating

Piggybacking and Tailgating is similar technique. Piggybacking is the technique in which unauthorized person waits for an authorized person to gain entry in a restricted area, whereas Tailgating is the technique in which unauthorized person gain access to the restricted area by following the authorized person. By using Fake IDs and close following while crossing the checkpoint, tailgating become easy.

Computer-based Social Engineering

There are different ways to perform Computer-based Social Engineering including Pop-up windows requiring login credentials, Internet Messaging and Emails such as Hoax letters, Chain letters, and Spam.

Phishing

Phishing process is a technique in which Fake Email which looks like

legitimate email is sent to a target host. When the recipient opens the link, he is enticed for providing information. Typically, readers are redirected to the fake webpage that resembles an official website. The user provides all sensitive information to a fake website believing as an official website because of its resemblance.

Spear Phishing

Spear Phishing is a type of phishing which is focused on a target. This is a targeted phishing attack on an individual. Spear phishing generates higher response rate as compared to a random phishing attack.

Mobile-based Social Engineering

1. Publishing Malicious Apps

In Mobile-based Social Engineering, a technique is by Publishing malicious application on application store to be available for download on a large scale. These malicious applications are normally a replica or similar copy of a popular application. For example, an attacker may develop a malicious application for Facebook. The user instead of downloading an official application may accidentally or intentionally download this third-party malicious application. When a user signs in, this malicious application will send the login credentials to the remote server controlled by the attacker.

2. Repackaging Legitimate Apps

In Mobile-based Social Engineering, another technique is by repackaging a legitimate application with malware. Attacker initially downloads a popular, most in-demand application from application store typically Games and Anti-viruses are most commonly used. Attacker repackages the application with

malware and uploads it to a third-party store. The user may not be aware of the availability of that application on application store or get a link for free download of a paid application. Instead of downloading from an official application from a trusted store, a user accidentally or intentionally downloads this repackaged application from the third-party store. When a user signs in, this malicious application will send the login credentials to the remote server controlled by the attacker.

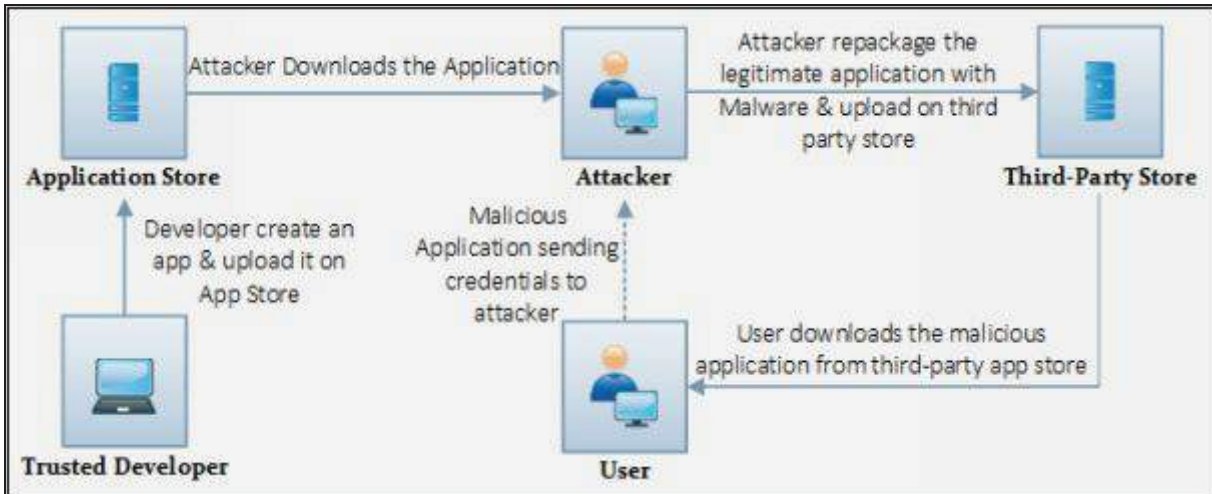


Figure 9-02 Repackaging Legitimate Application

3. Fake Security Apps

Similar to above technique, an attacker may develop a fake security application. This security application may be download by a pop-up window when the user is browsing website on the internet.

Insider Attack

Social Engineering is not all about a third person gathering information about your organization. It may be an insider, an employee of your organization having privileges or not, spying on your organization for malicious intentions. An insider attack is those attacks which are conducted by these insiders. These insiders may be supported by the competitor of an organization. A competitor may support a person in your organization for revealing sensitive information's and secrets.

Other than spying, Insider may have the intention of taking revenge. A disgruntled person in an organization may compromise the confidential and sensitive information to take revenge. An employee may be a disgruntled

person when he not satisfied with the management, trouble facing him from the organization, demotion or going to be terminated.

Impersonation on Social Networking Sites

Social Engineering Through Impersonation on Social Networking Sites

Impersonation on social networking site is very popular, easy, and interesting. The malicious user gathers personal information of a target from different sources mostly from social networking sites. Gathered information includes Full name, Recent profile picture, date of birth, residential address, email address, contact details, professional details, educational details as much as he can.

After gathering the information about a target, the attacker creates an account that is exactly the same with the account on the social networking site. This fake account is then introduced to friends and groups joined by the target. Usually, people do not investigate too much when they get a friend request, and when they find accurate information, they will definitely accept the request.

Once the attacker joined the social media group where a user shares his personal and organizational information, he will get updates from groups. An attacker can also communicate with the friends of the target user to convince them to reveal information.

Risks of Social Networking in a Corporate Networks

A social networking site is not secured enough as a corporate network secures the authentication, identification, and authorization of an employee

accessing the resources. The major risk of social networking is its vulnerability in the authentication. An attacker may easily manipulate the security authentication and create a fake account to access the information. An employee while communicating on social networking may not take care of sensitive information. Any employee may accidentally, and intentionally reveal the information which may be helpful for the one he is communication with, or the third person monitoring his conversation. It requires a need for a strong policy against data leakage.

Identity Theft

Identify Theft Overview

Identity theft is stealing the identification information of someone. Identity theft is popularly used for frauds. Anyone with malicious intent may steal your identification by gathering documents such as utility bills, personal information and other relevant information and create a new ID card to impersonate someone. It is not all about an ID card; he may use this information to prove the fake identity and take advantage of it

The process of Identity theft

Identity theft process starts with the initial phase in which attacker is focused on finding all necessary, beneficial information including personal and professional information. Dumpster Diving and by access the Desk of an employee is very effective technique. However, Social Engineering also work. The attacker will find Utility bills, ID cards, or Documents which will be helpful to get a fake ID card from an authorized issuing source such as Driving License office.

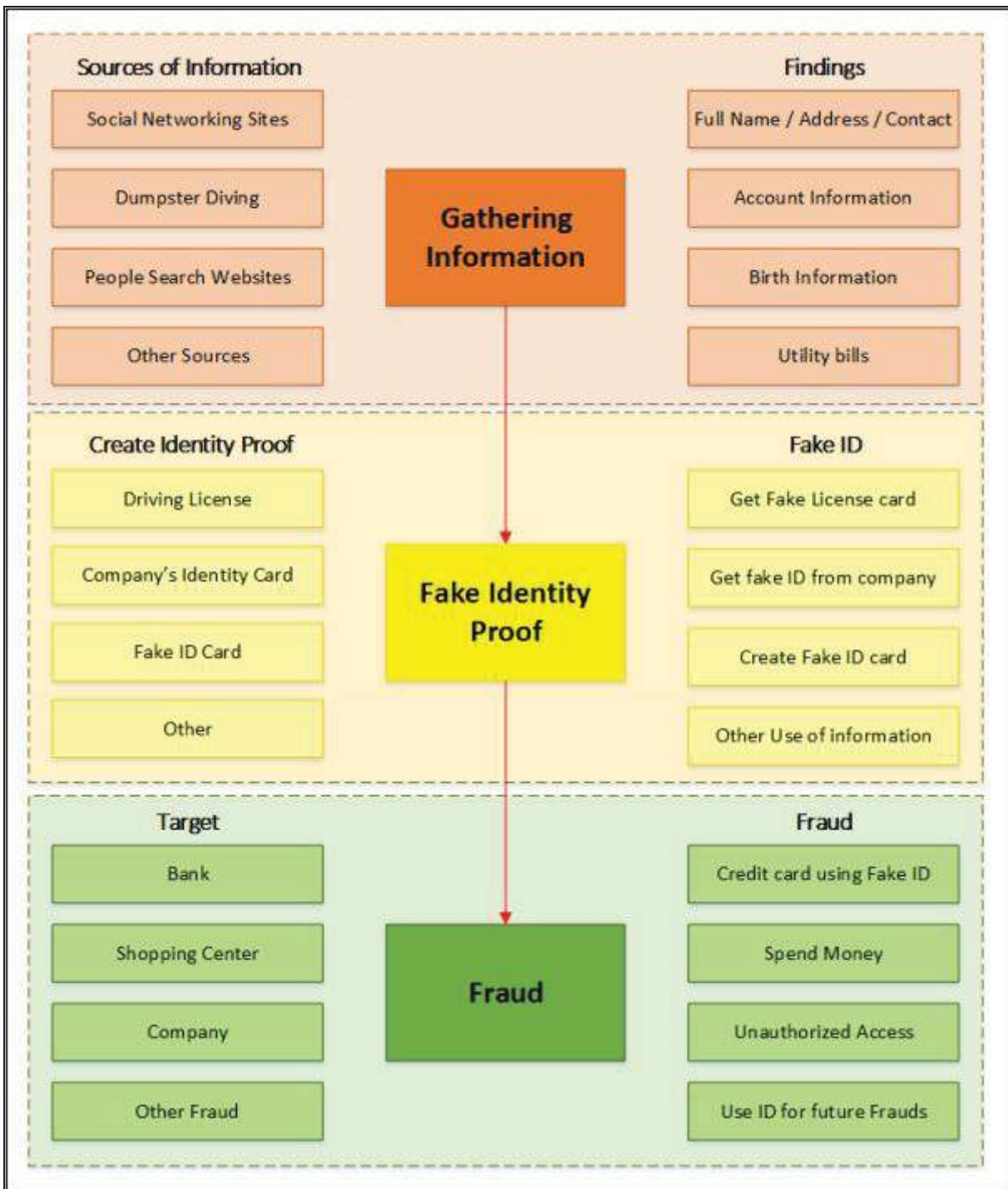


Figure 9-04 Processes of Identity Theft

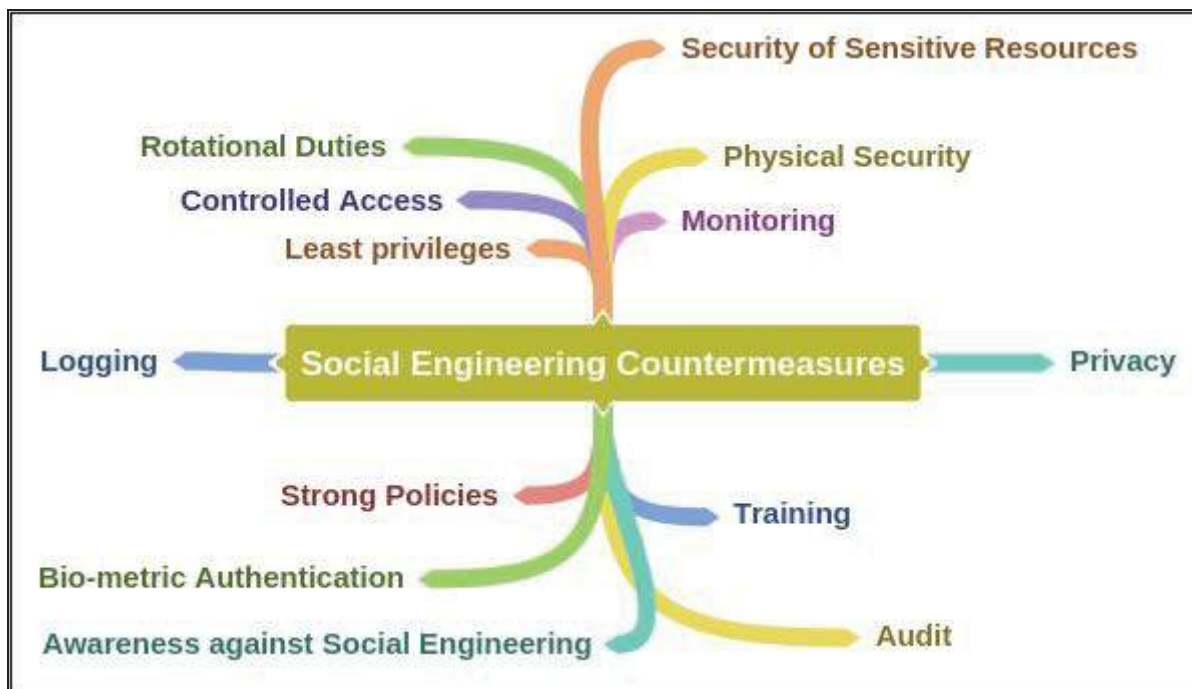
Once you get an ID from an authorized issuer such as Driving license centers, National ID card centers, Organization's administration department, you can take advantage of it. It is not as easy; you will need utility bills to prove your ID, you have provided all required parameters to prove yourself. Once you pass this checkpoint, you get the access using the ID by impersonating

legitimate employee.

Social Engineering Countermeasures

Social Engineering attacks can be mitigated by several methods. Privacy in the corporate environment is necessary to mitigate shoulder surfing and dumpster diving threats. Configuring strong password, securing passwords, keeping them secret will protect against social engineering. Social networking is always a risk of information leakage, but now, social engineering is also becoming an important platform for an organization to use. Keep monitoring social networking platforms, logging, training, awareness and audit can effectively reduce the risk of social engineering attacks.

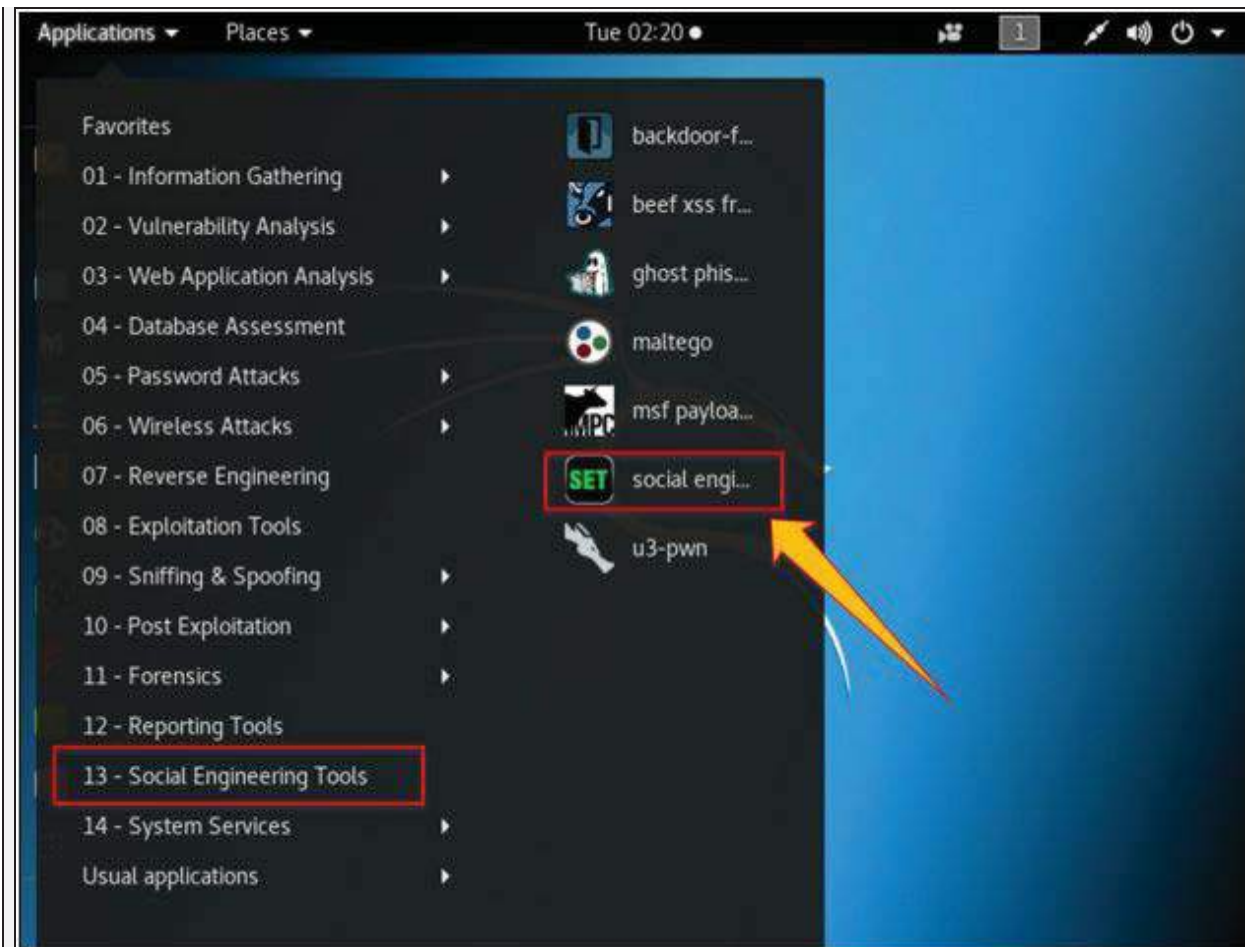



Figure 9-07 Social Engineering Toolkit

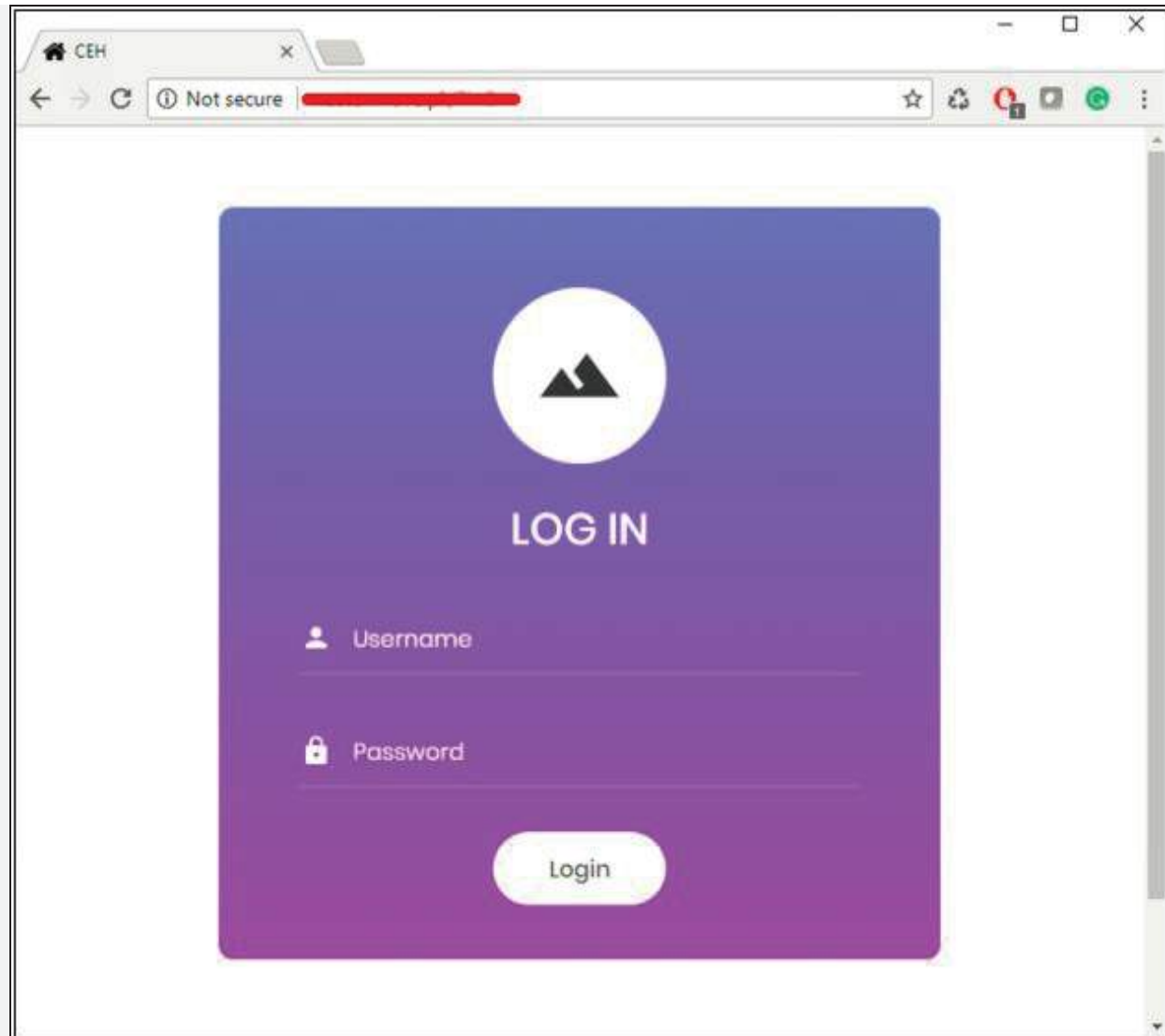



Figure 9-15 Logging into the cloned website

Username admin and password is extracted. If the user types it correctly, exact spelling can be used. However, you will get the closest guess of user ID and password. The victim will observe a page redirect, and he will be redirected to a legitimate site where he can re-attempt to log in and browse the site.

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Chapter 10: Denial-of-Services

Technology Brief

This chapter, "Denial-of-Service" is focused on DoS and Distributed Denial-of-Service (DDoS) attacks. This chapter will cover understanding of different DoS and DDoS attack, attacking techniques, Concept of Botnets, attacking tools, and their countermeasures and strategies used to defend against these attacks.

DoS/DDoS Concepts

Denial of Service (DoS)

Denial-of-Service (DoS) is a type of attack in which service offered by a system or a network is denied. Services may either be denied, reduced the functionality or prevent the access to the resources even to the legitimate users. There are several techniques to perform DoS attack such as generating a large number of request to the target system for service. These large number of incoming request overload the system capacity to entertain resulting denial of service.

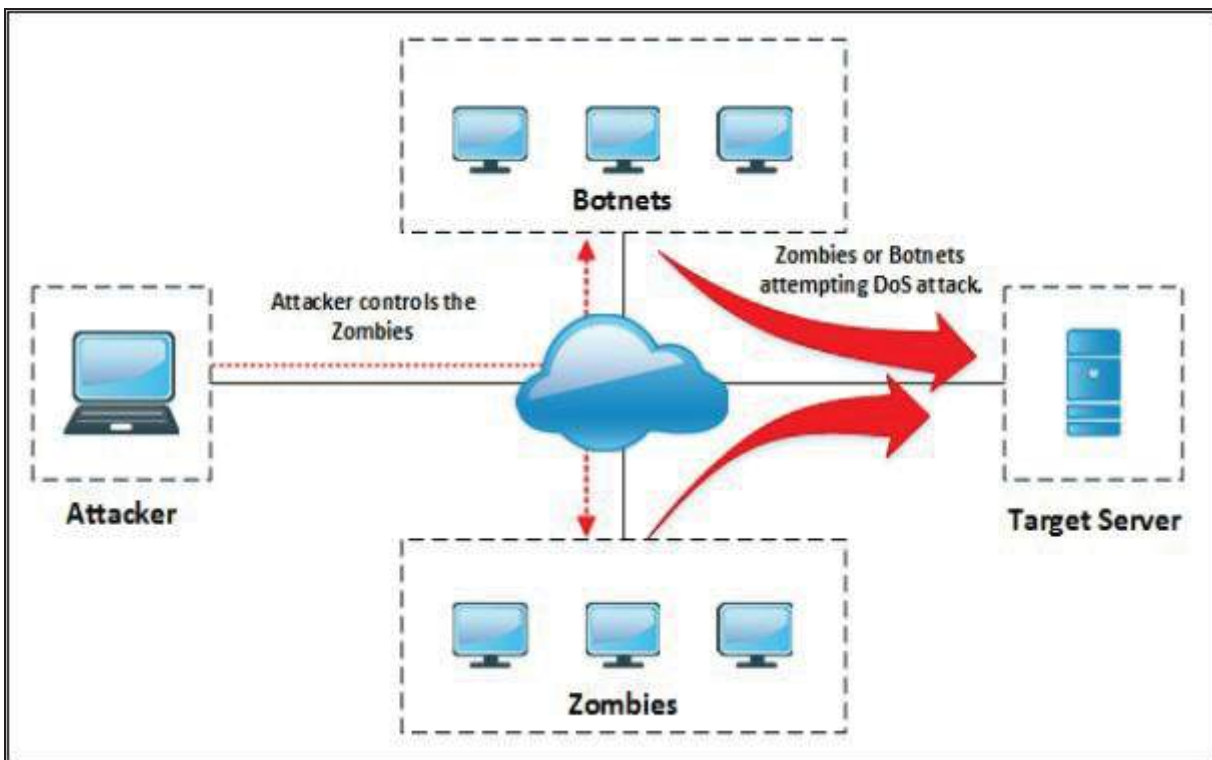


Figure 10-01 Denial-of-Service Attack

Common Symptoms of DoS attack are: -

- Slow performance
- Increase in spam emails
- Unavailability of a resource
- Loss of access to a website
- Disconnection of a wireless or wired internet connection
- Denial of access to any internet services.

Distributed Denial of Service (DDoS)

Similar to the Denial-of-service in which an attacker is attempting to a DoS attack, In Distributed DoS attack, multiple compromised systems are involved to attack a target causing a denial of service. Botnets are used for DDoS attack.

How Distributed Denial of Service Attacks Work

Normally an establishment of a connection consists of some step in which a user sends a request to a server to authenticate it. The server returns with the authentication approval. Requesting user acknowledges this approval, and then the connection is established and is allowed onto the server.

In the process of Denial of service attack, the attacker sends several authentication requests to the server. These requests have fake return addresses, so the server can't find a user to send the authentication approval. This authentication process waits for a certain time to close the session. The server typically waits more than a minute, before closing the session. The attacker is continuously sending requests causing a number of open connections on the server resulting in the denial of service.

DoS/DDoS Attack Techniques

Basic Categories of DoS/DDoS Attacks

Volumetric Attacks

Denial of Service attack performed by sending a high amount of traffic towards the target. Volumetric Attacks are focused on overloading the bandwidth consumption capability. These volumetric attacks are attempted with the intention to slow down the performance, degradation of services. Typically, these attacks are consuming bandwidth in hundreds of Gbps of bandwidth.

Fragmentation Attacks

DoS Fragmentation attacks are the attacks which fragment the IP datagram into multiple smaller size packet. This fragmented packet requires reassembly at the destination which requires resources of routers. Fragmentation attacks are of the following two types: -

1. UDP and ICMP fragmentation attacks
2. TCP fragmentation attacks

TCP-State-Exhaustion Attacks

TCP State-Exhaustion Attacks are focused on web servers, firewalls, load balancers and other infrastructure components to disrupt connections by consuming the connection state tables. TCP State-Exhaustion attacks results in exhausting their finite number of concurrent connections the target device can support. The most common state-exhaustion attack is ping of death.

Application Layer Attacks

An application layer DDoS attack is also called layer 7 DDoS attack. Application level DoS attack is a form of DDoS attack which focused the application layer of the OSI model resulting in the denial of degradation of service. The application level attack overloads the particular service or features of a website or application with the intention of denial or unavailability.

DoS/DDoS Attack Techniques

Bandwidth Attacks

Bandwidth attack requires multiple sources to generate a request to overload the target. DoS attack using a single machine is not capable of generating

enough requests which can overwhelm the service. The distributed-dos attack is a very effective technique to flood requests towards a target using the Distributed attack.

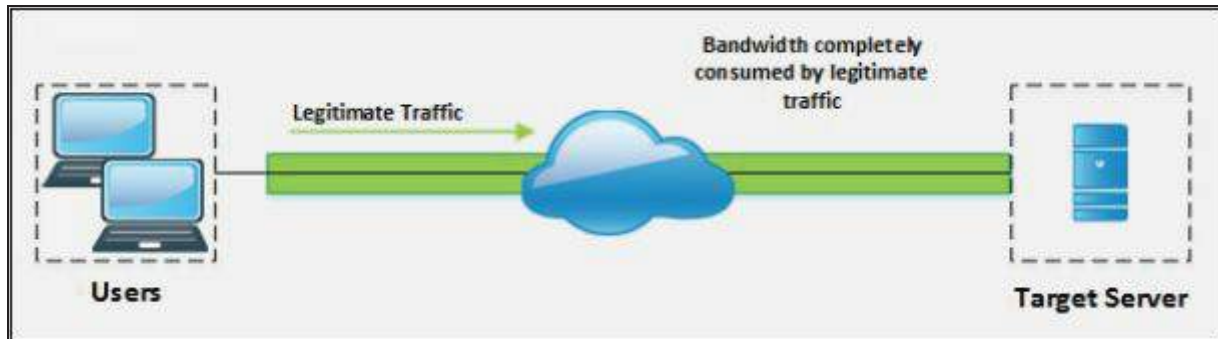


Figure 10-02 Before DDoS bandwidth attack

As we know, Zombies are the compromised system which is controlled by the master computer (attacker) or controlling zombies through handler provide support to initiate a DDoS attack. Botnets, defined later in this chapter, are also used to perform DDoS attacks by flooding ICMP Echo packet in a network. The goal of Bandwidth attack is to consume the bandwidth completely; no bandwidth is left even for legitimate use.

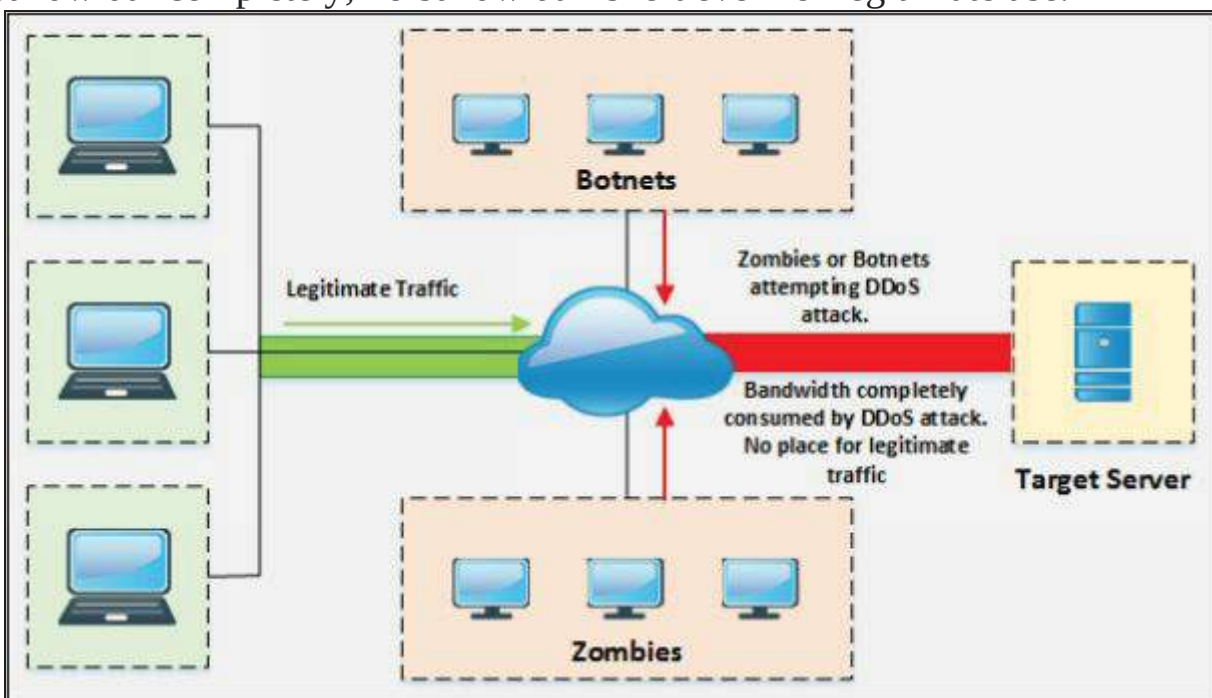


Figure 10-03 After DDoS bandwidth attack

By comparing the above figures, you will understand how Distributed-Denial-of-Service attack works and by consuming the entire bandwidth legitimate traffic is denied.

Service Request Floods

Service Request Flood is a DoS attack in which attacker flood the request towards a service such as Web application or Web server until all the service is overloaded. When a legitimate user attempts to initiate a connection, it will be denied because of repeated TCP connection by the attacker consumed all resources to the point of exhaustion.

SYN Attack / Flooding

SYN Attack or SYN Flooding exploits the three-way handshaking. The attacker, by sending a lot of SYN request to a target server with the intention of tying up a system. This SYN request has a fake source IP address which could not found the victim. Victim waits for the acknowledgment from the IP address but there will be no response as the source address of incoming SYN request was fake. This waiting period ties up a connection "listen to queue" to the system because the system will not receive an ACK. An incomplete connection can be tied up for 75 seconds.

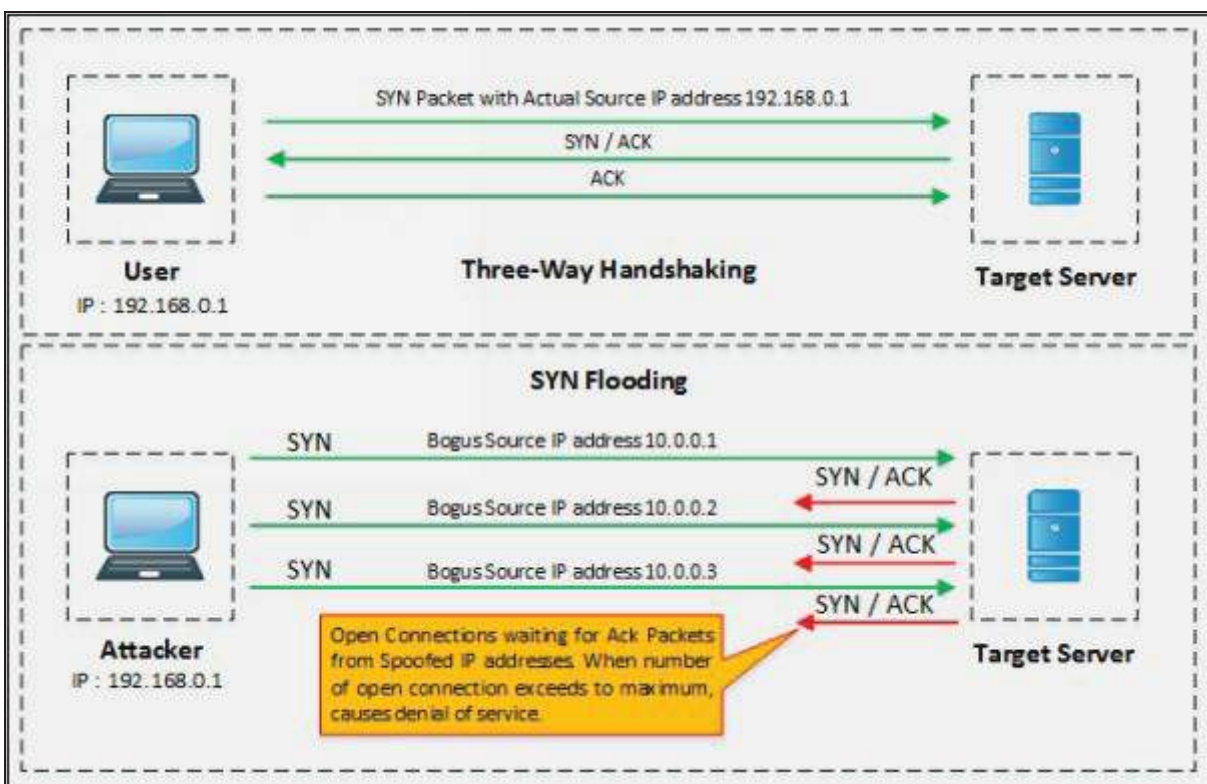


Figure 10-04 SYN Flooding

ICMP Flood Attack

Internet Control Message Protocol (ICMP) is the type of attack in which

attacker attacks using ICMP request. ICMP is a supporting protocol used by network devices to operation information, errors and indications. These request and their responses consume resources of the network device. Thus, by flooding ICMP request without waiting for response overwhelm the resources of the device.

Peer-to-Peer Attacks

A peer-to-peer DDoS attack exploits bugs in peer-to-peer servers or peering technology using Direct Connect (DC++) protocol to execute a DDoS attack. Most Peers to Peer networks is on the DC++ client. Each client DC++ based network is listed in network hub. Once it is compromised, it becomes easy for an attacker. Peer to peer networks is deployed among a large number of hosts. One or more malicious hosts in a peer to peer network can perform the DDoS attack. DoS or DDoS attacks may have different levels of influence base on various Peer to Peer network topologies. By exploiting huge amount of distributed hosts, an attacker can easily launch the DDoS attack to the target.

Permanent Denial-of-Service Attack

The permanent Denial-of-Service attack is the DoS attack which instead of focusing on denial of services, focused on hardware sabotage. Affected hardware by PDoS attack is damaged requiring replacement or reinstallation of hardware. PDoS is performed by a method known as “***Phlashing***” that causes irreversible damage to the hardware, or “***Bricking a system***” by sending fraudulent hardware updates. Once this malicious code is executed accidentally by the victim, it executes.

Application Level Flood Attacks

Application level attacks are focused on Application layer targeting the application server or client computer running applications. Attacker finds the fault and flaws in an application or operating system and exploits the vulnerability to bypass the access control gaining complete privileged control over the application, system or network.

Distributed Reflection Denial of Service (DRDoS)

Distributed Reflection Denial of Service attack is the type of DoS attack in which intermediary and Secondary victims are also involved in the process of launching a DoS attack. Attacker sends requests to the intermediary victim

which redirect the traffic towards the Secondary victim. Secondary victim redirects the traffic toward the target. Involvement of intermediary and secondary victim is for spoofing the attack.

Botnets

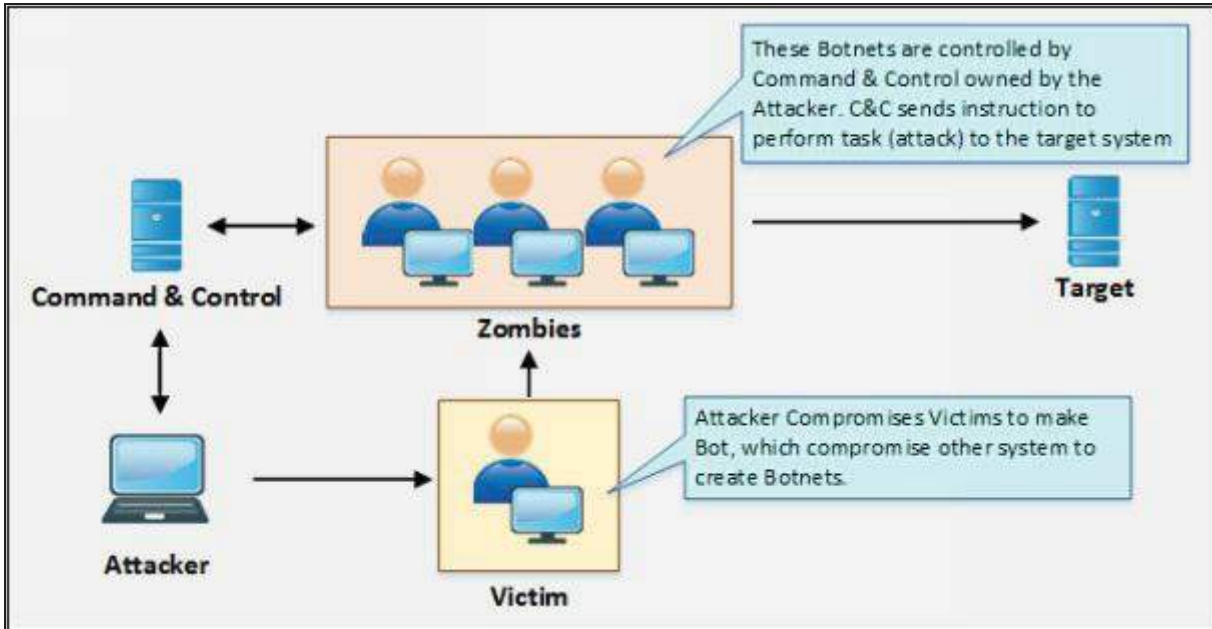


Figure 10-05 Typical Botnet Setup

Botnets are used for continuously performing a task. These malicious botnets gain access to the systems using malicious script and codes, it alerts the master computer when the system is controlled by the botnet. Through this master computer, an attacker can control the system and issue requests to attempt a DoS attack.

Botnet Setup

The Botnet is typically set up by installation a bot on Victim by using Trojan Horse. Trojan Horse carries bot as payload which is forwarded to the victim by using phishing or redirecting to either a malicious website or a compromised legitimate website. Once this Trojan is executed, the victim will be infected and get in control by the Handler, waiting for the instruction from Command and Control (CandC). Handler is the Bot Command and Control which sends an instruction to these infected systems (Bots) to attempt an attack on a primary target.

Scanning Vulnerable Machines

There are Several techniques used for scanning vulnerable machines including Random, Hit-list, Topological, Subnet, and Permutation scanning.

A brief description of these scanning methods is shown below: -

| Scanning Method | Description |
|--------------------------------|---|
| Random Scanning Technique | Infected machine probes IP addresses randomly from IP address space and scan them for vulnerability. When it found a vulnerable machine, it breaks into it and infects it with the script used to infect itself. Random scanning technique spread the infection very quickly as it compromises a large number of the host. |
| Hit-List Scanning Technique | The attacker first collects the information about a large number of potentially vulnerable machines to create a Hit-list. Using this technique, the attacker finds the vulnerable machine and infect it. Once a machine is infected, the list is divided by assigning half of the list to the newly compromised system. The scanning process in Hit-list scanning runs simultaneously. This technique is used to ensure the spreading and installation of malicious code in a short period. |
| Topological Scanning Technique | Topological Scanning gathers information from the infected system to find another vulnerable target. Initially compromised machine searches a URL from disk, it is going to infect and check for vulnerability. As these URLs are valid, the accuracy of this technique is extremely good. |

Propagation of Malicious Codes

There are three most commonly used malicious code propagation methods including Central, Back-chaining and Autonomous propagation.

Central Source Propagation

Central Source propagation requires central source where attack toolkit is installed. When an attacker exploits the vulnerable machine, it opens the connection on infected system listening for file transfer. Then, the toolkit is copied from the central source. This Toolkit is installed automatically after transferring from Central Source. This toolkit is used for initiating further attacks. File transferring mechanism that is used for transferring Malicious code (toolkit) is normally, HTTP, FTP, or RPC.

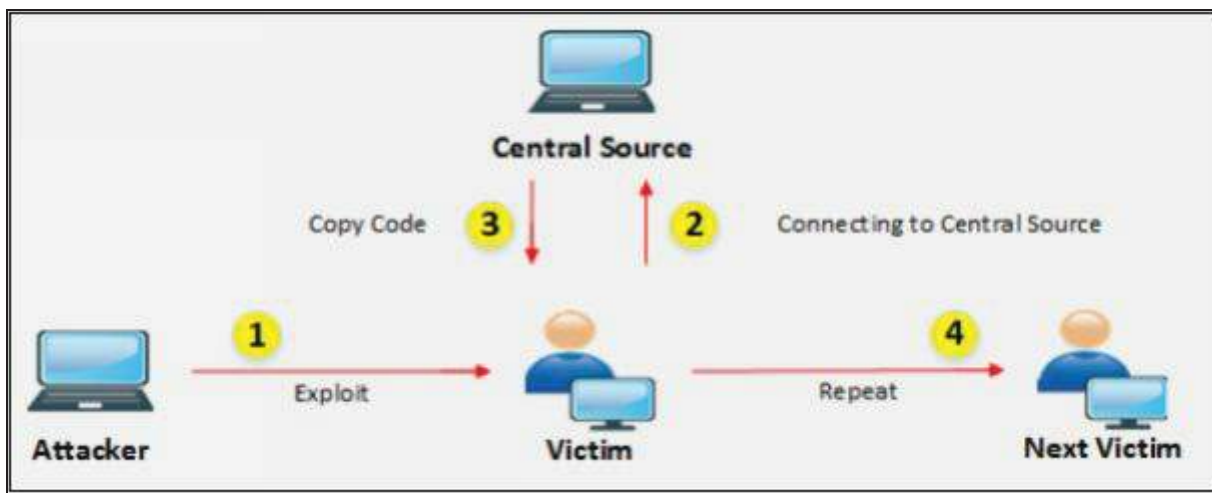


Figure 10-06 Central Source Propagation

Back-Chaining Propagation

Back-Chaining propagation requires attack toolkit installed on attacker's machine. When an attacker exploits the vulnerable machine; it opens the connection on infected system listening for file transfer. Then, the toolkit is copied from the attacker. Once toolkit is installed on the infected system, it will search for other vulnerable system and the process continuous.

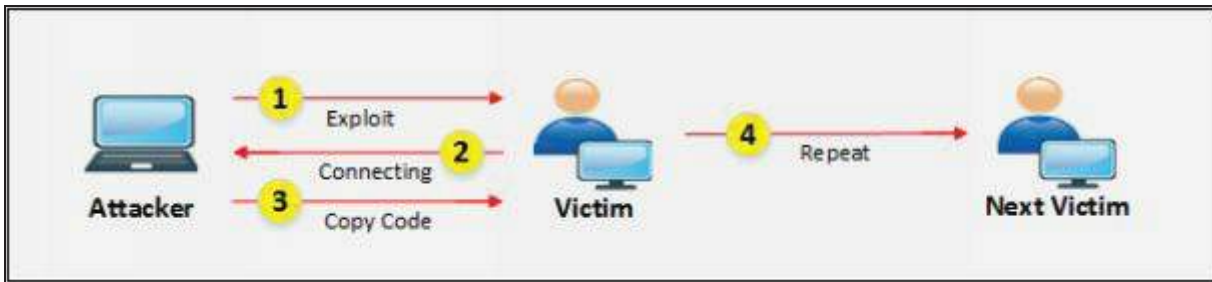


Figure 10-07 Back-Chaining Propagation

Autonomous Propagation

In the process of Autonomous propagation, the attacker exploits and send malicious code to the vulnerable system. The toolkit is installed and search for other vulnerable systems. Unlike Central Source Propagation, it does not require any Central Source or planting toolkit on own system.

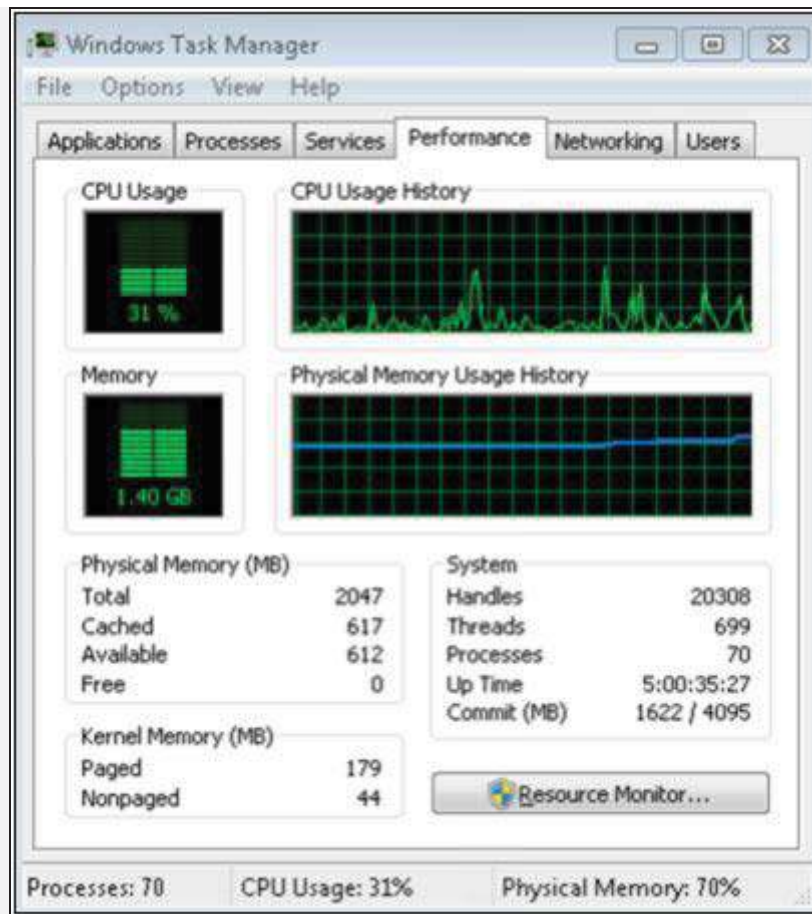


Figure 10-14 CPU Usage of Victim's machine

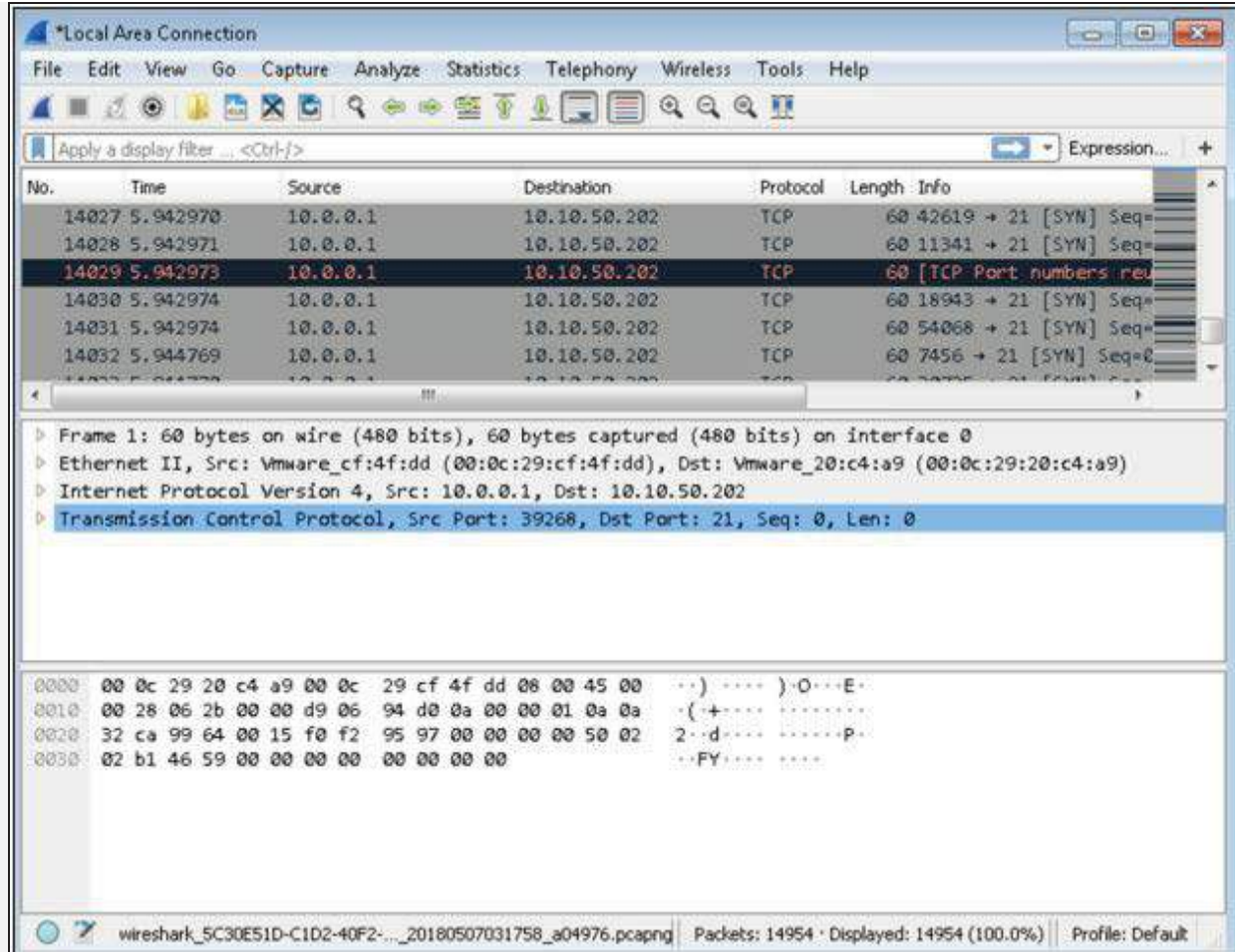



Figure 10-15 Capturing Packets

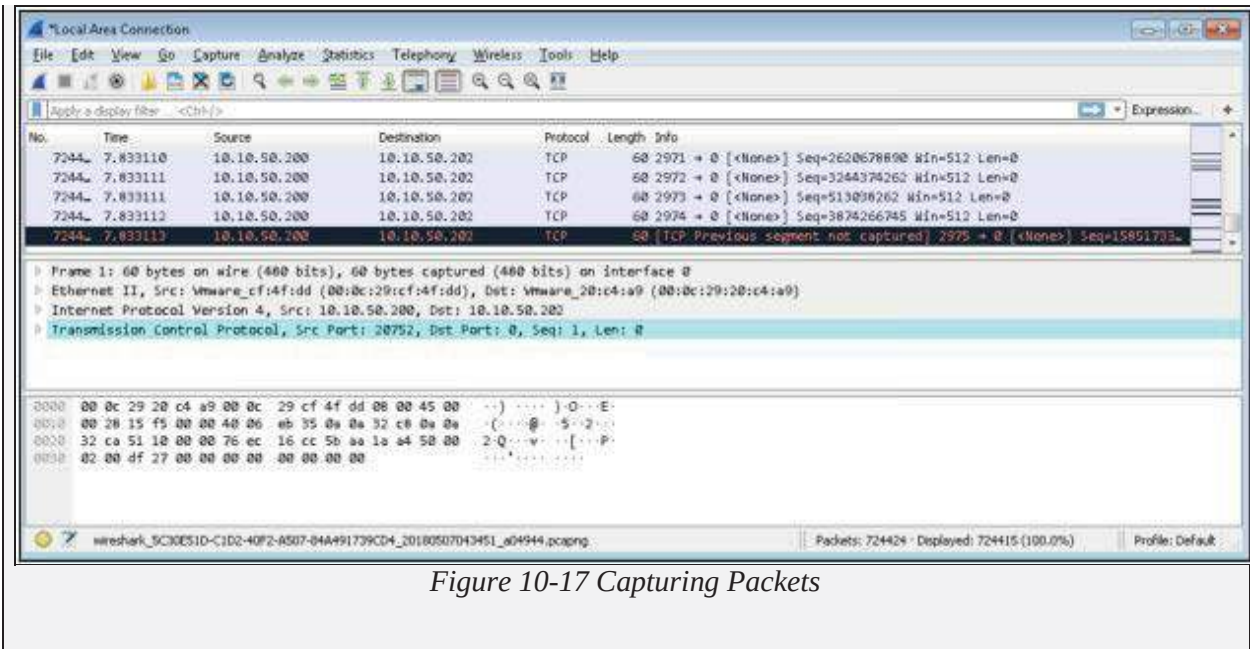


Figure 10-17 Capturing Packets

Counter-measures

Detection Techniques

There are several ways to detect and prevent DoS/DDoS attacks. The following are common security techniques:

Activity Profiling

Activity profiling means monitoring the activities running on a system or network. By monitoring the traffic flow, DoS/DDoS attacks can be observed by the analysis of packet's header information for TCP Sync, UDP, ICMP and Netflow traffic. Activity profiling is measured by comparing it from average traffic rate of a network.

Wavelet Analysis

Wavelet-based Signal Analysis is an automated process of detecting DoS/DDoS attacks by analysis of input signals. This automated detection is used to detect volume-based anomalies. Wavelet analysis evaluates the traffic and filter on a certain scale whereas Adaptive threshold techniques are used to detect DoS attacks.

Sequential Change-Point Detection

Change-Point detection is an algorithm which is used to detect denial of Service (DoS) attacks. This Detection technique uses non-parametric Cumulative Sum (CUSUM) algorithm to detect traffic patterns. Change-Point detection requires very low computational overheads hence efficient and immune to attacks resulting in high accuracy.

DoS/DDoS Countermeasure Strategies

- Intrusion Detection Systems

Techniques to Defend against Botnets

RFC 3704 Filtering

Botnet Defensive technique includes using RFC 3704 Filtering. RFC 3704 is designed for Ingress filtering for multi-homed networks to limit the DDoS attacks. It denies the traffic with a spoofed address to access the network and ensure the trace to its source address.

Cisco IPS Source IP Reputation Filtering

Source IP Reputation Filtering feature is ensured by Cisco IPS devices which are capable of filtering the traffic against the reputation score and other factors. IPS devices collect real-time information from Sensor Base Network. Its Global Correlation feature ensures the intelligence update of known threats including botnets and malware to help in detection of advance and latest threats. These threat intelligence updates are frequently downloaded on IPS and firepower devices of Cisco.

Black Hole Filtering

Black Hole Filtering is a process of silently dropping the traffic (either incoming or outgoing traffic) so that the source is not notified about discarding of the packet. Remotely Triggered Black Hole Filtering (RTBHF), a routing technique, is used to mitigate DoS attacks by using Border Gateway Protocol (BGP). The router performs Black hole filtering using null 0 interfaces. However, it can be done with the conjunction with BGP or configure a null 0 interface.

Enabling TCP Intercept on Cisco IOS Software

TCP Intercept command is used on Cisco IOS routers to protect TCP Servers from TCP SYN flooding attacks. TCP Intercept feature prevents the TCP SYN, a type of DoS attack by interception and validation of TCP connections. Incoming TCP Synchronization (SYN) packets are matched against the extended access list. TCP intercept software responds the TCP connection request with the requesting client on behalf of the destination

server; if the connection is successful, it initiates a session with destination server on behalf of requesting client and knits the connection together transparently. Thus, SYN flooding will never reach the destination server.

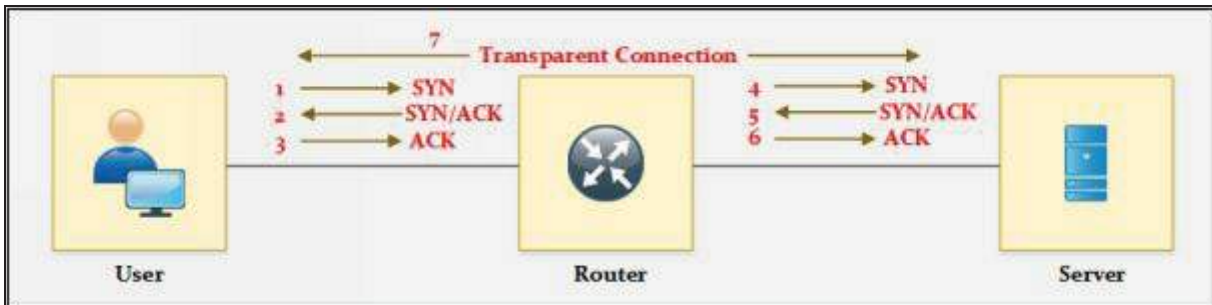


Figure 10-18 TCP Intercept Process

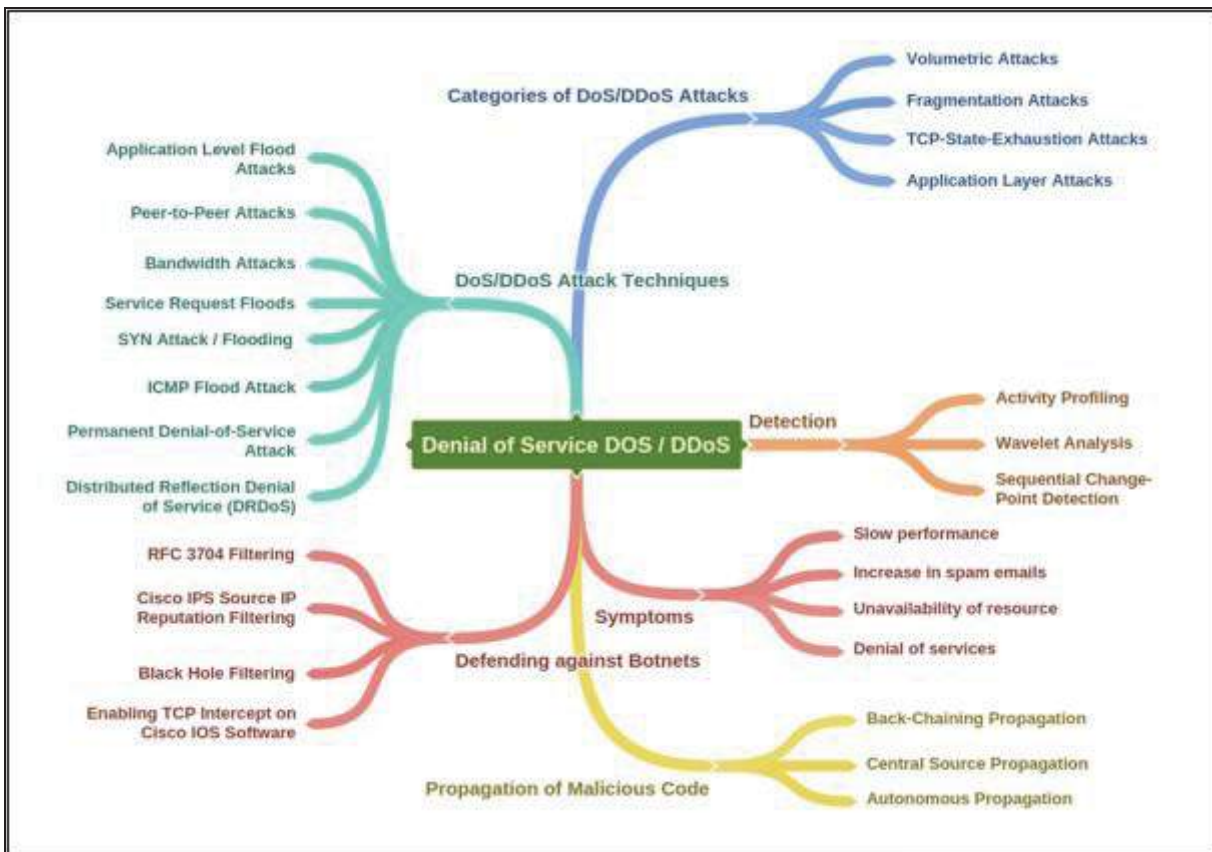

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Chapter 11: Session Hijacking

Technology Brief

The concept of session hijacking is an interesting topic among other scenarios. It is basically hijacking of sessions by intercepting the communication between hosts. The attacker usually intercepts the communication to obtain the roles of authenticated user or for the intention of Man-in-the-Middle attack.

Session Hijacking

In order to understand the session hijacking concept, assume an authenticated TCP session between two hosts. The attacker intercepts the session and takes over the legitimate authenticated session. When a session authentication process is complete, and the user is authorized to use resources such as web services, TCP communication or other, the attacker takes advantage of this authenticated session and places himself in between the authenticated user and the host. Authentication process initiates at the start of TCP session only, once the attacker successfully hijacks the authenticated TCP session, traffic can be monitored, or attacker can get the role of the legitimate authenticated user. Session hijacking becomes successful because of weak session IDs or no blocking upon receiving an invalid session ID.

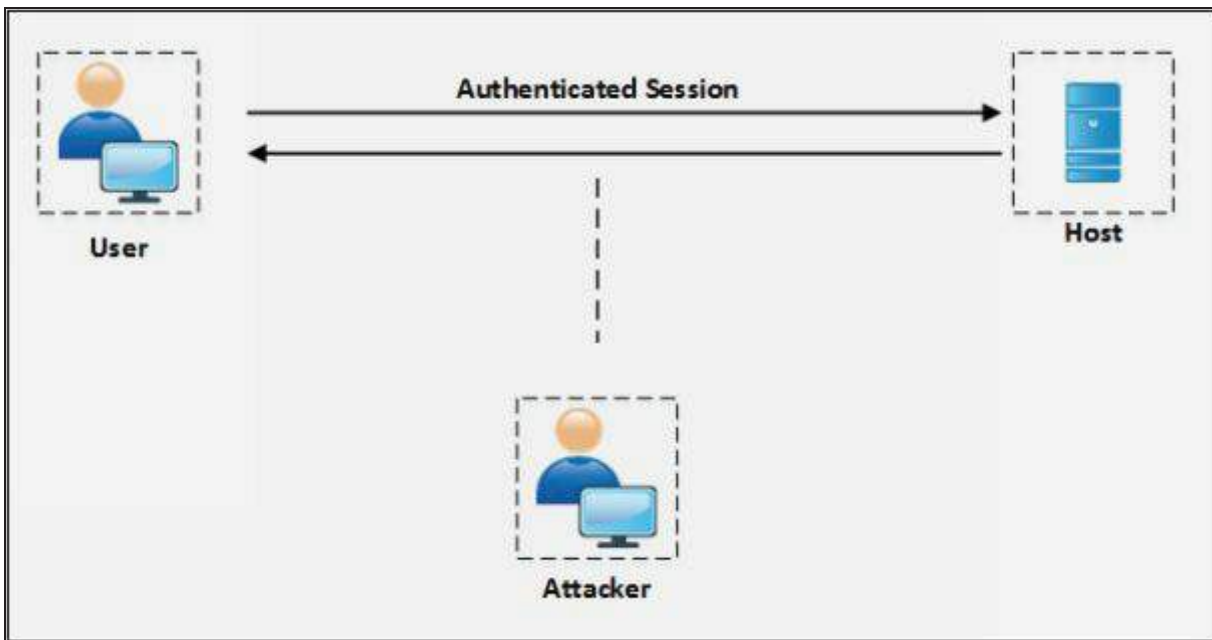


Figure 11-01 Session Hijacking

Session Hijacking Techniques

Session Hijacking process is categorized into the following three techniques:

Stealing

Stealing category includes the different technique of stealing session ID such as "Referrer attack" network sniffing, Trojans or by any other mean.

Guessing

Guessing category include tricks and techniques used to guess the session ID such as by observing the variable components of session IDs or calculating

the valid session ID by figuring out the sequence etc.

Brute-Forcing

Brute-Forcing is the process of guessing every possible combination of credential. Usually, Brute-Forcing is performed when an attacker gains information about the range of Session ID.

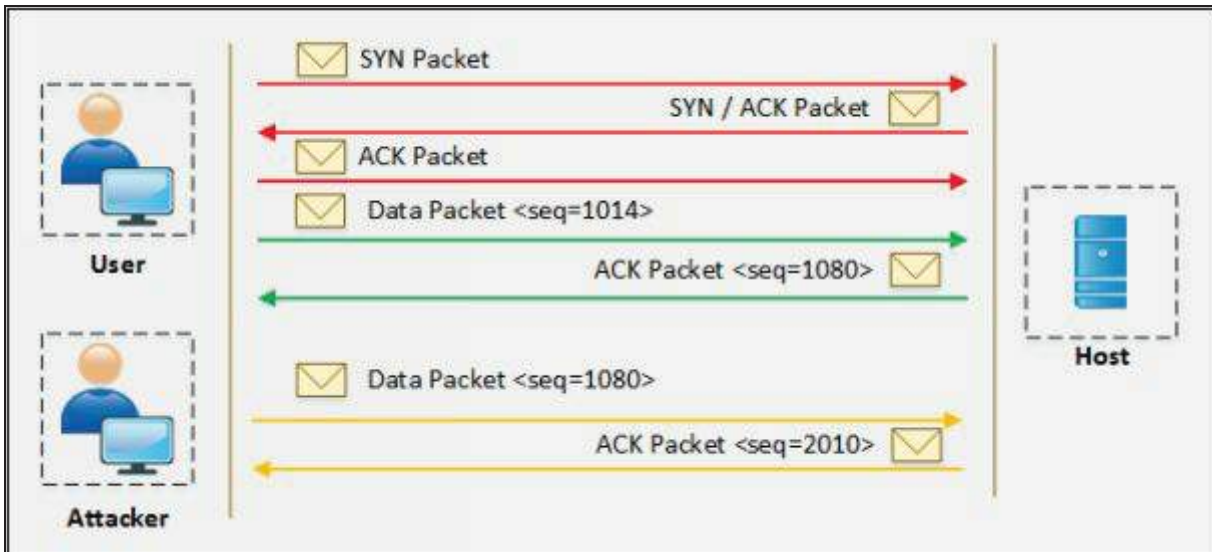


Figure 11-02 Brute-Forcing

Session Hijacking Process

The process of session hijacking involves: -

Sniffing

Attacker attempt to place himself in between victim and target in order to sniff the packet.

Monitoring

Monitor the traffic flow between victim and target.

Session Desynchronization

The process of breaking the connection between the victim and the target.

Session ID

Attacker takes control over the session by predicting the session ID.

Command Injection

After successfully taking control over the session, the attacker starts injecting the commands.

Types of Session Hijacking

Active Attack

The active attack includes interception in the active session from the attacker. An attacker may send packets to the host in the active attack. In an active attack, the attacker is manipulating the legitimate users of the connection. As the result of an active attack, the legitimate user is disconnected from the attacker.

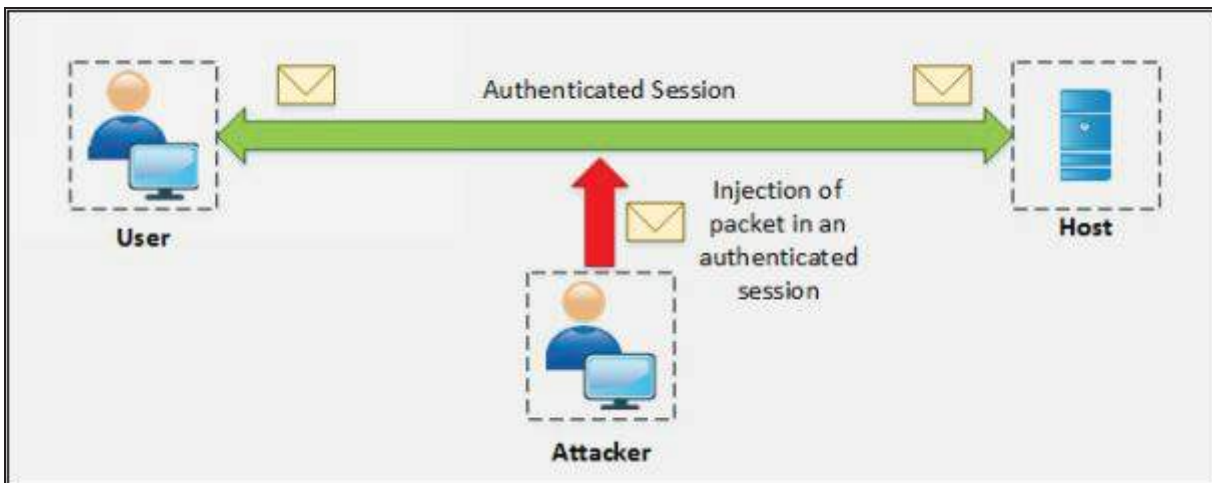


Figure 11-03 Active Attack

Passive Attack

The passive attack includes hijacking a session and monitoring the communication between hosts without sending any packet.

Session Hijacking in OSI Model

Network Level Hijacking

Network level hijacking includes hijacking of a network layer session such as

TCP or UDP session.

Application Level Hijacking

Application level hijacking includes hijacking of Application layer such as hijacking HTTPS session.

Network-Level Hijacking and Application-Level Hijacking are discussed in detail later in this chapter.

Spoofing vs. Hijacking

The major difference between Spoofing and Hijacking is of the active session. In a spoofing attack, the attacker is pretending to be another user by impersonating to gain access. The attacker does not have any active session; it initiates a new session with the target with the help of stolen information.

Hijacking is basically the process of taking control over an existing active session between an authenticated user and a target host. The attacker uses the authenticated session of a legitimate user without initiating a new session with the target.

Application Level Session Hijacking

Application-Level Hijacking Concept

Session hijacking as defined focuses on the application layer of the OSI model. In the application layer hijacking process, the attacker is looking for a legitimate session ID from the victim in order to gain access to an authenticated session which allows the attacker to avail web resources. For example, attacker, with an application layer hijacking can access the website resources secured for authenticated users only. The web server may assume that the incoming request forms the known host whereas an attacker has been hijacked the session by predicting the session ID.

Compromising Session IDs using Sniffing

Session sniffing is another flavor of sniffing in which an attacker is looking for the session ID / Session Token. Once the attacker has found the session ID, it can gain access to the resources.

Compromising Session IDs by Predicting Session Token

Predicting the session ID is the process of observing the currently occupied session IDs by the client. By observing the common and variable part of the session key, an attacker can guess the next session key.

How to Predict a Session Token?

Web servers normally use random session ID generation to prevent prediction however some web servers use customer defined algorithms to assign session ID. For example, as shown below:

After observing the above session IDs, you can easily identify the constant part and other variable parts. In the above example, **ABCD** is the constant part, **01012017** is a date, and the last section is the time. An attacker may attempt with the following session ID at 19:25:10

Compromising Session IDs Using Man-in-the-Middle Attack

The process of compromising the session ID using Man-in-the-Middle attack requires splitting of the connection between Victim and Web server into two connections, one of them between Victim-to-Attacker and another between Attacker-to-Server.

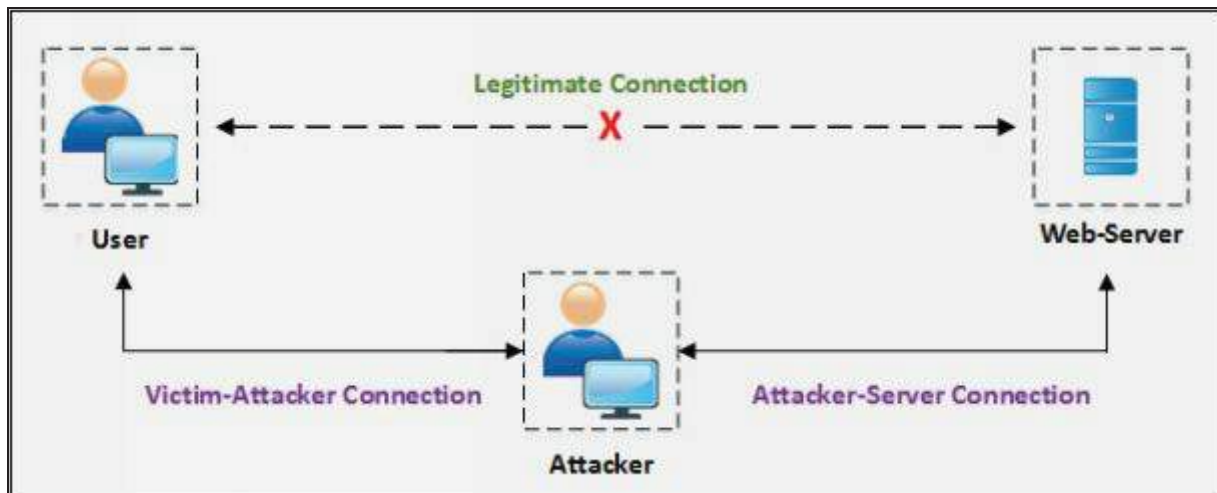


Figure 11-05 MITM Process

Compromising Session IDs Using Man-in-the-Browser Attack

Compromising Session ID using Man-in-the-Browser attack requires a Trojan, already deployed on the target machine. The trojan can either change the proxy settings, redirecting all traffic through the attacker whereas another technique using Trojan is that intercept the process between the browser and its security mechanism.

Steps to Perform Man-in-the-Browser Attack

To launch Man-in-the-Browser attack; the attacker first infected the victim's machine using a Trojan. Trojan installs malicious code in the form of an extension on the victim's machine and which modifies the browser's configuration upon boot. When a user logged into the site, URL is checked against a known list of the targeted website; the Event handler will register the event when it is detected. Using DOM interface attacker can extract and modify the values when the user clicks the button. The browser will send the form with modified entries to the web server. As the browser shows original transaction details, the user could not identify any interception.

Compromising Session IDs Using Client-side Attacks

Session IDs can be compromised easily by using Client-side attacks such as:

-

1. Cross-Site Scripting (XSS)
2. Malicious JavaScript Code
3. Trojans

Cross-site Script Attack

Cross-site Scripting attack is performed by an attacker by sending a crafted link with a malicious script. When the user clicks this malicious link, the script will be executed. This script may be coded to extract the Session IDs and send it to the attacker.

Cross-site Request Forgery Attack

Cross-Site Request Forgery (CSRF) attack is the process of obtaining the session ID of a legitimate user and exploiting the active session with the trusted website in order to perform malicious activities.

Session Replay Attack

Another technique for session hijacking is Session Replay Attack. Attacker captures the authentication token from user intended for the server and replays the request to the server resulting in unauthorized access to the server.

Session Fixation

Session Fixation is an attack permitting the attacker to hijack the session. The attacker has to provide valid session ID and make the victim's browser to use it. It can be done by the following technique

1. Session Token in URL argument
2. Session Token in hidden form
3. Session ID in a cookie

To understand the Session Fixation attack, assume an attacker, victim, and the web server. The attacker initiates a legitimate connection with the web server, issues a session ID or uses a new session ID. The attacker then sends the link to the victim with the established session ID for bypassing the authentication. When the user clicks the link and attempts to log into the website, web server continues the session as it is already established, and authentication is performed. Now, the attacker already has the session ID information will continue using a legitimate user account.

Network-level Session Hijacking

Network-Level hijacking is focused on Transport layer and Internet layer protocols used by the application layer. Network level attack results in extracting information which might be helpful for application layer session.

There are several types of network level hijacking including: -

- Blind Hijacking
- UDP Hijacking
- TCP/IP Hijacking
- RST Hijacking
- MITM
- IP Spoofing

The 3-Way Handshake

TCP communication initiates with the 3-way handshaking between requesting host and target host. In this handshaking Synchronization (SYN) packets and Acknowledgment (ACK) packets are communicated between them. To understand the flow of 3-way handshaking observe the following diagram.

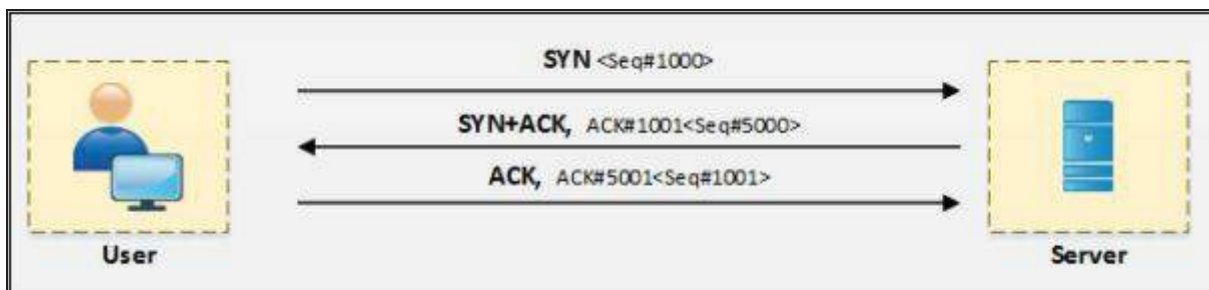


Figure 11-06 3-way Handshaking

TCP/IP Hijacking

TCP/IP hijacking process is the network level attack on a TCP session in which an attacker predicts the sequence number of a packet flowing between victim and host. To perform TCP/IP attack, the attacker must be on the same network with the victim. Usually, the attacker uses sniffing tools to capture the packets and extract the sequence number. By injecting the spoofed packet session can be interrupted. Communication from the legitimate user can be disrupted by a Denial-of-Service attack or Reset connection.

Source Routing

Source routing is a technique of sending the packet via selected route. In session hijacking, this technique is used to attempt IP spoofing as a legitimate host with the help of Source routing to direct the traffic through the path identical to the victim's path.

RST Hijacking

RST hijacking is the process of sending Reset (RST) packet to the victim with the spoofed source address. Acknowledgment number used in this Reset packet is also predicted. When the victim receives this packet, it could not identify that the packet is spoofed believing the actual source has sent the packet resulting in resetting the connection. RST packet can be crafted using packet crafting tools.

Blind Hijacking

Blind Hijacking is the technique in which attacker is not able to capture the return traffic. In Blind hijacking, attacker captures the packet coming from victim destined towards the server, inject malicious packet and forward to the target server.

Forged ICMP and ARP Spoofing

A man-in-the-middle attack can also be performed by using Forged ICMP packet and ARP spoofing techniques. Forged ICMP packets such as Destination unavailable or high latency message are sent to fool the victim.

UDP Hijacking

UDP Session Hijacking process is quite simpler than TCP session hijacking. Since the UDP is a connectionless protocol, it does not require any sequence packet between requesting client and host. UDP session hijacking is all about sending the response packet before a destination server responds. There are several techniques to intercept the coming traffic from the destination server

Countermeasures

Session Hijacking Countermeasures

Mitigation of Session Hijacking attacks includes several detection techniques and countermeasures that can be implemented including manual and automated processes. Deployment of Defense-in-depth technology, Network monitoring devices such as Intrusion Detection System (IDS) and Intrusion Prevention System (IPS) are categorized as automated detection process. There are several Packet sniffing tools available which can be used for manual detection.

Furthermore, encrypted session and communication using Secure Shell (SSH), using HTTPS instead of HTTP, using Random and lengthy string for Session ID, session timeout, and strong authentication like Kerberos can be helpful to prevent and mitigate session hijacking. Using IPsec and SSL can provide stronger protection against hijacking.

IPSec

IPSec stands for IP security. As the name suggests, it is used for the security of general IP traffic. The power of IPsec lies in its ability to support multiple protocols and algorithms. It also incorporates new advancements in encryption and hashing protocols. The main objective of IPSec is to provide CIA (confidentiality, integrity, and authentication) for virtual networks used in current networking environments. IPSec makes sure the above objectives are in action by the time packet enters a VPN tunnel until it reaches the other end of the tunnel.

- **Confidentiality.** IPSec uses encryption protocols namely AES, DES, and 3DES for providing confidentiality.
- **Integrity.** IPSec uses hashing protocols (MD5 and SHA) for providing integrity. Hashed Message Authentication (HMAC) can also be used for checking the data integrity.
- **Authentication algorithms.** RSA digital signatures and pre-shared keys (PSK) are two methods used for authentication purposes.

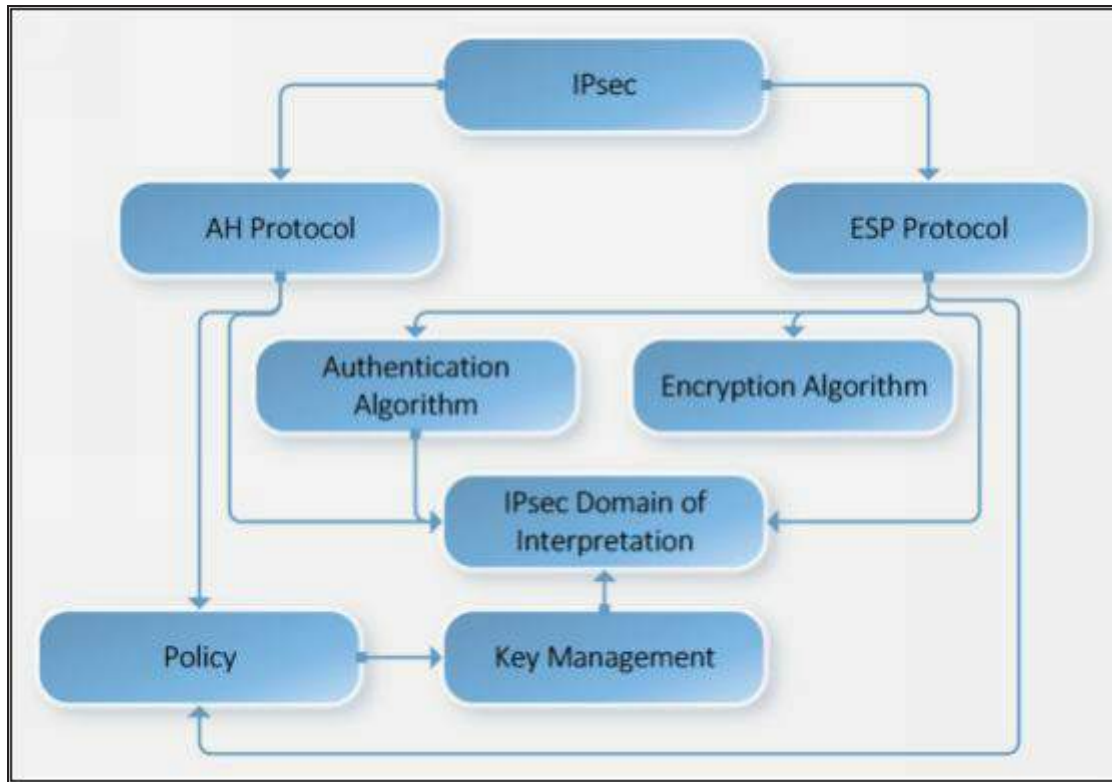


Figure 11-07 IPsec Architecture

IPsec Tunnel Mode

Being the default mode set in Cisco devices, tunnel mode protects the entire IP packet from originating device. It means for every original packet; another packet is generated with new IP header and send over the untrusted network to the VPN peer located on another end of the logical connection. Tunnel

mode is commonly used in case of Site-to-Site VPN where two secure IPSec gateways are connected over public internet using IPSec VPN connection. Consider the following diagram:

This shows IPSec Tunnel Mode with ESP header:

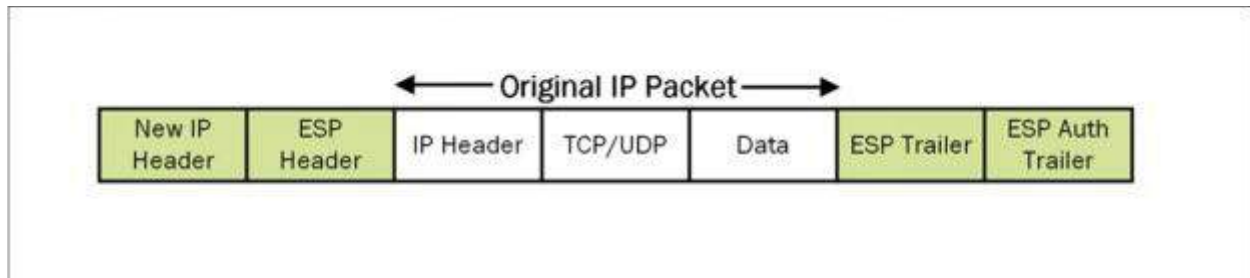


Figure 11-08 IPsec Tunnel Mode with ESP header

Similarly, when AH is used; new IP Packet format will be:

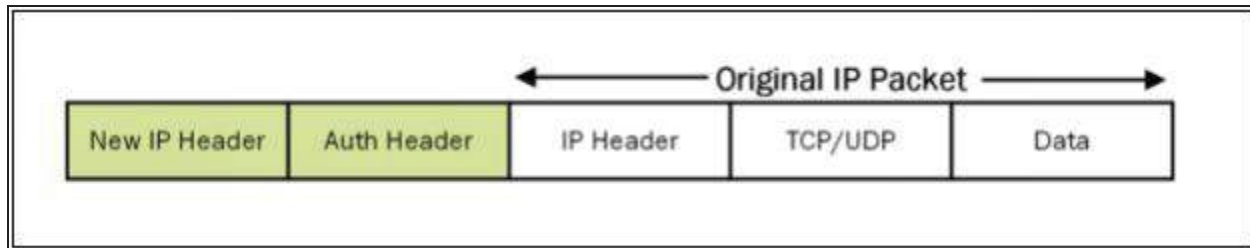


Figure 11-09 IPsec Tunnel Mode with AH header

IPsec Transport Mode

In transport mode, IPsec VPN secures the data field or payload of originating IP traffic by using encryption, hashing or both. New IPsec headers encapsulate only payload field while the original IP headers remain unchanged. Tunnel mode is used when original IP packets are the source and destination address of secure IPsec peers. For example, securing the management traffic of router is a perfect example of IPsec VPN implementation using transport mode. From a configuration point of view, both tunnel and transport modes are defined in the configuration of *transform set*. It will be covered in the Lab scenario of this section.

This diagram shows IPsec Transport Mode with ESP header:

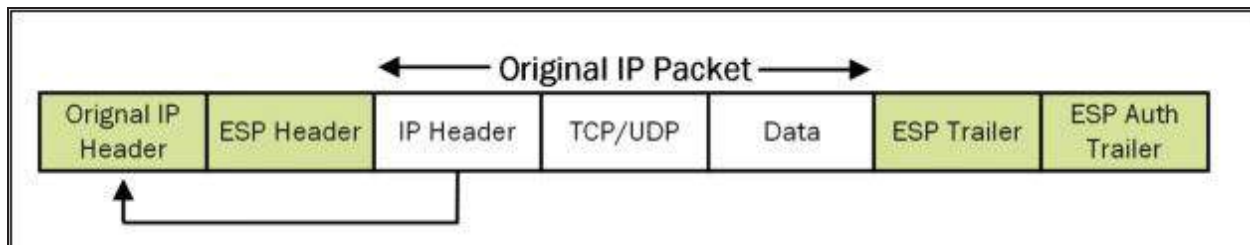


Figure 11-10 IPsec Transport Mode with ESP header

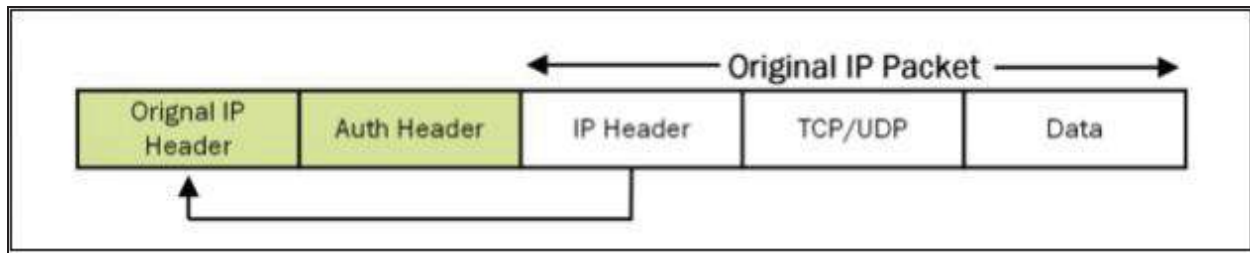
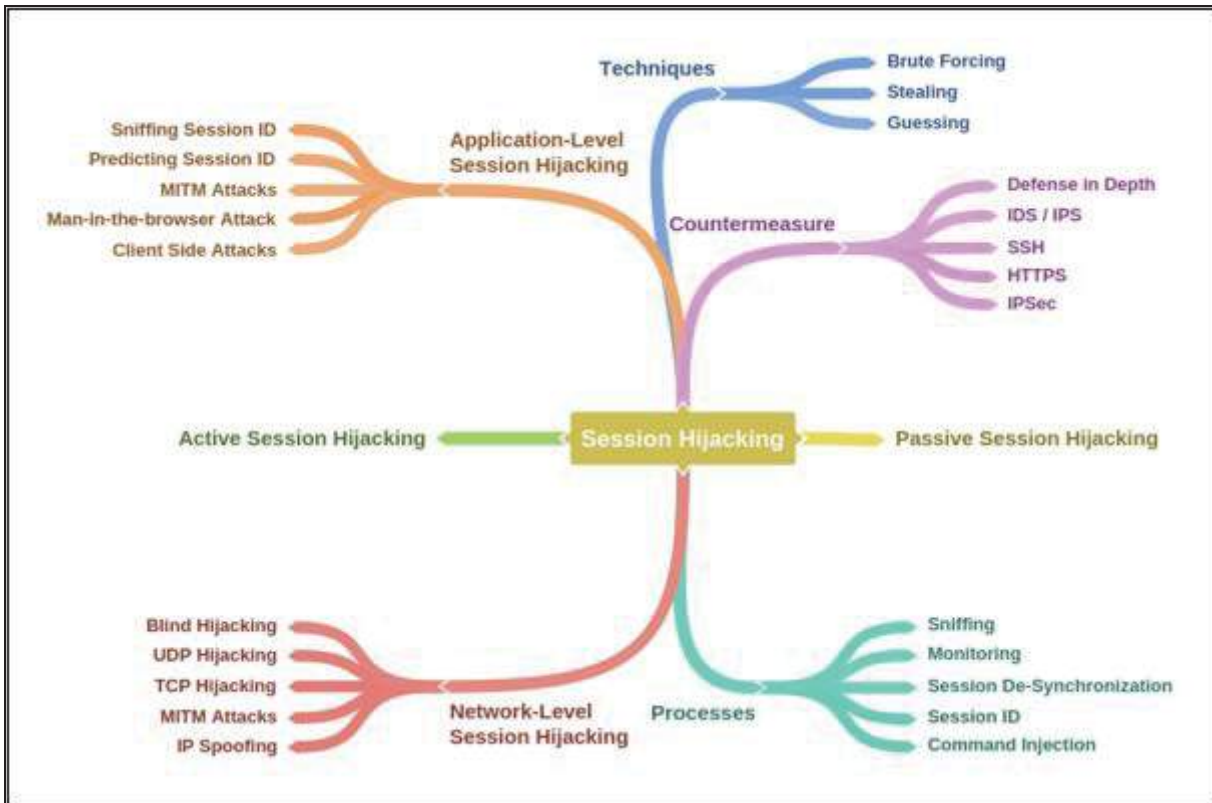


Figure 11-11 IPsec Transport Mode with AH header

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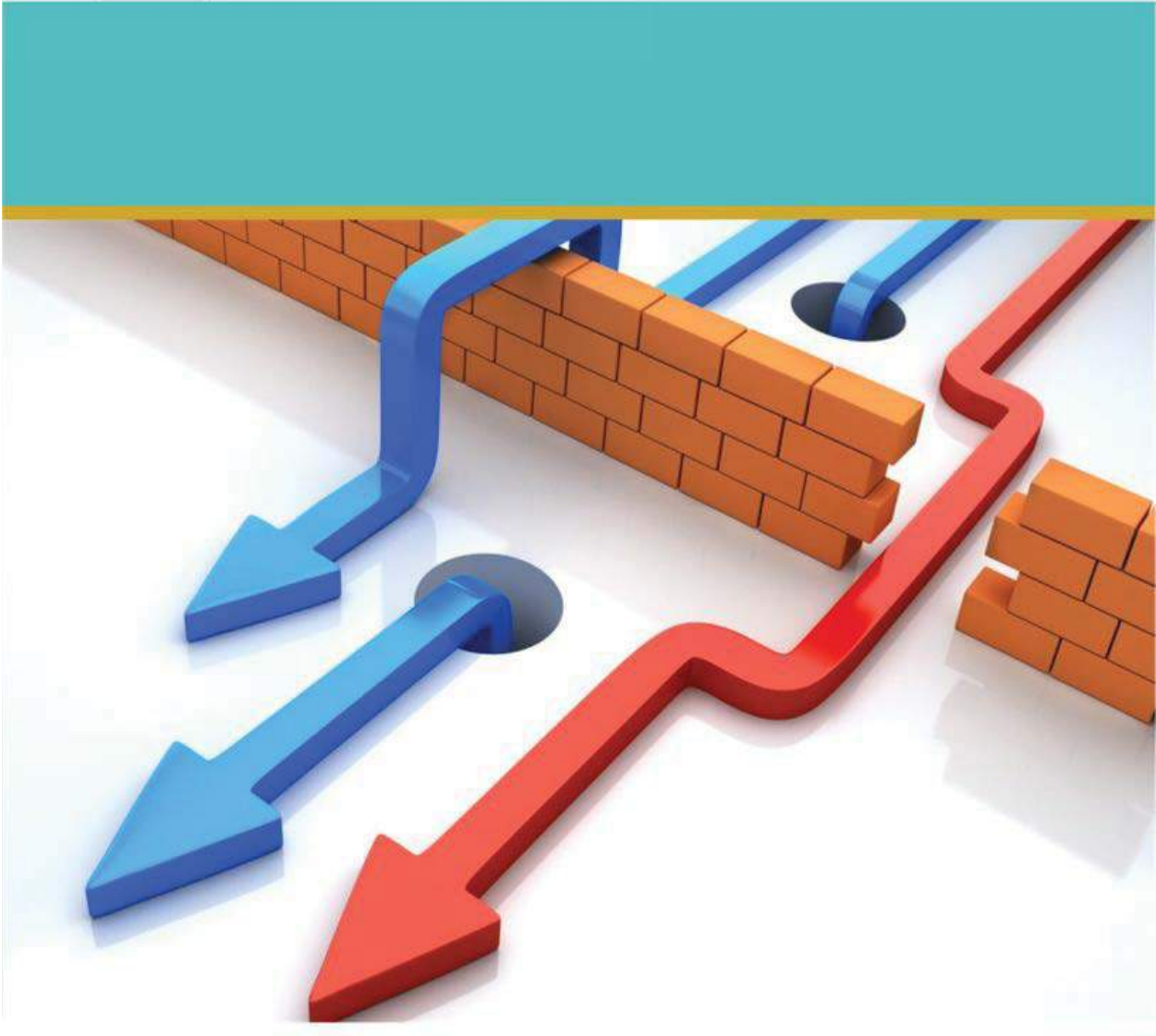

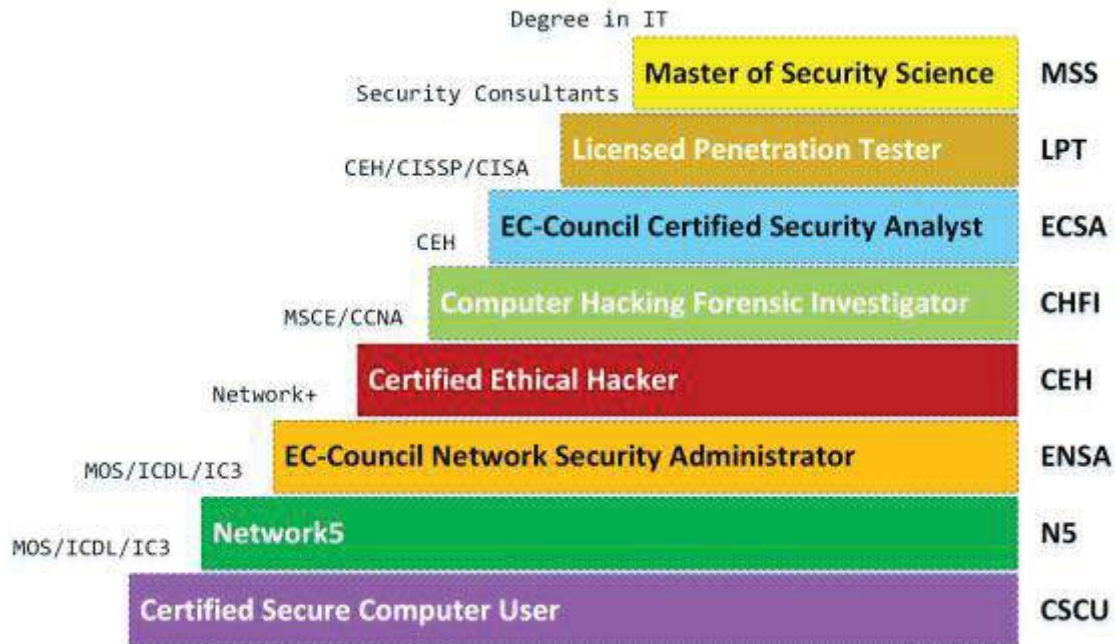


Figure 1 EC-Council Certifications Skill Matrix

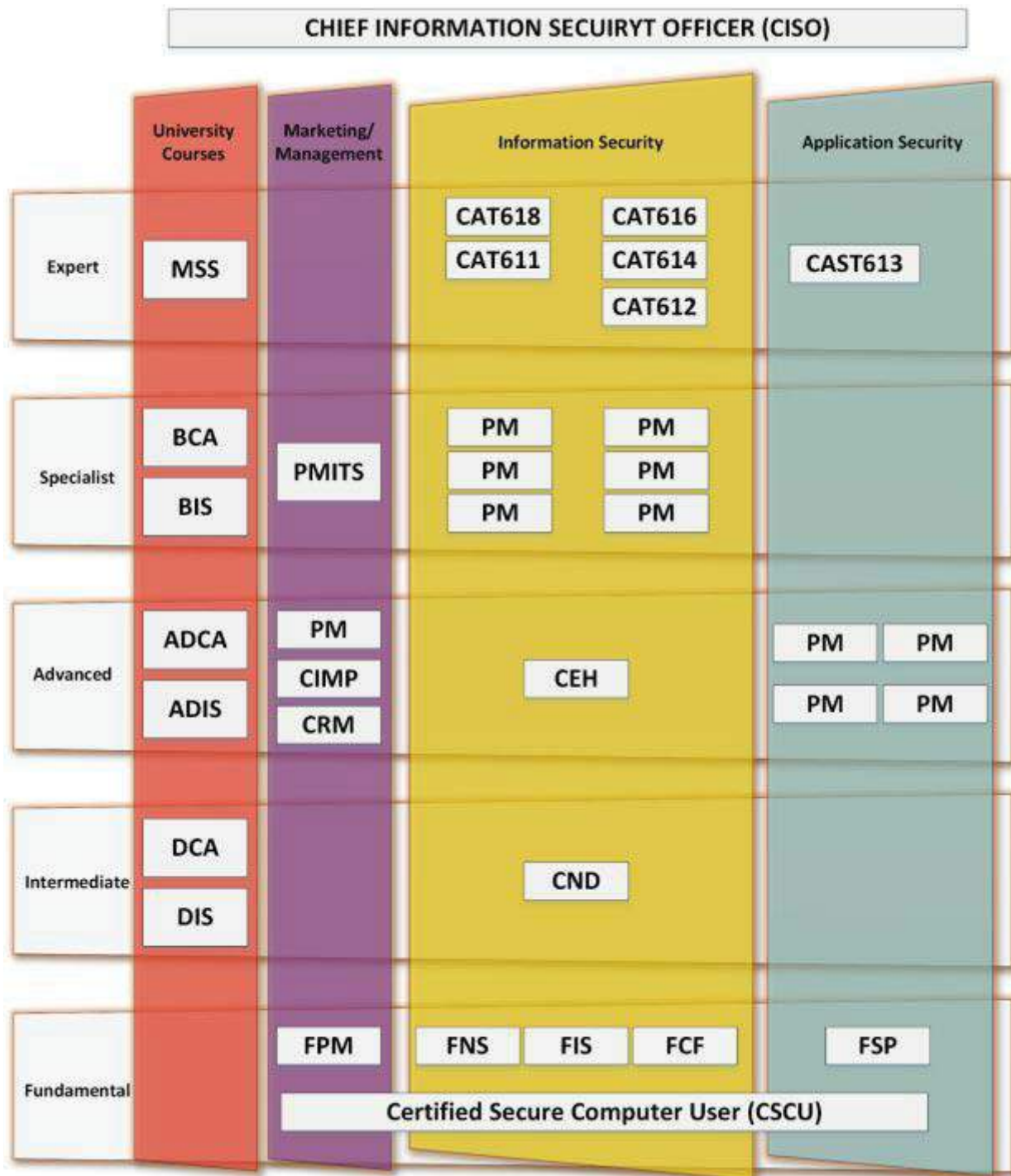


Figure 2 Cisco Certifications Track

Chapter 12: Evading IDS, Firewall and Honeypots

Technology Brief

IDS, Firewall and Honeypot Concepts

As the awareness of cyber and network security is increasing day by day, it is very important to understand the core concepts of Intrusion Detection/Defense System (IDS) as well as Intrusion Prevention System (IPS). IDS and IPS often create confusion as both modules are created by multiple vendors and different terminologies used to define the technical concepts are also same. Sometimes the same technology may be used for detection and prevention of some threat.

Just like other products, Cisco also has developed a number of solutions for implementing IDS/IPS for the security of the network. In the first phase of this section, different concepts will be discussed before moving to the different implementation methodologies.

Intrusion Detection Systems (IDS)

The placement of sensor within a network differentiates the functionality of IPS over the IDS. When sensor is placed in line with the network, i.e., the common in/out of specific network segment terminates on a hardware or logical interface of the sensor and goes out from second hardware or logical interface of the sensor, then every single packet will be analyzed and pass through sensor only if does not contain anything malicious. By dropping the traffic malicious traffic, the trusted network or a segment of it can be protected from known threats and attacks. This is the basic working of Intrusion Prevention System (IPS). However, the inline installation and inspection of traffic may result in a slighter delay. IPS may also become a single point of failure for the whole network. If 'fail-open' mode is used, the good and malicious traffic will be allowed in case of any kind of failure within IPS sensor. Similarly, if 'fail-close' mode is configured, the whole IP traffic will be dropped in case of sensor's failure.

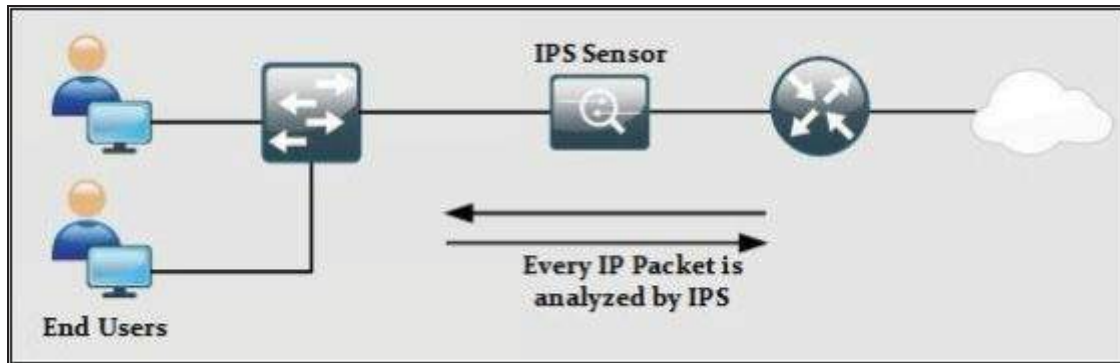


Figure 12-01. In-line Deployment of IPS Sensor

If a sensor is installed in the position as shown below, a copy of every packet will be sent to the sensor to analyze any malicious activity.

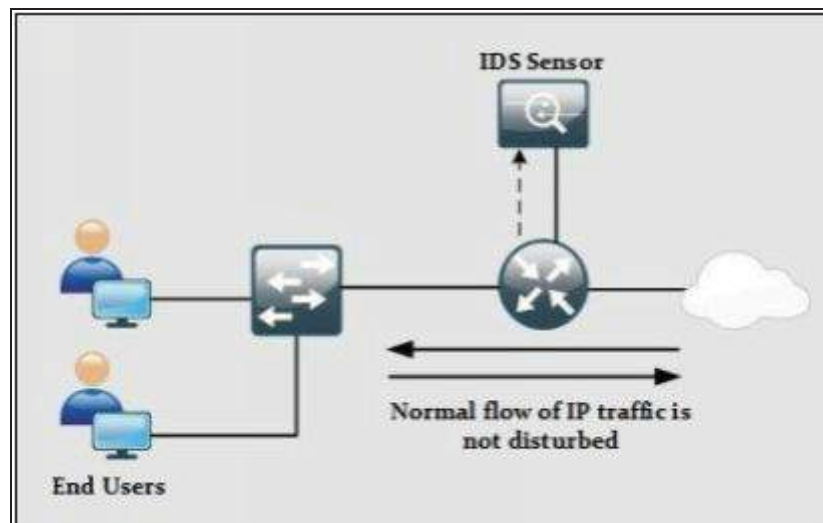


Figure 12-02. Sensor deployment as IDS

In other means, the sensor, running in promiscuous mode will perform the detection and generate an alert if required. As the normal flow of traffic is not disturbed, no end-to-end delay will be introduced by implementing IDS. The only downside of this configuration is that IDS will not be able to stop malicious packets from entering the network because IDS is not controlling the overall path of traffic.

The following table summarizes and compares various features of IDS and IPS.

Ways to Detect an Intrusion

When a sensor is analyzing traffic for something strange, it uses multiple techniques base on the rules defined in the IPS/IDS sensor. Following tools and techniques can be used in this regard:

- Signature-based IDS/IPS
- Policy-based IDS/IPS
- Anomaly-based IDS/IPS
- Reputation-based IDS/IPS

Signature-based IDS/IPS: A signature looks for some specific string or

behavior in a single packet or stream of packets to detect the anomaly. Cisco IPS/IDS modules, as well as next-generation firewalls, come with preloaded digital signatures which can be used to mitigate against already discovered attacks. Cisco constantly updates the signatures set which also needs to upload to a device by the network administrator.

Not all signatures are enabled by default. If some signature is generating an alert for traffic which is intended to be allowed due to some business needs, the network administrator needs to tune the IPS/IDS module so that false positive generated for legitimate traffic must not be generated.

Policy-Based IDS/IPS: As the name suggests, policy-based IDS/IPS module works based on the policy or SOP of an organization. For example, if an organization has a security policy that every management session with networking devices as well as end-devices must not initiate via TELNET protocol. A custom rule specifying this policy needs to be defined on sensors. If it is configured on IPS, whenever TELNET traffic hits the IPS, an alert will be generated followed by the drop of packets. If it is implemented on IDS based sensor, then an alert will generate for it, but traffic keeps flowing because IDS works in promiscuous mode.

Anomaly-Based IDS/IPS: In this type, a baseline is created for specific kind of traffic. For example, after analyzing the traffic, it is noticed that 30 half-open TCP sessions are created every minute. After deciding the baseline, say 35 half-open TCP connections in a minute, assume the number of half-open TCP connected has increased to 150 then based on this anomaly, IPS will drop the extra half-open connections and generate alert for it.

Reputation-Based IDS/IPS: If there is some sort of global attack, For example, recent DDoS attacks on servers of twitter and some other social websites. It would be great to filter out the known traffic which results in propagation of these attacks before it hits the organizations critical infrastructure. Reputation-based IDS/IPS collect information from systems participating in global correlation. Reputation-based IDS/IPS include relative descriptors like known URLs, domain names, etc. Global correlation services are maintained by Cisco Cloud Services.

The following table summarizes the different technologies used in IDS/IPS

along with some advantages over disadvantages.

Types of Intrusion Detection Systems

Depending on the network scenario, IDS/IPS modules are deployed in one of the following configurations:

- Host-based Intrusion Detection
- Network-based Intrusion Detection

Host-based IPS/IDS is normally deployed for the protection of specific host machine, and it works closely with the Operating System Kernel of the host machine. It creates a filtering layer and filters out any malicious application call to the OS. There are four major types of Host-based IDS/IPS:

- **File System Monitoring:** In this configuration, IDS/IPS works by closely comparing the versions of files within some directory with the previous versions of same file and checks for any unauthorized tampering and changing within a file. Hashing algorithms are often used to verify the integrity of files and directories which gives an indication of possible changes which are not supposed to be there.
- **Log Files Analysis:** In this configuration, IDS/IPS works by analyzing the log files of the host machine and generates warning for system administrators who are responsible for machine security. Several tools and applications are available which works by analyzing the patterns of behavior and further correlate it with actual events.
- **Connection Analysis:** IDS/IPS works by monitoring the overall network connections being made with the secure machine and tries to figure out which of them are legitimate and how many of them are unauthorized. Examples of techniques used are open ports scanning, half open and rogue TCP connections and so forth.
- **Kernel Level Detection:** In this configuration, the kernel of OS itself detects the changing within the system binaries, and an anomaly in system calls to detect the intrusion attempts on that machine.

The network-based IPS solution works as in-line with the perimeter edge device or some specific segment of the overall network. As network-based solution works by monitoring the overall network traffic (or data packets in specific) so it should be as fast as possible in terms of processing power so that overall latency may not be introduced in the network. Depending on

vendor and series of IDS/IPS, it may use one of above technologies in its working.

The following table summarizes the difference between the host based and network-based IDS/IPS solution:

Firewall

The primary function of using a dedicated device named as the firewall at the edge of the corporate network is isolation. A firewall prevents the direct connection of internal LAN with internet or outside world. This isolation can be performed in multiples way but not limited to:

- **A Layer 3 device** using an Access List for restricting the specific type of traffic on any of its interfaces.
- **A Layer 2 device** using the concept of VLANs or Private VLANs (PVLAN) for separating the traffic of two or more networks.
- **A dedicated host device** with software installed on it. This host device, also acting as a proxy, filters the desired traffic while allowing the remaining traffic.

Although the features above provide isolation in some sense, The following are the few reasons a dedicated firewall appliance (either in hardware or software) is preferred in production environments:

Although firewall provides great security features as discussed in the table above, any misconfiguration or bad network design may result in serious consequences. Another important deciding factor of deploying a firewall in current network design depends on whether current business objectives can bear the following limitations:

- **Misconfiguration and Its Consequences:** The primary function of a

firewall is to protect network infrastructure in a more elegant way than a traditional layer3/2 devices. Depending on different vendors and their implementation techniques, many features need to be configured for a firewall to work properly. Some of these features may include Network Address Translation (NAT), Access-Lists(ACL), AAA base policies and so on. Misconfiguration of any of these features may result in leakage of digital assets which may have a financial impact on business. In short, complex devices like firewall also requires deep insight knowledge of equipment along with the general approach to deployment.

- **Applications and Services Support:** Most of the firewalls use different techniques to mitigate the advanced attacks. For example, NATing is one of the most commonly used features in firewalls, and it is used to mitigate the reconnaissance attacks. In situations where network infrastructure is used to support custom-made applications, it may be required to re-write the whole application in order to work properly under new network changes.
- **Latency:** Just like implementing NATing on a route adds some end to end delay, firewall along with heavy processing demanding features add a noticeable delay over the network. Applications like Voice Over IP (VOIP) may require special configuration to deal with it.

Another important factor to be considered while designing the security policies of network infrastructure uses the layered approach instead of relying on a single element. For example, consider the following scenario:

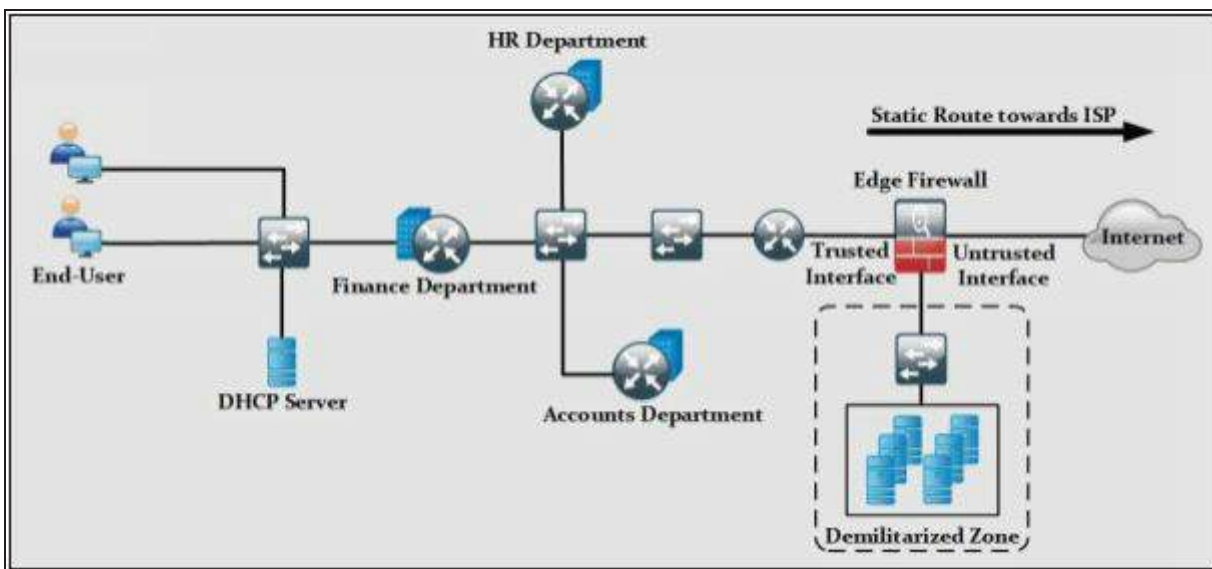


Figure 12-03. Positioning Firewall in a production environment

The previous figure shows a typical scenario of SOHO and mid-sized corporate environment where whole network infrastructure is supported by a couple of routers and switches. If the edge firewall is supposed to be the focal point of security implementation, then any slighter misconfiguration may result in high scale attacks. In general, a layered security approach is followed, and packet passes through multiple security checks before hitting the intended destination.

The position of firewall varies in different design variants. In some designs, it is placed on the perimeter router of the corporation while in some designs it is placed at the edge of the network as shown in the last figure. Irrelevant to the position, it is a good practice to implement the layered security in which some of the features like unicast reverse path forwarding, access-lists, etc. are enabled on perimeter router. Features like deep packet inspection, digital signatures are matched on the firewall. If everything looks good, the packet is allowed to hit the intended destination address.

Network layer firewalls permit or drop IP traffic based on Layer 3 and 4 information. A router with access-list configured on its interfaces is a common example of network layer firewall. Although very fast in operation and, network layer firewalls do not perform deep packet inspection techniques and detect any malicious activity.

Apart from acting as the first line of defense, network layer firewalls are also deployed within internal LAN segments for enhanced layered security and isolation.

Firewall Architecture

1. Bastion Host

Bastion Host is a computer system that is placed in between public and private network. It is intended to be the crossing point where all traffic is passed through. Certain roles and responsibilities are assigned to this computer to perform. Bastion host has two interfaces, one connected to the public network while the another is connected to the private network.

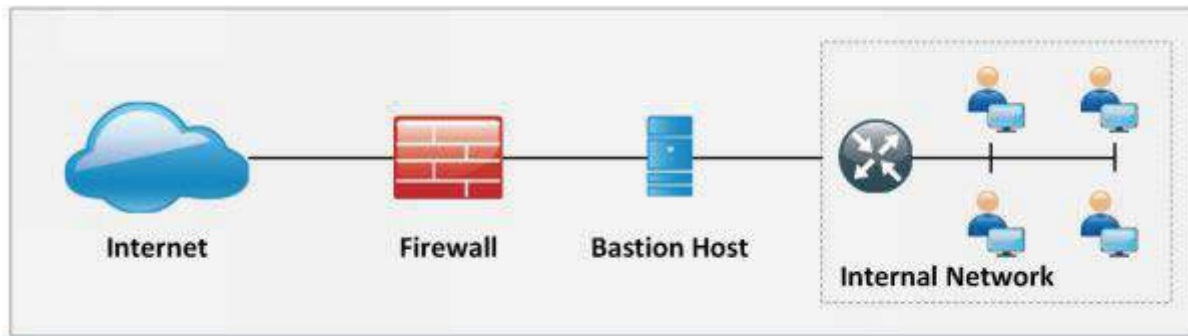


Figure 12-04. Bastion Host

2. Screened Subnet

Screened Subnet can be set up with a firewall with three interfaces. These three interfaces are connected with the internal private network, Public network, and Demilitarized Zone (DMZ). In this architecture, each zone is separated by another zone hence compromise of one zone will not affect another zone.

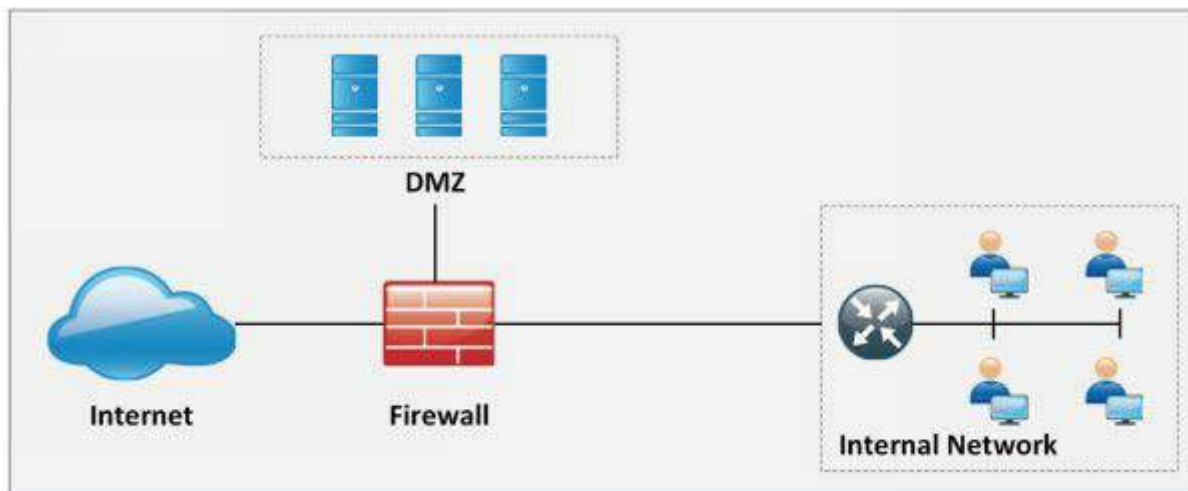


Figure 12-05. Screened Subnet

3. Multi-homed Firewall

Multi-homed firewall referred to two or more networks where each interface is connected to its network. It increases the efficiency and reliability of a network. A firewall with two or more interfaces allows further subdivision.

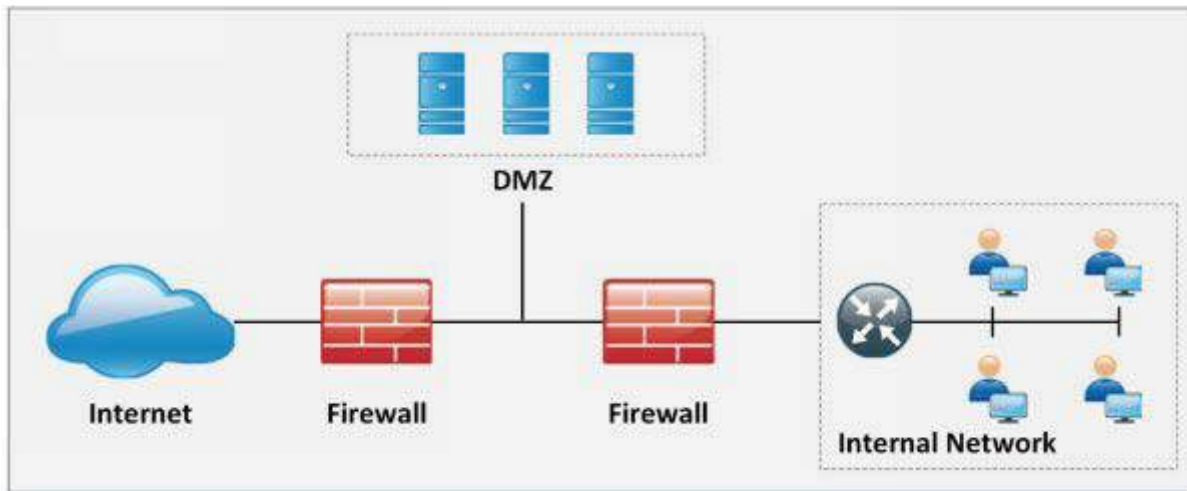


Figure 12-06. Multi-Homed Firewall

DeMilitarized Zone (DMZ)

IOS zone-based firewalls is a specific set of rules which may help to mitigate mid-level security attacks in environments where security is also meant to be implemented via routers. In zone-based firewalls(ZBF), interfaces of devices are placed to different unique zones like (inside, outside or DMZ) and then policies are applied on these zones. Naming conventions for zones must be easier to understand in order to be helpful at the hour of troubleshooting.

ZBFs also uses stateful filtering which means that if the rule is defined to permit originating traffic from one zone, say inside to another zone like DMZ, then return traffic would automatically be allowed. Traffic from different zones can be allowed using policies permitting the traffic in each direction.

One of the advantages of applying policies on zones instead of interfaces is that whenever new changes required at the interface level, then simply removing or adding interface in particular zone apply policies on it automatically.

ZBF may use the following feature set in its implementation:

- Stateful inspection
- Packet filtering
- URL filtering
- Transparent firewall
- Virtual Routing Forwarding (VRF)

This figure shows the scenario explained above:

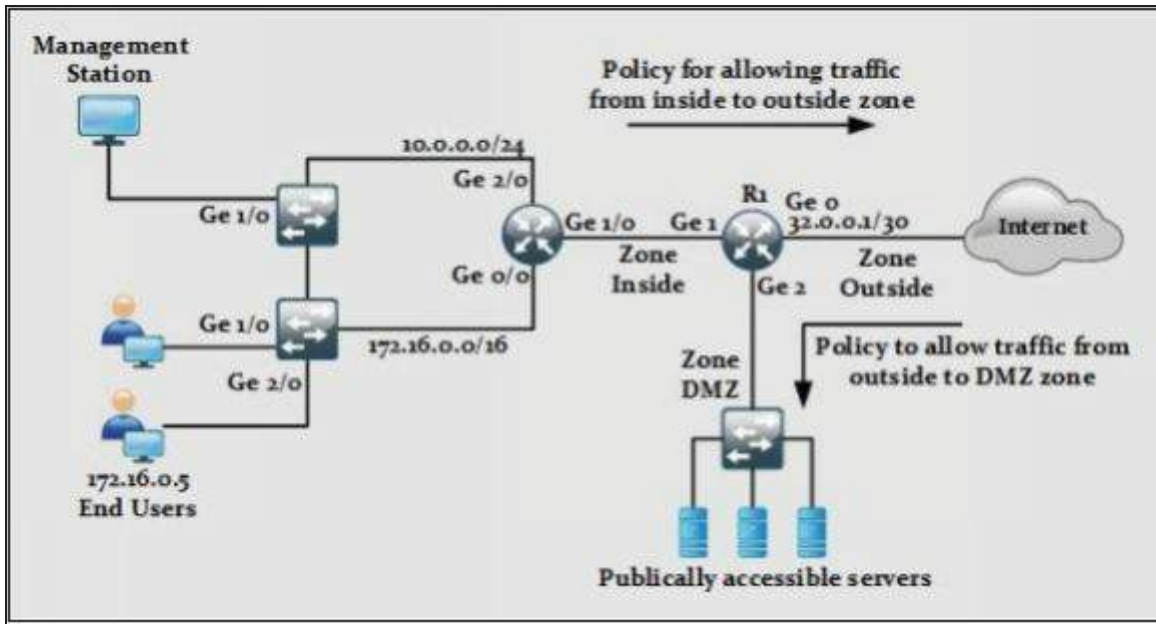


Figure 12-07. Cisco IOS Zone-Based Firewall Scenario

Types of Firewall

1. Packet Filtering Firewall

Packet Filtering Firewall includes the use of access-lists to permit or deny traffic based on layer 3 and layer 4 information. Whenever a packet hits an ACL configured layer 3 device's interface, it checks for a match in an ACL (starting from the first line of ACL). Using an extended ACL in Cisco device, following information can be used for matching traffic:

- Source address
- Destination address
- Source port
- Destination port
- Some extra features like TCP established sessions etc.

2. Circuit-Level Gateway Firewall

Circuit Level gateway firewall operates at the session layer of the OSI model. They capture the packet to monitor TCP Handshaking, in order to validate if the sessions are legitimate. Packets forwarded to the remote destination through a circuit-level firewall appears to have originated from the gateway.

3. Application-Level Firewall

Application Level Firewall can work at layer 3 up to the layer 7 of OSI model. Normally, a specialized or open source software running on high-end server acts as an intermediary between client and destination address. As these firewalls can operate up to layer 7, more granular control of packets moving in and out of network is possible. Similarly, it becomes very difficult for an attacker to get the topology view of inside or trusted network because connection requests terminate on Application/Proxy firewalls.

Some of the advantages and disadvantages of using application/proxy firewalls are:

4. Stateful Multilayer Inspection Firewall

As the name depicts, this saves the state of current sessions in a table known as a stateful database. Stateful inspection and firewalls using this technique normally deny any traffic between trusted and untrusted interfaces. Whenever an end-device from trusted interface wants to communicate with some destination address attached to the untrusted interface of the firewall, its entry will be made in a stateful database table containing layer 3 and layer 2 information. Following table compares different features of stateful inspection-based firewalls.

5. Transparent firewalls

Most of the firewalls discussed above work on layer 3 and beyond.

Transparent firewalls work exactly like above-mentioned techniques, but the interfaces of the firewall itself are layer 2 in nature. IP addresses are not assigned to any interface, think of it as a switch with ports assigned to some VLAN. The only IP address assigned to the transparent firewall is for management purposes. Similarly, as there is no addition of extra hop between end-devices, the user will not be able to be aware of any new additions to network infrastructure and custom-made applications may work without any problem.

6. Next Generation (NGFW) firewalls

NGFW is relatively a new term used for latest firewalls with the advanced feature set. This kind of firewalls provides in-depth security features to mitigate against known threats and malware attacks. An example of next-generation firewalls is Cisco ASA series with FirePOWER services. NGFW provides complete visibility into network traffic users, mobile devices, virtual machine (VM) to VM data communication, etc.

7. Personal Firewalls

Personal Firewall is also known as desktop firewalls, helps the end-users personal computers from general attacks from intruders. Such firewalls appear to be great security line of defense for users who are constantly connected to the internet via DSL or cable modem. Personal firewalls help by providing inbound and outbound filtering, controlling internet connectivity to and from the computer (both in a domain based and workgroup mode) and altering the user for any attempts of intrusions.

Honeypot

Honeypots are the devices or system that are deployed to trap attackers attempting to gain unauthorized access to the system or network as they are deployed in an isolated environment and being monitored. Typically, honeypots are deployed in DMZ and configured identically to a server. Any probe, malware, infection, the injection will be immediately detected by this way as honeypots appear to be a legitimate part of the network.

Types of Honeypots

1. High-Interaction Honeypots

High-Interaction Honeypots are configured with a verity of services which is basically enabled to waste the time of an attacker and gain more information

from this intrusion. Multiple honeypots can be deployed on a single physical machine to be restored if attacker even compromised the honeypot.

2. Low-Interaction Honeypots

Low-Interaction Honeypots are configured to entertain only the services that are commonly requested by the users. Response time, less complexity and few resources make Low-interaction honeypot deployment more easy as compared to High-interaction honeypots.

Detecting Honeypots

The basic logic of detecting a honeypot in a network is by probing the services. The attacker usually crafts a malicious packet to scan running services on the system and open and closed ports information. These services may be HTTPS, SMTPS or IMAPS or else. Once attacker extracts the information, it can attempt to build a connection, the actual server will complete the process of three-way handshaking but the deny of handshaking indicates the presence of a honeypot. Send-Safe Honeypot Hunter, Nessus, and Hping tools can be used to detect honeypots.

IDS, Firewall and Honeypot System

Intrusion Detection Tools

Snort

Snort is an open source intrusion prevention system which delivers the most effective and comprehensive real-time network defense solutions. Snort is capable of protocol analysis, real-time packet analysis, and logging. It can also search and filter content, detect a wide variety of attacks and probes including buffer overflows, port scans, SMB probes and much more. Snort can also be used in various forms including a packet sniffer, a packet logger, network file logging device, or as a full-blown network intrusion prevention system.

Snort Rule

Rules are a criterion for performing detection against threats and vulnerabilities to the system and network, which leads to the advantage of zero-day detection. Unlike signatures, rules are focused on detecting the actual vulnerabilities. There are two ways to get Snort rules:

1. Snort Subscribers Rule
2. Snort Community Rule

There is no much difference in between Snort Subscribers rule and Community rule. However, Subscriber rules are updated frequently and updated on the device as well. It requires a paid subscription to get real-time updates of Snort Rules. Community rules are updated by Snort Community containing all rules as the Subscribers set of the rule contains but they are not updated quickly as subscriber rule is.

Snort rules are comprised of two logical sections: -

1. The rule header

The rule header contains the rule's action, protocol, source and destination IP addresses and netmasks, and the source and destination ports information.

2. The rule options

The rule option section contains alert messages and information on which parts of the packet should be inspected to determine if the rule action should be taken.

Categories of Snort Rules

Snort rules are categorized into different categories and frequently updated by

TALOS. Some of these categories are

Application Detection Rule Category includes the rules monitoring Controlling of traffic of certain application. These rules control the behavior and network activities of these applications.

- app-detect.rules

Black List Rules category include the URL, IP address, DNS and other rules that have been determined to be an indicator of malicious activities.

- blacklist.rules

Browsers Category include the rule for detection of vulnerabilities in certain browsers.

- browser-chrome.rules
- browser-firefox.rules
- browser-ie.rules
- browser-webkit
- browser-other
- browser-plugins

Operating System Rules category include rules looking for vulnerabilities in OS

- os-Solaris
- os-windows
- os-mobile
- os-Linux
- os-other

Evading IDS

Insertion Attack

An Insertion attack is a type of evasion of IDS device by taking advantage of blindly believing of IDS. Intrusion Detection System (IDS) assumes that accepted packets are also accepted by the end systems, but there may be a possibility that end system may reject these packets. This type of attack is specially targeted to Signature-based IDS device in order to insert data into IDS. Taking advantage of vulnerability attacker can insert packets with a bad checksum or TTL values and send them out of order. IDS and end host, when reassembling the packet, they might have two different streams. For example, an attacker may send the following stream.

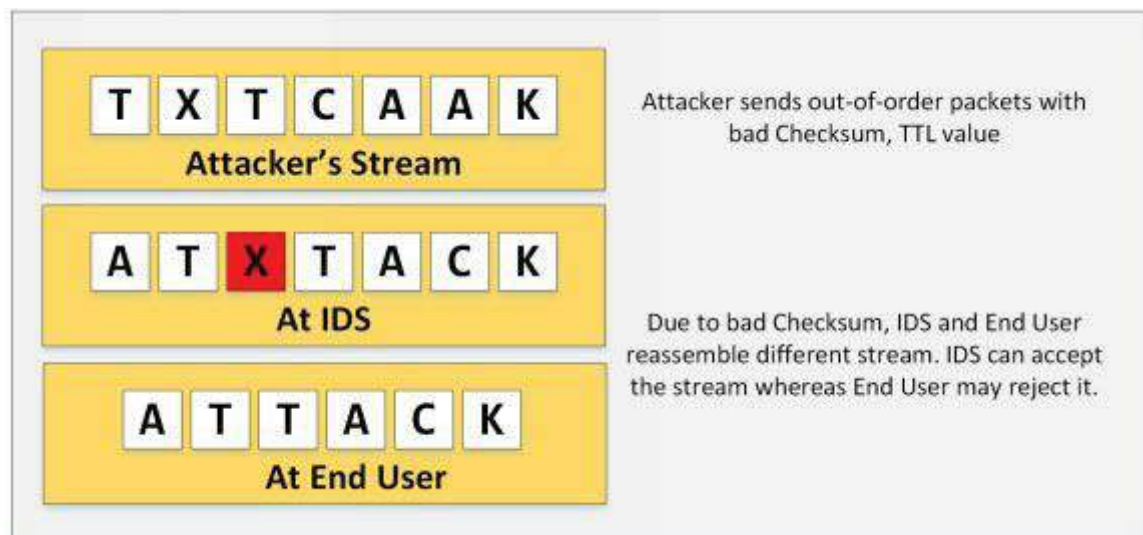


Figure 12-08. Insertion attack on IDS

Evasion

Evasion is a technique intended to send the packet that is accepted by the end system which is rejected by the IDS. Evasion techniques are intended to exploit the host. An IDS that mistakenly rejects such a packet misses its contents entirely. An attacker may take advantage of this condition and exploit it.

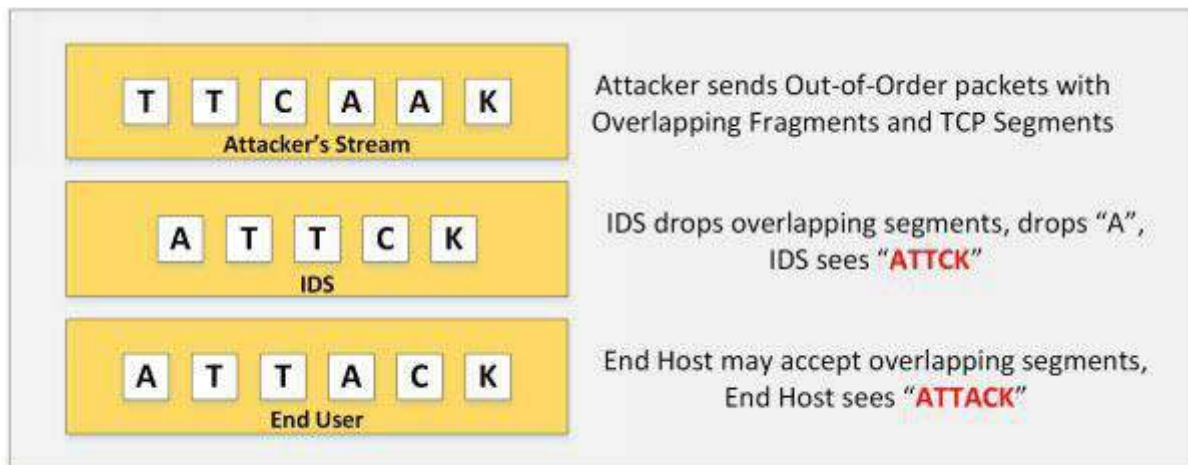


Figure 12-09. IDS Evasion

Fragmentation Attack

Fragmentation is the process of splitting the packet into fragments. This technique is usually adopted when IDS and Host device is configured with different timeouts. For example, if an IDS is configured with 10 Seconds of timeout whereas host is configured with 20 seconds of a timeout. Sending packets with 15sec delay will bypass reassembly at IDS and reassemble at the host.

Similarly, overlapping fragments are sent. In Overlapping fragmentation, a packet with the TCP sequence number configured is overlapping. Reassembly of these overlapping, fragmented packets is based on how an operating system configured to do. Host OS may use original fragmentation whereas IOS devices may use subsequent fragment using offset.

Denial-of-Service Attack (DoS)

Passive IDS devices are inherently Fail-open instead of Fail-Closed. Taking advantage of this limitation, an attacker may launch a Denial-of-Service attack on the network to overload the IDS System. To perform DoS attack on IDS, an attacker may target CPU exhaustion or Memory Exhaustion techniques to overload the IDS. These can be done by sending specially crafted packet consuming more CPU resources or sending a large number of fragmented out-of-order packets.

Obfuscating

Obfuscation is the encryption of payload of a packet destined to a target in a manner that target host can reverse it but the IDS could not. It will exploit the end user without alerting the IDS using different techniques such as

encoding, encryption, polymorphism. Encrypted protocols are not inspected by the IDS unless IDS is configured with the private key used by the server to encrypt the packets. Similarly, an attacker may use polymorphic shellcode to create unique patterns to evade IDS.

False Positive Generation

False Positive alert generation is the false indication of a result inspected for a particular condition or policy. An attacker may generate a large number of false positive alert by sending a Suspicious packet to manipulate and hide real malicious packet within this packet to pass IDS.

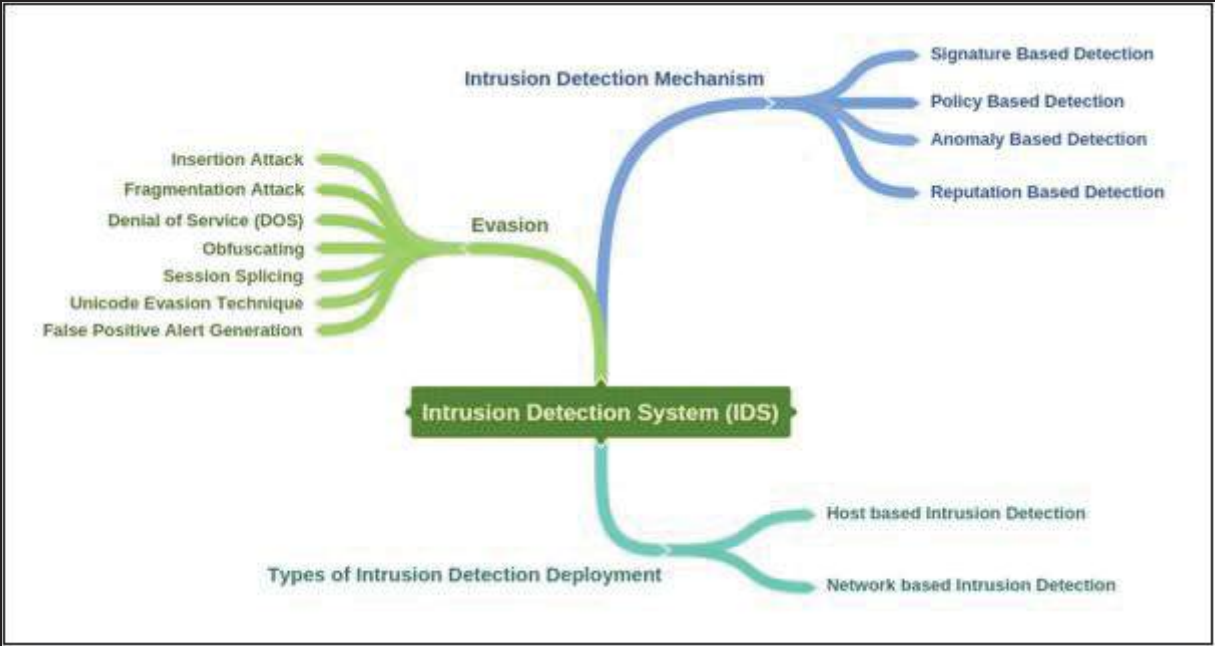
Session Splicing

Session Splicing is a technique in which attacker splits the traffic into a large number of the smaller packet in a way that not even a single packet triggers the alert. This can also be done by a slightly different technique such as adding a delay between packets. This technique is effective for those IDS which do not reassemble the sequence to check against intrusion.

Unicode Evasion Technique

Unicode evasion technique is another technique in which attacker may use Unicode to manipulate IDS. Unicode is basically a character encoding as defined earlier in HTML Encoding section. Converting string using Unicode characters can avoid signature matching and alerting the IDS, thus bypassing the detection system.

Evading Firewalls

Firewall Identification

Identification of firewall includes firewall fingerprinting to obtain sensitive information such as open ports, version information of services running in a network, etc. This information is extracted by different techniques such as Port scanning, Fire-walking, Banner grabbing, etc.

Port Scanning

Port Scanning is the examination procedure that is mostly used by the attackers to identify the open port. However, it may also be used by the legitimate users. Port scanning it does not always lead to an attack as it used by both of them. However, it is a network reconnaissance that can be used before an attack to collect information. In this scenario, special packets are forwarded to a particular host, whose response is examined by the attacker to get information regarding open ports.

Fire-walking

Fire-walking is a technique in which an attacker, using ICMP packet find out the location of firewall and network map by probing the ICMP echo request with TTL values exceeding one by one. It helps the attacker to find out a number of hops.

Banner Grabbing

Banner grabbing is another technique in which information from a banner is grabbed. Different devices such as routers, firewalls, and web server even display a banner in the console after login through FTP, telnet. Vendor information for a target device and firmware version information can be extracted using banner grabbing.

IP Address Spoofing

As defined earlier in the workbook, IP Address Spoofing is a technique, that is used to gain unauthorized access to machines by spoofing IP address. An attacker illicitly impersonates any user machine by sending manipulated IP packets with spoofed IP address. Spoofing process involves modification of header with a spoofed source IP address, a checksum, and the order values.

Source Routing

Source routing is a technique of sending the packet via selected route. In

session hijacking, this technique is used to attempt IP spoofing as a legitimate host with the help of Source routing to direct the traffic through the path identical to the victim's path.

By passing Techniques

Bypassing Blocked Sites Using IP Address

In this technique, Blocked Website in a network is accessed using IP address. Consider a firewall blocking the incoming traffic destined to a particular domain. It can be accessed by typing IP address in URL instead of entering domain name unless IP address is also configured in access control list.

Bypass Blocked Sites Using Proxy

Accessing the blocked websites using a proxy is very common. There are a lot of online proxy solution available which hide your actual IP address to allow to access restricted websites.

Bypassing through ICMP Tunneling Method

ICMP tunneling is a technique of injecting arbitrary data in the payload of echo packet and forwarded to target host. ICMP tunneling functions on ICMP echo requests and reply packets. Basically using this ICMP tunneling, TCP communication is tunneled over ping request and replies because payload field of ICMP packets are not examined by most of the firewalls, whereas some network administrators allow ICMP because of troubleshooting purpose.

Bypassing Firewall through HTTP Tunneling Method

HTTP tunneling is another way to bypass firewalls. Consider a company with a web server listening traffic on port 80 for HTTP traffic. HTTP tunneling allows the attacker to despite the restriction imposed by the firewall by encapsulating the data in HTTP traffic. The firewall will allow the port 80; an attacker may perform the various task by hiding into HTTP such as using FTP via HTTP protocol.

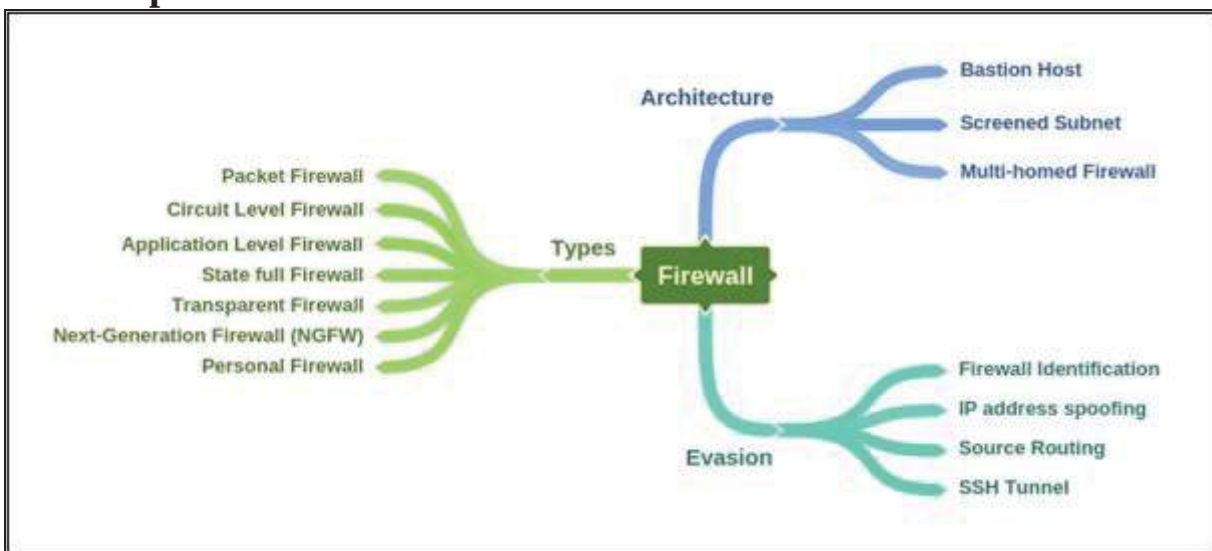
Bypassing through SSH Tunneling Method

OpenSSH is an encryption protocol that is basically used for securing the traffic from different threats and attacks such as eavesdropping, hijacking, etc. SSH connection is mostly used by applications to connect to the application servers. The attacker uses OpenSSH to encrypt the traffic to avoid detection by security devices.

Bypassing Firewall through External Systems

Bypassing through the external system is a process of hijacking a session of a legitimate user of a corporate network which is allowed to connect to an external network. An attacker can easily sniff the traffic to extract the information, stealing SessionID, cookies and impersonate him to bypass the firewall. An attacker can also infect the external system used by the legitimate user with malware or Trojan to steal information.

IDS/Firewall Evasion Counter-measures

Managing and preventing an evasion technique is a great challenge. There are so many techniques to make it difficult for an attacker to evade detection. These defensive and monitoring techniques ensure the detection system to protect the network and have more control over traffic. Some of these techniques are basic troubleshooting and monitoring, whereas some techniques are focused on proper configuration of IPS/IDS and firewalls. Initially, observe and troubleshoot the firewall by

- Port scanning
- Banner grabbing
- Fire-walking
- IP address spoofing
- Source routing
- Bypassing firewall using IP in URL
- Attempt a fragmentation attack
- Troubleshooting behavior using proxy servers
- Troubleshooting behavior using ICMP tunneling

Shutting down the unused ports, ports that are associated with known attacks in an effective step to prevent evasion. Perform in-depth analysis, resetting the malicious session, updating patches, IDS deployment, fragmented packet normalization, increasing TTL expiry, blocking TTL expired packet, reassembly of the packet at IDS, hardening the security and correctly enforcement of policies are effective step of preventing these attacks.

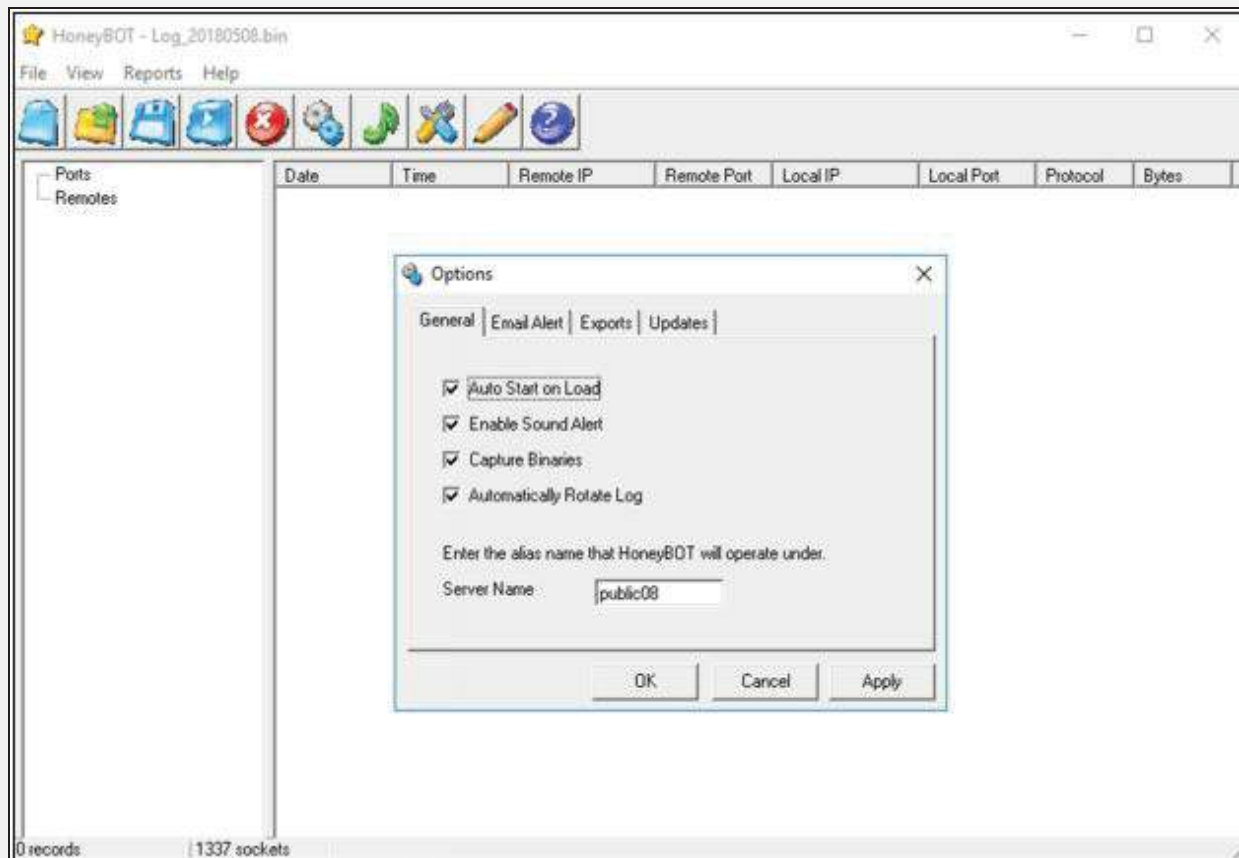


Figure 12-10. HoneyBot Application

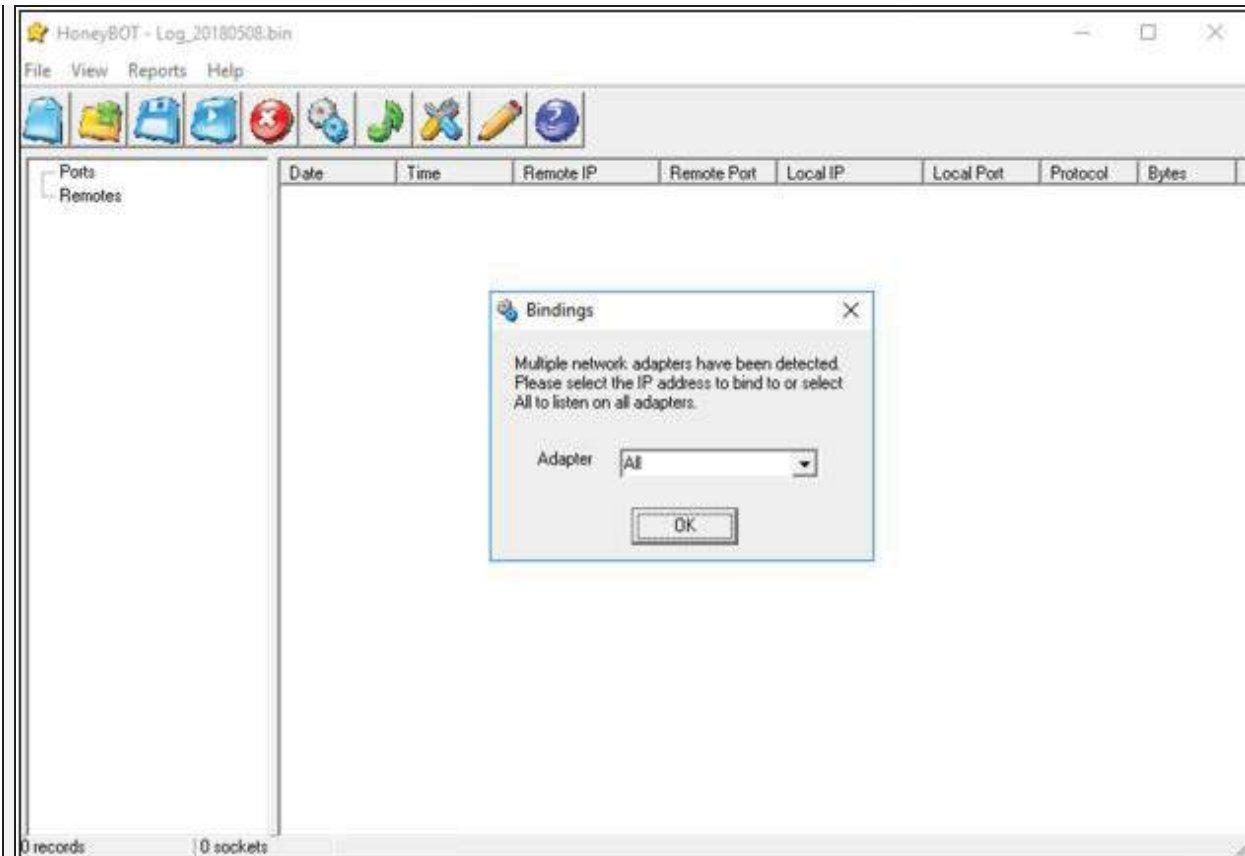


Figure 12-11. HoneyBot Application



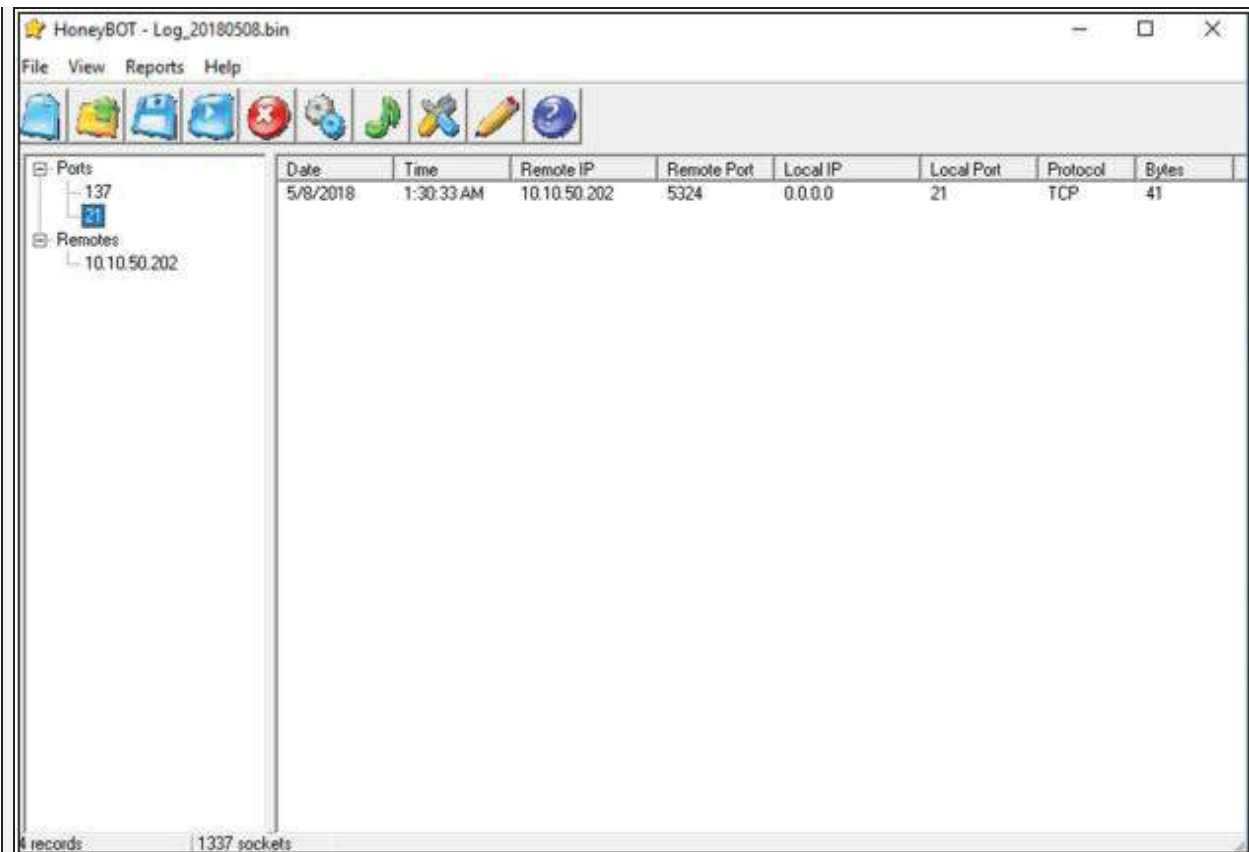


Figure 12-14. logs

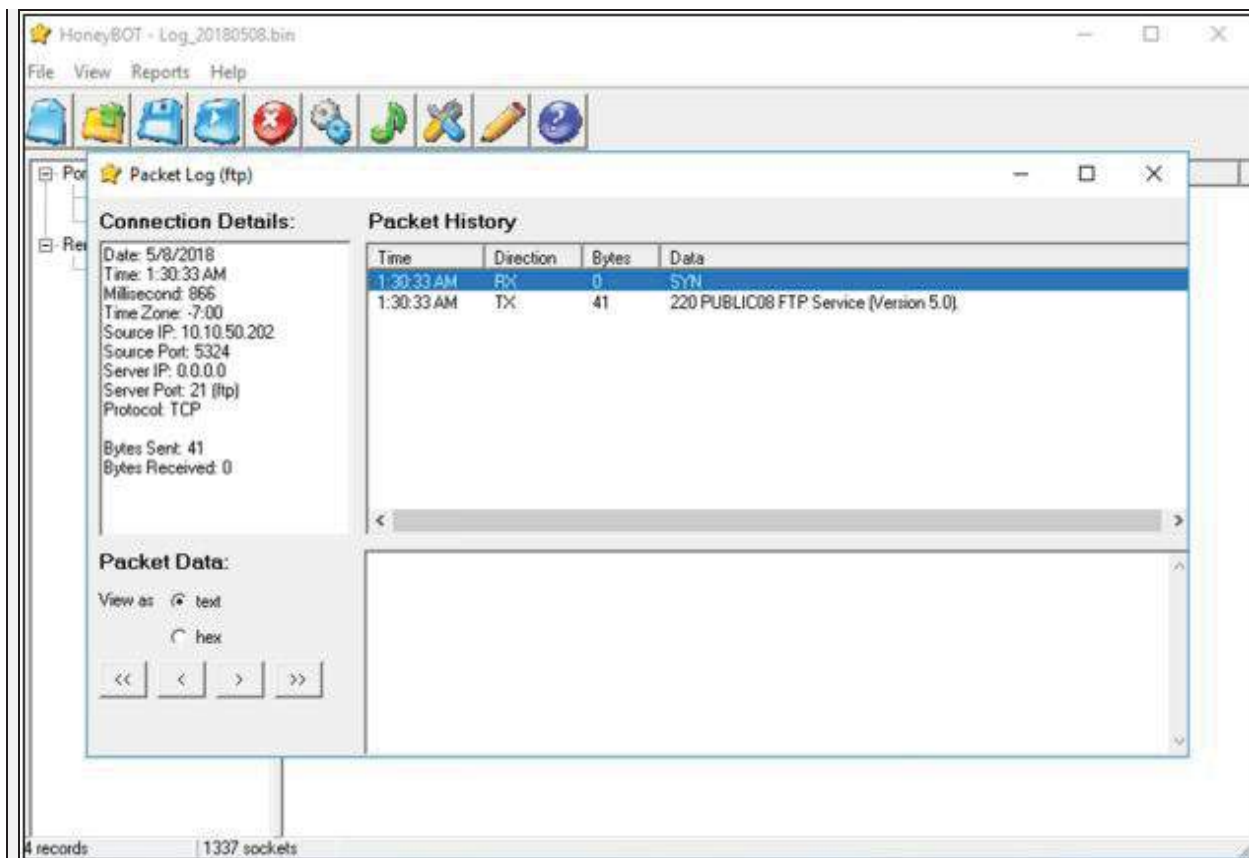


Figure 12-15. Detail of log entry

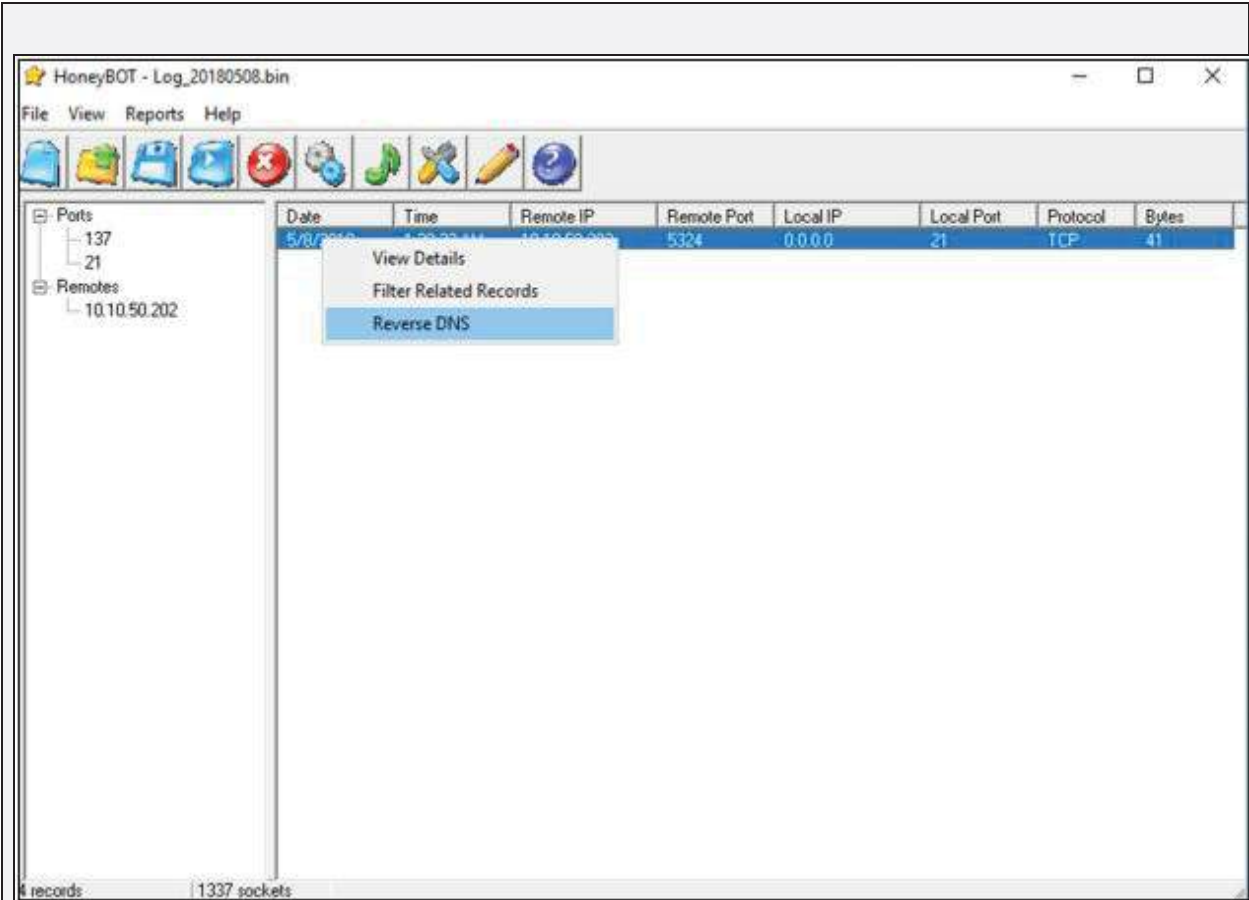


Figure 12-16. Reverse DNS

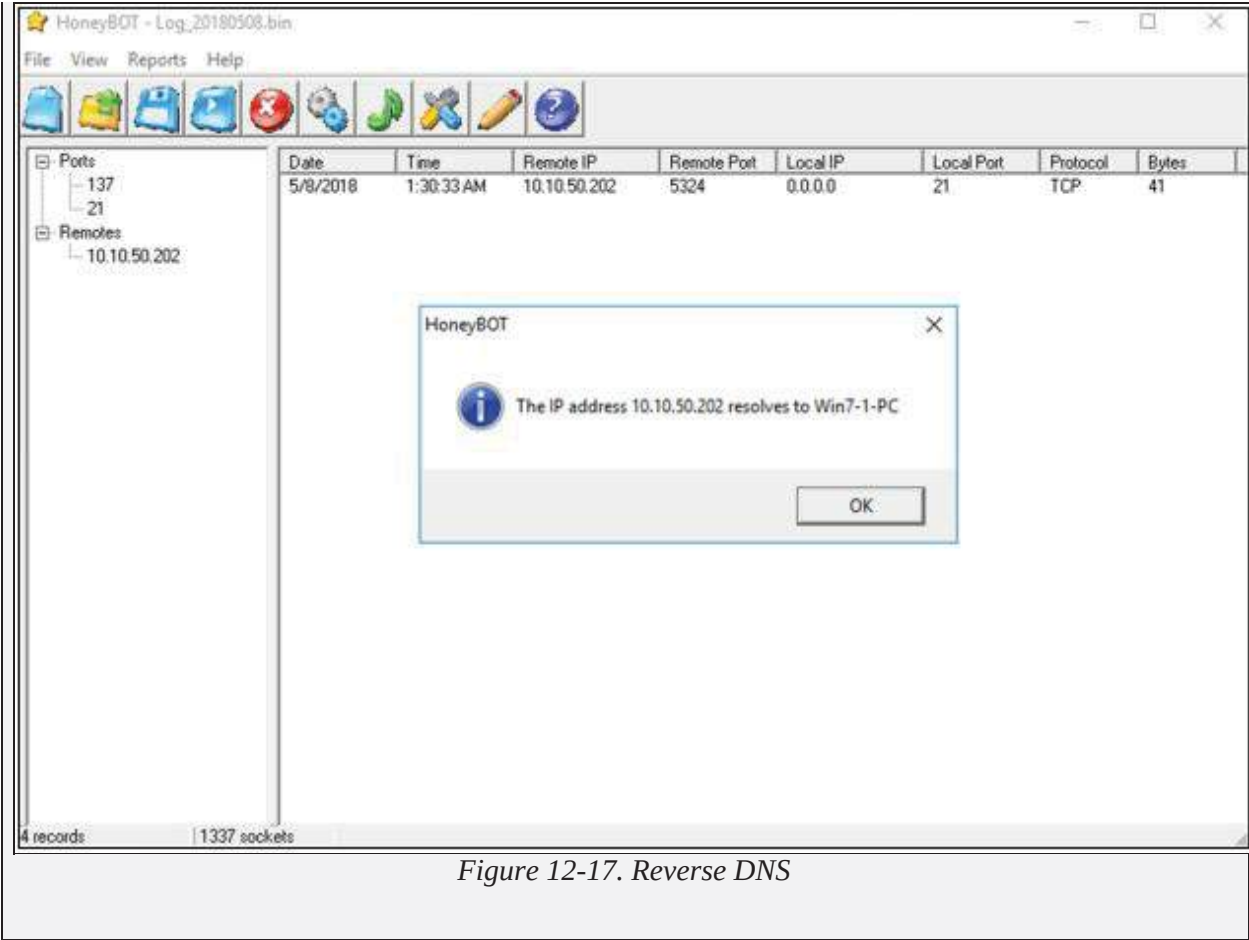


Figure 12-17. Reverse DNS

Chapter 13: Hacking Web Servers

Technology Brief

Web Servers are the programs that are used for hosting websites. Web servers may be deployed on a separate web server hardware or installed on a host as a program. Use of web applications is also increased over last few years. The upcoming web application is flexible and capable of supporting larger clients. In this chapter, we will discuss Web servers vulnerabilities, Web server attacking techniques and tools and their mitigation methods.

Web server Concepts

Web Server is a program that hosts Web sites, based on both Hardware and software. It delivers files and other content on the website over Hyper Text Transfer Protocol (HTTP). As we know, use of internet and intranet has raised, web services have become a major part of the internet. It is used for delivering files, email communication, and other purposes. Web server supports different types of application extensions whereas all of them support HTML for basic content delivery. Web Servers can be differentiated by the security models, operating systems and other factors.

Web Server Security Issue

Security Issue to a web server may include network-level attacks and Operating system-level attacks. Usually, an attacker targets any vulnerability and mistakes in the configuration of the web server and exploits these loopholes. These vulnerabilities may include: -

- Improper permission of file directories
- Default configuration
- Enabling Unnecessary services
- Lack of Security
- Bugs
- Misconfigured SSL Certificates
- Enabled debugging

Server administrator makes sure about eliminating all vulnerabilities and deploying network security measures such as IPS/IDS and Firewalls. Threats and attacks to a web server are described later in this chapter. Once a Web server is compromised, it will result in compromising all user accounts, denial of services offered by the server, defacement, launching further attacks through the compromised website, accessing the resources and data theft.

Open Source Web server Architecture

Open source web server architecture is the Web server model in which an open source web server is hosted on either a web server or a third-party host over the internet. Most popular and widely used open source web server are: -

- Apache HTTP Server

- NGINX
- Apache Tomcat
- Lighttpd
- Node.js

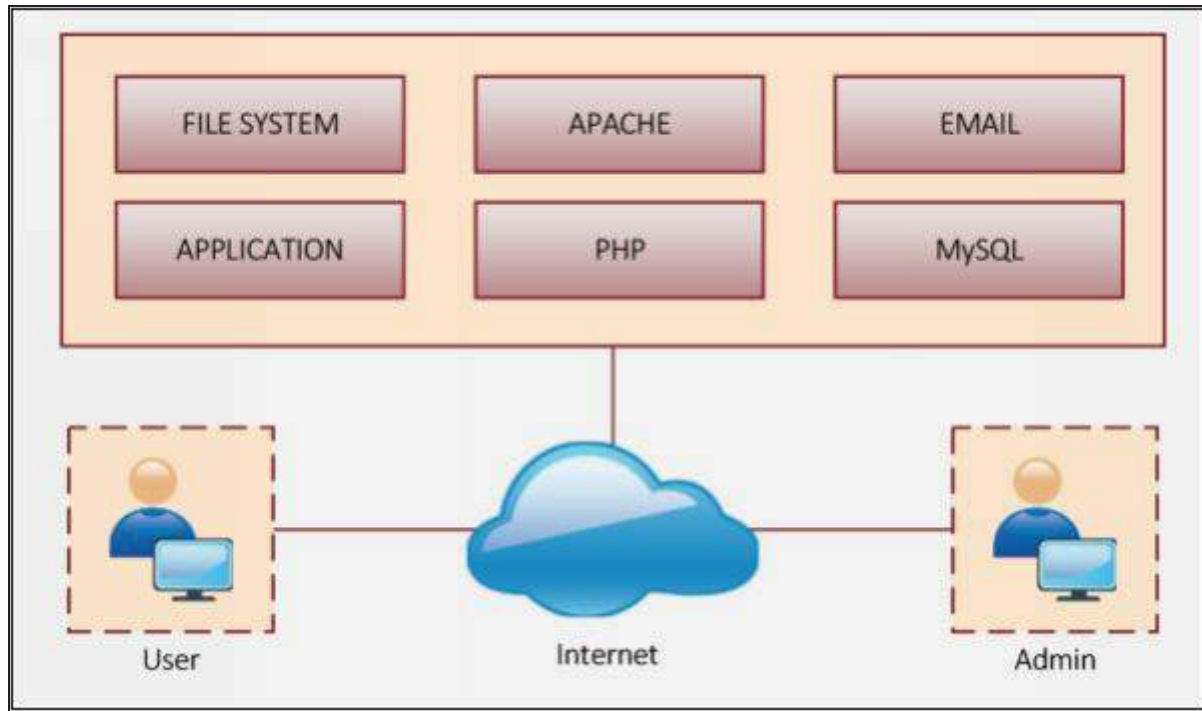


Figure 13-01 Open Web Server Architecture

IIS Web Server Architecture

Internet information services (IIS) is a Windows-based service which provides a request processing architecture. IIS latest version is 7.x. The architecture includes Windows Process Activation Services (WAS), Web Server Engine and Integrated request processing pipelines. IIS contains multiple components which are responsible for several functions such as listening to the request, managing processes, reading configuration files, etc.

Components of IIS

Components of IIS include: -

- ***Protocol Listener***

Protocol listeners are responsible for receiving protocol-specific requests. They forward these requests to IIS for processing and then return responses to requestors.

- ***HTTP.sys***

HTTP listener is implemented as a kernel-mode device driver called the HTTP protocol stack (HTTP.sys). HTTP.sys is responsible for listening HTTP requests, forwarding these requests to IIS for processing, and then returns processed responses to client browsers.

- **World Wide Web Publishing Service (WWW Service)**
- **Windows Process Activation Service (WAS)**

In the previous version of IIS, World Wide Web Publishing Service (WWW Service) is handling the functionality, whereas in version 7 and later, WWW Service and WAS service are used. These services run svchost.exe on the local system and share same binaries.

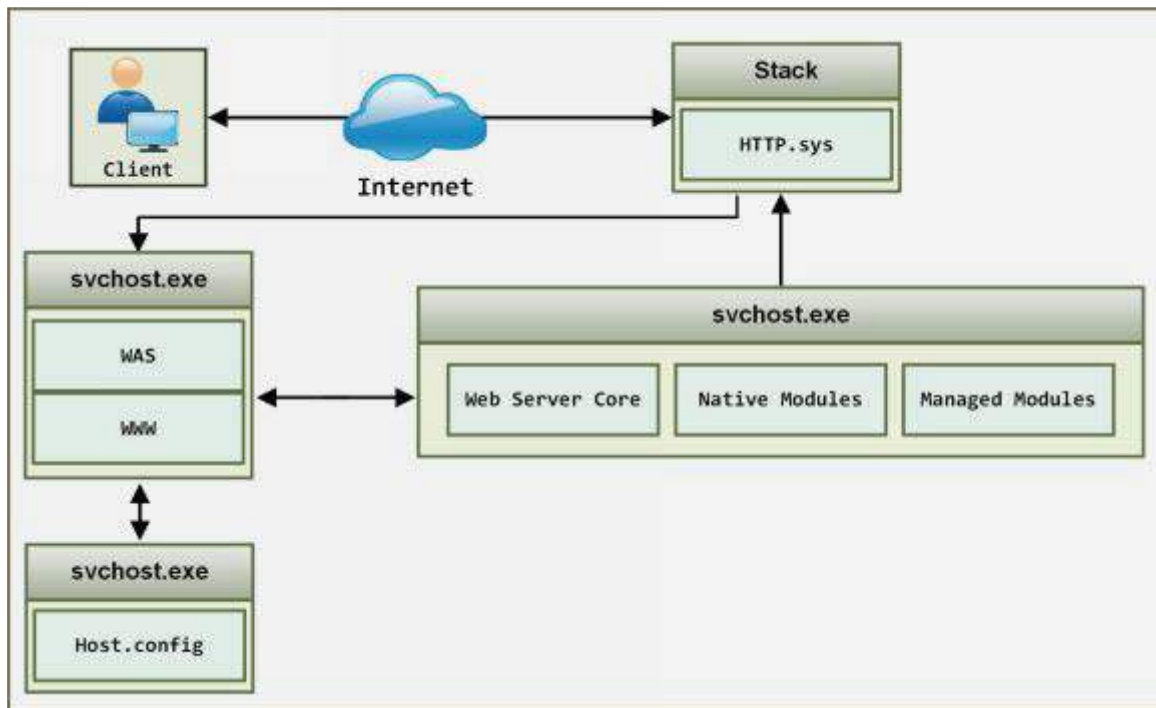


Figure 13-02 IIS Web Server Architecture

Web server Attacks

Web Server Attacking techniques includes several techniques, some of them are defined earlier in this book, remaining techniques are defined below: -

DoS/DDoS Attacks

DOS and DDOS attack, their attacking techniques are defined in detail in chapter 9. These DOS/DDOS attacks are used to flood fake request toward web server resulting in the crashing, unavailability or denial of service for all users.

DNS Server Hijacking

By compromising DNS server, attacker modifies the DNS configuration. The effect of modification results in terms of redirecting the request towards target web server to the malicious server owned or controlled by the attacker.

DNS Amplification Attack

DNS Amplification attack is performed with the help of DNS recursive method. Attacker takes advantage of this feature and spoofs the lookup request to DNS server. DNS server response the request to the spoofed address, i.e., the address of the target. By the amplification of the size of the request and using botnets, results Distributed Denial of Service attack.

Directory Traversal Attacks

In this type of attack, attacker attempt using trial and error method to access restricted directories using dots and slash sequences. By accessing the directories outside the root directory, attacker reveal sensitive information about the system

Man-in-the-Middle/Sniffing Attack

As defined in previous chapters, Using Man-in-the-Middle attack, the attacker places himself in between client and server and sniff the packets, extract sensitive information from the communication by intercepting and altering the packets.

Phishing Attacks

Using Phishing attacks, attacker attempt to extract login details from a fake website that looks like a legitimate website. This stolen information, mostly credentials, are used by the attacker to impersonate into a legitimate user on

the actual target server.

Website Defacement

Website defacement is the process in which attacker after successful intrusion into a legitimate website, alters and modify the content, appearance of the website. It can be performed by several techniques such as SQL injection to access the website and deface it.

Web server Misconfiguration

Another method of attack is by finding vulnerabilities in a website and exploiting them. An Attacker may look for misconfiguration and vulnerabilities of system and components of the web server. An attacker may identify weaknesses in terms of the default configuration, remote functions, misconfiguration, default certificates and debugging to exploit them.

HTTP Response Splitting Attack

HTTP Response Splitting attack the technique in which an attacker sends response splitting request to the server. By this way, an attacker can add the header response, resulting the server will split the response into two responses. The second response is under control of the attacker, so user can be redirected to the malicious website.

Web Cache Poisoning Attack

Web Cache poisoning attack in a technique in which attacker wipe the actual cache of the web server and store fake entries by sending a crafted request into the cache. This will redirect the users to the malicious web pages.

SSH Brute-force Attack

Brute forcing the SSH tunnel will allow the attacker to use encrypted tunnel. This encrypted tunnel is used for the communication between hosts. By brute forcing the SSH login credentials, an attacker can gain unauthorized access to SSH tunnel.

Web Application Attacks

Other web application related attacks may include: -

- Cookie Tampering
- DoS Attack
- SQL Injection

- Session hijacking
- Cross-Site Request Forgery (CSRF) attack
- Cross-Site Scripting (XSS) attack
- Buffer Overflow

Attack Methodology

Information Gathering

Information gathering includes a collection of information about target using different platforms either by social engineering, internet surfing, etc. An attacker may use different tools, networking commands for extract information. An attacker may navigate to robot.txt file to extract information about internal files.

Web server Footprinting

It includes footprinting focused on the web server using different tools such as Netcraft, Maltego, and httprecon, etc. Results of Web server footprinting brings server name, type, operating system and running application and other information about the target website.

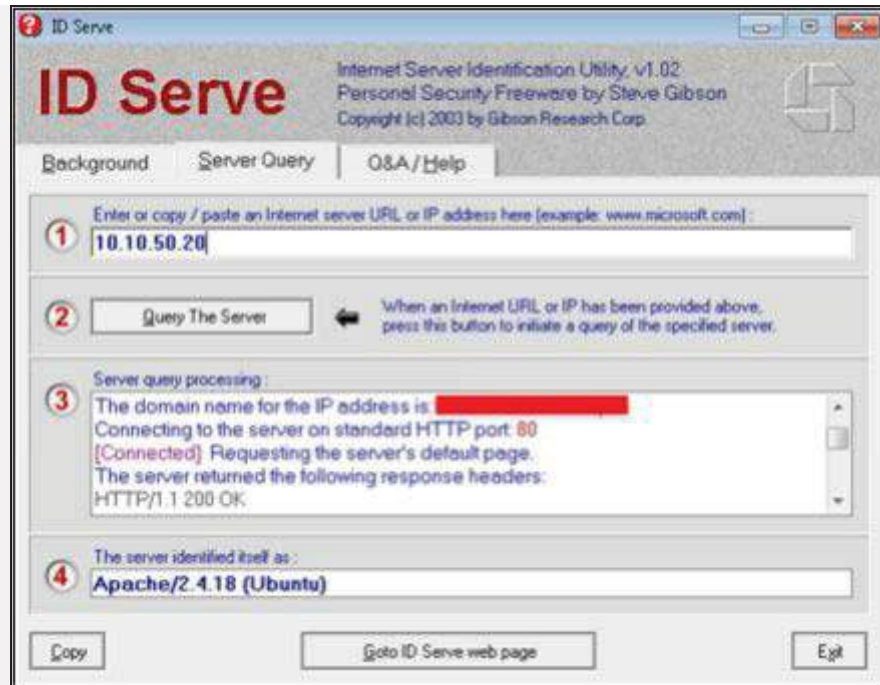


Figure 13-05 Generating Query

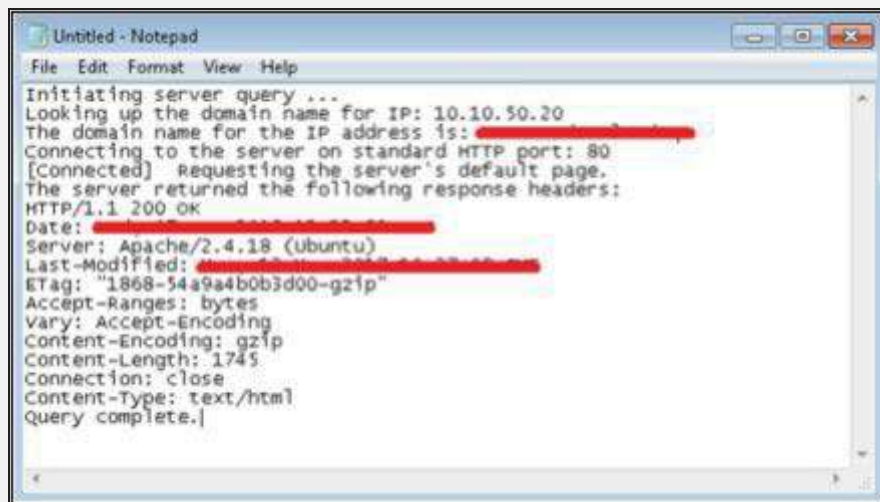


Figure 13-06 Extracted Information

Mirroring a Website

As defined earlier, mirroring a website is the process mirroring the entire website in the local system. If the entire website is downloaded onto the system, it enables is attacker to use, inspect the website, directories, structure

and to find other vulnerabilities from this downloaded mirrored website copy. Instead of sending multiple copies to a web server, this is a way to find vulnerabilities on a website.

Vulnerability Scanning

Vulnerability Scanners are automated utilities which are specially developed to detect vulnerabilities, weakness, problems, and holes in an operating system, network, software, and applications. These scanning tools perform deep inspection of scripts, open ports, banners, running services, configuration errors, and other areas.

Session Hijacking

Attacker by intercepting, altering and using a Man-in-the-Middle attack to hijack a session. The attacker uses the authenticated session of a legitimate user without initiating a new session with the target.

Hacking Web Passwords

Password Cracking is the method of extracting the password to gain authorized access to the target system in the guise of a legitimate user. Password cracking may be performed by social engineering attack or cracking through tempering the communication and stealing the stored information.

Password Attacks are classified into the following types: -

- Non-Electronic Attacks
- Active Online Attacks
- Passive Online Attacks
- Default Password
- Offline Attack

Countermeasures

The basic recommendation for securing the web server from internal and external attacks and other threat is the place the web server in a secure zone where security devices such as firewalls, IPS, and IDS are deployed, filtering and inspecting the traffic destined to the web server. Placing the web server into an isolated environment such as DMZ protect it from threats.

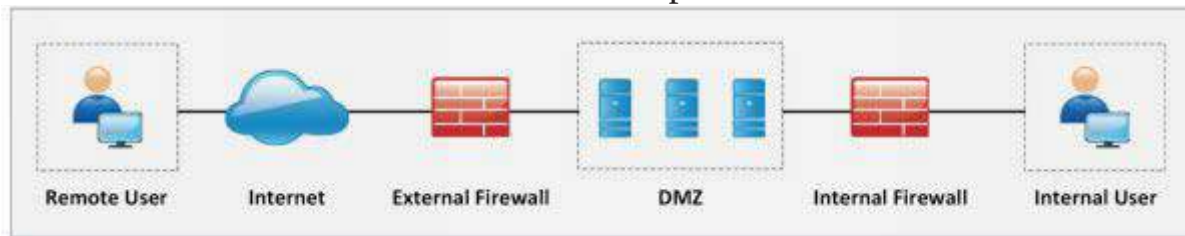


Figure 13-07 Web Server Deployment

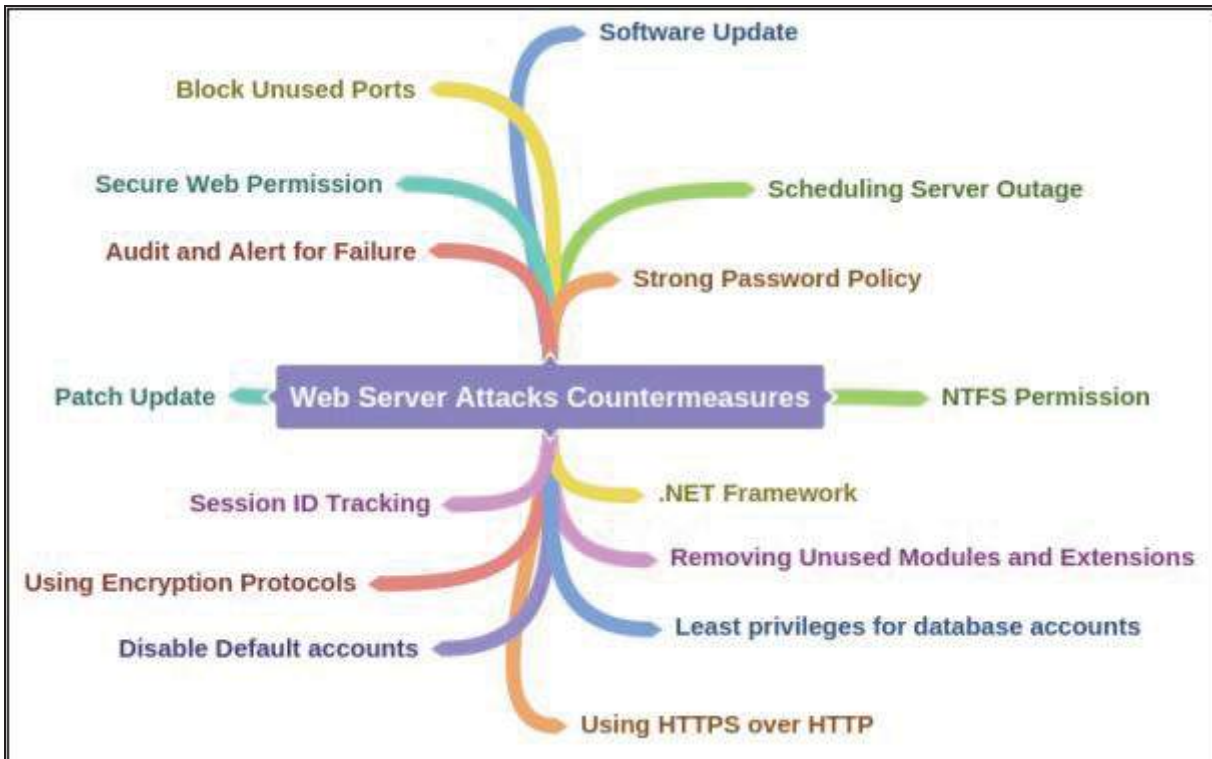
Detecting Web Server Hacking Attempts

There are several techniques that are being used to detect any intrusion or unexpected activity in a web server such as Website change detection system detects for a hacking attempt by using scripting which is focused on inspecting changes made by executable files. Similarly, hashes are periodically compared to detect modification.

- Auditing Ports.
- Disabling insecure and unnecessary ports.
- Using Port 443 HTTPS over port 80 HTTP.

Patch Management

Patches and Hotfixes

As we know, Patches and Hotfixes are required to remove vulnerabilities, bugs, and issues in a software release. Hotfixes are updates which fix these issues whereas patches are the pieces of software that is specially designed for fixing the issue. A hotfix is referred to a hot system, specially designed for a live production environment where fixes have been made outside a normal development and testing to address the issue.

Patches must be to download from official websites, home sites and application and Operating system vendors. The recommendation is to register or subscribe to receive alerts about latest patches and issues.

These patches can be download in the following way: -

- Manual Download from Vendor
- Auto-Update

Patch Management

Patch management is an automated process which ensures the installation of required or necessary patches on a system. Patch management process detects the missing security patches, find out a solution, downloads the patch, test the patch in an isolated environment, i.e., testing machine, and then deploy the patch onto systems.

Lab 13-2: Microsoft Baseline Security Analyzer (MBSA)

The Microsoft Baseline Security Analyzer is a Windows-based Patch management tool powered by Microsoft. MBSA identify the missing security updates and common security misconfigurations. MBSA 2.3 release adds support for Windows 8.1, Windows 8, Windows Server 2012 R2, and Windows Server 2012. Windows 2000 will no longer be supported with this release.

Procedure:

MBSA is capable of scanning Local system, remote system, and range of the computer.

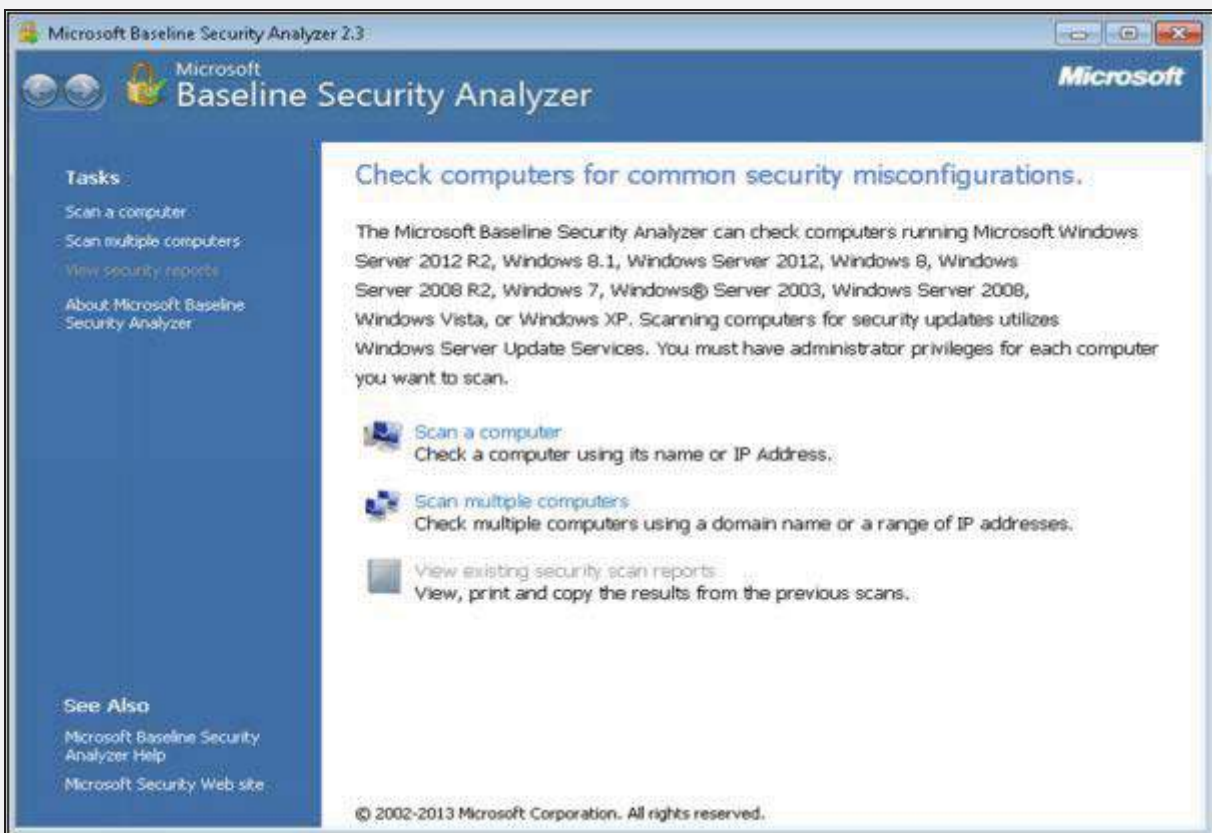


Figure 13-08 Microsoft Baseline Security Analyzer

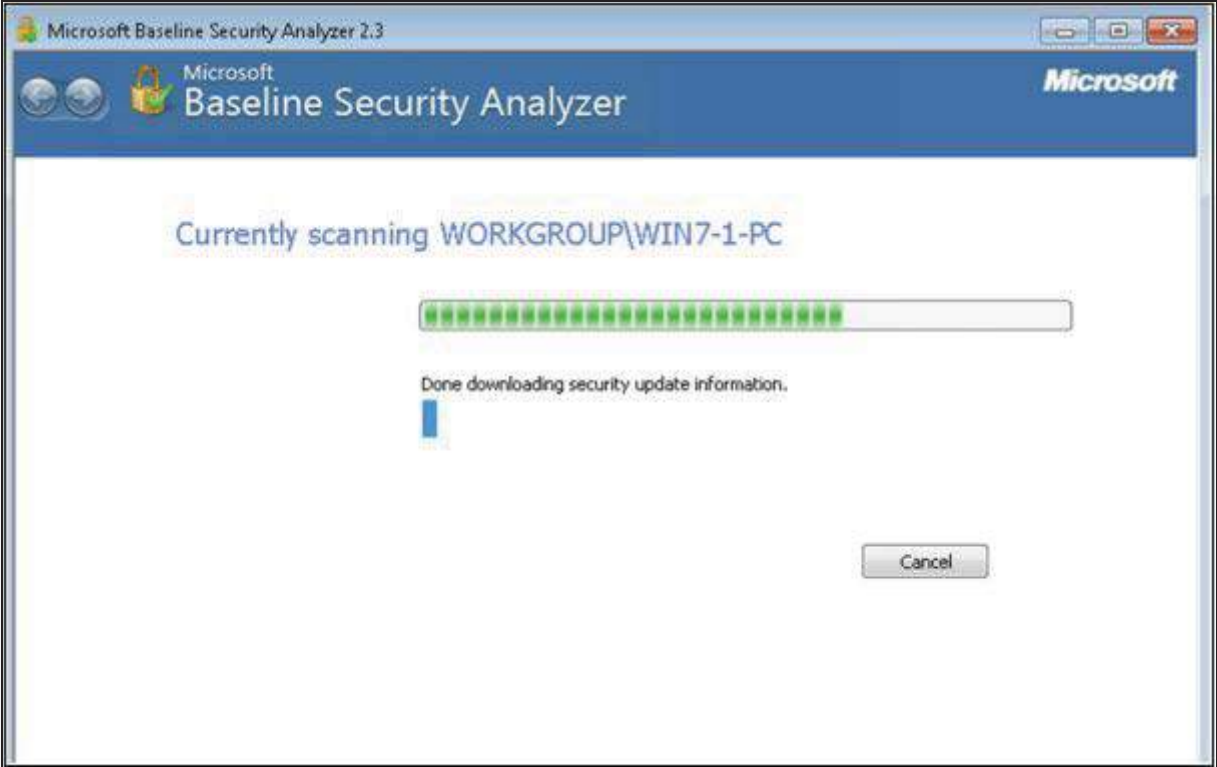


Figure 13-10 MBSA Scanning

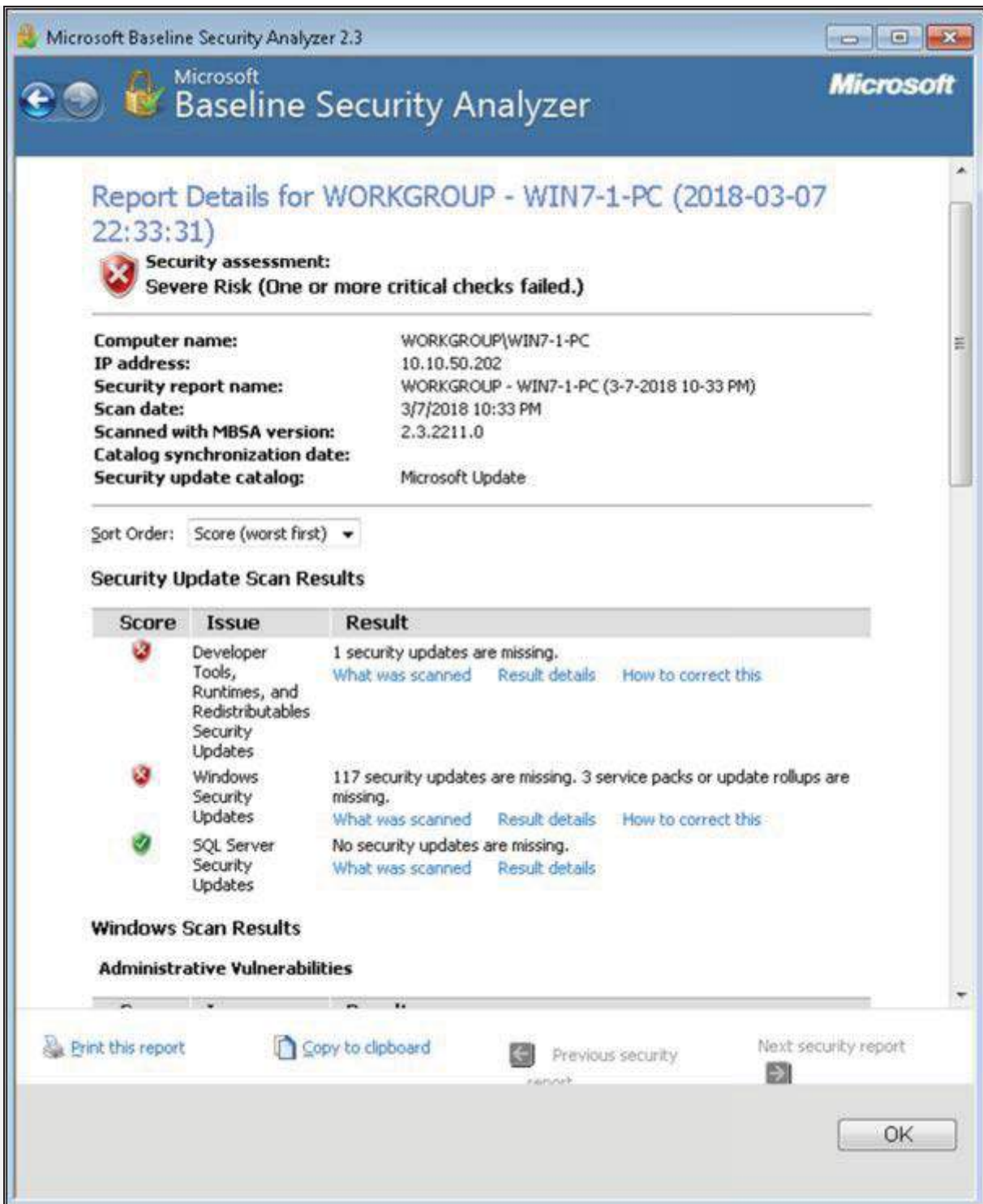


Figure 13-11 MBSA Scanning Result

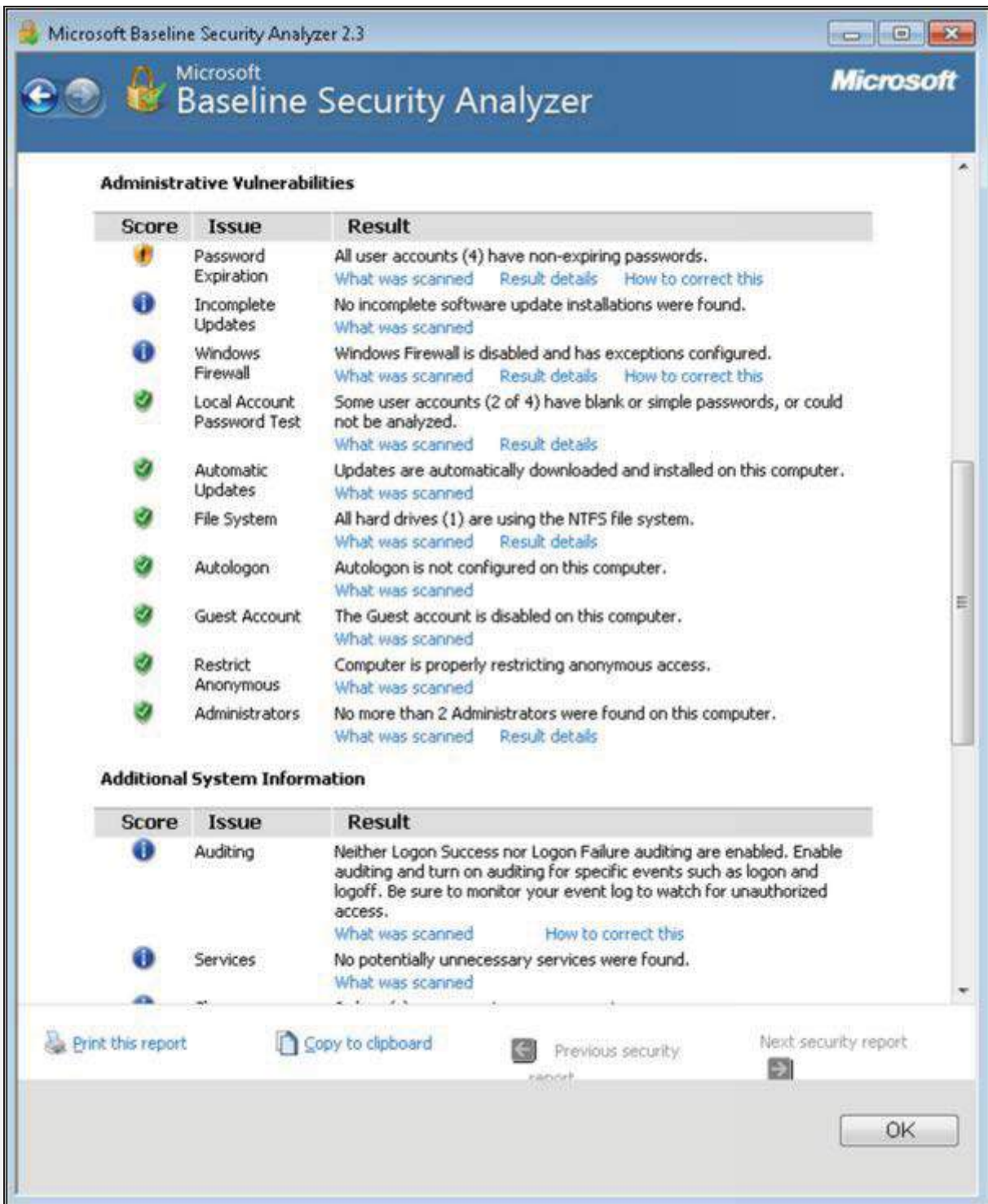


Figure 13-12 MBSA Scanning Result

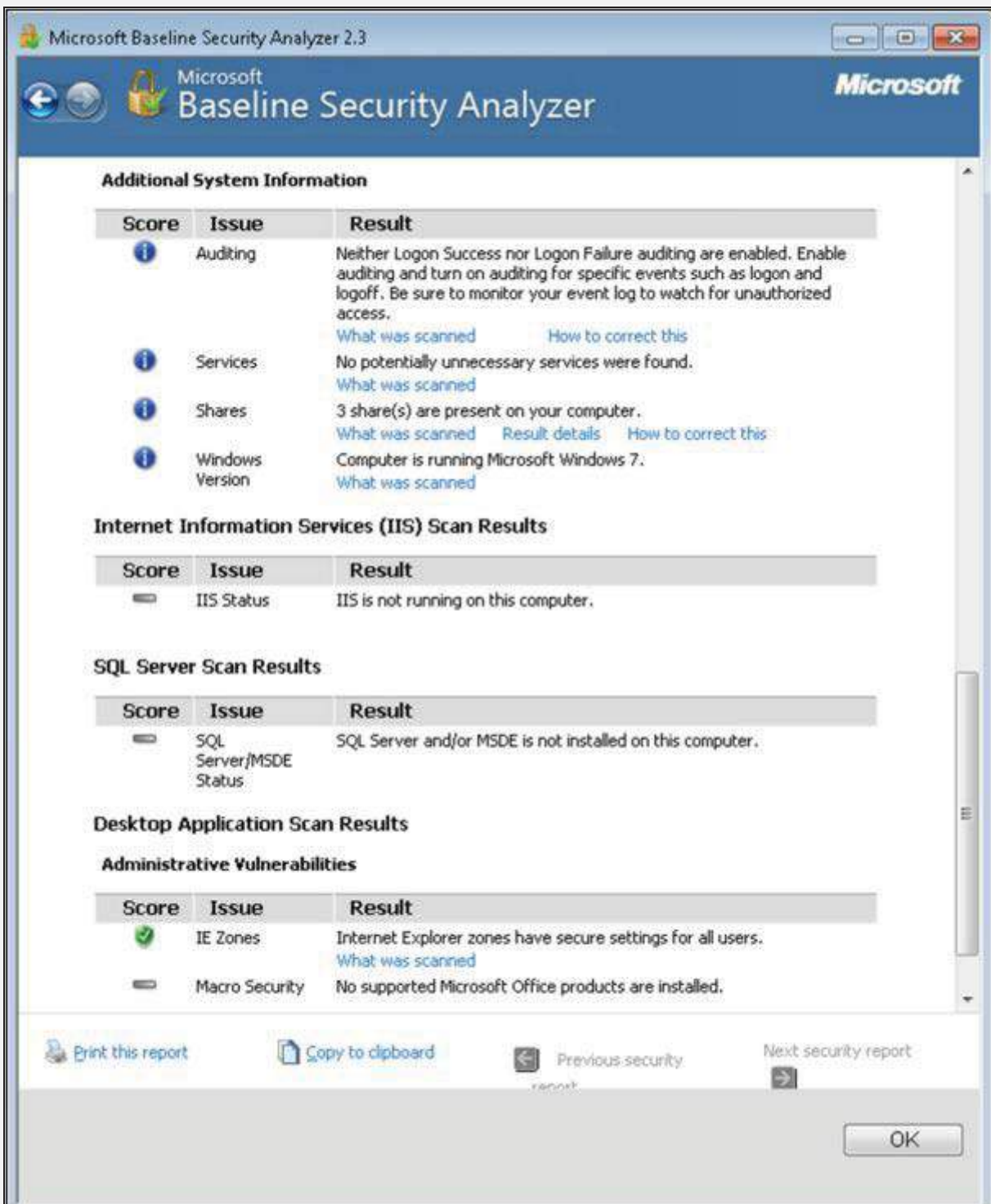


Figure 13-13 MBSA Scanning Result

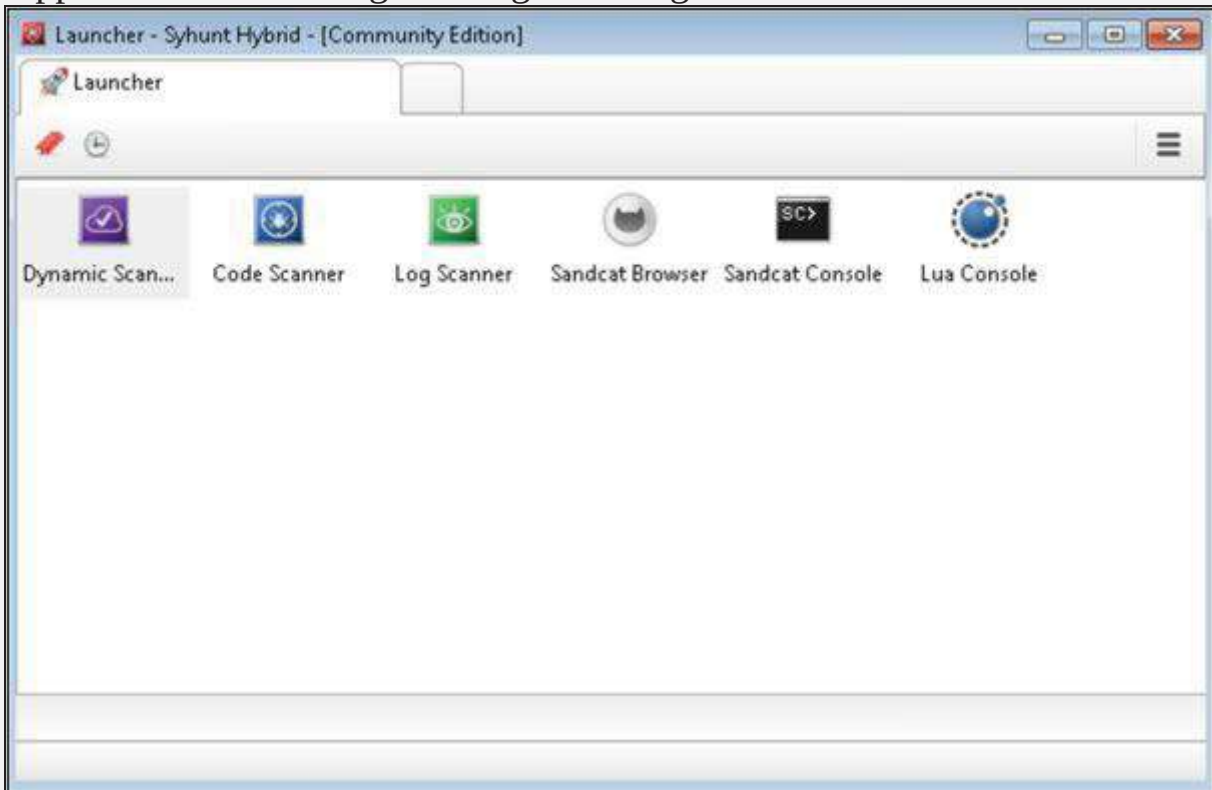


Figure 13-14 Syshunt Dynamic Scanning

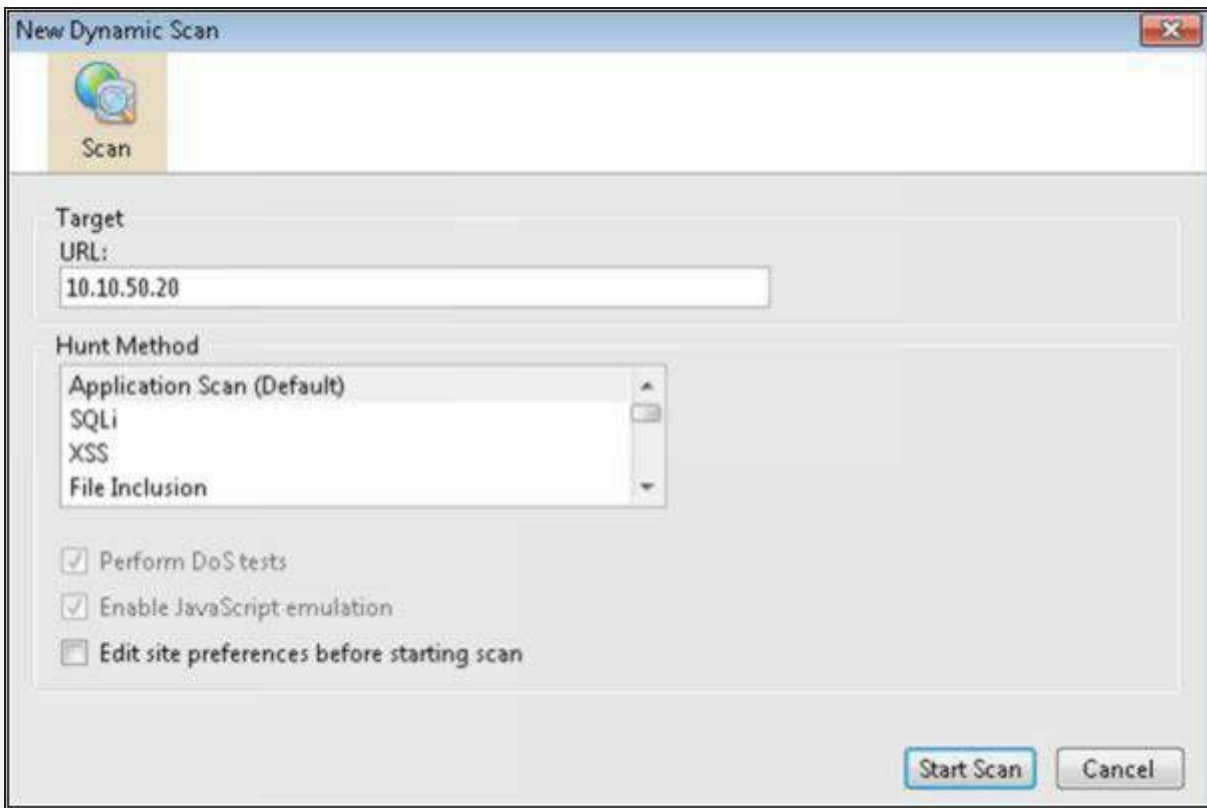


Figure 13-15 Syshunt Dynamic Scanning

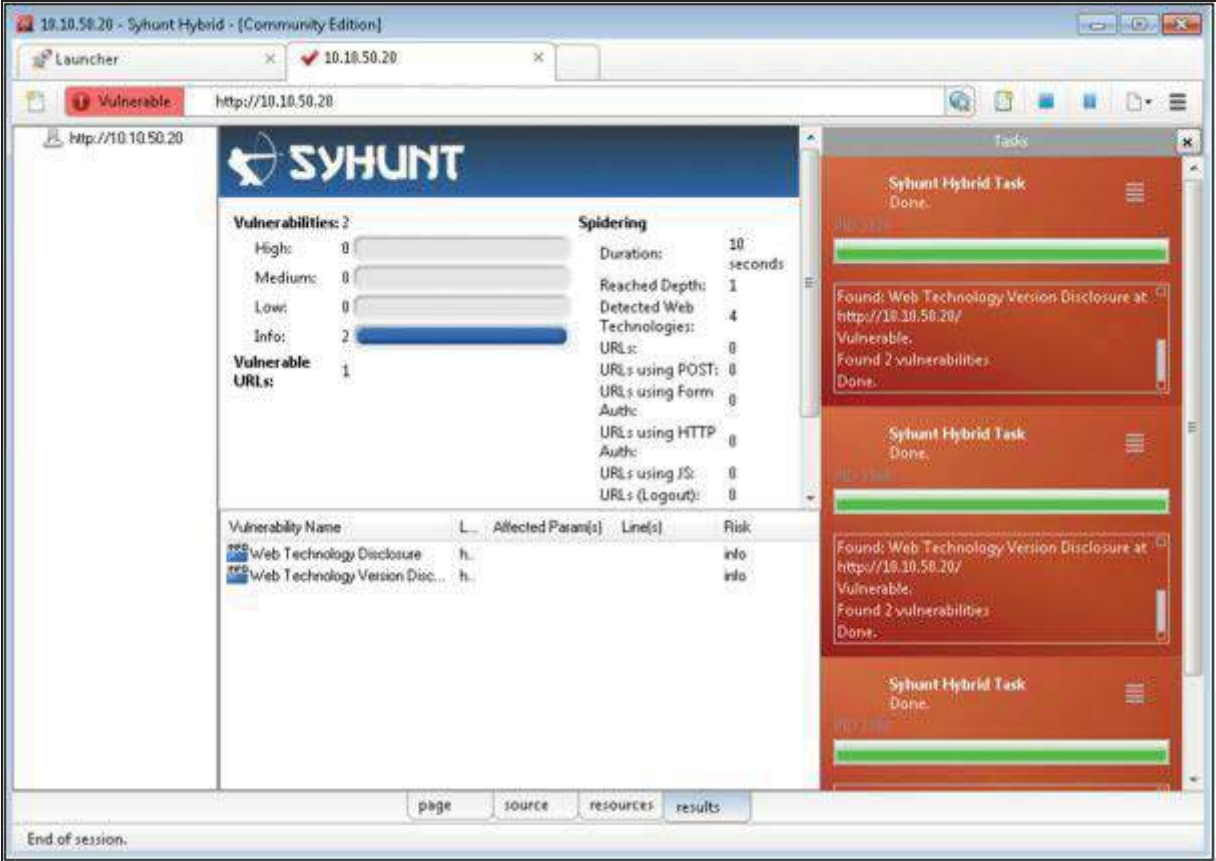


Figure 13-16 Syshunt Dynamic Scanning

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Chapter 14: Hacking Web Applications

Technology Brief

Significant increase in usage of Web application requires high availability and extreme performance of the application. In this modern era, the web application is popularly used in the corporate sector to perform important tasks as well as used globally for social purposes. It became a great challenge for the web server administrators and Application Server administrators to ensure security measures and eliminate vulnerabilities to provide high availability and smooth performance.

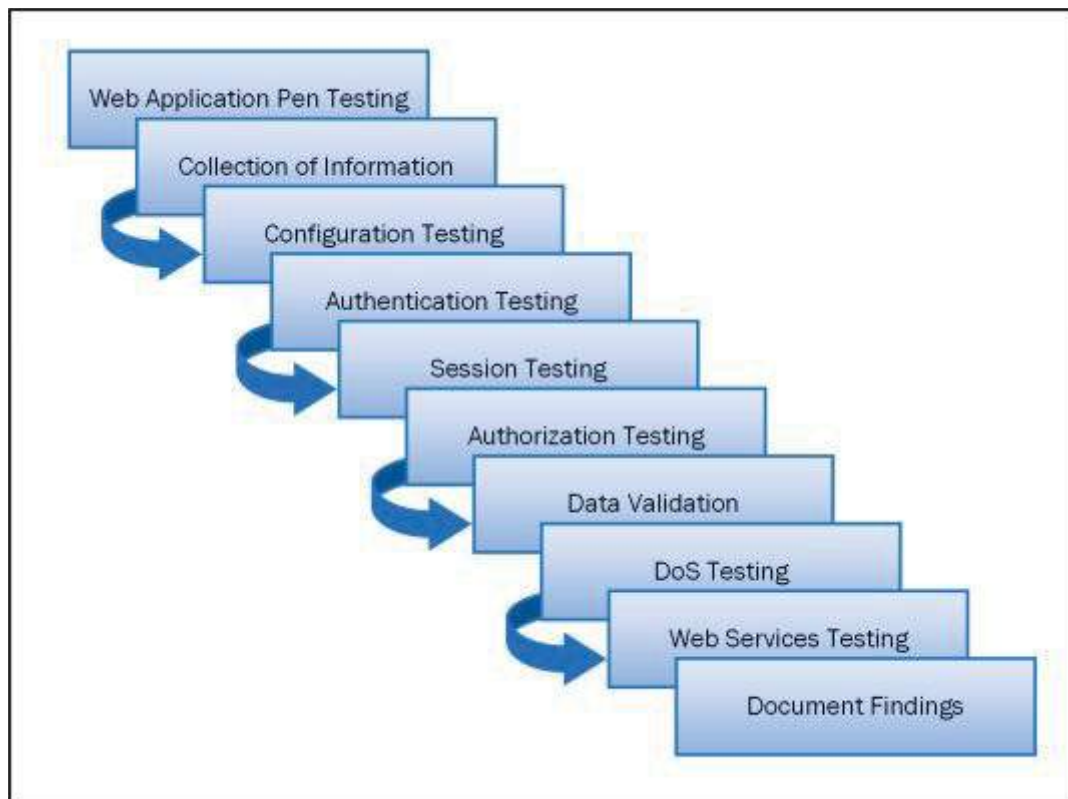


Figure 14-01 Web Application Pentesting

Web Application Concepts

Web Applications are that application that is running on a remote application server and available for clients over the internet. These web applications can be available on different platforms such as Browser or Software to entertain the clients. Use of Web application has been incredibly increased in last few years. Web Application is basically depending upon Client-Server relationship. Web applications are basically providing an interface to the client to avail web services. Web pages may be generated on the server or containing scripting to be executed on the client web browser dynamically.

Server Administrator

The server administrator is the one who took care of the web server in terms of safety, security, functioning, and performance. It is responsible for estimating security measures and deploying security models, finding and eliminating vulnerabilities.

Application Administrator

Application Administrator is responsible for the management and configuration required for the web application. It ensures the availability and high performance of the web application.

Client

Clients are those endpoints which interact with the web server or application server to avail the services offered by the server. These clients require a highly available service from the server at any time. While these clients are accessing the resources, they are using different web browsers which might be risky in terms of security.

How do Web Applications works?

A Web Application functions in two steps, i.e., Front-end and Back-end. Users requests are handled by front-end where the user is interacting with the

web pages. Services are communicated to the user from the server through the button and other controls of the web page. All processing was controlled and processed on the back-end.

Server-side languages include: -

- Ruby on Rails
- PHP
- C#
- Java
- Python
- JavaScript

Client-side languages include: -

- CSS
- JavaScript
- HTML

The web application is basically working on the following layers: -

- **Presentation Layer:** Presentation Layer Responsible for displaying and presenting the information to the user on the client end.
- **Logic Layer:** Logic Layer Used to transform, query, edit, and otherwise manipulate information to and from the forms.
- **Data Layer:** Data Layer Responsible for holding the data and information for the application as a whole.

Web 2.0

Web 2.0 is the generation of world wide web websites that provide dynamic and flexible user interaction. It provides ease of use, interoperability between other products, systems, and devices. Web 2.0 allows the users to interact and collaborate with social platforms such as social media site and social networking sites. Prior generation, i.e., web 1.0 in which users are limited to passive viewing to static content. Web 2.0 offers almost all users the same freedom to contribute. the characteristics of Web 2.0 are rich user experience, user participation, dynamic content, metadata, Web standards, and scalability.

Unvalidated Inputs

Unvalidated Input refers to the processing of non-validated input from the client to the web application or backend servers. This is a vulnerability that can be exploited to perform XSS, buffer overflow, and injection attacks.

Parameter / Form Tampering

Parameter tampering refers to the attack in which parameters are manipulated while client and server are communicating with each other. Parameters such as Inform Resource Locator (URL) or web page form fields are modified. By this way, a user may either redirected to another website that may exactly look like the legitimate site or modifies the field such as cookies, form fields, HTTP Headers.

Injection Flaws

Injection attacks work with the support of web application vulnerabilities if a web application is vulnerable that it allows untrusted input to be executed. Malicious code injection, file injection or malicious SQL injection will result in the exploit. Injection flaws include the following:

- SQL Injection
- Command Injection
- LDAP Injection

SQL Injection:

SQL Injection is basically the injection of malicious SQL queries. Using SQL queries, unauthorized user interrupts the processes, manipulate the database and execute the commands and queries by injection results in data leakage or loss. These vulnerabilities can be detected by using application vulnerability scanners. SQL injection is often executed using address bar. Attacker bypasses the vulnerable application's security and extracts the valuable information from its database using SQL injection

Command Injection:

Command injection can be done by any of the following methods:

- Shell Injection
- File Injection
- HTML Embedding

LDAP Injection

LDAP injection is a technique that also takes advantage of non-validated input vulnerability. An attacker may access the database using LDAP filter to search the information.

Denial-of-Service DoS Attack

An attacker may perform a DoS attack in the following ways: -

1. User Registration DoS

An attacker may automate the process to keep registering with fake accounts.

2. Login DoS

Attacker attempt to send login requests repeatedly.

3. User Enumeration

An attacker may attempt to try different username password combinations from a dictionary file.

4. Account Lockout

An attacker is attempting to lock the legitimate account by attempting invalid passwords.

Web App Hacking Methodology

Analyze Web Applications

Analyzing Web application includes observing the functionality and other parameters to identify the vulnerabilities, entry points and server technologies that can be exploited. HTTP requests and HTTP fingerprinting techniques are used to diagnose these parameters.

Attack Authentication Mechanism

By exploiting the authentication mechanism using different techniques, an attacker may bypass the authentication or steal information. Attacking on authentication mechanism includes: -

- Username Enumeration
- Cookie Exploitation
- Session Attacks
- Password Attacks

Authorization Attack Schemes

Attacker by accessing the web application using low privilege account, escalate the privileges to access sensitive information. Different techniques are used such as URL, POST data, Query string, cookies, parameter tampering, HTTP header, etc. to escalate privileges.

Session Management Attack

As defined earlier, Session management attack is performed by bypassing the authentication in order to impersonate a legitimate authorized user. This can be done using different session hijacking techniques such as: -

- Session Token Prediction
- Session Token Tampering
- Man-in-the-Middle Attack
- Session Replay

Perform Injection Attacks

Injection attack is basically an injection of malicious code, commands, and file by exploiting the vulnerabilities in a web application. Injection attack may be performed in a different form such as: -

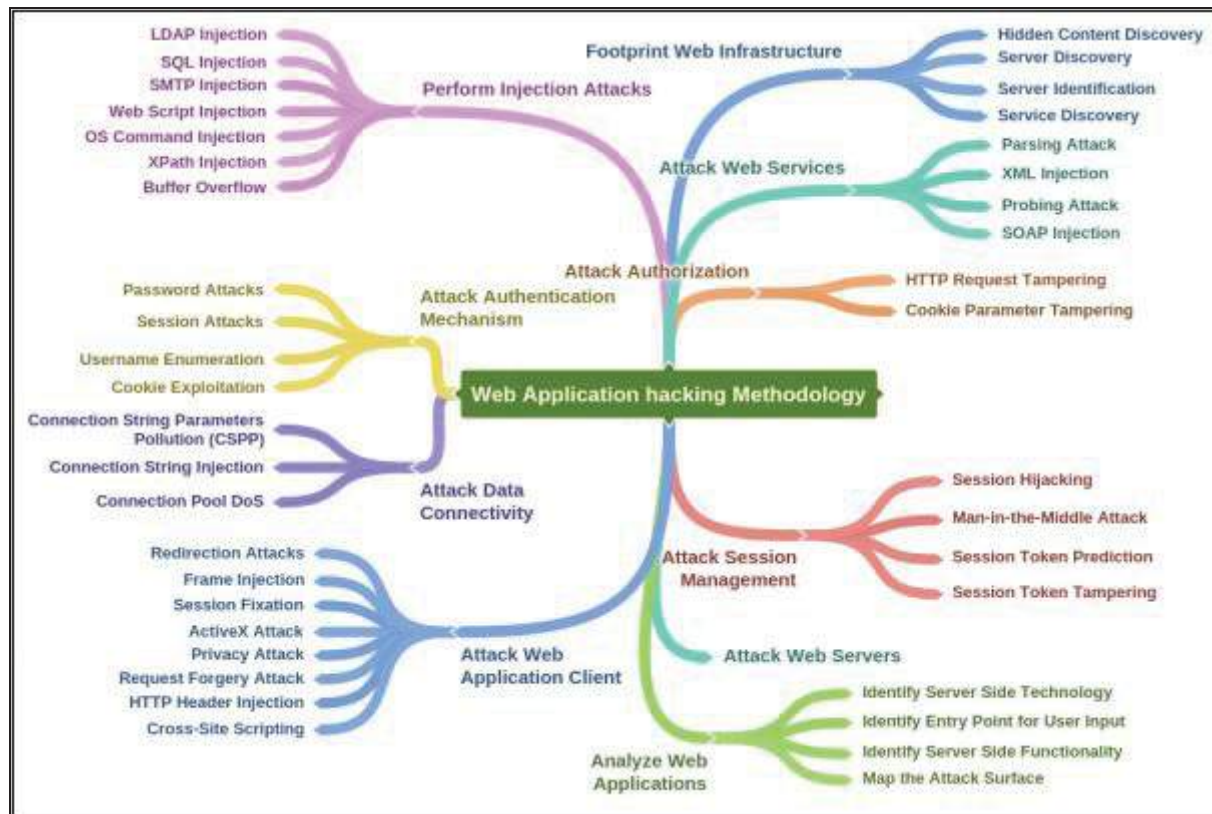
- Web Script Injection
- OS Command Injection
- SMTP Injection
- SQL Injection
- LDAP Injection
- XPath Injection
- Buffer Overflow
- Canonicalization

Attack Data Connectivity

Database connectivity attack is focused on exploiting the data connectivity between application and its database. Database connection requires connection string to initiate a connection to the database. Data connectivity attack includes: -

1. Connection String Injection
2. Connection String Parameters Pollution (CSPP)
3. Connection Pool DoS

Encoding Schemes

Web Applications uses different encoding schemes for securing their data. These encoding schemes are categorized into the two categories.

URL Encoding

URL Encoding is the encoding technique for secure handling of URL. In URL Encoding, URL is converted into an ASCII Format for secure transportation over HTTP. Unusual ASCII characters are replaced by ASCII code, a "%" followed by two hexadecimal digits. The default character-set in HTML5 is UTF-8. Following chart is showing some symbols and their codes.

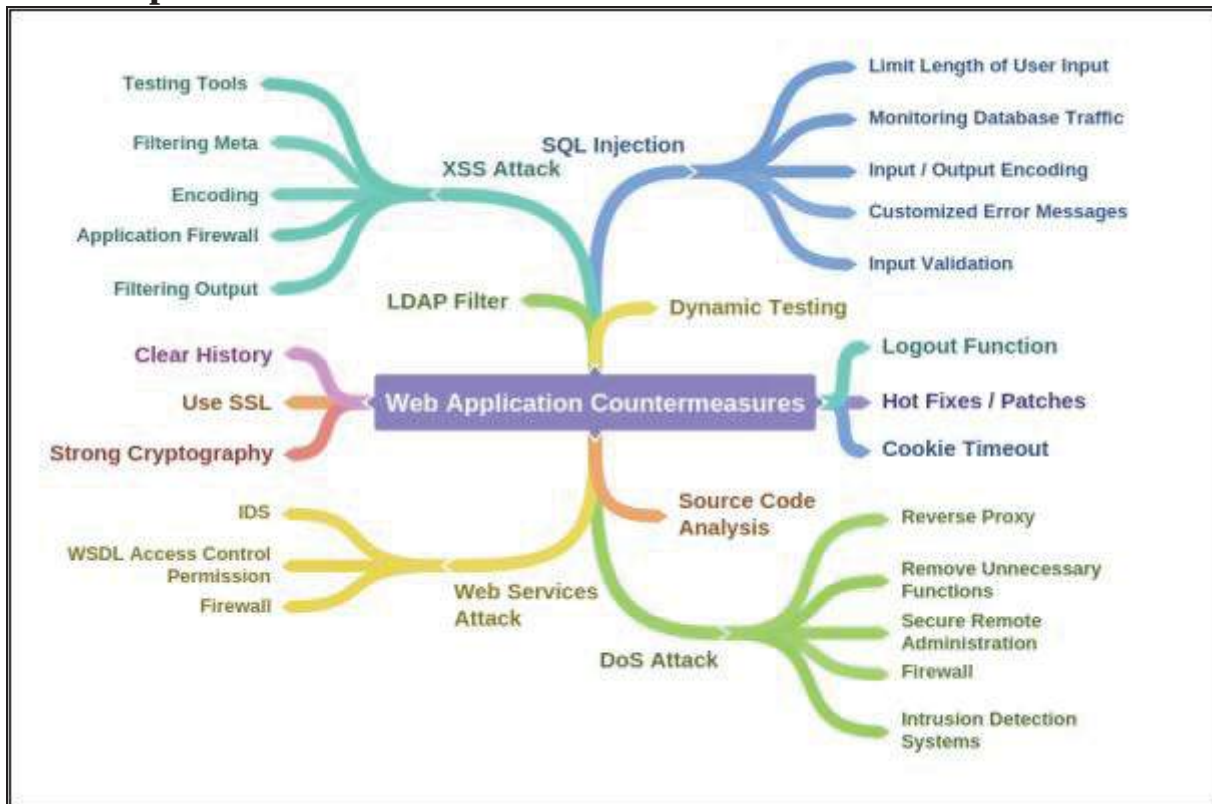

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Chapter 15: SQL Injection

Technology Brief

In this chapter, Structured Query Language (SQL) injection is covered. SQL Injection is a popular and complex method of attack on web services, applications, and Databases. It requires deep knowledge about web application processes and its components such as databases and SQL. SQL Injection is basically insertion of malicious code or script by exploiting vulnerabilities to launch an attack powered by back-end components. This chapter will give information about concepts or SQL injection, types, methodology and defending techniques of SQL injection.

SQL Injection Concepts

SQL Injection

SQL Injection Attacks uses SQL websites or web applications. It relies on the strategic injection of malicious code or script into existing queries. This malicious code is drafted with the intention of revealing or manipulating data that is stored in the tables within the database.

SQL injection is a powerful and dangerous attack. It identifies the flaws and vulnerabilities in a website or application. The fundamental concept of SQL injection is to inject commands to reveal sensitive information from the database. Hence, it can result to a high profile attack.

The scope of SQL Injection

SQL Injection can be a great threat to a website or application. SQL injection impact can be measured by observing the following parameters that an attacker is intended to overcome: -

- Bypassing the Authentication
- Revealing sensitive information
- Compromised Data integrity
- Erasing the database
- Remote Code Execution

How SQL Query works

Injection of SQL query will be executed on the server and replied by the response. For example, following SQL query is requested to the server.

```
SELECT * FROM [Orders]
```

These commands will reveal all information stored in the database "Orders" table. If an organization maintains records of their orders into a database, all information kept in this database table will be extracted by the command.

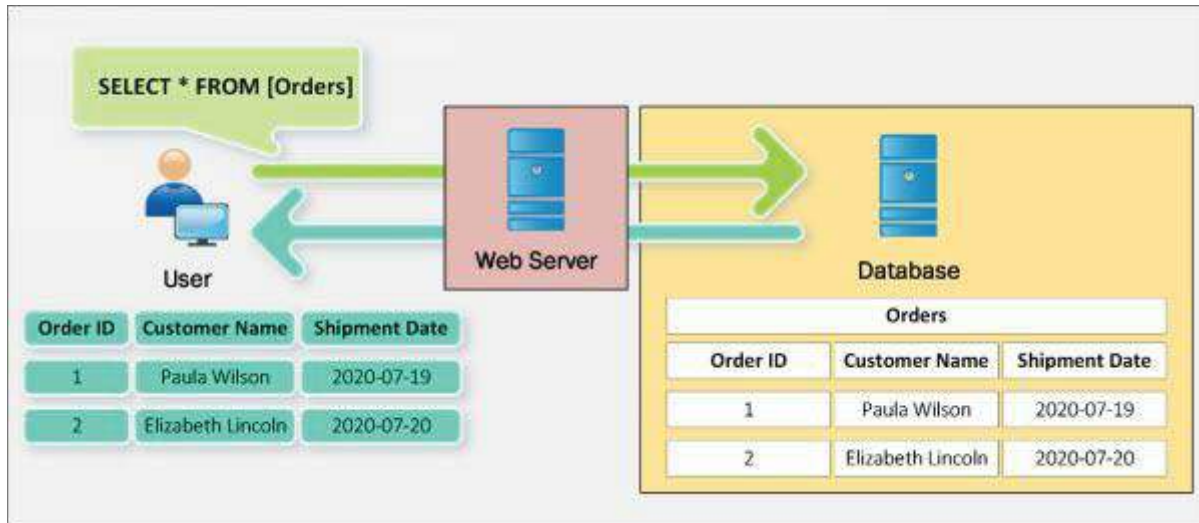


Figure 15-01 SQL Query working

SQL Delete Query

Types of SQL Injection

SQL Injection can be classified into three major categories.

1. In-band SQLi
2. Inferential SQLi
3. Out-of-band SQLi

In-Band SQL Injection

In-Band SQL injection is a category which includes injection techniques using same communication channel to launch the injection attack and gather information from the response. In-Band Injection techniques include: -

1. Error-based SQL Injection
2. Union based SQL Injection

Error Based SQL Injection

Error-based SQL Injection is one of the in-band SQL Injection technique. It relies on error messages from the database server to reveal information about the structure of the database. Error-based SQL injection is very effective for an attacker to enumerate an entire database. Error messages are useful during the development phase to troubleshoot issues. These messages should be disabled when an application website is live. Error Based SQL Injection can be performed by the following techniques: -

- System Stored Procedure
- End of Line Comment
- Illegal / Logically incorrect Query
- Tautology

Union SQL Injection

Union-based SQL injection is another In-band SQL injection technique that involves the UNION SQL operator to combine the results of two or more SELECT statements into a single result.

```
SELECT <column_name(s)> FROM <table_1>  
UNION  
SELECT <column_name(s)> FROM <table_2>;
```

Inferential SQL Injection (Blind Injection)

In an Inferential SQL Injection, no data is transferred from a Web

application; the, i.e., attacker is unable to see the result of an attack hence referred as a Blind injection. The attacker just observed the behavior of the server. The two types of inferential SQL Injection Are Blind-Boolean-based SQL injection and Blind-time-based SQL injection.

Boolean Exploitation Technique

Blind SQL injection is a technique of sending a request to the database. the response does not contain any data from database however attacker observe the HTTP response. By evaluating the responses, an attacker can infer whether injection was successful or unsuccessful, as the response will be either true or false however it will not contain any data from the database.

Out-of-band SQL Injection

Out-of-band SQL injection is the injection technique that uses different channels to launch the injection and gather the responses. It requires some features being enabled such as DNS or HTTP requests on database server hence it is not very common.

SQL Injection Methodology

Information Gathering and SQL Injection Vulnerability Detection

In the information gathering phase, Collect the information about the web application, operating system, database and the structure of the components. Evaluation of extracted information will be helpful to identify the vulnerabilities to exploit. Information can be gathered by using different tools and techniques such as injecting codes into the input fields to observe the response of error messages. Evaluation of input field, hidden fields, get and post requests, cookies, string values and detailed error messages can reveal enough information to initial injection attack.

Launch SQL Injection Attacks

Appropriate SQL injection attack from the category can be initiated just after gathering the information about the structure of database and vulnerabilities found. By exploiting them, the injection can be successful. SQL injection attacks such as Union SQL injection, Error-based SQL injection, Blind SQL injection and others can be used to extract information from the database such as extracting Database name, tables, columns, rows, and fields. The injection can also have intended for bypassing the authentication.

Advanced SQL Injection

Advanced SQL injection may include an enumeration of databases like MySQL, MSSQL, MS Access, Oracle, DB2, or PostgreSQL, tables and columns in order to identify privilege level of users, account information of database administrator and database structure disclosure. It also includes passwords and hashes grabbing, and transferring the database to the remote machine.

Evasion Techniques

Evading IDS

In order to secure database, isolated deployment in a secure network location with an intrusion detection system (IDS) is recommended. IDS keep monitoring the network and host traffic as well as a database application. The attacker has to evade IDS to access the database, for this, it uses different evading techniques. For example, IDS using Signature-based Detection system compare the input strings against the signature to detect intrusion. Now all you have to do is to evade the signature-based detection.

Types of Signature Evasion Techniques

Different techniques as mentioned below are used to evade: -

- Inserting Inline Comment in between keywords
- Character Encoding
- String Concatenation
- Obfuscated Codes
- Manipulating White Spaces
- Hex Encoding
- Sophisticated Matches

Counter-measures

In order to mitigate SQL injection attacks, there are several detection tools available which can be used. These tools perform testing of website and applications and report the data, issues and remediation actions. Some of these advanced tools also offer technical description as the issue.

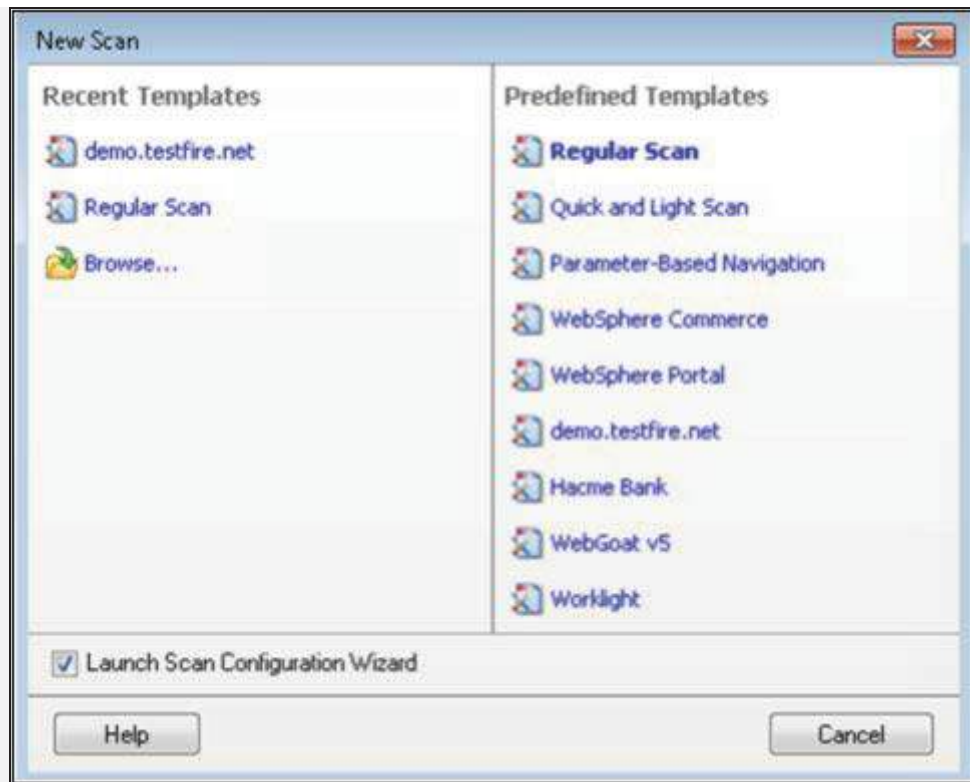


Figure 15-03 New Scan

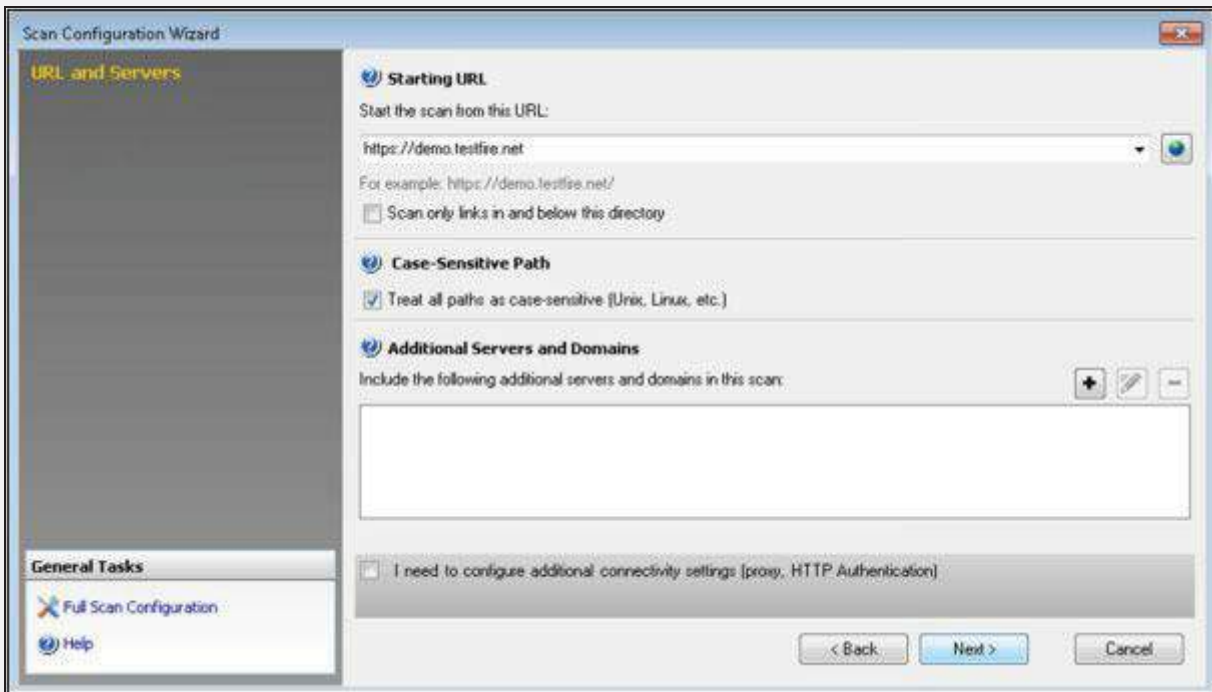


Figure 15-05 Configuration Wizard

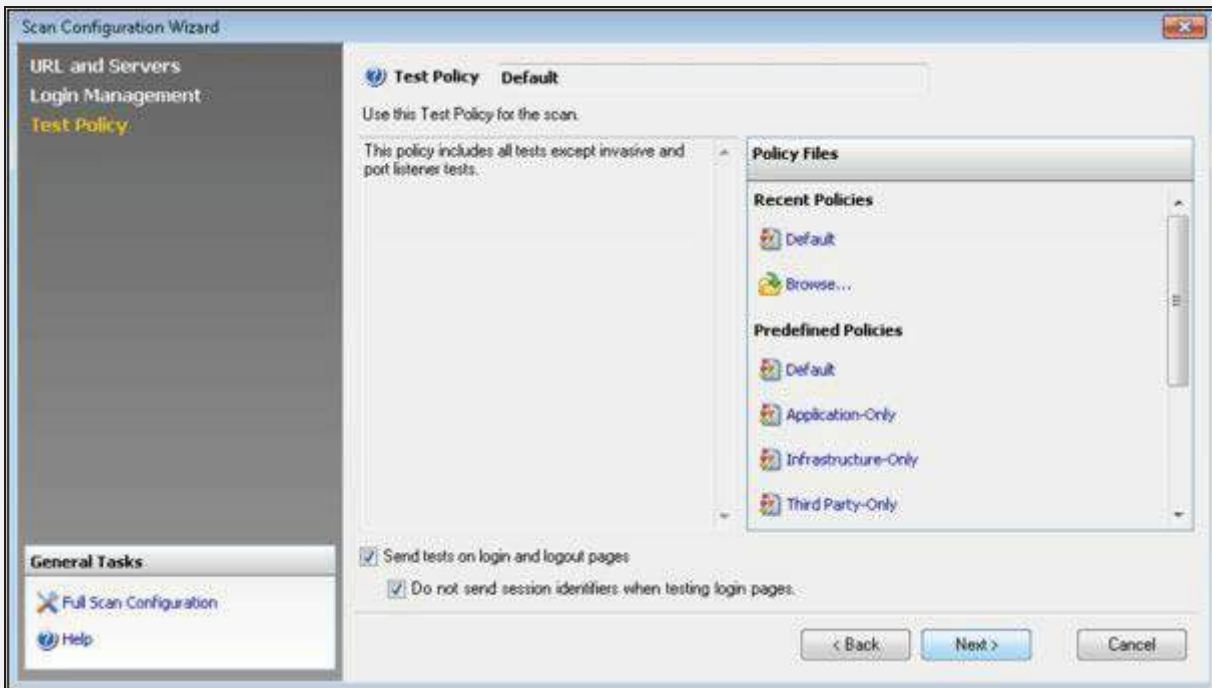


Figure 15-07 Configuration Scan Policy

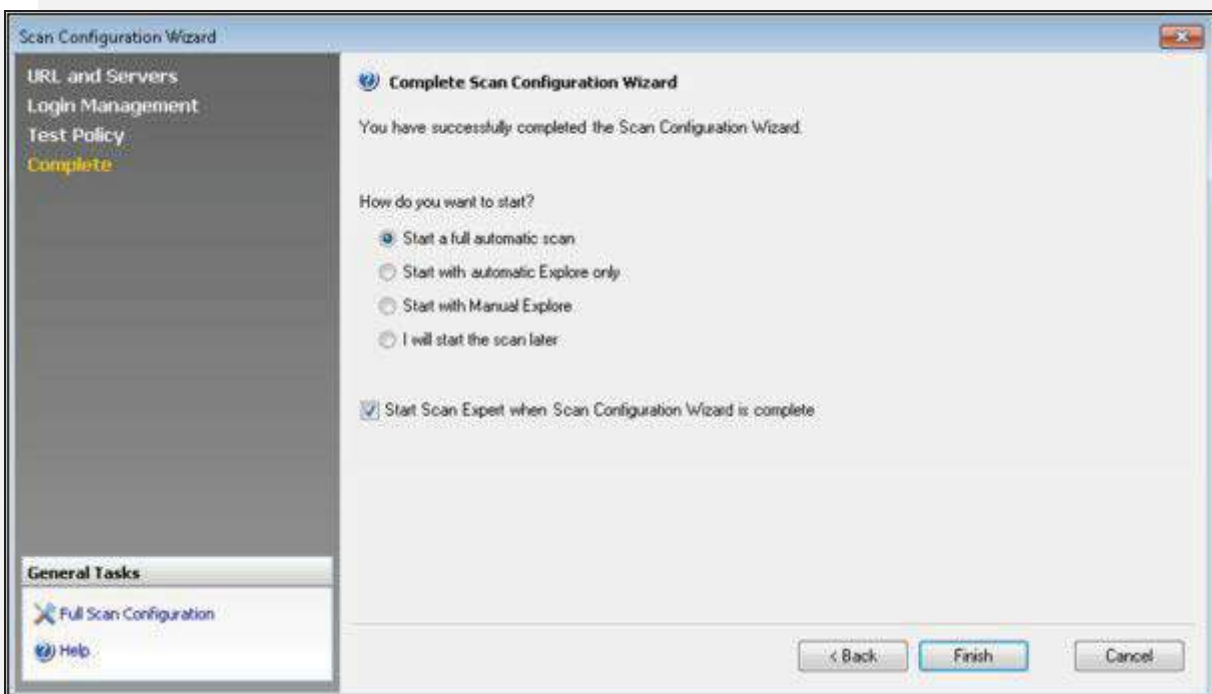


Figure 15-08 Configuration Wizard

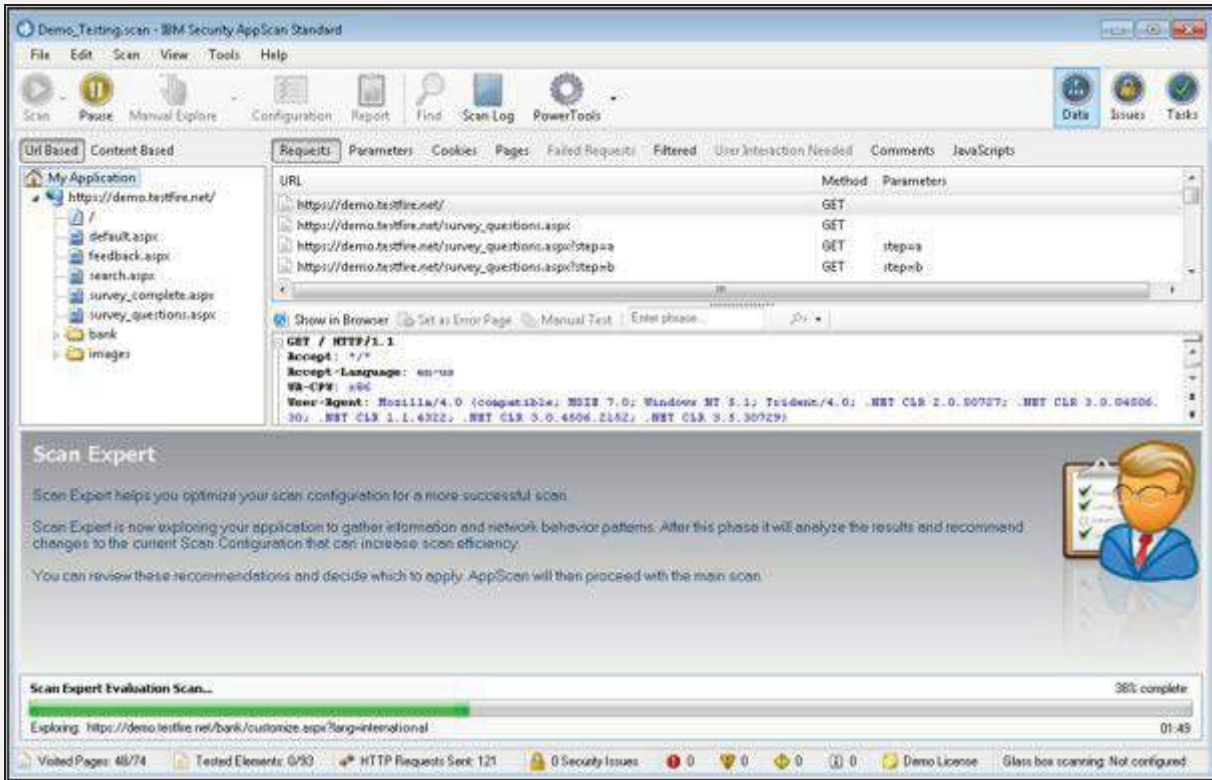


Figure 15-09 Scanning

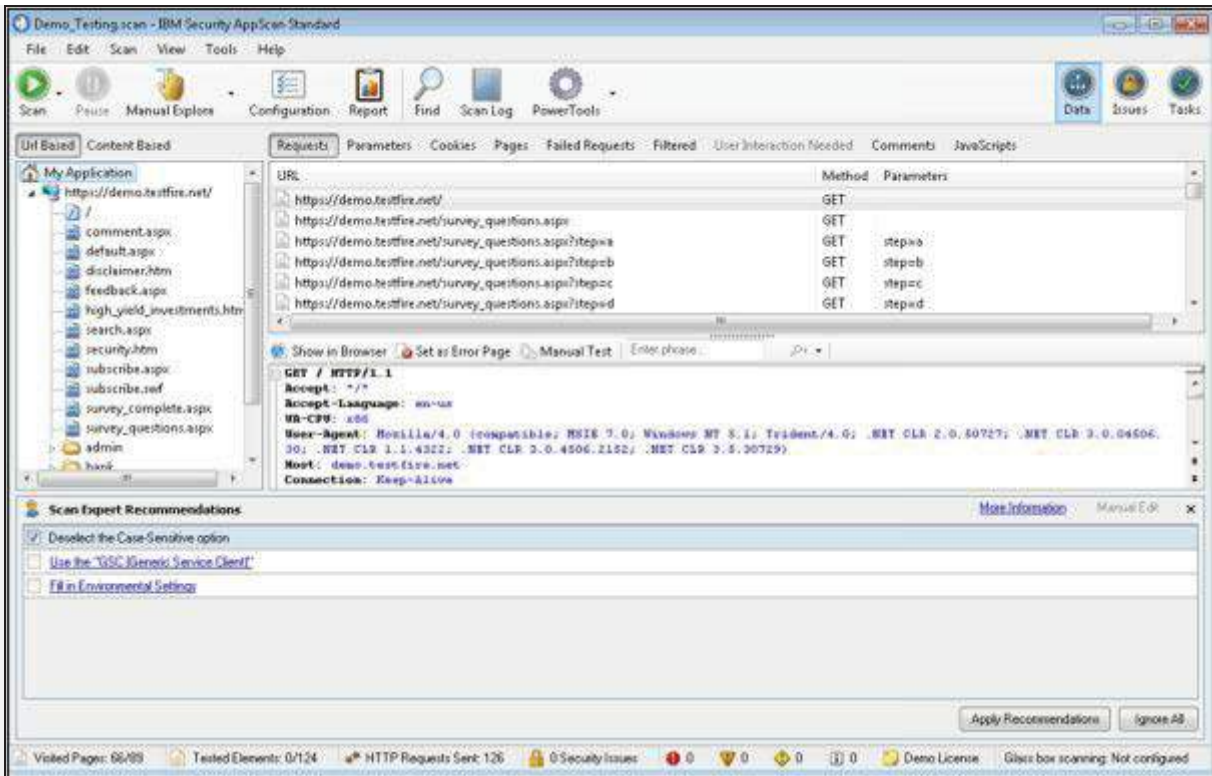


Figure 15-10 Result - Data Tab

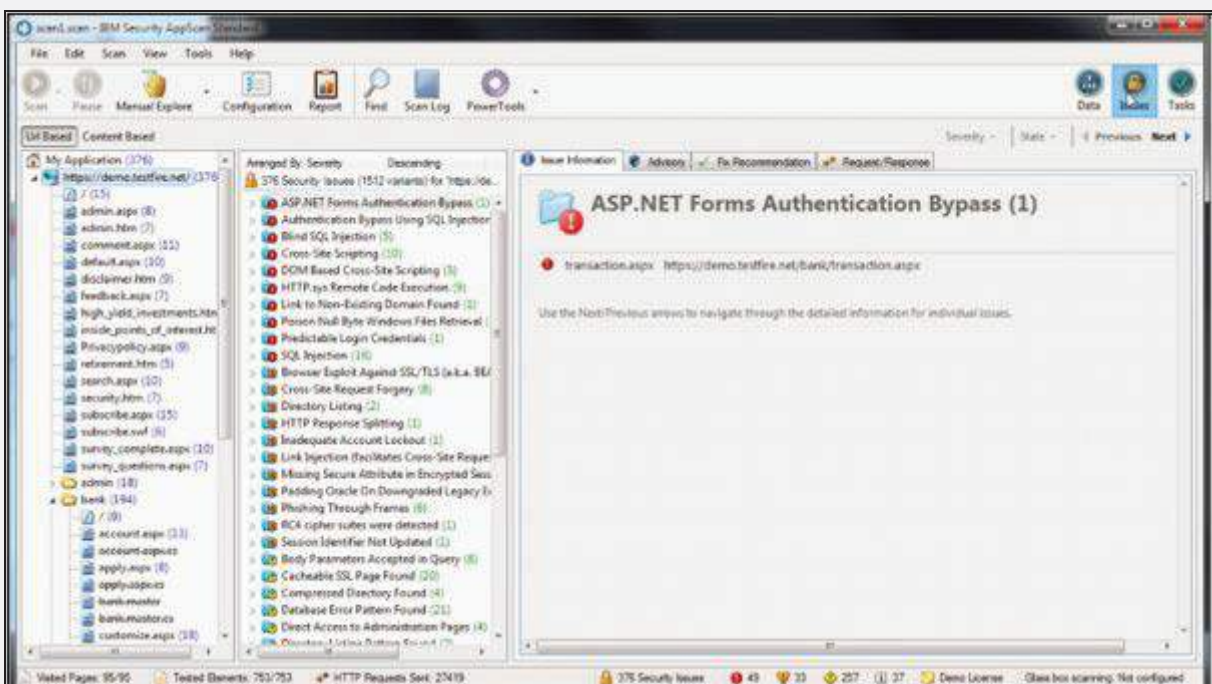


Figure 15-11 Issue Tab

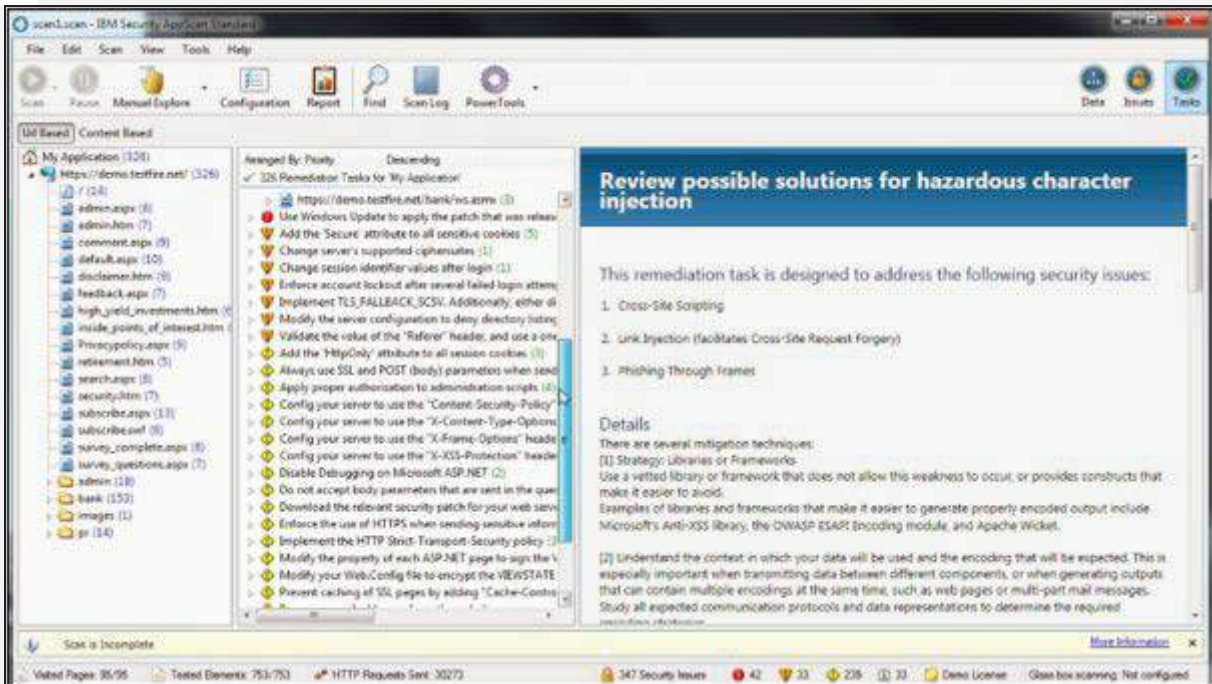
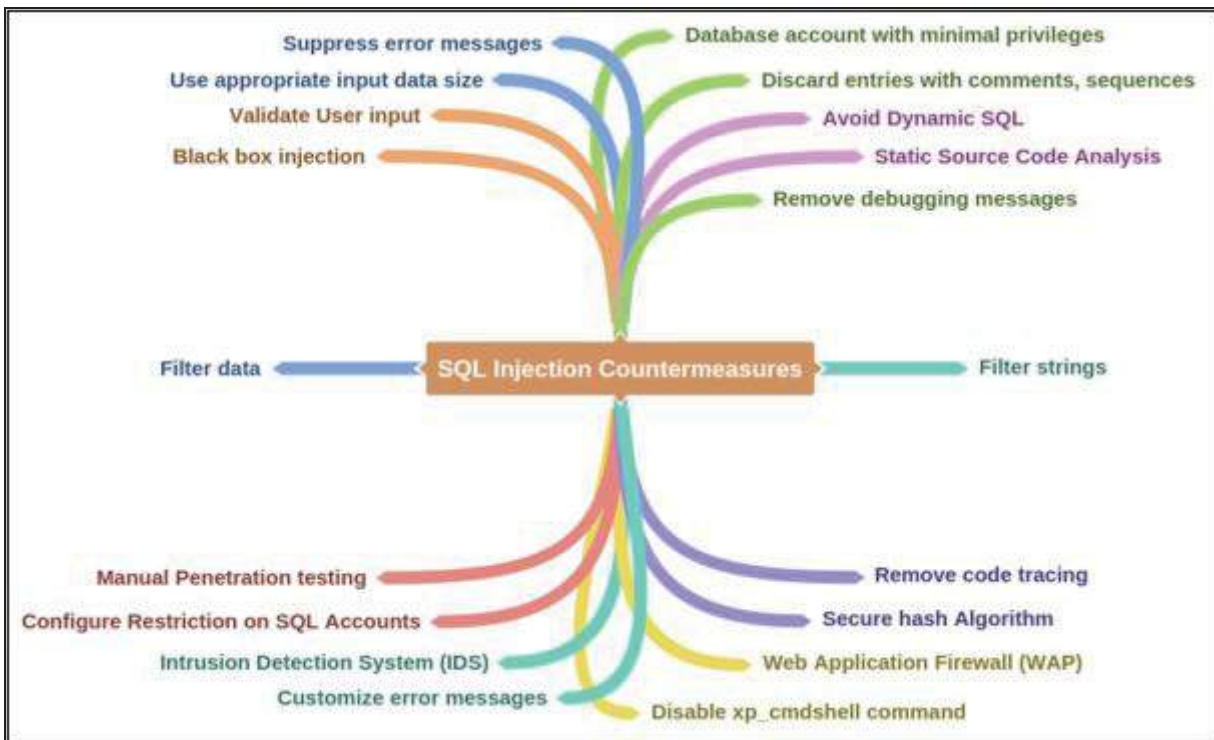


Figure 15-12 Task Tab

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Chapter 16: Hacking Wireless Networks

Technology Brief

Wireless networks are the most common and popular technology. Installation of the wired network has been replacing the wireless network because of its ease and mobility. Using wireless network increase not only mobility in a network but also increase the flexibility for the end users. Another advantage of wireless technology is to connect those remote areas where wired technology implementation is difficult. In the early era of wireless technology, the wireless network is not supposed to be secure enough to protect information. However, a lot of encryption techniques are used to secure the wireless communication channels. In this chapter, we will discuss the Concept of wireless networks, threat, and vulnerabilities, attacks on wireless technologies and their defending techniques.

Wireless Concepts

Wireless Networks

The wireless network is a type of computer network that is capable of transmitting and receiving the data through a wireless medium such as radio waves. The major advantage of this network is to reduce the cost of wires, devices, and installation complexity of wired networks. Usually, wireless communication relies on radio communication. Different frequency ranges are used for different type of wireless technology depending upon the requirements. The most common example of wireless networks is cell phone networks, Satellite communication, microwave communication, etc. These wireless networks are popularly used for Personal, Local, wide area networks.

Wireless Terminologies

GSM

Global System for Mobile Communication (GSM) is a standard by European Telecommunication Standards Institute. It is a second generation (2G) protocol for digital cellular networks. 2G was developed to replace 1G (analog) technology. This technology has been replaced by 3G UMTS standard, followed by 4G LTE standard. Mostly GSM networks operate in 900MHz or 1800MHz frequency bands.

Access Point

In Wireless networks, an Access point (AP) or Wireless Access Point (WAP) is a hardware device that allows wireless connectivity to the end devices. The access point can either be integrated with a router or a separate device connected to the router.

SSID

Service Set Identifier (SSID) is the name of an Access Point.

BSSID

MAC address of an Access Point.

ISM Band

ISM band also called the unlicensed band is a radio frequency band dedicated to the Industrial, Scientific and Medical purpose. The 2.54 GHz frequency band is dedicated to ISM. Microwave ovens, cordless phones, medical diathermy machines, military radars and industrial heaters are some of the

equipment that uses this band.

Orthogonal Frequency Division Multiplexing (OFDM)

Orthogonal frequency-division multiplexing (OFDM) is a method of digital encoding on multiple carrier frequencies. It is used in digital televisions, audio broadcasting, DSL internet and 4G communication.

Frequency-hopping Spread Spectrum (FHSS)

FHSS is a technique of transmitting radio signals by switching or hopping the carrier of different frequencies.

Types of Wireless Networks

Types of wireless networks deployed in a geographical area can be categorized as: -

- Wireless Personal Area Network (Wireless PAN)
- Wireless Local Area Network (WLAN)
- Wireless Metropolitan Area Network (WMAN)
- Wireless Wide Area Network (WWAN)

However, a wireless network can be defined in different types depending upon the deployment scenarios. The following are some of the wireless network types that are used in different scenarios.

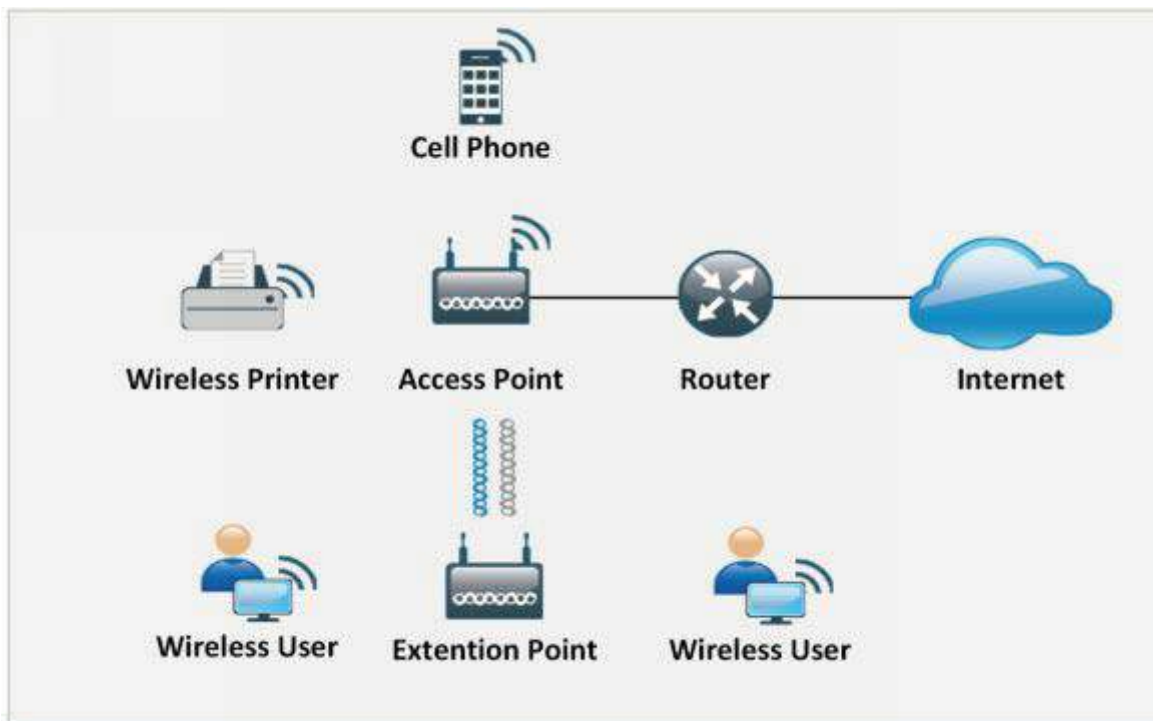


Figure 16-01 Extension to a wired Network

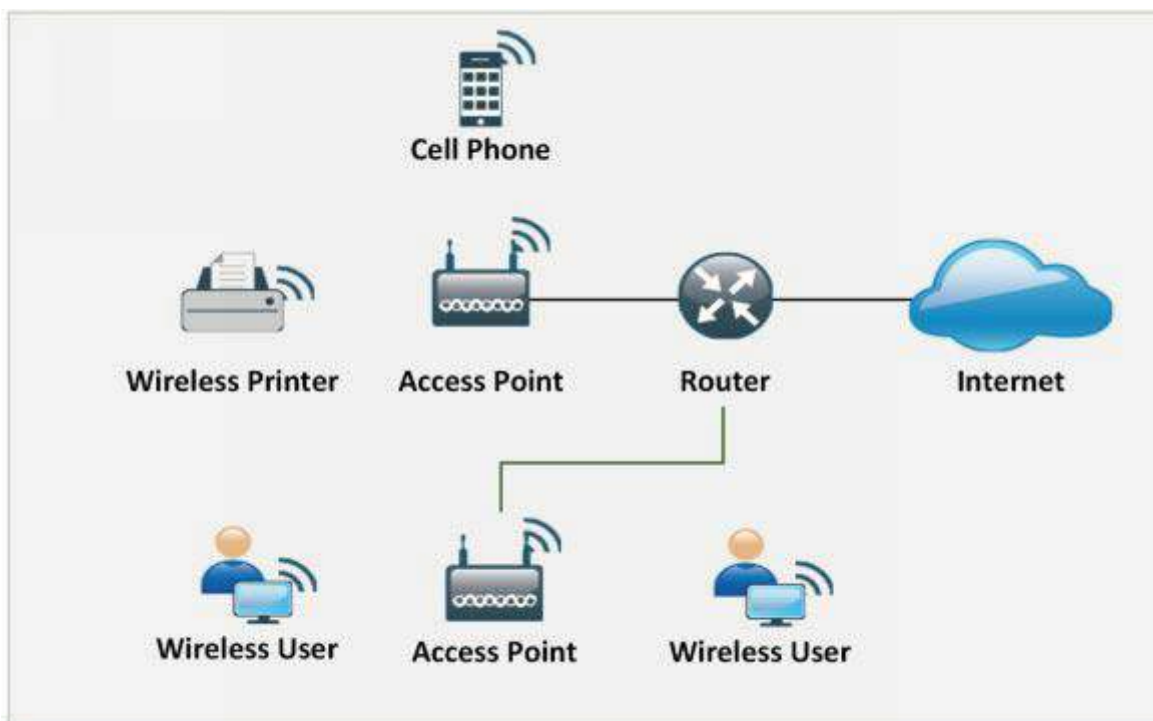


Figure 16-02 Multiple Access Points

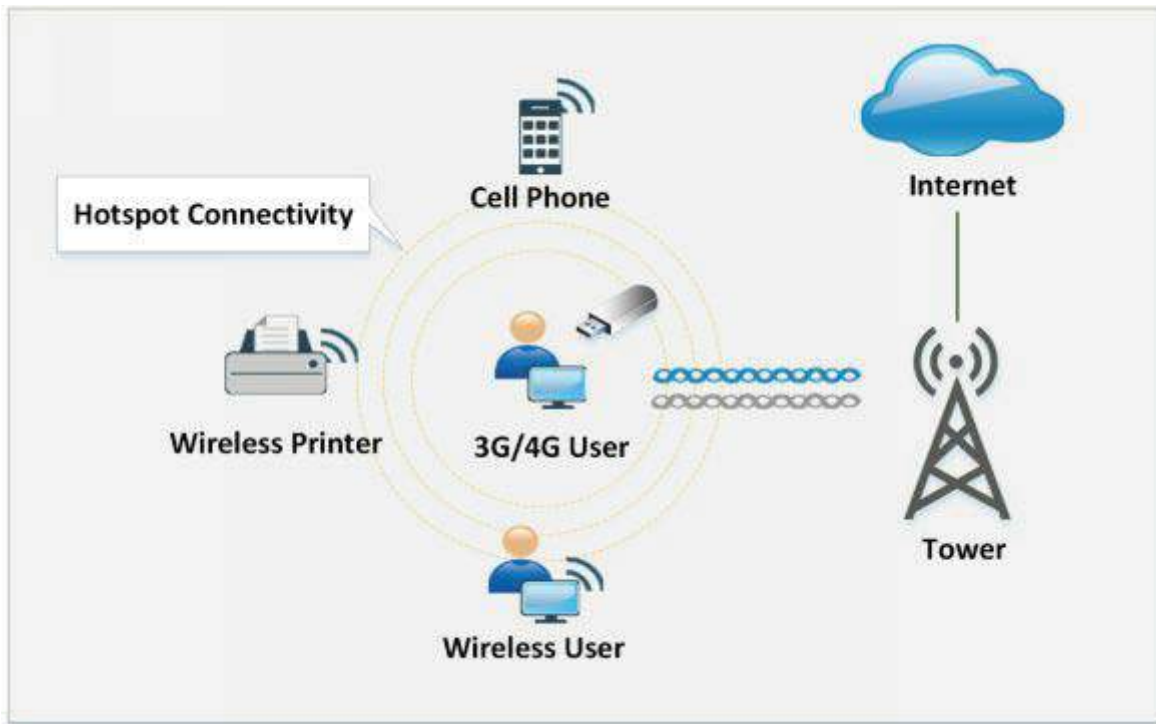


Figure 16-03 Hotspot Network

Service Set Identifier (SSID)

Service Set Identifier (SSID) is the name of an Access Point. Technically, SSID is a token, that is used to identify 802.11 networks (Wi-Fi) of 32 bytes. The Wi-Fi network is broadcasting the SSID continuously (if enabled). This broadcasting is basically intended for identification and presence of a wireless network. If SSID broadcast is disabled, wireless devices will not find the wireless network unless they are configured with the SSID manually by access each device. Default parameters such as default SSID and password

must be changed to avoid compromise.

Wi-Fi Technology

Wi-Fi is wireless local area networking technology which follows 802.11 standards. Many devices such as personal computers, gaming consoles, mobile phones, tablets, modern printers and much more are Wi-Fi compatible. These Wi-Fi Compatible devices are connected to the internet through a Wireless Access Point. There are several sub-protocols in 802.11 such as 802.11 a/b/g/n which are used in WLAN.

Wi-Fi Authentication Modes

There are two basic modes of authentication in Wi-Fi-based networks.

1. Open Authentication
2. Shared Key Authentication

Open Authentication

Open system authentication process requires six frame communications between client and the responder to complete the process of authentication.

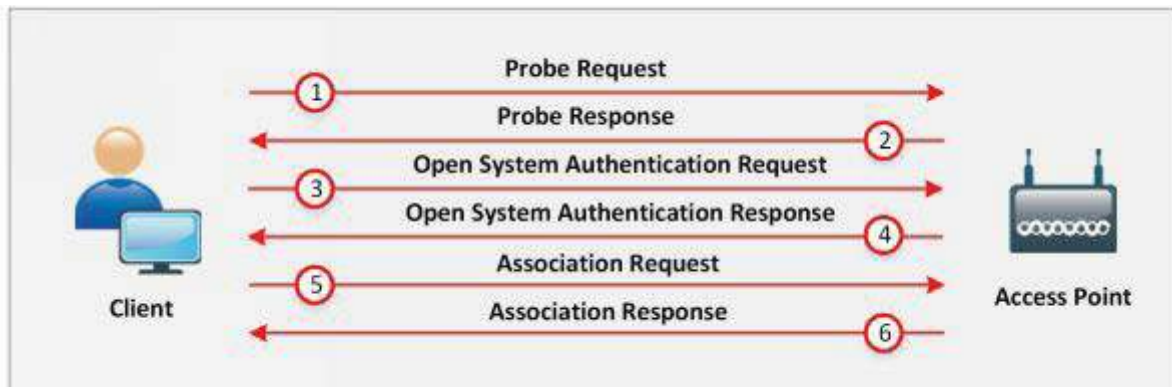


Figure 16-04 Open Authentication

- In a Wi-Fi Based LAN network, when a wireless client is attempting to connect through Wi-Fi, it initiates the process of association by sending the probe request. This probe request is to discover the 802.11 network. This probe request contains supported data rate information of the client. Association is simply a process of connecting to a wireless network.
- This probe request from the client is replied with a response containing parameters such as SSID, data rate, encryption, etc. if the access point found compatible supported data rate, encryption and another parameter with the client.

- The client sends an open authentication request (authentication frame) to the access point with the sequence 0x0001 to set authentication open.
- The Open authentication request is replied by the access point with the response having sequence 0x0002.
- After receiving open system authentication response, the client sends association request with security parameters such as chosen encryption to the access point.
- Access point responds with a request to complete the process of association and client can start sending data.

Shared Key Authentication

Shared Key authentication mode requires four frames to complete the process of authentication.



Figure 16-05 Shared Key Authentication

- The first frame is the initial authentication request frame that sent by the client to the responder or access point.
- Access point responds the authentication request frame with the authentication response frame with the challenge text.
- The client will encrypt the challenge with the shared secret key and send it back to the responder.
- Responder decrypts the challenge with the shared secret key. If the decrypted challenge matches with the challenge text, successful authentication response frame is sent to the client.

Wi-Fi Authentication with Centralized Authentication Server

Now a day, the Basic technology of WLAN which is commonly and widely deployed and still being in use all over the world is IEEE 802.11. The Authentication Option for IEEE 802.11 network is Shared-Key-Authentication mechanism or WEP (Wired Equivalency Privacy). Another

option is to Open Authentication. These Options are not capable of securing the network hence the IEEE 802.11 is remaining secure.

These two authentication mechanisms Open and Shared Authentication cannot effectively secure the network because WEP key is required, and in Shared-Key Authentication, Challenge is forwarded to the client which can be detected by hacked which can detect clear text challenge packet and Encrypted packets.

IEEE 802.1x comes with an alternative Wireless LAN Security feature that offers more enhanced user authentication option with Dynamic key distribution. IEEE 802.1x is focused solution for WLAN framework offering Central Authentication. IEEE 802.1x is deployed with Extensible Authentication Protocol (EAP) as WLAN Security Solution.

The major components on which this enhanced WLAN Security solution IEEE 802.1x with EAP depends are: -

1. Authentication
2. Encryption
3. Central Policy

Authentication: Mutual Authentication process between Endpoint User and Authentication Server RADIUS, i.e., commonly ISE or ACS.

Encryption: Encryption keys are dynamically allocated after authentication process.

Central Policy: Central policy offers management and Controlling over re-authentication, session timeout, regeneration and encryption keys, etc.

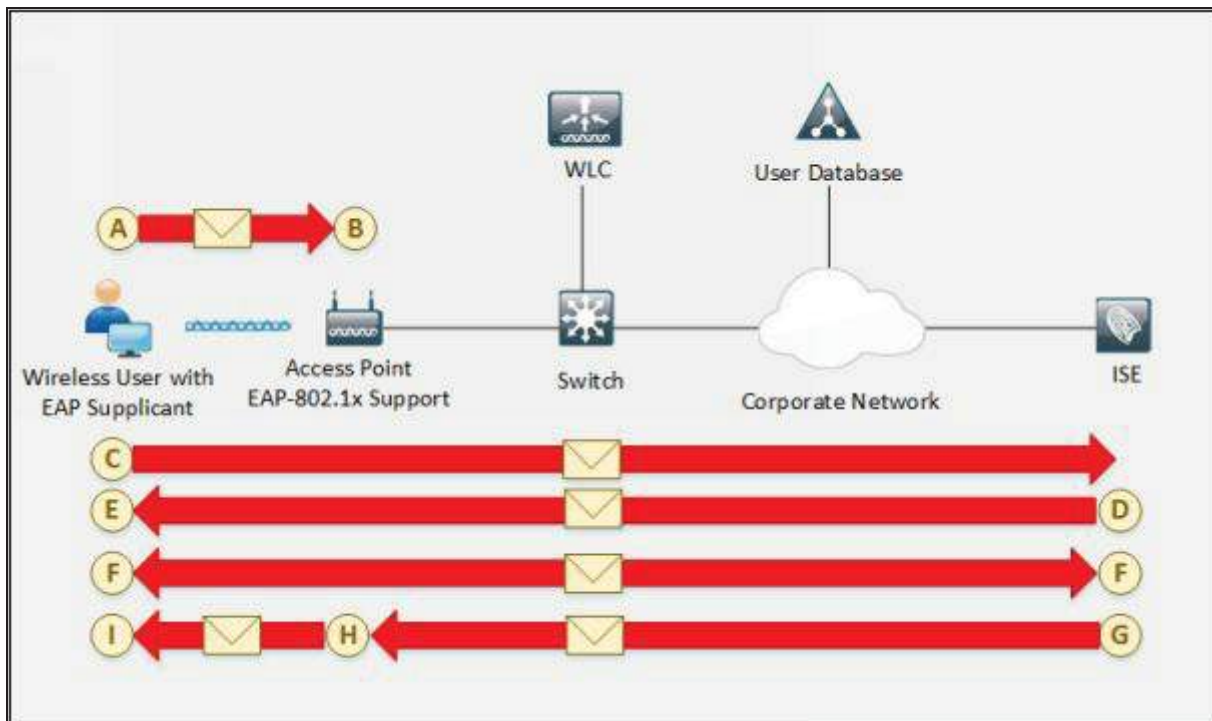


Figure 16-6. IEEE 802.1x-EAP Authentication Flow

Wireless 802.1x –EAP Authentication Flow

- A. In the above figure, Wireless User with EAP Supplicant connects the network to access the resources through an Access Point.
- B. As it connects, and link turns up, the Access point will block all traffic from the recently connected device until this user logs in to the network.
- C. A user with EAP Supplicant provide login Credentials that commonly are Username and Password, but it can be User ID and One-Time password or combination of User ID and Certificate. When User provides login credentials, these credentials are authenticated by the Authentication server that is RADIUS server.
- D. Mutual Authentication is performing at point D and E between the authentication server and Client. This is a two-phase authentication process. At first phase, the server authenticates User.
- E. At the second phase, User authenticates Server or vice versa.
- F. After the mutual authentication process, mutual determination of WEP key between server and client is performed. The client will save this session key.

- G. RADIUS authentication server sends this session key to the Access point.
- H. In the end, Access point now encrypts the Broadcast key with the session key and send the encrypted key to the client.
- I. The client already has Session key, which will use for decryption of encrypted broadcast key packet. Now Client can communicate with the Access point using session and broadcast keys.

Wi-Fi Chalking

Wi-Fi Chalking includes several methods to detect open wireless networks. These techniques include: -

- **WarWalking:** Walking around to detect open Wi-Fi networks
- **WarChalking:** Using Symbol and Signs to advertise Open Wi-Fi networks
- **WarFlying:** Detection of open Wi-Fi networks using Drones
- **WarDriving:** Driving around to detect Open Wi-Fi networks

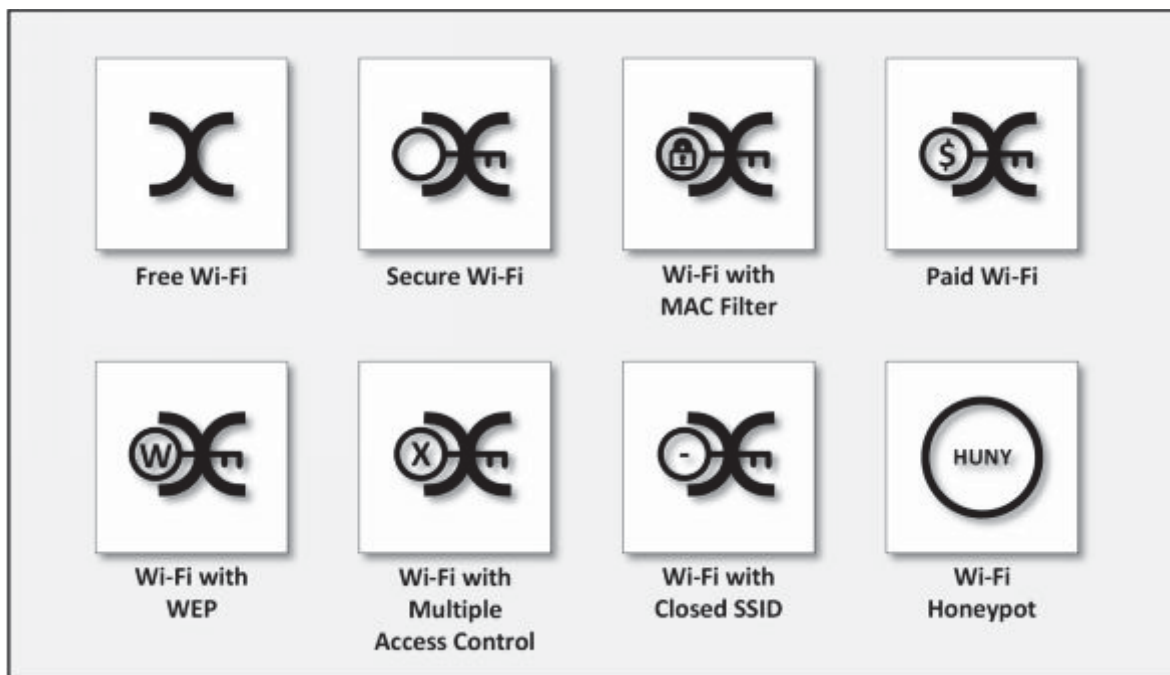


Figure 16-7. Wi-Fi Symbols

Types of Wireless Antenna

Directional Antenna

Directional antennas are designed to function in a specific direction to improve the efficiency of the antenna while communication by reducing the interference. Most common type of directional antenna is a "Dish" use with satellite TV and internet. Other types of directional antennas are Yagi antenna, Quad antenna, Horn antenna, Billboard antenna, and Helical antenna.

Omnidirectional Antenna

An omnidirectional antenna is those antennas that radiate uniformly in all directions. The radiation pattern is often described as Doughnut shaped. Most common use of Omnidirectional antennas is in radio broadcasting, cell phone, and GPS. Types of the Omnidirectional antenna includes Dipole antenna and Rubber Ducky antenna.

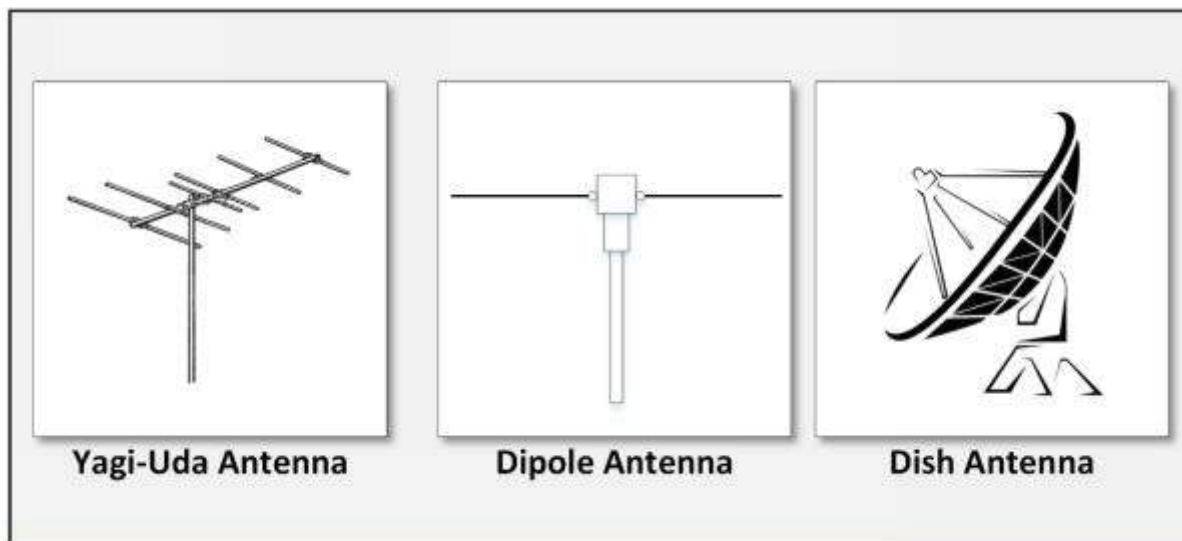


Figure 16-8. Types of Antenna

Parabolic Antenna

Parabolic Antenna, as defined with the name is depend upon parabolic reflector. The curved surface of parabola directs the radio waves. Most popular type of parabolic antenna is called Dish Antenna or Parabolic Dish. Use of parabolic antennas is in Radars, weather detection, satellite television, etc.

Yagi Antenna

Yagi-Uda antenna that is commonly known as Yagi antenna is the type of directional antenna is comprised of Parasitic elements and driven elements. It is lightweight, inexpensive and simple to construct. It is used as a terrestrial

television antenna, point-to-point fixed communication in radar antenna, etc.

Dipole Antenna

The dipole antenna is the simplest antenna consisting of two identical dipoles. One side is connected to the feedline whereas another is connected to the ground. Most popular use of Dipole antenna is in FM receiving antenna and TV antenna.

Wireless Encryption

WEP Encryption

Wired Equivalent Privacy (WEP) is an oldest and weakest encryption protocol. It was developed to ensure the security of wireless protocols however it is highly vulnerable. It uses 24-bit initialization vector (IV) to create a stream cipher RC4 with Cyclic Redundant Check (CRC) to ensure confidentiality and integrity. Standard 64-bit WEP uses the 40-bit key, 128-bit WEP uses 104-bit key and 256-bit WEP uses a 232-bit key. Authentications used with WEP are Open System authentication and Shared Key authentication.

Working of WEP Encryption

Initialization Vector (IV) and Key together is called WEP Seed. This WEP Seed is used to form RC4 Key. RC4 generates a pseudorandom stream of bits. This pseudorandom stream is XORed with the Plain text to encrypt the data. CRC-32 Checksum is used to calculate the Integrity Check Value (ICV).

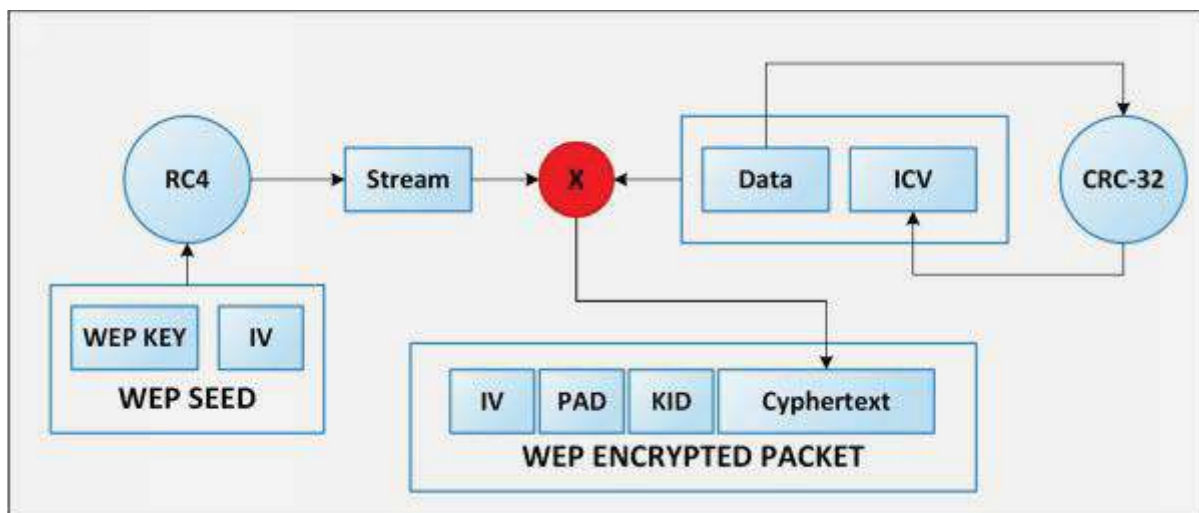


Figure 16-9. WEP Encryption Flow

Weak Initialization Vectors (IV)

One of the major issues with WEP is with Initialization Vector (IV). IV value is too small to protect from reuse and replay. RC4 Algorithm uses IV and Key to create a stream using Key Scheduling algorithm. Weak IV reveal information. Collection of weak IV will be the base key. WEP has no built-in provision to update key.

Breaking WEP Encryption

Breaking WEP encryption can be performed by following the steps mentioned below: -

1. Monitor the Access point channel.
2. Test Injection Capability to the Access point.
3. Use tool for Fake Authentication.
4. Sniff the packets using Wi-Fi Sniffing tools
5. Use Encryption tool to inject Encrypted packets.
6. Use the Cracking tool to extract the encryption key from IV.

WPA Encryption

Wi-Fi Protected Access (WPA) is another data encryption technique that is popularly used for WLAN network based on 802.11i Standards. This security protocol is developed by Wi-Fi Alliance to secure WLAN network as a solution of weakness and vulnerabilities found in Wired Equivalent Privacy (WEP). Deployment of WPA requires firmware upgrade for Wireless network interface cards that are designed for WEP. Temporal Key Integrity Protocol (TKIP) ensures per packet key by dynamically generating a new key for each packet of 128-bit to prevent a threat that is vulnerable to WEP. WPA also contain Message Integrity Check as a solution of Cyclic Redundancy Check (CRC) that is introduced in WEP to overcome the flaw of strong integrity validation.

Temporal Key Integrity Protocol

Temporal Key Integrity Protocol (TKIP) is a protocol that is used in IEEE 802.11i Wireless networks. This protocol is used in Wi-Fi Protected Access (WPA). TKIP has introduced three security features: -

1. Secret root key and Initialization Vector (IV) Mixing before RC4.
2. Sequence Counter to ensure receiving in order and prevent replay attacks.
3. 64-bit Message Integrity Check (MIC).

Working of WPA Encryption

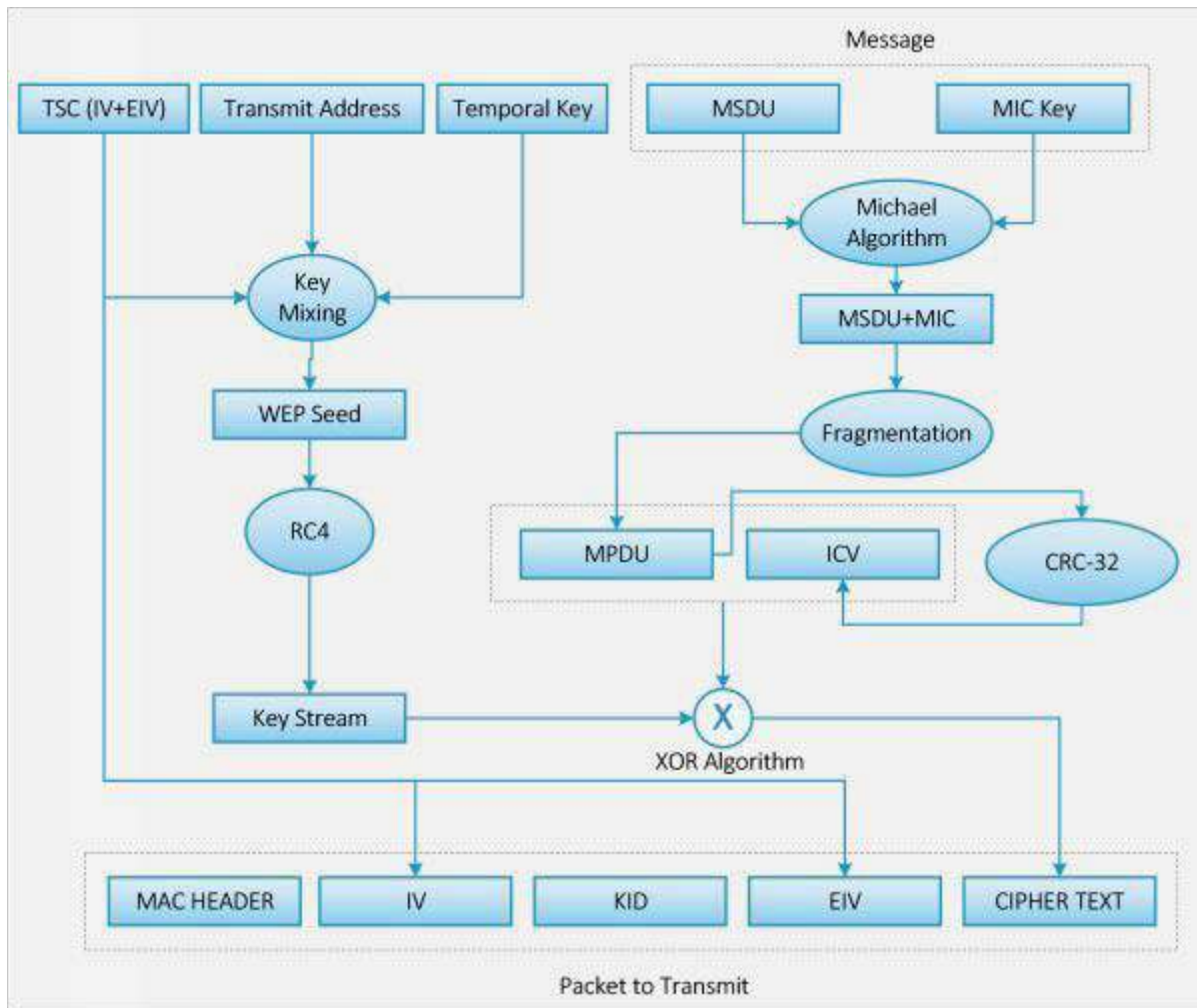


Figure 16-10. WPA Encryption Flow

1. Temporal Encryption Key, Transmit Address and TKIP Sequence number is initially mixed to create WEP seed before input to the RC4 algorithm.
2. WEP seed is input to the RC4 algorithm to create Key Stream.
3. MAC Service Data Unit (MSDU) and Message Integrity Check (MIC) are combined using Michael Algorithm.
4. The resultant of Michael Algorithm is fragmented to generate MAC Protocol Data Unit (MPDU).
5. 32-bit Integrity Check Value (ICV) is calculated for MPDU.
6. The combination of MPDU and ICV is XORed with the Key Stream created in the second step to create Ciphertext.

WPA2 Encryption

WPA2 is designed to overcome and replace WPA, providing, even more, better security using 192-bit encryption and individual encryption for each user to make it more complicated and harder to compromise. It uses Counter Mode Cipher Block Chaining Message Authentication Code Protocol (CCMP), and Advanced Encryption Standard (AES) based encryption. Wi-Fi Alliance also introduces next security protocol WPA3 in the year 2018 to overcome WPA2 with additional capabilities and security.

WPA2-Personal required a password (Pre-Shared Key) to protect the network from unauthorized access. In this mode, each wireless device is encrypting the traffic with a 128-bit derived key from the passphrase of 8 to 63 ASCII characters. WPA2-Enterprise includes EAP or RADIUS for a centralized authentication mechanism. Using this centralized authentication with additional authentication mechanisms such as Kerberos and Certificates, wireless networks can be more secure.

Breaking WPA Encryption

1. Brute Forcing the WPA PSK user-defined password using Dictionary Attack.
2. Capture the Authentication Handshaking packets of WPA/WPA2 to crack WPA Key offline.
3. Forcing the Connected client to disconnect and then reconnect to capture authentication packets to brute force the Pairwise Master key (PMK)

Wireless Threats

Access Control Attacks

Wireless Access Control Attack are those attacks by attacker penetrate the wireless network by evading access control parameter such as by spoofing MAC address, Rouge Access point, and misconfigurations, etc.

Integrity and Confidentiality Attacks

Integrity attacks include WEP injection. Data frame injection, replay attacks, and bit flipping, etc. Confidentiality attacks include traffic analysis, session hijacking, masquerading, cracking, MITM attacks, etc. in order to intercept the confidential information.

Availability Attacks

Availability attacks include Flooding and Denial of service attacks in order to prevent legitimate users from connecting or accessing the wireless network. Availability attacks can be made by Authentication flooding, ARP poisoning, De-authentication attacks, disassociation attack, etc.

Authentication Attacks

Authentication attack is intended to steal identity information or legitimate wireless client in order to gain access to the network by impersonating. It may include Password cracking techniques, identity theft, password guessing.

Rogue Access Point Attack

Rogue Access point attack is a technique in which a rogue access point in a place with a legitimate wireless network with the usually the same SSID. User assumes the rogue access point as the legitimate access point and connects with. Once a user is connected with the rogue access point, all traffic will direct through it, and the attacker sniffs the packet to monitor activity.

Client Mis-association

Client Mis-association includes a rogue access point outside the parameters of a corporate network. Once an employee is connected with it by bypassing the security policies, all traffic will be passing through the attacker.

Misconfigured Access Point Attack

Misconfigured access point attack include access to the legitimate access point by taking advantage of its misconfigurations. Misconfiguration may be like weak password, default password configuration, Wireless network without password protection, etc.

Unauthorized Association

The unauthorized association is another techniques user infected with Trojan are working as an access point which allows the attacker to connect the corporate network through it. These Trojan enable the soft access point through the malicious scripting which allows the devices such as a laptop to turn their WLAN cards into transmitting a WLAN network.

Ad Hoc Connection Attack

Ad Hoc connection is insecure network because they do not provide strong authentication and encryption. An attacker may attempt to compromise the client in ad hoc mode.

Jamming Signal Attack

Signal Jamming attacks required high gain frequency signal which causes the Denial of service attack. Carrier Sense Multiple Access / Collision Avoidance algorithm requires waiting time to transmit after detection of a collision.

Wireless Hacking Methodology

Wi-Fi Discovery

The first step in hacking a Wireless network in order to compromise it is to get information about it. This information can be collected by Active footprinting, passive footprinting method as well using different tools. Passive footprinting includes sniffing the packets using tools such as “Airwaves,” “NetSurveyor” and other tools to reveal information such as Live wireless networks around. Active footprinting includes probing the Access point to gain information. In Active footprinting, the attacker sends a probe request, and access point sends probe response.

GPS Mapping

GPS mapping is the process to create a list of discovered Wi-Fi networks to create records using GPS. GPS trace the location of discovered Wi-Fi. This information can be used for selling to the attacker or hacking communities.

Wireless Traffic Analysis

Traffic analysis of Wireless network includes capturing the packet to reveal any information such as broadcast SSID, Authentication methods, Encryption techniques, etc. There are several tools available to capture and analyze the wireless network such as Wireshark/Pilot tool, Omni peek, Commview, etc.

Launch Wireless Attacks

An attacker, using the tool, such as Aircrack-ng and other attacks such as ARP poisoning, MITM, Fragmentation, MAC Spoofing, De-authentication, Disassociation, and rogue access point to initiate the attack on a wireless network.

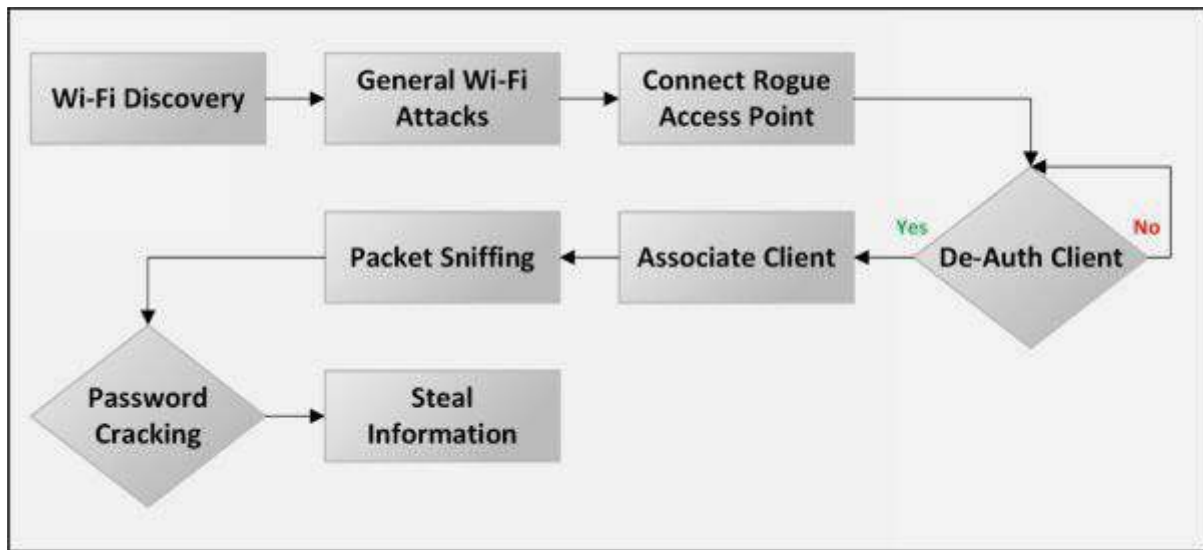


Figure 16-11. Wi-Fi Pen Testing Framework

Bluetooth Hacking

Bluetooth hacking refers to the attacks on Bluetooth- based communication. Bluetooth is a popular wireless technology which can be seen on almost every mobile device. Bluetooth technology is used for short-range communication between the devices. Bluetooth operates at 2.4 GHz frequency and can be effective up to 10 meters.

Bluetooth discovery feature enables the devices to be discoverable by another Bluetooth enabled devices. Discovery feature may be enabled for all the time as well as set up to be discoverable for a short period of time.

Bluetooth Attacks

BlueSmacking

BlueSmack is the type of DoS attack for Bluetooth. In BlueSmacking, the target device is overflowed by the random packets. Ping of death is used to launch this Bluetooth attack, by flooding a large number of echo packets causes DoS.

BlueBugging

BlueBugging is another type of Bluetooth attack in which an attacker exploits Bluetooth device to gain access and compromise its security. Basically, BlueBugging is a technique to access the Bluetooth enabled device remotely. The attacker uses this to track victim, access the contact list, messages and other personal information.

BlueJacking

BlueJacking is an art to send unsolicited messages to Bluetooth enabled devices. BlueJacking hacker can send messages, images and other files to another Bluetooth device.

BluePrinting

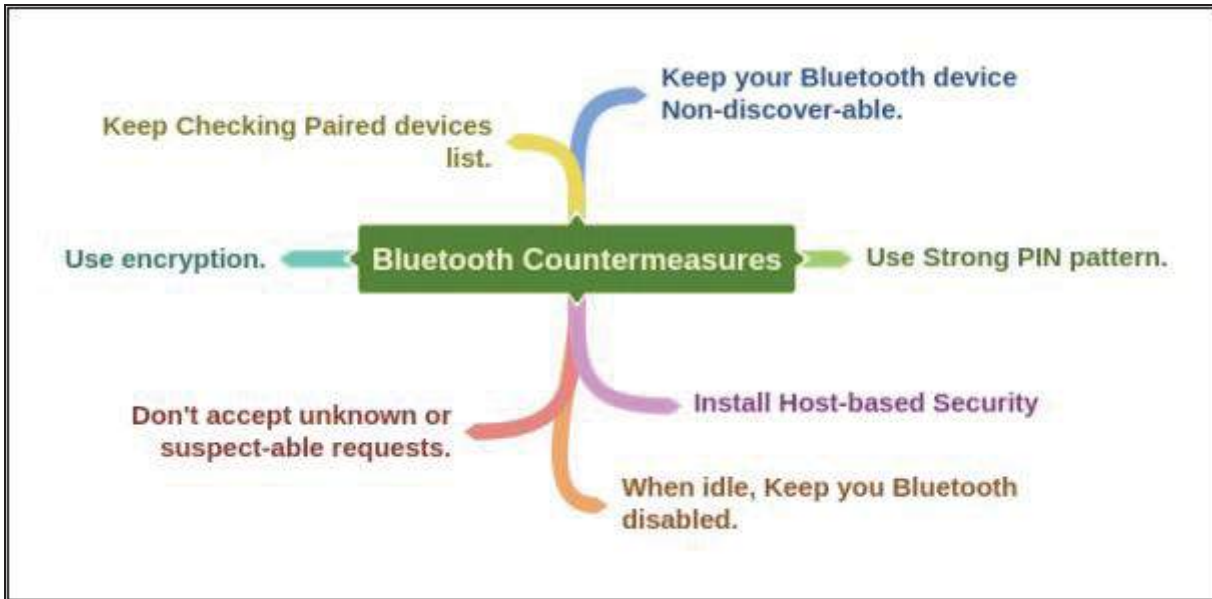
BluePrinting is a technique or a method for extracting the information and details about a remote Bluetooth device. This information may be used for exploiting. Information such as firmware information, manufacturers information, and device model, etc. can be extracted.

BlueSnarfing

BlueSnarfing is another technique in which attacker theft the information from Bluetooth enabled devices. In BlueSnarfing, attackers exploit the

security vulnerabilities of Bluetooth software and access Bluetooth enabled devices and steal information such as contact list, text messages, email, etc.

Bluetooth Countermeasures



Wireless Security Tools

Wireless Intrusion Prevention Systems

Wireless Intrusion Prevention System (WIPS) is a network device for wireless networks. It monitors the wireless network and protect it against unauthorized access points and perform automatic intrusion prevention. By monitoring the radio spectrum, it prevents rogue access points and generates alerts for network administrator about detection. Fingerprinting approach helps to avoid devices with spoofed MAC addresses. WIPS is consists of three components, Server, Sensor, and Console. Rogue access points misconfigured APs, Client misconfiguration, MITM, Ad hoc networks, MAC Spoofing, Honeypots, DoS attack can be mitigated using WIPS.

Wi-Fi Security Auditing Tool

Using Wireless Security tools is another approach to protect wireless networks. These security software's provides wireless network auditing, troubleshooting, detection, intrusion prevention, threat mitigation, rogue detection, day-zero threat protection, forensic investigation and compliance reporting. Some of the popular Wi-Fi security tools are as below: -

- AirMagnet WiFi Analyzer
- Motorola's AirDefense Services Platform (ADSP)
- Cisco Adaptive Wireless IPS
- Aruba RFProtect

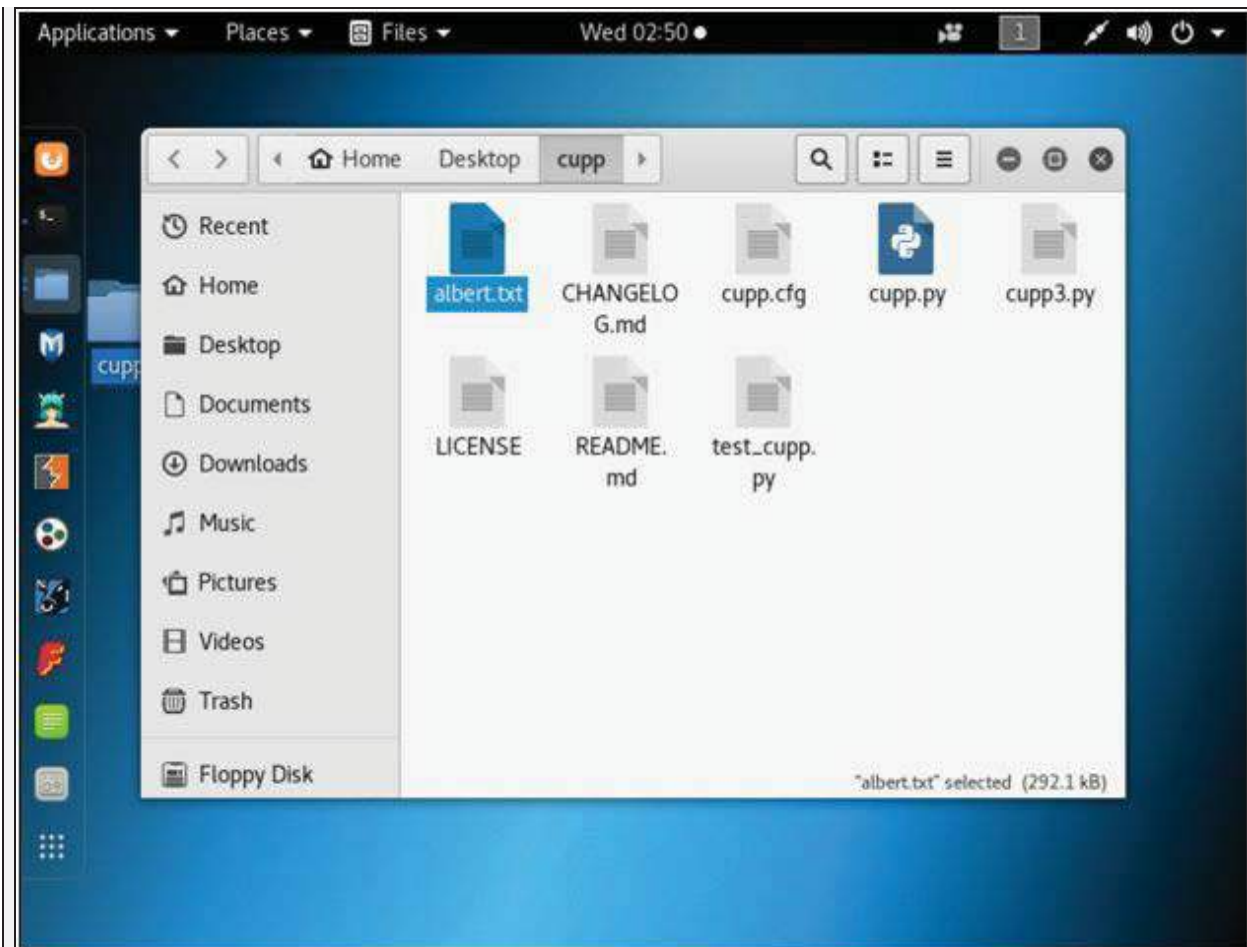


Figure 16-16. Password file albert.txt

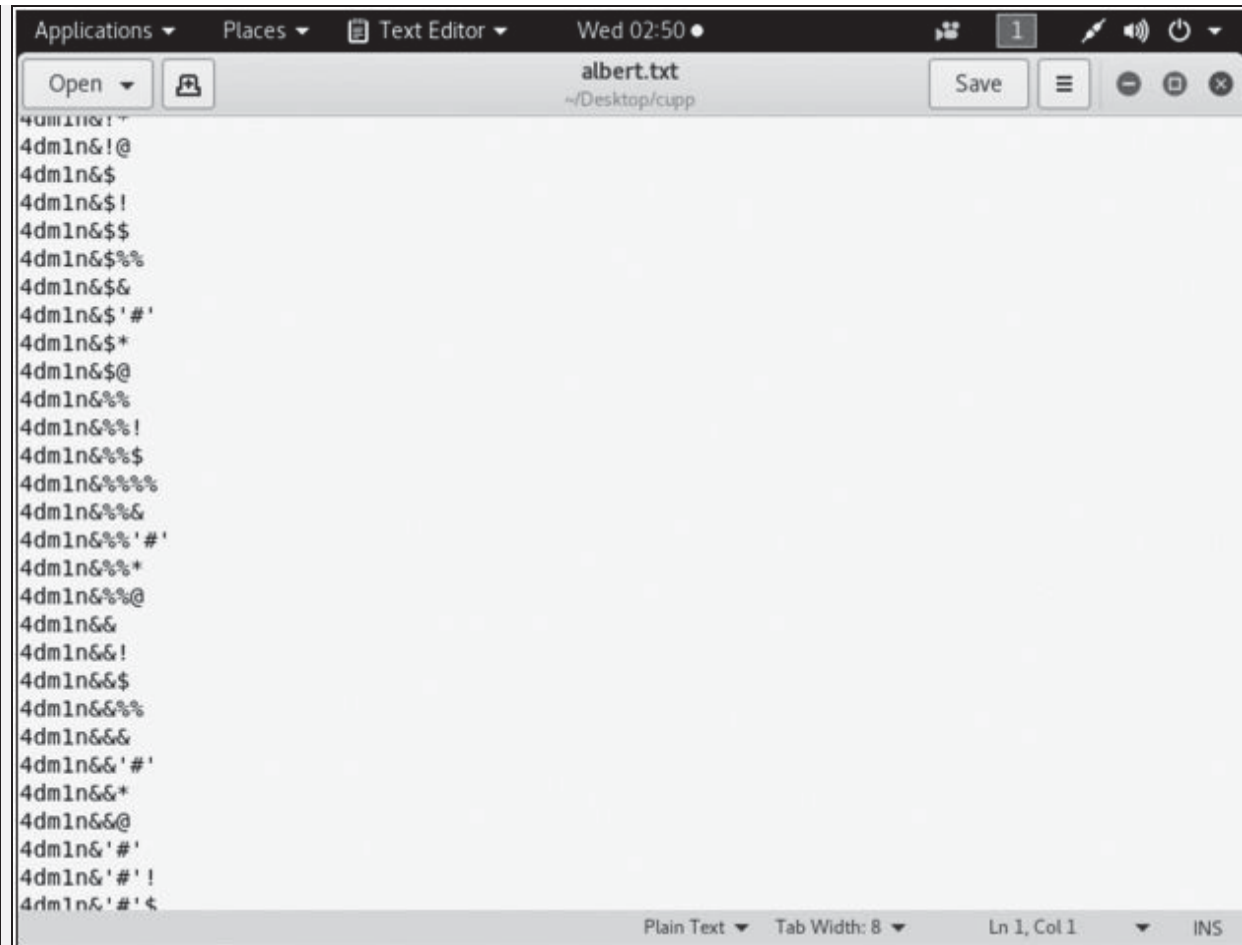


Figure 16-17. Possible combinations



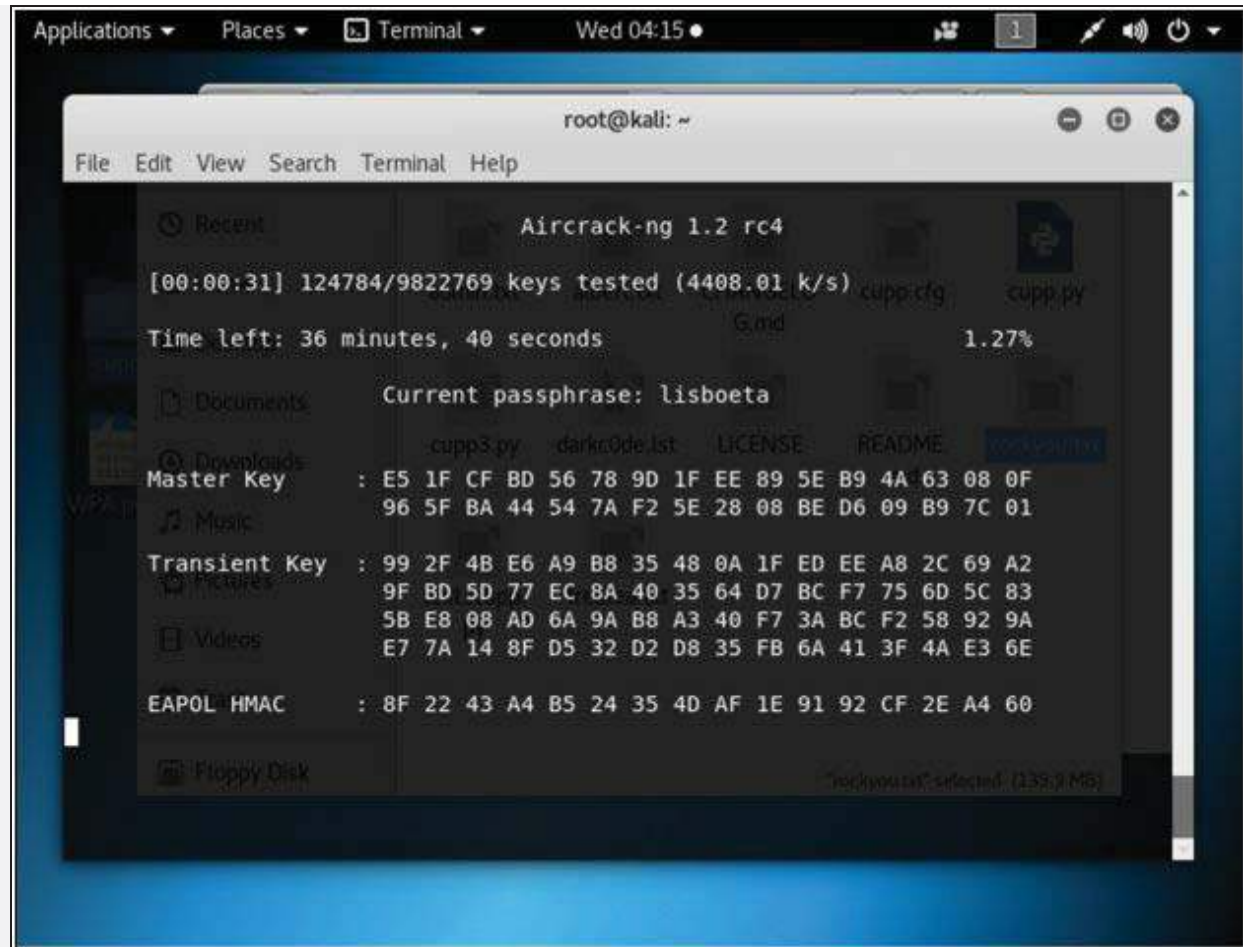


Figure 16-19. Cracking Password

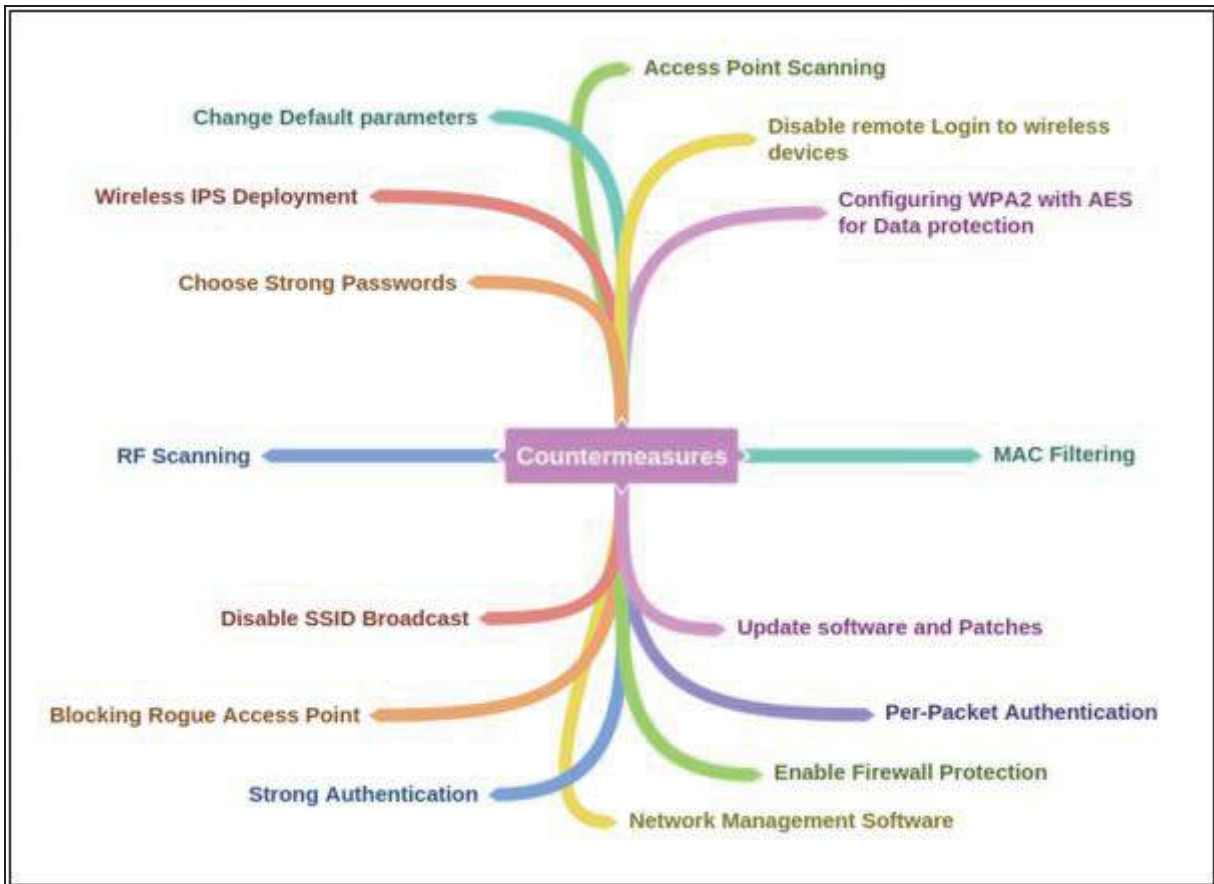

Technology Brief

Application Sandboxing Issue

Sandboxing is one of the most important key components of security. It supports security as an integrated component in a security solution. Sandboxing feature is much different from other traditional anti-virus and antimalware mechanisms. Sandboxing technology offers enhanced protection by analysis of emerging threats, malware, malicious applications, etc. in a sophisticated environment with in-depth visibility and more granular control. However, the advanced malicious application may be designed to bypass the sandboxing technology. Fragmented codes and script with sleep timer are the common techniques that are adopted by the attacker to bypass the inspection process.

Mobile Spam and Phishing

Mobile Spamming is a spamming technique for the mobile platform in which unsolicited messages or emails are sent to the targets. These spams contain malicious links to reveal sensitive information. Similarly, phishing attacks are also performed because of ease to setup and difficult to stop. Messages and email with prize-winning notifications and cash winning stories are the most commonly known spams. An attacker may either ask for credentials on a phone call, message or redirect the user to malicious website, or

compromised legitimate website through a link in a spam message or email.

Open Wi-Fi and Bluetooth Networks

Public Wi-Fi, Unencrypted Wi-Fi and Bluetooth networks are another easy way for an attacker to intercept the communication and reveal information. Users connected to public Wi-Fi intentionally or unintentionally may be a victim. BlueBugging, BlueSnarfing and Packet Sniffing are the common attacks on open wireless connections.

Hacking Android OS

Introduction to Android Operating System

Android is an operating system for Smartphones developed by Google. Android is not only for Smartphones but also gaming consoles, PCs, and other IoT devices. Android OS brings flexible features, with an open source platform. Wide support application and integration with different hardware and services are the major features of this operating systems. The Android operating system has since gone through multiple major releases, with the current version being 8.1 "Oreo," released in December 2017.

A popular feature of Android is its flexibility of third-party applications. Users can download and install and remove these applications (APK) file from application stores or from the internet. however, this might be a security risk because of open source nature; this third-party application may include a number of applications that are violating the policy of a trusted application. A lot of Android hacking tools, mentioned in this workbook are also not available at the play store.

Device Administration API

Device Administration API is introduced in Android 2.2. Device Administration API ensures device administration at the system level, offering control over Android devices within a corporate network. Using these security-aware applications, the administrator can perform several actions including wiping the device remotely. Here are examples of the types of applications that might use the Device Administration API:

- Email clients.
- Security applications can do a remote wipe.
- Device management services and applications.

Root Access / Android Rooting

Rooting is basically a process of gaining privileged control over a device, commonly known as Root access. In the Android operating system, rooting is the same process of gaining privileged access to an Android device such as a smartphone, tablet, etc., over subsystems. As mentioned earlier, Android is modified version of Linux kernel; root access gives "Superuser" permissions. Root access is basically required to modify the settings and configurations that require administrator privileges however it can be used to alter the

system applications and settings to overcome limitations and restrictions. Once you have root access, you have full control over kernel and applications. This rooting can be used for malicious intentions such as the installation of malicious applications, assigning excessive permissions, installation of custom firmware.

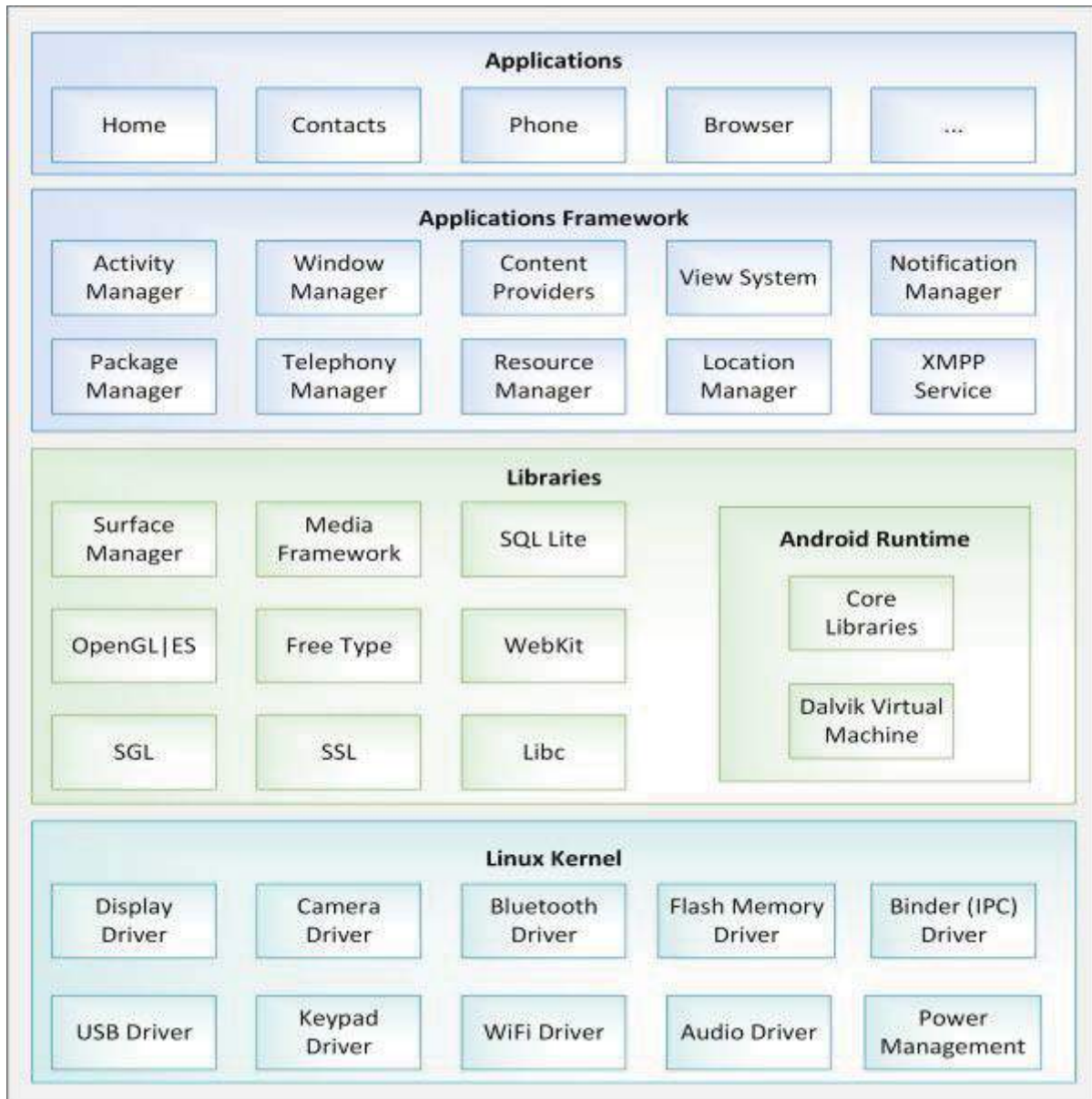


Figure 17-01. Android Framework

Hacking iOS

iPhone Operating System

The operating system developed for the iPhones by Apple, Inc. is known as iOS. It is the another most popular operating system for mobile devices including iPhones, iPads, and iPods. The user interface in an iOS is based upon direct manipulation using multi-touch gestures. Major iOS versions are released annually. The current version, iOS 11, was released on September 19, 2017. iOS uses hardware-accelerated AES-256 encryption and other additional encryption to encrypt data. iOS also isolates the application from other applications. Applications are not allowed to access the other apps data.

Jailbreaking iOS

Jailbreaking is the concept of breaking the restriction "Jail." Jailbreaking is a form of rooting resulting in privilege escalation. iOS jailbreaking is the process of escalating the privileges on iOS devices intended to either remove or bypass the factory default restrictions on software by using kernel patches or device customization. Jailbreaking allows the root access to an iOS device which allows downloading unofficial applications. Jailbreaking is popular for removing restrictions, installation of additional software, malware injection, and software piracy.

Types of Jailbreaking

Basically, iOS Jailbreaking is categorized into three types depending upon privilege levels, exploiting system vulnerability, a vulnerability in first and third bootloader, etc. Userland exploits and iBoot exploit can be patched by Apple.

1. Userland Exploit

A Userland exploit is a type of iOS jailbreaking which allow User-level access without escalating to about-level access.

2. iBoot Exploit

An iBoot exploit is a type of iOS jailbreaking which allow User-level access and boot-level access.

3. Bootrom Exploit

A bootrom exploit is a type of iOS jailbreaking which allow User-level access and boot-level access.

Jailbreaking Techniques

1. Tethered Jailbreaking

In Tethered Jailbreaking, when the iOS device is rebooted, it will no longer have a patched kernel. It may have stuck in a partially started state. With Tethered Jailbreaking, a computer is required to boot the device each time; i.e., the device is re-jailbroken each time. Using Jailbreaking tool, the device is started with the patched kernel.

2. Semi-tethered Jailbreaking

Semi-tethered Jailbreaking technique is another solution in between Tethered and Untethered Jailbreaking. Using this technique, when the device is a boot, it does not have patched kernel but able to complete the startup process and entertain normal functions. Any modification will require startup with patched kernel by jailbreaking tools.

3. Untethered Jailbreaking

In Untethered jailbreaking, Device is booted completely. While booting, Kernel will be patched without any requirement of the computer thus enabling the user to boot without a computer. This technique is harder to attempt.

Hacking Windows Phone OS

Windows Phone (WP) is another operating system in the OS family, developed by Microsoft. Windows phone was the first to launch with Windows Phone 7. Windows 7 issue was fixed by later release 7.5 Mango which has very low hardware requirement of 800MHz CPU and 256 MB Ram. Windows 7 devices are not capable of upgrading to Windows 8 due to hardware limitations. Windows 8, 8.1 release in 2014 is eliminated by Windows 10 released in 2017.

Windows Phone

Windows Phone 8 is the second- generation Windows phone from Microsoft. Windows Phone 8 replaces the Windows CE based architecture that was used in Windows 7. Windows Phone 8 devices are manufactured not only by Microsoft but Nokia, HTC, Samsung, and Huawei as well. Windows Phone 8 is the first mobile OS launched by Microsoft using the Windows NT kernel. Improvement of the file system, drivers, security, media, and graphics is featured in windows phone 8. Windows Phone 8 is capable of supporting multi-core CPUs up to 64 cores. It is also capable of supporting 1280×720 and 1280×768 resolutions. Windows Phone 8 also supports native 128-bit Bit locker encryption and Secure Boot. Windows Phone 8 also supports NTFS due to this switch. Internet Explorer 10 is the default browser in windows 8 phones. Windows Phone 8 uses true multitasking, allowing developers to create apps that can run in the background and resume instantly.

Some other measure features of Windows Phone 8 include: -

- Native code support (C++)
- NFC
- Remote Device Management
- VoIP and Video Chat integration
- UEFI and Firmware over the air for Windows Phone updates
- App Sandboxing

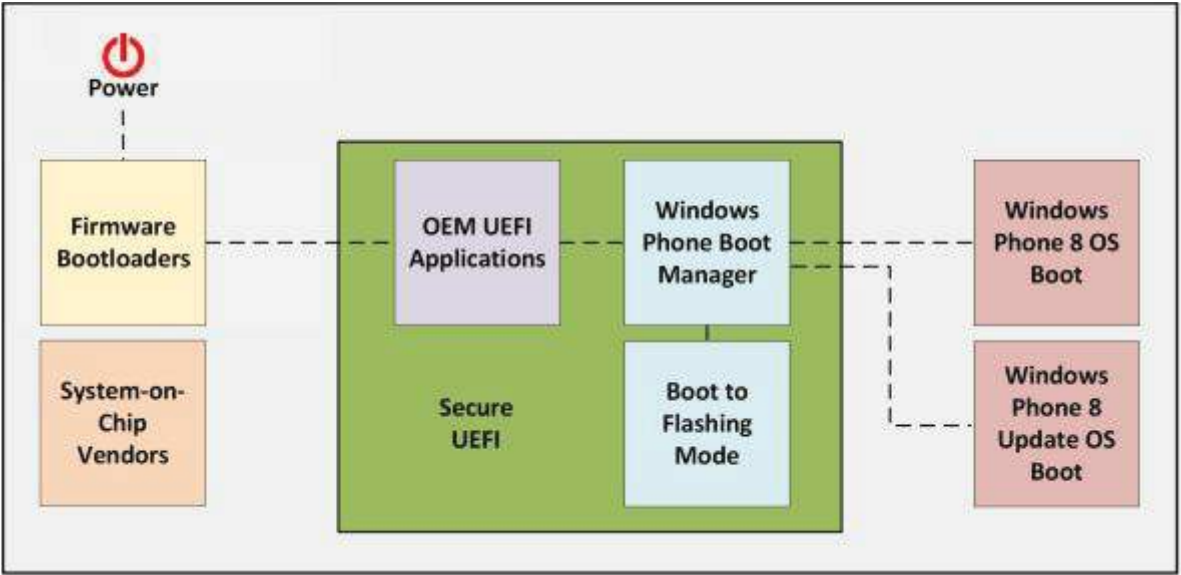


Figure 17-03. Windows 8 Secure Boot Process

Hacking BlackBerry

Blackberry is another smartphone company that is formerly known as Research-In-Motion (RIM) limited. Blackberry was considered as a most prominent and secure mobile phone. The operating system of Blackberry phone is known as Blackberry OS.

BlackBerry Operating System

Blackberry OS is the operating system of Blackberry phones. It provides multitasking with special input supports such as trackwheel, trackball, and most recently, the trackpad and touchscreen. Blackberry OS is best known for its features such as its native support for corporate emails, Java Based application framework, i.e., Java Micro Edition MIDP 1.0 and MIDP 2.0. Updates to the operating system may be automatically available from wireless carriers that support the BlackBerry over the air software loading (OTASL) service.

BlackBerry Attack Vectors

Malicious Code Signing

Malicious Code Signing is the process of obtaining a code-signing key from the code signing service. An attacker may create a malicious application with the help of code signing keys obtained by manipulating the information such as using anonymously using prepaid credit-cards and fake details and publish the malicious application on Blackberry App world. Blackberry App world is official application distribution service. User downloads this malicious application which directs the traffic to the attacker.

JAD File Exploit

Java Application Description (.jad) files contain attributes if Java application. These attributes include information and details about the application including URL to download the application. An attacker can trick to installed malicious .jad file on victim device. This crafted .jad file with spoofed information can be installed by the user. A malicious application can also be crafted for a Denial-of-Service attack.

Mobile Device Management (MDM)

Mobile Device Management Concept

The basic purpose of implementing mobile device management (MDM) is deployment, maintenance, and monitoring of mobile devices that make up BYOD solution. Devices may include the laptops, smartphones, tablets, notebooks or any other electronic device that can be moved outside the corporate office to home or some public place and then gets connected to corporate office by some means. The following are some of the functions provided by MDM:

- Enforcing a device to be locked after certain login failures.
- Enforcement of strong password policy for all BYOD devices.
- MDM can detect any attempt of hacking BYOD devices and then limit the network access of these affected devices.
- Enforcing confidentiality by using encryption as per organization's policy.
- Administration and implementation of *Data Loss Prevention (DLP)* for BYOD devices. It helps to prevent any kind of data loss due to end user's carelessness.

MDM Deployment Methods

Generally, there are two types of MDM deployment, namely:

On-site MDM deployment: On-site/premises MDM deployment involves installation of MDM application on local servers inside the corporate data center or offices and its management is done by local staff available on the site.

The major advantage of On-site MDM is granular control over the management of the BYOD devices, which increases the security to some extent.

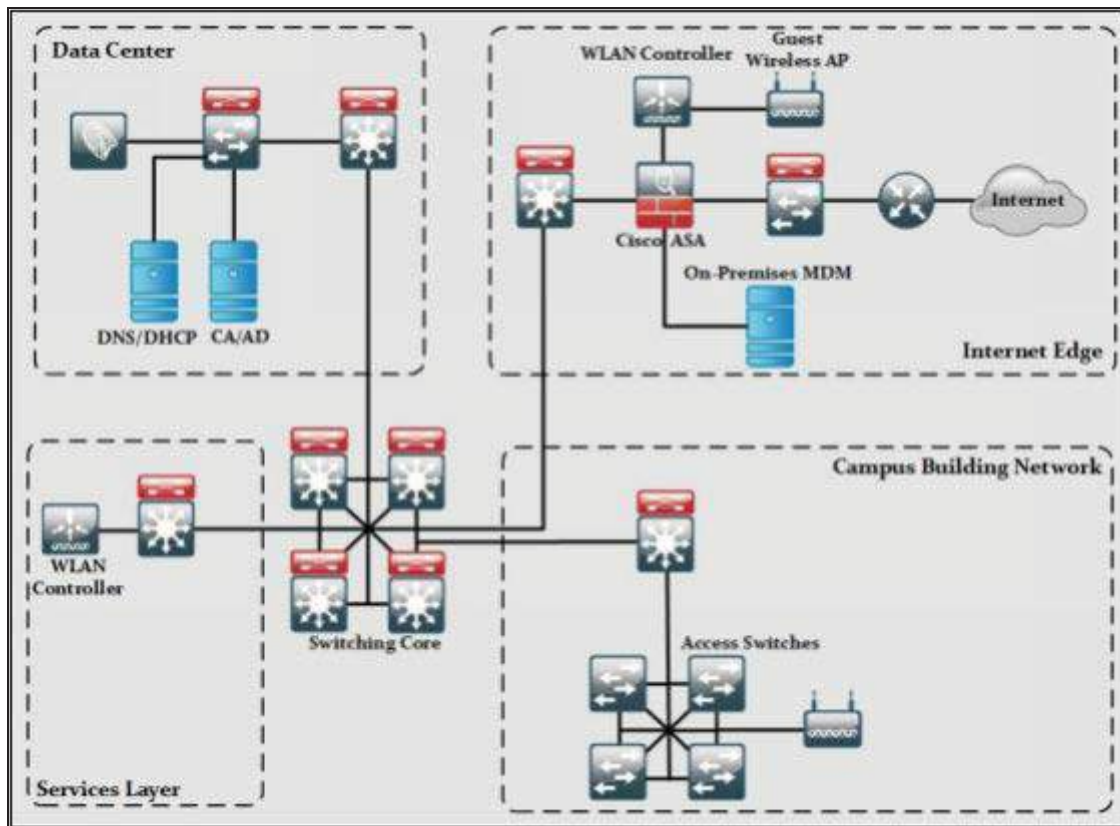


Figure 17-04. On-Premises MDM High-Level Deployment Architecture

The on-site/premises MDM solution consists of the following architecture:

- **Data Center:** may include ISE, DHCP, and DNS servers to support certain services apart from distribution and core switches. ISE is used to provide the enforcement of organization's security policies. DNS/DHCP servers are used to provide the network connectivity. Similarly, CA and AD servers can also be used to provide access only to users with valid authentication credentials.
- **Internet Edge:** The basic purpose of this architecture is to provide connectivity to the public internet. This layer includes Cisco ASA firewall to filter and monitor all the traffic ingress and egress towards the public internet. Wireless LAN Controller (WLC) along with Access Points (APs) are also present in internet edge to support guest users. One of the key components at internet edge is On-premises MDM solution, which maintains policies and configuration settings of all BYOD devices, connected to the corporate network.
- **Services Layer:** This layer contains WLC for all the APs used by users within a corporate environment. Any other service required by

corporate users like NTP and its supporting servers can be found in this section.

- **Core Layer:** Just like every other design, the core is the focal point of the whole network regarding routing of traffic in a corporate network environment.

- **Campus Building:** A distribution layer switch acts as ingress/egress point for all traffic in a campus building. Users can connect to campus building by connecting to access switches or wireless access points (APs).

Cloud-based MDM deployment: In this type of deployment, MDM application software is installed and maintained by some outsourced managed services provider.

One of the main advantages of this kind of setup is the less administrative load on customer's end as deployment and maintenance is totally the responsibility of service provider.

The cloud-based MDM deployment is consists of the following components, as depicted in the figure:

- **Data Center:** may include ISE, DHCP, and DNS servers to support certain services apart from distribution and core switches. ISE is used to provide the enforcement of organization's security policies. DNS/DHCP servers are used to provide the network connectivity. Similarly, CA and AD servers can also be used to provide access only to users with valid authentication credentials.

- **Internet edge:** the Basic purpose of this section is to provide connectivity to the public internet. This layer includes Cisco ASA firewall to filter and monitor all the traffic ingress and egress towards the public internet. Wireless LAN Controller (WLC) along with Access Points (APs) are also present in internet edge to support guest users.

- **WAN:** The WAN module in cloud-based MDM deployment provides MPLS VPN connectivity from branch office to corporate office, internet access from branch offices and connectivity to cloud-based MDM application software. Cloud-based MDM solution maintains policies and configuration settings of all BYOD devices connected to the corporate network.

- **WAN edge:** This component act as a focal point of all ingress/egress

MPLS WAN traffic entering from and going to branch offices.

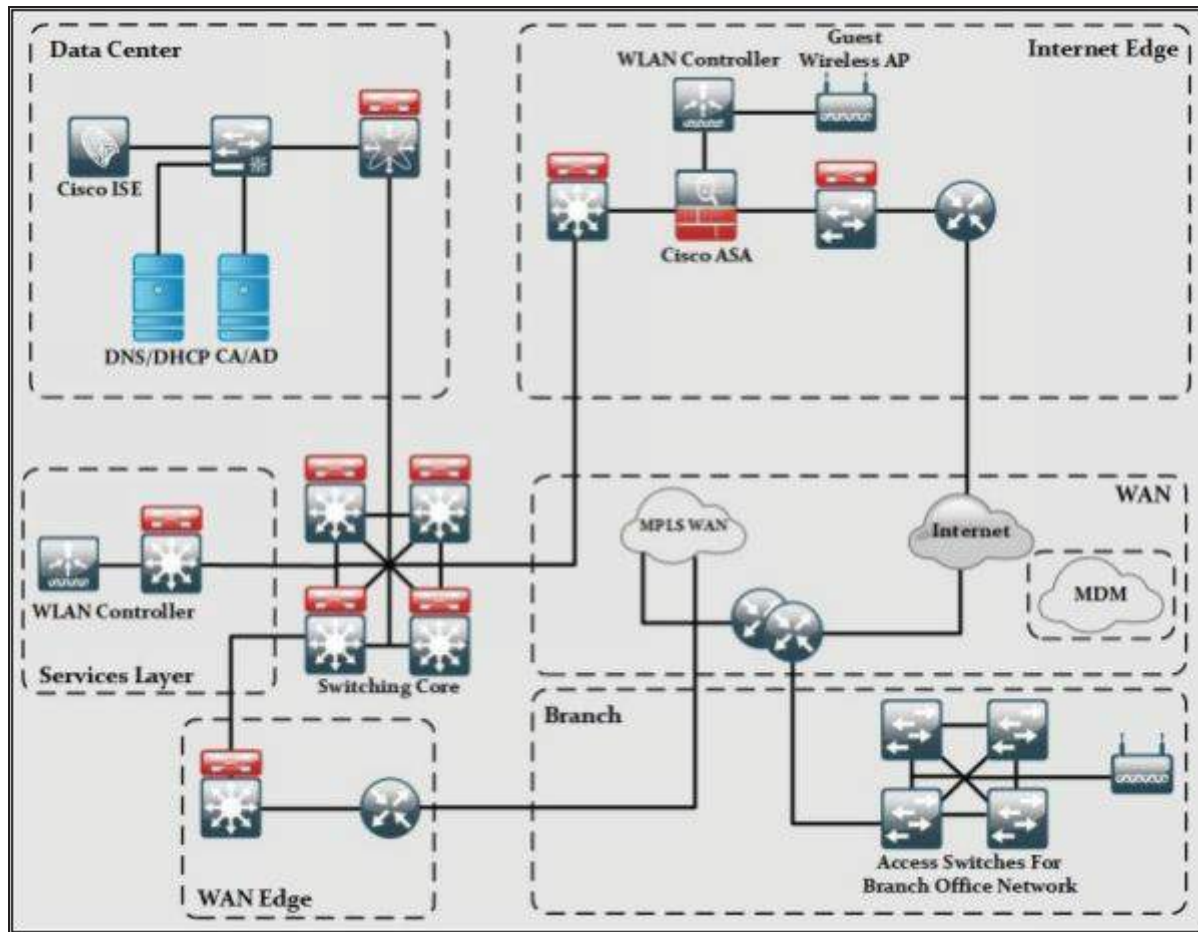


Figure 17-05. Cloud-Based MDM Deployment High-Level Architecture

- **Services:** This layer contains WLC for all the APs used by users within a corporate environment. Any other service required by corporate users like NTP and its supporting servers can also be found in this section.
- **Core Layer:** Just like every other design, the core is the focal point of the whole network regarding routing of traffic in a corporate network environment.
- **Branch offices:** This component is comprised of few routers acting as focal point of ingress and egress traffic out of branch offices. Users can connect to branch office network by connecting to access switches or wireless access points (APs).

Bring Your Own Device (BYOD)

In this section, the importance of *Bring Your Own Device (BYOD)* and its high-level architecture will be discussed. Apart from BYOD, one of its management approach known as *Mobile Device Management (MDM)* will also be discussed.

Although the concept of BYOD facilitates the end users in some way, it also brings new challenges for network engineers and designers. The constant challenge that is faced by today's network designers to provide seamless connectivity while maintaining a good security posture of an organization. Organizations security policies must constantly be reviewed to make sure that bringing any outside device over the corporate network will not result in theft and comprise of organization's digital assets.

Some of the reasons that demand BYOD solutions to be implemented in an organization are:

- **A wide variety of consumer devices:** In the past, we were used to having only PCs constantly sitting on the table, and wired connection was the only preferred way of communication. In the 21st century, not only higher data rates have resulted in countless opportunities, but the variants of devices on the internet are also increased. If we look around, we see mobile devices like smartphones, tablets and even laptops which are constantly communicating with each other over some wired or wireless network. Employees may connect their smartphones to corporate networks during working hours and to the internet when they move to a home or some café. Such situations demand BYOD solution to be implemented in the corporate environment to stay safe from any kind of theft.
- **No, fix a time for Work:** In the past, we were used to following a strict 8-hour working environment. Now, we work during lunch, and even our working rosters get updated on weekly bases. Sometimes, we even work during the night to meet the deadlines.
- **Connecting to corporate from anywhere:** Employees also demand to connect to the corporate network anytime either they are at home or in some café. The emergence of wireless networks and mobile

networks like 3G/4G also enables them to connect even from the most remote location on earth.

BYOD Architecture Framework

There are rules in implementing BYOD in an organization. It depends on the company's policy about how flexible they are in accepting and enabling their employees to bring along different types of devices. Introducing BYOD in an organization may also result in implementing or deploying new software and hardware features to cater the security aspects of BYOD.

The Cisco BYOD framework is based on *Cisco Borderless Network Architecture*, and it tries to implement *best common practices (BCP)* in designing branch office, home office, and campus area networks.

This figure shows the Cisco BYOD architecture with a short explanation of each component in the coming section.

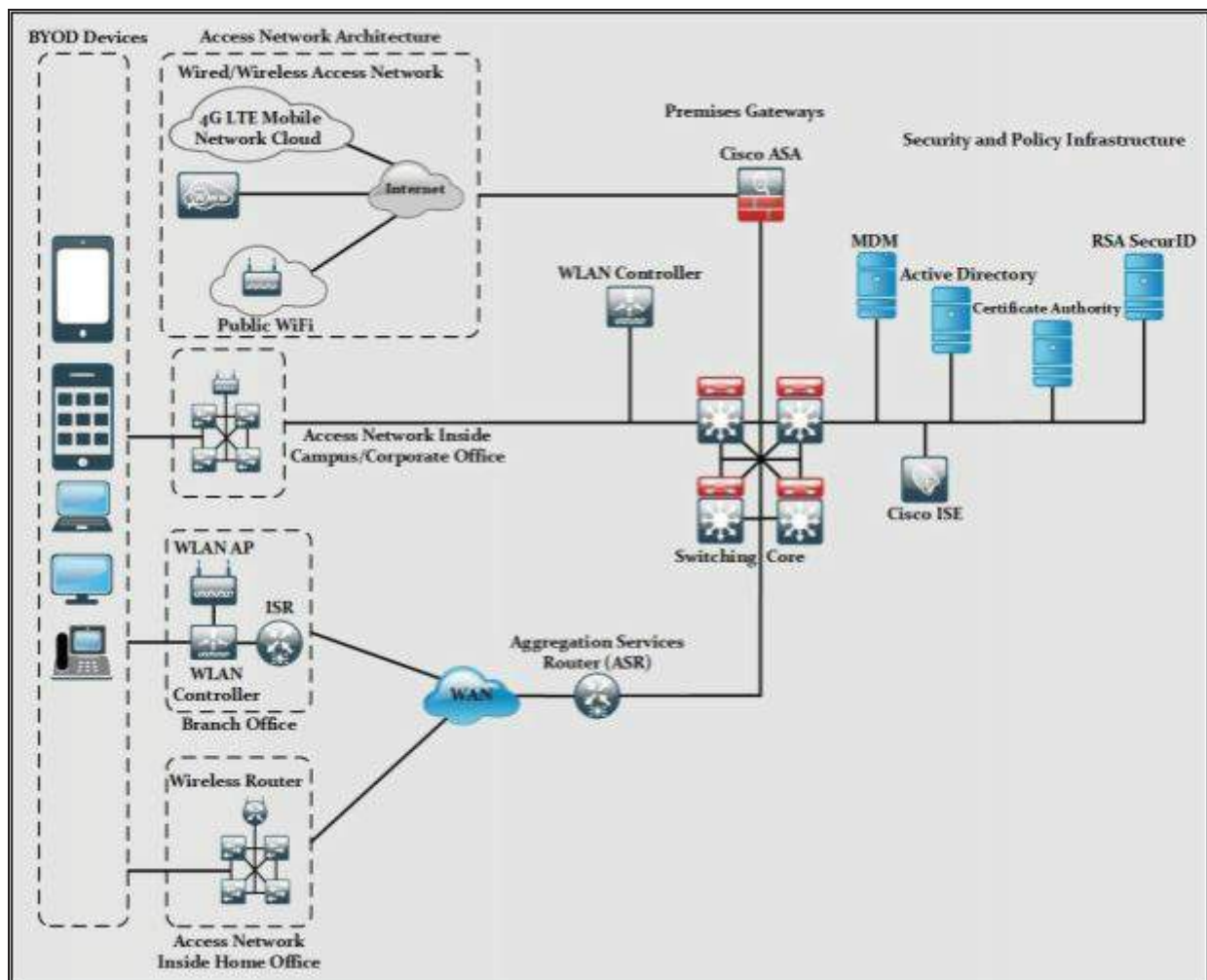


Figure 17-06. BYOD high-level architecture

BYOD Devices: These endpoint devices are required to access the corporate network for daily business need. BYOD devices may include both corporate and personally owned devices, regardless of their physical location. At day, they may be at the corporate office and at night, they may be some café or food restraint. Common BYOD devices include smartphones, laptops, etc.

Wireless Access Points (AP): Cisco wireless access points (APs) provide wireless connectivity to the corporate network for above defined BYOD devices. Access points are installed physically at the campus, branch office, or even at home office to facilitate the employees.

Wireless LAN Controllers: WLAN controllers provides centralized management and monitoring of Cisco WLAN solution. WLAN is integrated with *Cisco Identity Service Engine* to enforce the authorization and authentication of BYOD end-point devices.

Identity Service Engine (ISE): ISE is one of the most critical elements in Cisco BYOD architecture as it implements Authentication, Authorization, and Accounting on BYOD end-point devices.

Cisco AnyConnect Secure Mobility Client: Cisco AnyConnect Client software provides connectivity to the corporate network for end users. Its uses 802.1x features to provide access to campus, office or home office network. When end users need to connect to the public internet, AnyConnect uses VPN connection to make sure the confidentiality of corporate data.

Integrated Services Router (ISR): Cisco ISR routers are preferred in BYOD architecture for proving WAN and internet access for branch and home office networks. They are also used to provide VPN connectivity for mobile BYOD devices within an organization.

Aggregation Services Router (ASR): Cisco ASR routers provide WAN and internet access for corporate and campus networks. They also act as aggregation points for connections coming from the branch and home office to the corporate networks of Cisco BYOD solution.

Cloud Web Security (CWS): Cisco Cloud Web Security provides enhanced security for all BYOD devices which access the internet using public hotspots and 3G/4G networks.

Adaptive Security Appliance (ASA): Cisco ASA provides the standard

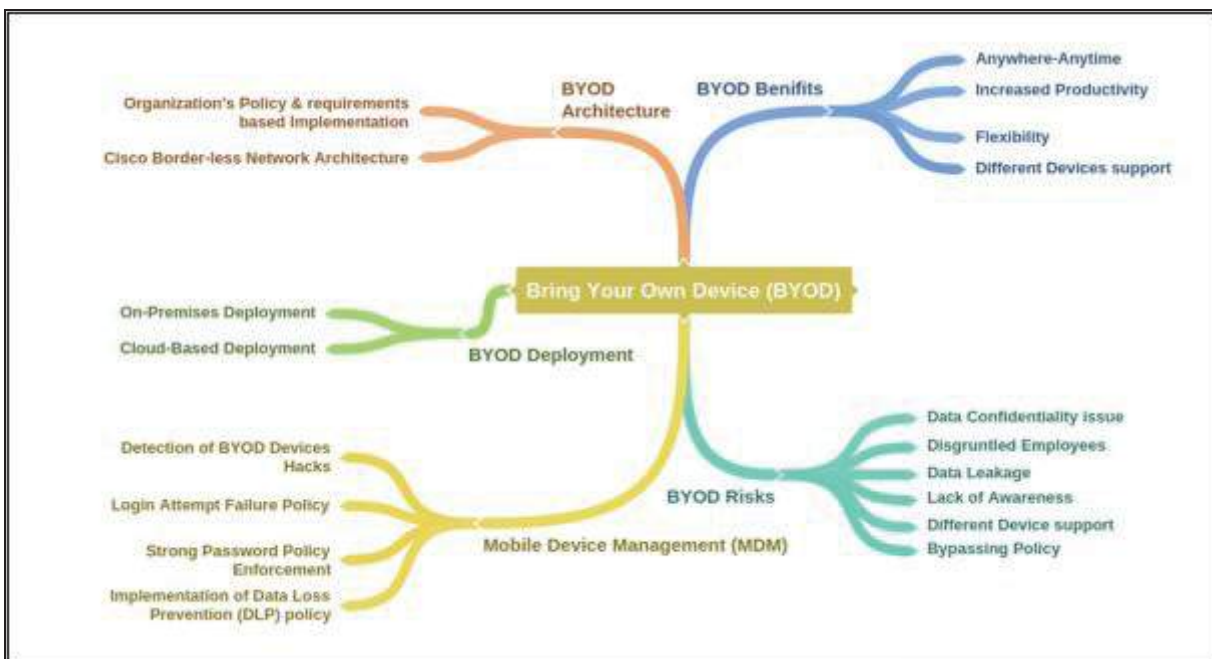
security solutions at the internet edge of campus, branch and home office networks within BYOD architecture. Apart from integrating IPS/IDS module within itself, ASA also acts as the termination point of VPN connections made by *Cisco AnyConnect Client* software over the public internet to facilitate the BYOD devices.

RSA SecurID: RSA SecurID generates a one-time password (OTP) for BYOD devices that need to access the network applications that require OTP.

Active Directory: Active Directory provides centralized command and control of domain users, computers, and network printers. It restricts the access to network resources only to the defined users and computers.

Certificate Authority: Certificate authority can be used to allow access to corporate network to only those BYOD devices which have a valid corporate certificate installed on them. All those devices without certificate may be given no access to the corporate network but limited internet connectivity as per defined in the corporate policy.

Apart from this built-in feature and precautions, several tools are also available on every official application stores to provide user better security of their devices. Some of the beneficial guidelines to secure your mobile phone are as follows: -

- Avoid auto-upload of files and photos
- Perform security assessment of applications
- Turn Bluetooth off
- Allow only necessary GPS-enabled applications
- Do not connect to open networks or public networks unless it is necessary
- Install applications from trusted or official stores
- Configure string passwords
- Use Mobile Device Management MDM softwares
- Use Remote Wipe Services
- Update Operating Systems
- Do not allow rooting / jailbreaking
- Encrypt your phone
- Periodic backup
- Filter emails
- Configure application certification rules
- Configure mobile device policies
- Configure auto-Lock

Chapter 18: IoT Hacking

Technology Brief

This module is added in CEHv10 with the objectives of understanding IoT concepts, an overview of IoT threats and attacks, IoT hacking methodology, tools and techniques of IoT hacking, security tool and penetration testing. Internet of Things (IoT) is an environment of physical devices such as home appliances, electronic devices, sensors, etc. which are embedded with software programs and network interface cards to make them capable of connecting and communicating with the network.

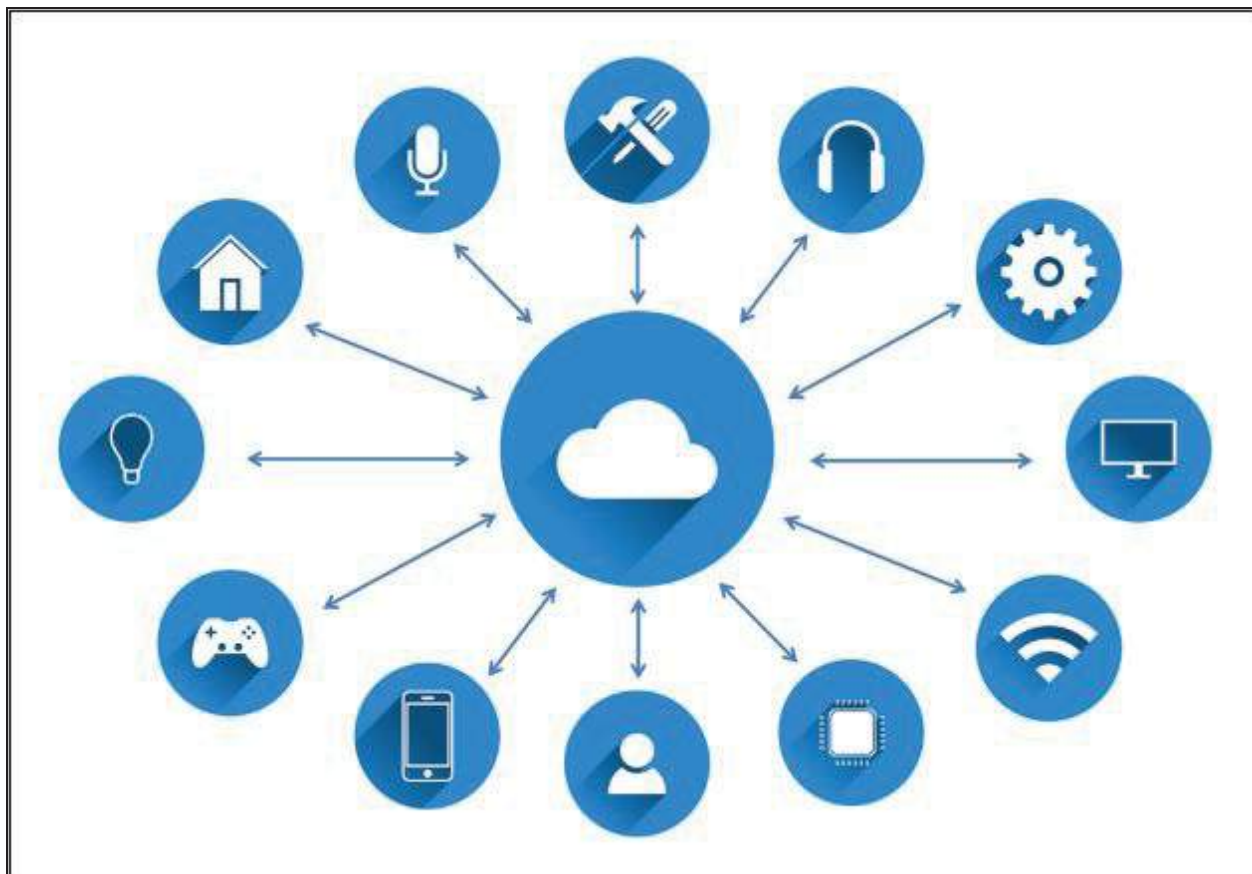


Figure 18-01: Internet of Things (IoT)

Internet of Things (IoT) Concept

The world is rapidly moving towards automation. The need for automated devices which controls our daily tasks on fingertips is increasing day by day. As we know the performance and productivity difference between manual and automated processes, moving towards interconnection of things will advance and make the process even faster. The term "Things" refers to the machines, appliances, vehicles, sensors and many other devices. An example of this automation process through the Internet of Things is connecting a CCTV camera placed in a building captures intrusion and immediately generate alerts on client devices at the remote location. Similarly, we can connect other devices over the internet to communicate with other devices.

IoT technology requires unique identity. Unique identity refers to the IP address, especially IPv6 addresses to provide each and every device a unique identity. IPv4 and IPv6 planning and deployment over an advance network structure requires thorough consideration of advanced strategies and techniques. In IP version 4, a 32-bit address is assigned to each network node for the identification while in IP version 6, 128 bits are assigned to each node for unique identification. IPv6 is an advanced version of IPv4 that can accommodate the emerging popularity of the internet, increasing number of users, and a number of devices and advancements in networking. Advance IP address must consider IP address which supports efficiency, reliability, and scalability in the overall network model.

How does the Internet of Things works?

IoT devices may either use IoT gateways to communicate with the internet, or they might be directly communicating with the internet. Integration of controlled equipment, logic controller and advanced programmable electronic circuits make them capable of communicating and being controlled remotely.

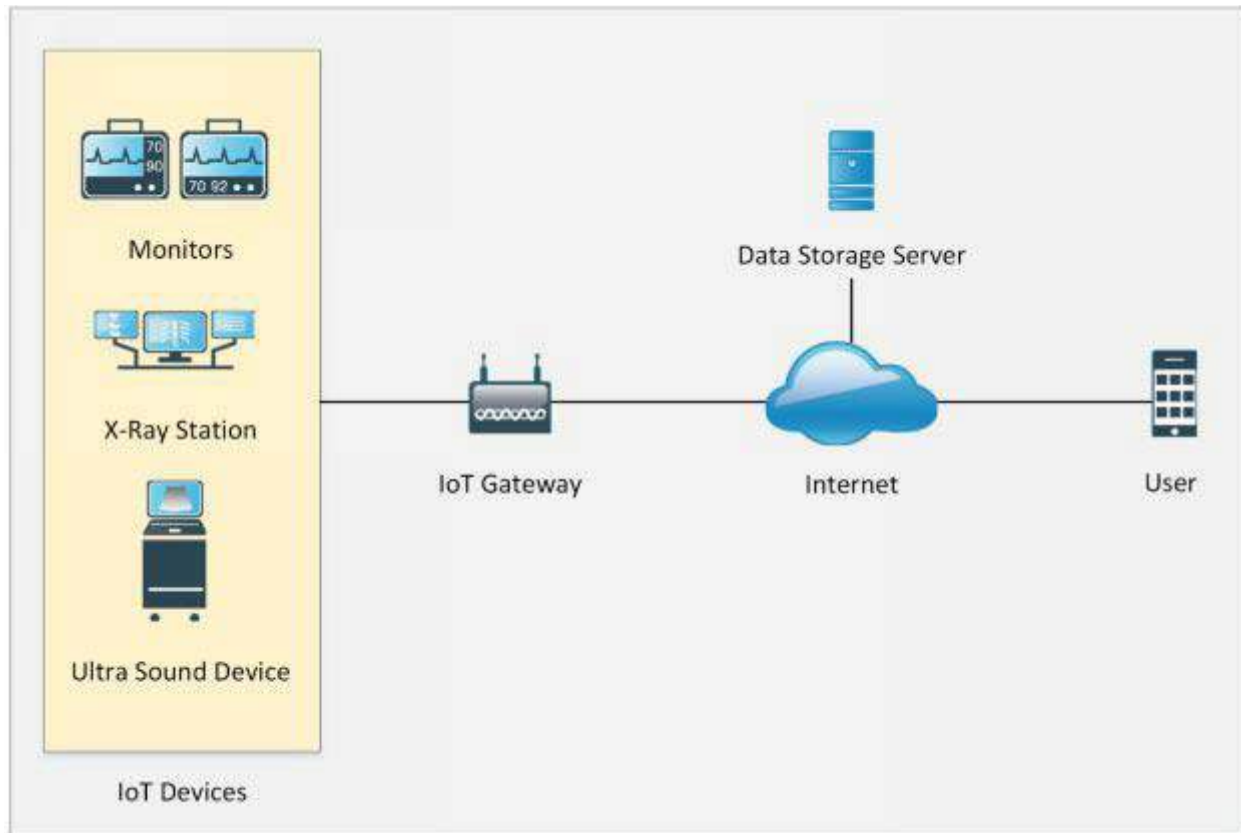


Figure 18-02: Working of the Internet of Things (IoT)

The architecture of IoT depends upon five layers which are as follows:

1. Application Layer
2. Middleware Layer
3. Internet Layer
4. Access Gateway Layer
5. Edge Technology Layer

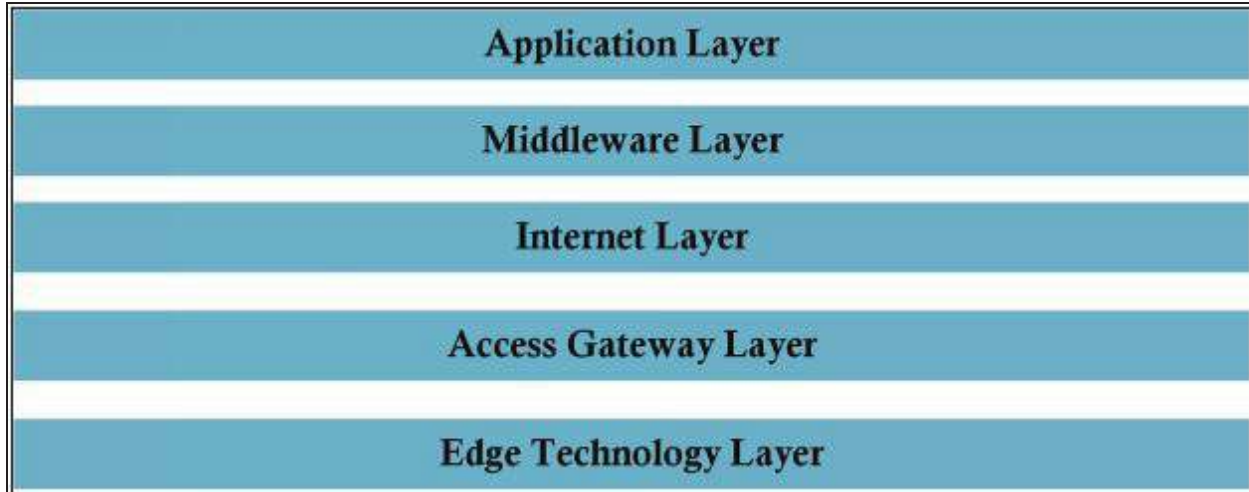


Figure 18-03: Internet of Things (IoT) Architecture

- The Application layer is responsible for delivering the data to the users at the application layer. This is a user interface to control, manage and command these IoT devices.
- Middleware Layer is for device and information management.
- Internet Layer is responsible for endpoints connectivity.
- Access Gateway Layer is responsible for protocol translation and messaging.
- Edge Technology Layer covers IoT capable devices.

IoT Communication Models

There are several ways in which IoT devices can communicate with the other devices. The following are some of the IoT communication models.

Device-to-Device Model

Device to device model is a basic IoT communication model in which two devices are communicating with each other without interfering any other device. Communication between these two devices is established using a communication medium such as a wireless network. An example of Device-to-Device communication model can be a Mobile phone user and a Wi-Fi printer. The user can connect Wi-Fi printer using Wi-Fi connection and send commands to print. These devices are independent of vendor. The mobile phone of a vendor can communicate with the wireless printer of different manufacture because of interoperability. Similarly, any home appliance connected with wireless remote control through a medium such as Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, NFC or RFID can be an example of Device to Device communication model.

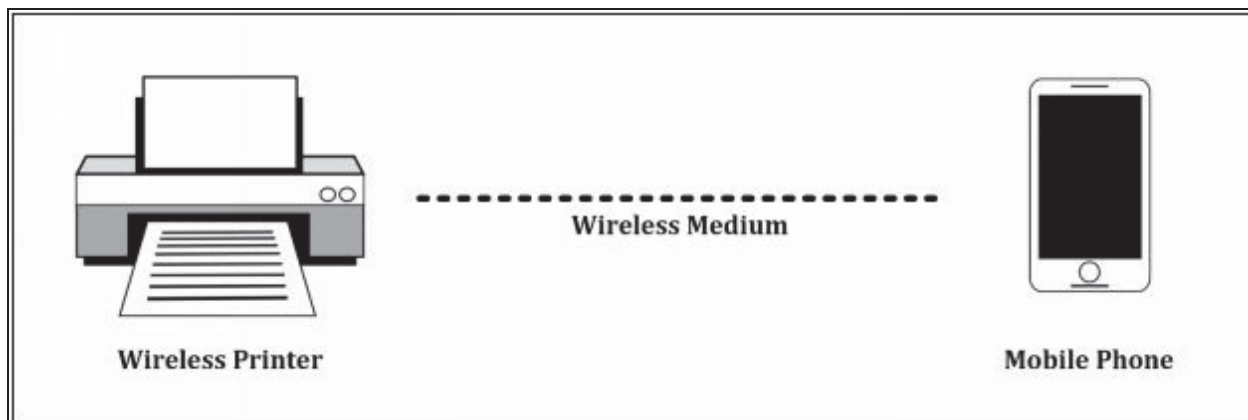


Figure 18-04: Device-to-Device Communication Model

Device-to-Cloud Model

Device-to-Cloud Model is another model of IoT device communication in which IoT devices are directly communicating with the application server. For example, consider a real-life scenario of a home where multiple sensors are installed for security reasons such as motion detector, cameras, temperature sensor, etc. These sensors are directly connected to the application server which can be hosted locally or on a cloud. The application server will provide information exchange between these devices.

Similarly, Device-to-Cloud communication scenarios are found in a manufacturing environment where different sensors are communicating with the application server. Application servers process the data, and perform predictive maintenance, required and remediation actions to automate processes and accelerate production.

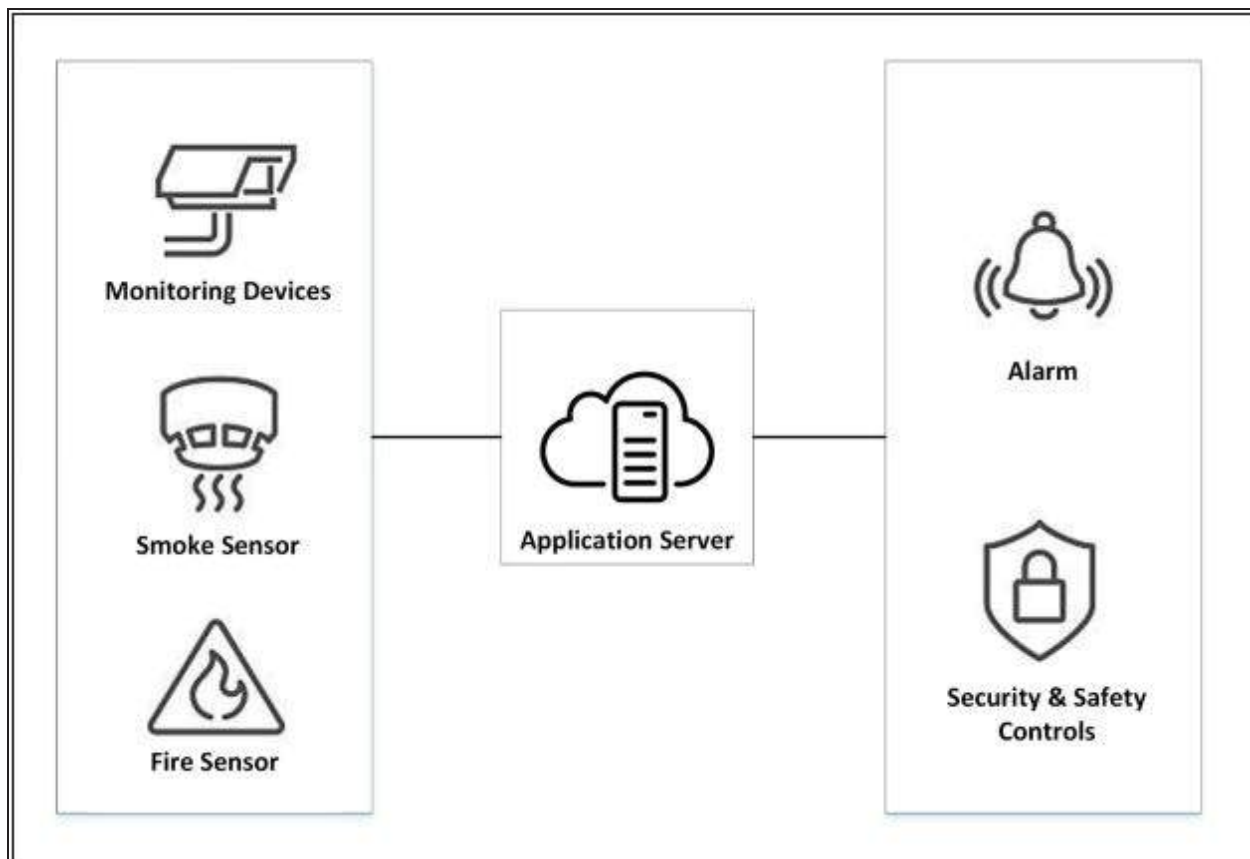


Figure 18-05: Device-to-Cloud Communication Model

Device-to-Gateway Model

Device-to-Gateway model is similar to Device to cloud model. IoT gateway device is added in this Device-to-Gateway model which collects the data from sensors and send it to the remote application server. In addition, you

will have a consolidation point where you can inspect and control the data being transmitted. This gateway could provide security and other functionality such as data or protocol translation.

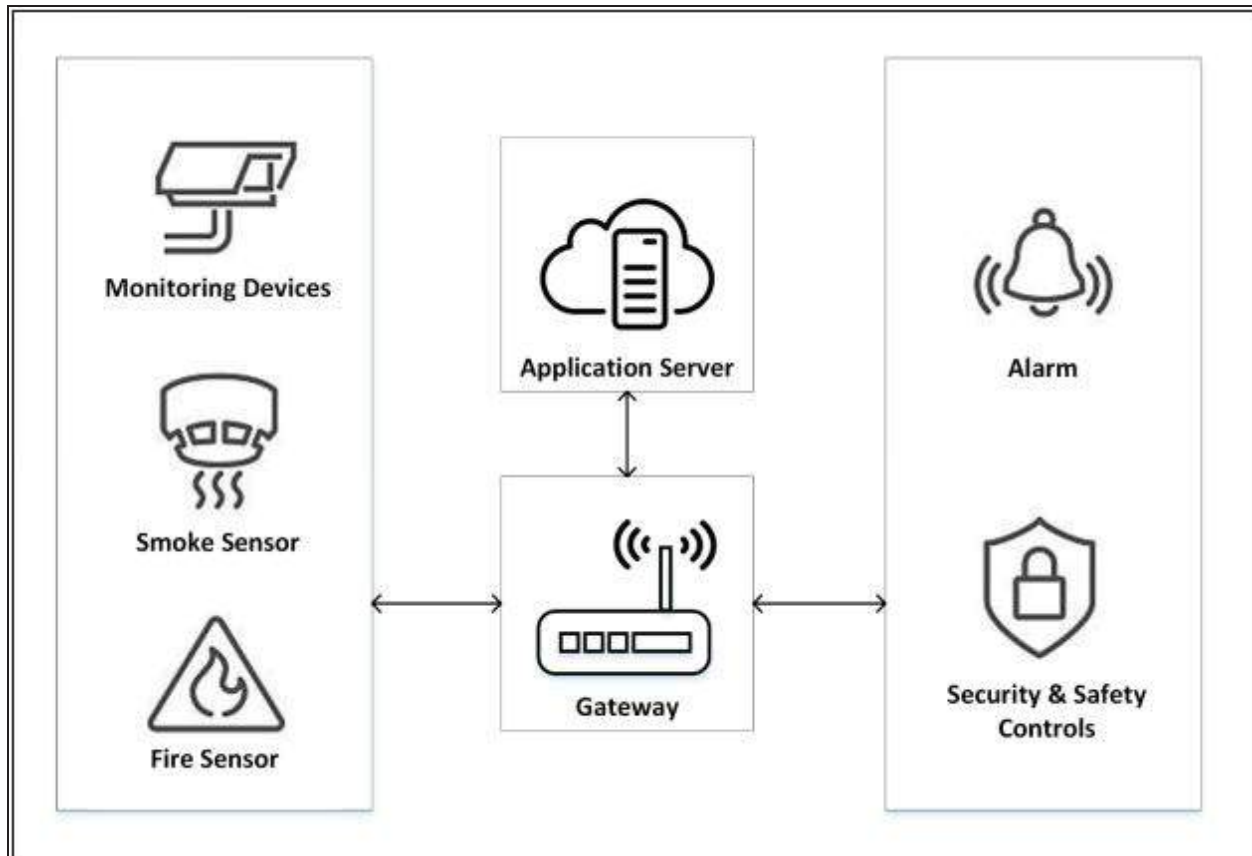


Figure 18-06: Device-to-Gateway Communication Model

Back-End Data-Sharing Model

Back-End Data-Sharing Model is an advanced model in which devices are communicating with the application servers. This scenario is used in a collective partnership between different application providers. Back-End Data Sharing model extends the Device-to-Cloud model to a scalable scenario where these sensors are accessed and controlled by multiple authorized third-parties.

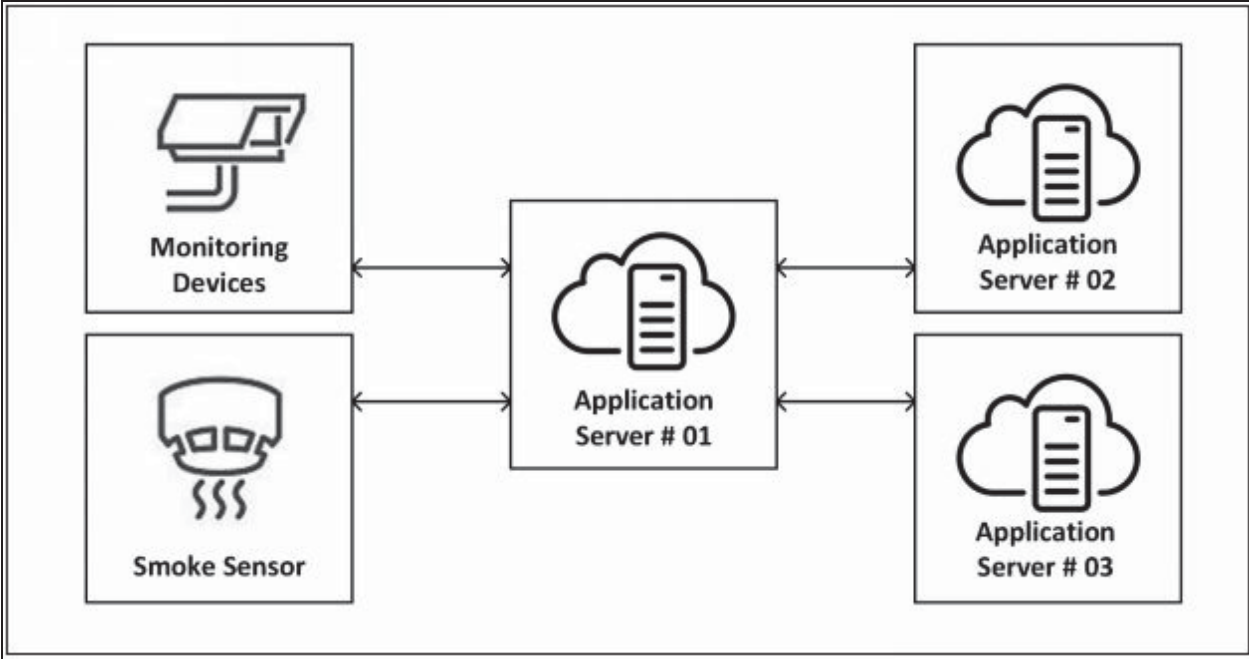


Figure 18-07: Back-End Data Sharing Model

5. Difficult to update firmware and OS
6. Interoperability Issues

IoT Attacks

DDoS Attack

Distributed-Denial of Service attack as defined earlier intended for making services of the target unavailable. Using Distributed-DOS attack, all IoT devices, IoT gateways and application servers can be targeted, and flooding request towards them can result in denial of service.

Rolling Code Attack

Rolling code or Code hopping is another technique to exploit. In this technique, attacker capture the code, sequence or signal coming from transmitter devices along with simultaneously blocking the receiver to receive the signal. This captured code will later use to gain unauthorized access.

For example, a victim sends a signal to unlock his garage or his car. Central locking of cars works on radio signaling. An attacker using a signal jammer, prevent the car's receiver to receive the signal and simultaneously capture the signal sent by the owner of the car. Later, an attacker can unlock the car using captured signal.

BlueBorne Attack

The blueborne attack is performed using different techniques to exploit Bluetooth vulnerabilities. This collection of techniques to gain unauthorized access to Bluetooth enabled devices are called a Blueborne attack.

Jamming Attack

Jamming of signals to prevent devices to communicate with each other and

with the server.

Backdoor

Deploying a backdoor on a computer of an employee of an organization, or victim to gain unauthorized access to the private network. It is not all about creating a backdoor on IoT devices.

Some other types of IoT attacks include:

- Eavesdropping
- Sybil Attack
- Exploit Kits
- Man-in-the-Middle Attack
- Replay Attack
- Forged Malicious Devices
- Side Channel Attack
- Ransomware Attack

IoT Hacking Methodology

Hacking methodology for IoT platform is same as a methodology for other platforms. Methodology for IoT hacking is defined below:

Information Gathering

The first step in hacking IoT environment requires information gathering. Information gathering includes extraction of information such as IP addressing, running protocols, open ports, type of devices, vendor's information, etc. Shodan, Censys, and Thingful are the search engine to find out information about IoT devices. Shodan is a helpful platform for discovering and gathering information about IoT devices. As shown in the figure on the next page, information can search for Webcams deployed across the world.

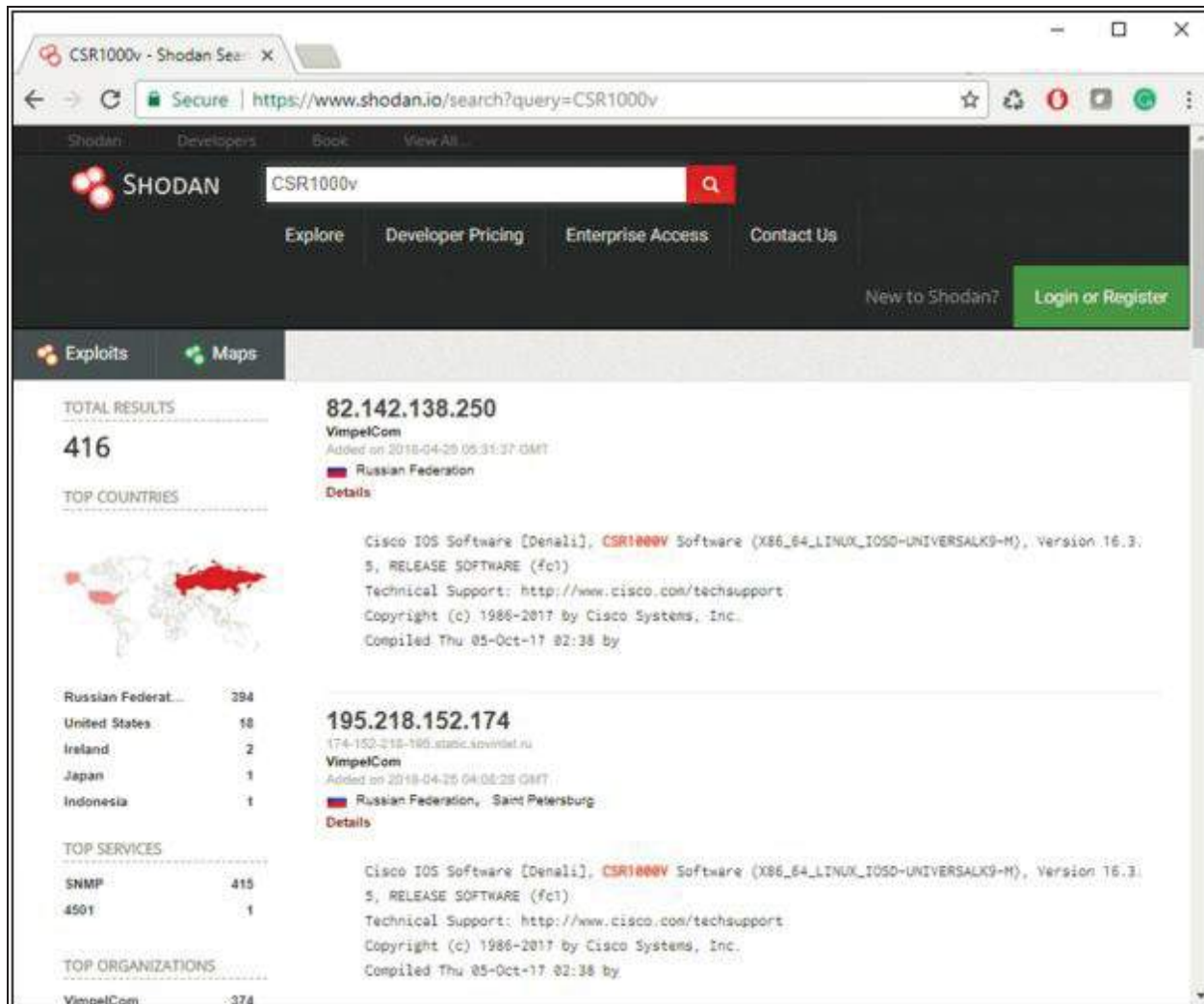


Figure 18-08: Shodan IoT Information Gathering

Vulnerability Scanning

Vulnerability scanning includes scanning the network and devices for identification of vulnerabilities such as weak passwords, software and firmware bugs, default configuration, etc. Multi-ping, Nmap, RIoT Vulnerability scanner, Foren6 are used for scanning against vulnerabilities.

Launch Attack

Launching an attack phase includes exploiting these vulnerabilities using different attacks such as DDoS, Rolling Code attack, jamming, etc. RFCrack and Attify Zigbee Framework, HackRF One are popular tools for attacking.

Gain Access

Gaining access includes taking control over IoT environment. Gaining access, escalating privileges to the administrator, installation of backdoor are also included in this phase.

Maintain Attack

Maintaining attack includes logging out without being detected, clearing logs and covering tracks.

Countermeasures:

Countermeasure for IoT devices includes the following measures which are recommended by the manufacturing companies.

- Firmware update
- Block unnecessary ports
- Disable Telnet
- Use encrypted communication such as SSL/TLS
- Use strong password
- Use encryption of drives
- User account lockout
- Periodic assessment of devices
- Secure password recovery
- Two-Factor Authentication
- Disable UPnP

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Chapter 19: Cloud Computing

Introduction to Cloud Computing

Cloud Computing technology is the most popular now a day because of its flexibility and mobility support. Cloud Computing allows the access to personal and shared resources with minimal management. It often relies on the internet. There is also third-party cloud solution available which saves expanding resources and maintenance. Most appropriate example of Cloud computing is Amazon Elastic Cloud Compute (EC2), highly capable, low cost, and flexible. Major characteristics of cloud computing include:

- On-demand self-service
- Distributed Storage
- Rapid Elasticity
- Measured Services
- Automated Management
- Virtualization

Types of Cloud Computing Services

Cloud Computing Services are categorized into the following three types: -

- Infrastructure-as-a-Service (IaaS)
- Platform-as-a-Service (PaaS)
- Software-as-a-Service (SaaS)

Infrastructure-as-a-Service (IaaS)

Infrastructure services, (IaaS) also known as Cloud infrastructure service is basically a self-service model. IaaS is used for accessing, monitoring and managing purpose. For example, instead of purchasing additional hardware such as firewall, networking devices, server and spending money on deployment, management, and maintenance, IaaS model offers cloud-based infrastructure to deploy remote datacenter. Most popular examples of IaaS are Amazon EC2, Cisco Metapod, Microsoft Azure, Google Compute Engine (GCE).

Platform-as-a-Service (PaaS)

Platform as a service another cloud computing service. It allows the users to develop, run and manage applications. PaaS offers Development tools, Configuration management, Deployment Platforms, and migrate the app to

hybrid models. It basically helps to develop and customize applications, manage OSes, visualization, storage and networking, etc. Examples of PaaS are Google App Engine, Microsoft Azure, Intel Mash Maker, etc.

Software-as-a-Service (SaaS)

Software as a Service (SaaS) is one of the most popular types of Cloud Computing service that is most widely used. On-demand Software is centrally hosted to be accessible by users using client via browsers. An example of SaaS is office software such as office 365, Cisco WebEx, Citrix GoToMeeting, Google Apps, messaging software, DBMS, CAD, ERP, HRM, etc.

Cloud Deployment Models

The following are the Deployment models for Cloud Services.

NIST Architecture is intended to facilitate the understanding of the requirements, uses, characteristics, and standards of cloud computing.

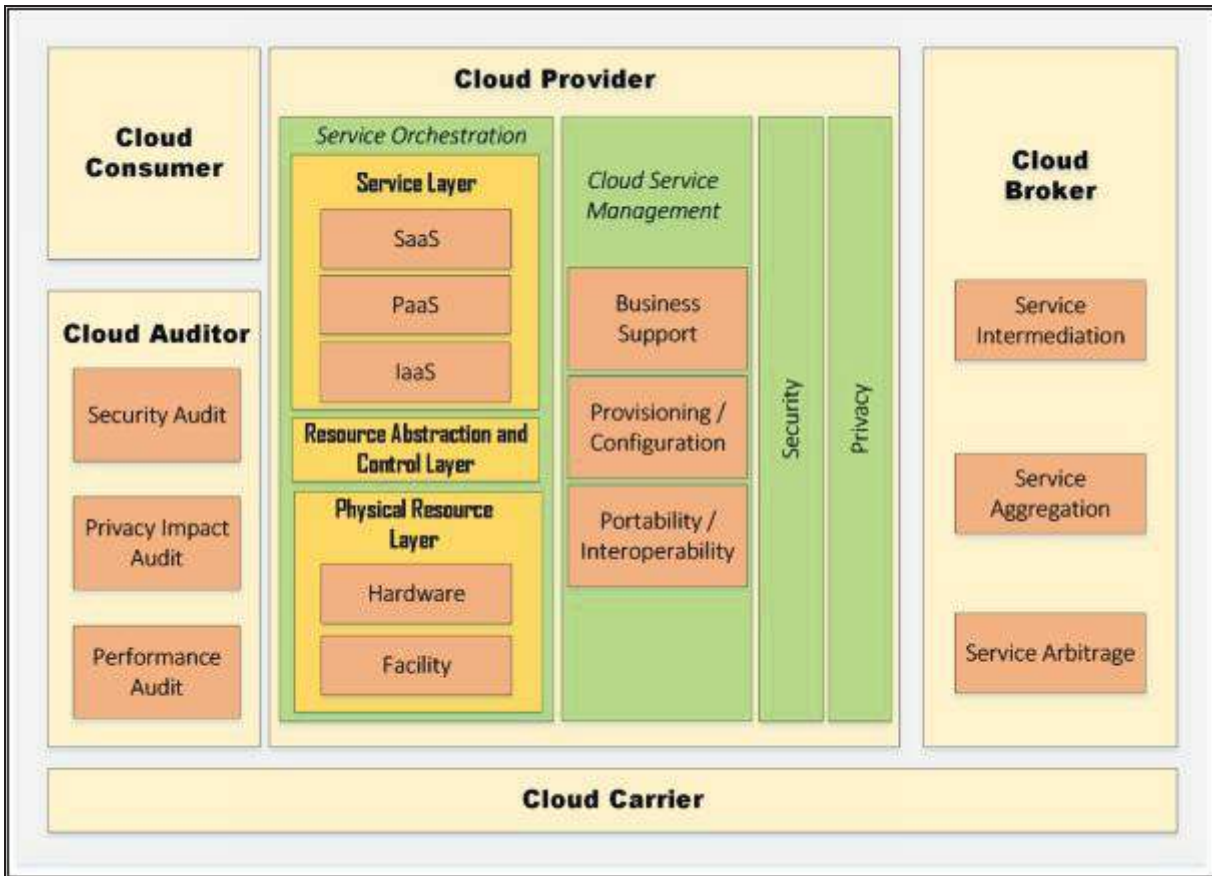


Figure 19-01. NIST Cloud Computing Reference Architecture

Cloud Computing Benefits

There are abundant advantages of cloud computing in which some most important are discussed here;

Increased Capacity:

By using cloud computing, the users have not worry about the capacity of infrastructure as the cloud platform provides the unlimited capacity or simply we can say that by using a cloud platform, the customer can use as much capacity as he wants or as small capacity as he needs.

Increased Speed:

Cloud computing environment has dramatically reduced the time, and cost of new IT services thus increased the speed for organizations to access the IT resources.

Low Latency:

By using cloud computing, the customers have a facility of implementing their applications with just a few clicks, so they can do all tasks easily at minimal costs, i.e., not too much time consumed as well as minimum latency is produced.

Less Economic Expense

The major advantage of Cloud Computing is a Less economic expense. No need to purchase dedicated hardware for a particular function. Networking, Datacenter, firewall, application and other services can be easily virtualized over cloud saving the cost of purchasing hardware, configuration and management complexity and less maintenance cost.

Security

In terms of security, cloud computing is also efficient. Major advantages include less investment over security with effective patch management and security updates. Disaster recovery, dynamically scaling defensive resources and other security services offers protection against cloud computing threats.

Understanding Virtualization

Virtualization in computer networking is a process of deploying a machine or multiple machines virtually on a host. These virtually deployed machines use the system resources of the host machine by logical division. Major Difference between a physically deployed machine and a virtual machine is of system resources and hardware. Physical deployment requires separate dedicated hardware for an on Operating system whereas a virtual machine host can support multiple operating systems over a single system sharing the resources such as storage.

Benefits of Virtualization in Cloud

The major advantage of virtualization is cost reduction. Purchasing dedicated hardware not only cost enough but it also requires maintenance, management, and security. Additional hardware consumes space and power consumptions whereas Virtualization support multiple machines over single hardware. Furthermore, virtualization also reduces administration, management and networking tasks, ensures efficiency. Virtualization over the cloud is even more effective where no need to install even single hardware. All virtual machines deployed over a host is owned by cloud over the internet. You can easily access them from anywhere any time.

Cloud Computing Threats

As cloud computing is offering many services with efficiency, and flexibility, there are also some threats, from which cloud computing is vulnerable. These threats include Data loss/breach, insecure interfaces and APIs, malicious insider, privileges escalations, natural disasters, hardware failure, authentication, VM level attacks and much more.

Data Loss/Breach

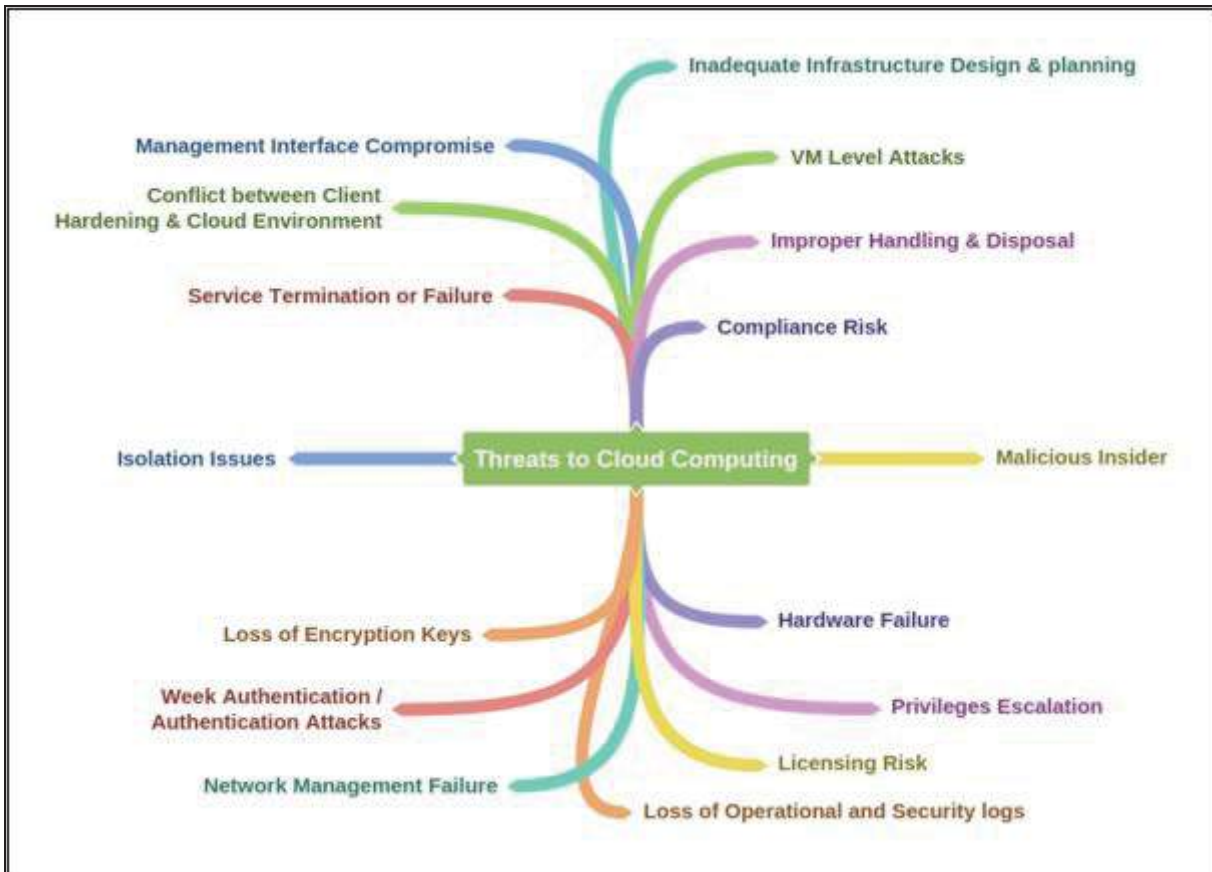
Data loss and Data breach are the most common threat to every platform. Improper Encryption or losing Encryption keys may result in Data modification, erasing, data steal, and misuse.

Abusing Cloud Services

Abusing Cloud Services includes using service for malicious intents as well as using these services abusively. For example, Dropbox cloud service was abused by an attacker to spread massive phishing campaign. Similarly, it can be used to host, malicious data and Botnet command and control, etc.

Insecure Interface and APIs

Software User Interface (UI) and Application Programming Interface (APIs) are the interfaces used by customers to interact the service. These interfaces can be secure by performing Monitoring, Orchestration, Management and provisioning. These interfaces must be secure against malicious attempts.



Cloud Computing Attacks

In Cloud Computing, the following are the most common attacks that are being in used by an attacker to extract sensitive information such as credentials or gaining unauthorized access. Cloud Computing Attacks includes: -

- Service Hijacking using Social Engineering Attacks
- Session Hijacking using XSS Attack
- Domain Name System (DNS) Attack
- SQL Injection Attack
- Wrapping Attack
- Service Hijacking using Network Sniffing
- Session Hijacking using Session Riding
- Side Channel Attack or Cross-guest VM Breaches
- Cryptanalysis
- Dos / DDoS Attacks

Service Hijacking using Social Engineering Attacks

We have already discussed social engineering attacks. Using Social Engineering techniques, the attack may attempt to guess the password. Social Engineering attacks result in unauthorized access exposing sensitive information according to the privilege level of the compromised user.

Service Hijacking using Network Sniffing

Using Packet Sniffing tools by placing himself in the network, an attacker can capture sensitive information such as passwords, session ID, cookies, and another web service-related information such as UDDI, SOAP, and WSDL

Session Hijacking using XSS Attack

By launching Cross-Site Scripting (XSS), the attacker can steal cookies by injecting malicious code into the website.

Session Hijacking using Session Riding

Session Riding is intended for session hijacking. An attacker may exploit it by attempting cross-site request forgery. The attacker uses currently active session and rides on it by executing the requests such as modification of data, erasing data, online transactions and password change by tracking the user to click on a malicious link.

Domain Name System (DNS) Attacks

Domain Name System (DNS) attacks include DNS Poisoning, Cybersquatting, Domain hijacking and Domain Snipping. An attacker may attempt to spoof by poisoning the DNS server or cache to obtain credentials of internal users. Domain Hijacking involves stealing cloud service domain name. Similarly, through Phishing scams, users can be redirected to a fake website.

Side Channel Attacks or Cross-guest VM Breaches

Side Channel Attacks or Cross-Guest VM Breach is an attack which requires the deployment of a malicious virtual machine on the same host. For example, a physical host is hosting a virtual machine that is offering the cloud services hence the target of an attacker. The attacker will install a malicious virtual machine on the same host to take advantage of sharing resources of the same host such as processor cache, cryptographic keys, etc. Installation can be done by a malicious insider, or an attacker by impersonating a legitimate user.

Similarly, there are other attackers that are discussed earlier are also vulnerable to Cloud Computing such as SQL Injection attack (injecting malicious SQL statements to extract information), Cryptanalysis Attacks (weak or obsolete encryption) Wrapping Attack (duplicating the body of message), Denial-of-Service (DoS) and Distributed Denial-of-Service (DDoS) Attacks.

Cloud Security

Cloud Computing Security refers to the security implementations, deployments, and preventions to defend against security threats. Cloud Security includes Control policies, deployment of security devices such as application firewalls, Next Generation IPS devices and hardening the infrastructure of Cloud computing. It also includes some activities that are to be taken from the service providers end as well as actions that should be taken at the user end.

Cloud Security Control Layers

Application Layer

There are several security mechanisms, devices, and policies that provide support at different cloud security controls layers. At the Application layer, Web application firewalls are deployed to filter the traffic and observe the behavior of traffic. Similarly, Systems Development Life Cycle (SDLC), Binary Code Analysis, Transactional Security provide security for online transactions, and script analysis, etc.

Information

In Cloud Computing, to provide confidentiality and integrity of information that is being communicated between client and server, different policies are configured to monitor any data loss. These policies include Data Loss Prevention (DLP) and Content Management Framework (CMF). Data Loss Prevention (DLP) is the feature which offers to prevent the leakage of information to outside the network. Traditionally this information may include company or organizations confidential information, proprietary, financial and other secret information. Data Loss Prevention feature also ensures the enforcement of compliance with the rules and regulations using Data Loss Prevention policies to prevent the user from intentionally or unintentionally sending this confidential information.

Management

Security of Cloud Computing regarding management is performed by different approaches such as Governance, Risk Management, and Compliance (GRC), Identity and Access Management (IAM), Patch and Configuration management. These approaches help to control the secure access to the resources and manage them.

Network layer

There are some solutions available to secure the network layer in cloud computing such as the deployment of Next-Generation IDS/IPS devices, Next-Generation Firewalls, DNSSec, Anti-DDoS, OAuth and Deep Packet Inspection (DPI), etc. Next-Generation Intrusion Prevention System, known as NGIPS, is one of the efficiently-proactive components in the Integrated Threat Security Solution. NGIPS provide stronger security layer with deep visibility, enhanced security intelligence and advanced protection against emerging threat to secure complex infrastructures of networks.

Cisco NGIPS Solution provides deep network visibility, automation, security intelligence, and next-level protection. It uses the most advanced and effective intrusion prevention capabilities to catch emerging sophisticated network attacks. It continuously collects information regarding the network, including operating systems information, files and applications information, devices and user's information. This information helps NGIPS to determine network maps and host profiles which lead to contextual information to make better decisions about intrusive events.

Trusted Computing

The root of Trust (RoT) is established by validating each component of hardware and software from the end entity up to the root certificate. It is intended to ensure that only trusted software and hardware can be used while still retaining flexibility.

Computer and Storage

Computing and Storage in cloud computing can be secured by implementing Host-based Intrusion Detection or Prevention Systems HIDS/HIPS. Configuring Integrity check, File system monitoring and Log File Analysis, Connection Analysis, Kernel Level detection, Encrypting the storage, etc. Host-based IPS/IDS is normally deployed for the protection of specific host machine, and it works closely with the Operating System Kernel of the host machine. It creates a filtering layer and filters out any malicious application call to the OS.

Physical Security

Physical Security is always required on priority to secure anything. As it is also the first layer OSI model, if the device is not physically secured, any sort

of security configuration will not be effective. Physical security includes protection against man-made attacks such as theft, damage, unauthorized physical access as well as environmental impact such as rain, dust, power failure, fire, etc.

Responsibilities in Cloud Security

Cloud Service Provider

Responsibilities of a cloud service provider include to meet the following security controls: -

- Web Application Firewall (WAF).
- Real Traffic Grabber (RTG)
- Firewall
- Data Loss Prevention (DLP)
- Intrusion Prevention Systems
- Secure Web Gateway (SWG)
- Application Security (App Sec)
- Virtual Private Network (VPN)
- Load Balancer
- CoS/QoS
- Trusted Platform Module
- Netflow and others.

Cloud Service Consumer

Responsibilities of a cloud service consumer include to meet the following security controls: -

- Public Key Infrastructure (PKI).
- Security Development Life Cycle (SDLC).
- Web Application Firewall (WAF).
- Firewall
- Encryption.
- Intrusion Prevention Systems
- Secure Web Gateway
- Application Security
- Virtual Private Network (VPN) and others.

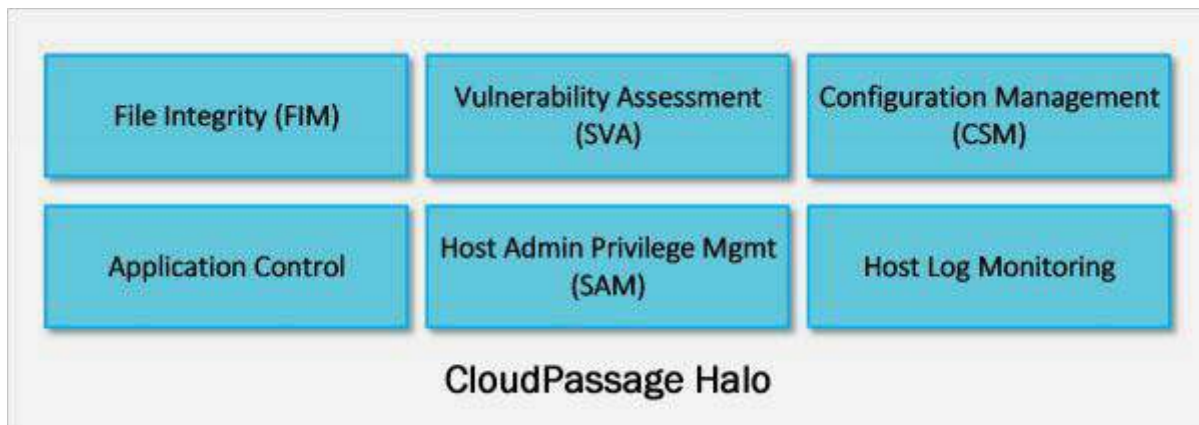
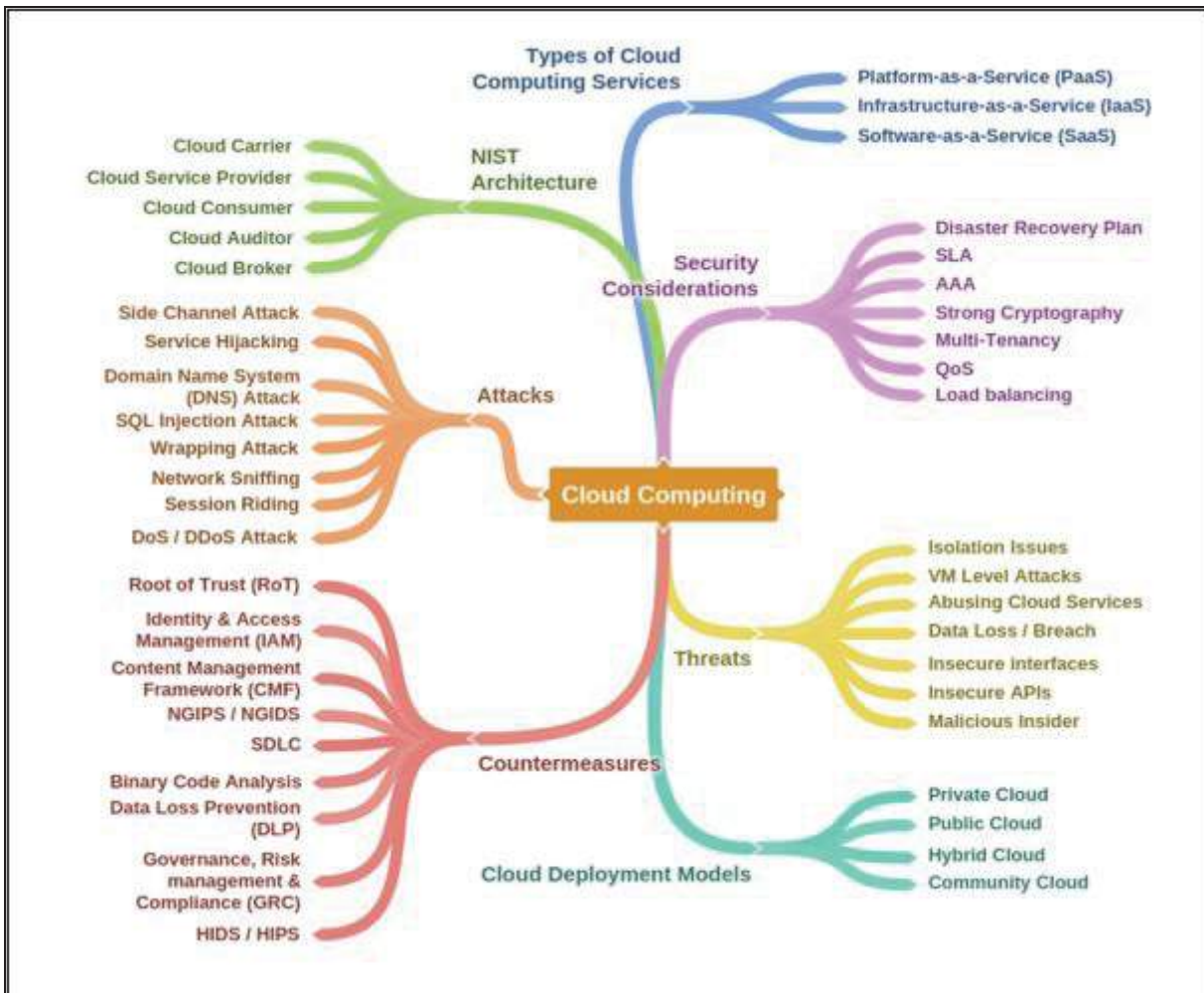


Figure 19-02. Cloud Passage Halo Components

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Chapter 20: Cryptography

Technology Brief

As we have studied earlier, confidentiality, integrity, and availability are the three basic components around which we should build and maintain our security model. We must know different methods by which we can implement each one of these features. For example, by using encryption, we can make sure that only the sender and the receiver can read clear text data. Anybody between the two nodes needs to know the key to decrypt the data. Similarly, hashing is used to ensure the integrity of data. This section explains the concepts and different methods by which we can implement encryption and hashing in our network. Several terminologies need to be explained before moving to the main agenda of this section.

Cryptography Concepts

Cryptography

Cryptography is a technique of encrypting the clear text data into a scrambled code. This encrypted data is sent over public or private network toward destination to ensure the confidentiality. This encrypted data known as "Ciphertext" is decrypted at the destination for processing. Strong encryption keys are used to avoid key cracking. The objective of cryptography is not all about confidentiality, is also concern integrity, authentication, and Non-repudiation.

Types of Cryptography

Symmetric Cryptography

Symmetric Key Cryptography is the oldest and most widely used cryptography technique in the domain of cryptography. Symmetric ciphers use the same secret key for the encryption and decryption of data. Most widely used symmetric ciphers are AES and DES.

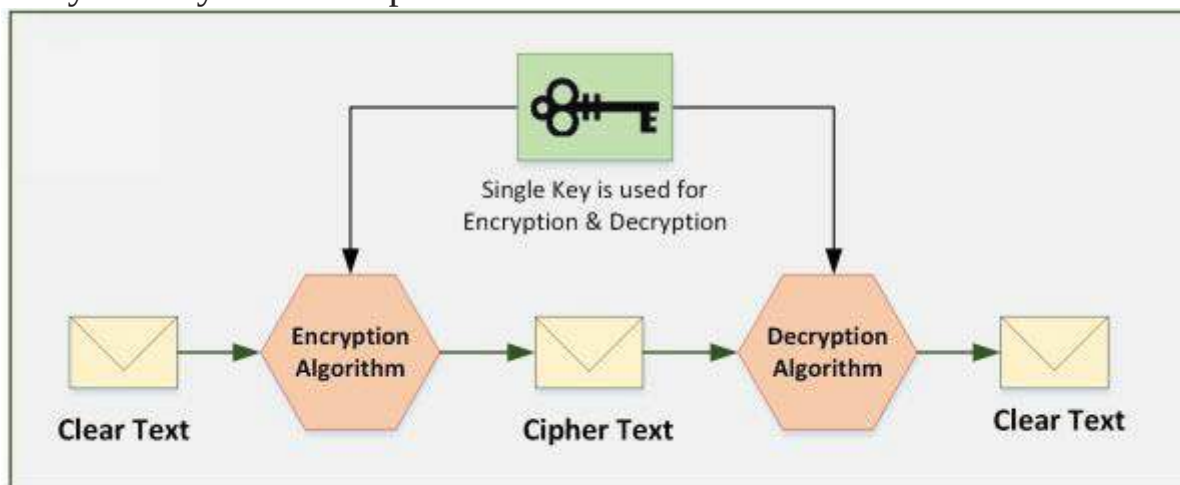


Figure 20-01. Symmetric Cryptography

Asymmetric Cryptography / Public Key Cryptography

Unlike Symmetric Ciphers, two keys are used. One key is publically known to everyone while one key is kept secret and is used to encrypt the data by sender hence it is also called Public Key cryptography. Each sender uses its secret key (also known as a private key) for encrypting its data before sending. The receiver uses the respective public key of the sender to decrypt the data. RSA, DSA and Diffie-Hellman Algorithm are popular examples of asymmetric ciphers. Asymmetric Key Cryptography delivers Confidentiality,

integrity, authenticity and Non-repudiation by using Public and Private key concept. The private key is only known by the owner itself. Whereas, the Public key is issued by using Public Key Infrastructure (PKI) where a trusted Certification Authority (CA) certify the ownership of key pairs.

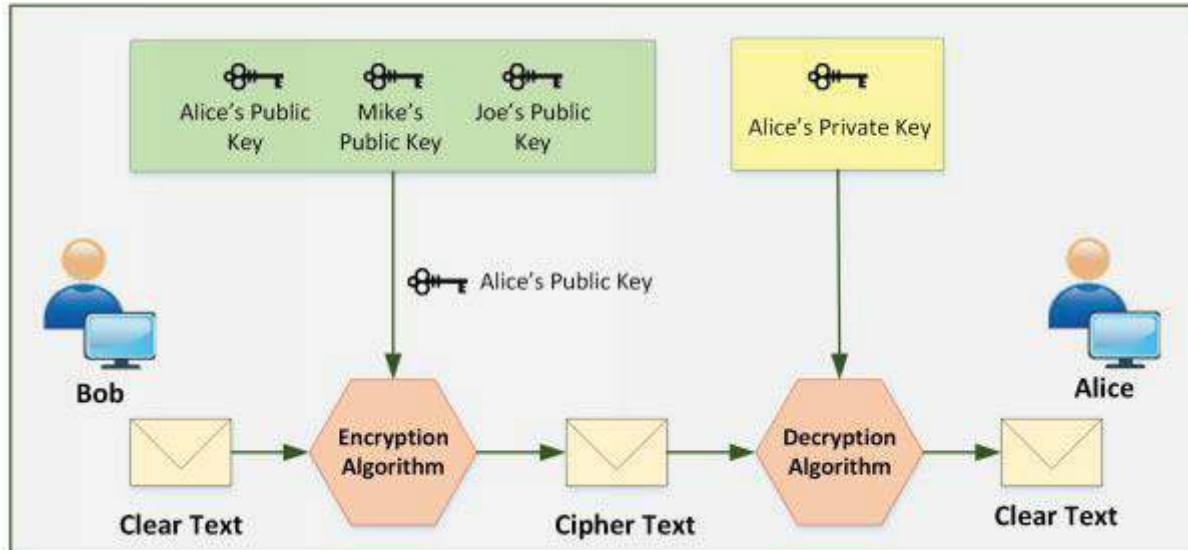


Figure 20-02. Asymmetric Cryptography

Government Access to Keys (GAK)

Government Access to keys (GAK) refers to the agreement between government and software companies. All or necessary keys are delivered to a governmental organization which keeps it securely and only uses them when the court issues a warrant to do so.

Encryption Algorithms

Ciphers

A cipher is a set of rules by which we implement encryption. Thousands of cipher algorithms are available on the internet. Some of them are proprietary while others are open source. Common methods by which ciphers replace original data with encrypted data are:

Substitution

In this method, every single character of data is substituted with another character. A very simple example in this regard would be to replace the character by shifting it three characters ahead of it. Therefore, “D” would replace “A” and so on. To make it more complex, we can select certain letters to be replaced in the whole text. In this example, the value of the key is three, and both nodes should know it otherwise they would not be able to decrypt the data.

Polyalphabetic

This method makes substitution even more difficult to break by using multiple character substitution.

Keys

In the above example of substitution, we used a key of “three,” Key plays the main role in every cipher algorithm. Without knowing the key, data cannot be decrypted.

Stream Cipher

A type of symmetric key cipher that encrypts the plain text one by one. There are various types of stream ciphers such as synchronous, asynchronous. RC4 is the most common type of stream cipher design. The transformation of encrypted output varies during the encryption cycle.

Block Cipher

A type of symmetric key cipher that encrypts the plain text on the fixed length of the group. The transformation of encrypted data does not vary in a block cipher. It encrypts the block of data using the same key on each block. DES and AES are common types of block cipher design.

Data Encryption Standard (DES)

Data Encryption Algorithm (DES) is a Symmetric Key Algorithm that was used for encryption, but now, it is considered as insecure, however successors such as Triple DES, G-DES replaced DES encryption. DES uses 56-bit Key size that is too small to protect data consisting.

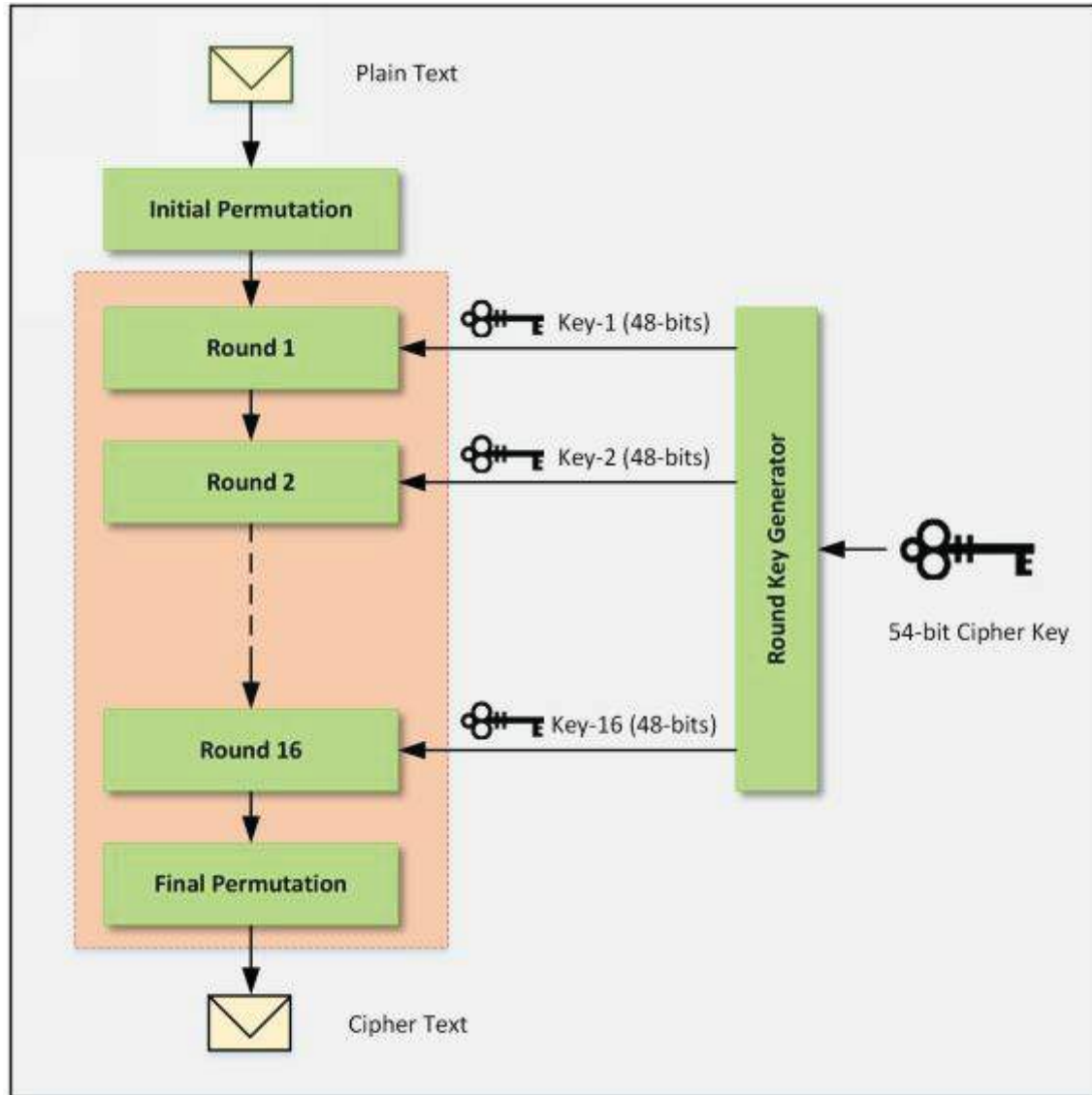


Figure 20-03. DES Algorithm

DES algorithm is consisting of 16 rounds processing the data with the 16 intermediary round keys of 48-bit generated from 56-bit cipher key by a Round Key Generator. Similarly, DES reverse cipher computes the data in clear text format from cipher text using same Cipher key.

The following are the major parameter of DES.

Advanced Encryption Standard (AES)

When DES become insecure, and Performing DES encryption three times (3-DES or Triple-DES) took high computation and time, there was a need for another encryption algorithm that is more secure and effective than DES. "Rijndael" issues a new algorithm in 2000-2001 known as Advanced Encryption Algorithm (AES). AES is also a Private Key Symmetric Algorithm but stronger and faster than Triple-DES. AES can encrypt 128-bit data with 128/192/256 bit keys.

The following are the major parameter of AES.

To understand the AES algorithm, Consider AES-128bit scenario. In 128-bit AES, there will be 10 rounds. Initial 9 rounds will be the performing the same step, i.e., Substitute bytes, shifting or rows, mixing of columns, and Adding round keys. The last round is slightly different with only Substitute bytes, shifting or rows and Adding round keys. The following figure shows the AES algorithm architecture.

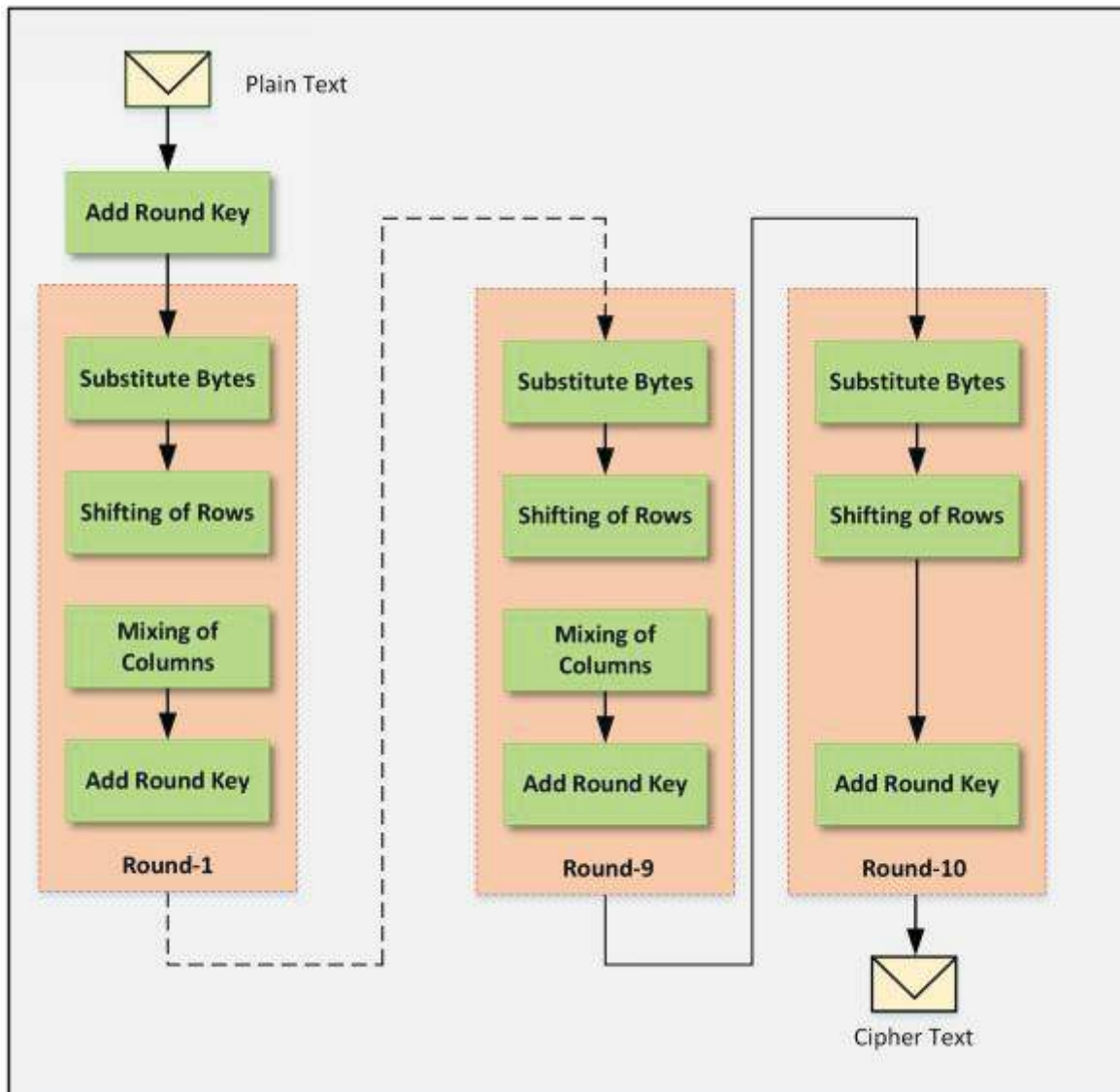


Figure 20-04. AES Algorithm

RC4, RC5, RC6 Algorithms

RC4 is an older encryption technique designed in 1987 by Ron Rivest based on stream cipher. RC4 is used in SSL, WEP protocols. RC4 generates a pseudo-random stream that is used for encryption of plain text by bit-wise exclusive-Or (similar to the Vernam cipher except for that generated pseudorandom bits). Similarly, the process of decryption is performed as it is symmetric operation. In the RC4 algorithm, 24-bit Initialization Vector (IV) generates a 40 or 128-bit key.

RC5 was a Symmetric Key Block Cipher introduced in 1994. RC5 has variable block size (32, 64 or 128 bit), Key size of 0 to 2040 bits and 0 to 255 rounds.

RC5 is suggested with the 64-bit block size, 128-bit key and 12 rounds. RC5 also consists of some modular additions and exclusive OR (XOR)s.

RC6 is also a Symmetric Key block cipher that is derived from RC5 having a block size of 128-bits with 128, 192, 256 up to 2040-bit key support. RC6 is very similar to RC5 in structure, using data-dependent rotations, modular addition, and XOR operations. RC6 does use an extra multiplication operation not present in RC5 to make the rotation dependent.

The DSA and Related Signature Schemes

Using a basic concept of a signature, that we use in our daily life to prove the authenticity and actual origin of a document, in computer networking, Digital Signature Algorithm (DSA) is used. Digital Signature can provide three components of network security, i.e., Authenticity of a message, Integrity of a message, and Non-repudiation. The digital signature cannot provide the confidentiality of communication. However, it can be achieved by using encrypting the message and signature.

Digital Signature uses Public Key to sign and verify the packets. The signing of a document requires private key whereas Verification requires a Public key. The sender of the message signed with its private key and send it to the receiver. The receiver verifies the authenticity of the message by decrypting the packet with sender's public key. As sender's public key only decrypts the message, it verifies that sender of the message.

The integrity of a message is preserved by signing the entire message. If any content of the message is changed, it will not get the same signature. Integrity is signing and verifying the message obtained by using Hash Functions.

Digital Certificate contains various items and these items are listed below:

- **Subject**—Certificate holder's name.
- **Serial Number**—Unique number for certificate identification.
- **Public Key**—A copy of public of the certificate holder.
- **Issuer**—Certificate issuing authority's digital signature to verify that the certificate is real.
- **Signature Algorithm**—Algorithm used to digitally sign the certificate by the Certification Authority (CA).
- **Validity**—Validity of a certificate or we can say expiry date and time of the certificate.

The Digital certificate has X.509 version supported the format, and that is a standard format.

RSA (Rivest Shamir Adleman)

This algorithm is named after its creators, namely Ron Rivest, Adi Shamir, and Leonard Adleman. Also known as public key cryptography standard (PKCS) #1, the main purpose of its usage today is authentication. The key length varies from 512 to 2048 with 1024 being preferred one. RSA is one of the de-facto encryption standards.

The RSA Signature Scheme

1. Two very large prime numbers "p" and "q" are required.
2. Multiply the above two primes to find n, the modulus for encryption and decryption. In other words, $n = p * q$.
3. Calculates $\phi = (p - 1) * (q - 1)$.
4. Chooses a random integer "e" i.e Encryption Key and calculates "d" Decryption Key so that $d * e = 1 \text{ mod } \phi$.
5. Announce "e" and "n" to the public; he keeps " ϕ " and "d" secret.

Message Digest (One-way Hash) Functions

The message digest is a cryptographic hashing technique that is used to ensure the integrity of a message. Message and message digest can be sent together or separately through a communication channel. Receiver recalculates the Hash of the message and compares it with the Message digest to ensure if any changes have been made. One-Way-Hash of Message digest means the hashing function must be a one-way operation. The original message must not be able to recreate. The message digest is a unique fixed-size bit string that is calculated in a way that if a single bit is modified, it changes 50% of the message digest value.

Message Digest Function: MD5

The MD5 algorithm is one from the Message digest series. MD5 produces a 128-bit hash value that is used as a checksum to verify the integrity. Hashing is the technique to ensure the integrity. The hash value is calculated by

computing specific algorithms to verify the integrity that the data was not modified. Hash values play an important role in proving the integrity not only of documents and images but also used in protocols to ensure the integrity of transporting payload.

Secure Hashing Algorithm (SHA)

As Message Digest 5 (MD5) is a cryptographic hashing algorithm, another most popular, more secure and widely used hashing algorithm is Secure Hashing Algorithm (SHA). SHA-1 is a secure hashing algorithm producing 160-bit hashing value as compared to MD5 producing 128-bit value. However, SHA-2 is even more secure, robust and safer hashing algorithm now.

Syntax: **The password is 12345**

SHA-1: **567c552b6b559eb6373ce55a43326ba3db92dcbf**

Secure Hash Algorithm 2 (SHA-2)

SHA2 has the option to vary digest between 224 bits to 512 bits. SHA-2 is a group of different hashes including SHA-256, SHA-384 and SHA 512. The stronger cryptographic algorithm will minimize the chances of compromise.

Hashed Message Authentication Code (HMAC)

HMAC uses the mechanism of hashing, but it adds another feature of using

the secret key in its operation. Both peers only know this secret key. Therefore, in this case, only parties with secret keys can calculate and verify hash. By using HMAC, if there is an attacker who is eavesdropping, it will not be able to inject or modify the data and recalculate the correct hash because he will not know the correct key used by HMAC.

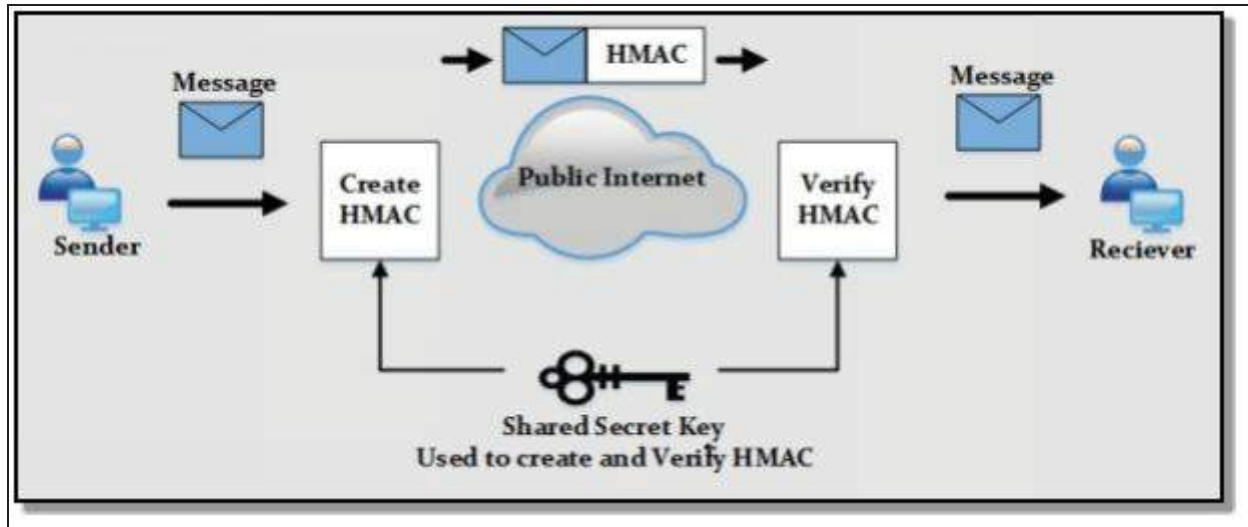


Figure 20-05. HMAC Working Conceptual Diagram

SSH (Secure Shell)

Secure Shell Protocol, commonly known in short as SSH protocol is a protocol that is used for secure remote connections. It is a secure alternative to insecure protocols such as Telnet, rlogin and FTP. SSH is not only used for remote login but also with other protocols such as File Transfer Protocol (FTP), Secure Copy Protocol (SCP). SFTP (SSH File Transfer Protocol) is popularly used for secure file transfer as it runs over SSH. SSH protocol functions over client-server architecture where SSH client connects to SSH server through a secure SSH channel over an insecure network.

Secure Shell (SSH) protocol is consists of three major components:

- The Transport Layer Protocol [SSH-TRANS] provides server authentication, confidentiality, and integrity. It may optionally also provide compression. The transport layer will typically be run over a TCP/IP connection, but might also be used on top of any other reliable data stream.
- The User Authentication Protocol [SSH-USERAUTH] authenticates the client-side user to the server. It runs over the transport layer

protocol.

- The Connection Protocol [SSH-CONNECT] multiplexes the encrypted tunnel into several logical channels. It runs over the user authentication protocol.

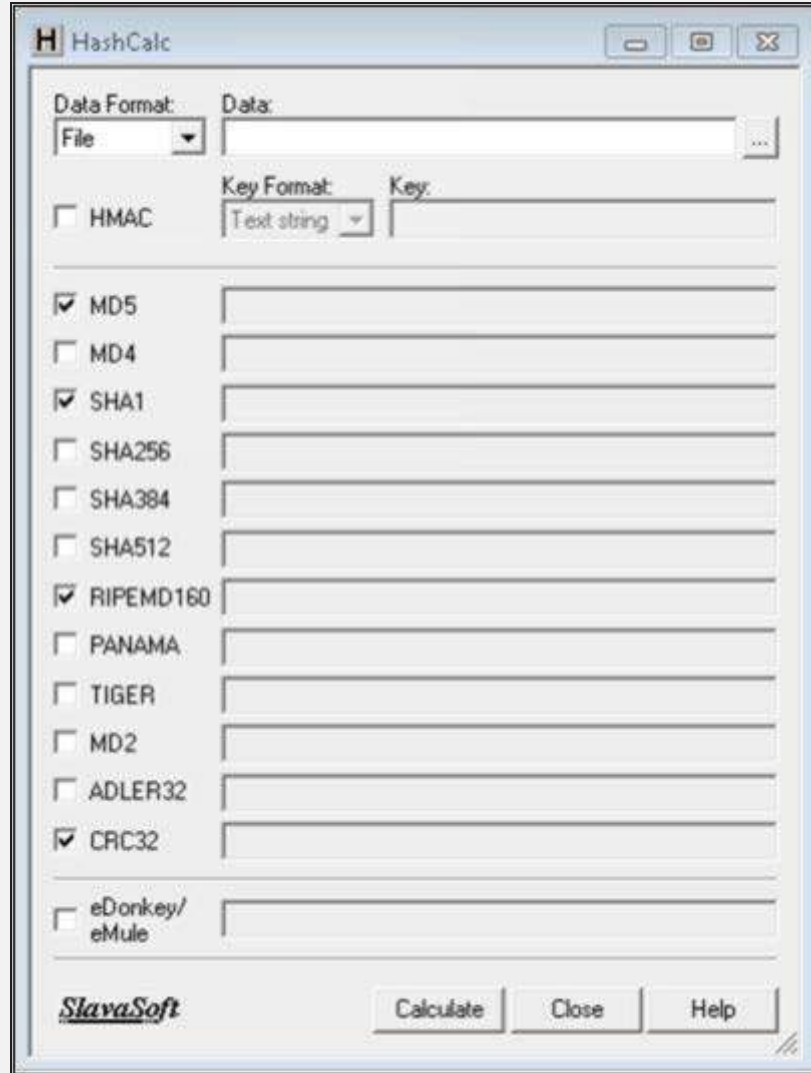


Figure 20-06. HashCalc Tool

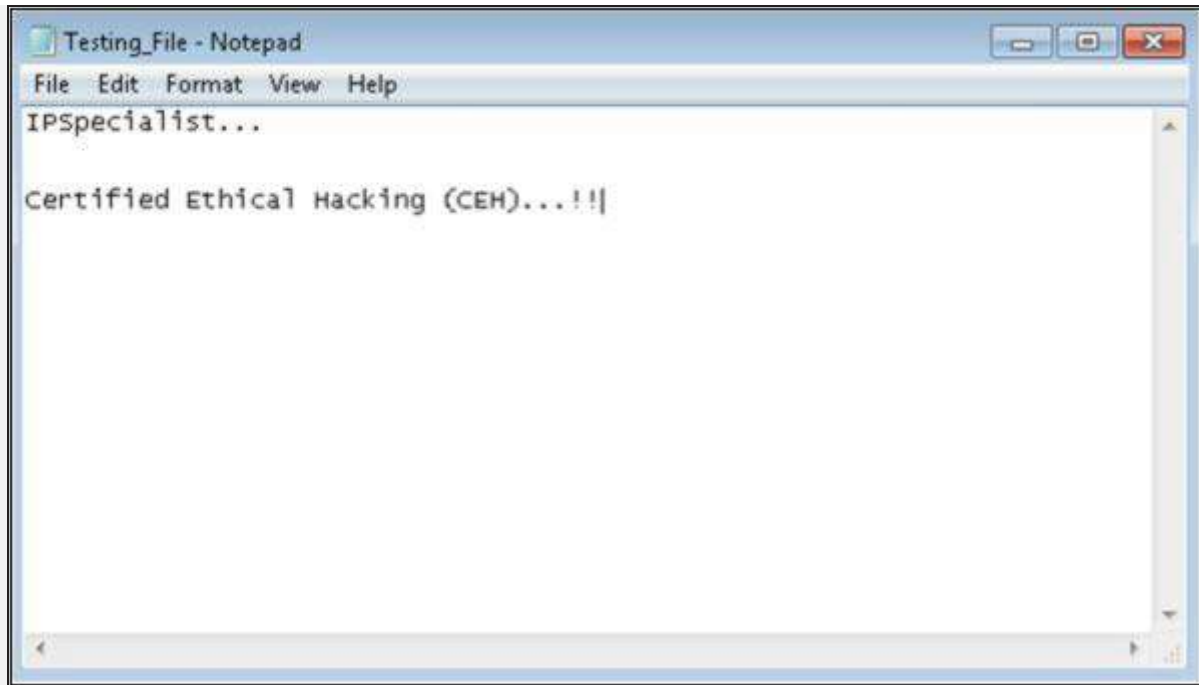


Figure 20-07. Creating File for MD5 Calculation

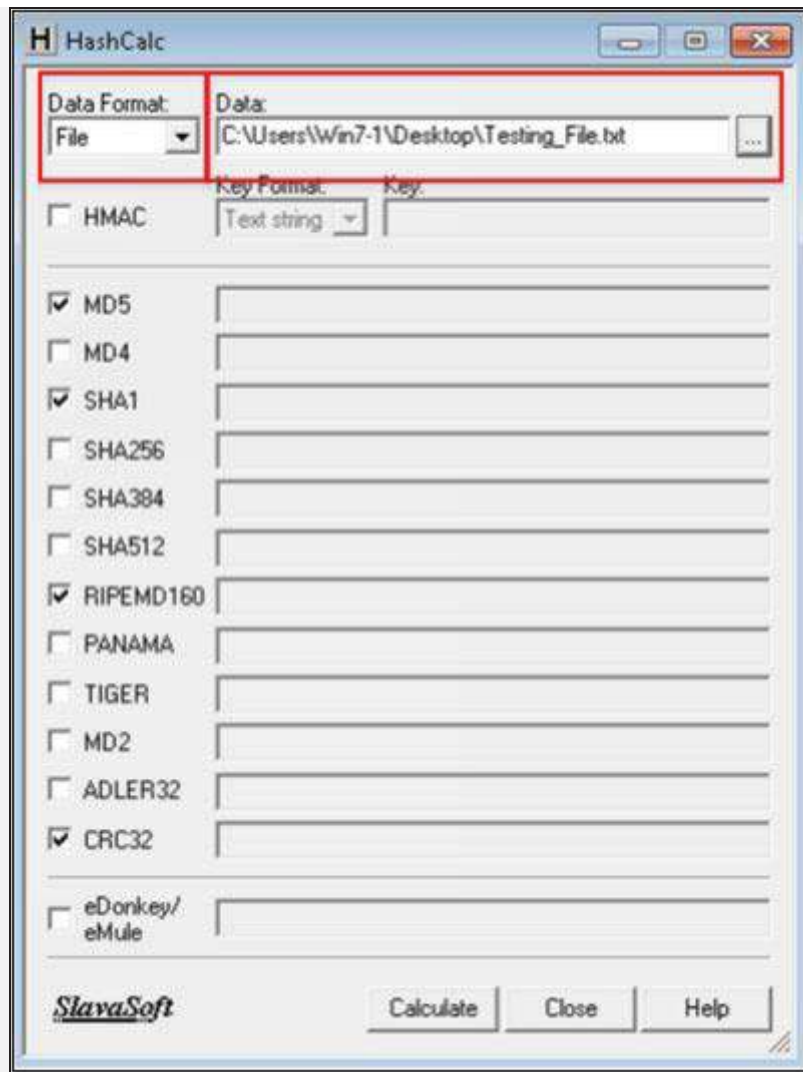


Figure 20-08. Uploading File to calculate Hash

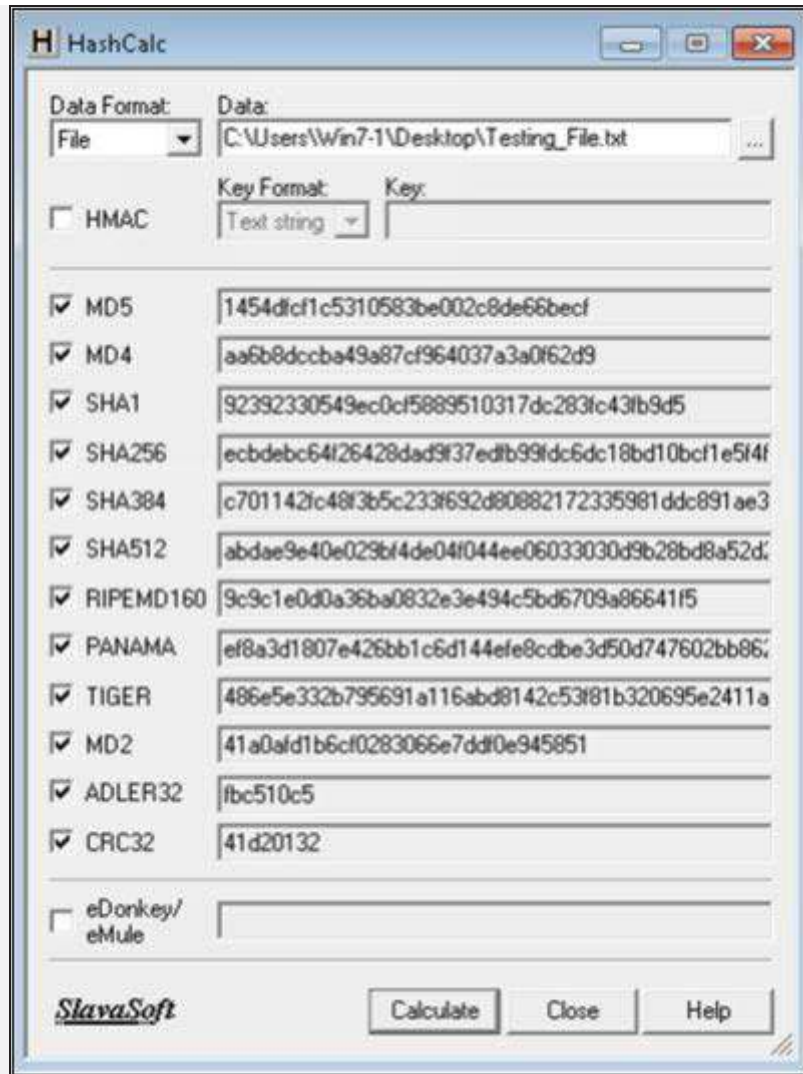


Figure 20-09. Calculating Hash

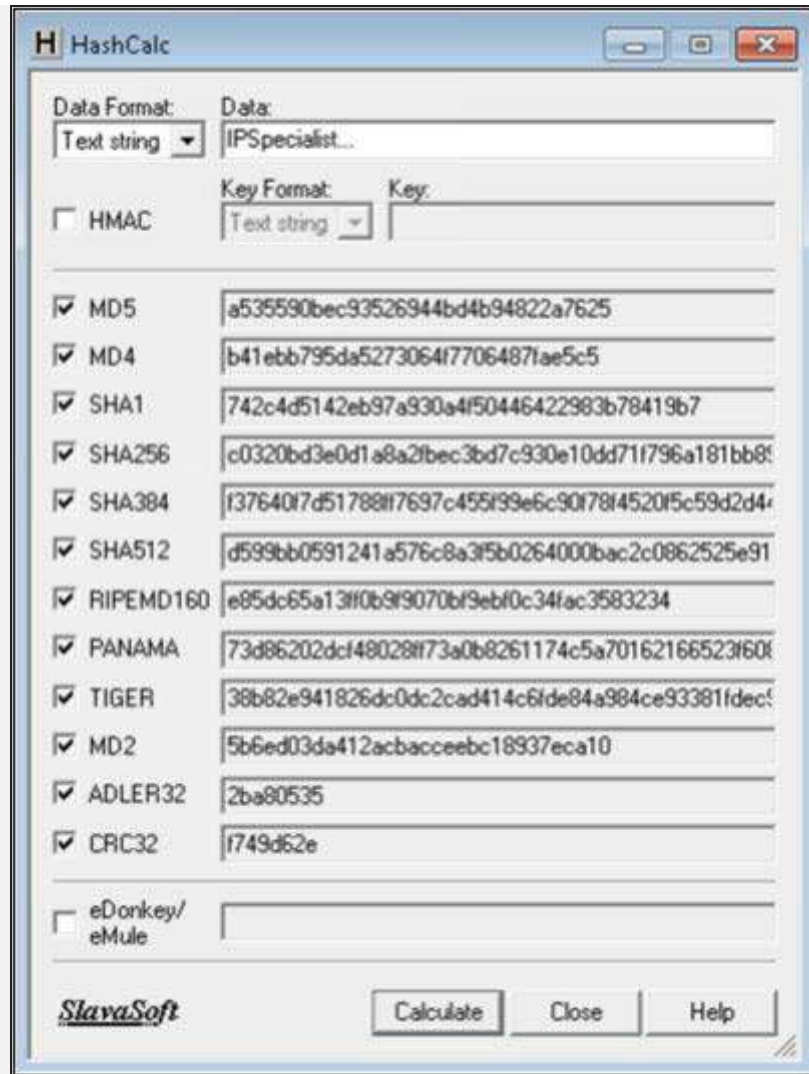


Figure 20-10. Calculating Hash with Text String

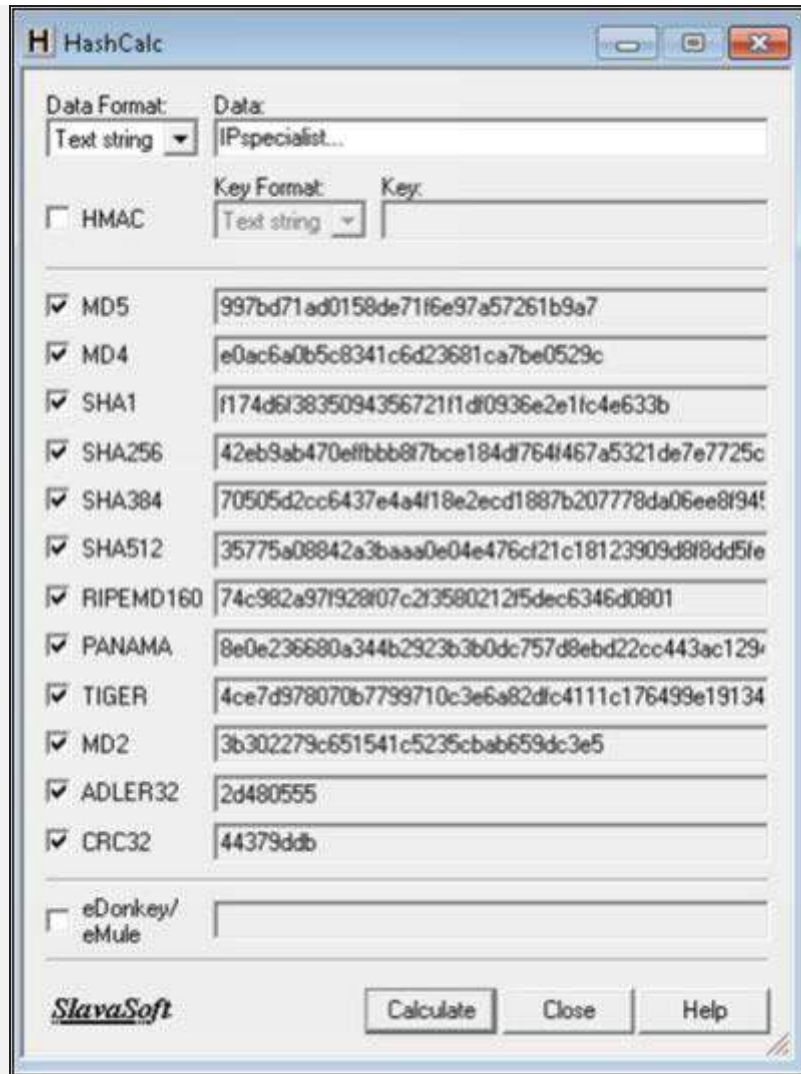


Figure 20-11. Comparing Hash of different Text String

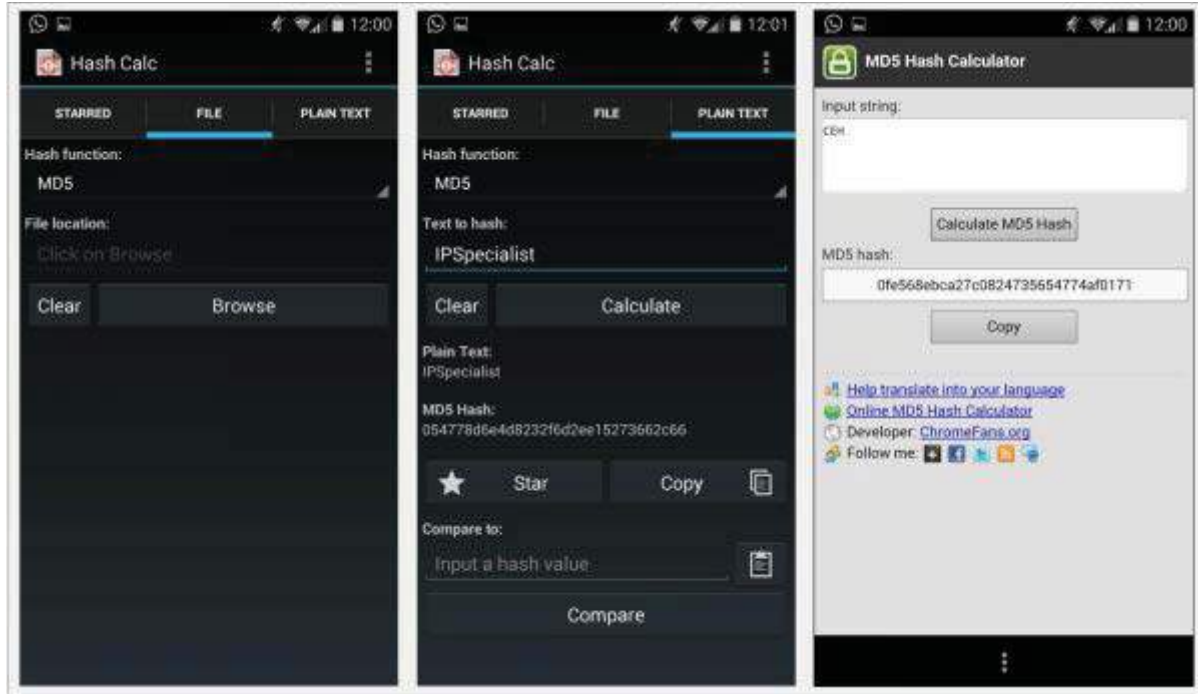


Figure 20-12. Hashing tools for Mobile

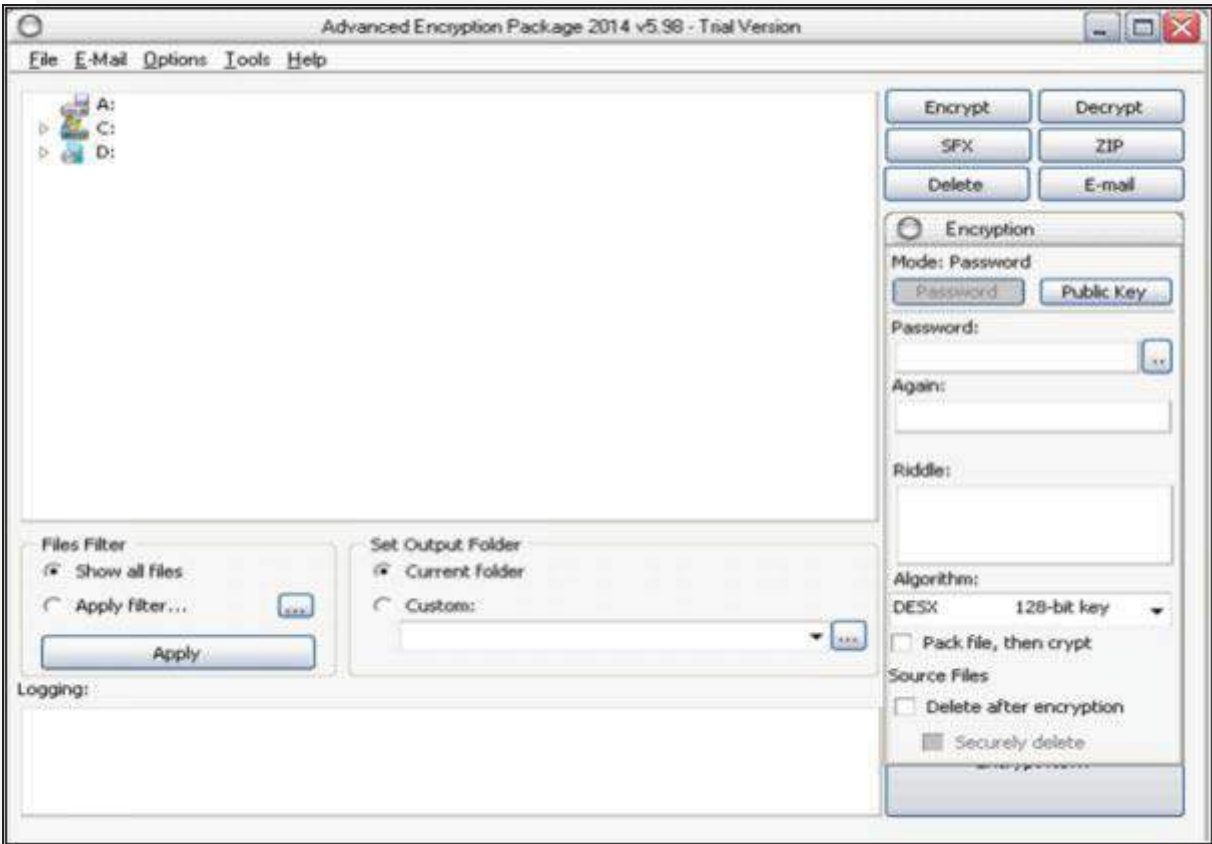


Figure 20-13. Advanced Encryption Package 2014

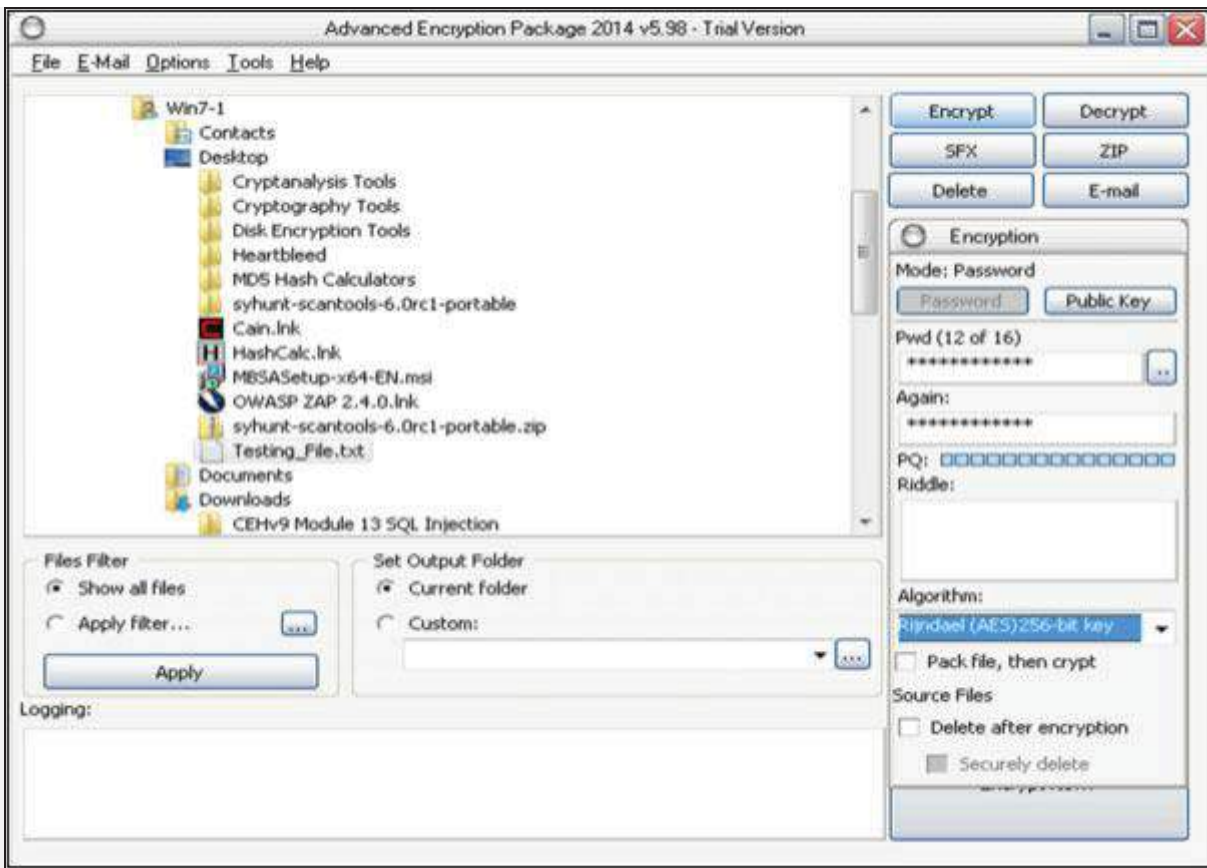


Figure 20-14. Uploading File to Encrypt

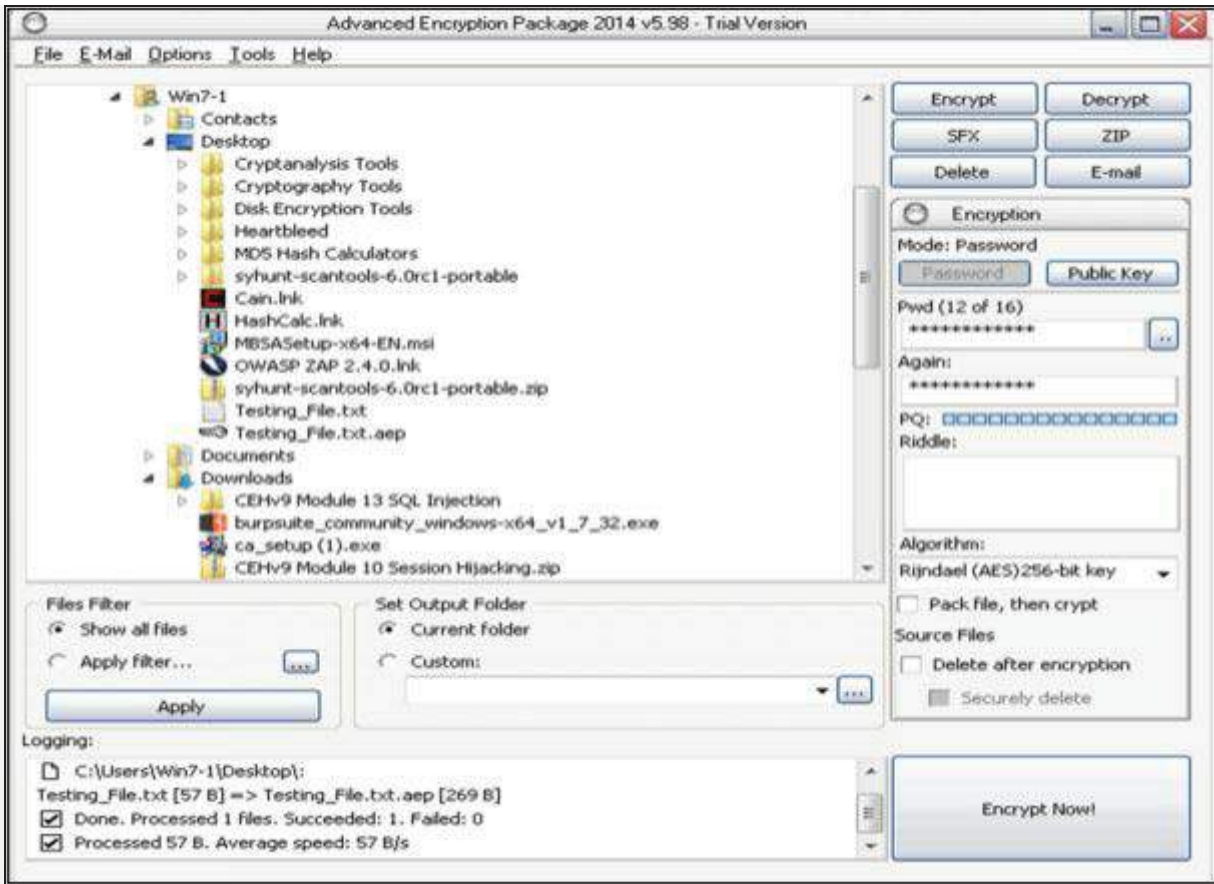


Figure 20-15. Encrypting with AES 256-bit

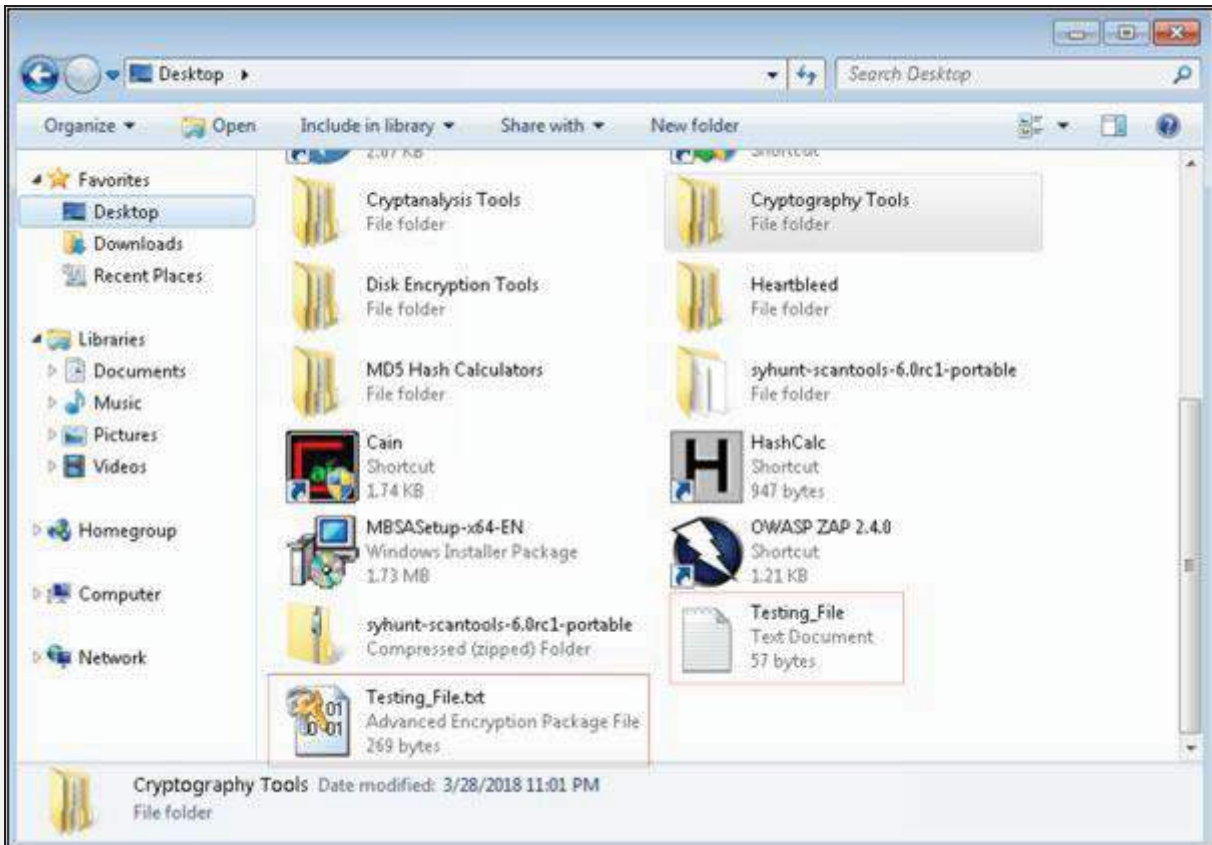


Figure 20-16. Comparing Encrypted and Original Files

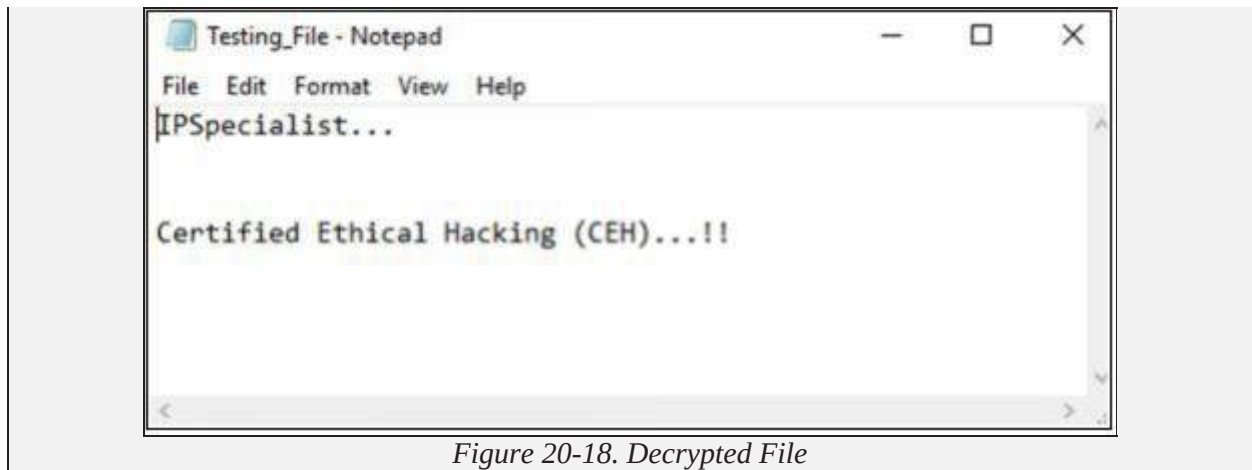


Figure 20-18. Decrypted File

Public Key Infrastructure(PKI)

Public Key Infrastructure

PKI is the combination of policies, procedures, hardware, software, and people that are required to create manage and revoke digital certificates. Before moving to the original discussion, basic terminologies needs explanation.

Public and Private Key Pair

Public and Private Key pair work like a team in encryption/decryption process. The public key is provided to everyone, and the private key is secret. Every device makes sure that no one has its private key. We encrypt data sending to a particular node by using its public key. Similarly, the private key is used to decrypt the data. It is also true in the opposite case. If a node encrypts a data with its private key, the public key is for decryption.

Certification Authorities (CA)

A certificate authority (CA) is a computer or entity that creates and issues digital certificates. Number of things like IP address, fully qualified domain name and the public key of a particular device is present in the digital certificate. CA also assigns a serial number to the digital certificate and signs the certificate with its digital signature.

Root Certificate

Root certificate provides the public key and other details of CA. An example of one is:

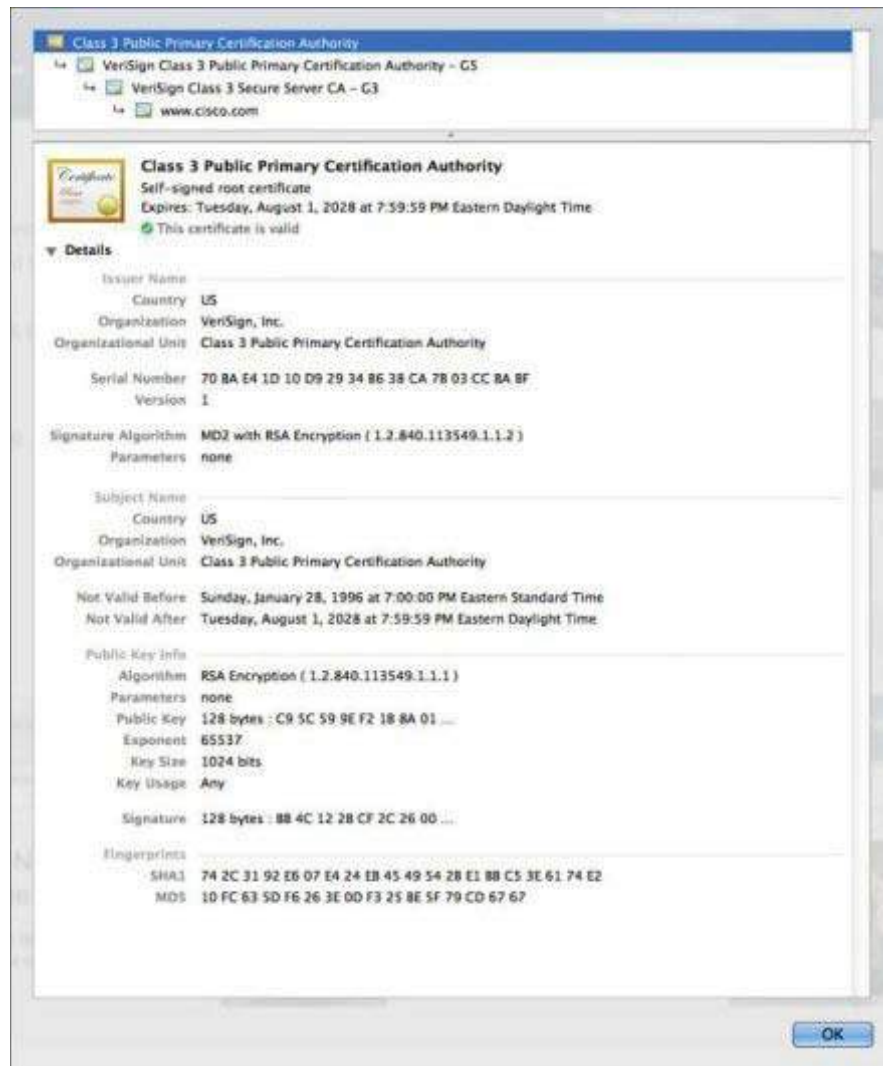


Figure 20-19. Example Root Certificate

There are multiple informative sections in the figure above including a serial number, issuer, country and organization names, validity dates, and public key itself. Every OS has its placement procedure regarding the certificates. Certificate container for specific OS can be searched on the internet to get to the certificates stored on the local computer.

Identity Certificate

The purpose of identity certificate is similar to root certificate except that it provides the public key and identity of client computer or device. For example, a client router or web server who wishes to make SSL connections with other peers.

Signed Certificate Vs. Self Signed Certificate

Self-Signed Certificates and Signed Certificates from a Certificate Authority (CA) provide security in the same way. Communication using these types of certificates are protected encrypted by high-level security. Presence of Certificate Authority implies that a trusted source certifies communication. The signed security certificate is to be purchase whereas Self-signed certificates can be configured to optimize cost. A Third-party Certificate Authority (CA) requires verification of domain ownership, and other verification to issue a certificate.

Email Encryption

Digital Signature

Digital Signature is a technique to evaluate the authenticity of digital documents as signature authenticate the authenticity of a document. Digital Signature ensures the author of the document, date and time of signing and authenticates the content of the message.

There are two categories of Digital Signatures:

1. Direct Digital Signature
2. Arbitrated Digital Signature

Direct Digital Signature

Direct Digital Signatures involves only sender and receiver of the message assuming that receiver has sender's Public Key. The sender may sign entire message or hash with the private key and send it towards the destination. The receiver decrypts it using the Public key.

Arbitrated Digital Signature

Arbitrated Digital Signatures involves a third-party called "Trusted Arbiter." The role of this Arbiter is to validate the signed messages, insert date and then send it to the recipient. It requires a suitable level of trust and can implement with either public or private key.

SSL (Secure Sockets Layer)

In a corporate environment, we can implement the security of corporate traffic over the public cloud by using site-to-site or remote VPN. In public, there is no IPsec software running. Normal users also need to do encryption in different cases like online banking, electronic shopping. In such situations, SSL comes in to play. The good thing about Secure Socket Layer (SSL) is that almost every single web browser in use today supports SSL. By using SSL, the web browser makes an HTTPS-based session with the server instead of HTTP. Whenever a browser tries to make HTTPS based session with a server, a certificate request is sent to the server in the background. The server in return, reply with its digital certificate containing its public key. The web browser checks the authenticity of this certificate with a certificate authority (CA). Let's assume that certificate is valid, now server and the web browser have a secure session between them.

SSL and TLS for Secure Communication

The terms SSL (Secure Socket Layer) and TLS (Transport Layer Security) are often used interchangeably, and provide encryption and authentication of data in motion. These protocols are intended for a scenario where users want secure communication over an unsecured network like the public internet. Most common applications of such protocols are web browsing, Voice over IP (VOIP), and electronic mail.

Consider a scenario where a user wants to send an email to someone or wants to purchase something from an online store where credit card credentials may be needed. SSL only spills the data after a process known as 'handshake.' If a hacker bypasses the encryption process than everything from bank account information to a secret conversation is visible which malicious users may use for personal gain.

SSL was developed by Netscape in 1994 with an intention to protect web transactions. The last version for SSL was version 3.0. In 1999, IETF created Transport Layer Security, which is also known as SSL 3.1 as TLS is, in fact, an adapted version of SSL.

The following are some of the important functionalities SSL/TLS has been designed to do:

- Server authentication to client and vice versa.
- Select common cryptographic algorithm.
- Generate shared secrets between peers.
- Protection of normal TCP/UDP connection

Working

Working of SSL and TSL is divided into two phases:

Phase 1 (Session Establishment)

In this phase, common cryptographic protocol and peer authentication take place. There are three sub-phases within overall phase 1 of SSL/TLS as explained below:

- **Sub-phase 1.** In this phase, hello messages are exchanged to negotiate common parameters of SSL/TLS such as authentication and encryption algorithms.

- **Sub-phase 2.** This phase includes one-way or two-way authentication between client and server end. A master key from is sent by client side by using server's public key to start protecting the session.
- **Sub-phase 3.** The last phase calculates a session key, and cipher suite is finally activated. HMAC provides data integrity features by using either SHA-1 or MD5. Similarly, using DES-40, DES-CBC, 3DEC-EDE, 3DES-CBC, RC4-40, or RC4-128 provides confidentiality features.

**** Session Keys Creation.** Methods for generating session keys are as follows:

- *RSA Based.* Using public key of peer encrypts shared secret string.
- *A fixed DH Key Exchange.* Fixed Diffie-Hellman based key exchanged in a certificate creates a session key.
- *An ephemeral DH Key Exchange.* It is considered to be the best protection option as actual DH value is signed with the private key of the sender, and hence each session has a different set of keys.
- *An anonymous DH Key Exchange without any Certificate or Signature.* Avoiding this option is advised, as it cannot prevent man in the middle attacks.

Phase 2 (Secure Data Transfer)

In this phase, secure data transfer takes place between encapsulating endpoints. Each SSL session has unique session ID which exchanges during the authentication process. The session ID is used to differentiate between old and new session. The client can request the server to resume the session based on this ID (In case, sever has a session ID in its cache).

TLS 1.0 is considered to be a bit more secure than the last version of SSL (SSL v3.0). Even US Government has also declared not to use SSL v3.0 for highly sensitive communications due to latest vulnerability named as POODLE. After POODLE vulnerability, most web browsers have disabled SSL v3.0 for most of the communication and services. Current browsers (Google Chrome, Firefox, and others) support TLS 1.0 by default and latest versions of TLS (TLS 1.1 and TLS 1.2) optionally. TLS 1.0 is considered to

be equivalent to SSL3.0. However, newer versions of TLS are considered to be far more secure than SSL. Keep in mind that SSL v3.0 and TLS 1.0 is not compatible with each other as TLS uses Diffie-Hellman and Data Security Standard (DSS) while SSL uses RSA.

Apart from secure web browsing by using HTTPS, SSL/TLS can also use for securing other protocols like FTP, SMTP, and SNTP, and other protocols.

Pretty Good Privacy (PGP)

OpenPGP is the most widely used email encryption standard. It is defined by the OpenPGP Working Group of the Internet Engineering Task Force (IETF) as a Proposed Standard in RFC 4880. OpenPGP is derived from the PGP software, created by Phil Zimmermann. The main purpose of OpenPGP is to ensure an end to end encryption over email communication; it also provides message encryption and decryption and password manager, data compression and digital signing.

Disk Encryption

Disk Encryption refers to the encryption of disk to secure files and directories by converting into an encrypted format. Disk encryption encrypts every bit on disk to prevent unauthorized access to data storage. There are several disk encryption tools available to secure disk volume such as:

- Symantec Drive Encryption
- GiliSoft Full Disk Encryption

Cryptography Attacks

Cryptography attacks are intended to recover encryption key. Once an attacker has the encryption key, he can decrypt all messages. Weak encryption algorithms are not resistant enough to cryptographic attacks. The process of finding vulnerabilities in a code, encryption algorithm, or key management scheme is called Cryptanalysis. It may be used to strengthen a cryptographic algorithm or to decrypt the encryption.

Known Plaintext Attack

Known plaintext attack is a cryptographic attack type where a cryptanalyst has access to plaintext and the corresponding ciphertext and seeks to discover a correlation between them.

Cipher-text Only Attack

A ciphertext-only attack is a cryptographic attack type where a cryptanalyst has access to a ciphertext but does not have access to the corresponding plaintext. The attacker attempts to extract the plain text or key by recovering plain text messages as much as possible to guess the key. Once the attacker has the encryption key, it can decrypt all messages.

Chosen Plaintext Attack

A chosen plaintext attack is a cryptographic attack type where a cryptanalyst can encrypt a plaintext of his choosing and observe the resulting ciphertext. It is the most common attack against asymmetric cryptography. To attempt chosen plaintext attack, the attacker has information about encryption algorithm or may have access to the workstation encrypting the messages. The attacker sends chosen plaintexts through encryption algorithm to extract ciphertexts and then encryption key. Chosen plaintext attack is vulnerable in the scenario where public key cryptography is being in use, and the public key is used to encrypt the message. In the worst case, an attacker can expose sensitive information.

Chosen Cipher-text Attack

A chosen ciphertext attack is a cryptographic attack type where a cryptanalyst chooses a ciphertext and attempts to find the corresponding plaintext.

Adaptive Chosen Cipher-text Attack

Adaptively chosen ciphertext attack is an interactive type of chosen plaintext attack where an attacker sends some ciphertexts to be decrypted and observe

the results of decryption. Adaptively chosen ciphertext attacks gradually reveal the information about encryption.

Adaptive Chosen Plaintext Attack

An adaptive chosen-plaintext attack is a form of Chosen plaintext cryptographic attack where the cryptanalyst issues a series of interactive queries, choosing subsequent plaintexts based on the information from the previous encryptions.

Rubber Hose Attack

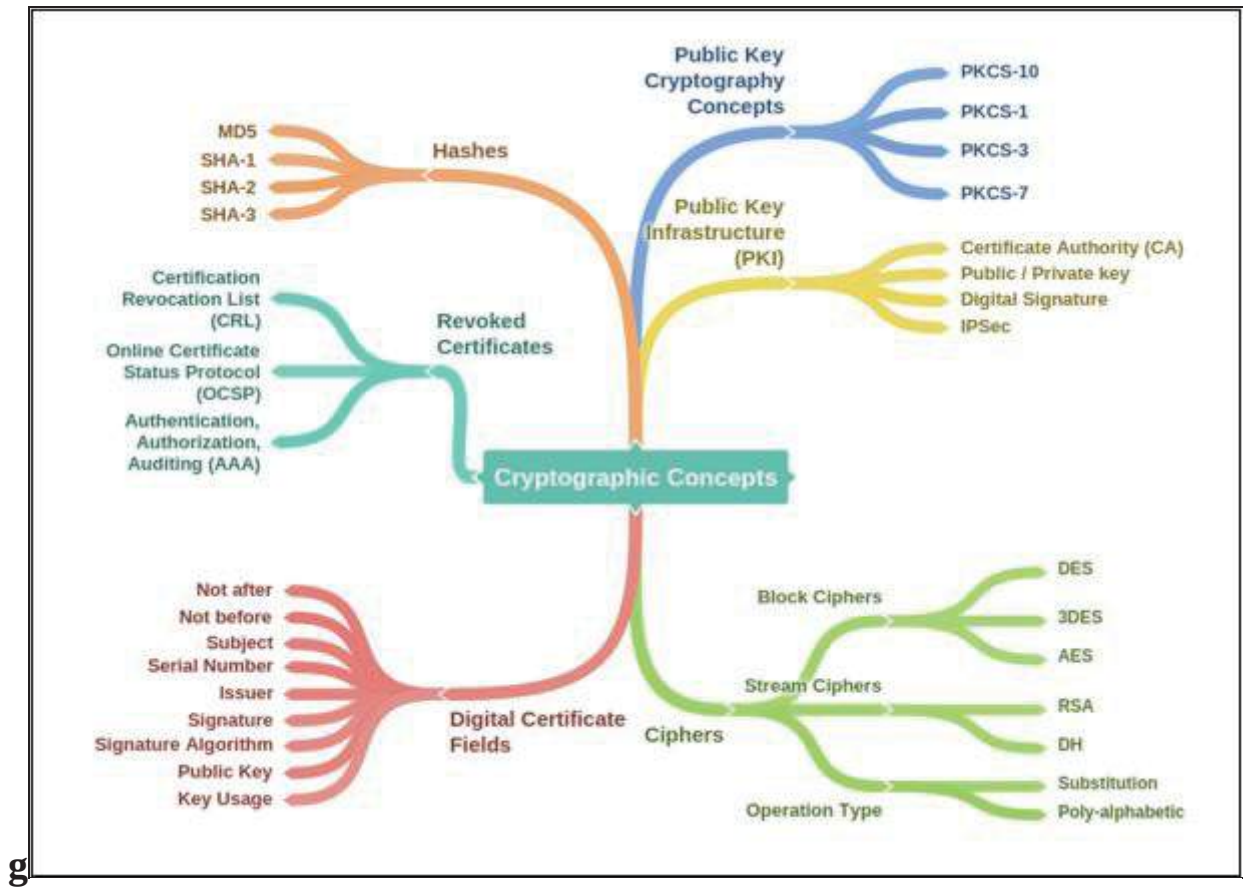
Rubber hose attack is a technique of gaining information about cryptographic secret such as passwords, keys, encrypted files, by torturing a person.
